# PUBLIC STATUTES OF THE SESSION.

## TWENTY-FIFTH PARLIAMENT—THIRD SESSION.

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### AGRICULTURAL SEEDS ACT (GEO. V, No. 15, 1921)—

An Act to regulate the sale of agricultural seeds; to prohibit the sale of certain seeds and plants; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Captain Dunn, 21 September, 1921. Assented to, 13 December, 1921.]

### ANZAC MEMORIAL BURSARY FUND ACT (GEO. V, No. 16, 1921)—

An Act to provide for the administration and distribution of the Anzac Memorial Bursary Fund; and for that purpose to vest the said fund in the Bursary Endowment Board upon certain trusts. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Mutch, 10 November, 1921. Assented to, 13 December, 1921.]

### APPROPRIATION ACT (GEO. V, No. 20, 1921)—

An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain sums to make good the supplies granted for the service of the year from the 1st day of July, 1921, to the 30th day of June, 1922 (inclusive of both dates); to adjust the vote "Advance to Treasurer," 1920-21, Consolidated Revenue Fund, for supplementary charges during the period from the 1st day of July, 1920, to the 30th day of June, 1921 (inclusive of both dates); to cover payments "Unauthorised in Suspense," Consolidated Revenue Fund, for urgent claims on account of services of the year 1920-21; to provide for Public Works and other services out of the Public Works Fund; and to provide for services out of the Closer Settlement Fund; and for purposes connected with and incidental to the above objects. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 29 November, 1921. Assented to, 28 December, 1921.]

### ARCHITECTS ACT (GEO. V, No. 8, 1921)—

An Act to provide for the registration and to regulate the practice of architects; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Mutch, during the previous session and forwarded to the Council for concurrence, but not finally dealt with because of prorogation; message sent to the Council on 28 September, 1921, requesting that the bill be proceeded with. Assented to, 28 November, 1921.]

### EAST ORANGE SEWERAGE ACT (GEO. V, No. 11, 1921)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a system of sewerage for the town of East Orange; and for purposes consequent thereupon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Estell, 28 September, 1921. Assented to, 10 December, 1921.]

### KATOOMBA WATER SUPPLY ACT (GEO. V, No. 13, 1921)—

An Act to sanction the carrying out of certain works to augment the water supply of the Municipality of Katoomba; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Estell, 27 October, 1921. Assented to, 10 December, 1921.]

### LAND AND VALUATION COURT ACT (GEO. V, No. 10, 1921)—

An Act to provide for the dissolution of the Land Appeal Court; to provide for the constitution of a Land and Valuation Court, and to define the jurisdiction, powers, and procedure of such court; to amend the Crown Lands Consolidation Act, 1913, and certain other Acts; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. McTiernan, 19 October, 1921. Assented to, 10 December, 1921.]

**LOAN ACT (GEO. V, No. 21, 1921)—**

An Act to authorise the raising of a loan for public works and services; and for other purposes. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 23 December, 1921. Assented to, 28 December, 1921.]

**MINING (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 7, 1921)—**

An Act to amend the Mining Act, 1906, as amended by the Mining (Amendment) Act, 1907, the Mining (Amendment) Act, 1918, and the Mining (Amendment) Act, 1919; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Cann, during the previous session, and forwarded to the Legislative Council for concurrence, but not finally dealt with because of prorogation; message sent to the Legislative Council on 28 September, 1921, requesting that the bill be proceeded with. Assented to, 28 November, 1921.]

**PARKES WATER SUPPLY ACT (GEO. V, No. 12, 1921)—**

An Act to sanction the construction of works for the amplification of the water supply of the town of Parkes; and for purposes consequent thereupon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Estell, 28 September, 1921. Assented to, 10 December, 1921.]

**PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS (CASUAL VACANCIES) ACT (GEO. V, No. 6, 1921)—**

An Act to make further provision for the filling of casual vacancies in the Legislative Assembly; to amend the Parliamentary Elections (Casual Vacancies) Act, 1920, and certain other Acts; and for purposes connected therewith. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Lang, 4 November, 1921. Assented to, 19 November, 1921.]

**PARLIAMENTARY ELECTORATES AND ELECTIONS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 19, 1921)—**

It was generally understood that members should sit on the side of the House to which they belonged; the changing of seats would lead to endless confusion, 1600.*Wheat Marketing Bill:* On an expediency motion the debate must be strictly confined to the question of expediency. *Address in Reply*: An amendment to the address and an amendment to the amendment being before the House it was not competent to move a further amendment until the amendment to the amendment was disposed of, 150, 203, 681; the judges of the Arbitration Court came within the application of the rule that it was not competent except on a substantive motion to discuss the conduct of judges. The decision or position of a judge could be discussed, but the judge himself must not be attacked or associated with any political party, 177; a reflection upon a judge would not be permitted whether it was an original statement or a quotation, 273; the practice of moving, "That the hon. member be not further heard," when he had just opened his mouth, was one of which the Speaker did not approve, 681; a member might be guilty of disorderly conduct, such as entering the House after the bar had been closed down for a division, but it did not follow that the Speaker could disregard his vote; it was disorderly to enter the House or to forcibly raise the bar to admit a member when the House was in division, 678; in view of the wilful violation of the rules of the House the division was treated as a nullity and a fresh division called for, 679; the Speaker could not take any cognisance of any arrangement between members as to pairs, 676.

*Adjournment*: On a motion of adjournment the range of debate was very narrow; a member must confine himself to the one subject in respect of which the motion has been moved, 792, 794, 1489. A motion of adjournment to discuss "the completion of the deviation works on the western railway near George's Plains" could not be regarded as a definite matter of urgent public

importance; the desirability of completing the works could be discussed in another form, but not under cover of a motion of adjournment, 1329; there was nothing in the standing orders making it obligatory on the Speaker to observe when a notice was put in the box, 1412; the Speaker had no discretion as to the subject-matter of a motion being a matter of urgent public importance, 1413; a motion of adjournment to discuss the necessity for immediate steps being taken to build the city and eastern suburbs railway was in order; it was not apparent that there were two distinct railways referred to; it was the practice of the Speaker to shuffle the notices placed in the box, as otherwise advantage might be given to the paper on top, 1552; without hearing argument the Speaker could not determine whether or not a statement in a motion was correct; he could not say whether the State Enterprises Bill referred to in an order of the day covered a State coal-mine, or a State coal-mine on the area mentioned in a motion of adjournment; while the Speaker was not prepared to rule the motion out of order, he had no hesitation in saying that standing order No. 49 had been abused over and over again, and he called attention to the fact that in the proposed new standing orders there was a limitation on the right to move the adjournment and the Speaker would have the discretion as to whether the motion submitted was of urgent public importance, 1702; the motion was already covered by a notice of motion on the business-paper, 1703; where a motion of adjournment was submitted to the House and afterwards ruled out of order, it was the custom not to draw a second motion paper out of the box without the consent of the House. Where a motion was patently out of order, and was so declared by the Speaker before having been submitted to the House, a second motion paper could be extracted from the box by the Speaker without the consent of the House, 1703.

*City Council, Alleged Corruption:* The Speaker would have to be satisfied that the matter was the subject of proceedings in the courts before ruling that it was *sub judice*; on receiving information to that effect he must treat the matter as *sub judice*, 1268.

*Motherhood Endowment Bill:* Although the bill provided for a method of appointing officers or servants different from that prescribed in the Public Service Act, that did not make it necessary for the Public Service Act to be specifically referred to in the title. A number of rulings which it was impossible to reconcile had been given in former years on the point whether a bill affecting the provisions of an existing Act was out of order unless some reference to such Act were contained in the title. The Speaker could not sustain some of these rulings, and he would decline to follow them, 1757; it would be advisable in future when compilations of rulings were made either to omit rulings which had been overruled or to have it expressly stated that such rulings were not followed later on, 1759.

*Order of Business:* If the point were taken the Speaker would be inclined to rule that a motion that "during the remainder of the present session" Government business should take precedence, &c., would not apply to the day on which the motion was moved, 1704.

**Pairs: 675-677 (See Address in Reply; also Personal Explanation).** The Speaker could not take it upon himself to prescribe any procedure in regard to pairs—that was a matter which must be provided for in the standing orders. Until some procedure was prescribed the Speaker would not take cognisance of anything relating to pairs, 1409.

**Parliamentary Elections (Casual Vacancies) Bill:** It was not for the Speaker to decide whether or not a bill should be reserved for the royal assent. The bill was not out of order on the ground that it indirectly contravened the principle embodied in the Constitution that the Assembly should be an elective House. Section 4 of the Imperial Constitution statute made it clear that the House had the power, subject to certain rules and provisions of law with regard to the reservation of bills for the royal assent, to alter its own Constitution, 1088-9; *obs.* regarding amendment made by Legislative Council, 1415.

**Personal Explanations:** Members would not be permitted under cover of what they called personal explanations to explain their arrangements with regard to pairs for which no provision was made in the standing orders, 710; or to discuss an insinuation thrown out by way of interjection, 805; or to go into matters other than those in which they were personally concerned, 1410.

**Petitions:** No one could be heard at the bar of the House without the consent of members; the Speaker had nothing to do with the granting of the prayer of a petition for leave to be heard at the bar—he was in the hands of the House and in such a matter could do nothing of his own volition, 390; when petitions were presented a record was made in the *Votes and Proceedings* and were then placed in the archives of the House, and unless some motion was moved nothing further was done, 390.

**Questions:** The object of a question was to elicit information, not to supply it to the House, 34, 37, 81, 870, 871, 1697; it was beneath the dignity of the House for a member to ask whether a Minister was satisfied with a meal he had had at some railway refreshment-room, 1700; questions should not contain arguments, expressions of opinion, or inferences, 37; answers to questions could not be canvassed; the rule was that no question could be asked relating to an answer already given, 2031;

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**ASSEMBLY (continued):****SPEAKER, MR., RULINGS AND OPINIONS OF (ctd.):**

a member would not be permitted to read an extract from a newspaper and then ask a Minister if it were true, 2218; it was not customary to allow a series of questions without notice to be read out; the proper course in such a case was to place the question on the business-paper, 2424; a member must not use any argument, express any opinion, or state any fact except so far as might be necessary to explain his question, 2516, 2517; it was not within the province of the Speaker to control the answers given by Ministers; if they chose not to answer, there was no reason why they should be compelled to do so; if the language used by a Minister was offensive, the Speaker would take notice of it, 2518; *obs.*, 2667; the Speaker could not control the answers given by Ministers, 2670.

A motion for the postponement of a clause, whether by a Minister or a private member, must be accepted by the Chairman, 1291; if a member wished to dispute what another member was saying he was not necessarily justified in taking a point of order; an accusation of "deliberately stone-walling" could hardly be ruled out of order as unparliamentary, 1355; a reference to some members as the friends of those who "farm the farmers" was not tantamount to an imputation of corrupt motives, 1356; having regard to the whole tenor of the bill the Speaker was not prepared to say that a clause providing for preference to unionists was beyond the scope of the bill, 1473; a motion, "That the question be now put," moved by a Minister after 6 o'clock, the hour fixed by sessional order to terminate the period during which Government business could be taken on Tuesdays, could not be accepted; no Government business could be taken after that hour, 1512.
