# PUBLIC STATUTES OF THE SESSION.

TWENTY-FIFTH PARLIAMENT—SECOND SESSION.

## APPROPRIATION ACT (GEO. V No. 15, 1920)—

An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain Sums to make good the Supplies granted for the Service of the year from the 1st day of July, 1920, to the 30th day of June, 1921 (inclusive of both dates); to adjust the vote "Advance to Treasurer," 1919-20, Consolidated Revenue Fund, for supplementary charges during the period from the 1st day of July, 1919, to the 30th day of June, 1920 (inclusive of both dates); to cover payments "Unauthorised in Suspense," Consolidated Revenue Fund, for urgent claims on account of Services of the years 1918-19 and 1919-20; to provide for Public Works and other Services out of the Public Works Fund; and to provide for Services out of the Closer Settlement Fund; and for purposes connected with and incidental to the above objects. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 26 November, 1920. Assented to, 1 December, 1920.]

## BLACKHEATH VALIDATION ACT (GEO. V No. 7, 1920)—

An Act to validate the reconstitution of the Blue Mountains Shire, and the creation thereby of a Municipality of Blackheath and a new Blue Mountains Shire; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Council by the Hon. E. J. Kavanagh, 8 September, 1920. Assented to, 12 October, 1920.]

## BOOKMAKERS' TAXATION (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 33, 1920)—

An Act to increase the taxes payable by bookmakers; to amend the Finance (Taxation) Act, 1915, the Finance Taxation (Management) Act, 1915, the Finance Taxation (Amendment) Act, 1917, and the Bookmakers (Taxation) Act, 1917; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 15 December, 1920. Assented to, 29 December, 1920.]

## CONVEYANCING (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 23, 1920)—

An Act to amend the Conveyancing Act, 1919, and certain other Acts; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Council by the Hon. R. Sproule, 13 October, 1920. Assented to, 23 December, 1920.]

## CROWN LANDS (RESUMPTION) VALIDATION ACT (GEO. V No. 31, 1920)—

An Act to validate certain resumptions of land under the Crown Lands Acts; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Loughlin, 15 December, 1920. Assented to, 29 December, 1920.]

## EIGHT HOURS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 28, 1920)—

An Act to provide for inquiry into and regulation of the working hours of employees; to amend the Eight Hours Act, 1916, and the Acts relating to industrial arbitration; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Cann, 8 December, 1920. Assented to, 29 December, 1920.]

## FAIR RENTS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 46, 1920)—

An Act to amend the Fair Rents Act, 1915; to amend the law relating to landlord and tenant; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. McTiernan, 8 December, 1920. Assented to, 31 December, 1920.]

## FOOD PRESERVATION BY SULPHUR DIOXIDE ENABLING ACT (GEO. V No. 48, 1920)—

An Act to sanction and regulate the use of sulphur dioxide in the preservation of whole meats, poultry, fish, and other articles of food; to amend the Public Health Acts, the Pure Food Act, 1908; and certain other Acts; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Wearne, 1 December, 1920. Assented to, 31 December, 1920.]



**FRIENDLY SOCIETIES (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 38, 1920)—**

An Act to amend the Friendly Societies Act, 1912; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Dooley, 16 December, 1920. Assented to, 31 December, 1920.]

**GAS ACT AMENDMENT ACT (GEO. V No. 14, 1920)—**

An Act to amend the Gas Act, 1912. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Cann, 26 October, 1920. Assented to, 30 November, 1920.]

**GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 26, 1920)—**

An Act to authorise the Railway Commissioners for New South Wales to acquire, hold, develop, and work coal-mines within the State of New South Wales; to amend the Government Railways Act, 1912; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Estell, 27 October, 1920. Assented to, 29 December, 1920.]

**GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 5, 1920)—**

An Act to amend the Government Savings Bank Act, 1906; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 15 September, 1920. Assented to, 11 October, 1920.]

**GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK (RURAL BANK) ACT (GEO. V No. 40, 1920)—**

An Act to provide for the establishment and the carrying on of a Rural Bank Department of the Government Savings Bank; to make better provision for financing farmers; to make further provision for the management of the Government Savings Bank; to repeal the Valuation of Land Act, 1916, so far as concerns the Government Savings Bank of New South Wales in respect to valuations for loans and investments; to amend the Government Savings Bank Act, 1906, the Acts amending the same, and certain other Acts; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Captain Dunn, 9 December, 1920. Assented to, 31 December, 1920.]

**GUN LICENSE ACT (GEO. V No. 42, 1920)—**

An Act to regulate and license the use, carriage, possession, sale, and hire of guns and firearms; to prohibit the use, possession, or sale of maxim silencers; and for other purposes connected therewith or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Dooley, 14 December, 1920. Assented to, 31 December, 1920.]

**HARBOUR AND TONNAGE RATES ACT (GEO. V No. 12, 1920)—**

An Act to make provision for levying and collecting harbour, tonnage, and buoyage rates, and berthing charges, and for the management and control of public wharfs, and the lands, buildings, or property connected therewith, in certain ports; for regulating the berthing and removal of vessels to or from such wharfs, and the discharging, loading, storing, stacking, and removing of goods on or from such wharfs; to amend the Port Kembla Harbour Act, 1898, and to repeal the Wharfage and Tonnage Rates Act, 1901, and the Port Kembla Wharfage and Tonnage Rates Amendment Act, 1916; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 5 October, 1920. Assented to, 19 November, 1920.]

**INCOME-TAX (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 21, 1920)—**

An Act to amend the Income-tax Act, 1911, as amended by the Income-tax (Amendment) Act, 1912, and the Income-tax (Amendment) Act, 1914; and for other purposes. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 30 November, 1920. Assented to, 21 December, 1920.]

**INDUSTRIAL ARBITRATION (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 19, 1920)—**

An Act to provide for declarations by the Board of Trade as to living wages taking effect throughout the State; to amend the Acts relating to industrial arbitration; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Cann, 26 October, 1920. Assented to, 10 December, 1920.]

## LEGAL PRACTITIONERS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 29, 1920)—

An Act to admit Richard Denis Meagher to practise as an attorney, solicitor, and proctor of the Supreme Court of New South Wales; to amend the Legal Practitioners Act of 1898, and the Charter of Justice; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Bennett, 21 October, 1920. Assented to, 29 December, 1920.]

## LOAN ACT (GEO. V No. 27, 1920)—

An Act to authorise the raising of a loan for public works and services; and for other purposes. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. McKell, 22 December, 1920. Assented to, 29 December, 1920.]

## LOCAL GOVERNMENT (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 44, 1920)—

An Act to amend the Local Government Act, 1919, and certain other Acts; to validate certain things; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Mutch, 15 December, 1920. Assented to, 31 December, 1920.]

## MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF SYDNEY ELECTRIC LIGHTING (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 22, 1920)—

*Address in Reply:* The ordinary rule, which precluded any discussion of or reflection on the conduct of a judge, did not apply to a judge from another State who was acting here as a Royal Commissioner, 129; an amendment to

**SPEAKER, MR., RULINGS AND OPINIONS OF (ctd.):** strike out all the words after "That" in the motion for the adoption of the address in reply was irregular, and not in accordance with the usages of the House, but Mr. Speaker was not prepared to rule it out of order while the debate was still in progress; he did not know how the intention of the standing orders that the House should adopt an address in reply would be carried out unless some further motion were passed, 609.

**Adjournment:** A motion of adjournment to discuss the proposal to remit the question of members' parliamentary allowances to a judge, and the menace of the Premier's attempted intimidation on this and other matters to make the judiciary subserve the political ends of the Government, clearly referred to more than one subject, and was therefore out of order, 1530; a motion to discuss the contemptuous attitude of the Government towards a request for means to display war trophies, was made a matter of urgent public importance by the mere fact of five members having risen in their places, but it was hoped this position would be changed by an alteration of the standing orders, which would leave it to Mr. Speaker to decide the question of urgency, 1764; a motion to discuss the provision of an addition to the Federal payment, and of certain railway and tramway privileges to maimed and limbless soldiers, was not out of order on the ground that it referred to two different matters—it dealt with substantially one matter, although it was put in a double form; but it was out of order because it was reasonably probable that an opportunity would be presented for the discussion of the subject at an early date on the railway estimates, 2481; a motion to discuss the granting of increased allowances to beneficiaries under the Miners' Accident Relief Fund was out of order on the ground that the desirableness of granting the increase could not be regarded as a specific and urgent matter of recent occurrence, 2645; a motion to discuss the refusal of the Government to permit farmers to engage harvest labourers except through the Government labour exchanges was out of order, having regard to the reasonable probability of an early opportunity for discussion being afforded in connection with the estimates, 2646; the foregoing motion, on being again brought forward after the estimates had been considered, was allowed to be moved as dealing with an urgent

and a definite matter of public importance—notwithstanding that an opportunity for discussion might have presented itself recently, 2732; in dealing with the point that a motion for adjournment anticipated an order of the day, regard would be paid to the probability of the anticipated matter being brought before the House within a reasonable time, 2481, 2646, 2731, 3971; there was no rule precluding members against whom charges had been made from voting while such charges were being inquired into, 2740; a motion calling on the Government to provide employment throughout the State was out of order—the subject-matter of a motion of adjournment must be a specific matter, and a matter of recent occurrence, and not an abstract resolution, 3970.

**Basic Wage:** A matter which was being considered by the Board of Trade or a wages board was *sub judice*, and should not be discussed in the House, 770; a bill for the endowment of motherhood, which was the subject of an introductory notice of motion, might or might not affect the question of the basic wage, and a motion to discuss the latter question did not, so far as could be seen, conflict with the notice of motion, 772.

**Bolshevism in Russia:** Mr. Speaker recognised no ruling by which a member could be restricted in his *bona fide* quotations in support of a proposition before the House, 1611; quotations and remarks must be generally relevant to the main purpose of the motion, 1613-14.

**Donald, Walter Croal:** In view of the House having by two motions expressed its desire that the ordinary procedure should be set aside to enable the petitioner to appear at the bar of the House, a member other than the one in whose name the motion relating to the matter appeared on the business-paper would be permitted to move it; a motion having been carried that the petitioner be heard at the bar, no discussion on the merits of the case could be permitted on the motion, "That the petitioner be now heard," 4163; there was nothing in the standing orders to prevent a petitioner from appearing on his own behalf at the bar of the House, 4175.

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**ASSEMBLY (continued):****SPEAKER, MR., RULINGS AND OPINIONS OF (ctd.):**

*Electorate Vacancies:* There was no provision in the electoral law for a by-election, and therefore Mr. Speaker, in the case of a seat being resigned on the eve of the meeting of Parliament, deemed it his duty to withhold the issue of a writ pending a resolution of the House, as provided in section 70, declaring the seat vacant. On such a resolution being carried, Mr. Speaker would regard it as an authority to issue a writ, and when that was done, his duty would have been discharged, 212; *obs.*, 552, 608, 1043, 1174.

*Food Preservation by Sulphur Dioxide Enabling Bill:* Under the special circumstances the member in charge of the bill was permitted to move the third reading immediately after the report of the committee had been received, but a distinction was drawn between Government and private bills. The setting aside of the standing orders was a matter in which the greatest care should be exercised, and Mr. Speaker would be very careful in future about allowing the rules to be set aside in the case of a private bill, especially towards the end of the session, 3818.

*James, Mr. Justice, Appointment of:* A motion of adjournment to discuss the conduct of the Government in connection with the appointment of Mr. Justice James was not in proper form, but could, if desired by the mover, be amended by striking out superfluous words, without the consent of the House, 933.

*Mining (Amendment) Bill:* The fact that a royal commissioner was inquiring into the administration of the railways and tramways did not preclude members from discussing the bill on the second reading, even though the measure proposed to confer certain powers on the Railway Commissioners, 3079.

Section 4 of the Imperial Constitution statute made it clear that the House had the power, subject to certain rules and provisions of law with regard to the reservation of bills for the royal assent, to alter its own Constitution, 2016; *obs.*, 3575.

*Parliamentary Select Committee Enabling Bill:* The bill, although it simply affected a committee of the Legislative Council, involved expenditure, and should have originated in the Assembly, and should have been preceded by a message from the Crown, 4108.

*Parliamentary Select Committees Enabling Bill:* The bill, which proposed to permit certain select committees of the two Houses to sit during recess, must involve the expenditure of public money, and therefore should have originated in the Assembly, and should have been preceded by a message from the Governor; the bill also was out of order on the ground that it dealt with matters affecting the powers and privileges of the House, namely, a select committee of the House, 4002; a second bill under the same title as a former bill which had been ruled out of order, as just stated, having originated in the Assembly, was properly before the House. It was not contrary to the Constitution Act, 4189.

*Parliamentary Staff Salaries: obs.*, 4155.

*Personal Explanations:* Members would not be permitted to correct what they deemed to be inaccuracies in newspapers, under cover of personal explanations, 176, 2566; a personal explanation did not afford a member an opportunity to reply to something said in the course of debate, but was intended to permit of explanation of what was regarded as a misrepresentation of remarks made in the House, 264; a member must not under cover of a personal explanation make an attack on another member, 676, 2914.

*Petitions:* A member could not present a petition from himself, 2335; a petition praying for the removal of the name of Sir Thomas Henley, K.B.E., from the list of Knights of the British Empire, was not respectful, decorous, and temperate in its language, as required by the standing orders, and could not be received, 3958.

*Privilege:* A motion that the action of the Royal Commissioner inquiring into the adequacy of Ministers' and members' salaries in subpoenaing members as witnesses was a breach of privilege, dealt with a matter which could be said to directly affect the privileges of the House, and was in order, 2587.

*Public Works Committee:* There was no provision for an election of the committee in any other than the first session of each Parliament, 84.

*Questions:* Until the sessional orders were passed there was no limit to the time for asking questions; it was not compulsory for Ministers to answer questions, 101; questions must be asked only with the object of obtaining information, 1114, 2080, 2339; Mr. Speaker could not control the tone in which members asked questions, but he would see that questions were put in such a way as to be audible, 1115; a member could not supply information under the guise of asking a question, 1423, 2339, 4077; a member could not draw attention to the absence of any member from the Chamber unless he were a Minister, and it were sought to connect his absence with some neglect of duty, 1527; a question asking for an expression of opinion on a legal or constitutional point could not be allowed, 2036, 2634, 2824; a question should not contain arguments, expressions of opinion, inferences, or imputations, 2160; members were not at liberty to ask questions relating to matters which were being inquired into by a royal commission or to the procedure of the commission, 2421, 2422; it was not in order to ask merely if certain statements in a newspaper were true, but attention might be drawn to them if the member asking the question made himself responsible for their accuracy, 2474; it was against the rules to ask a Minister whether he was aware that a certain man had done something, unless he followed up the question by asking whether the Minister intended to take action, 2639; if the point were taken that the answer to a question given by a Minister was not strictly relevant, Mr. Speaker would look into it, but it had been the practice to allow a certain amount of latitude to Ministers, and not to confine them strictly to the specific question asked, 2822; when a question directly or indirectly involved a reflection on a member, it was the duty of the member asking the question to make himself acquainted with the facts, and vouch for the facts on which he based his question, 4077.

*Racecourses Admission Tax (Amendment) Bill:* This was one of the class of bills which the House had always denied the right of the Legislative Council to amend, and therefore the House was invited not to consider the Council's amendments, but to lay the bill aside, 4175.
