Clause 3. In the event of any land to which any freeholder or conditional purchaser may be entitled in virtue of his freehold or conditional purchase being held by any other person under pastoral lease such freeholder or conditional purchaser may give notice in writing to such pastoral leaseholder or his agent superintendent or overseer of the position of the land intended to be leased by him and of the marks showing the boundaries thereof and ~~thenceforth such land may be taken under pre-lease and shall be held to have been withdrawn from the pastoral tenant under the Land Law and all the rights of such pastoral leaseholder shall cease and determine so far as they relate to such land and the land shall be held to be duly leased to such freeholder or conditional purchaser—~~ Provided that if any such pastoral leaseholder his agent superintendent or overseer **shall within one month thereafter** object to any such freeholder or conditional purchaser's choice of land so taken possession of and that such freeholder or conditional purchaser and pastoral leaseholder cannot agree as to a fair selection of land to be held under pre-lease then the matter may be submitted to arbitration by either party And at the termination of any such mode of settlement of boundaries aforesaid **or if no such objection be made then from the time of giving such notice aforesaid** the land shall pass from the pastoral leaseholder to the freeholder or conditional purchaser as the case may be under the Land Law. (*Read.*)

The Government may by notification in the *Gazette* appoint Trustees not being fewer than five **nor more than nine** in number for every Cemetery Provided that the Minister for Lands the Director of the Botanic Gardens and the Mayor of Sydney shall each during his term of office be a Trustee for the Necropolis at Haslem's Creek. The Trustees shall subject to the provision hereinafter contained in reference to the building of mortuary churches or chapels apply the fees charges and other income arising from the Cemetery in the following manner (that is to say) in the first place in and towards defraying their expenses as Trustees under this Act in the next place in and towards maintaining such Cemetery and all walls palisades fences railings enclosures gates entrances or erections thereon in complete repair in the next place in and towards paying the salary of any Secretary Clerk or other officer who may be appointed to carry out this Act and in the next place in and towards paying the stipend or other remuneration of any minister appointed or permitted under this Act to perform the burial service and in the last place in and towards laying out and embellishing such Cemetery. (*Read.*)

The Trustees may with the approval of the Government build in each portion thereof which shall have been dedicated and set apart in the burial-ground for burying the dead of any denomination a mortuary church or chapel for the performance therein of the rites and ceremonies used by such denomination in connection with the burial of the dead **Provided that the necessary funds are supplied by such denomination** and the said Trustees may with the like approval borrow any money required for such purpose and charge with the payment of such money and interest the fees and charges and other income arising from such portion of the Cemetery (*Read.*)

Clause 25. Upon the written application of ~~fifty~~ **twenty** householders resident not more than half a mile from any place used as a Cemetery or burial-place (whether the same be a Cemetery under this Act or not) complaining that such Cemetery is a public nuisance or upon the written certificate of three duly qualified medical practitioners that any such place is injurious to health the Government may cause inquiry to be made and **upon proof that any material allegation in such application or that such certificate is true** may thereafter by notification in the *Gazette* prohibit such place to be used as a Cemetery or burial-place and any person who shall at any time after the expiration of one calendar month from the date of the *Gazette* containing such notice bury or cause to be buried in such place any corpse or human remains or take part in any funeral ceremony or burial therein shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds **Provided that instead of such prohibition the Government may at their discretion require from the owner or owners or person or persons in charge of such Cemetery or burial-place such security as may be necessary to prevent any public injury or inconvenience therefrom** (*Read.*)

THE STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE of the Legislative Assembly have the honor to report to your Honorable House that, having had under consideration the Questions of the "*Intrusion of Strangers in the Passages to the House*," the "*Control of the Messengers of this House*," and the proposal to provide "*a New Parliamentary Refreshment Room*," they have arrived at the following Resolutions in reference thereto, viz:—

SIR,

In reply to the Minute of the Minister for Public Works upon the enclosed papers relative to the erection of a New Refreshment Room at the Parliamentary Buildings, requesting me to report "under what authority the work was commenced, without submitting the plans and estimate for approval in the usual way, and stating if funds were available",—

2. I do myself the honor to state that your minute of 9th April, upon 69-1336, in which I was requested "to take the necessary steps to carry out the work," was thought to be an instruction to proceed at once. I was under the impression that the usual course of submitting a plan and estimate to the Minister for Public Works was in this case to be dispensed with, sketches having in the first instance been prepared at the request of the Standing Orders Committee, which comprised some Members of the Government, and the approval of one of the designs (with an extension of 20 feet) notified in the printed Report of the Committee, forwarded to me with the paper above referred to. It moreover has been the practice, in regard to repairs and additions at the Parliamentary Buildings, to commence such works at once, often in anticipation of ministerial authority, and without waiting for the approval of the plans.

3. Before even working plans could be prepared, it was necessary to provide other accommodation for the Steward, whose apartments would be interfered with by the proposed building; the work was therefore commenced at once, as the period before the probable meeting of Parliament was barely sufficient for completing the improvements; and it was done under the annual contracts, as, independently of the loss of time that would otherwise occur, it was of such a nature as to render it difficult to contract for separately.

4. The works comprise the alterations required by the Committees, new quarters for Steward, new kitchen, scullery, pantry, pastry-room, three sleeping-rooms for attendants, store-rooms and out-offices, with Refreshment Room 60 feet by 30 feet, and 20 feet high, on the upper floor.

 (DESPATCH FORWARDING.)

SIR,

I have the honor to transmit to you the copy of an Act of the Imperial Parliament, authorizing Act 32 Vict., cap. 10. the removal of prisoners from one Colony to another for the purpose of punishment.

You will see that, by the 4th section, any two Colonies may, with the sanction of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, agree for the removal of any prisoners from one of such Colonies to the other, for the purpose of their undergoing their sentences in the Colony to which they are removed.

It was not thought necessary to exclude any Colonies by name from the operation of this Act; but I am anxious to remove any ground for apprehension that this Act might be used to revive the system of transportation to Western Australia.

It has been observed to me, and is, no doubt, true, that under this Act Her Majesty would have legal power to sanction transportation from any British Colony to Western Australia. But it is also true that Her Majesty has legal power to order transportation from this country to the last mentioned Colony, or, by Order in Council, under the 4th section of 6 Geo. 4th, c. 69, to appoint Western Australia as a place to which colonial convicts may be removed. And the colonists may be assured that Her Majesty will not be advised to sanction, under this Act, a mode of proceeding in respect to colonial convicts which, at the wish of the Australian Colonies, has been abandoned in respect to British Convicts.

Her Majesty's Government are of opinion that, as a general rule, it is desirable that each Colony should deal with its own convicts within the Colony; but it has been found difficult in some of the smaller West India Colonies to exercise a proper system of prison discipline and control; and one of the objects of this Act is to facilitate the erection of central prisons in one or more of the larger islands, should the colonists desire it, where a more effectual, and at the same time more economical, supervision of the prisoners could be carried out.

I trust that this assurance and explanation will effectually obviate any misapprehension which might arise as to the intended operation of the Act.

A.D. 1869.

An Act for authorizing the Removal of Prisoners from one Colony to another for the purposes of Punishment. [13th May, 1869.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to the removal of prisoners from one Colony to another for the purposes of punishment: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:—

Short title.
Definition of terms:
"Colony:"

1. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1869."
2. For the purposes of this Act—

The term "Colony" shall not include any place within the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or within such territories as may for the time being be vested in Her Majesty by virtue of any Act of Parliament for the government of India, but shall include any plantation, territory, or settlement situate elsewhere within Her Majesty's dominions, and subject to the same local government: and for the purposes of this Act all plantations, territories, and settlements under a central legislature shall be deemed to be one Colony under the same local government.

"Governor:"

The term "Governor" shall include the officer for the time being administering the government of any Colony.

"Legislative body."

The term "legislative body" shall mean any House of Assembly or other body of persons having legislative powers in the Colony, and where such body of persons consists of two separate Houses it shall include both Houses, and where there are local legislative bodies as well as a central legislative body shall mean the central legislative body only.

Section 4 of 6 G.
4. c. 69, repealed.

3. The fourth section of the Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for punishing offences committed by transports kept to labour in the Colonies, and better regulating the powers of Justices of the Peace in New South Wales," is hereby repealed, except so far as may be necessary for supporting or continuing any proceedings taken thereunder.

Prisoners may be removed from one Colony to another for purposes of punishment.

4. Any two Colonies may, with the sanction of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, agree for the removal of any prisoners under sentence or order of transportation, imprisonment, or penal servitude from one of such Colonies to the other for the purpose of their undergoing in such other Colony the whole or any part of their punishment, and for the return of such prisoners to the former Colony at the expiration of their punishment, or at such other period as may be agreed upon, upon such terms and subject to such conditions as may seem good to the said Colonies.

The sanction of the Order of Her Majesty in Council may be obtained, in the case of a Colony having a legislative body, on an address of such body to Her Majesty, and in the case of any Colony not having a legislative body, on an address of the Governor of such Colony; and such sanction shall be in force as soon as such Order in Council has been published in the Colony to which it relates.

The agreement of any one Colony with another shall for the purposes of this Act be testified by a writing under the hand of the Governor of such Colony.

Removal of prisoners to be by warrant.

5. Where the sanction of Her Majesty has been given to any such agreement as aforesaid relating to the removal of prisoners from one Colony to another for the purpose of undergoing their punishment, any prisoners under sentence or order of transportation, imprisonment, or penal servitude, may be removed from such one Colony to the other under the authority of a warrant signed by the Governor, and addressed to the master of any ship, or any other person or persons; and the person or persons to whom such warrant is addressed shall have power to convey the prisoner therein named to such other Colony, and to deliver him when there into the custody of any authority designated in such warrant, or empowered by the Governor of such last mentioned Colony to receive such prisoner.

Prisoner in legal custody during removal.

6. Every prisoner shall, from the time of his leaving his prison in one Colony to the time of his reaching his prison in the other Colony, be deemed to be in the legal custody of the person or persons empowered to remove him, and to be subject to the same restraint, and, in the event of misbehaviour, to the same punishment as if he had continued in prison, and as if the person or persons empowered to remove him were the gaoler or gaolers of such prison; and if he escape or attempt to escape from such custody, such prisoner, and every person aiding or attempting to aid him in such escape, shall be subject to the same punishment as if such escape or attempt to escape were an escape or attempt to escape from prison.

A prison shall mean any place of confinement or any place where the prisoners undergo punishment.

Any person punishable under this section may be tried and punished either in the Colony from which the prisoner is being removed, or in the Colony to which he is being removed; and the law applicable to such person shall be the law of the Colony in which he is tried.

Liability of prisoner in Colony to which he is removed.

7. Every prisoner shall, upon his delivery to the person having lawful authority to receive him in the Colony to which he is removed, be subject within such Colony to the same laws and regulations, and shall be dealt with in all respects in the same manner, as if he had been tried and received the same sentence in such Colony as the sentence which has been passed on him in the Colony from which he is removed.

Removals heretofore made to be valid for all purposes.

8. And whereas from time to time divers prisoners have been removed from one of Her Majesty's Colonies to another, and doubts have been entertained whether such removals were legal, and how far such prisoners could be legally dealt with in the Colonies to which they have been removed, and it is expedient that such doubts should be removed: Be it enacted as follows:

The removal of any prisoner heretofore made from one Colony to another by or under the authority of the Governor of either of such Colonies, and any act done in relation to such removal by or under such authority, and the detention, custody, and treatment in either Colony of the prisoner so removed, shall be deemed to have been as lawful and effectual for all purposes whatsoever as if this Act had been passed at the time of such removal, and had been in force in respect of both the Colonies referred to in this section, and such removal had been duly made in pursuance of this Act.

MY LORD,

Her Majesty's Government have had recently under their consideration the distribution of Her Majesty's Troops among the British Colonies, and the rate of contribution to be paid to the Imperial Exchequer by the Colonies in which they are placed.

They have come to the conclusion, that the Force at present so stationed is capable of considerable reduction; and such a reduction is almost forced upon them, in the case of Australia, by the total withdrawal of Her Majesty's Troops from New Zealand, which renders it no longer possible to station the detached Wing of a Regiment in Continental Australia. Orders have therefore been given to withdraw from Australia all the Infantry in excess of a single Regiment.

In the distribution of that Regiment it is the desire of Her Majesty's Government to consult the convenience of the different Colonies, so far as is consistent with the requirements of military discipline. I shall gladly receive any information from you, which, after consultation with the neighbouring Governments, you think likely to assist me in effecting this object.

In the decision which I am forced to adopt without such consultation, I have considered the probable desires of the different Colonial Governments as well as I can, subject to any reconsideration which further information may render expedient. Her Majesty's Government have decided that the Head Quarters of the Australian Command should remain in Victoria, where it is at present; but the Head Quarters of the Regiment at Sydney, where the largest number of Infantry will continue to be stationed.

The allotment of Troops will be as follows:—

New South Wales	4 Companies.
Victoria	2 Companies.
South Australia	2 Companies.
Queensland	1 Company.
Tasmania	1 Company.

A Battery of Artillery will remain at Sydney; and, if the Victorian Government should wish it, another Battery will be sent to Melbourne.

All these Troops will, for the present, be paid for at the rate now agreed on. But you must be aware that this rate must be considered temporary. The principle that the Colonies should pay the full expense of their own military defence must now be considered as established in general, and it is actually applied to the two Crown Colonies of Ceylon and the Straits Settlements. No reason can be alleged why it should not be equally applied to the flourishing Colonies of Australia. And I think it necessary to inform you, that a careful inquiry will shortly be instituted into the expense of the Troops employed in the different British Possessions, with the object of ascertaining a rate of Colonial payment which will cover the full cost of these Troops. You may therefore, at no distant period, expect a proposal founded on this inquiry; and it will be for the Australian Colonies to consider whether or not it is worth their while to pay this increased cost for the presence of a small body of Her Majesty's Troops.

In any such consideration it must be remembered that no fraction of a Regiment can be allotted to Australia, and that at least four Companies must be stationed in one of the principal cities, where there is adequate barrack accommodation. I also desire you to inform your Government, that whether or not the Colonies should be willing to pay the increased cost of these Troops, and able to come to any such understanding as would enable Her Majesty's Government to station a Regiment in Australia, the Secretary of State for War will afford them all possible assistance for the employment, at their own expense, of such Commissioned and Non-commissioned Officers, whether of Cavalry, Artillery, or Infantry, as they may find useful for organizing and instructing any local Force which they may choose to maintain

for

for the construction, inspection, or maintenance of fortifications, or for any other matter connected with military defence. The War Department will also be ready, when practicable, to furnish them at cost price with such arms, ammunition, or military stores as they may need. And in case the Colony should desire to employ any well-conducted Privates in their Police Force, about their works of defence, or indeed in any employment under Government, soldiers will be allowed to quit the service for such purpose under Regulations of which I enclose a copy.

Lastly, I have to state the opinion of Her Majesty's Government, that the period is at hand at which Tasmania should cease to enjoy the advantage, hitherto conceded, of receiving the services of Her Majesty's Troops without payment. The new arrangement will therefore apply to that Island; and the Government of Tasmania should become a party to any consultation which may take place on the future arrangements for the military defence of the Australian Colonies.

MY LORD,

I have the honor to acknowledge the Duke of Buckingham's Despatch, No. 87, of date 20th November, 1868, in answer to mine, No. 26, of date 29th February, 1868, on the subject of a Petition against the importation of South Sea Islanders into Queensland as labourers.

2. With reference to His Grace's concluding paragraph, I now beg to enclose a Report of a Public Meeting lately held in Sydney, from which your Lordship will see that the objectors here to this system are not satisfied with the supposed security against abuses afforded by the Queensland Act of last year.

3. In another Despatch by this mail, I shall have occasion to bring under your notice a particular case in connection with the system of importing labour for the Fiji Islands; and I would particularly direct your Lordship's attention to the evidence lately given by one Henry Heath, at a Magisterial Inquiry, held here on the 12th instant.

MY LORD,

I have the honor to forward to your Lordship the copy of a letter and its enclosures which I have received from Mr. Thurston, Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Fiji, on the subject of three murders of South Sea Islanders on board the British ship "Young Australian," near Apii, in the New Hebrides Group, in October last.

2. I referred this letter to the Attorney General, from whom I learnt that in consequence of information previously received the Crown had already commenced proceedings, by procuring a Magisterial Inquiry in the nature of a Coroner's Inquest.

3. I have been furnished with a copy of the evidence taken on that occasion, which I enclose herewith.

4. The result of this inquiry was that Albert Ross Howell, the master of the "Young Australian," and two of the crew, "Jimmy," and "Rangi," were on the 17th instant brought up at the Water Police Court, before Captain Cloete, Water Police Magistrate, charged with participating in these murders, and two of them were by him committed for trial. The native "Jimmy" was discharged.

5. I enclose a copy of the depositions.

6. Having previously seen a Melbourne newspaper telegram, which stated that one Levinger, the supercargo of the vessel in question, had been arrested in Melbourne, I communicated with the Attorney General about him. I enclose a copy of his reply.

Enclosure No. 4.

7. Your Lordship will also learn from this last document that the trial of these men has been postponed until May, as Sir William Manning wishes if possible to obtain further evidence, particularly that of the declarants referred to in Mr. Thurston's letter.

8. I propose to apply to Mr. Thurston to forward to Sydney (in accordance with a Minute of Sir William Manning's) "the declarants and any other witnesses whom the Consul may find and think competent. They must be persons who from religion are admissible as witnesses on oath; and it will be better to select out of the many persons who probably witnessed the whole affair, such as can be understood without an interpreter, or to send an interpreter who must himself be capable of taking an oath." In a further Minute, he adds,—"the witnesses having differed as to whether at the moment of the murder being committed the 'Young Australian' was at anchor within a sea-league of the shore, or was at a greater distance

and under-weigh, the information or indictment has been prepared and filed with two counts, so as to meet either alternative. One charges the offence as having been committed upon the sea, and the other places it at an island or place in the Pacific Ocean, not subject to Her Majesty or to any European rule or power. I have not before me at this moment either the evidence or the information, but the above is substantially correct."

9. The proceedings in this case are taken under the Imperial Act 9 Geo. 4, cap. 83, section 4, known as the New South Wales Act.

10. In conclusion, I beg to state that I will furnish Commander Palmer, of H.M.S. "Rosario," who proceeds shortly from this port for a cruise amongst the islands, with a copy of Mr. Thurston's letter.

Mr. Thurston to Governor the Earl of Belmore.

British Consulate,
Fiji, 17 January, 1869.

My Lord,

I have the honor herewith to enclose original declaration made before me upon the 12th instant, by "Tom," a native of Tanna, and "Mararaya," a native of Vate or Sandwich Island, touching the murder of three aborigines, names unknown, of an island called Pama, one of the New Hebrides. The above-named declarants arrived in Fiji on or about the 19th November last, in the ship "Young Australian," Albert Ross Hovell, master, of Sydney, New South Wales, on board of which vessel, while lying off the island of Pama, they declare the three aborigines were shot to death, having about noon of the same day been, by a portion of the crew under Mr. Hovell's command, forcibly seized while fishing, and conveyed on board the "Young Australian." The details of said alleged seizure and murder are more fully set forth in the accompanying documents.

In accordance with Foreign Office instructions, I have by this mail forwarded a report on this matter, together with copies of the declarations, to Commodore Lambert. Considering it not unlikely Commodore Lambert may be absent from Sydney, I have thought it right to place the subject directly before your Lordship, for transmission to the Colonial Secretary, or for the initiation of such proceedings as your Lordship may deem necessary.

The informants, my Lord, are both heathens. The Tanna man speaks English very fairly—his statement throughout was made in English. I afterwards examined him in his own language through a Christian Tannese, some time resident in Tonga and Fiji. The Vate native is far less intelligent than the man "Tom"; he speaks no language but his own. There can, in my opinion, be no collusion between the informants. He evidently had no idea of the purpose for which he was brought to this office; and though differing from "Tom" in the general relation of the voyage, he confirms his statement most clearly, that certain natives were seized, and finally shot on board the "Young Australian."

I cannot learn the European name of Pama Island; it is, I believe, in sight of Espiritu Santo. On arrival in Fiji, Mr. Hovell reported himself from Tanna, Sandwich, and Vanua Lava.

A few days before leaving this port for Sydney, the second mate, Robert Lennie, and two able seamen, named respectively _____ were discharged from the ship by mutual consent. These men are subjects of other countries than Great Britain; Robert Lennie, who is most strongly incriminated, being a Frenchman. The others are Germans. With the exception of Lennie, I have no knowledge of the present residence of these men.

Whilst most anxious, my Lord, that the interests of justice shall not suffer by any act of omission upon my part, I find myself placed, as your Lordship will perceive, in a somewhat difficult position.

Considering that the charges of murder, *et cetera*, now submitted to your Lordship's notice, have been made by heathens, whose testimony cannot be taken upon oath, should I promote the interests of justice by forwarding them alone to the Colony for examination?

Again, should I be warranted in arresting (provided I could find the power in myself, for your Lordship must be aware there is no *lex loci* in Fiji to which application can be made for assistance) the persons of Lennie and others now in Fiji, upon such evidence as I have received?

Again, had information of the proceedings on board the "Young Australian" been given me prior to the discharge of these men, I might, upon the principle that a British ship carries British law with her, have taken any action within the limits of my authority that appeared necessary; but considering they have been legally discharged from their late ship, and therefore, I presume, from any obligation to submit to my jurisdiction, should I not be incurring a grave responsibility in placing them under arrest and having them conveyed to Sydney?

After mature deliberation, I have concluded it better to forward your Lordship the enclosed statements only of the crimes and misdemeanors alleged to have been committed on board the "Young Australian" during her late voyage.

I shall endeavour to obtain the evidence of the seamen discharged here by Mr. Hovell and also that of two Rotumah islanders who formed part of the boat's crew. These latter are living with a British settler on Viti Levu. It is likely they are Christian, and from my having resided at their island for some months will probably be known to me. Meantime I submit to your Lordship the propriety of arresting or holding to bail the master and supercargo of the "Young Australian," pending the opportunity to establish the truth or falsity of the enclosed statements.

I feel it imperative upon me to state the natives "Tom" and "Mararaya" are so circumstantial in their report that I personally entertain no doubt of the general truthfulness of their statements.

Besides the master and supercargo who left this port for Sydney, there was on board the chief mate, one Macmasters, and also the cook, who had been the whole voyage in the ship.

The supercargo, Hugo Levinger, a British Jew, formerly resided in Fiji. In my opinion, this man would readily become a witness for the Crown were he to entertain a suspicion of inconvenience or danger to himself, unless the subject matter of this despatch being bruited abroad, as it most likely will be through private letters, he availed himself, as also might the others, of an opportunity to leave the Colonies.

In re "Young Australian," of Sydney, N.S.W., Albert Ross Hovell, master; — Levinger, supercargo; charged with the murder (or of being accessories both before and after the fact) of three aborigines of Pama Island, near Espiritu Santo, New Hebrides.

PERSONALLY appeared before me, John B. Thurston, Esquire, Acting British Consul in Fiji and Tonga, "Hannaen," alias "Tom," a heathen, and native of Tanna Island in the New Hebrides, who stated as follows, to wit:—I came to Fiji in the ship commanded by Captain Ross (Hovell)—(See Consul's note A); at Tanna, the ship anchored at Port Resolution; the captain came on shore and said to me—"You bring all your men to Fiji; you can go and see the place and return again, while your men remain there for one year at work"; I replied—"Very well," and went on board with my people; when we arrived at Fiji we learnt we were to remain for three years; from Tanna we went to Erromanga; at Erromanga, Bob (Note B) went on shore and persuaded the natives with some difficulty to embark for Fiji, upon an engagement for four months; from this island we went to Sandwich (Vate); the ship was not anchored; I went on shore the first time the boat went; there was no fighting—no guns were discharged during the time; three guns were in the boat; they were not taken out of the boat; I only went on shore once, having a bad finger; I did not hear any shooting; the Sandwich men were "gammoned" away by Bob to come to Fiji for four moons (i.e. months); the ship remained two days at Sandwich, that is the large island,—then went to Mau, and anchored; a lot of mats were purchased, but the natives would not visit the ship; thence we went to Tongoa;

Tonga; no natives would come to Fiji; Bob came on board, and we sailed for Engmi; at Engmi some men came on board—they were “gammoned” by Bob; thence we sailed to Apee, where some men came on board to go to Fiji; they came for two months’ stay; thence we reached the island of Pama, near Espiritu Santo; the ship anchored; at noon the boat in charge of Bob went towards the shore; Bob met some men (three) fishing in a canoe, and invited them by signs to come on board; the natives by signs declined, shaking their heads; then the Erromangans and Rotumah men, with Bob, seized the three natives, and, dragging them into their boat, brought them on board; there was no firing from the boat; if there had been I must have heard and seen it; we were distant from the canoe, when the seizure was made, about 300 yards—(*Distance indicated by declarant upon Levuka Beach*); after embarking these three men, the boat went on shore; one of these brought on board was an old man, chief of the Pama men; the other two were young men; * the old chief cried very much, and touching his breast, pointed towards the land, signifying his desire to go on shore; the captain told him to come to Fiji, and he should have tomahawks, but the old man could not understand; then a white man, with one eye (*Levinger*) Mr. Lavaga, told the Tanna, Erromanga, and Sandwich men to put these three below in the hold, which was done; the Sandwich men then offered them some food, but they would not eat; they then feigned sea-sickness, and asked to be allowed on deck, but the man with the bad eye (*Levinger*) would not allow it; presently the old man seized some stones, and began to fight all the natives down below, who, running on deck, left the hold entirely to the Pama men; the white men then said to the captain—“Let these men be killed”; the captain said—“No; wait for Bob, who took them”; when Bob came on board he said to the captain—“What’s the matter?” the captain replied—“The Pama men are fighting”; Bob then loaded two muskets in the cabin, and, coming forward, gave them to Louis; he, Bob, then went aft; Bob and Louis then opened little holes (*ports or bull’s-eyes*) in the cabin and fore-castle bulk-heads and commenced firing; Louis shot the two young men, and Bob shot the old man; I know who shot the men although I was on deck; as the natives were shot the captain was informed by the one who fired, and I, standing on deck close to the captain, heard all that was said. When the three were all killed, I and some others were sent below to bring them on deck; stones were tied to their feet and the bodies were thrown overboard; the ship sailed the same evening for Santo. At Espiritu Santo men were obtained; a man, a boy, and two women were stolen; these people were fishing on the reef by torchlight; Bob landed with his Erromanga men, and going round inshore of the natives, seized and brought them on board. At Murrilava four women were bought; I was in the boat this day; tomahawks and barter were thrown on shore, and the women swam off. At Kawa (a large island) a native was shot—having shot some arrows at the boat he was shot dead in return; I was not in the boat; Tom, an Erromanga man, told me this. From Kawa we came to Fiji. Before we came to Fiji the captain and Mr. Lavaga (*Levinger*) said to me—“Tom, when the Consul comes on board at Fiji, don’t you say anything about the Pama and Kawa men, or he will make us fast.” When you (*addressing the Consul*) came on board and spoke to us I was afraid to speak of these occurrences.

Memoranda by Acting Consul Thurston.

BEFORE eliciting the afore-written statements from Tom, he was duly cautioned to tell the truth. In reply, he stated in English, and also in Tannese through John Pama, a Tannese member of the Wesleyan Society, that he intended to tell what he had seen only.

The foregoing statement was made in the English language. Those passages scored with red ink‡ were given both in English and Tannese.

Albert Ross Hovell, master of the “Young Australian,” is better known by the name of Ross than Hovell; by the Note A. natives he is known as Ross only.

Bob is one Robert Lennie, a Frenchman, lately serving as second mate on board the “Young Australian”; he was Note B. discharged at Levuka, on the 1st December last; his present place of abode is uncertain.

[*Sub-enclosure No. 3.*]

In re “Young Australian” of Sydney, N.S.W., Albert Ross Hovell, master, ——— Levinger, supercargo, charged with the murder (or of being accessories both before and after the fact) of three aboriginals of Pama Island, near Espiritu Santo, New Hebrides.

PERSONALLY appeared before me, John B. Thurston, Esquire, Acting British Consul in Fiji and Tonga, Mararaya, a heathen native of Eukmbau, in the island of Vaté or Sandwich, who being examined through Soh, a native of the same place, speaking Fijian, stated as follows, to wit:—I came to Fiji with Captain Ross (Hovell); we were on the beach at our town when the boat came in, and the crew offered to trade for tobacco; the men landed with guns; they were white men and Rotumah men; the only one of whom I know the name is Bob; they pointed guns at us and ordered us into the boat; some of us being frightened went into the boat, ten in all; others also frightened, ran away towards the bush; the white men fired at them, but no natives were wounded; on reaching the ship Captain Ross (Hovell) told us to come to Fiji and work for ten moons; he told us we should make oil; we did not want to come; we were not allowed to go on shore after our embarkation; the ship anchored near our town and remained, I think, thirteen nights; no canoes visited the ship; after we left Vaté we went to Makuru; the men of this place came on board; some came to Fiji by their own desire; thence we went to Engmi where some men embarked for Fiji, by their own consent; thence to Tonga and anchored, some men of Tonga came willingly to Fiji; thence to Sarroway (?); six men embarked here for Fiji, they came willingly; thence to Tulakoro (?), whence some men came willingly; thence to Murrilava, whence some men also came willingly to Fiji; thence to a land the name of which I do not know; the ship anchored; the boat went towards the shore and met a canoe coming out with seven men on board; those in the boat seized three and put them in the bottom of the boat; the remaining natives in the canoe fled; the whites fired and shot them all; the boat brought the three taken to the ship; one of them was an old man, a chief; two were young men; they were taken below in the hold; then they began to fight; the white men then shot all three dead; they shot from two holes, one forward and one aft; we, that is the other natives on board, ran up on deck and took to the rigging when the Pama men first commenced to fight; when the Pama men were dead, stones were tied to their feet and they were thrown overboard; it was then night; two fired guns, Bob and the *malai*§; we then went to another island, where one man came on board willingly; thence we went to another island—I do not know its name; the natives brought yams on the beach to sell; those in the boat fired at the natives—I saw one fall on the sand—I think he was dead; from this island we came to Fiji; I did not tell these things to Joe the Consul’s boy—I did not know him—he is not of my tribe.

ANOTHER letter, sir, I write to you, in confirmation of my former letter, which contained a report told to me by John Pama, the Tanna native who lives with me, about the Pama men who were killed on board the great ship (“Young Australian”) that brought men here, and was anchored at Levuka.

I was anxious, because this thing was great and heavy; therefore I sent John Pata to bring the Tanna men who told this report to him. When they came to my house, I said—"My friends, this is a great thing which you have told; if this be false, it is very bad; if you know that these Pama natives were really killed, then take hold of this pen—if it be false, do not.

These are their own or true hands with which they made these signs, and when they had made them they said—"What we have seen and known we tell. The great ship went to Tanna, and we Tanna natives went on board; then she went to Erromanga, thence to Sandwich, thence to Inea, thence to Ipi, thence to Pama. When we got there the boat was prepared to go ashore; Bob (the white man), three natives of Erromanga, and three natives of Rotumah, pulled towards the shore; they met a canoe belonging to the place with three men on board, one being an elderly man, and two were young men; the elderly man was a chief; they were seized by force, and thrown into the boat, and taken to the great ship.

When on board the ship they wept, and refused to come to Fiji; they did not wish to eat or drink—they wept only. Then said the captain of the ship—"Let them be taken down into the hold, till Bob comes back again from the land, and decides concerning them." When they were in the hold they resisted, and threw stones at the black men in the hold, and shot at them with bows and arrows; then all the black men fled on deck, and only the three Pama men were left in the hold; then Bob came and tried to speak to them, but they threw stones at him, and he fled on deck; then was opened a piece of the bulkhead in the captain's end of the ship, and they fired with guns; the old man was first wounded in the thigh, but he bound it up and went on fighting; then the two young men were shot dead; then the old man was shot again and died; then night was over the land. A lamp was put on its stand, and taken down into the hold, and the dead bodies were lifted up and thrown into the sea. Two only fired the guns—Bob and Lui. It is said that Bob lives at Wairiki.

There are two Rotumans who live with Mr. Hennings who know about this thing, because they went about in this great ship; one of them is named David. These two told to Tom, a Rotuman who has been long here, all this affair, and Tom told it to John Pata, and John told it to me. Tom said to John that they were commanded not to let this thing be known.

This, sir, my letter is finished.

Levuka, December 22.

In this letter, sir, I write a report which I heard, and which was told to me by John Pata, a native of Tanna, who lives with me; it was told to him by three Tanna natives who were brought here by the large ship that was sailing with men, and which was anchored at Levuka. The names of the three Tanna natives who told this report, are Heanaevu, and Yau, and Nuravu, and their report is like this:—"The great ship ("Young Australian") went first to Tanna, and the Tanna men went on board; then it went to Eromanga, thence to Sandwich, thence to Men, thence to Ipi, and from hence to Pama. When it was at anchor there, Papo (a white man) three Rotumans, and two Eromangans, went down into the boat, and they pulled towards the land, and met a canoe belonging to that island, which they seized by force and took to the great ship ("Young Australian"), the three men, the old man being the chief, and two young men. When these three were got on board they were strongly averse to being taken to Fiji—they wept and refused to eat; therefore said the captain of the ship—"Let them be taken down into the hold, and put in irons, and wait for Papo, who brought them on board, that he may decide whether it would be well to let them go back again to their land or not."

When in the hold these three resisted strongly, and tried to fight; they got bows and arrows belonging to the Tanna and Eromanga men which were in the hold, and also stones, and fought with all the black men in the ship; they shot an Eromangan in the ear with an arrow; the white men tried to stop this, but did not; then Papo went down into the hold to stop it, but they hit him with stones, and he fled up again to the deck; then the white men decided that the three should be shot; then they opened a door from the cabin into the hold, and shot them with guns; two men fired the guns, Papo and Lui; the old chief was first wounded in the thigh, but he bound up his wound and went on fighting; then one of the young men was shot dead; then the other young man was shot also, and fell dead; then the old chief, who was first wounded, was shot dead. When this was finished night had come over the land. Then a lamp was taken down into the hold to find the dead, and they were all three taken up to the deck and thrown into the sea. Then the ship went to Sado, thence to Maleravo, thence to Tkawa, and thence to Fiji. This, sir, is the report which I heard, and my letter is finished.

INQUIRY into the alleged Murder of three South Sea Islanders at sea.

Joseph Johnson, on oath, states, I was cabin-boy of the vessel "Young Australian"; I live in Cumberland-street; I was on board the "Young Australian," at the South Seas, in October; I saw three men come up in a boat; the ship was at anchor at Apia, about a musket-shot from the shore, in October last, when three islanders came on board among the other blacks; the three men came with Rangai about 9 o'clock in the morning; a boat left the ship with the second mate and his crew of six men—all South Sea Islanders; the second mate's boat went on shore at Apia to get natives, and on their way back, without any natives, they met a canoe with three men (natives) in it; they took the men out of the canoe and brought them on board the vessel; they sent them down below, by a man named Levinger, a supercargo; there were other natives below, who commenced teasing these three men; they then tried to make their escape from the hold, and the other natives knocked them back again; some of the other natives then ran on deck and put on the hatch—the main hatch; the three islanders came on deck and looked for spears, and found some bows and arrows that were lying in the hold; then two Frenchmen—Antonie and Louis—cried out to the other natives that these three islanders had bows and arrows; the three natives broke the hatch off, and commenced to fire the arrows and throw stones and cocoa-nuts at everybody on deck; they struck one native on the head with an arrow and another in the breast; then Levinger, the supercargo, told the two Frenchmen and Rangai, who had muskets, to shoot at these three islanders; an islander named Jem had a musket; the second mate got some oakum and put it on an iron rod, and the cook dipped it in kerosene oil; they lit it to show a light to those who were firing down the fore-hatch; the second mate's name is Robert, and the cook's name is Sam; he is in Sydney; the second mate is at the island; Jemmy, a native, fired first, and then Louis; they both went down the fore-castle and fired through the bulkhead into the hold at these three islanders; Tom and Antonie fired down the hatch at these three islanders; a number of shots were fired; after the firing ceased, these three men were brought on deck by the other natives; two were dead, and the other died shortly after being brought on deck; they were bleeding; stones were tied to the bodies and they were thrown overboard; Rangai fired at these men also; the names of the men who fired are, Rangai, Antonie, Louis, Tom, and Jemmy; Rangai, Tom, and Jemmy are natives; Antonie and Louis are white men; both the cook and second mate held the light whilst the others fired; these three men were alone in the hold when they were fired at; the "Young Australian" is a three-masted schooner, sailing under the British flag, and commanded by Captain Hovell; the captain was standing on the poop during the whole of this time; I heard the captain call out not to shoot them; he did not endeavour to prevent them doing so; he also told them to let the men come out of the hold and jump over the side; Levinger was standing forward, inciting the men to shoot the natives; he did not fire himself.

Mr. Cloete:—I signed articles at the Shipping Office in Sydney; when these men came to the ship's side, they came on board themselves, and were led down the hatchway by the supercargo; they could not understand what was said to them; they did not struggle; one of the islanders who were shot was old, another middle-aged, and another young; the other men we had on board in the hold were caught by the second mate—some at Tanna, some at Erromanga, and some at Sandwich; there

there were about eighty of them; Tommy, who could speak all of their languages, told them yarns that they would take them to the Fijis, and give them tobacco and muskets, and they could come back the next day; when they are taken to the Fijis, they are taken in smaller vessels to all parts of the Fijis; these three men were crossing from one island to another when they were taken; there is not an American, French, or any flag flying on the island Apii; it was about 3 o'clock when these men were taken, and they were shot about dusk; we sailed from Apii at 3 o'clock the next morning; I did not hear this affair logged—it was not told to anybody there; this vessel belongs to a person named Griffiths in Sydney; payment was made to Levinger, the supercargo, for each islander; the supercargo is a German Jew.

Mr. Leit: I heard the cook say they were not more worth shooting than a dog; Jemmy and Rangî are on board the schooner "Active" now in this port.

Robert M' Master, on oath, states:—I am chief officer of the British schooner "Young Australian"; we were, during our last voyage, under British colours; I remember being off the island of Apii during the month of October last; I don't remember three natives being brought on board when lying off the island of Apii; I remember three coming aboard the vessel at Pama; they came aboard and sat down on the poop, and sat there all the afternoon; they put a piece of cloth around them, and towards dark they got a yam to eat, and were shown the hold where they were to sleep; they went down into the hold, and the Tanna men commenced teasing them, throwing cocoa-nuts at them, and jeering them; they commenced quarrelling and making a great noise; I went to the hatch and sung out to a Tanna man named Tom, and said to him—"You look out Tom—Tanna man you make plenty fight presently," and he said—"All right mate, no make no fight," and I went away to my work, and my attention was attracted a few minutes afterwards by a great noise, and hearing the Tanna man crying out fight, fight, and the three islanders firing arrows at everybody they could see through the hatches; they shot several of the crew and natives; Rangî, a native, got a musket, Jemmy, a native, got a musket, Louis and Antonio, Frenchmen, and Tommy, a native, each got a musket; when it was getting dark the captain gave instructions that muskets and ammunition should be served out to the crew; the muskets were loaded when served out; these muskets were fired at these three islanders who were below; they were fired from the cabin, the fore-castle, and down the hatches, by the men Rangî, Jemmy, Tommy, Louis, and Antonio; the firing lasted from twenty minutes to half an hour; I think Sam held a light down the hold to permit the men who had muskets to see the three islanders; the second mate Robert held the lights down the hold; I think they held the light to allow the men who were firing to see how to fire; the three men were shot; they were brought on deck dead; stoucs were tied on to the bodies and they were thrown overboard; the supercargo, Levinger, did not give the men orders to fire; the captain, Captain Hovell, ordered the men to fire; Tanna and Pama are portions of the New Hebrides; there is no protection given to that group by any Power; it was the shooting that killed the men; these three men were pulling towards the vessel when they were taken into the boat, and brought by the mate to the vessel; the sixty or eighty men we had on board were taken to the Fijis, where they are engaged under the supervision of the British Consul. When I first saw these three men they were in the ship's boat—whether they were taken out of their canoe by force or not I don't know; I heard the captain order the men to desist from firing, but to try and pacify these men; during the time the firing was going on, Tommy, one of the men who were armed, was wounded with an arrow by one of these islanders whilst he was looking down into the hold; the men desisted firing when ordered by the captain; the men were then wounded, and some of the other men on deck tried to secure these men in the hold, and one of them got wounded, and the captain ordered them to fire again, which they did until the three islanders were killed; these three men did not, by either signs, or in any manner whatever, express a wish to leave the vessel; I showed one of them down into the hold—Levinger was there too; the hatches were removed by somebody, I don't know whom, as there was a fair mutiny on board; Sam, the cook, held the light down the main hatchway; when I say that several were shot by these three islanders, I mean they were wounded by the arrows fired by these men; neither the cook nor second mate was wounded while they were holding the light down the hatchway; when I say these three islanders were pulling towards the vessel, they were in the ship's boat; I heard the captain give orders to allow these three men to jump overboard; we took about 230 men to Ovalau; we discharged those men at the Consul's office; we were refused any more permits by the Consul; all the men we had were engaged at Ovalau in the presence of the Consul; I don't know that we had a permit on last voyage.

Henry Heath, on oath, states:—I was cook on board the "Young Australian"; we were off one of the two islands Apii and Pama in October last; the mate went on shore with two boats, he and five men in one, and Rangî with about the same number of men was in the other boat; they got no natives on shore, and on their returning they met a canoe with three Islanders in it; I saw one boat (the second mate's) towing the canoe to the vessel and the three islanders in his boat; the three men came on board quietly, and the supercargo gave them a stick of tobacco and a pipe; they remained on the poop for some time; when the supercargo ordered them to go down below they resisted, and by signs intimated their desire to go ashore, but the supercargo prevented their going ashore and forced them down below; the elder man resisted a good deal; there were about 150 men already down below, and the Tanna men commenced throwing the ballast (small stones) at these three men, and the three Islanders commenced throwing stones back, and as soon as all the ballast was thrown away the three Islanders got some bows and arrows and commenced firing at anybody that showed near the hatches; then the Tanna men commenced dancing their war dance and wanted to set fire to the vessel to burn these three men out, and towards dark, some one, I don't know who, ordered the muskets to be brought out; the second mate, Rangî, and Antonio, brought the muskets; the captain was on the poop; the supercargo said don't shoot them if you can help it, these are £16 10s. lost; I saw Rangî fire; I saw Louis and Antonio fire; Jemmy had not a musket, he threw a large piece of ballast at one of the three men; I saw Tom fire; the captain did not speak during the time they were firing; I did not hear him tell them to stop firing; I did not hear the supercargo tell them to fire or interfere in any way; after they had fired all their arrows they took refuge in the fore part of the vessel; there was no attempt made to seize them by anybody then; when they went forward the fore-hatch was taken off and a light made of oakum and purflino oil was put down, and they were shot by Antonio, Rangî, and Bob the second mate through the fore-hatch and main-hatch; Bob fired through the main-hatch, and Antonio and Rangî through the fore-hatch; they fired from the cabin into the main and fore-hatch; I saw their bodies brought on deck, they were dead, their death was caused by the firing; I was ordered to hold the light by the second mate; Antonio, Louis, and I threw them overboard; there was no French, American, or any other flag flying on that island; we were under English colours; we sold in Levuka 230 men and 6 women for £1,200; they are sold to Englishmen who are planting cotton there, and in three years they get a small piece of unbleached calico, a flask of powder, and a few beads from their masters, sometimes they get back to their own islands and sometimes they don't; I don't know whether they were sold with the Consul's consent; the way these men are got on board is this,—the vessel is tacking about and two boats are sent on shore with natives painted and dressed with feathers in their hair in the boat to act as decoys; they show the natives a musket and tomahawk and other things, and when they get a number of Islanders on board the boat they put up the sail and steer for the vessel, and when they get the Islanders on board they don't allow them to go ashore again; at the time the three Islanders were shot they were unarmed and were in the forepart of the vessel; the vessel was about five miles from the land and was under sail at the time; two men were shot in the fore-hold and one of them in the main-hold; Rangî and Tom shot the man in the fore-hold, and Antonio shot the man in the main-hold.

Albert Ross Howell, charged with having murdered three South Sea Islanders, on board the "Young Australian" at sea.

Richard Elliott, on oath, states:—I am a constable of New South Wales Detective Police Force; between 12 and 1 o'clock this afternoon I arrested prisoner at his residence, Riley-street in this city, by virtue of the warrant produced, wherein he is charged with having, in the month of October last, on board the British ship "Young Australian," then on the high seas, feloniously, wilfully, and of his malice aforethought, killed and murdered three men, whose names to me are unknown; I read the warrant to prisoner, but he made no reply; I asked him if he had the ship's log-book, or any papers in connection with this charge; he said the log-book and papers were in Mr. Roberts', the solicitor's, possession; I also asked him if he had the permit from the Consul; he said, "no, he had not, they had to give that back to the Consul."

Bench: The murdered men I allude to in my evidence were South Sea Islanders—natives, I believe, of the New Hebrides; I pray for a remand till to-morrow to bring the necessary evidence.

Robert McMaster, on oath, states: I am chief officer of the vessel "Young Australian" now in this port; she sails under the British flag; I was on board her in the month of October last—she was then at the New Hebrides; I recollect being off the island of Apii; that island is not under any civilized Government; I remember three natives coming on board in the ship's boats off the island of Pama; it was in the middle of the month, a Monday or Tuesday: the vessel was at anchor from three-quarters to a mile from the land; the second mate and five of a boat's crew (natives); the first I saw of them was in the ship's boats; I saw no canoe with them; they sat down on the poop; this was between 1 and 2 o'clock; they sat there for a couple of hours; they were tying a piece of cloth around, and amusing themselves with a pipe and tobacco; they got a yam, and went down below into the hold; about 4 o'clock they sat down, and commenced eating their yam; I went away to work at the mainsail; about half an hour after they went down I heard a row; I went to the hatch, looked down, and spoke to Tom Tanna, who could speak good English; the two prisoners Rangi and Jemmy were not on board; I turned to my work again; the next I saw the Tanna men rushing out of the hold, and singing out "Fight!" getting sticks, bolts, and anything they could; this was about 10 minutes after I spoke to Tom Tanna; the three natives I have mentioned were throwing stones and cocoa-nuts; the three natives got hold of some bows and arrows, and were firing at any one they could see, black or white; they were in the hold, firing up through the hatches; Eromanga Tom was wounded by the arrow; a Rotumah man, David, was wounded; the captain was at this time on deck; he gave instructions not to shoot the three men or hurt them, but to pacify them as much as possible; some of the men had muskets; when it was dusk the captain said they would have to shoot the three men who were in the hold; he said this to the persons around him—I heard him say it; the captain said they must wound, not kill them; at 6 o'clock Louis and Antonio had muskets; they got them out of the cabin; the captain was on the poop; the captain said, addressing the men who had the muskets—"Don't shoot them to kill them, but to wound them"; there was not any shooting for some time; the ship's boats came alongside at half-past 6 o'clock; the captain went to the hatch several times, and was nearly wounded; he made motions to them to be quiet, and spoke to them in English; when the boats came alongside, all hands collected on the hatch to try and get down, but it was no use; every time any one showed, an arrow was fired at him; this went on for half an hour, until it got so dark that you could not see anything; these three men had a barricade in the hold, and we could not see them; the second mate, Robert, got a light, but I believe the cook held it for him; the second mate fired down the hold, and after the second mate fired I heard him say one was dead; the captain was at this time on the poop, and had not said anything immediately before; Antonio fired through the cabin bulkhead, and he said he had shot one man; there was a shot fired, I believe, by Louis, from the fore-castle; there were five shots fired: the cook held the light down the hatch whilst the firing was going on; we had a supercargo named Levinger on board; I did not hear any one besides the captain give any orders about firing; the captain attempted to stop the firing in the middle of it; Rangi had a musket, and I think Jemmy had a musket too, but am not sure; I don't know whether they fired; the captain said they—speaking of the three natives who were in the hold—must be shot, before they were shot, and whilst these men had muskets in their hands; I don't know who shot the third man; I saw the corpses of the three men brought on deck by the other natives and the crew; stones were tied to them by the crew, and they were thrown overboard; the captain was on the poop and could see what was done; I did not hear these three men or any one of them called by any name; their names were unknown to me; the shooting killed these three men; I have no doubt about the matter; there were sixty or seventy other natives on board at this time; the three men were in the fore-part of the hold on the starboard side; the men desisted firing when ordered by the captain for a time, and afterwards they commenced again; the captain, after he had ordered the firing to desist, said the men would have to be shot, and on that the firing recommenced which resulted in the killing of the three men; I can't say any more as to what the two coloured prisoners were doing than I have said; we had 230 men on board that trip; we had that number on board at one time; we took them to Ovalau, Fiji, where they were hired out at service; the "Young Australian" is a schooner of 130 tons tonnage; we left our anchorage at 4 o'clock the next morning, and went to Santo, 200 miles away; we got about fifteen men there; we took the boat ashore; the natives came into her, and we rowed them on board; the "Young Australian" is a Sydney vessel, sailed from this port, and I believe her owner is James Griffin.

To the Bench: There was a native who could speak the same language as these three men on board; the captain did not have anything told to these three men as to what was going to be done to them or anything; from the poop where the captain was standing is about 20 feet, and from the main to the fore hatch is 20 feet more.

Mr. Williams: Some of the men round the captain when he said the three men must be shot had muskets; there were somewhere about five or six shots fired; I do not know of my own knowledge that there was a person on board who could speak the language of these three natives; the prisoner, Albert Ross Hovell, is the person of whom I have been speaking as the captain through my depositions; the island of Pama is not under any recognized Government that I know of; I saw no flag flying there; it is one of the New Hebrides, and is distant fifteen or twenty miles from Apii.

Joseph Johnson, on oath, states:—I was cabin-boy on board the "Young Australian" in October last; I was on board the "Young Australian" off the island of Apii in the middle of October last; I remember three islanders coming on board; I first saw them in the ship's boat; the boat was coming round a point of the island of Apii; there was not a canoe with them; the ship's boat came to the ship; the three islanders came on the deck and sat on the poop; this was about 3 o'clock; they remained on the poop about half an hour; they were sitting still; I then saw the supercargo (Levinger) lead these three islanders to the main hatchway; these three men went down into the hold; about five minutes after that I saw the other natives that were in the hold tormenting these three islanders, spitting on and laughing at them; the three men then tried to come out of the hold, and the other natives tried to shove them back; all the other natives then got hold of pieces of wood; the three islanders had not anything just then; all the other natives commenced to rush out of the hold, and put the hatches on, keeping the three men down below; I heard the Frenchman Antonio sing out that they had bows and arrows; Antonio got rope to make these three islanders fast, but the supercargo said it was too late then; the three islanders began then to break open the main hatch, and did break it open, and began to heave up stones and cocoa-nuts at any one that was passing; I ran up the foremast to get away from these three islanders; as soon as the hatches were broken off I saw that the three islanders had bows and arrows, and I ran up the mast to get out of their way; the other natives had these bows and arrows in the hold; these three natives fired the arrows at me; I heard some one say—"Look out, they are firing arrows up," but I saw them myself; I came down the jibstay on to the jib-boom, and went and sat on the bows where the other natives were sitting; the men were still firing arrows up; Eromanga Tom was firing muskets to defend himself; Eromanga Tom had a musket; I saw him fire down the main hatchway only once; the second mate, Bob, had a musket; Louis and Antonio also had muskets; the two prisoners before the Court, Jemmy and Rangi, had muskets; it was just getting dusk at this time; the cook, Sam I call him, was there; I heard Levinger say to shoot them; I heard Louis say—"What is the use of firing yet?" I did not hear any one say anything else about firing; I did not hear any one else say anything about firing before the firing commenced, except what I have stated; the captain was on the poop at the time I heard him say—"Don't fire at them—let them come up and go over the side"; the prisoner Albert Ross Hovell is the person I refer to as the captain; when those three islanders attempted to come up, all the other natives commenced throwing stones at them; I did not see either of the two coloured prisoners, Jemmy and Rangi, fire, but both of them had muskets; it was not dark then—it was dark when the firing ceased—it became dark whilst the firing was going on; the firing lasted three-quarters of an hour; after the firing ceased I saw these three islanders on deck—two were dead, the other had a little life in him; I don't know whether he was alive when they threw him overboard; they tied stones to the bodies of these three islanders and threw them overboard; I don't know where the captain was at this time—it was dark; I heard the captain all the time say "Not to shoot them"; the prisoners Jemmy and Rangi were looking over the side when the bodies were being thrown overboard; I did not see the captain whilst the bodies were being thrown overboard, nor did I hear him giving any instructions about it; the captain was on the poop, when I saw him, during this transaction; the poop is about twenty feet from the main hatch; the captain was looking on—he did not come off the poop to where the men were firing; we sailed at 3 o'clock the next morning.

Bench: These men's bodies were brought up through the main hatch; they were firing arrows the whole of the time; I was down in the hold the next morning, and there were not any arrows there then;

Mr.

Mr. Williams: There were about fifty arrows in the hold; I was about two feet away from the bodies of these men; they were bleeding from wounds; one had five wounds—one in his arm, one in his thigh, one in his leg, and one in his forehead, and the other in the middle of his body; they were bullet wounds; this was the man that had some life in him when he was on deck; I did not go close to the other bodies; I only went close to this body because I saw some life in him; there were about a dozen shots fired; the ship was at anchor; she was not tacking about; the arms were kept in the main cabin; I don't know who threw them, the three islanders' bodies, overboard, or who tied the stones; when I say that I saw the captain at the poop during this transaction, I mean during the firing; these three islanders were all men; one was old, another young, and another middle-aged; I did not hear them called by any names; I did not hear any one of them called by any name.

Mr. Roberts: The time I ran up the mast I went to get out of danger; I considered myself in danger; three or four arrows were fired at me in quick succession; I was on the top-gallant arm; I saw them firing at Erromanga Tom; many arrows had been fired at different members of the crew before I heard the report of firearms; the arrows were used whilst the firing was going on; Erromanga Tom was a chief; Rangî and Jemmy came on board after the firing of the arrows commenced; these three men commenced firing about half-past 3; I heard only twelve shots fired; the firing ceased after dark; during that time I did not hear the captain's voice; I don't know when these three men were shot; it was not quite dark when the first shot was fired; these three islanders were carrying on this disturbance for several hours before a shot was fired; I considered mine, and the lives of the other members of the crew, endangered, before any shot was fired; I saw Antonio fire a shot; I did not see Rangî and Jemmy fire, but I heard the report of the muskets.

Bench: These three islanders were not armed when they came on board; when they came on board the captain had not any intercourse with them; the boats went on shore before the vessel anchored; we came there about 1 o'clock on the day the affair occurred.

Mr. Williams: We on deck could not get out of the way of these men shooting; these three islanders put their heads up through the hatchway, and looked where to aim.

Bench: There were about eighty men on board, and two were wounded; these three islanders had not any other weapons than bows and arrows; they were shooting the arrows all the time the muskets were being fired.

Henry Heath, on oath, states: I was cook on board the "Young Australian" in October last; I recollect that vessel being off the island of Apîi or Pama in that month; I know prisoner Albert Ross Howell—he was captain of that vessel at this time; the prisoners Rangî and Jemmy were seamen on board; I recollect the second mate going on shore in one boat with five men, and prisoner Rangî in another boat with about five men; I saw them leave the ship and go in the direction of the shore; I noticed them when they were returning to the ship; I noticed when they came alongside that the second mate had three islanders, men, in his boat; there was not a canoe with them; there was not a canoe being towed by either of the boats; when the boat came alongside, these three islanders walked up the ladder and on to the poop, where they sat down, and the supercargo gave them a pipe and some tobacco; these three islanders remained on the poop about an hour, and were then shown the way down into the hold; the supercargo made signs to them to go down into the hold; there was no ladder leading from the deck into the hold; there was a piece of firewood there with some of the branches cut off, by which they went down; they did not resist when motioned to go down into the hold; these three men had some yams given them down in the hold; the other natives of the other islands we had on board commenced jeering at these men; we had about 150 other natives on board the vessel at that time; the Tanna boys commenced throwing pieces of cocoa-nut shell at these three islanders, and the three islanders retaliated by throwing pieces of ballast at the other natives; the whole lot of them, excepting the three men, then came on deck; by some means or other the Tanna men had obtained some bows and arrows; and these three men found the bows and arrows in the hold, and commenced to fire at every one they could see; they were at this time in the main-hold; the hatch was open; the ballast and firewood in the hold was just enough to allow a man to put his head up on deck; the eldest man of the three put his head through the hatchway and fired some arrows fore and aft at any one he could see; one of the crew named Davy was wounded by an arrow in the breast; a man named Tom was wounded in the forehead; no one would go near this man to secure him, because they did not know whether the arrows were poisoned; I don't know where these other two islanders were—they were somewhere in the hold at this time; they shot all of their arrows away, and it commenced to become dark; Captain Howell was at this time on the poop; I did not hear him say anything; I could not hear him, on account of the excitement on board; just before dark muskets were handed round; the second mate, Antonio, Louis, Rangî, the prisoner before the Court, and a man named Tom—each got a musket; when Louis went down into the fore-castle the prisoner Jemmy handed him the rifle; the firing commenced just before dusk from the cabin; I can't say who fired first; they fired two shots through an opening in the cabin leading into the hold; these three islanders retreated to the fore part of the hold—one of them got behind a canoe that was in the hold; there was then a wad of oakum tied on to a rod of iron and dipped in oil; the fore-hatch was taken up; the second mate came to the galley to light the oakum, and ordered me to hold it down the fore-hold; one man was on one side of the hold and the other on the other side; I don't know where the third man was; as the light went down the two men retreated into the middle of the hold; Antonio fired and shot one of them—the man fell when shot; Rangî shot another man; the third man was behind the canoe; the man behind the canoe was shot by a man named Tom; altogether there were only five shots fired; they had not any fresh muskets, and they did not load again; at the time that these men were shot they had ceased firing their arrows; a rope was put down the hold and the three bodies of these islanders hauled up and laid on the deck; they had been killed by the musket-shot wounds; the three bodies were thrown overboard—I can't say by whom; Captain Howell was on the poop all the time the shooting was going on; I heard the captain say—"Spare the men if you can"; I have stated that the supercargo called to the captain—"Don't shoot the men if you can help it—there's £16 10s. lost on them"; the captain tried to put a stop to the firing, but it was all in vain, the excitement was too great; the muskets were brought from the cabin; I did not hear any one give orders for the muskets to be brought from the cabin; after these men had shot away all their arrows, and before they were shot, no attempt was made to secure them; there was plenty of ballast there; no one liked to go down; the vessel was under sail when the shooting was going on; the vessel was about five miles from land, between Apîi and Pama; the "Young Australian" sails under the British flag; I heard the captain say—"Don't fire if you can help it"; I did not hear him say "Stop firing."

Bench: I did not see the muskets handed round; I don't know who brought them, the captain was present when the muskets were served out; I don't know where the captain was when the bodies were thrown overboard; the captain and the men who had the muskets and the natives were all mixed together on the poop.

Mr. Roberts: The captain was on the poop when the shots were actually fired; I could not say whether the shots were fired at these three men on the motion of the men themselves, or whether by orders from some persons; I did not hear the captain order the shots to be fired; the three islanders could be seen through the hole in the bulkhead of the cabin, from which place the first two shots were fired; the excitement was so great on board at the time the two shots were fired that no orders could be heard before the muskets were discharged; these three islanders were firing their arrows at every one they saw; these three islanders were in no degree civilized; the natives of these islands are cannibals; nearly twenty minutes elapsed between the firing of the first two shots and the firing of the third, fourth, and fifth shots; it was during this interval that the captain said—"Don't shoot the men—spare them if you can," and these men paid no attention to it; the excitement was still great; the boats that went to the shore had muskets—they always do; the muskets they had firing with may have been brought out of the boats for all I know—they were handed about on the poop; I never heard the captain order them to fire; I was never near the captain; I never heard him say these three men must be shot when these men had the muskets—if he had said so I could have heard him; the captain could not see the third, fourth, and fifth shots except by the flash and report; the third and fourth shots were fired at once, and the fifth soon after, as soon as the light could be shown; it was at this time that the captain said—"Spare the men if you can—don't shoot them"; I was close by, and distinctly heard the captain use those expressions; I did not see the captain hand round the guns; the muskets were handed round, and a quarter of an hour elapsed before they were discharged; there was great excitement, disturbance, and confusion going on at the time the muskets were handed round; as long as these

three

three islanders had possession of the hold I consider the lives of the members of the crew were endangered; Jimmy did not fire at all; I did not know whether all the arrows had been fired below before the last three shots were fired; one man lay in his bunk a month in consequence of the wounds received from one of these islanders; I am positive that the three men were dead before they were thrown overboard, that stones were not tied to them, and that the vessel was under sail at the time.

Bench: I did not hear the captain order the men to give up the muskets or place them in the cabin between the firing of the first two shots and the firing of the third, fourth, and fifth shots.

Mr. Roberts: Just before the third shot was fired the captain cried out—"Don't shoot the men—spare them if you can," and they took no heed—the shots were fired in such quick succession.

Mr. Williams: I did not hear the captain say anything during the interval of twenty minutes between the second and the third fourth and fifth shots; the captain was on the deck all this time, and saw the men with the muskets on deck; he did not interfere to take the muskets from the men, nor tell them, as far as I heard, not to shoot.

ALBERT ROSS HOVELL and RANGI stand charged before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the Colony aforesaid, this 17th day of February, 1869, for that they, the said Albert Ross Hovell and Rangi, in the month of October last, on the high seas, feloniously, wilfully, and of their malice aforethought, did kill and murder three men whose names are unknown; and the examinations of all the witnesses on the part of the prosecution having been completed, and the depositions taken against the accused having been caused to be read to them by me, the said Justice before whom such examination has been completed: And I, the said Justice, having also stated to the accused and given them clearly to understand that they have nothing to hope from any promise of favour, and nothing to fear from any threat which may have been holden out to them to induce them to make any admission or confession of their guilt, but that whatever they shall say may be given in evidence against them upon their trial, notwithstanding such promise or threat; and the said charge being read to the said Albert Ross Hovell and Rangi, and the witnesses for the prosecution—George Turner, Richard Elliott, Robert M'Master, Joseph Johnson, and Henry Heath, being severally examined in their presence, the said Albert Ross Hovell and Rangi are now addressed by me as follows:—"Having heard the evidence, do you wish to say anything in answer to the charge? You are not obliged to say anything unless you desire to do so; but whatever you say will be taken down in writing, and may be given in evidence against you upon your trial"; whereupon the said Albert Ross Hovell saith as follows:—"I have nothing to say"; and Rangi saith as follows:—"I have nothing to say."

I have decided not to proceed to the trial of Hovell and Rangi at the present sitting, as I think it proper to endeavour to obtain further evidence, especially that of the declarants, whose statements are forwarded by H.M. Consul.

The case will not therefore be tried until May.

MY LORD,

I have received your Despatch, No. 27, of the 26th February, respecting a charge brought against Albert Ross Hovell, master of the "Young Australian," of being concerned in the murder of three South Sea Islanders. The outrages alleged to be committed on the natives of the South Sea Islands had already attracted the attention of Her Majesty's Government. It is of the first importance that such lawless and inhuman proceedings should be put an end to, and I am glad to perceive that Her Majesty's Government may count on the co-operation of that of New South Wales in the attempt to effect this.

I shall probably have to address you on the subject again in connection with your Despatch No. 26. Meantime I enclose copies of two Despatches which I had addressed to Colonel Blackall before I had perused your Despatches on the subject.

Sir,

My attention has been called to a paragraph in the *Sydney Morning Herald*, of which I enclose a copy, on the subject of Polynesian immigrants in Queensland.

I should wish to be informed what is known of the Mr. Ross Lewin who is mentioned in this article, and of the immigrants brought by him to Queensland in the ship "Spunkic."

I am aware that the law of the Colony makes the best practicable provision for requiring that immigrants should not be introduced except by persons who had obtained a license from Government, and had executed a bond which made them amenable to the Government, in case the immigrants are shown to be kidnapped or treated otherwise than as provided by law. But I should be glad to be informed of the course pursued by the Executive in giving effect to this law—Who practically issues licenses? Whether any inquiry is made into the character of the persons applying for such licenses? What inquiry is instituted into the state of the immigrant ship on its arrival, and the history of the voyage? Whether any complaints have been made? And, whether any masters of vessels have been subjected to any penalties for violation of the conditions prescribed by their bond or by the law of the Colony?

As this immigration is the subject of much comment in this country, it concerns the Colonial Government to furnish the Secretary of State with full information as to the mode in which it is carried on.

Sir,

I have addressed you, in another Despatch, respecting the immigration of South Sea Islanders into Queensland. I now enclose extracts from two newspapers, bearing on the same subject, which have been subsequently brought under my

(2) *Leeds Mercury*, Friday, April 18, par. 2, columns 6, 7.

I have, of course, no means of judging what credit is to be attached to the statements contained in these extracts. They derive some weight, however, from the circumstance that definite facts are alleged, and certain persons are quoted as making themselves directly or indirectly responsible for representations as to the mischief arising from the immigration.

The persons quoted are, the Bishop of Sydney, Bishop Pattison, the Reverend J. P. Sunderland, and the Reverend John Graham. The specific allegations relate, in part, to the mode in which the people are treated in Queensland; in part, to some transactions which appear to have taken place among the South Sea Islands, but which are not on their face connected with the Queensland Emigration.

Probably the same and other facts have been brought before the Council and Assembly of Queensland in petitions which appear to have been addressed to them by a meeting held at Sydney. I anticipate that before you receive this Despatch you will have communicated to me copies of those petitions, and will have given me an account of the steps which are taken in consequence of them. But I wish you clearly to remember that the matter is not a mere Queensland question—it is a matter affecting foreign though uncivilized countries, and the honor of the British name in connection with them—it is a matter in which Her Majesty's Government feel the deepest interest, and in respect of which you as their Officer are under the most serious responsibility.

It is for you to take care that the Home Government is not misled, but receives accurate and full information respecting what is going on in Queensland; and to use your utmost influence to secure that the immigrants receive, in relation to their employers, that special protection which immigrant labourers receive in other Colonies to which coloured immigrants (as they are called) proceed, and without which they must be at the mercy of those about them.

I trust to you for giving your immediate and serious attention to the matter, in order that Her Majesty's Government may be in a position to vindicate the character of the Colony, if these abuses do not exist; or to take such steps as may be necessary for putting a stop to the emigration, if they do.

Extract from *Times* of 21 April, 1869.

THE Polynesian Labourers' Question has assumed more important dimensions. It has been the subject of a large public meeting, under the presidency of His Worship the Mayor of Sydney, who, on behalf of the meeting, signed petitions to the two Houses of Parliament in Queensland, praying them to inquire into the working of, and, if necessary, to repeal the "Polynesian Labourers' Act," which received the provisional assent of the interim Governor last March. The Bishop of Sydney spoke very strongly, founding his denunciation of the Act mainly upon Bishop Pattison's representations of the evil it was working in the islands of the South Sea, among which he is cruising, with his life in his hand. Some terrible revelations are coming out respecting the atrocities committed by captains in the act of "recruiting" these poor islanders in the southern seas, under the British flag and the licence of the Queensland Government. Some instances were given by the Rev. John Graham; one was given on the authority of the wife of a missionary well known, he said, to many present. She wrote:—

"The slave traffic is still being carried on among these islands. We had quite a scene here two or three weeks ago. A little schooner anchored in the bay, and in a few hours afterwards two heathen natives appeared in a great state of excitement, saying that they had stolen nine natives, two of whom were under-chiefs, from their land, and they wished to know if the missionary could do anything in the way of getting them liberated. On the following morning a boat was sent on shore with Mare natives, from whom Mr. M— learnt the name of the captain, the vessel, and further particulars about the said Erromangans. He then sent a note to the captain requesting him to land the natives, stating that, meantime, his boat would remain here till he did so. In a little while a boat was seen approaching with the captain, two white men, and a large crew of natives. The captain came to the house in a great rage, with a revolver in one hand and a rifle in the other, while all who were with him were armed to the teeth. He demanded his boat. Mr. M— said he would get it whenever the Erromangans were landed. He said if he did not get it immediately there would be bloodshed; he had come prepared to fight. Meanwhile the heathens were gathering thick and fast, and were not only willing but anxious to fight for their countrymen. But Mr. M—, being afraid of bloodshed, got the captain to sign a paper promising to send them ashore. This he did rather reluctantly. The natives were most unwilling to let them go before seeing their friends landed; and the captain, as soon as he got on board, weighed anchor and left the bay without fulfilling his promise. As it is full time measures were taken to stop this shameful traffic, Mr. M— has written out a full statement of the case to Commodore Lambert."

I believe I stated in my last something respecting the act of the supercargo of a vessel bound to Samoa, where that person had just established a plantation. By arrangement with the captain, sixty men and twenty or thirty young women were inveigled on board and forcibly detained, and carried to Samoa. A case has just come to the knowledge of the authorities here and compelled them to put the law in force against the offenders. The captain of the "Young Australian" and one of the crew stand committed to take their trial for the murder of three natives of one of the New Hebrides group of islands. The supercargo, who is also implicated in the affair, has been caught at Melbourne, and is coming up. Briefly, the particulars are as follows:—The vessel mentioned, chartered by a Sydney firm, sailed in September last or thereabouts with a cargo for Fiji.

The

The cargo being discharged (so at present I understand the case), a raid was proposed among the New Hebrides islands for "niggers," as the Polynesians are called, to work on the newly established plantations at Fiji. The vessel was five weeks gone, and when it returned landed 280 natives, including six women, something like £1,200 having been cleared by the transaction. The vessel returned to Sydney. While here intelligence was received from Fiji, which was made known to the Government. It appears that during that voyage off the island of Pama, three natives were forced on board, who, breaking open the hold in which they were confined, fought for their liberty, and were shot down and tumbled overboard by command of the supercargo, and under the silent sanction of the captain. The vessel was just on the point of starting again from Sydney on another expedition when the captain was arrested. I understand that a great many shippers are engaged in this traffic, which can be carried on respectably under the indorsement of the Queensland Parliament—I had almost said of the British Government—but I hope we have not yet come to that. In my next I shall be able to inform you how the case has sped. It cannot be denied that there is a strong desire on the part of a great many of the young men of these islands "to see the world," and that they will find the means of quitting their islands. No one can possibly object to this natural emigration. If the men wish to come to these Colonies let them come, and let the Magistrates see that the contracts they make are equitable. No engagement should be permitted on distant islands unless where properly appointed labour depôts are established. If we begin with injustice we are bound to continue the injustice by compelling those to work who have not voluntarily engaged to work. If we begin with kidnapping in the South Sea Islands, we must, to sustain the false position, follow up with slavery in these Colonies, as is clearly shown by the prayer of the Sydney petitioners already referred to.

EXTRACT from *Leeds Mercury* of 16th April, 1869.

WE have before aided in bringing certain painful facts connected with the importation of South Sea Islanders into Queensland before the public, we will only at present cite the evidence of the latest witness that we have heard of; and we leave his testimony to make its own impression. In an article in "Christian Work for April" headed "Kidnapping of South Sea Islanders for Queensland," we find it stated that "At a recent meeting in Australia, the Reverend J. P. Sunderland gave the following account of what he saw and heard on this subject in August last, in Queensland. He visited sugar plantations where some 3,000 or 4,000 Polynesian labourers were employed, who had been taken from their homes by fraud. Ships went to the New Hebrides to 'catch blackbirds' as it was called, and they caught them by utter deceit, for three years engagements. He went to some of the best sugar plantations in Queensland, and if ever there was anything like slavery that was. The natives were of different islands and different dialects, and so were isolated in their new homes. Their hours of labour were from half-past six to half-past five, with an hour for dinner; their wages, 2s. 6d. a week, payable at the end of three years. They were very scantily dressed. One would have nothing but a flannel shirt, another only a pair of trousers, and they had to dig with bare feet. They said to him, 'Missa, we've been deceived; we were told we should have plenty of work, plenty of food, and at the end of twelve months should go back home; but we found we have to stop three years.' He asked the planters what they did when the labourers fell ill. The reply was, 'They often gammon to be ill, but we take a whip and tickle them up a bit and then they soon get well.' Such was the humane process by which the Islanders were to be raised in the scale of morality and civilization. One planter wrote to another and said, 'What can you supply me a hundred niggers for?'; and no doubt as long as it was found that £6 or £7 a head could be got for the natives, men would do anything to get them."

I have the honor to transmit to you, for your consideration, and for that of your Responsible Advisers, the enclosed copy of Instructions recently issued by the Earl of Clarendon to Her Majesty's Consul at the Fiji Islands, together with a copy of a letter on the subject, addressed to the Admiralty by the Foreign Office.

You will perceive that the Foreign Secretary has reserved for the present his decision as to the question whether it is desirable to take steps for an extension of the powers entrusted to Mr. March in his official capacity.

I beg to call your special attention to the limits within which the operations of the British Consular and Naval Officers will be restricted; and I have to instruct you not to afford any encouragement to measures such as have been contemplated in some recent instances, for the acquisition of land in the Fiji Islands, by individuals or Companies. If the promoters of any similar scheme were to apply to you for letters of introduction to the British officials in those islands, it appears to me that it will be your duty to decline to accede to such request.

Sir,

I am directed by the Earl of Clarendon to transmit to you, to be laid before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, copy of a Despatch which His Lordship has addressed to Mr. March, who has been appointed as Her Majesty's Consul at Fiji, containing general instructions for his guidance, both as regards the native chiefs and the British community settled in the islands.

Lord Clarendon does not doubt that the Lords of the Admiralty will concur with him in the opinion that it will be desirable that the British Naval Authorities, as well as Her Majesty's Consul, should, as far as may be practicable, confine themselves to matters in those quarters where the legitimate interests of British subjects are concerned, and should abstain, except in very extreme cases, from the employment of force, and from any measures which could give a colour to the erroneous notions current in regard to territorial acquisition in the islands.

Lord Clarendon, therefore, desires me to request that you will suggest to the Lords of the Admiralty that the Naval Authorities on the Australian Station should be informed of the nature of the instructions addressed to Mr. March, and should be instructed, as far as may be consistent with the exigencies of the service, to give to him the countenance and support which will be afforded by the occasional visit of one of Her Majesty's vessels of war.

Lord Clarendon to Mr. March.

Foreign Office, March 19, 1869.

Sir,

There are certain points connected with the existing state of affairs in the Fiji Islands to which I think it desirable to call your attention, on your proceeding to your post, in order, if possible, to relieve you hereafter from difficulty as to the course which you should pursue.

The absence of a constituted Government will deprive you of the support to which a Consular Officer would, in ordinary cases, look, and as the quarter in which he might appeal for redress in case of injury to the interests which he is bound to protect.

On the other hand, the British community, with which you will have to deal, will comprise within its members many persons who, from their antecedents and habits, may be more prone to adventure than ready to conform to authority.

As regards the local chiefs, it is far from my intention to restrict you from the exercise of such influence, in the shape of friendly communications and advice, which you can exert for the benefit of an uncivilized race; but you will clearly understand that it will be your duty to avoid taking part in any internal dissensions, or in any acts of partisanship which would compromise the neutrality of your position, and place you virtually, or even in appearance, in a position of intervention in the disputes amongst the chiefs.

As regards the British community, I trust that by the exercise of tact and judgment you may be able to deal with most cases when your intervention is called for. Your powers of jurisdiction are, however, limited, and it may be a matter for consideration hereafter whether they may not beneficially be extended. In the meanwhile, there are various matters which will call for your early attention, and amongst these you will find the speculations set on foot in the Australian Colonies, involving the contemplated acquisition, by purchase, of large districts in the islands. As far as Her Majesty's Government are concerned, steps have already been taken to discourage enterprises of this description; but from the last information which has reached me the scheme has not been abandoned, and must be dealt with both with reference to the tendency shown by British settlers to extend their operations into the interior, and to a growing disposition to treat the islands in the light of a Colonial Possession of the British Crown.

It will be your duty, by your acts and language, to discountenance any such erroneous notion, and you will make it to be clearly and publicly understood that your functions are confined to the limits of your Consular duties, in watching over commercial interests, and as far as may be, contributing to the order and well-being of the British community; but that any attempt to form establishments in the interior will be at the sole risk of the undertakers, who, in withdrawing themselves beyond the bounds of your legitimate influence, may expose themselves to risk.

It is my intention to suggest to the Lords of the Admiralty that the Naval Authorities on the Australian Station should be directed, as far as may be consistent with other requirements, to cause some of Her Majesty's vessels of war occasionally to visit the islands for the purpose of giving weight to your representations and supporting your proper authority. But you will understand that the presence of such a vessel of war is not proposed with a view to its being made serviceable for purposes connected with native feuds, still less that any operations should be undertaken which would be calculated to show an intention to acquire for this country any territorial possession in the islands.

Wolfen and Company, of this city, made an application to me with a view to the Commandant being authorized to issue from the military stores samples of congreve rockets for the use of the Fiji Island chief Thackombau, who they say, "is now about to commence hostilities against the rebellious natives who are at the present moment very troublesome to the European settlers, and it is for this purpose these rockets are required." Messrs. Wolfen, believe that "the punishing of the disorderly natives is urged on the chief by the European settlers."

2. I referred their letter to the Attorney General, and upon receipt of that Minister's reply I declined to comply with Messrs. Wolfen & Company's request.

Independently of this opinion, in which I fully concur, I am under an impression, derived partly from Mr. Acting Consul Thurston's letter, which forms the subject of another despatch by this mail, that these natives, styled by Messrs. Wolfen "rebellious," owe no allegiance whatever to the chief Thackombau.

4. I trust your Lordship will approve of my proceedings in this matter.

Sir,

We have the honor of informing your Excellency that, by request of our Fiji Branch, we have applied to the Military Store Office, on behalf of Fiji Native Government King Thackombau, for samples of congreve rockets, for which we have been authorized to pay what may be demanded for them; and in reply, we are informed that the application must be made through your Excellency.

The chief or king of Fiji is now about to commence hostilities against the rebellious natives, who are at the present moment very troublesome to the European settlers, and it is for this purpose these rockets are required.

We believe the punishing of the disorderly natives is urged on the chief by the European settlers; and your Excellency may probably, under the circumstances, authorize the Commandant to supply these sample rockets, with the view of assisting to subdue the refractory portion of the natives by the Native Government of Fiji.

The Attorney General to His Excellency's Private Secretary.

In the matter of an application from Messrs. Wolfen & Co., on behalf of Fiji Native King Thackombau, for samples of Congreve Rockets.

I cannot hesitate to advise that compliance with Mr. Wolfen's request be refused. For the Government of this Colony to furnish the samples asked for, with the avowed view of enabling one chief of Fiji to make war upon tribes with which he has some wild hostility, would be an act of countenance and aid to which it should on no account lend itself.

It is not sufficient to urge that British settlers are interested in the success of the proposed war, as they have not settled in that country under the special protection of the British flag, but have chosen to go thither trusting to the power of the chief of an uncivilized race. The question whether Great Britain should accept the protectorate of the Fijis has been considered, and answered in the negative; and it would seem to me quite inconsistent with the views of the Home Government, and with Her Majesty's present relation to these islands, for her representative in this Colony to furnish arms or samples of arms for use in the internal wars of the people.

I have the honor to acquaint your Lordship that I have received a letter from Mr. Thurston, Her Majesty's Acting Consul for Fiji and Tonga, informing me (in accordance with general instructions which he appears to have received from the Foreign Office) that a notice, a copy of which is enclosed, had been issued at Bau, and was intended to be republished in the Australian Colonies and New Zealand, inviting persons to enter the service of Thackombau, Chief of Bau, as military settlers, and of the causes which have led thereto.

2. I consulted my Attorney General as to whether I could or ought to do anything in the matter, and if so, what; and subsequently I received a written opinion from him.

3. Sir William Manning is of opinion that any person accepting Thackombau's invitation would render himself liable under the circumstances to be prosecuted for a breach of the Foreign Enlistment Act, 59 Geo. 3, cap. 69, sec. 2, and he advised the issue of a Proclamation warning Her Majesty's subjects here.

4. I then referred the letter and opinion to the consideration of my Responsible Advisers, and I have by their advice, issued a Proclamation, a copy of which I enclose.

5. I thought it to be convenient that the Governors of the other Colonies concerned should be made acquainted with what I have done; and I have therefore sent copies of the papers to them, as well as to Mr. Thurston, and will do so to Commodore Lambert.

6. I trust your Lordship will approve of my action in the matter.

7. In conclusion, I enclose for what it is worth, a newspaper paragraph bearing upon the matter.

VOLUNTEERS as military settlers are hereby invited to enrol themselves into a corps, for the purpose of assisting Thackombau, King of Bau, to subjugate the rebellious and cannibal tribes of the interior of Viti Levu.

Each man enrolling must sign a declaration he will faithfully serve King Thackombau, his heirs and successors, in person, crown, and dignity, against all native enemies, and will observe and obey all orders of King Thackombau, his heirs and successors, and of the European generals and officers set over him, until the subjugation of the rebellious and cannibal tribes releases

releases him from active service. In consideration of the effective rendering of such service, each volunteer will receive, in fee simple, a grant of land of an area proportionate to their rank, to be selected by themselves in the districts subjugated, provided such selection does not interfere with Government towns; their occupation and tenure of said grants rendering them liable to the service and obligations of military settlers generally.

Volunteers will provide their own arms.

I HAVE given immediate attention to the letter of Acting Consul Thurston, of Fiji, dated the 2nd February in this year, which His Excellency the Governor was pleased to place in my hands yesterday; and I have the honor to report thereon as follows :—

1. As regards the invitation by British subjects to Maafce, the so-called King of the Windward Islands, to bring his warriors into Rewa, Fiji, for the purpose of subjugating certain savage tribes who have shown themselves hostile to the European settlers, and whom their nominal chief, Thackombau, is unable to control, I am unable to advise that His Excellency or the judicial authorities of this Colony have any power to interfere in the matter. I cannot take upon myself to advise whether the Naval Authorities, acting under the instructions of the Home Government, should take any steps to prevent the adoption by Maafce of the measures which such invitation proposes.

2. It seems to me that the enlistment of British subjects as military officers and soldiers, for service under the so-called King Thackombau, of Fiji, without the leave and license of Her Majesty, is a violation of the Foreign Enlistment Act, 59 Geo. III. c. 69, sect. 2, and a misdemeanor. That enactment is not confined to cases of service under potentates recognized by civilized States, but extends to cases of military service under "any person or persons exercising or assuming to exercise the powers of government in or over any foreign country colony province or part of any province or people."

Moreover, it is stated upon high authority to be a high misdemeanor at common law for any British subject to enter into the service of any foreign State, or to contract with any foreign State any engagement which subjects him to an influence or control inconsistent with the allegiance due to his own Sovereign; and I conceive that the position of Thackombau on the one hand, and that which the person enlisting would take on the other hand, by virtue of the declaration of allegiance, &c., which he is to be required to sign, would bring the latter within this breach of the law.

I have considered this matter also in reference to the question whether a British subject taking service with such a chief as Thackombau, and in the course of such service killing any of Thackombau's enemies, would thereby become guilty of murder, and be subject to the criminal jurisdiction of our Courts; and I see so much of both legal and practical difficulty in the law, and as to its enforcement, that I cannot recommend any action by this Government on the assumption of jurisdiction in this form.

The course that I take leave to recommend is the issue of a proclamation by His Excellency (with the advice of the Executive Council, if given), warning all British subjects that, by taking service in the manner proposed they will render themselves liable to conviction for misdemeanor.

With this I send a sketch of the terms of such proclamation or notice.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honorable SOMERSET RICHARD, EARL OF BELMORE, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council in Ireland, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

WHEREAS intelligence has been received of the intended publication of a notice, purporting to have been issued by the so-styled Chief Secretary at Bau, Fiji, and dated the 31st day of January now last past, wherein volunteers are invited to take military service under Thackombau, therein styled King of Bau, for the purpose of assisting him in subjugating certain tribes in the interior of Viti Levu, and thereupon to sign a declaration faithfully to serve the said so-styled King Thackombau, his heirs and successors, against all native enemies, and to obey all his and their orders, and the orders of the European Generals and Officers set over such volunteers, and whereby inducements to such service are held out by promises of large grants of land: And whereas it is contrary to the laws of Great Britain that such service should be entered upon by British subjects, without the leave or license of Her Majesty: Now, therefore, I, SOMERSET RICHARD, EARL OF BELMORE, the Governor aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby warn all and sundry Her Majesty's subjects in the Colony of New South Wales, that all persons, being British subjects, who shall, without the leave or license of Her Majesty in that behalf obtained, enter into such service and sign such declaration as aforesaid, or shall contract or engage to enter to take or accept such service, will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and will render themselves liable to prosecution according to law.

2. In framing this reply I have been advised by the Attorney General, and on one point—relating to natives of France who are supposed to have been implicated, and to be still at large—I have received a formal opinion from him, a copy of which I enclose.

3. I have also sent a copy of this opinion to Mr. Thurston for his guidance.

4. Your Lordship will see that Sir William Manning advised me that the proceedings should be communicated to the French Consul in Sydney, Monsieur Sentis, and that no attempt should be made to arrest the Frenchmen without his concurrence.

5. Monsieur Sentis, as you will find by the enclosed copy of a memorandum received by me from him, declines to interfere unless these men are actually in custody here, and then only to the extent of claiming for them a mixed jury.

6. I have consequently told Mr. Thurston that I cannot advise the arrests being made, but must leave him to act on his own judgment and responsibility. Warrants appear to have been issued by the Water Police Magistrate, but not at the instance of the Attorney General.

7. As I am quite without instructions or authority to take action in the matter, I trust your Lordship will approve of what I have done.

Sir,

I have had the honor to receive your communication of the 17th January, 1869, covering certain declarations made before you respecting the murders alleged to have been committed in October last, on board the British vessel "Young Australian." I have sent copies of these papers to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies; but before doing so I referred them to Sir William Manning, Attorney General of New South Wales, and learnt from him, that acting on prior information the Crown had already commenced proceedings in the matter;—first, by an inquiry in the nature of an inquest, and afterwards by a prosecution of the master (A. R. Hovell) and two of the crew, named Rangi and Jemmy, for murder. The master and Rangi have been committed for trial, and are in custody. An information was filed against them at a recent sitting of the Supreme Court, and the trial has been postponed till May next, with a view to the procuring of further evidence if obtainable.

Levinger, the supercargo, has I learn been arrested in Melbourne under a warrant from this Colony, and is now in custody. He appears to have been remanded to Sydney.

The Attorney General advises that you should be invited to collect such further evidence as may appear to you calculated to throw light on the case, and that any persons whom you may consider also acquainted with the true facts, and legally competent to give evidence in a Court of Justice, may be sent by you to Sydney, in time for the May sittings of the Court. It will be necessary that they should be persons "sensible of the obligations of an oath from religious sentiment and belief," persons who "believe in the existence of a God, and that divine punishment will be the consequence of perjury," and who regard an oath as binding on their consciences.

It will also be desirable to select, in the event of there being a choice of competent witnesses, such as can understand and can make themselves understood in the English language, or to send with them a competent interpreter, such interpreter being also qualified to undertake, under the sanction of an oath, that he will faithfully interpret.

I request that you will be so good as to act upon the suggestion above conveyed, and I shall be glad if you will convey me the earliest information in your power as to the additional evidence you may have collected.

The expenses to which you may be put in acting under my request, will I presume be ultimately paid by the Home Government, but of this you will be a better judge than I can be; but in the meantime you are at liberty (should you find it necessary) to communicate with the Crown Law Officers of this Colony respecting them.

In view to an inquiry whether the course said to have been pursued by the master and crew of the "Young Australian," in procuring labourers for service in Fiji, comes within the laws for the suppression of slavery, I shall be glad if you will give me information as to the disposal, legal and social position, and treatment of these men when landed in that and other islands, and as to the measures (if any) adopted to secure their subsequent return to their native islands.

I find that the French Consul in Sydney declines to interfere further than to claim a mixed jury, if the men* are actually brought and tried here, but I cannot take upon myself to advise the arrests mentioned by Sir William Manning being made, and must leave you to act upon your own judgment and responsibility with regard to them.

In the matter of the participation by subjects of France in the murders on board the British vessel "Young Australian."

IN reference to the note of His Excellency the Earl of Belmore, of yesterday's date, I have the honor to report as follows:—

Warrants have, as I learn, been issued by the Water Police Magistrate, for the arrest of the Frenchman, and another foreigner supposed to be of the same nation, who were concerned in the murders on board the "Young Australian." These warrants were not applied for at my instance; and I know of no authority for executing them in the island of Fiji, or elsewhere in those parts. The Supreme Court has jurisdiction to try cases of this sort when the persons accused are within the limits of this territory; but it does not follow that our Justices of the Peace can reach the persons of the offenders by warrants executed beyond such limits, and not within some place to which the extradition laws may extend. Should the warrants be in fact executed, and the offenders thereupon be brought within the Colony, the charges may be proceeded with; and perhaps it might not be deemed wrong to seize these men, if found on the South Sea Islands after having committed their offence on board a British ship, and when under articles as members of its crew, and to convey them by force to this Colony.

But such a step would be, in a legal sense, of such a questionable character that I must advise that it be not attempted in the case of a subject of France without the concurrence of the representative of that country.

Upon the above grounds, I recommend that the proceedings should be communicated to the French Consul at Sydney, and that nothing should be attempted towards the arrest of the Frenchman or Frenchmen said to have been concerned in this murder, without prior consultation with him.

MEMO for Lord Belmore, by M. Sentis, French Consul in Sydney.

THE French Consul in Sydney having received communication of the Attorney General, and opinion on the matter of some Frenchmen supposed to be connected with a murder committed on high seas, when articulated to the ship "Young Australian," expresses his thanks to His Excellency for the courtesy shown to him on this occasion.

As regards his countrymen, he begs to state that he has no jurisdiction in the Fiji Islands, and therefore could not interfere in the matter.

In the case the men would be brought to Sydney and tried before the Supreme Court of New South Wales, the Consul would only claim what is granted by the law of the country, *i.e.*, that the accused might have the benefit of a jury with half of their countrymen resident in Sydney.

MY LORD,

With reference to my Despatches, No. 27, of date 26th February, and No. 40, of 20th March, 1869, on the subject of the alleged murders on board the British ship "Young Australian," I have now the honor to forward three further Despatches, two of them with enclosures,* which I have received since the departure of the last mail, from Her Majesty's Acting Consul for Fiji and Tonga.

* One of the enclosures, dated 30 March, cannot be traced.

2. Mr. Thurston forwarded at the same time with these papers two natives of the island of Rotumah, for the purpose of giving evidence at the trial of Albert Ross Hovell and Rangī, in accordance with a request contained in my letter to him of March 10th, a copy of which formed one of the enclosures to my Despatch, No. 40, above referred to.

3. I now beg to enclose a copy of my letter to Mr. Thurston, in reply to his last communications. This, with them, will I think fully explain the position of the matter to your Lordship.

4. Mr. Thurston, in one of his letters, refers to a Despatch which he sent to me at the same time, under flying seal, addressed to Commodore Lambert. In accordance with his request, I perused it, and forwarded it to New Zealand, where I believe the Commodore is at present.

5. This letter mentioned that the barque "Anna," of Melbourne, had returned on the 8th February from a cruise to the Kingsmill Islands (where I believe she went for the purpose of procuring labourers), had disembarked at the port of Rewa (Fiji) between sixty and seventy souls—that no report of her entry had been made to him as Consul, and that she had returned to the Kingsmill Islands on the 16th.

6. Mr. Thurston also informed Commodore Lambert of an attempted fictitious sale of a vessel by a British subject, who had not himself obtained (or completed) a clear title to her, to an American subject at Fiji, whom he described as a pauper, proposing to take a bill of exchange in ostensible payment for her, for the supposed purpose of enabling her to sail under American colours.

The Consul would appear, however (as I understood him), to have prevented this arrangement being carried out, at any rate at that time.

I have the honor to enclose herewith the declarations of two Rotumah men alluded to in my former despatch to your Lordship, reporting charges of murder against the master and crew of the ship "Young Australian." These men, Hau or Ao, and David or Tevita, fully confirm the information first received. I have placed them among my native servants, where they will remain until the receipt of your Lordship's advices.

PERSONALLY appeared before me, John B. Thurston, Esquire, Acting British Consul in Fiji and Tonga,—Hau, a Christian native of Rotumah, who, being examined touching the proceedings on board the ship "Young Australian," during the late voyage to the New Hebrides, declared as follows (to wit):—

I joined the "Young Australian," under the command of Captain Ross Hovell, at Rotumah; four men from Notau, my town, joined four from Oinafa and two from Etatert. From Rotumah we went to Tanna; we took on board sulphur and pigs, also embarked some Tanna men for Fiji; we then went to Erromanga and embarked some men by their own consent; thence to islands of which I do not know the names. At Santo we stole plenty of men; the boat was usually sent in and anchored close to the beach; in the boat were Lavinger, Bob, four Rotumah men and two Erromangans; the white men staid in the boat; the native crew went on shore and laid in wait for Santo men; sometimes Santo men came to the boat with yams for sale, and were seized and taken to the ship. Bob stood up with a musket to shoot any one who should attempt to escape. The ship sailed round the island and her boat landed at different places. I recollect three natives being shot on

on board the ship; I do not know the name of their island; they did not come on board by their own consent; they were seized and made prisoners; it happened thus,—we saw a small canoe lying off the shore, and two boats were lowered to catch it; I was in one boat commanded by Bob; an Erromanga man steered the other boat; we gained on the canoe, and the natives on board jumping into the water were soon caught; two were caught by my boat, and one by the Erromanga man's boat; we then took the three men to the ship, and put them in the hold; they tried to come up, and Levinger pushed them down again; I then went on shore with the boats; on my return I saw all the people were in the rigging, and on the yards, and heard the three men taken by us were fighting with bows and arrows; shortly after I returned, Bob, Antonio, Louis, and two Rotumah men, Mai-mā-ofā and Moy-langi, commenced firing with muskets at the three men in the hold; by-and-by all three were killed; then the Tanna men and others, I among them, went down into the hold; the bodies appeared quite dead, and were shot (wounded) all over; one was a boy, one a young man, and the other an old man: the old man was not quite dead, and lifting up his head, began to speak, when a Tanna man cut him down with an axe; I saw it done; the bodies were taken on deck, stones tied to them, and they were thrown overboard; the moon was up at this time; it was evening; the white man loaded guns and gave them to the Rotumah men; I cannot speak English, and do not know what the captain and others were saying during the time these facts were occurring; no other men were shot to my knowledge during the voyage; I know nothing more than I have stated about the death of the three natives we seized; before we anchored in Fiji, the Rotumah men were told not to say anything about the seizure and shooting of the natives, because misunderstanding would give rise to much lying, and the captain and other whites would therefore tell the story themselves.

Personally appeared before me John B. Thurston, Esquire, Acting British Consul in Fiji and Tonga, David, a Christian native of Rotumah, who being examined touching the proceedings on board the ship "Young Australian" during her late voyage to the New Hebrides, declared as follows, to wit:—I joined the ship "Young Australian" under the command of Captain Ross Hovell, at Rotumah, from which place we went to Tanna; I was not employed at any time on boat service, but remained entirely on board ship; I do not know the names of the many islands we visited during the voyage; we took on board many men; I heard they were stolen; I remember three natives being brought on board one day; they had been caught in a canoe not far from the land; they were put below into the hold to prevent their escape; I was at the hatch on deck watching them; they had not been below long when they commenced to fight and drove all the other natives on deck; some of the hatches were put on, but I was kept at the open one until an arrow striking me in the left breast (wound exhibited) caused such pain that I had to leave my place and lie down; the three men below were afterwards shot; firing commenced as soon as "Bob" came back with the boats; I did not see the men shot I was lying down; while the white men and Tanna men were tying stones to the three bodies I went on deck; all three were dead; the old man was cut on the head and shot in the legs and back; the boy was shot through the head, the other was shot in many places; Bob, Antonio, and Louis shot from the fore-castle and cabin bulkheads; two Rotumah men had guns given them—one gun would not go off; these two men are still with the ship; I hear Bob is in Fiji; the men Antonio and Louis went away from Fiji in a brig; during the firing the captain said—"Shoot them in the legs"; some of the Rotumah men who left in the ship for Sydney can speak English; I and Hau left the ship without being paid off; the Tanna man who cut down the native in the hold with an axe is in Levuka; I saw him a day or two ago; I do not know his name.

My Lord,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's Despatch, under date of 10th March instant, together with the annexed opinion of Sir William Manning, Attorney General for New South Wales, "in the matter of participation by subjects of France in the murders on board the British ship 'Young Australian.'"

On the 3rd of January last I wrote a Despatch to your Lordship covering the depositions of Ao and David, two Rotumah boys who formed part of the crew of the "Young Australian" during her late voyage. Since writing, no opportunity has offered until the present to forward this despatch.

I have now to inform your Lordship of the transmission of said depositions; and also, in accordance with your Lordship's suggestions, that I have forwarded the boys Ao and David by the schooner "Ida" to the Colonies for examination.

David is the man stated to have been wounded during the affray.

Both Ao and David are intelligent, and likely if not moved by their unusual position to give their evidence clearly. They are both Christian, and are either members or on trial for admission to the Wesleyan Church at Rotumah. They can write a little in their own language, and have been for some years under the tuition of the Reverend W. Fletcher, the resident Protestant missionary at their native island. They cannot sufficiently explain themselves in English.

The arrival of the "Ida" permits me, however, to secure the services of the most competent interpreter that could possibly be obtained. The master of the "Ida," Charles Howard, has resided for nearly thirty years past at Rotumah, and speaks that peculiar and difficult language as well or better than English. He is an illiterate but very respectable and honest old man, and I have no doubt the Attorney General will approve of him as a trustworthy interpreter.

Touching the expenses incurred in the conveyance to Sydney and maintenance while there of the witnesses, I am of opinion that the charge should be debited to the public of New South Wales. Should the Crown Law Officers dissent from this conclusion, I have directed Mr. Howard to refer to this office. In order the conveyance of these men may be a matter of contract, they will be forwarded much in the same manner as distressed British seamen.

As the island of Rotumah is within the limits of this Consular district, it is my duty to request the witnesses Ao and David may, at the termination of the May Sessions, be returned to Rotumah, or to this office, in order I may return them from Fiji.

I have attentively read the opinion of Sir William Manning upon the propriety or otherwise of arresting the French seamen charged with complicity in the murders on board the "Young Australian," and note in your Lordship's Despatch "the French Consul declines to interfere, further than to claim a mixed jury, if the men are actually brought and tried" in Sydney.

Feeling at the first, what I now find ruled by the Attorney General, that no warrants issued by Colonial Justices of the Peace could take effect beyond the limits of the Colony, excepting to such civilized places as the Extradition Laws might extend, I feared the actual murderers of the natives might escape.

I remark the words of Monsieur Sentis do not even convey an expression of opinion, but are confined solely to a claim he would prefer, if the men, were brought within the limits of the territory of New South Wales.

Under the circumstances, my Lord, I have decided not to risk the probabilities of much lengthy and unpleasant correspondence by arresting the men Lennie and Voller without full and sufficient authority.

The social position and treatment of New Hebrideans while in Fiji will form, my Lord, the subject of a separate despatch.

For the further information of your Lordship, and by way of illustrating the desire some resident British subjects have withdrawn their vessels from the surveillance of this office, I have the honor to forward, under flying seal, a Despatch addressed to Commodore Lambert, to whom after perusal I beg it may be forwarded.

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your three Despatches, dated respectively 3rd February, 30th March, and 30th March, and also another under flying seal addressed to Commodore Lambert, which I have perused, and forwarded to New Zealand to him, by the mail of the 24th instant.

2. The schooner "Ida" arrived, I believe, on the 22nd; notice was given the same day to the Crown Solicitor, who at once provided for the safe custody of the two native witnesses whom you forwarded.

3. I did not get your Despatches, owing to absence from Sydney, till next day. On their receipt, I communicated by telegram with the Attorney General, who is attending the Maitland Circuit, and the next morning had an interview with the Crown Solicitor on the subject.

4. I find that the trial of Hovell and Rangī is fixed for the 17th May, at Sydney, whereas Lovinger's trial is fixed for the 19th, at Melbourne. The Crown Solicitor appeared to think that the witness David (who seems to have understood English sufficiently well to give evidence of what he heard said, as well as of what he saw on the occasion of the murders), would be a material witness at both trials. Should the Law Officers of the Crown in Victoria be of the same opinion, Lovinger's trial will probably have to be postponed to the following sittings; Hovell's trial having been already postponed once, cannot be so again; and it would be hardly possible for the witness to give evidence in Court in Sydney on the 17th, and in Melbourne so soon afterwards as the 19th.

5. This will probably lead to the detention of David longer than you may expect. The return of these natives to Rotumah or Fiji will however be attended to.

6. With regard to the non-arrest of the two Frenchmen, the Crown Solicitor assures me that no right whatever exists to arrest them under the circumstances. If they were found here, I apprehend however the Court would have jurisdiction, no matter how they came here. I am further informed that the English law which enables foreigners to claim a mixed jury does not extend to New South Wales.

7. I observe a query in your Despatch to Commodore Lambert, which leads me to think that you have not yet received a copy of certain papers on the subject of the Polynesian labour question which have been laid before the House of Commons. I therefore enclose a copy of the reprint of them which has been made here.†

8. In conclusion, I beg to assure you of my willingness to give you any assistance or advice in my power at all times. At the same time I am in possession of no instructions, and have received no authority from Her Majesty's Government to take any steps in this matter, or to interfere further than in the performance of such duties as may be incidental to the Governor or Government of this Colony, in the execution of the Act 9 Geo. IV, cap. 83, sec. 4, which extends the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of New South Wales to deal with offences committed in the islands of the Pacific Ocean, not occupied by any civilized power.

9. I will forward a copy of your letters and of this reply to Lord Granville.

I have the honor to enclose the copy of a letter which I have received from Commander Palmer, of H.M.S. "Rosario," informing me that he had detained the schooner "Daphne," of Melbourne, John C. Daggett, master, whilst at Levuka, Ovalau, Fiji, on suspicion of her having been engaged in what would constitute a breach of the laws relating to the slave trade.

2. Captain Palmer also informed me verbally that he put a prize crew on board of her, under the command of Sub-lieutenant the Honorable Richard Bingham, and that she might shortly be expected to arrive in this port.

3. He requests me, in his letter, to cause the Queen's Proctor, or any Proctor, to enter proceedings against her in the Vice-Admiralty Court of New South Wales, on her arrival.

4. This letter has been referred to the Crown Law Officers, and I enclose two Minutes by Sir William Manning, Q.C., Attorney General, upon the same.

5. The Crown Solicitor will take proceedings accordingly

6. The "Daphne's" log and other papers have been handed over to me by Captain Palmer for the purposes of this prosecution.

Commander Palmer, H.M.S. "Rosario," to Governor the Earl of Belmore.

H.M.S. "Rosario,"
Sydney, 22 May, 1869.

My Lord,

In the absence of Commodore Lambert, I have the honor to report, for your Lordship's information, that I detained the schooner "Daphne," of Melbourne, John C. Daggett, master, while at Levuka, Ovalau, Fijis.

My reasons for so doing are as follows:—

1. She had on board 100 natives from the Banks' Group, New Hebrides, without any interpreter, and quite naked. One lad (about 18) has quite lost the use of his left leg.
2. The clearance of the "Daphne," from Brisbane, is only for the New Hebrides and not for Fiji.
3. Form I. of the Queensland Labour Act purports to be an agreement between 51 natives and an agent of the name of Ross Lewin, to go as labourers to Queensland; but these documents are all signed and witnessed by interested parties.
4. Being licensed to carry down only 58 natives to Brisbane, according to Form C, I find this vessel at Ovalau, Fiji, with 100 on board.
5. The master and supercargo state that 108 natives were brought down to Tanna, and that 8 were landed for Lewin's own station, and the remainder (100) brought on to Ovalau, having re-engaged at Tanna. This re-engagement is drawn up and signed by the same interested parties; moreover, the dates of these documents do not correspond with those of the "Daphne's" log, with the exception of the first.
6. Passenger list irregular from Brisbane, and not signed by any port officer.
7. No clearance for the Fijis, or any passenger list.
8. A native boat's crew on board, not on the ship's articles, belonging to the Loyalty Islands; they have at some period or other been taken from under the French flag. These men were placed on board the "Daphne," by Lewin, who appears to supply boats' crews for the purpose of kidnapping; I have clear evidence to this effect while amongst the New Hebrides.

Taking all these circumstances into consideration, I landed these unfortunate people at Levuka, each of them receiving a fathom of cloth and a good meal. I requested Mr. Thurston, the Acting British Consul, to take charge of them until he received further instructions from your Excellency.

I then detained the "Daphne," and placed an officer and crew on board her, with orders to proceed to Sydney, on the ground of grave suspicion that the schooner, master, supercargo, and crew, have been engaged either in actual slavery, or at least in a most irregular traffic tending to promote and encourage the slave trade, in violation of the Acts 5 Geo. IV., c. 113, and 6 & 7 Vic., c. 98.

I have therefore the honor to request that on the arrival of the "Daphne" in this port you will cause the Queen's proctor, or any other proctor, to enter proceedings against her in the Vice-Admiralty Court of New South Wales.

I may add, that although this vessel appears to be licensed by the Queensland Government Agents to provide labourers, she is fitted up precisely the same as an African slaver, with the exception of leg-irons. I found muskets and ammunition on board; and the supercargo, Mr. Pritchard, had a revolver, loaded and capped.

The "Daphne's" log, together with her papers, are at present in my possession.

Re Alleged Slave-trading in schooner "Daphne."

If this vessel is liable to condemnation for slaving, the master and crew must also be liable to be prosecuted criminally. The master's offence would be piracy and felony under section 9 of 5 Geo. IV, c. 113; and the crew would be chargeable with misdemeanor under section 11.

I do not see that there can be any doubt of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of this Colony over such offences by virtue of section 4 of the Constitution Act, 9 Geo. IV, c. 83.

I think therefore, that on the arrival of the "Daphne," the master and crew should be proceeded against for felony and misdemeanor, respectively. For this purpose the evidence of Captain Palmer or one of his officers would be required in the first instance, at the Police Office, and perhaps, if the Justices should think fit to commit the accused, some of them may become disposed to save themselves by the avowal of the truth as to the mode in which the islanders were got on board, &c., &c., and to give evidence for the Crown.

It will be advisable that the Crown Solicitor should attend at the Police Office, assisted by a competent Barrister, who should previously have been instructed to prepare himself fully.

Re Schooner "Daphne."

THERE can be no doubt of the duty of the Crown Law Officers of this Colony to act upon the instructions they have received for prosecuting this vessel to condemnation, unless they saw clearly that the facts demanded advice on their part to the contrary.

In my opinion, the facts are not such in this case. On the contrary, I think that the statements contained in the letter of Captain Palmer show abundant grounds for the course taken by him as Commander of H.M.S. "Rosario," and amply suffice for requiring a submission of the case to investigation by the Court of Vice Admiralty.

Whether the charge that the vessel was engaged in slaving will be capable of substantiation in the Court, is by no means so clear; and the proof that the islanders found on board of her were being conveyed and were confined "as and in order to their being dealt with as slaves," will be matter of much difficulty, both legal and practical—the former, because of the partial legalization of the traffic by the Queensland law, and by the license held at the time for this ship; and because of the evidence that may be anticipated as to the non-slave character in which it was intended that the men should be employed; the latter, because of the probable legal incompetency of the islanders to give evidence on oath, and of the great advantage which the European master and crew will consequently have over them in this respect.

So far as the authorized number of fifty-eight men were concerned, the difficulty would be very great, as it would be said—perhaps irresistibly—that they were being conveyed under legal sanction to a country where the law would preclude their being "dealt with as slaves". But as the number actually carried was 108, of whom eight had already been landed at Tanna, and forty-two must have been designed for some other place not enjoying free institutions under a recognized Government, the Judge may be able to arrive at the conclusion that the fate of all beyond fifty-eight was intended to be that of slaves, notwithstanding the sworn statements that may be made to the contrary. He will not, however, have the same facilities as have usually been afforded in respect of the African slave-trade, because the trade is not, as in that case, undisguised in its character, and known to be carried on in connection with countries in which slavery was a recognized institution.

The Crown Solicitor will be at once instructed to commence proceedings in the Vice-Admiralty Court of this port, as soon as the "Daphne" shall have arrived.

I have the honor to enclose a Memorial addressed to me by planters and others at Fiji, interested on the subject of the Polynesian labourers imported to those islands.

2. This memorial has been conveyed to me by Commander Palmer, R.N., who has lately returned from the islands with Her Majesty's ship "Rosario." The memorialists request me to send a copy of it to your Lordship, accompanied with such remarks as I may see fit to make. I send the original document, with the signatures attached.

3. Very considerable difference of opinion exists here with regard to this question. As far as the condition of the labourers who have been imported into the Fiji Islands is concerned, I must refer your Lordship to Mr. Acting Consul Thurston's letter, a copy of which formed an enclosure (No. 1) to my Despatch, No. 27, of date 26th February, 1869. I have no reason to doubt the correctness of Mr. Thurston's views.

4. As to the method by which labourers are procured, I have had cause to think that the law was too often either evaded or set at defiance; I therefore requested Captain Palmer to furnish me with such general information as he might consider likely to be of value to me in reporting on the subject. Here-
with I enclose his reply.*

5. My correspondence by this and former mails about the alleged murders on board the "Young Australian," and the detention of the schooner "Daphne," suspected of being engaged in a breach of the laws relating to the slave trade, will I think have shown your Lordship that there is a *prima facie* case for an inquiry into this matter.

6. I would suggest that such an inquiry could best be made by a Commissioner possessing a competent knowledge of the law, and totally unconnected either with the Australian Colonies or with the islands in the Pacific Ocean.

7. I think that something of this sort is called for both in the interest of the natives of the islands, and of the planters, who desire to deal fairly with their native labourers; and also with regard to the honor of the British Empire.

With reference to former correspondence on the subject of the murders on board the "Young Australian," I beg to enclose two further papers which I have received from Commander Palmer, R.N., who has lately returned from Fiji, together with a Memorandum by the Attorney General thereon.

2. Hovell and Rangī have been tried before the Supreme Court and found guilty of wilful murder, with a strong recommendation to mercy. They have been sentenced to death, but the sentence has been respited until certain points of law reserved by the Judge at the request of the prisoner's counsel have been argued before the Supreme Court.

3. The most material points were, whether two witnesses natives of Rotumah were in law competent to be sworn, and whether the cause of the death of the natives was proved.

4. The Judge has made his report to me, and the case has been considered in Council to-day, in accordance with the tenor of my instructions, and further consideration of it postponed until after the Supreme Court has decided the points reserved.

5. I may add that the Judge stated, in reply to questions put to him when in attendance before the Executive Council to-day, that he considered Rangī to be the most guilty of the two, and that he thought that Hovell lost his head and did not know what he was doing. In his report he states "the prisoner Hovell seems not to have taken any part in the matter further than exclaiming, when he heard the firing, 'My God! what is that?' and that he afterwards called out 'Don't shoot them—try and pacify them—not to shoot to kill them—that they must be shot—not to shoot but wound them.' After these expressions the natives were shot and their dead bodies thrown overboard."

6. I enclose a copy of the evidence, extracted from the *Sydney Morning Herald*. The Judge told me that the alleged tomahawking of one native is doubtful.

My Lord,

I have the honor to enclose for your information a statement made by a Rotumah native called Mummy, late one of the crew of the "Young Australian," and a witness to the murder of the natives on board her. It was made in the presence of the Rev. Mr. Neilson, of Tanna, Thomas Davis, a European resident at Port Resolution, and myself, and interpreted by Joel, another Rotumah man, who spoke English:—

"Was on board the 'Young Australian,' Hovell master, as one of the crew, in October, 1868; three men were brought on board from Api Island (?), New Hebrides, in a boat—only two wished to come, the other jumped overboard and swam away; boat pulled after him, and Sam (another Rotumah man) took a boat-hook and hooked the swimming man in the face, making a hole through his cheek; they got him into the boat and flung him down on his back; the second mate, Robert Lennie, a Frenchman called Bob, was in charge of the boat, and ordered all this to be done; the three men were then taken on board the 'Young Australian,' the master giving them some cloth and mats—they were then sent down into the hold; there were natives already in the hold from Vate, Tanna, and Rotumah, but none of these would allow these three men to come to their part of the hold; the wounded man demanded to be put on shore, and tried to get on deck, but he was flung back again; he tried again to get up, but was again flung back; a general fight then took place in the hold, and arrows were shot about indiscriminately at both white men and natives, and David (another Rotumah man) was wounded; heard Hovell call out to make them fast when they came on deck; the second mate Bob came aft and said—'Take guns and shoot them'; Levinger said—'Don't shoot, but make them fast'; they dare not go down into the hold to make them fast, so Levinger then say—'Shoot them in the legs but don't kill them'; the three white men (Bob, Louis, and Antonie, all Frenchmen) had muskets, so had Jemmy, Rangī, and myself; a light was shown into the hold by means of a stick and cotton; and the three Api men were shot, dragged on deck, and thrown overboard—only two were dead, one was still alive when thrown overboard; never heard Hovell speak except say make them fast; the bodies were thrown overboard by the three Frenchmen; the vessel was at anchor at the time."

George Gerrish, of Lovuka, Ovalau, Fiji, do hereby solemnly declare and affirm that the undermentioned statement was made before me, by Robert Lennies, late second mate of the schooner "Young Australian," Albert Ross Hovell, master, of Sydney, New South Wales; and hoping that this might be beneficial to him, the said Albert Ross Hovell, now under committal on the charge of murder on the high seas, respectfully pray that it may be taken into consideration.

Robert Lennies' statement:—About the middle of November, 1868, I brought from the island of Manno or Pama (one of the New Hebrides) three men, who said that they were willing to proceed to the Fijis for the purpose of working there for an unnamed term; they were received on board by Capt. Hovell and the supercargo Levenger, who gave them a fathom or cloth each and pipes and tobacco; they then proceeded to the lower deck, and whilst eating, some Tanna men commenced quarrelling with them; I, Robert Lennies, then left the vessel, with two boats belonging to the vessel, for the purpose of bringing more men, but none were willing to go to Fiji; I returned before I reached the vessel; Captain Hovell made signs to me to bring the boat on her starboard quarter, because the Tanna and Pama men were fighting; upon reaching the deck I saw the three men I brought on board standing in the main hatchway, armed with bows and arrows, firing at the Tanna men: they (the Pama men) also had in their possession an iron bar and a tomahawk; Captain Hovell then ordered the Tanna men to desist, and clear from the main deck, to allow the Pama men to go on shore again; Captain Hovell then took some green leaves (which is a sign of friendship) in his hand, and proceeded to the mainmast for the purpose of quieting the men, but they received him with a volley of arrows, one of which would certainly have killed him had it not been for the fore-brace, which it struck whilst on its errand of destruction; at the same time one of the crew (a Rotumah man) whilst coming aft received an arrow in his left breast; one of the Erroumango men seeing this took hold of a rifle which was lying on the quarter and jumped to the main deck for the purpose of shooting or otherwise the men of Pama; he received an arrow in his head and another in his right arm; they were then seemingly quiet for about half an hour; Captain Hovell in the meantime trying his best to quiet all disturbance, but not daring to go near the hatchway for fear of the arrows; a Rotumah boy then told one of the crew (Louis, a Frenchman) that the Pama men were piling cocoa-nut husks against the main hatchway for the purpose of firing the ship; whilst this was being said Louis received an arrow in his foot; Captain Hovell, after trying his utmost to keep the Pama natives quiet, without avail, gave orders to cripple them by shooting at their legs; it was now about half-past 6 p.m., and perfectly dark, except by the blaze caused by the cocoa-nut husks, which were now blazing fiercely. The captain's orders were obeyed, and one was shot through the fore-hatch, and two through the after bulk-head; they were in one corner, therefore we could not see whether we had killed them or not; but shortly after we proceeded and found that two were dead and one mortally wounded, but receiving a blow from a Tanna man with a tomahawk, death was instantaneous; we then tied some heavy stones around their legs and threw them overboard. The next day we sailed for Santo, the whole of the arrows were poisoned, and three of the crew barely escaped with their lives. One of the crew (Louis the Frenchman) distinctly heard, and so did others, the captain tell the first mate, M'Masters, to make an entry in the log respecting this affair.

This document is an imitation of Acting Consul Thurston's handwriting. It is handed to Captain Palmer, but the Acting Consul in no way supports the statement contained within. Lennie is a murderer at large, and his statement worthless.

Mr. Spring Rice to The Under Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Sir,

With reference to your letter of the 29th ultimo, I am directed by the Earl of Clarendon to request that you will state to Earl Granville that His Lordship anticipates that Lord Granville will concur with him in the opinion that the state of things exhibited in the correspondence of which you enclose copies is very serious, and all the more so from the extreme difficulty of dealing with it; and Lord Clarendon considers that an intolerable responsibility will be thrown upon Her Majesty's Government if the present state of things, as regards the introduction of immigrants into the Fiji Islands, is allowed to continue.

If no means can be found for exercising an efficient control over the operations connected with the immigration, and if evils so flagrant as those which occurred in the case of the "Young Australian" cannot be checked by other means, Lord Clarendon apprehends that legislation must be resorted to next year.

In the meanwhile, Lord Clarendon considers it of the utmost importance that Her Majesty's Government should be in possession of full and accurate information on the whole subject; and with this object, His Lordship proposes, with Lord Granville's concurrence, to address to Mr. March, Her Majesty's Consul in the Fiji Islands, the instructions of which copy is enclosed.

I am at the same time to enclose, for Lord Granville's information, copy of a circular which Lord Clarendon has lately addressed to Her Majesty's Consuls in the Pacific, with a view to direct their attention to the general question regarding the operations being carried on in the South Sea Islands; and in suggesting that it may be desirable to communicate that Despatch to the Australian Government, I am to request that you will call Lord Granville's attention to the statement contained in Lord Belmore's Despatch to Mr. Thurston of the 28th of April, to the effect that he is in possession of no instructions and has received no authority from Her Majesty's Government to take any steps in this matter.

Allusion has been made to a law existing in the Colony as regards Polynesian labour; and if the Colonial Department are in possession of a copy, Lord Clarendon would be glad if it could be communicated to this department.

Sir,

The Secretary of State for the Colonies has communicated to me copies of the Despatches which Mr. Acting Consul Thurston addressed to the Earl of Belmore, on the 3rd of February and 30th March last. I have, however, received no Despatches direct from Mr. Thurston of so recent a date as the last of these, and I am therefore left to gather from these Despatches the anomalous state of things with which you will have to deal on your arrival at your post.

In my Despatch No. 4, of the 10th of May, I explained to you the circumstances under which I have been precluded from taking steps to extend your jurisdiction over British subjects in the Fiji Islands. But it seems from Mr. Thurston's Despatches that, in the absence of such powers legally conferred, necessity and convenience have practically secured to him a certain extent of jurisdiction, more or less recognized by the resident community—which may probably be extended to you.

The

The mode in which the influence thus acquired has been exercised, as regards immigration into the islands, and with respect to the position of the immigrants, is a very serious matter. Indeed, there can be little doubt, from the facts stated by Mr. Thurston, that a slave trade with the South Sea Islands is gradually being established by British speculators for the benefit of British settlers, and that the traffic has had the indirect sanction of the British Consul in the Fiji Islands, the only British authority on the spot who appears to have intervened, and hitherto with success, to prevent the gross abuses of which the traffic is capable; but already reports of entry are evaded, fictitious sales of vessels are made, kidnapping is audaciously practised, and it is under these circumstances that Mr. Thurston reports that there are indications that the control he has hitherto exercised will be opposed in some quarters; and it is manifest that the protection which he has extended to the immigrants, and which cannot be enforced, will soon be openly defied. The responsibility which has up to this time attached to Her Majesty's Consulate, in regard to this question, and which becomes the more grave in view of deplorable occurrences such as those which occurred in the case of the vessel "Young Australian," must eventually rest with Her Majesty's Government; and it is therefore necessary that they should receive accurate information on the subject, in order to enable them to decide as to the course which it may be expedient to follow in dealing with the matter.

You will therefore lose no time in reporting to me fully upon the whole subject, explaining by whom and from what quarters the immigrants are procured, the nature of the contracts of engagement, the guarantees given by the settlers for the due performance of the contracts, the employment for which the labourers are engaged, the means possessed by Her Majesty's Consulate for ascertaining how they are treated, and specially whether you can rely upon having an interpreter through whom you can communicate with the labourers, the facilities for reconveying them to their homes at the expiration of their engagements, the character of the vessels and commanders engaged in the traffic, and whether there is overcrowding in the vessels, and a proper supply of provisions; and the price paid per head for each immigrant.

If the introduction of immigrants is, as it would appear, conducted on an increasing scale, it is to be presumed that a demand must exist resulting from a corresponding increase in the number of the European settlers and in the development of their operations. You will therefore furnish me with particulars as to the nationality and general character of the settlers, the amount of land held by them, and as to the probability of their requiring a large increase in the number of labourers, and whether these last cannot be found in the Fiji Islands without importing them from other quarters.

You will understand that the subject is one which occupies the anxious attention of Her Majesty's Government, and you will endeavour to throw upon it all the light in your power. Any suggestions you may offer, either for placing the traffic on a sound footing, or for putting an end to it altogether, will be well received by Her Majesty's Government.

I have, in conclusion, only to instruct you to convey to Mr. Thurston my approval of the steps taken by him to procure the evidence which will be required by the Australian Courts in dealing with the case of the "Young Australian," and you will bear in mind that it is your duty to avail yourself of every opportunity which may present itself for keeping the Australian Government informed of any points connected with the matter in which their influence can usefully be exercised.

Sir,

Great interest has been taken of late in this country as regards the steps reported to be in progress for obtaining from the various islands in the Pacific, immigrants to supply the labour required in adjacent quarters; and reports which can scarcely have originated without some foundation, have been current as to the hardships to which the immigrants have been exposed. The matter indeed has attracted so much public interest as to have made it necessary for some explanations on the subject to be furnished to Parliament; Her Majesty's Government therefore feel it due both to the cause of humanity and to public feeling in this country to exert any influence in their power on behalf of the immigrants, and to protect them against any evil consequences which might result either from ignorance on their own part or from the cupidity of speculators in human labour. On these grounds I have to instruct you to direct your special attention to the operations which may be undertaken to procure immigrants, and to report to me any information you can procure on the subject, explaining for what labour markets the immigrants may be destined, what contracts are entered into between the immigrants and the contractors, and what precautions are taken for their safety and comfort on the voyage.

Sir,

I have laid before Earl Granville your letter of the 3rd instant, of the subject of the abuses connected with the introduction of immigrants into the Fiji Islands.

I am directed by His Lordship to express his concurrence in the Despatch which Lord Clarendon proposes to address to Mr. March, Her Majesty's Consul at Fiji; and I am to state that a copy of the Despatch of 31st July to Her Majesty's Consuls will be communicated to the Governors of New South Wales, Victoria, and Queensland.

At the same time, I am to request that you will call Lord Clarendon's attention to the circular instruction addressed by Lord Stanley to the Consuls on the 8th July, 1868, a copy of which was enclosed in the letter from the Foreign Office of that date; and I am to inquire whether any answer has been received to it, as none has been communicated to this department.

I am to enclose a copy of the Act of the Queensland Legislature, which Lord Granville presumes is the Act referred to in your letter; and I am to state that Her Majesty's decision upon this Act, which is, however, in operation, has not been taken pending the receipt of the answers to Lord Stanley's circular.

With reference to that part of your letter in which Lord Granville's attention is called to the statement of Lord Belmore that he had received no authority to take any steps in the matter of these outrages, I am to observe that Lord Belmore's letter to Mr. Thurston was written in April, before there had been time to instruct him as to the case of the "Young Australian," but that no failure of justice has arisen from this fact, as legal proceedings were at once taken at Sydney by the proper authorities, under the Act of 9 Geo. IV., cap. 83, and as appears from a subsequent Despatch, of which a copy is annexed, the prisoners were tried and found guilty of murder.

Lord Granville has, however, by no means lost sight of this important question, and Despatches were sent by the mail of the 13th instant to the Governors of New South Wales and Victoria, directing them to use every possible endeavour for the repression of these atrocities.

Lord Clarendon will also perceive that it is Lord Granville's intention to submit all the correspondence and papers upon this subject to the Law Officers of the Crown, with a view of ascertaining what check can be placed by Imperial legislation or otherwise upon these scandalous proceedings; and I am to add, that the correspondence which has passed upon this subject will be laid before Parliament, in continuation of the previous paper of July, 1868.

I am desired to enclose copies of two Despatches which were received from Lord Belmore upon this subject by the last mail.

Lord Clarendon will observe that in the Despatch No. 80, of 27th May, Lord Belmore suggests that a Commissioner should be sent out to inquire into these cases of alleged slave-trading. Lord Granville will be glad to be made acquainted with Lord Clarendon's views upon this suggestion.

The humble Petition of the undersigned Residents of the proposed new Electorate of Ryde,—

SHOWETH AS FOLLOWS:—

Your Petitioners are residents of a district containing from 900 to 1,000 electors having distinct local interests, which it is desirable they should have the power to represent in your Honorable House. At present, however, they are unable to do this, because the district is split in two by the boundary between the Electorate of St. Leonards and Central Cumberland.

About 600 of the electors of this proposed Electoral District are at present included within the Electorate of St. Leonards, with which your Petitioners have few interests in common. The remainder of the electors of this proposed District, numbering about 300, are included within the Electorate of Central Cumberland.

The said Electorate of St. Leonards contains the very large number of 1,986 electors, of whom those of your Petitioners who reside within it form only one-third, which effectually precludes your Petitioners from the exercise of their legitimate influence in your Honorable House, through the Member for St. Leonards.

The said Electorate of Central Cumberland contains the still larger number of 2,200 electors, of whom the electors resident within the proposed new District form only one-seventh; and as the inhabitants of Central Cumberland generally are not at all interested in the local wants of your Petitioners, this has the effect of utterly ignoring the voice of your Petitioners in the Parliament of the country, through the Member for Central Cumberland.

The new Electorate proposed by your Petitioners touches at one part the Electorate of Parramatta, which, although it has only 1,282 electors, returns two Members to Parliament.

Wherefore your Petitioners humbly pray,—That whereas your Honorable House is short (since the separation of Queensland) by eight Members of the number of Representatives required by the Constitution Act to complete the Legislative Assembly, your Honorable House will take the premises into consideration, and erect into the new Electorate of Ryde the District in which your Petitioners reside, embracing the Parish of Hunter's Hill and the eastern portion of the Parish of the Field of Mars, being a portion of the County of Cumberland; and bounded on the south-west by the Parramatta River, from Onion's Point to the boundary of the Town of Parramatta, at the Protestant Orphan School; and on the west by the boundary of the said Town of Parramatta to the Pennant Hills and Colo Road; thence by that road north-easterly and north, to the boundary-line of the Field of Mars, and by that line in an easterly direction to the head of the Lane Cove River, and by that river to Onion's Point, on the Parramatta River aforesaid,—and give to such new Electorate (comprising 900 to 1,000 electors) the power to return one Member to your Honorable House.

The Memorial of the undersigned Inhabitants of the Police District of Broulee,—

HUMBLY SHOWETH :—

That by the Electoral Act of 1858 the Police District of Broulee, having an Agricultural and Mining population, was incorporated with the Police District of Eden, where the pursuits are chiefly pastoral, to form the Electoral District of Eden, which extends for 150 miles along the seaboard of the Colony, and contains a population of about 8,000 persons of whom some 1,700 are on the Electoral Roll.

That nearly half the Electors are in this Police District, and taking into consideration the enormous extent of the Electoral District as now formed, the number and diversity of the interests of its population, your Memorialists have good reason to complain of the inadequacy of their Parliamentary representation.

And your Memorialists therefore pray, that your Honorable House will take the premises into consideration, and form the District of Broulee into a new Electorate to be called the Electoral District of Moruya and entitled to return one representative.

And your Memorialists, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

John Hackett appears, on summons, charged with neglecting to keep clean premises in William-street, 16th March.

Defendant pleads not guilty.

Richard Seymour, on oath, states:—I am Inspector of Nuisances for this City; I know the defendant's premises in William-street in this City; he carries on the business of a butcher; between 12 and 1 o'clock on the afternoon of the 16th of this month I inspected the premises, and found the premises very dirty; and on a dung-heap I saw what appeared to be hair off a pig, covered with maggots, and the dung-heap the same, and a quantity of liver and lights hanging about in a stinking state; there was a most offensive smell from the premises, caused by the filthy state the premises were in; Dr. Dansey was with me, he having accompanied me at my request, owing to my observation of the place on the Monday previous; there have been numerous complaints made by the neighbours of the nuisance arising from the stench emitted from defendant's premises.

Cross-examined by Mr. Gannon:—The dung-heap must have contained decayed animal matter to account for the quantity of maggots about it, but I did not see any; I showed defendant that the whole yard and shed, where he keeps his horse, was very dirty; it was not a very large dung-heap.

George Frederick Dansey, on oath, states:—I am the Acting City Health Officer of this City; on 16th of this month I accompanied last witness in his inspection of the defendant's premises in William-street; I found the yard in a very dirty state; there was a dung-heap covered with maggots; the heap was alive with maggots, and an offensive smell; there were sheep's head and entrails, and meat, and bones hanging about; they did not appear to be fresh, and were exposed to the sun; the premises were not clean, and a most offensive smell came from the dung-heap.

Cross-examined by Mr. Gannon:—There was a bad smell from the bones defendant said were put there that morning and would go away in the evening; I did not ascertain what the dung-heap was composed of.

James Butler, on oath, states:—I am an Alderman of this City; I reside in William-street; on the 16th of this month, between 2 and 3 in the afternoon, I accompanied Alderman Oatley to defendant's premises, and defendant took us round the yard; I found no offensive smell there; the livers on the fence were sweet, and I thought the yard was kept very clean for a butcher's; I did not notice any bones; I noticed the stable, but found no offensive smell about the premises.

Cross-examined by Mr. Driver:—I noticed the dung-heap, but did not see any maggots and could not say it was not crawling alive; I could not say there were no bones in the stable; there are several other butchers' shops besides defendant's in William-street.

By Mr. Gannon:—Defendant called our attention to the dung-heap, and I told him I found nothing offensive in it.

Cross-examined by Mr. Driver :—There were cows' tails' hair, some black hair, and some maggots in the dung-heap ; I was there five days ; the rubbish used to be thrown on the dung-heap ; the bones in the stable on Tuesday were fresh bones that day.

David Mahoney, on oath, states :—I am employed by defendant ; last Tuesday the premises were not interfered with from the time Inspector Seymour was there till after Aldermen Butler and Oatley were there, except that I put more bones there ; the bones in the stable were put there, a few on Monday night and the remainder on Tuesday morning ; the liver and lights were fresh—they came the previous evening ; the dung came from the stable, and was taken away on Tuesday evening ; the premises did not smell offensively that afternoon at all.

Cross-examined by Mr. Driver :—I have been only about a fortnight in defendant's employ ; I did not see the dung taken away ; I do not know whether hair or blood was thrown on the heap, but I did not put anything but dung in it ; there were no bones in the yard ; if there was a sheep's head in the yard it was a fresh one, and not an old decayed one.

Collins*; on that occasion, Mr. Rodd, the present defendant, was sworn in the usual manner, and signed the depositions.

John Collins, on oath, states :—I live with my father at Dochra, about 4 miles from Mr. Rodd; I was summoned by Mr. Rodd on 3rd December for trespassing on his land; I see a sketch of the paddock, and I was on a place marked as a road when I was called back and subsequently fined for trespassing; at the trial I saw Mr. Rodd sworn; if Mr. Rodd swore to the words referred to in the information, he swore false; this paddock is not enclosed altogether—there is an opening on the north and south side; there is an opening between the fences on the north and south side, which are the openings in question; on the north side the opening is about 10 rods, and on the south side the opening is about 20 yards; persons can ride on both sides of the paddock without riding over or through any fence; the fence does not go across the creek, neither on the north or the south; I have known this paddock about two years; during these two years I often have seen the south side and there never was any fence there, but I have not so frequently seen the north side; I saw the south side on 3rd day of December last, the day on which Mr. Rodd gave his evidence, and on that day there was an opening of about 20 yards; the day after I was fined I went to see the north side and found about twenty panels out; I could ride in and out, and on the south side I could ride in and out; on the north side I could swim through the water; I was alone when I examined the north and south side; since I saw the openings on the north and south side, some boughs have been placed on the south side—a sort of saplings, some loose in the water, some lying on the bank—but this was not done till a few days after the trial.

Cross-examined by Mr. Mullen, Attorney for defendant:—The land is enclosed all but the two openings; I searched and could not find any more; I see the creek in the sketch on the south side, and the two marks at the opening of the creek on the south side; it is deep; about 12 feet on the west side of the creek the fence came to the water, and on the east side it did not come within three or four panels of the water; there was a declivity there 3 or 4 feet, of a flat to the water; there was a depth 2 feet deep of water at this time, and no fence inside that; I never went through this way; I noticed this as particularly as any other panel or fence on the road; on the north side there is about 10 rods of an opening, and 6 feet wide in some places of water and 6 or 8 feet of water in it; it is not a place of traffic through here; the sketch I see is drawn correctly; the creek runs nearly straight with the fence as it appears on the sketch; on the west side there is about 4 feet without fence or water.

Examined by Mr. Chambers, Attorney:—On the north side there are only boughs—no fence at all; I mean by so many panels being down that so many panels were wanting; I never knew any were up.

William Collins, on oath, states:—I have resided at Dochra sixteen years; I know the paddock in which my son was charged with trespassing, and before it was a paddock I have known the land twenty years; I know the creek that goes through it; a fence is not across the creek; there is no fence at all—I mean on the south side; there is no fence for about 20 yards; on the north side, where the creek goes through, there is not any fence for about 60 yards, more or less, and if defendant has sworn that the fence goes right across the creek he has sworn falsely; and if he has sworn according to the words in the Information he has sworn falsely; I remember my son being fined on the 3rd of December last; on that day I saw these fences; the very day my son was fined there were no fences across the creek at that time, and persons could ride or walk through on either side without going through a fence; I also saw these places again on 16th December last, and found something had been done on the south side; some branches and saplings placed at the opening on the south side, and nothing whatever, that I could perceive, was done on the other side; I gave evidence on the 3rd December, at the trial.

Cross-examined by Mr. Mullen:—The fence comes down to the creek on the west bank and to the east bank; to the first post it is about 20 yards; I don't know whether it is 100 yards to the water; I don't know the question; I should say it is from 15 to 20 feet perpendicularly taken from the top of the bank to the water; on the north side the width of the creek is about 6 yards; gum bushes are placed in east bank of the northern opening; I was partly the instigation of my son laying this Information against Mr. Rodd; neither Mr. Rodd or his son ever refused me permission going through this paddock.

By Mr. Chambers:—On the north side the bushes were there before the trial, but not on the south side; there is no panelling or fencing where the bushes are.

James Collins, on oath, states:—I know Tom Smith; I remember my brother being fined for trespassing in Mr. Rodd's paddock; I went and examined the paddock on 2nd December; my brother had then received the summons; I found an opening in the line of fence of five or six panels on the south side where the creek went through; there was no fence across the creek—not a particle; the fence was two or three panels from the water; a person could walk or ride between the fence and the water—nothing to prevent it; the width of the water was about 4 yards; I noticed an opening on the north side of between 50 and 60 yards; the water was 6 or 7 yards wide; any person could get in at one place without touching the water on the side of the bank; persons could also get in by going up the creek.

My brother was brought up and fined on 3rd December, 1867; if Mr. Rodd swore to the words used in the Information he swore what was false; when my brother was fined I took Smith to look at the places, and they were in the same state as when I saw them on the 2nd; I have not seen them since.

Cross-examined by Mr. Mullen:—I recognize the land as shown in the sketch.

Alexander M'Gregor, on oath, states:—I have been living in Mr. Collins's neighbourhood; I know the fences round Mr. Rodd's paddock; I know where a creek enters on the road in the paddock, and where it goes out the other side; I was working there in November last; at that time there were 16 yards of a fence; from the creek to the bank persons could ride in and out; persons could ride up the creek in a certain way; on the north side there was an opening of about fifteen panels; the fence does not go right across the creek; on December 12th I saw the creek on the south side; I did not notice anything done to it; a person could not ride in and out on Mr. Rodd's side of the road; there were some bushes there.

Cross-examined by Mr. Mullen:—I am in Mr. Loder's employment now; on the south side it is rather a deep gully; he could fence it; on the north side I could not fence it; I could not fence across the creek, but I could fence down to the water.

SIR JAMES MARTIN to HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

2 July, 1869.*Regina v. Hovell and Rangī.*

MY LORD,

Although I believe it is unusual for the counsel for the prisoners on a criminal trial to state his own individual views to the Government, for the purpose of influencing its decision upon the case of such prisoners after their conviction, I nevertheless think that I am called upon to make that of Captain Hovell and the native Rangī an exception to the general rule. I do so because I am firmly persuaded that in the conviction of those persons there has been a great miscarriage of justice. In the statements contained in the Petition, a copy of which was published in the *Sydney Morning Herald* of Monday last, I entirely concur, and I believe with their Honors the Judges that the letter of Dr. Steel published shortly before the trial must have had a very prejudicial effect upon such trial, and must consequently, as it seems to me, have deprived it of that character of dispassionate impartiality by which all criminal trials ought to be distinguished. The view taken by all the members of the Court of that publication throws so much doubt upon the propriety of the conviction that I thought it not improbable that upon that ground alone your Excellency would feel impelled to direct the prisoners to be pardoned. My object, however, in now addressing your Excellency is not to invite attention to the opinions expressed by the Judges, but to bring prominently before your Excellency a point of law, in respect to which the Supreme Court seems to me, from a misconception of fact, to have fallen into a serious error.

It is an established rule that all witnesses who are examined upon any trial—civil or criminal—must give their evidence under the sanction of an oath; and a witness in taking an oath must be understood to make a formal and solemn appeal to the Supreme Being for the truth of the evidence which he is about to give; and further, to imprecate the divine vengeance on his head if what he shall say be false. An examination upon oath implies that the witness should go through a ceremony of a particular import; but whatever its form, such ceremony must be one which the witness considers, or at all events the Court must have some fair reason to believe he considers, binding upon his conscience.

In the present case a South Sea Islander, unable to speak or understand the English language, was called as a witness, and being questioned through an interpreter, is reported by the Judge who presided at the trial to have said—"That he had been baptised—that he had been taught by a Mr. Fletcher (who was stated by the interpreter to be one of the Wesleyan Missionaries) about Jesus and about a Bible—that he calls it the Book—that he goes to chapel—that he can read the Rotumah Book—that if he told lies he would be punished—he would go to hell; that he did not know what the Book before him was [it was an English Bible]; that Fletcher had taught him what an oath was, and on the interpreter explaining to him that the Bible before him was similar to a Rotumah Bible, he answered that he believed if he kissed the book and told lies he would go to hell."

His Honor the Chief Justice, on this report of his colleague, held that the witness (who kissed the book in the usual way) was duly sworn; that is to say, that he made a formal and solemn appeal to the Supreme Being for the truth of what he was about to say, and imprecated divine vengeance on his head if what he said should be false, and did this in a form which it was evident was binding on his conscience. Mr. Justice Hargrave agreed with the Chief Justice; and Mr. Justice Cheeke, while concurring, said he had great doubt as to the propriety of such decision. It would be useless, and indeed improper, for me to urge upon your Excellency that this decision is one not warranted by the authorities; but as the opinion of the Chief Justice proceeded on what I have since ascertained to be a mistake as to an important fact, I feel myself fully justified, and even bound to call your Excellency's attention to this circumstance. The Chief Justice said, in giving his judgment, that the witness *had been taught to read the Rotumah Bible*, and on my interrupting him, and saying that, according to his colleague's report, the witness had been taught to read the *Rotumah Book*, he then said the *Rotumah Book* and the *Bible* were proved to be the same. On my then stating that *there was no such evidence, but merely the ALLEGATION of the interpreter to that effect*, he said his judgment would be the same *if the Rotumah Book contained only a translation of parts of the Bible*; but of this there was no evidence whatever. I have since been credibly informed, by a gentleman who obtained his information from the Wesleyan Book Depôt, that the Bible has not yet been translated into the Rotumah language, and that Mr. Fletcher, the Wesleyan Missionary referred to, is expected in Sydney in a few weeks, for the purpose of making arrangements for the publication of such a translation. Under these circumstances, the Court and the witness having been misinformed by the interpreter that the book before the witness was similar to a Rotumah Bible, I venture to submit to your Excellency, that however great the probability may be that the witness spoke the truth, yet he cannot be said to have *taken an oath*—the necessary and indispensable guarantee of such truthfulness—by going through the ceremony of kissing a book of which he knew nothing, and about which he had been so misinformed. If there had been in point of fact *any* book in the Rotumah language the kissing of which would have bound the conscience of the witness as a solemn act appealing to the Almighty, then perhaps it might with some little plausibility be contended that the erroneous statement of the interpreter to the witness that the Bible and such book were similar might not have been material, for the conscience of the witness (he believing the false statement) might still be bound; but the case is different where there is no Rotumah Bible in existence, and where no Rotumah book other than the Bible is proved to exist the kissing of which could be regarded as the solemn appeal which the taking an oath implies. The witness thus (as I think) improperly admitted was the only person who proved the manner in which the three men were taken on board the "Young Australian"; and it may be that the prejudice raised against the prisoners

prisoners by the circumstances thus stated led to their conviction. Although I have above assumed the probability that the witness spoke the truth, I am aware (having so learnt from the Attorney General) that your Excellency has had before you a letter from Captain Palmer, enclosing a statement made by another native, from which it appears (contrary to the testimony of the witness) that two of the three men went on board voluntarily, and that only one of them was in any way coerced.

I submit the foregoing for your Excellency's consideration, and the consideration of their Honors the Judges and your Ministers, all of whom you may perhaps think it expedient again to consult, in the hope that Hovell and Rang'i's case may be reconsidered, and that while Levinger is now at large on bail in the Colony of Victoria, these two persons may not be suffered to undergo precisely the same punishment as Pearson, who killed with his own hand an officer of justice while endeavouring lawfully to apprehend him, and in whose favour I am not aware that any mitigating circumstance has been publicly shown. I do not desire any answer to this letter, but I beg that I may be permitted to refer to it in the event of any discussion about these cases hereafter.

COMMANDER PALMER, R.N., to HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

H.M.S. "Rosario,"
Sydney, 24 May, 1869.

MY LORD,

I have the honor to enclose, for your information, a statement made by a Rotumah native called "Mummy," late one of the crew of the "Young Australian," and a witness to the murder of the natives on board her. It was made in the presence of the Rev. Mr. Neilson of Tanna, Thomas Davis a European resident at Port Resolution, and myself, and interpreted by Joel, another Rotumah man, who spoke English:—

"Was on board the 'Young Australian,' Hovell master, as one of the crew, in October, 1868. Three men were brought on board from Apii Island, New Hebrides, in a boat; only two wished to come; the other jumped overboard and swam away; boat pulled after him, and Sam (another Rotumah man) took a boat-hook and hooked the swimming man in the face, making a hole through his cheek; they got him into the boat and flung him down on his back; the second mate (Robert Lennies), a Frenchman called 'Bob,' was in charge of the boat, and ordered all this to be done; the three men were then taken on board the 'Young Australian,' the master giving them some cloth and mats; they were then sent down into the hold; there were natives already in the hold from Vaté, Tanna, and Rotumah, but none of them would allow these three men to come to their part of the hold; the wounded man demanded to be put on shore, and tried to get on deck, but he was flung back again; he tried again to get up, but was again flung back; a general fight then took place in the hold, and arrows were shot about indiscriminately at both white men and natives, and David, another Rotumah man, was wounded; heard Hovell call out to make them fast when they came on deck; the second mate 'Bob' came aft and said—'Take guns and shoot them'; Levinger say—'Don't shoot, but make them fast'; they dare not go down into the hold to make them fast, so Levinger then say—'Shoot them in the legs, but don't kill them'; the three white men (Bob, Louis, and Antonie, all Frenchmen) had muskets—so had Jemmy, Rang'i, and myself; a light was shown into the hold by means of a stick and cotton, and three Apii men were shot, dragged on deck, and thrown overboard; only two were dead—one was still alive when thrown overboard; never heard Hovell speak except say—'Make them fast'; the bodies were thrown overboard by the three Frenchmen; the vessel was at anchor at the time."

I, GEORGE Gerrish, of Levuka, Ovalau, Fiji, do hereby solemnly declare and affirm that the undermentioned statement was made before me by Robert Lennies, late second mate of the schooner "Young Australian," Albert Ross Hovell master, of Sydney, New South Wales; and hoping that this might be beneficial to him the said Albert Ross Hovell, now under committal on the charge of murder on the high seas, respectfully pray that it may be taken into consideration:—

Robert Lennies' Statement.

About the middle of November, 1868, I brought from the island of "Manno" or "Pama" (one of the New Hebrides) three men who said that they were willing to proceed to the Fijis for the purpose of working there for an unnamed term; they were received on board by Captain Hovell and the supercargo Levinger, who gave them a fathom of cloth each and pipes and tobacco; they then proceeded to the lower-deck, and whilst eating, some Tanna men commenced quarrelling with them; I, Robert Lennies, then left the vessel with two boats belonging to the vessel for the purpose of bringing more men, but none were willing to go to Fiji. I returned. Before I reached the vessel Captain Hovell made signs to me to bring the boat on her starboard quarter, because the Tanna and Pama men were fighting; upon reaching the deck, I saw the three men I brought on board standing in the main-hatchway, armed with bows and arrows, firing at the Tanna men. They—the Pama men—also had in their possession an iron bar and a tomahawk. Captain Hovell then ordered the Tanna men to desist and clear from the main deck, to allow the Pama men to go on shore again. Captain Hovell then took some green leaves (which is a sign of friendship) in his hand, and proceeded to the mainmast for the purpose of quieting the men, but they received him with a volley of arrows, one of which would certainly have killed him had it not been for the forebracc, which it struck whilst on its errand of destruction; at the same time one of the crew (a Rotumah man), whilst coming aft, received an arrow in his left breast. One of the Erromanga men, seeing this, took hold of a rifle which was lying on the quarter, and jumped to the main deck, for the purpose of shooting, or otherwise, the men of Pama; he received an arrow in his head and another in his right arm; they were then seemingly quiet for about half an hour, Captain Hovell in the meantime trying his best to quiet all disturbance, but not daring to go near the hatchway for fear of the arrows. A Rotumah boy then told one of the crew (Louis, a Frenchman) that the Pama men were piling cocoa-nut husks against the main hatchway, for the purpose of firing the ship. Whilst
this

this was being said, Louis received an arrow in his foot. Captain Hovell, after trying his utmost to keep the Pama natives quiet, without avail, gave orders to cripple them by shooting at their legs; it was now about half-past 6 p.m., and perfectly dark, except by the blaze caused by the cocoa-nut husks, which were now blazing fiercely. The captain's orders were obeyed, and one was shot through the fore-hatch and two through the after bulks-head; they were in one corner, therefore we could not see whether we had killed them or not, but shortly after we proceeded and found that two were dead and one mortally wounded, but receiving a blow from a Tanna man with a tomahawk death was instantaneous. We then tied some heavy stones around their legs and threw them overboard. The next day we sailed for Santo. The whole of the arrows were poisoned, and three of the crew barely escaped with their lives. One of the crew (Louis, the Frenchman) distinctly heard, and so did others, the captain tell the first mate, M^r Masters, to make an entry in the log respecting this affair.

This document is an imitation of Acting Consul Thurston's handwriting. It is handed to Captain Palmer, but the Acting Consul in no way supports the statement contained within. Lennie is a murderer at large, and his statement worthless.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable SOMERSET RICHARD, Earl of Belmore, Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales.

The Petition of the undersigned,—

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH :—

1. That on the 26th May last, Albert Ross Hovell, late master of the schooner "Young Australian," was with one "Rangi," a native of one of the South Sea Islands, and late one of the crew of the said schooner, found guilty of the wilful murder, on board such schooner, of a South Sea Island native whose name was unknown.

2. That the trial commenced on the 25th May; and on the conclusion of the Judge's summing up, the Jury at 7.30 p.m. on that day retired to consider their verdict, and remained in deliberation in their retiring-room until 9.5 p.m. (a period of one hour and thirty-five minutes), when the Judge had them brought into Court and asked them whether they had agreed or were likely soon to agree. They said no, and added that they were equally divided, six being for acquittal and six for conviction. They were then locked up for the night.

3. That at 9 a.m. the following morning (the 26th May) the Judge took his seat on the bench and sent in to the Jury to inquire whether they had agreed, when they said that they had not yet agreed, but were likely to agree in a few minutes.

4. That five minutes afterwards, viz., at 9.5 a.m., they came into Court; and on being again asked if they had agreed, they said they had, and that they found the prisoners guilty, with a strong recommendation to mercy.

5. That five witnesses were examined on behalf of the Crown against the prisoners, viz.,—three white persons and two South Sea Islanders—the white people being (1) the chief officer, (2) the cabin boy, and (3) the cook on board the schooner at the time of the commission of the offence, and the two natives at that time forming part of the crew.

6. That the three white persons did not know under what circumstances the three men who were killed were brought on board, but that one of the native witnesses, "Josiah," stated they were seized by boats' crews sent from the schooner, and brought on board against their will.

7. That at the time these three men came on board there were sixty or seventy other islanders, natives of the island of Tanna, on board, who it was proved without any contradiction whatever were so on board of their own freewill as passengers to Fiji, where they were afterwards taken and landed in the presence of the British Consul.

8. That all the witnesses proved that the three men after coming on board remained on deck for half an hour, eating some yams which had been given to them, and seemed, as stated by the chief officer in his evidence, "as happy as possible."

9. That pipes and tobacco were given to them, and cloth to put round their loins, and they then went below, the hatches remaining open.

10. That some time afterwards (how long did not appear) a disturbance arose between the three men and some of the Tanna men (passengers as before mentioned), which disturbance lasted an hour or more. That at length the Tanna men, who were below, rushed on deck, leaving behind them only the three men, who at once possessed themselves of some bows and about fifty arrows, which the Tanna men had taken on board, and commenced shooting these arrows indiscriminately at every one within reach of them, pushing off the hatches which had been placed over the hatchway to prevent them injuring or killing any one with the arrows.

11. That efforts were made to pacify the three men, who were thus with deadly weapons attacking every one on board, the prisoner Hovell (the captain) advancing for that purpose towards them with a green bush, when he was shot at by one of them, the arrow lodging in part of a sail close to his ear.

12. That in the course of this shooting of arrows, which lasted half an hour or more, three persons were wounded, and shots were fired by some members of the crew at the three men, without order from the captain, and in the first instance, as was proved by the chief officer, only to frighten them.

13. That it was proved by the chief officer that when the first shot was fired, the captain exclaimed—"My God! what is that?" and that he said—"Not to shoot them, but to try and pacify them—to frighten them, as by showing them firearms."

14. That the same witness also said that he afterwards heard the captain say—"Not to shoot to kill them, but they would have to be shot—not to shoot, but to wound them"; and he stated further—"When the captain said the men were to be shot, but not to kill them, several persons were standing around, and Antonio was there with a musket in his hand."

15. That these statements of the chief officer thus set forth in the preceding paragraph of this Petition are the only evidence tending to connect the captain in any way with the shooting of three men; and your Petitioners respectfully submit they are altogether insufficient, even if it was clear that the very words spoken of were used to warrant the conclusion that the captain directed the three men to be fired at.

16.

16. That no other witness speaks of any such words being used by the captain, while the cook and the cabin boy, as well as the chief officer, speak of the efforts of the captain to quell the disturbance without bloodshed, and to allow the three men to leave the vessel; and the chief officer moreover proved substantially that the men who had arms in their hands were for the moment beyond the captain's control, for he says—"I do not know whether the captain had control over the men or not; when the firing took place there was great excitement on board"; that the cabin boy says—"I heard the captain say—'Stop—not to shoot them—let them jump over the side of the vessel'"; and further—"I heard the captain say several times not to shoot them; I heard the captain stamping his foot and telling the crew not to shoot the men; there were then about eighty natives on the deck; the crew paid no attention to what the captain said"; that the cook said—"I heard the captain say—'Spare the men if you can—don't shoot them.'"

17. That the whole of the evidence shows that the disturbance which led to the loss of the three men's lives originated in no way from anything done by the captain or the crew, but arose between those men and the Tanna men; that when the three men began to use the arrows which were supposed to be poisoned, great excitement arose; and under such excitement, without the captain's orders or consent, and against his wishes, firearms were used—the persons using them being at the time beyond his control, and that his efforts were directed from first to last to preserve and not to take life.

18. That under the circumstances, your Petitioners cannot but think that there has been in this case a great miscarriage of justice, which can only be accounted for by the supposition that the Jury were biased by something which had reached their ears out of Court.

19. That in the *Sydney Morning Herald* of the 8th May, a letter was published containing statements about the captain which were calculated in the highest degree to prejudice his trial, and which, in the opinion of your Petitioners, in all probability led to the six jurors who were for returning a verdict of acquittal at the close of the trial consenting, after being locked up all night, to return a verdict of guilty in the morning.

20. That your Petitioners are warranted in entertaining this opinion by the fact that on the recent application to the Supreme Court against the writer and publishers of that letter to punish them for a contempt of Court by reason of such publication, the Chief Justice said that such publication "must have had a serious and prejudicial effect upon Hovell's case." Mr. Justice Hargrave said "that such publication must have produced a frightful effect on the administration of justice"; and "Mr. Justice Faucett said these letters were for the purpose of stirring up the mind of the public against Captain Hovell, and must have produced a serious injury to the administration of justice."

Your Petitioners, therefore, feel themselves justified and called upon as citizens interested in the pure administration of justice, most respectfully to urge upon your Excellency that the verdict against Captain Hovell and Rangī is one that ought not to be allowed to stand, as it is manifest that they have not had a fair trial, and that the evidence in no way warrants the verdict which the Jury (one-half of them evidently with great difficulty) were persuaded to return; and your Petitioners will ever pray.

HIS HONOR THE CHIEF JUSTICE to THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

SIR,

I have the honor to transmit herewith the observations of my brother Judges and myself upon the Petition and letter touching the case of the prisoners Hovell and Rangī—upon which our opinion was requested by His Excellency.

In reference to the first paragraph in Mr. Justice Hargrave's observations, I think it necessary to repeat what I have said in the sixth paragraph of my own Report, namely, that my cited words have been mistaken, and are therefore wrongly quoted by His Honor.

I do not believe, in point of fact, that Dr. Steel's publication really had any influence on the verdict. I say this on the faith of information furnished to me by Mr. Justice Cheeke since my paper was written. I never said that the men had not a fair trial, or anything to that effect.

THE QUEEN v. HOVELL AND RANGI.

1. With respect to the legal point raised by Sir James Martin, I observe that he does not expect any opinion—and I should be much astonished if he did—as to the correctness of the decision by the Court; but he suggests that a serious (and as he conceives a fatal) mistake existed on a matter of fact, which would, in his judgment, invalidate that decision. I have personally no objection, therefore, at Lord Belmore's request (although wholly disapproving of appeals by counsel to the Executive on cases in which they have professionally been engaged), to report on the question thus raised.

2. Of this alleged fact—the non-existence of any Rotuma Bible—I am judicially and individually ignorant. It may be that no portion of the Holy Scriptures has been actually printed in that language, and yet that there is in manuscript, readable by the natives, or by and from which they are instructed by the missionaries, a translation in the Rotuma tongue, of the Gospels of the New Testament, upon which alone Christians in our Courts need be sworn. I never said that any portions or portion of the Bible would be equivalent, but that an oath on the *Gospels* was sufficient, to the exclusion of other portions. Here, however, the witness was sworn on the entire Bible, in its English translation; so that the only question was, how far (if at all) his conscience could be deemed bound by that form of oath, under the circumstances; and whether he manifested such a degree of intelligence as to be able to comprehend its import, and that there is another world in which falsehood is known and punishable by an Almighty Being. Lastly—whether he did, in fact, comprehend and believe those truths, and accepted the form administered as binding on him, knowing that this Being was thereby appealed to.

3. It may be conceded that all inquiries of this nature are—but of necessity—very unsatisfactory, in the case of ignorant and uneducated persons, and of children, however intelligent for their age. The very mode of eliciting their opinions or belief is objectionable; for until we feel satisfied that they really possess the requisite belief, of what value are the answers; and what knowledge can we ever have that they do not falsely profess a belief which they do not entertain? In the majority of cases, an illiterate witness or a child would hopelessly attempt to explain what he meant by an Almighty or Omniscient Being, or by another state of existence after death—still less what heaven was, or hell. The presiding Judge must, therefore, be content with general questions reasonably answered; and the examinant ought to be admitted, if the Judge be persuaded not unreasonably that he does believe in a future world, and attests the Supreme Ruler in a binding form of adjuration. An oath on the Gospels, or in the case of a Jew on the Pentateuch, is necessary only where the witness has not religiously adopted another mode of swearing.

4. Now here the witness said, truly or falsely, that there was a Rotuma Bible; that he had been taught about Jesus, and a Bible which he called the Book, and that he could read the Rotuma Book. Then he declared that if he told lies he would go to hell. It is true that he did not know what the book lying before him was; but he believed (it matters not on what assurance) that it was *the Book*—the same, in another language, as the Rotuma Book or Bible, and that if he kissed it and told lies he would go to hell. Such, in substance, was his statement; and I cannot see how, such being the man's declared belief, the oath could or can be held less binding by proving that in fact there was no printed or no complete Bible in his language, as is alleged by Sir James Martin.

5. If this witness's testimony was improperly received, I cannot doubt that the prisoners ought to be pardoned; for although there would still remain sufficient evidence of the killing, and that it was under circumstances which made Hovell equally with Rangī responsible for the act, yet the verdict cannot but be supposed to have been materially influenced by the particular facts supplied by this witness. It would be impossible to say that there might not have been—in the absence of that testimony—a verdict of acquittal, on the ground of a killing in self-defence; the attack commenced by the slaughtered men being regarded as wholly unjustifiable, if not wanton and without provocation. With the evidence uneliminated a case of imprisonment was established, from which they were entitled—and not improbably were endeavouring—to effect their liberation. So, at least, the case presents itself to my mind. But my colleague, Mr. Justice Cheeke, who tried it, will be better able on this point to form a correct opinion.

6. There are only two matters, in the Petition adverted to by Sir James Martin, and dwelt on in his letter, which appear to call for notice. One is, the suggestion that the Jury were probably prejudiced against the prisoner Hovell, by a publication of the Rev. Dr. Steel, in the *Sydney Herald*, and thereby were influenced in their verdict; and the other is, that in fact that verdict was on the merits wrong. On the first of these points I have already elsewhere expressed my opinion that the publication alluded to was calculated to induce (not that it did really induce, for as to that I know nothing) a very prejudicial effect on Hovell's case. This, however, not by in any manner referring to the case itself, but by reporting and commenting on acts of his connected with trading, and "recruiting" for native labourers in the islands, on other occasions. On the second point—the suggestion that the Jury were prejudiced, in point of fact, and thus, or by some misapprehension, betrayed into the returning of an erroneous verdict—it becomes me to speak with caution on the evidence as reported by the presiding Judge. I entertain no doubt that a barbarous murder was committed; and it is difficult to understand that the master could not have taken more energetic steps for preventing it, if he really was not an assenting party. On the other hand, it does not seem clear that he knew of the men having been forcibly brought on board, or that they were not then engaged in an unjustifiable and indiscriminate attack on his own people and the other natives. I cannot say that the case is altogether free from doubt; but the Jury had this very point laid before them, I understand, and strongly dwelt on, as well as the conflicting evidence on the question of Hovell's share in the transaction; and they, after full consideration, believed the witnesses, who, if not directly (yet from their narration of the circumstances), fastened the guilt of complicity upon him.

7. I have read the statement made before Captain Palmer, of H.M.S. "Rosario," and transmitted by him to Lord Belmore. It tends to relieve Hovell from the charge of actual participation in the fring; his only order being to make the men fast. And it is (as noticed by Sir James Martin), opposed to the account given at the trial of the capture of the three unfortunate natives. Two are said by this informant to have come voluntarily, and one is declared to have been wounded brutally in the cheek—a circumstance not mentioned by the witness who described the capture. I need hardly add, that Mr. Justice Cheeke—who heard all the sworn testimony—is in a far better position than any other Judge can be, to form a reliable judgment on the facts of this unhappy case; and that if (reading the statement so transmitted) His Honor, or the Governor in Council, shall be led by it to distrust the evidence which it tends to impeach, or shall on any other ground, upon fuller reflection, feel dissatisfied with the conclusion arrived at by the Jury, the prisoner Hovell ought to be released. A very grave question will then arise, as to the disposal of Rangī, the principal in the deed. On that question it is not my province to offer here any observation.

Q. v. HOVELL AND RANGI.

I have carefully perused the accompanying Report of His Honor the Chief Justice, and concur most entirely therewith, more especially with reference to the law and practice as to receiving oaths in judicial proceedings. I will merely add two observations, viz. :—First, that the vast number of signatures to this Petition of respectable Sydney residents, embodying in its terms the words used by the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Faucett, and myself, as to these two prisoners not having had a fair trial, is a very strong reason for granting the prayer of the Petition. And secondly (upon the evidence as reported to the full Court by Mr. Justice Cheeke), I should have felt quite satisfied, judicially, with a verdict of acquittal; for although the Jury were perfectly justified in returning the verdict of guilty, yet the evidence in the case, followed by the strong recommendation to mercy, has left a strong impression on my mind that the evidence, upon the whole, was not inconsistent with "justifiable homicide."

I HAVE perused the Reports of His Honor the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Hargrave; and the only additional remarks I can offer to His Excellency refer to the observations of the Chief Justice,—that if the evidence of the Rotumah native be rejected, then the verdict ought to have been in favour of the prisoners, on evidence being adduced as to the act of kidnapping by any of the crew.

In that remark I fully concur. Yet, after the conclusion arrived at by the Supreme Court, establishing the evidence of the witness *admissible*, in my opinion the verdict of the jury, both upon the facts and law, was perfectly correct.

The consideration of the anxious question arising under the Petition appears to my mind entirely for His Excellency and Council.

Will you do me the favour of letting me know, for His Excellency's information, whether you said that the prisoner had not a fair trial, or anything to that effect?—because, if so, the Executive Government certainly ought to be at once informed that such was your opinion. The saying attributed to you was on the occasion of the proceedings against Dr. Steel, when judgment was delivered by the three then sitting Judges.

THE ACTING BRITISH CONSUL, FIJI AND TONGA, to HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

British Consulate,
Fiji, 11 August, 1869.

MY LORD,

The inhabitants of this port have presented to me a Memorial, intended to be forwarded to your Lordship, praying a merciful consideration and commutation of sentence lately passed upon Albert Ross Hovell, in the matter of murders committed on board the ship "Young Australian" while cruising among the islands of the New Hebrides, and requested my signature thereto.

Upon careful perusal of this Memorial, I find certain animadversions upon the trial, want of evidence, &c., &c., with which I do not feel warranted in identifying myself.

I have known Albert Ross Hovell for the last nine years—have been a passenger in vessels under his command—we were once shipwrecked and lived together for many months upon a remote island of the South Seas—and upon many occasions, my Lord, I have had good and full opportunity to acquaint myself with the disposition and character of the prisoner.

I can fully indorse all that was said in prisoner's favour by Mr. Fairclough and other master mariners; and may add, I believe I know more of the prisoner's natural good-nature, and kind, frank bearing, particularly to natives, than any or all the gentlemen to whom I allude.

Your Lordship will conceive the late unhappy events are to me no less inexplicable than painful. It is with great pain I learn a man whom I have ever regarded as a blunt, honest seaman, with whom I have by chance shared danger and privation, condemned to death or life-long imprisonment for the heinous crime of murder. I cannot however extenuate the crime or the circumstances under which it was committed, and have declined to sign—in its entirety—the Memorial noted.

In the prayer your Lordship's Memorialists make, that mercy be extended to the prisoner, I beg most respectfully to join, but without reference to the commission or trial of the crime whereof Hovell has been found guilty. I simply pray your Lordship for such mercy as may be asked for *mercy's sake*, trusting the solemn warning conveyed to evil-doers in Hovell's case, together with the now awakened vigilance of the several Colonial Governments, may for the future prevent any necessity for an extreme vindication of justice.

May it please your Excellency,—

We, the undersigned residents of the town of Levuka, Island of Ovalau, Fiji, learning with extreme regret that Albert Ross Hovell, late master of the barque "Young Australian," has been convicted of a capital offence on the high seas,—namely, of the murder of a native of one of the South Sea Islands,—hasten to forward this Petition on his behalf, in testimony of his character for humanity and kindness towards natives under him and with whom he has had intercourse, hoping that it may further strengthen the hand of mercy which has been extended towards him in the commutation of his sentence from that of death to one scarcely less severe and awful.

Our

Our knowledge of Captain Hovell extends, in some instances, over a period of ten years and upwards, and this at times and in places where the trait in his character to which we have referred could be narrowly observed; and we can fearlessly say that his treatment of natives has always been such as to cause feelings of the greatest surprise at hearing that such a grave charge was proved against him.

We believe also that, but for the great difficulties that intervene, much direct personal evidence in favour of Captain Hovell might have been forwarded from here, the weight of which was lost to him at his trial; and we would also respectfully urge upon your Excellency the fact that the trial took place at a time when the public mind was excited and perhaps prejudiced by rumours and reports of ill-treatment and cruelty towards natives of the South Sea Islands, and at a place remote from the scene of action.

We hear with extreme pleasure that a Petition in favour of Captain Hovell has been forwarded to your Excellency, signed by upwards of three thousand of the inhabitants of Sydney; and we hope that, although from paucity of numbers our Petition may fall into insignificance alongside so gigantic an appeal for mercy, that this may be compensated for by the fact that nearly if not the whole of our testimony is from personal knowledge and observation.

We would also beg leave to state that this Petition emanates only from the town of Levuka, and not from the whole of the Fiji Group, as would be the case did time permit; but from the fact of only a few hours being available for the drawing up of this Petition, between the arrival of the vessel which brought the final news of sentence and the departure of the next vessel for Sydney, this is impossible.

I HEREBY have great pleasure in stating that I have known Capt. Hovell, late of the "Young Australian," for the last nine years, and cannot speak but too highly of his character in every respect.

During his last voyage to Tanna, he re-engaged two natives of that place and formerly in my employ. These natives are still with me, and have often stated that Capt. Hovell always treated them and others well. They further state that they think Capt. Hovell was not to blame in his encounter with a lot of unruly natives—their fellow-passengers on his last voyage.

*John Waistell Orridge, on oath, states:—*I am a Superintendent of Police of New South Wales, of the Southern District; I apprehended the prisoner yesterday, at Clontarf, Middle Harbour, in the District of Sydney, charging him with attempting to murder Alfred Ernest Albert, Duke of Edinburgh, and I charged him with wounding with intent to murder the Duke of Edinburgh; about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon I was at Clontarf, and saw the Duke of Edinburgh and Sir William Manning walking from the luncheon-room in the direction of the beach, there being a picnic to Clontarf for the benefit of the Sailors' Home; there was a large assemblage of people collected; when His Royal Highness and Sir William Manning had got about half way from the luncheon-tent to the beach, I was at a distance of about 70 yards from them, and saw the prisoner rush up from behind, coming suddenly out of the crowd, making towards the Prince, whose back was towards him; I saw him present a revolver at the Prince's back; seeing the act, I immediately ran towards the Prince; I saw a shot fired by the prisoner at the Prince, who I saw fall on his hands and knees; the prisoner was about 2 yards from the Duke when he fired; a second shot was fired by the prisoner before I reached him; on my reaching him he had been seized by some gentlemen who were nearer to him than I was, and I then seized him, and other police came to my assistance; he was from that time in my custody, on the ground at Clontarf, on his transit by the steamer to Sydney, and from the landing-place, until I lodged him in this gaol; I could not say whether the Duke was wounded, as my attention was solely occupied by attending to the prisoner; when in the cab, on the way from the landing-place in Sydney to the gaol, prisoner who was covered with blood on his face, said "I've made a mess of it, and all for no good." Two pistols are in the hands of persons who found them, and will be produced.

*Cross-examined by prisoner:—*You did make the remark—"I've made a mess of it, and all for no good."

*Henry Clarke, on oath, states:—*I am a merchant, carrying on business at the Victoria Wharf; I was at the picnic to Clontarf yesterday; about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, or a little past that hour, I was in company with Mr. S. H. Pearce, and saw the Duke of Edinburgh between the luncheon-tent and the beach, at the edge of a clear space, just before entering some trees; I called Mr. Pearce's attention, saying—"There's the Prince, Mr. Pearce"; immediately after I spoke I saw the prisoner advancing from the crowd towards the Prince; I was in a line with the Prince, and I was about 20 feet from the Prince; I saw the prisoner with something in his hand, but at the time did not know what it really was, which he presented at the back of the Prince—he seemed to be about from 4 to 6 feet from the Prince when he did

so ; I saw a pistol discharged, and heard the report ; I then perceived it was a pistol the prisoner held in his hand and pointed at the Prince's back ; the Prince immediately fell on his knees, making an exclamation like " Oh ! " or something of that kind ; I then ran towards the prisoner, but before I reached him a second shot was fired ; I saw it fired, but did not notice in what direction it was fired ; it seemed to be fired in the direction of the Prince, but whether it was aimed at him or not I cannot say—it was fired by the prisoner ; before I reached the prisoner, and after the second shot was fired ; immediately after the second shot was fired—a man seized him from behind ; I seized the prisoner by the back of the neck, and Mr. Pearce also seized him, and the prisoner fell to the ground ; about that moment the last witness Mr. Orridge and some of the police came up and caught hold of the prisoner ; I assisted the police and others in getting the prisoner on board the steamer, and I accompanied Mr. Orridge in the steamer to Sydney.

Simeon Henry Pearce, on oath, states:—I am a Magistrate of this Colony ; I was at Clontarf yesterday, and saw the Duke of Edinburgh there ; about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon I was in company with the last witness Mr. Clarke, and saw the Prince crossing the ground from the luncheon-tent towards a belt of trees which fringes the beach at Middle Harbour ; Mr. Clarke called my attention to the Prince ; I heard the report of fire-arms, and saw the Prince fall on his hands and knees and call out " Oh ! Oh ! " ; I saw the prisoner retreating backward with a pistol in his hand ; Sir William Manning was making towards the prisoner, who, as he retreated backwards, held the pistol levelled in the direction of the Prince and Sir William Manning ; at this time I was immediately opposite the prisoner, and within 10 or 12 feet from him ; I saw Sir William Manning bend his head, and immediately the prisoner fired another shot ; Sir William Manning was then moving towards the prisoner, and Sir William fell on the ground immediately the shot was fired ; the prisoner backed a few paces further, when a man advanced from behind and threw his arms round the prisoner ; I ran towards him and seized him, and so did Mr. Clarke ; Mr. Orridge and a number of the police came up, and I, along with others, assisted the police in getting the prisoner on board the steamer ; I never lost sight of him until he was placed on board the steamer.

Cross-examined by prisoner :—I believe Sir William Manning fell on his hands and knees when the second shot was fired.

John Harding, on oath, states :—I am one of the bandsmen of Her Majesty's ship " Galatea " ; I was at the Sailors' Home Picnic at Middle Harbour yesterday ; I saw the Prince go into the tent, and a little afterwards he came out and came towards where our band was standing ; when the Prince got near us I turned round, and hearing the sound of a pistol-shot I turned round again ; I saw the Prince lying down with his hand to his side ; I heard another shot fired, and saw then three men struggling together ; Mr. Vial was one of them—I do not know who the other two were ; I ran to the place, and found they were struggling with a man ; I picked up a pistol and an opera-glass from the place where the struggle took place, as the men who were struggling moved away ; I gave the pistol to the Bandmaster, Mr. Pritchard ; the pistol was a revolver, and I noticed that two chambers were discharged and four chambers were still loaded.

Charles Pritchard, on oath, states :—I am the Bandmaster of Her Majesty's ship " Galatea " ; I was with the band at the Sailors' Home Picnic at Middle Harbour yesterday ; the last witness is one of our band ; I saw a man advance and fire a shot at the Duke of Edinburgh as he was coming towards us ; when we are playing in public, and the Duke happens to be present, we generally keep our eye on him as much as possible ; the man was quite close to the Duke when he fired—I think he was within a couple of feet of him ; the Duke fell ; I advanced to the man who fired ; some strange gentlemen had seized him, and I caught hold of him by the hair of his head ; the pistol fell—I saw it fall ; the crowd coming up, and in the struggle, we moved away from the place where the last witness picked up the pistol and handed it to me ; I handed it to the nearest officer of our ship, Lieutenant Bradley.

Cross-examined by prisoner :—I both heard and saw the second shot fired ; the second shot was fired just as he was seized by some gentlemen ; he had raised the pistol and taken aim with it—it was aimed in the direction of the Duke and another gentleman with him ; the second shot was fired not in the same direction as the first, as after firing the first from behind the Duke, the man retreated sideways ; and when the second shot was fired there was a gentleman advancing towards the man who fired, and it was fired in the direction of that gentleman ; I could not say if the second shot was fired immediately before or after the man was seized by the gentleman from behind.

William Vial, on oath, states :—I am a coach-maker, carrying on business in Castlereagh-street, in this city; I was at the picnic to Middle Harbour yesterday; I had been in the luncheon-tent and was walking down the ground, and I saw the Duke of Edinburgh leave the luncheon-tent with Sir William Manning; I saw the Duke hand an envelope to Sir William Manning; they were then standing in front of the small pavilion; they then walked from the pavilion towards where I was standing; I was standing between the "Galatea" band and the pavilion; His Royal Highness passed the Honorable George and Mrs. Allen, and spoke to them; when the Prince and Sir William Manning got within from 25 to 30 feet from me, I was still looking at them; I was in conversation with two ladies; I saw a man come towards the Prince, making four or five quick steps in a direction from behind, and a little to one side of His Royal Highness; before I had time to speak the man levelled a pistol at the Prince's back and fired; as nearly as I can judge the man had the pistol within about 4 feet of the Prince when he fired; the Prince fell forward when the man fired; I heard the Prince call out "My back is broken," or something to that effect; Sir William Manning turned round facing the man, who retreated towards me backwards; the man called out to Sir William Manning, "Stand back"—levelled the pistol at him—pulled the trigger, but the pistol did not go off; he then levelled the pistol again in the direction of the Prince and Sir William Manning, who were both in a line with him, and I was in a line with them behind the prisoner; I rushed upon him, jumping on his back, and got my arms round him as he was pointing the pistol, pinioning his arms to his side—and whilst I had his arms pinioned in that way prisoner twisted his arms round as if he was struggling to point the pistol at me; he swore at me; finding he could not point the pistol at me, he pointed it in the same direction he aimed it when first I seized him; I noticed that movement of his, and lowered my right arm knocking down his arm which was raised at the elbow in front of him, and at that moment the pistol was discharged in a downward direction; I then attempted to throw the prisoner, but before I could effect that I was seized by some excited people by my hair and whiskers, was thrown down, kicked, and beaten; the prisoner in general appearance seems like the man I saw fire, and whom I seized; I have no doubt he is the man, but his features are bruised now; when I seized him I at once called for assistance, and some persons came immediately, the whole scene occupying only a few minutes; whilst I had hold of prisoner he looked round at me so that I had an opportunity of seeing his face.

Alexander Watson, on oath, states :—I am a Surgeon in the Royal Navy, now serving on board Her Majesty's ship "Challenger"; I was at the Sailors' Home Picnic yesterday, at Clontarf; I was near the Duke of Edinburgh when I heard a pistol-shot and saw the Duke fall; I went to His Royal Highness' assistance, had him carried to the tent, and caused him to be stripped, and found he was wounded over the ninth rib, about 2 inches to the right of the vertebral column; I examined the wound; it was a recent pistol-shot wound; the pistol produced appears to be such a weapon as would inflict such a wound; I probed the wound for about one inch and a half; I have no doubt the wound was caused by the shot I heard fired when I saw the Prince fall; the bullet has not been extracted yet.

Henry Rawlinson, on oath, states :—I am a Senior-sergeant of Police, stationed in Sydney; I assisted to arrest the prisoner yesterday at Clontarf, Middle Harbour; I saw a pistol taken by Senior-sergeant Musgrove from the breast-pocket on the left side, outside, of the prisoner's coat; I accompanied the police by whom the prisoner was escorted from Clontarf to the gaol; on the wharf, as we were going from the steamer to the cab, the prisoner said to me, "I'm much obliged to you for getting my face washed"—I had caused the blood to be washed off his face; he said also, "I do not care for death; I'm sorry I missed my aim—I've made a bloody mess of it"; this was said to me voluntarily, without my having spoken to him; when first I laid hold of him at Clontarf, he said to me, "I'm a Fenian; may God save Ireland"; I was about from 20 to 25 yards from the prisoner when the shot was fired, and seized him immediately; on the wharf, when he said "I've made a bloody mess of it," he added—"but I cannot help it now."

Richard Musgrove, on oath, states :—I am a Senior-sergeant of Police, stationed in Sydney ; yesterday I was at the Sailors' Home Picnic, at Middle Harbour ; I saw the Prince come out of the luncheon-tent yesterday, and immediately afterwards heard a shot fired ; I ran to the place and found the prisoner down ; I seized him by the hair and shoulder ; he called out, "I'm a bloody Fenian, I'll die for my country" ; I saw in his coat-pocket the muzzle of a pistol protruding, which I took from him ; it is a small-sized Colt's revolver ; it appears to be a new one, branded "Challinor, gun-maker, Sydney" ; I stuck to him until he was put on board the steamer, and I accompanied him to this gaol ; the pistol I took from him is produced ; it is in the same state now as when I took it from the prisoner ; all the chambers are loaded and the nipples capped.

Cross-examined by prisoner :—You did make use of the word "bloody."

William Montague Manning, Knight, on oath, states :—I was at Sailors' Home Picnic at Clontarf on Thursday last at lunch ; I was with the Duke of Edinburgh, and when His Royal Highness retired I retired with him and came out of the luncheon-tent with him ; and at the same time His Excellency the Earl of Belmore and Lady Belmore came out of the tent with the Duke ; the Duke led Lady Belmore to the private pavilion which had been erected for him ; Lord Belmore accompanied by a lady and I went to the same tent ; the Duke then signified to me that he desired my attendance and walked a little away from the tent ; and walked from the pavilion over the open ground towards the waterside, accompanied by myself only ; the Duke said he wished to present a donation to the Sailors' Home, and presented an envelope to me ; we walked a little further in the same direction, when we met the Honorable George and Mrs. Allen ; the Duke shook hands with Mr. Allen, and then we walked a little further still, going in the direction of the bay, His Royal Highness being in conversation with me at the time, when I heard an explosion something like that of a cracker or small firework quite close to us ; I was walking on His Royal Highness' left, and I was very slightly behind the line he was walking, but not sufficiently so to see anything behind him ; I think the Duke either fell forward or exclaimed something, but whichever it was it led me to believe that he was struck ; I faced round towards the direction from which the report came ; and I believe I advanced towards a man whom I noticed behind the Duke, and who was very near to us ; the man corresponded in appearance to the prisoner now before the Court, he was dressed like a gentleman ; after a short interval I noticed him as I should judge 2 or 3 paces from me and facing me, and in the act of presenting a pistol having a single barrel at me, and, as I thought, in a line with my head ; it appeared to me that he was in the very act of firing, and I lowered myself quickly towards the ground to get out of the line of his fire, and in so doing I lost my balance and I believe I fell ; either before I moved downwards, or whilst lowering my head, I noticed the pistol snapped ; I believe almost instantly afterwards I was in the act of rising when I saw the man again at what appeared to me at a somewhat greater distance from me, but I cannot be sure of it ; he was presenting the pistol again ; and it appeared to me it was presented directly at me ; and just at that instant I saw two arms thrown round the man from behind him ; I could not see the man who threw his arms around the man—I only saw his arms ; almost immediately afterwards the pistol exploded ; on getting up I next saw a cluster of men on the spot where the man with the pistol had stood, and they were apparently struggling with some one on the ground ; I think there were two policemen came and attempted to pull some of the men off ; this struggle took place somewhat on my right hand as I was then standing ; almost at the same instant I saw some men carrying the Duke of Edinburgh towards his pavilion, and heard the Duke ask them to carry him easily, or make some remark as to the way they were carrying him ; I then went after the Duke, and did not pay any further attention to the man who had fired the pistol, but the prisoner now before the Court, in figure, stamp, and general appearance, resembles that man.

Prisoner being asked if he had any questions to ask Sir William Manning, replied—"I have not" ; and prisoner here states—"If Sir William Manning had not rushed at me the Prince would have received a second shot and I should have shot myself."

John Terence M'Mahon, on oath, states:—I am a clerk in the General Post Office, Sydney; I was at the Sailors' Home Picnic at Clontarf on Thursday last, and saw the Duke of Edinburgh on the open ground, I think at between 2 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon, coming from the direction of his own tent towards the beach; Sir William Manning was with him; the lady with me wished me to walk towards the Duke so that she might see his face; I did so, and was looking about me; when I got to within less than 10 yards of the Duke, we were meeting him, on the Duke's left; as we stood there I saw a man following from the direction of the tent towards the Prince, near the edge of the people surrounding the place; as he got near the centre of the open ground, he, when about 20 yards from the Prince, quickened his pace and walked quickly up to him; I kept my eye on the man thinking he was going to call the Duke's attention to something behind; when the man got straight behind the Duke, within arm's length of the Duke, he took a step to the left, and I am sure the man's hand must have touched the Prince; I heard a shot fired like the report of a Chinese cracker; I did not see it fired; there was no smoke; the Duke fell and screamed out; I ran to the place to render assistance to the Duke, and passed Sir William Manning and the man who I believed fired the shot, and as I passed him I heard the cocking or snapping of the pistol; Sir William Manning had his arms raised, and the hands of the man and Sir William seemed to be about a yard apart; I was afterwards, having passed them, between the Prince and Sir William Manning and the man who fired the shot; the prisoner now before the Court appears like that man; he was dressed in black, and of gentlemanly appearance; I have no doubt but that the prisoner is the man who fired the shot.

Rodd v. Collins—Entering enclosed lands without consent—1st sec. 18 Vic. No. 27.

Defendant pleads not guilty—disputes the title of complainant to the land.

Robert Adamson Rodd, on oath, states :—I am a grazier, residing at Menimbah ; I know defendant ; my land is enclosed with secure fences ; the ingress and egress is by gates, which are private ; I remember Wednesday, the 20th November last—I saw defendant on my land on that day, in the morning about 6 o'clock—I was drafting sheep ; I saw defendant going through my paddock ; I had before told defendant that I would not allow him to go through my paddocks, on account of disturbing my sheep running in the paddock ; on this morning defendant was considerably in the paddock before I saw him ; as soon as I saw him I called him back, he stopped, I told him that I had before cautioned him not to go through my paddock ; he asked me to go through and I said that I would not on that occasion allow him to go through ; he turned back—went towards the gate ; I went to the yard and could not see the gate from where I was standing ; five minutes afterwards I saw defendant galloping across the paddock ; I directed one of my sons to follow him and bring him back, which he did—he galloped after him, overtook him, and brought him back ; I saw defendant through the gate ; he was very abusive and insulting in his language ; he said I might summon him and be damned, and used other extreme bad language ; I never gave defendant personally permission that he might go through this land, but I have given permission to my friends to go through.

Examined by defendant's attorney, Mr. Girard :—This paddock is enclosed ; there is a creek through it—across it ; there is no opening between one portion of the fence and another—the fence might be down occasionally ; the fence is right across the creek ; I have not observed where the creek runs, whether from north to south ; the paddock is enclosed all round by a ring fence and fences outside of it ; I know defendant's father, Mr. William Collins ; I have lived at Menimbah twenty or twenty-five years ; I think Mr. Collins came subsequent to me ; the enclosures have been put up about ten years ; some portion five years, or even twelve months ; there is no road there ; the gateway referred to in my evidence has been there for the last ten years I think ; I don't remember giving Mr. W. Collins permission to go through—to the best of my belief I never did ; I don't remember when Mr. Collins was in a gig calling him and telling him he might go through the paddock as usual ; Mr. Collins and his family have asked to go through the paddock, and I have refused them within the last few years ; they have not gone through to my knowledge ; I presume my sons would give permission to respectable people going through ; I think there were not other persons present when defendant said I might summon him and be damned.

By complainant's attorney, Mr. Waring :—I don't remember ever giving defendant permission to go through.

Bertram Rodd, on oath, states :—I am a son of last witness, the complainant ; I know defendant ; I remember Wednesday, 20th November last ; I saw defendant come into my father's enclosed land—he was on horseback ; my father told him to go out ; I did not see him go out off the land ; I saw him two or three minutes afterwards, or a few minutes ; he was cantering on the land across my father's land from where he entered ; my father sent me after him ; I brought him back and saw him through the gate off the land—my father was then present ; my father's land is enclosed with good fences and gates ; there was a track or private road where defendant was going ; I never heard my father give defendant permission to go through ; when I went to him I asked him if he was not ordered back—he said he was ; I told him he had better go back now ; he asked me if he was going to be summoned—I replied I did not know ; he said he did not care if he was, he would only be fined a pound and he did not care for that.

Examined by Mr. Girard for defendant :—He returned immediately I asked him to come back ; I saw him go as far as the gate, but not through, the first time—but the second time I saw him go through the gate near the house (the gate he entered) ; I did not see him again on that day ; I had not as good an opportunity of seeing him as my father had if he had come back again on that day ; I have seen him before going through the paddock ; I did not object to his going through ; I was not told till lately to object to his going through ; I was told to object to any one going through excepting personal friends ; a good many persons, neighbours, have gone on this private road ; they have always asked permission to go through ; this paddock is fenced entirely round—not a single panel wanting.

Mr. Girard objects to the jurisdiction of the Bench, on the ground of a question regarding the title of the land.

Mr. Girard tenders the evidence of defendant, and it is objected to by the Bench.

William Collins, on oath, states:—I reside at Dochra; I am a grazier; I know Mr. Rodd, the complainant in this case; defendant is my son—his name is John Henry Collins; I know the land he is accused of having passed through; I have lived in that neighbourhood twenty-four years next March; I know the road on which my son is charged with going on, for twenty-four years; I have used the identical track during that time myself; the paddock in question is not enclosed—there is no fence in two different places round the paddock—on the south of the paddock, the creek, and there are 20 yards more or less without anything; on the opposite side or north there is about 60 yards without any fence; I don't know any reason for it; the creek runs through it; there is no fence on either side of the paddock where the creek runs through; I don't claim a right of road through that paddock; I did get permission from Rodd to go through this paddock, which has not been withdrawn to this day; the permission was given to me for my sons and servants or any one belonging to me, by Mr. Rodd, senr.; about five or six years ago Mr. Rodd erected a fence across the road I used to go; the first time I went that way after the erection of this fence was on a Sunday morning in June, 1852; I was in a gig going to church, and on that day I got permission without asking for it; Mr. Rodd told me on that day always to go through and not go round, or any one belonging to me.

Examined by Mr. Waring:—The 20 yards about, and the 60 yards I have spoken, there is a creek; there is no fence over the creek; I know the boundaries of some parts of Mr. Rodd's land; Mr. Rodd has thousands of acres not enclosed; I know the paddock in question; I cannot say whether it is a private road or public road through it; I don't know whether I could enter that portion of Mr. Rodd's land without taking down a rail or opening a gate; from the gate to one side of the creek might be from 100 to 150 yards; I positively swear that the paddock in which defendant was is not enclosed all round—there was a gate where defendant entered; when I go from Singleton upon entering the land the creek is on the left side; there is no fence dividing the creek from the land; there is a fence along the boundary of the paddock on the east and west; there is 60 yards on the north without a fence, and 20 yards on the south without a fence, more or less.

(PETITION—CERTAIN RESIDENTS OF SYDNEY AND SUBURBS.)

To the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Assembly in Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of the undersigned—

SHOWETH :—

That your Petitioners regard the continuance of Capital Punishment as a relic of a barbarous age, and quite unsuited to the present advanced state of civilization.

Your Petitioners are desirous that the punishment of death should be abolished, especially for the following reasons :—

- 1st. Because the right of taking life appertains alone to Him who gave it.
- 2nd. Because the relaxation in the criminal code in the mother country shows that the punishment of death may be beneficially discontinued.
- 3rd. Because the abolition of the death penalty has been effected in various States with advantage to their respective communities.
- 4th. Because the uncertainty of the punishment tends to encourage crime.
- 5th. That innocent individuals are frequently executed ; and that no human tribunal is justified in inflicting a penalty which when a wrong is committed cannot be remedied.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray, that your Honorable House will be pleased to pass a Bill abolishing the Punishment of Death.

And, as in duty bound, your Petitioners will ever pray.

SIR,

I have the honor to submit, for the information of the Honorable the Colonial Secretary, my Report on Immigration.

2. In the Appendices are contained returns giving much interesting statistical information, and other particulars relating to immigration.

3. Preceding Reports have been made annually, but in the present instance the Report is brought down to the period of the arrival (on the 11th April, 1869) of the last ship with immigrants under the Assisted Immigration Regulations.

4. Although the Regulations for assisted immigration were cancelled on the 11th December, 1867, the passage certificates were still of value for twelve months from that date; these having, however, now lapsed by effluxion of time, I am enabled to give a short summary of the immigration which has been effected since their promulgation on 21st June, 1861.

5. The number of individuals nominated has been 21,045

There have arrived, including some who were allowed to pay the full cost of their passage 16,623

And there have declined or were unable to emigrate 4,461

Of the number who have arrived, the returns show that considerably more than one-third have been unmarried females, viz., 5,860 unmarried females, out of a total of 16,623 immigrants.

6. The total number of immigrants arrived under the Regulations has been 16,623.

8. There were but very few of the married people or of the single men who on arrival were willing to enter into service, preferring to join their relatives or friends who had sent for them.

9. Referring to the annual returns furnished to this department by the Collector of Customs, from the year 1860 to the year 1868 (both inclusive), it appears that the total arrivals from Great Britain and Ireland have been

Thus showing that in the past nine years the very small excess of arrivals over departures by sea (independently of the assisted immigrants) has been... 869

Being an average excess per annum of less than 100 individuals, including children under 12 years of age.

10. Although such a small number of persons have arrived by sea, the Colony has, during the past nine years, undoubtedly received a large increase of population by land; from Queensland to the Clarence River, Richmond River, and New England Districts, as well as from Adelaide and Victoria to the Wagga Wagga, Albury, and Murrumbidgee Districts.

11. The emigration from the United Kingdom to the Australian Colonies and New Zealand has of late years very considerably diminished. According to the Annual Report of Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners, the return of such emigration is as follows :—

SIR,

I do myself the honor to forward the annexed Statistical Register for 1868, and to precede the same with the following Report, calling attention to the various returns as published in detail in the Register.

PART I.

POPULATION, IMMIGRATION, VITAL STATISTICS, &c.

POPULATION.

On the 31st December, 1867, the estimated population of the Colony was Page 2. 447,620; to this number there has been added during the year 1868, by excess of births over deaths, 11,260; and by the number arriving over those departing from the Colony 7,885, showing the estimated population, on the 31st December, 1868, as 466,765, being an addition to that of 1867 of 19,145, or 4.27 per cent.

BIRTHS, MARRIAGES, AND DEATHS.

By the Vital Statistical Register just published, it will be seen that during the year 1868 there were 18,485 births recorded, 3,736 marriages were entered as having been celebrated, and 7,225 deaths were registered, as also shown in Tables 3, Page 3. 4, and 5 of part I of this Register.

IMMIGRATION.

The number of immigrants arriving at the public expense was 470, and at Page 4. their own cost 753, making a total of 1,223 (exclusive of persons landing from intercolonial and foreign vessels); the total outlay for the 470 who arrived at the public expense was £11,202 17s. 2d., being at the rate of £23 16s. 8d. per head.

The decennial return showing the amount paid out of the Revenue of the Colony on account of immigration, with the number of immigrants introduced, will be found in Table No. 120, at page 179 of the Register.

LUNATIC AND INVALID INSTITUTIONS.

There were on 31 December 1868, in the Institutions at Tarban Creek and Page 5. Parramatta 1,230 persons, of whom 780 were males and 450 were females, being 330 males in excess of females. Of the total number in the Asylums 975 were British-born, 149 were Colonial-born, and 106 were Foreign-born.

Of these patients 255 males and 161 females are supposed to be curable, and 525 males and 289 females are stated to be beyond remedy.

There were the same number (11) lunatics in the Private Asylum at Cook's River as in the year 1867.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Page 6.

There appears by the returns furnished to be 37 Hospitals, 8 Benevolent Asylums, 10 Orphan and Industrial Schools (including the 3 Ragged Schools), and 5 Miscellaneous Institutions, distributed throughout the Colony, besides the before-mentioned Lunatic Asylums.

HOSPITALS.

Of the 37 Hospitals, 5 were closed during the year; in the remaining 32 there were on 31st December 1867, 438 patients; during 1868 there were admitted 3,864 patients, and during the same period the number discharged was 3,415, and 450 died, leaving 437 patients in these Hospitals on 31 December last. During the year 5,661 paupers received out-door relief. The receipts were from Government £25,779 12s. 1d., and from voluntary contributions £12,117 9s., making a total of £37,897 1s. 1d.; the disbursements during the year being £36,499 0s. 6d.

BENEVOLENT ASYLUMS.

These Asylums number 8, in which there were 1,189 inmates on 31st December last, including 201 children; the receipts from Government during the year were £18,645 3s., and from voluntary contributions £1,382 12s. 11d.; there were admitted during the year 1,883 persons, and discharged 1,577; the deaths occurring were 289, and the paupers receiving out-door relief numbered 2,548.

ORPHAN SCHOOLS, &c.

The Orphan Schools, Industrial Schools, Asylums for Destitute Children, &c., numbered 10, in which were admitted 270 during 1868, discharged 147, and 13 removed by death. The number remaining in these Institutions on 31 December last (including those of 1867) was 1,848; the total receipts from Government being £21,442 1s., and from other contributions £6,130 15s. 7d., and the disbursements amounted to £26,780 12s. 8d.

PROVISIONS AND CLOTHING.

Page 11.

The decennial return shows an advance in prices upon those of 1867, in the articles of wheat, flour, fresh meat, potatoes, and some minor articles. The clothing ranges much upon that of the preceding year.

PART II.

RELIGION, EDUCATION, AND CRIME.

The number of churches and chapels given in the various returns show 750, ^{Page 14.} being an advance on those given for 1867 of 100; the average attendance however, cannot be stated, as many of the returns furnished include attendances at worship at other places than churches and chapels.

The number of Ministers on the Register, under the Acts 19 Vic., Nos. 30 and 34, was 453. The expense for salaries, allowances, and contingencies, was £24,662 11s. 11d., and from the Church and School Estate Fund £4,565 5s. 8d.; making a total of £29,227 17s. 7d., as shown in the following table:—

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

In the 740 Sunday Schools on the returns, there were 4,984 teachers, namely, ^{Page 15.} 2,235 males and 2,749 females, with an average attendance of scholars of 43,794, or 21,248 male and 22,546 female; the average attendance exceeded that of 1867 by 4,282, and that of 1866 by 6,579, there being an advance in ten years of 43,794 against 16,590, or an increase of 27,204 scholars—a very marked advancement.

WEEK-DAY SCHOOLS.

The total number of private schools is given as 496, with number of scholars attending 11,486, the number of teachers being 763.

ORPHAN AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The number of schools receiving State assistance was 1,254, with 1,814 teachers and 66,835 pupils; the total amount paid by Government from Treasury being £116,856 12s. 7d., and the amount received from voluntary contributions, fees, &c., £42,636 8s. 9d., making a total of £159,493 1s. 4d. Of the above schools 2 were orphan schools, 1 destitute children, 2 industrial schools, 748 schools under Council of Education (of which 289 were denominational), 496 were private schools, the

the University, the 2 Colleges of St. Paul and St. John, the Grammar School, and the Deaf and Dumb Institute, making the total. The decennial return of schools and scholars shows a gradual increase, the year 1868 showing an advance on the preceding year of 3,652 scholars and of 74 schools.

The Asylum for Destitute Children having 684 inmates, received from the Colonial Treasury during 1868 £8,305 12s. 9d., and from voluntary contributions, fees, &c., £4,466 10s. 2d.

The Orphans Schools mustering 537 scholars, received from Government £6,438 6s. 5d., being £11 19s. 10d. per head. The scholars under the Council of Education, including the 289 Denominational Schools receiving assistance, numbered 53,752 scholars, with a receipt from Government of £87,834 11s. 7d., and £34,164 3s. 6d. from voluntary contributions, fees, &c. The Industrial Schools had 198 scholars, and received from Government £6,228 1s. 10d., or £31 9s. 1d. per head. The University of Sydney, St. Paul's College, St. John's College, Grammar School, and Deaf and Dumb Institute, received from Government £8,050, and from voluntary contributions £4,005 15s. 1d.

CRIME.

Page 34. Under this heading the returns show that there were in 1868 300 Commit-
 Page 36. ments for Trial in the Supreme and Circuit Courts, and 706 for Trial at Quarter
 Page 35. Sessions, making a total of 1,006 commitments, from which 187 convictions were
 Page 37. obtained before the Supreme and Circuit Courts, and 414 were obtained at Quarter
 Sessions, making 601 convictions out of 1,006 commitments.

In 1867 the commitments were 1,180, with convictions numbering 702; the convictions being less by 101 in 1868 than those in 1867, and showing a ratio per 1,000 of the estimated population at the middle of 1868 of 1.314 or 1 in 759, against 1.599, or 1 in 625, in 1867—a marked improvement.

SUMMARY JURISDICTION.

PART III.

TRADE AND COMMERCE.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

The Import and Export Returns seaward, to be found at pages 44 to 93, Pages 44 to 93. exhibit the growth of our commercial intercourse with other countries. The important position which this Colony occupies as a market for home and foreign supplies, as well as the extraordinary expansive character of its producing power, cannot but be regarded with the deepest interest by those who are watching its advancement in material wealth, and noting the development of its unlimited resources.

The general results of our trading operations in 1868 may be gathered from the following figures:—

It will thus be seen that the net value of our Imports exceeded that of Exports by £858,473; showing that upon our transactions of the year a balance to that amount was debited to the Colony. Our indebtedness however to the United Kingdom for the period stated was cancelled, and left a sum of £826,530 to our credit, while the excess of Imports from British Colonies may be explained as chiefly accruing from heavy remittances in gold dust, wool, and other produce in exchange for our commodities in the regular course of trade and transit to the Home market, as instanced in the item of wool from the adjacent Colonies. The Imports in the aggregate were at the rate of £17 5s. per head of the estimated population at the end of the year 1868; and the Exports at the rate of £15 8s. 3d. per head upon the same calculation.

Compared with the year 1867, our progress is unquestionably satisfactory.

Victoria took from us goods to the value of £1,098,891, Queensland Page 44. £1,014,366, and New Zealand £485,588; in each of which Colonies the interchange appears in their favour. The Imports from the same places exceeded our Exports thither in the following amounts:—Victoria £116,886, Queensland £491,604, New Zealand £235,348. The Imports from South Australia reached £272,283, against an Export value of £33,014, the excess £239,269 being chiefly for flour and grain.

STATISTICS, 1868—REPORT.

Ore, Tallow, and Wool, were the chief, amounting together to a total value of £1,286,825. The Imports of Wool alone in 1868, from the Colony of Queensland, being valued at £771,325, against 336,197 in 1867.

Comparing the Import trade, it is found that the declared value of Imports Page 94. at the Custom House has risen from £6,597,053 in 1859 to £8,051,377 in 1868, proving that the demand has kept pace with the increase of population, and that the credit of the Colony is well sustained; for it may be taken as a safe criterion in judging the stability of a community engaged in commercial traffic, that its position is in direct relation to the confidence it inspires in the mercantile world, resting upon its ability to realize from its established sources of wealth sufficient to meet all claims against it, after providing for its own immediate necessities.

The Imports, which have decreased in value during the year under review as compared with 1867, are particularized in the table below; from which we learn that Sugar, Kerosene, Saddlery, Machinery, Iron and Steel, Cordage and Rope, are the most prominent, and would perhaps indicate that colonial industries have in some degree tended to this desirable reduction.

In illustration of the remarkable progress of our commerce and the opening out of our internal resources referred to in the first paragraph of this section of my Report, I have appended a statement embracing the last four decennial periods, commencing with 1828. This arrangement conveys at a glance the history of the Colony's advancement; while at the same time it is suggestive of what may yet be achieved by the display of the same energy and enterprise which has been the means of placing New South Wales in the first rank of British Possessions. If in a space of forty years, so much has been accomplished by a comparatively small community, what may we not expect with a largely increased population with wealth at command, opportunities to employ it, and backed as these advantages are by that energetic spirit which bore the early colonists onward in their work.

Port Phillip was separated from New South Wales in the year 1851, and Queensland in 1859, which will account for the apparent falling off in the wool export. These changes of course affect the other headings.

The figures under 1868 show the exact condition of the Colony for that year.

The decennial table at page 96 shows the export of Grain, *the produce of the Colony*. It will there be seen that 1,146,913 bushels of Maize were shipped to other Colonies—the largest export under this item during the decennial period. The export of Flour and Bread took second position during the same years, there being 7,341,500 lbs. exported. The export of Butter and Cheese however, does not rank very favourably compared with former years. Table No. 50, at page 97, shows the advance

advance in the item of Preserved Meats exported, accounting for the marked diminution under the head of Salt Beef, Pork, &c. The export of Wool in 1868, *the produce of the Colony*, as shown in Table 53 at page 98, was of the value of £1,879,751. The total value however, of Wool shipped, including Wool the produce of other Colonies, as shown at page 93, was £2,693,105. The Tallow, *the produce of the Colony*, exported in 1868, was large in quantity, being 93,901 cwt., of the value of £144,377; there having been also exported during the year 19,931 cwt., of the value of £31,963, previously received from other Colonies. The export of Coal, shown in the decennial table at page 100, was 548,036 tons, of the value of £292,201, a large item in the exports of the Colony. Gold and Coin, *the produce of the Colony*, exported, does not show so large an amount as previous years, being of the total value of £1,895,929, against £2,170,165 in 1867. *Vide* Table 58, at page 100.

SHIPPING.

INWARDS.

The number of vessels entered Inwards at the several Ports of the Colony in 1868 was 2,073, representing 724,193 tons, and manned by 34,531 seamen; being an increase of 205 vessels, 77,223 tons, and 1,324 seamen, upon the returns for 1867. Shipping Inwards. Page 103.

With the exception of 1866, when the number of arrivals was 2,099, with an aggregate of 730,354 tons, the year 1868 exhibited the most favourable indication of activity among the shipping during any years of the last decennial period.

Of the vessels which anchored in our Ports in 1868, 1,922 were British, of 662,957 tons, giving employment to 32,537 men; 151 were Foreign, of 61,236 tons, with 1,994 men. Nationality. Table 64.

Of the British ships, 1,096 arrived with cargoes and 826 in ballast; of the Foreign, 71 had cargoes and 80 were in ballast. With cargoes or ballast.

The number of Mills for grinding and dressing grain has decreased from 188 Mills. in 1867 to 181 in 1868. It is however slightly in excess of that returned for the Page 108. three years preceding. In 1860 there were 193 Mills in operation, since which the number has continued to decline.

Woollen Manufactures are on the increase, 227,464 yards of Cloth and Tweeds Woollens. having in 1868 been sent out from five establishments. In 1864 there were only Page 113. 91,800 yards manufactured.

In 1868 there were 28 establishments for the manufacture of Soap and Soap and Candles, against 30 in the previous year. The quantity of Soap produced in 1868 Page 113. weighed 81,549 cwt., and of Candles 14,155 cwt. In 1867 77,773 cwt. of the first, and 26,206 cwt. of the last mentioned article were turned out.

The quantity of Tobacco manufactured in 1868 was 7,808 cwt., an increase Tobacco. of 875 cwt. upon the previous year. Page 114.

The number of Factories in 1868 exceeded by five those in operation the year before.

Taking the mean of the last ten years, the production of Tobacco in 1868 has been satisfactory.

In 1864 the quantity returned was 8,619 cwt.—the largest of any year during the period referred to. The scarcity of the imported article, and the partial stoppage of supplies from America at that time, doubtless gave an impetus to the growth and manufacture of the weed.

At the Wollongong Mine, situated on American Creek, 2,040 tons of Shale are stated to have been released from their bed, valued at £4,080.

When it is recollected that these mineral deposits were only brought under notice for the first time in the Statistical Register for 1865, the promoters would appear to have shown much perseverance and energy in rendering them so productive. As the Oil extracted from the Mineral is now establishing itself in the Colonial market, and is favourably spoken of by consumers, we may find it very shortly checking if not superseding the importation of the foreign article.

AGRICULTURE.

The decennial return of the quantity of land occupied throughout the Colony during the year ended 31st March 1869, and the produce of the cultivated lands, will be found at page 128 in the Appendix to this Report. From the results exhibited by this return we learn that the occupation of the land is steadily increasing, and that the breadth of cultivation has consequently been extended in a corresponding ratio.

The number of occupiers of land, exclusive of those for pastoral purposes, increased from 25,875 in 1867-8 to 26,581 in the year under review. Of these 16,510 were freeholders and 10,071 leaseholders. The former have increased at the rate of 5·67 per cent., but the latter class have decreased by 1·85 per cent.

The total extent of land held decreased from 7,737,651 acres in 1867-8 to 7,464,924 acres in 1868-9, or 3·65 per cent. With regard to tenure, 5,018,301 acres, or 67·22 per cent., were freehold; and 2,446,623 acres, or 32·78 per cent., were leasehold. The area under the freehold title had increased by 441,271 acres, while that under lease had decreased by 713,998 acres—a falling off in the aggregate holdings of 272,727 acres.

The average quantity of land possessed by each freeholder in 1868-9 was $303\frac{3}{4}$ acres, by the leaseholder $243\frac{3}{4}$ acres.

As regards Cultivation, the freeholder had brought 277,082 acres under crop, while the leaseholder had 157,744 acres in the same condition. The whole area of cultivated lands had increased from 413,164 acres in 1867-8 to 434,826 acres in 1868-9, the increase being 21,662 acres, or 5·24 per cent.

Comparing the average of Wheat in 1867-8 with that in 1868-9, we find that in the former year there were 149,142 acres under crop, and in the latter 164,206, a difference of 15,064 acres in favour of 1868—the produce being 1,433,807 and 1,887,085 bushels respectively. The yield per acre during 1868-9 averaged 11 bushels 29 lbs., against 9 bushels 37 lbs. in the year before. The return for the Grain sown however, fluctuates considerably according to seasons. The produce for the past year may be looked upon as favourable.

Produce to

The Wheat crop was at the rate of 4 bushels and 2 lbs. to every head of the population; but as a portion has to be set aside for seed Wheat, and the average rate of consumption is calculated to be from 7 to 8 bushels per head, it follows that we produce insufficient to meet the demand by at least 50 per cent., which will account for the large importations of Flour and Bread-stuffs from the adjacent Colonies

Colonies and elsewhere, to satisfy the requirements of the community. It will therefore be understood that before the Colony can be regarded as self-supporting in this particular, the area of land for Wheat crop must be extended in a proportionate ratio—that is to say, we must increase the acreage so as to raise the produce to a level with our wants.

The Maize crop for 1868-9 exceeded that of the preceding year by 644,900 bushels. In 1867-8, 115,522 acres were planted, against 120,807 in 1868-9, being an increase of 5,285 acres, or 4.57 per cent. The yield in 1868-9 was 3,777,405 bushels, or 31 bushels 12 lbs. per acre, while that for 1867-8 gave 3,132,505 bushels, or an average of 27 bushels 5 lbs. per acre. As the manufacture of Maizena or Corn Flour is largely increasing, and the soil and climate of this Colony so favourable for the growth of this grain, we may fairly calculate that it is destined to become a very important item in farming products. Barley covered 6,397 acres, or 1,257 acres in excess of 1867-8. The produce of the growth of this cereal increased from 62,392 bushels in 1867-8, to 94,715 bushels in 1868-9, giving 12 bushels 8 lbs. per acre in the former period, against 14 bushels 48 lbs. in that last mentioned. Barley.

The quantity of land cultivated for Oats in 1868-9 was 12,129 acres, to 13,142 acres in the year before, showing a decrease of 1,013 acres. The yield however, was in excess of that for 1867-8, which gave but 156,965 bushels, against 164,687 in 1868-9; the average return per acre being 13 bushels 34 lbs. in 1868-9, to 11 bushels 56 lbs. in 1867-8. The area of land brought into cultivation for Potatoes in 1868-9 covered 16,391 acres—an increase of 951 acres when compared with the preceding year. The quantity produced in 1868-9 was less than in any year of the last sexennial period. Potato crop.

The returns for the past year fail to show the extent of land laid down for Cotton, or the quantity grown; from which it may perhaps be inferred that its cultivation is not sufficiently remunerative to induce its continuance. The produce in 1865 appears to have been the largest recorded, being 29,012 lbs.; the following year, however, it fell to 380 lbs.; the next there were no returns furnished; but in 1868 it appeared to revive, as 13,680 lbs. were stated to have been grown. In 1868 the Tobacco crop covered 875 acres, against 626 acres in the year before, producing an increase of 1,890 cwt. In 1863, during the period of the American struggle, 15,315 cwt. were returned as the yield of that year, which, from the comparatively small importation of this article, probably found a ready and paying market; since the American trade has been reopened, the imports of Tobacco have swelled considerably, and perhaps tended to check the enterprise of the colonial grower, who appears to have turned his land to other account. The cultivation of the Sugar-cane is now becoming a permanent industry, and assuming a most important feature in agricultural operations. In 1864, when the first returns were furnished to this department, there were only 2 acres in crop, which Sugar-cane

which produced 280 lbs.; since then the extension of the growth of Sugar has attracted considerable attention; and I doubt not that in a few years the importations of this article of general consumption will be sensibly diminished by the encouraging results of the enterprising efforts of the settlers.

To afford a clear view of what has been achieved in this branch of agriculture, I append a brief statement of the progress of the plantations from the year 1864.

With such an extraordinary productive increase, and taking into consideration the fact of the canes planted within the last three or four years coming into full bearing and perfection, we may now with confidence look forward to a multiplied return of the yield of this new source of wealth.

Vineyards.

The breadth of land devoted to the growth of the Grape has also largely increased. From the statement (Table 95, page 128) we learn that in 1864 there were only 1,640 acres under cultivation, producing 136,976 gallons of Wine, 2,033 gallons of Brandy, and 393 tons of fruit for table use. Since then the acreage has annually been extended, and the produce has been correspondingly large, as will be seen by the following figures:—

As regards the quality of the Wine produced in the Colony, competent judges affirm that it will bear a favourable comparison with the greater portion of those imported, besides being decidedly more wholesome from its purity. Its cheapness is another advantage which will aid its becoming more generally appreciated.

PASTORAL.

The returns of Live Stock for 1868 present a favourable comparison with those for the previous year.

Live Stock.

With the view of adding to the interest which invests this important source of Colonial wealth, I have tabulated the information possessed by the Department relating to pastoral pursuits, commencing with the year 1828, and showing the increase for each decennial period from that time. In perusing this table, it should be borne in mind that although the numbers of Live Stock appear large, yet from the parent stock of this Colony sprung those vast herds and flocks which now spread over Australia and New Zealand, not alone feeding their rising populations, but supplying an Export for the home market in the staple article of Wool alone to the value of £1,879,751 annually, as shown in the export return to be found in the Appendix.

Taking

Taking the fair average market value of Live Stock at the present time, we may assume that the pastoral returns represent the enormous sum of over ten million and a half pounds. Distributing the number of stock over population, there would be for every head nearly 4 horned cattle and 32 sheep. In 1860 it was calculated that there were 7 horned cattle and rather more than 17 sheep to each person.

In my Report preceding the Table for 1867, I appended a statement showing the total number of Live Stock in the Australian Colonies, including New Zealand; I now reproduce those figures, conceiving they will afford conclusive evidence of the astounding growth of this pastoral property.

It appeared from the latest available returns that in 1867 there were throughout the group of Colonies 636,674 horses, 3,867,678 horned cattle, 46,812,859 sheep, and 598,430 pigs.

These numbers are the accumulated products of the comparatively insignificant returns of Live Stock in 1828.

PART VI.

MONETARY AND FINANCIAL.

COIN AND GOLD BULLION.

We now come to the Monetary and Financial Returns, as published in tables 101 to 133 inclusive, pages 134 to 193 of the Register, from which it will be seen that on 31 December 1868, the British Coins and Australian Sovereigns and Gold Bullion in the Mint, Treasury, and the Banks, was £2,379,916 3s. 11d., being an increase of that in the same coffers on 31 December of the preceding year of £598,098 12s. 9d. The average of the year shows £2,009,826 1s., against that of 1867 of £1,727,932 5s. 6d.

NOTES IN CIRCULATION.

The notes in circulation on 31 December 1868, were to the value of £719,684, the average circulation being stated at £653,183; those of 1867 were respectively, in circulation, 31. December 1867, £664,818, average £531,516.

The average liabilities and assets of the various banks, and of the capital and profits, are shown in the Quarterly Returns published in Table 110.

The total liabilities on 31 December 1868, for notes and bills in circulation, deposits and balances due to other Banks, is given as £7,533,690 8s. 4d., while the assets are shown as £11,690,225 7s. 3d., including Government securities.

The paid-up capital is given at £7,634,656, and the amount of reserved profits at the time of declaring last dividend was £1,941,540 9s. 10d.

The returns for 1867 give £6,906,466 1s. 5d. as the liabilities, and £10,574,571 5s. 1d. as assets; the amount of reserved profits at time of declaring last dividend being £1,969,688 3s. 10d.; there being less by £28,147 14s. to the reserved fund in 1868 than in 1867. The assets stated in the quarterly return ending 31 December 1868, were in advance of 1867 to the extent of £1,115,654 2s. 2d.; but the liabilities of 1868 are more by £627,224 7s. 11d. than those for quarter ending 31 December 1867.

SAVINGS' BANK.

The New South Wales Savings' Bank show that there were on 31 December 1868, 15,965 Depositors, with £712,306 5s. to their credit; and an amount of £10,756 9s. 3d. to the credit of 1,076 Crown prisoners. The Country Districts show £151,858 12s. 2d. to the credit of 3,666 depositors; the amount to credit of the Reserved Fund being £107,058, and to Profit and Loss Account £19,592 2s. 9d. The advance in the number of depositors was 1,730 in Sydney, and 490 in Country Districts. There was also an advance to the credit of the prisoners of £507 6s. The total deposits on 31 December of the respective years 1867 and 1868 being £711,245 19s. 9d. and £874,921 6s. 5d., an advance of £163,675 6s. 8d. in favour of 1868. The assets by investments on 31 December 1868, were £999,282 3s. 8d.

MINT.

The value of Gold, at £3 17s. 10½d. per oz., received at the Mint for coinage in 1868 was £2,359,525 10s. 1d., and sovereigns were issued to the value of £2,319,000. ELECTRIC TELEGRAPHS.

Upon the Telegraph lines throughout the Colony there were forwarded during ^{Page 175.} 1868 an advance in the number of messages of 2,425 on 1867. The extent in miles of the wire was, 1867, 3,567, and 1868, 4,385, an addition of 818 miles. The total cost of construction up to 31 December 1868, was £169,949 16s.

POSTAL COMMUNICATION.

From the decennial return at page 176, there appears to have been a ^{Page 176.} diminution in the correspondence of 1868 to that of 1867, as regards the whole of the deliveries, foreign, inland, and town. The newspapers posted to foreign parts show an increase on 1867, but those posted for inland delivery were 334,750 short of those posted for same purpose in 1867. The diminution in the number of letters was as follows,—foreign delivery 42,394, inland 146,700, town 3,372. The total letters posted in 1867 were 6,748,356; in 1868 only 6,555,890 were posted. The parcels posted were also short by 72,310 of those of 1867.

MONEY ORDERS.

The remittances during 1868, through the 161 offices, by Money Orders, were ^{Page 177.} to the amount of £247,488 19s. 10d., represented in 56,492 Orders issued; the Orders paid were 50,437, of the value of £222,570 11s. 8d. The amount remitted and paid was in advance of that of 1867, although the number of Orders issued were less by 4,364.

METEOROLOGY.

The Monthly tabulated results of Observations at the Government Observatory will be found in Table 135, at pages 212 and 213.

REAL AND LEASEHOLD ESTATES.

The value expressed in the 2,136 absolute conveyances registered during 1868 was £550,696, and in the 76 absolute assignments of leasehold estates, £19,651. Page 214. The grand total amount represented in the deeds registered (exclusive of leases) is £1,787,836, and the annual rental secured by the 283 leases registered is £16,750. The total number of deeds registered during 1868 was 5,110. These figures are exclusive of the transactions under the Real Property Act hereafter spoken of.

MORTGAGES—REAL ESTATE.

Comparing the Return 1868 with that of 1867, it is shown that the amount lent in the first-named year was less than that of 1867 by £7,927; the total amount lent during 1868 upon real security being £648,180. The amount lent upon Town, Suburban, Country, and Town and Country Lands conjointly, is given in the following table:— Page 214.

MORTGAGES ON LIVE STOCK.

Large sums are still annually lent upon this security. During 1868 there were 370 mortgages given, representing security for £1,399,479, over 2,997,019 sheep, 211,811 head of cattle, and 7,769 horses; and showing an advance upon the amount lent in 1867 of £194,468. The discharges in 1868 of previous mortgages numbered 111, representing £962,596.

LIENS ON WOOL.

Page 215.

These have during 1868 been the source of large accommodation. 286 liens were registered, of the value of £512,121. These securities are, however, only annual and therefore, much of the amount represented as lent in 1867, and perhaps previous years, is again represented as secured in 1868.

LIENS ON GROWING CROPS.

Page 215.

This is also an annual security. In 1867 £13,895 is shown as having been lent on 171 liens; in 1868, 112 liens were registered, the amount secured being £11,308, a decrease on 1867 of £2,587.

REAL PROPERTY ACT.

Page 215.

There has been a slight decrease of 20 during 1868, on the preceding year in the number of applications under this Act. The value of land included in the applications is expressed at £214,813; the fees received were consequently short of those of 1867 by £304 12s. 6d. The number of grants recorded is also short by 193 of those recorded in 1867; the value, however, expressed in the grants of 1868 exceeded that of 1867 by £59,057. The total consideration-money stated in the transfers effected under the Act in 1868 was £111,135 7s. 8d., and the amount of money secured by mortgages in the same year was £254,610 17s. 7d. The total value of the land under the operation of the Act, on 31st December 1868, was £2,661,484 1s. 5d.; the total number of instruments recorded in 1868 being 1,094.

REGISTRATION OF DEEDS AND REAL PROPERTY ACT CONJOINTLY.

From the two branches of registration of transactions of real and leasehold estates, it appears from the returns that the absolute transfers under the two systems were to the extent of £681,482, and the gross amount of money lent was £902,790.

CIVIL JURISDICTION.

The return at page 216 shows that, during 1868, the number of writs issued for cases before the Supreme Court and Circuit Courts was 2,002. The cases entered for trial were 243, and judgments were signed for £247,695 0s. 6d. The bills filed in Equity were 25; the petitions numbered 67; and decrees and orders 151. Under the Testamentary Jurisdiction there were 236 probates granted, the estates being stated at £491,437, and 201 letters of administration were issued, of the stated amount of £125,498. There were under the Appellate Jurisdiction from Insolvency 4 cases, and 6 from District Courts. The number of civil cases tried during 1868, in the Supreme and Circuit Courts, were,—in the Central Court, Sydney, 92 cases; in Circuit Courts, 39; before special juries there were 3 cases tried; before the District Courts there were tried 5,984 cases; verdicts were obtained in 5,329 cases for the plaintiffs, and in 655 for the defendants; of the 5,984 cases tried, 94 were before jury and 5,890 without jury. Motions were made in 30 cases for new trials, of which 12 were granted.

INSOLVENCIES.

CONDITIONAL PURCHASES.

Page 227.

A return has been added to the Register showing the number, area, and amount realized on Conditional Purchases since 1862. It will be seen by this return that 22,995 selections have been made, embracing an area of 1,764,061 acres; the amount paid for deposits being £441,015, for balance of purchase money, £81,373, and for interest £52,137, making the gross receipts £574,525. The return does not give the unpaid balance of purchase money; this sum must however be considerable, as the selectors are at liberty to retain possession of the lands upon payment of 5 per cent. per annum upon the unpaid balance of the purchase money. Deducting the amount paid for deposit and the amount for balance of purchase money from the gross amount of sales at 20s. per acre, there appears still to be due the sum of £1,241,673,—inclusive, however, of selections forfeited, the area of which has not been shown.

ALIENATED AND UNALIENATED LANDS.

The total acres of Alienated and Unalienated Lands in the various Counties, and in the remaining portion of New South Wales, will be found at page 228, tables 161 and 162. The lands leased for pastoral purposes will be seen in Table 164, at page 230. From this table it is shown that the total annual rent payable is £254,950.

The foregoing Report having called attention to the principal features of the accompanying Statistical Register, I have only to refer inquirers for more specific information to the various returns as published.

SIR,

I have the honor to forward herewith, for presentation to Parliament, the abstracts of Marriages, Births, and Deaths, for the year 1868.

In analyzing these Returns, the following results are brought out:—

- 33,182 names were added to the registers during the year, giving an aggregate number of ^{Progress of} registration. 362,366 since the 1st March, 1856, when the Act 19 Vic., No. 34, came into force.
- 7,472 persons were married.
- 18,485 births were recorded.
- 7,225 deaths, at all ages, were registered.

The marriages were 310 in excess of those in the preceding year; the births, 168; while the deaths decreased by 1,406.

The estimated population of the Colony on the 31st December last was 466,739, viz.:—260,413 ^{Population.} males, and 206,326 females. These figures are arrived at by calculating the excess of births over deaths, 11,232—the number of arrivals over departures, seaward, 7,885—and adding the population (worked out by the same process) on the last day of the year 1867—the net increase to the vital strength of the Colony for the past year being 19,117, or 4.27 per cent.

It will be seen that the conjugal condition of the people has improved; the marriage rate ^{Marriage, Birth, and Death rates.} being 0.82 to every hundred living, against 0.76 in 1867; the increase being chiefly among members of the Church of England. The facilities now afforded by the clergy, as well as the abolition of compulsory fees, having, in all probability, led to this augmentation.

The Free Church of England has also advanced from 186 in 1867, to 350 in 1868, attributable, doubtless, to the itinerant ministrations of its clergy, the publicity of their proffered services, and to other inducements held out by those attached to this sect authorized to perform the marriage ceremony.

The birth-rate was 4.05 per cent., exhibiting a numerical increase of 168 on the registrations of the previous year.

Taking the figures from the Census of 1861, when the married females numbered 53,509, out of the gross population of that sex, stated to have been 152,372, and the births 14,681, or 27.44 per cent.,
 the

the estimated proportion of married women in 1868, upon the same basis, should have been 71·983; the births in the latter year being 18,485, or 25·67 per cent. It follows therefore, that the population has sustained a loss of 1·77 per cent from this source of supply. The retrogression in the natural increase is difficult to explain, but may perhaps be accounted for by changes in the productive element; the fecundity of child-bearing women having probably fallen off—caused, it may be, by the temporary separation of heads of families, who have been attracted to the gold fields, or to other places in search of employment, or in arranging for permanent settlement in the districts of the interior under the provisions of the Land Act. This however can only be regarded as an assumption, but yet points to influences which may have operated in bringing about so unlooked for a result.

The decrease in the number of deaths when compared with those which occurred in 1867 is easier of elucidation, the measles epidemic having in that year killed a large number of the infantile portion of community; while in 1868 the Colony was fortunately free from the destructive consequences of such a visitation, the death rate being but 1·55 per cent., and, with the exception of 1861, the most favourable indication of the health of the people during any year of the decennial period just completed.

Divisional
changes.

Each year's experience more fully convinces me of the necessity of divisional changes in the registration districts, in order that properly constituted officers may be employed to supervise the Registrars in their duties, and see that the provisions of the Act are fully and faithfully carried out. A reference to that paragraph in my Report for 1866 (page 2) which bears upon the subject, will explain the alterations and changes I propose should be made for the efficient working of the registration system.

On several occasions in the annual communications from this Department, I have brought under notice the absolute necessity of taking a Census of the Colony, so that a reliable foundation may be obtained for basing calculations on the numbers, ages, and occupations of its inhabitants.

The importance of this national undertaking to all classes is so palpable, that I feel it my duty to urge upon the Government the advisability of taking initiatory steps during the ensuing Session of Parliament to authorize and provide for this service.

The Quinquennial period at which the Census should have been taken, was on the first of April, 1866. As, however, some of the adjacent colonies had just previously ascertained their numbers, while our neighbour Victoria postponed its action in that direction, the Legislature of this Colony declined at that time sanctioning a provision for the work; but as the preparatory arrangements will occupy some months, I trust that when the date is fixed for entering upon the work, sufficient time will be allowed for making them, so that accuracy and completeness may be insured.

At present any attempt to furnish reliable statements referring to the social condition of the colonists and the progress of the country, can only be received as loose approximations tending to mislead and encourage false conclusions.

Dissatisfaction has frequently been expressed by residents of some of the suburban districts as to the published rates of mortality in their respective localities, which are calculated, it may be stated, upon the numbers given in the Census of 1861, being the only authoritative account of the population available. Doubtless many alterations as to the proportion of inhabitants have taken place since that time, and thus the percentages given may in some instances prove to be fallacious when the next enumeration of the people is before us; at the same time it must be remembered that the ratio in each suburb is calculated upon the same principle; consequently, no injustice is done to any one in particular.

Reconstruction
of Registration
Map.

In making arrangements for taking the next Census, I would suggest an entire reconstruction of the Registration Map under the Act 7 Vict., No. 34, so that the Registration Districts may be assimilated as nearly as possible to the Police Districts, which in many instances have been sub-divided and altered since the proclamation defining the boundaries of the former in 1856, at which date they were identical. Applications are repeatedly made for the establishment of additional registry offices; and in adjusting the boundaries as recommended, much of the objection which now exists, to a compliance with the wishes of the applicants would be removed; besides which, it would materially lessen the cost and reduce the labour of compilation.

From these figures it will be observed, that the Church of England solemnized more marriages in 1868 than in any year since 1859, besides taking the highest number of any of the religious bodies during the past year; the Roman Catholics being next in order, followed by the Presbyterians, the Wesleyans, together with the Primitive Methodists, and the Free Church of England—the number of marriages by the last-mentioned denomination having risen from 186 in 1867 to 350 in 1868.

It will be noticed in this Return, that the number performed by the District Registrars was less than in either of the preceding four years.

In the introductory portion of this Report I have advanced an opinion as to the causes which have operated to bring about the increase of marriages by the Church of England, which will probably be more strongly marked in subsequent years.

Appendix C informs us that in the year 1868, with 7,472 persons who entered the marriage state, 1,505 attached the mark-signature to the certificates—a less favourable sign of educational progress by this test than was exhibited in the returns for 1867, but still an improvement on the average of previous years.

Locally distinguished :—Of the 2,384 persons married in Sydney, 396 affixed their mark, or 16.61 per cent. ; of these 140 were males and 256 females, the bridegrooms having a decided advantage in this respect over their partners, which is remarked to be generally the case to whatever denomination the parties may belong ; this however may possibly arise from nervousness on the part of the brides, whose intelligence must not therefore be under-valued. In the Suburbs, out of 506 persons who contracted matrimonial alliances, 66, or 13.04 per cent., had recourse to the mark-signature, 26 being males and 40 females ; and of the 4,582 who were united in wedlock in the Country Districts, 1,043, or 22.76 per cent., were unable to write. In proportion to numbers, the Suburban division occupies the first rank in an educational point of view, the City next, and the Country the least efficient, as might reasonably be expected from the advantages which the urban and suburban residents enjoy over those living in outlying districts with the people widely scattered. We may however hope that the efforts which are now being so strenuously made to enlighten and educate the rising generation will be successful in rescuing thousands from this charge of ignorance, and enable them to participate in those benefits which education confers.

Amendment in
Marriage Act,
1 Vict., No. 30.

In the last Annual Report issued from this Department, the subject of an Amended Marriage Act was brought prominently before the Government, the draft of a proposed Bill being appended to point out more clearly the suggested alterations found, upon practical experience, to be necessary. The question has of late been under the serious consideration of many of the clergy, who see how much the happiness of their flocks is involved in the present imperfect measure, which affords every facility for clandestine marriages. Numerous cases have occurred, and in many instances a great amount of parental distress has been the consequence. I therefore trust that the Government may find it convenient to propose a measure during the next Session of the Legislature to remedy this crying evil.

In framing such an amendment on the Act, I would advise that the declarations should be more specific and stringent, necessitating a previous notice to the Minister or to the Registrar of the District, whichever may be applied to for performance of the ceremony.

The law which regulates and authorizes the registration of Ministers for the celebration of marriages is also very vague, and requires amending in reference to the qualifications for registration, and by whom the application is to be made ; also in regard to the amount and character of the evidence to prove that the Minister has been duly ordained or recognized as the officiating clergyman ; further, as to the number of the congregation for whom the minister is required ; unless application be made for enrolment by the head of the Church or Denomination to which he may belong.

The ratio of births in Sydney to every 1,000 living in 1859, calculated upon the estimated population at the middle of the year, was 43·00, while that for 1868 was 36·36 only—a falling off of 6·64 per 1,000. In the Suburbs, the difference was 7·93, and in the Country Districts 1·69. With reference to the aggregate births of the Colony for the periods mentioned, the decrease was at the rate of 3·06 per 1,000, while the mean of ten years 1859 to 1868 was found to be 42·24, or 1·23 above the ratio of the past year.

The natural increase of population by the excess of births over deaths for the past ten years was 95,376. A computation has been made upon the last census returns, and the estimated number of people on the 31st December last, with the view of showing the proportion of native-born colonists to those who claim the United Kingdom, British possessions, or Foreign countries as their birth place; from which it has been ascertained, that upon the date given above their numbers should have reached 213,239, against 253,500, or 40,261 in favour of those who have emigrated to these shores. Although this is but an approximation, it is sufficient to prove how rapidly the Australian element is increasing and nearing the equalizing point, as regards the nationality of the colonists.

Table E brings before us the number of illegitimate children born in each year during the decennial period. This class of births is still, I regret to find, on the increase, being 699 in 1868, against 465 in 1859, and twenty-nine in excess of those registered in 1867. For the edification of those who may feel disposed to interest themselves in this vitally important question, it may be stated, that during the ten years referred to, the aggregate number of children born out of wedlock in the Colony was 5,588—of which 1,276 were in the City of Sydney, 473 in the Suburbs, and 3,839 in the Country Districts. Appendix B compares the number of legitimate and illegitimate children born in each of the registration districts of the Colony in 1868.

DEATHS.

Decrease in the number of deaths.

The number of deaths recorded during the year 1868 amounted to 7,225, viz., 4,279 males, and 2,946 females; a decrease of 1,406, or 16.29 per cent., upon the deaths of the previous year.

Rates of mortality.

The mortality in 1868 was in the ratio of 15.83 per 1,000 of the living, and less by 1.87 per 1,000 than the average of the ten preceding years.

The deaths in the City of Sydney were 1,599 to 2,151, or 8.94 per 1,000 less than in 1867.

In the Suburbs 956 deaths were registered, against 1,386; a decrease of 9.63 per 1,000.

And in the Country Districts the difference between the two years was 424, or 1.26 per 1,000 in favour of 1868.

Notwithstanding that the mortality fell considerably upon a comparison with 1867, mainly to be accounted for by the absence of any cause of an epidemic character, it must not be forgotten that the death-rate of the city is always increased by the deaths which take place in the Infirmary and Benevolent Asylum, not fairly chargeable to Sydney; so that the city may be considered as having been remarkably healthy during the past year. The sanitary condition of the residents in the Suburbs during 1868 also compares favourably with the year preceding.

Mortality in hot and cold seasons.

Dividing the year into hot and cold seasons, we find that taking the ten years ended last December, the total number of deaths in these respectively were—

Cold Season—April to September.

The mortality being 1,794 in excess of the cold, or as it may be more correctly termed, the temperate period.

The summer months, with their sometimes scorching heat and attendant causes, no doubt exercise considerable influence on the rate of mortality, while the cooler temperature has an opposite effect apparently, and conduces to the health of the people.

Quarterly comparison for ten years.

Taking each quarter of the year for the decennial period, we are enabled to form a comparison in the aggregate of the relative mortality in each.

The September Quarter therefore shows a much less number of deaths than either of the others, that ending March being the most fruitful in fatal cases of disease.

Percentages of deaths in City Wards and Suburbs.

The percentages in the City Wards and in the Suburban Divisions for the years 1864 to 1868, are also given on the deaths under 5 years to total deaths; on the deaths under 5 years in proportion to births; on the total deaths to births; and on the total deaths to population, in the same form as that adopted in the Report for the year 1864, and will amply repay the study which their publication is intended to encourage.

Prevailing diseases in certain localities.

These tables, together with that marked I, in the Appendix, distinguishing the particular diseases which were most prevalent and fatal in each ward of the city or suburbs will afford abundant materials for those charged with the conservancy of the public health, to investigate the cause of excessive disease in certain localities, and to suggest to the municipal authorities the necessity of carrying out such measures as may tend to remove, or at least, ameliorate the evils which lead so frequently to disease and death. I may observe that the Appendix Table referred to was compiled especially to assist the City Health Officer in his inquiries into the sanitary condition of the city generally; and now, with the results of five years' careful observation before him, he will be possessed of sufficient data to guide him in his philanthropic duty. I can only say, in concluding these remarks, that the opinion I have expressed on this subject on more than one occasion, is strengthened by the facts which have been brought under my notice, attributing the main cause of disease in the city to the accumulation of animal and vegetable matter in the low-lying portions of Sydney, to stagnant fetid pools, and to the ill-constructed and badly ventilated dwellings of the poorer class.

A heavy responsibility rests upon those who have the immediate superintendence of the sanitary arrangements of the city, involving, as they do, the fate of thousands of the citizens now unconsciously surrounded by the fatal causes of disease.

Table K, which follows, exhibits, in a condensed form, the classification of diseases which have resulted in death during the sexennial period ending 1868, according to the accepted nosological arrangement. Under the Zymotic Class, we find that miasmatic diseases proved the most fatal, being 26.23 per cent. on the aggregate mean deaths of the six years; the next heaviest death-rate being 12.80 per cent. from diseases of the nervous system, and those from accident and negligence, 8.12 per cent. The deaths of the developmental class, principally confined to children, also reached the high rate of 7.35 per cent. Classification of diseases.

A misapprehension would appear to exist as to the term "typhus," which is applied to fevers, and is classed under the miasmatic order. The number of deaths set down to that disease includes all those of a typhoid character, and is under the system of tabulation originated by Dr. Farr, the eminent statistician, now generally adopted. It does not necessarily follow that typhus should be interpreted as referring to fevers of the malignant and infectious type, which, as far as my experience extends, are not of frequent occurrence; but when such cases do arise they would certainly be classified with those designated colonial, gastric, and other fevers. It seems to have been Dr. Farr's object to bring all such diseases under the same general nomenclature, and I have little doubt for some especial and valid reason which his extensive knowledge dictated. Much discussion took place on the subject in England some years since, but it did not in any way tend to alter or interfere with the tabular arrangement.

The classification referred to is now uniform throughout the British Possessions, and is found in every respect to be of great value for comparative purposes, as well as an aid to scientific inquiry. By those conversant with statistics relating to the health of the people, its practical utility cannot fail to be appreciated.

April, May, and December exhibit the highest number of deaths, the temperature ranging from 58.1 to 69.1. This, however, would not appear to have any direct influence on the mortality. In April 144 deaths were recorded, thermometer 64.5, with a rainfall of 8.09 inches in 13 days; in May, with 148 deaths, thermometer 58.1, with 2.18 inches of rain; and yet, in December, with the thermometer at 69.1, rainfall 1.81 only, the deaths were most numerous, 161. The amount of ozone in the atmosphere is shown to be less in those months when the most deaths occurred, December being the lowest, 4.2. In September the deaths were but 99, with 2.68 inches of rain; ozone, 5.0. The deaths in October were also below the average for the twelve months; 2.06 inches of rain fell, the registered amount of ozone being 5.5.

Taking the mean of the twelve months for the ten years, we find that the deaths were 133; the temperature, 62.5; barometer, 29.954; depth of rain, in inches, 4.12, which fell in eleven days; the ozone (for six years only) being 4.8.

No definite opinion on this subject has been arrived at, even in England, where it has been under inquiry by medical jurists. The mortality there has been found to differ year by year under the same degrees of temperature; nor does the humidity of the air seem to have much effect on disease, although

it

it was observed that diseases of the respiratory organs were in excess during the more humid months; and such is the case generally in this Colony. The more probable inference to be drawn from the results before us is, that deaths are more frequent in the hot season of the year, arising from the impurity of the atmosphere, caused by the decomposition of animal and vegetable matter, which impregnates the air, inducing epidemic and other diseases frequently ending in death.

To those who may wish for fuller information on the interesting topics brought under notice, I would refer to the tables in the Appendix, which are complete in detail, and will be found to contain all that may be looked for.

I believe I have now touched upon the whole of the subjects falling within my province; and, in concluding my remarks, would express a hope that the suggestions I have offered may meet with the approval of the Government, and that its action may be productive of those advantages to the public in sanitary and social points of view which, I conceive, are to be obtained by the adoption of the means recommended.

THE EARL OF BELMORE to THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE EARL GRANVILLE, K.G.

(No. 54.)

Government House,
Sydney, 25 March, 1869.

MY LORD,

I have the honor to draw your Lordship's attention to an Address which I have received from the Legislative Council, communicating copies of Resolutions which they have agreed to with regard to the payment of last month's salaries, &c., in anticipation of the passing of a temporary Appropriation Act by their House.

2. I enclose a copy of the Minute of the Executive Council authorizing the payments complained of, from which you will perceive that this step (which was quite unpremeditated, and taken with no intention of infringing the privileges of the Legislative Council) was advised, in consequence of that House having adjourned (unexpectedly) over one of their usual sitting days for one week, thus rendering the passing of the Bill, in due form, impossible, before the payments fell due. The resolution for this adjournment was no doubt moved by the Representative of the Government inadvertently.

3. They have also repeated some Resolutions passed by them on the 29th of June, 1860. The circumstances which had occurred at that time will be found explained in Sir William Denison's Despatch, No. 76, dated 13th July, 1860; answered by the Duke of Newcastle's Despatch, No. 103, dated 26th December, 1860.

4. I understand that the unauthorized payments in 1860 had been made upon Resolutions only of the Legislative Assembly; whereas, in the present instance, a Bill had passed the Assembly, and been sent by Message to the Legislative Council, which House not having held a sitting after the Message was sent up to them, had not, of course, received it before the salaries were paid.

5. I find, upon inquiry, that salaries only were paid upon my Warrant, under this authorization by the Executive Council, before the passing of the Act, and nothing was done that was not absolutely necessary. It seems to be supposed that I was advised improperly to sign the Warrant. In point of fact, that was not the advice given. As I read the Constitution Act, an appropriation is not required to authorize the Governor to sign any Warrant, but to authorize the Treasurer to act upon the Governor's Warrant, no matter when or how long before signed. If I am wrong in this view, I shall be glad of your Lordship's correction.

6. Further than this, under the system which prevails here, a preliminary Warrant is issued by the Governor to the Treasurer every month, authorizing him to pay a sum not exceeding a certain amount out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund. After the moneys are issued, it is held necessary to give complete legality to the Treasurer's payments, that the Governor should sign a final covering Warrant for the exact sum paid, it being impossible to ascertain the amount of payments for the service of any month, in due form, until late in the month following. The preliminary Warrant is all that has been signed in the present instance, the covering Warrant not having, up to the present moment, been submitted to me in due course, although the Appropriation Bill was assented to on the 16th instant.

7. So much for technicalities. I now come to the ground upon which I justify my assenting to the advice of my Responsible Advisers.

8. Finding that I was constantly called on to authorize payments in anticipation of Parliamentary sanction, to be afterwards covered by the amounts being taken in Supplementary Estimates, and feeling strong doubts as to the propriety of what had become a very ordinary practice, I requested your predecessor to favour me with instructions for my guidance.

9. The points raised by me are recapitulated in the Duke of Buckingham's "Separate" Despatch, dated 30th September, 1868, and His Grace's opinion with regard to them concisely given. Applying those instructions to the present case, which differs from the former in so far as this concerns Estimates-in-Chief and one House of Parliament only—those, Supplementary Estimates and both Houses—I consider the present (whoever may have been in fault) to be an "unforeseen contingency" of an urgent nature, and the course which has been pursued to be "justifiable" on the ground that it was presumably "suro to be subsequently sanctioned, joined to strong grounds of expediency, even though short of actual necessity."

EARL GRANVILLE to THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE EARL OF BELMORE.

MY LORD,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's Despatches,—No. 43, of 22nd March, and No. 54, of 25th March.

I have to convey to you the authority for which you apply in the former Despatch—to lay before the Parliament of New South Wales my predecessor's Despatch, marked "Separate," of 30th September, 1868, on the subject of the issue of public moneys.

I cannot concur with your Lordship in your construction of the Constitution Act, as stated in your second Despatch. To require the Governor's Warrant as a condition of the expenditure of public money, would be merely nugatory, if the Governor were at liberty to issue that Warrant for expenditure not justified by law.

Having reference to the terms of the Duke of Buckingham's Despatch of 30th September, I am not prepared to disapprove the course which you adopted in authorizing the payment of certain salaries in anticipation of an Appropriation Act; but at the same time, I think that you have somewhat misunderstood the spirit of those instructions, and that the mere fact that a certain number of public officers would be put to a temporary inconvenience, cannot be viewed as an unforeseen emergency, as it is a consequence which must, in the nature of things, result from any delay in passing an Appropriation Act; nor is it such a case of expediency as justifies a violation of law.

But independently of these considerations, the question is settled prospectively by the action of the Legislative Council; as I consider it clear that, except in case of absolute and immediate necessity (such, *e. g.*, as the preservation of life), no expenditure of public money should be incurred without sanction of law, unless it may be presumed not only that both branches of the Legislature will hold the expenditure itself unobjectionable, but also, that they will approve of that expenditure being made in anticipation of their consent.

Your Lordship will not therefore be at liberty, on any future occasion, to repeat the step which you have adopted in this case.

MY LORD,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's despatch of the 17th June, marked "Separate," in which you desire instructions as to whether it is competent for you to exercise the discretionary power legally and constitutionally, which the Governors of New South Wales have done during the last ten years, with regard to approving of Executive sanction being given in anticipation of Parliament appropriation to such payments as are referred to in the 3rd paragraph of your despatch.

The payments mentioned in the 3rd paragraph are called for when the amount appropriated for any particular Service has proved to be insufficient, or an item may have been casually omitted, or some unforeseen emergency has arisen.

I apprehend that you cannot legally exercise a power of expending moneys without an Appropriation Act, and that you would *prima facie* be bound to refuse to sign a Warrant sanctioning any expenditure of public money which has not been authorized by law.

But, as in England, so in New South Wales, cases of supreme emergency may arise when it may be impossible to adhere to the strict and proper rule without detriment to the public interest, and when the Government at home takes upon itself the responsibility of sanctioning such expenditure. Such are cases where a Service voted requires more money than has been voted, or where some wholly unforeseen contingency arises of too urgent a nature to allow of the required expenditure being previously submitted to Parliament for their sanction.

Cases of this kind must be dealt with by the Governor on the responsibility of his Ministers, and he must exercise his own judgment upon a careful consideration of all the circumstances brought under his notice by those Ministers.

I shall not attempt to give you more definite instructions upon this subject, as each case must stand or fall upon its own merits; but I should be disposed to say, generally, that such expenditure would be justifiable, first on the grounds of necessity, or secondly on the ground that it is sure to be subsequently sanctioned—joined to strong grounds of expediency, even though short of actual necessity.

You are probably aware that in England the Treasury have no power of transferring surpluses on Civil or Revenue Service Votes to meet deficiencies occurring on other Votes of the same Service, but a fund has been established by Parliament, called "The Civil Contingency Fund," amounting to £120,000, out of £120,000, which the Treasury can provide temporarily for any Services such as you allude to in the 3rd paragraph of your despatch. In the following Estimates a Vote is taken for all such advances, and the sum so voted is repaid to the Civil Contingency Fund.

It appears to me worthy of your careful consideration, whether a similar Contingency Fund might not usefully be established in the Colony; though, without further information, I am not myself in a position to judge whether such a measure would in the result prove beneficial, or whether, if proposed, it would be likely to obtain the sanction of the Colonial Legislature.

MINUTE OF THE COLONIAL TREASURER.

I HAVE read the Despatch of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, No. 52, 16 June, 1869, referred to me by my Colleagues, and now state, as requested by them, my views of the opinion therein expressed as to the expenditure of certain public moneys by this Government, which was the subject of His Excellency the Governor's Despatch to His Lordship, of 25th March last, No. 54, which was called forth by an Address from the Legislative Council, dated the 23rd idem.

To make the case intelligible, I detail the circumstances under which the Address referred to was presented to His Excellency the Governor.

The Session of Parliament 1868-9, was opened on the 13th October, 1868, and, as the Address in reply to the Governor's Speech was carried only by the casting vote of the Speaker, the House adjourned for a week, and the late Ministry resigned a few days after.

On the 27th October, the present Ministry took office, when the House again adjourned to the 8th December following. On the 9th December, 1868, the Estimates for 1869 were, for the first time, laid before the Assembly.

From causes altogether beyond the control of Ministers, the consideration of these Estimates was not begun till late in January, 1869. A "Vote of Credit" was therefore taken for the salaries of January—an interim Appropriation Act for the amount was passed by the Assembly—concurred in by the Council, and assented to by the Governor, within that month—and the salaries for January were paid in February following.

Meanwhile, the Estimates for the year were being proceeded with as expeditiously as possible; but as they could not be completed in February, another "Vote of Credit" was taken for the salaries of that month, and another interim Act passed by the Assembly and sent up to the Council on the 26th February. The Council had, however, through some inadvertence, adjourned from the 24th February to the 3rd March, so that its concurrence could not possibly be obtained for the payment of the February salaries on their due date, that is, the 1st March following.

Under the circumstances, therefore, that the Assembly had given a Vote of Credit for the salaries, and passed an Appropriation Bill for the amount of the Vote, the Ministers advised, and the Governor consented, that the payment should be made in March, in the same manner as if the Bill had met the concurrence of the Council, and received the Royal Assent. Payment of the salaries for February, was, under Executive authority, made accordingly. So

So soon as the fact of this payment became known, Notice of Motion in the Council was given by the Honorable Mr. Docker, who had held respectively the offices of Postmaster General and Colonial Secretary in the preceding Administration. The Motion was as follows, viz. :—

Resolved,—

“(1.) That this Council views with regret and alarm, the disposition evinced by the present Administration, to set aside the Constitutional functions of this Chamber of the Legislature, by advising the issue of Warrants for the payment of moneys for the Public Service, before the Bill, by which such moneys could alone be legally appropriated, had been brought up from the Legislative Assembly.

“(2.) That the Constitution Act having expressly provided that all payments to be made out of the Consolidated Revenue should be appropriated to such specific purposes by an Act of the Legislature of the Colony—this Council having, on a previous occasion, by Resolutions adopted and forwarded to the Secretary of State, declared—‘That for any person or persons, whatsoever, employed in the payment of public money, to pay, or cause to be paid, any sum or sums of money for or towards the support of Services, whether voted in any Session of Parliament or not, before the same be included in an Act of the Legislature, duly passed according to law, is derogatory to the privileges of Parliament, and subversive of the Constitution’;—and further, ‘that even in cases where great public emergency can be pleaded in excuse, the illegality can only be properly condoned by a distinct Act of Indemnity, passed in due form by all branches of the Legislature,’ the repetition of such a violation of the Law and the Constitution, is an invasion of the rights and privileges of this Council, and tends to weaken its just authority as a co-ordinate branch of the Legislature of the Colony.

“(3.) That this Council having witnessed the disastrous results which followed the adoption of a similar policy in an adjoining Colony, is the more imperatively called upon to repeat its protest against the continuance of an illegal course of conduct, which, if persisted in, must inevitably terminate in a state of similar disorder.

“(4.) That the foregoing Resolutions be embodied in an Address to His Excellency the Governor.”

In the debate on this motion, a material amendment of the question was proposed by the Honorable Mr. Hay, formerly Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, and Secretary for Lands under a preceding Administration, and carried, as follows, viz. :—

(1.) That as it appears that certain moneys authorized to be issued out of the Consolidated Fund, by the Act which received the Governor's assent on the sixteenth day of this month, had been issued before the Bill was brought up to this House, the Council desires to express its regret that such an irregularity has been permitted, and in view thereof, to repeat its Resolutions as passed on the 29th day of June, 1860.

(2.) That the above Resolution, and a copy of the Resolutions of 29th June, 1860, be communicated by Address to His Excellency the Governor.

In transmitting these Resolutions, by Despatch No. 54, of 25 March, 1869, His Excellency the Governor pointed out to the Secretary of State, the inadvertence by which the expenditure in this case was prevented from receiving the sanction of the Legislative Council; and further represented that, under instructions received from the then Secretary of State for the Colonies, in November, 1868, he considered himself justified in assenting to such expenditure.

It would appear that Lord Belmore, entertaining doubts of the propriety of anticipating by Executive authority, the sanction of Parliament in certain cases of expenditure, had requested instructions upon the following points :—

1. In case of expenditure for any service the Vote for which was found insufficient;
2. In case of any item casually omitted from the Estimates;
3. In case of any unforeseen emergency.

I make the following extract from His Grace the Duke of Buckingham's Despatch in reply to Lord Belmore :—

“As in England, so in New South Wales, cases of supreme emergency may arise when it may be impossible to adhere to the strict and proper rule, without detriment to the public interest, and when the Government at home takes upon itself the responsibility of sanctioning such expenditure. Such are cases where a Service voted requires more money than has been voted, or where some wholly unforeseen contingency arises of too urgent a nature to allow of the required expenditure being previously submitted to Parliament for their sanction.

“Cases of this kind must be dealt with by the Governor on the responsibility of his Ministers, and he must exercise his own judgment upon a careful consideration of all the circumstances brought under his notice by those Ministers.

“I shall not attempt to give you more definite instructions upon this subject, as each case must stand or fall upon its own merits; but I should be disposed to say, generally, that such expenditure would be justifiable—first, on the grounds of necessity, or secondly, on the ground that it is sure to be subsequently sanctioned, joined to strong grounds of expediency even though short of actual necessity.”

Lord Belmore's justification of himself, on the ground of these instructions, for having assented to the payments in the case under consideration, is thus conveyed in his Despatch to Lord Granville, No. 54, of 25th March, covering the Resolutions of the Council :—

“Applying these instructions to the present case, which differs from the former in so far as this concerns Estimates-in-Chief and one House of Parliament only—those, Supplementary Estimates and both Houses, I consider the present to be an ‘unforeseen contingency’ of an urgent nature, and the course which has been pursued to be ‘justifiable’ on the ground that it was presumably ‘sure to be subsequently sanctioned,’ ‘joined to strong grounds of expediency, even though short of actual necessity.’”

Lord

Lord Granville, in reply (Despatch No. 52, 16 June, 1869), expresses himself as follows :—

“ Your Lordship will not therefore be at liberty, on any future occasion, to repeat the step which you have adopted in this case.”

Lord Granville appears to consider expenditure without Parliamentary sanction justifiable on two grounds only: 1st, on the ground of necessity—2nd, on the ground of expediency, accompanied by a reasonable presumption that both branches of the Legislature will subsequently approve of the expenditure.

Nevertheless, in the very case under consideration, Lord Granville, even if he does not directly censure, at least expressly prohibits, for the future, the course taken by Lord Belmore, in having, upon the advice of his Ministers, under circumstances of great emergency, assented to an expenditure which, although not strictly legal, had been sanctioned by the Legislative Assembly, both by Resolution and by Bill, and to which—although the Bill for the purpose had, by a mere inadvertence, failed to pass the Legislative Council—there could be no doubt whatever that the sanction of that body would have been afterwards obtained.

Without further dwelling, however, upon this apparent discrepancy between principles laid down, and the application of those principles by the Secretary of State for the Colonies, I invite the serious attention of my Colleagues to the probable effect of these instructions, and to the embarrassments in which the present or any future Government of this Colony might be thereby involved.

We see that, in a case where every constitutional step was taken, excepting the final step of obtaining the technical consent of the Upper Chamber—in a case of such “emergency” that delay on the part of the Executive might have been dangerous to the public interest, the Secretary of State’s disapproval of the course adopted is scarcely withheld, while his injunction against its repetition is peremptorily imposed.

It then becomes a grave question whether, by prohibitory instructions to the Governor of this kind, the free action of Responsible Government in this Colony is not liable to be seriously impeded—whether our position and functions as Responsible Advisers of His Excellency, and Ministers responsible to Parliament, are not interfered with by the Secretary of State so as to affect the principle of Colonial independence. Lord Granville seems to have overlooked the fact that the action of the Executive Council, in cases like that referred to, is not that of the Governor alone, but the joint action of the Governor and his Responsible Advisers. The Governor, no doubt, is responsible to the Imperial Government, but his Advisers are responsible to the Parliament of this Colony; and to bind the Governor by thus laying down an arbitrary course of procedure, may bring him into collision with his Ministers on matters affecting local interests alone, and involve such an encroachment upon the privileges of the people and Parliament of this Colony, as appears quite inconsistent with those broad and enlightened principles of self-government which have been long acknowledged in this Colony, and of late so strongly impressed upon the Colonies by the Imperial Government.

The magnitude and frequency of unexpected demands upon our public funds may be estimated from the amount of supplementary appropriations made by Parliament annually during a series of years, say ten :—

The greater part of this large supplemental expenditure has been, from time to time, dealt with as having originated under circumstances of emergency, which were held to justify the exercise of Executive responsibility, and which was afterwards on that ground legalized by the harmonious action of both Chambers.

I cannot refrain from noticing the remark of Lord Granville, that “the question” of authorizing payments in anticipation of an Appropriation Act “is settled prospectively by the action of the Legislative Council.” It seems to me that the tendency of this remark is to place the Council in antagonism with the other branch of the Legislature, by the unnecessary revival of questions connected with Money Bills, and the imposition of taxes and pecuniary burdens upon the people; and as the only “action” taken by the Council in the matter, was to pass the Resolution of the 23rd March last, expressing regret that “irregularity” had occurred in issuing moneys before the Bill which authorized the issues had been brought up to the Council, and to repeat the Resolutions passed in June, 1860, I cannot see the force or significance of Lord Granville’s remark, inasmuch as the “irregularity” complained of was explained by the Governor to have been caused by an inadvertence.

As to the Resolutions of June, 1860, which were passed in reference to the payment of expenses from January to June of that year, under Votes of Credit only, I quote the opinion expressed by Sir William Denison in transmitting the Resolutions:—

“With regard to the Resolutions themselves, whatever may be the view legally taken of the operation of the Appropriation Act, it is most certain that the principle affirmed is altogether at variance with the practice which has prevailed in the Colonies, where the Government always assumed the responsibility of expending money for purposes not contemplated when the Estimates for the year were prepared, and has secured a practical indemnity for this, by bringing in a Supplementary Estimate, and inserting the amount in the Appropriation Act for the subsequent year.”

To which I add the views expressed on the subject, as conveyed by the Duke of Newcastle, in reply to Sir William Denison:—

“I have received Sir W. Denison’s Despatch, No. 76, of the 13th July, forwarding, in accordance with the request of the Legislative Council of New South Wales, a series of Resolutions adopted by that branch of the Legislature, explanatory of the views entertained by them respecting the operation of the Appropriation Act, in giving legislative sanction to the payments made by the Government for the Public Service previous to the passing of such an enactment.

“2. Sir W. Denison further explains the difference which had existed between the two branches of the Legislature, as to the power of the Legislative Council in dealing with questions of expenditure.

“3. I transmit to you, for your information, copies of a correspondence with the Governor of New Zealand on a similar question which arose within that Government.

“4. I trust that the moderation and prudence of both branches of the Legislature will prevent the recurrence of any similar difficulty in New South Wales.”

From the correspondence referred to in the foregoing, I make the following extract:—

“2. The question raised by your despatch is one of great importance in itself, and touching on the first principles of English Constitutional Law. In this country it has been the undisputed practice, as affirmed by a Resolution of the House of Commons of the year 1678, that Bills for Supply “ought not to be changed or altered by the House of Lords.” It is quite true that the New Zealand Constitutional Act contains no provision to the same effect. But it appears to me that the analogy of the English Constitution ought to prevail, the reason being the same, when the Upper House is not elected by the people. And in Canada, where the Constitutional Act is similar in this respect to that of New Zealand, the Legislative Assembly has hitherto exercised without dispute the same privilege in regard to Money Votes as the British House of Commons.

“I have, &c.,

I may here point out that the practice in England is to pay moneys upon the resolution of the House of Commons alone—a practice expressly authorized and recognized by the 29th & 30th Vict., cap. 39, sec. 14, viz.:—

“When any sum or sums of money shall have been granted to Her Majesty by a Resolution of the House of Commons, or by an Act of Parliament, to defray expenses for any specified public services, *it shall be lawful* for Her Majesty, by Her Royal Order, under the Sign Manual, countersigned by the Treasury, *to authorize and require* the Treasury to issue out of the Credits to be granted to them on the Exchequer Accounts, the sums which may be required from time to time to defray such expenses.”

In opposition to the idea of Executive responsibility entertained by Lord Granville, I have recited, by way of contrast, the opinions on the subject expressed by the Dukes of Newcastle and Buckingham and Chandos, and Sir W. Denison and Sir G. Grey. I also add an extract from Todd’s work on “Parliamentary Government in England,” viz.:—

“It is therefore erroneous to suppose that the Government can be absolutely *prevented* from any misapplication of the Parliamentary grants. Even were it possible to do so, it would not be politic to restrain the Government from expending money, under any circumstances, without the previous authority of Parliament. In the words of Mr. Macaulay, (Secretary to the Board of Audit), ‘cases must constantly arise, in so complicated a system of Government as ours, where it becomes the duty of the Executive authorities, in the exercise of their discretionary powers, boldly to set aside the requirements of the Legislature, trusting to the good sense of Parliament, when all the facts of the case shall have been explained, to acquit them of all blame; and it would be not a public advantage, but a public calamity, if the Government were to be deprived of the means of so exercising their discretionary authority.’ To the same effect we have a declaration by a Committee of the House of Commons, ‘that in special emergencies, expenditure unauthorized by Parliament becomes absolutely essential. In all such cases the Executive must take the responsibility of sanctioning whatever immediate urgency requires; and it has never been found that Parliament exhibited any reluctance to supply the means of meeting such expenditure.’”

Under these circumstances, I advise my Colleagues to join with me in an expression of opinion against the instructions lately issued by the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor, as amounting to an interference in matters of Local Government—with our responsibility as Ministers of the Crown, and Representatives of the Parliament and the People of this Colony upon a question entirely unconnected with Imperial interests.

MY LORD,

I do myself the honor to furnish for the information of your Excellency, the Fourteenth Annual Report on the Post Office Department, being that for the year 1868.

The new Postal Act, 31 Victoria, No. 4, which was passed towards the end of the year 1867, enabled several important improvements in the postal service of this Colony to be introduced during the year 1868. Amongst the advantages which have already been gained by the new Act, the following may be mentioned, viz. :—The prepayment to destination of correspondence for the continent of Europe, without the necessity of such correspondence passing through the United Kingdom; the transmission of patterns and samples of merchandise by the inland post; the reduction of the registration fee on letters, from 6d. to 4d.; the compulsory registration of letters containing coin or other valuable articles; the transmission of insufficiently stamped ship letters, provided they bear, when posted, not less than a single rate of postage; and the regulation of the Money Order system by Act of Parliament. Speaking generally of the new Act, I may state that it has been found to meet the requirements of the Department in every way, by enabling it to afford facilities to the public which it was hitherto prevented from doing, and by providing means of dealing with matters of detail connected with the working of the postal system which the previous Acts did not supply.

To meet the provisions of the new Act it was found necessary to introduce a new code of postal regulations, which were sanctioned by your Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council, and brought into operation, simultaneously with the new Act, on the 1st January, 1868.

In the Appendix will be found returns shewing the length of new lines established during 1868 to be 763 miles; and the length of postal lines abolished during the same period to be 294 miles. The actual increase in the extent of postal route in the year 1868, as compared with that of the year 1867, being 469 miles, as shewn in the above return. Returns of the increased and decreased communication on existing lines will be found in the Appendix.

The extension of the railway to Marulan on the Southern line, and to One-tree Hill on the Western line, during the year 1868, enabled the mails to be conveyed by train a distance of 44 miles more than in the previous year.

The number of post offices established during 1868 was 28, the number re-established 2, and the number discontinued 20, making an actual increase of 10 in the number of post offices in the colony.

76 changes of Postmasters were effected during 1868.

It is gratifying to observe that the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company has, during the year 1868, performed its contract in a satisfactory manner; and the exertions which have been made towards securing the arrival to time of the contract packets have doubtless been duly appreciated by the public.

There is still some inconvenience felt (especially in the country districts) in consequence of the dates fixed for the arrival and departure of the mail-steamers not being in each month the same, but this cannot be avoided so long as the present principle on which the time-table between England and India is framed (*viz.*—the arrival and departure being on a fixed *day* of the week, instead of a fixed *date* of the month) is adhered to. The Post Office Department has adopted the only means in its power to remedy the inconvenience complained of, *viz.*—by the aid of frequent notifications in the daily newspapers, to make the public acquainted with the dates of arrival and departure of the mail-steamers.

It will be remembered that this Colony considered it necessary in the year 1866 to give the required notice (*viz.*—two years and three months) of its intention to discontinue its subsidy to the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company's contract, in consequence of the very irregular way in which the service was then performed. This notice was received by the Imperial authorities in due course, but a request has been made by them that this Colony would allow it to remain in abeyance until the general question of Steam Postal communication with the Australian Colonies receives attention, and considering the improved manner in which the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company is now performing the contract, the Government of this Colony has deemed it expedient to agree to this request.

The new arrangement of Time Table, affording thirteen instead of twelve mails each way, annually, has caused the Colonial contribution to the subsidy to be increased from £81,710 to £93,075 10s., (including the cost of conveyance between Southampton and Ceylon).

The Panama and New Zealand Royal Mail Company's steamers continued the Service between Sydney and Panama, until the end of the year 1868, when it was discontinued in consequence of the inability of the Company to complete its Contract.

The correspondence between this Colony and America, and several other places, has of course suffered as regards its speedy transmission by the withdrawal of the steamers of the Panama and New Zealand Royal Mail Company. Looking at this service from a postal point of view, the correspondence alone did not justify the large amount of subsidy which was entailed upon this Colony for its conveyance

As regards the performance of the contract, it is only due to the Company to state that, from the establishment of the Panama Mail Service to its close, the contract was carried out in an efficient and satisfactory manner, considering the difficulties which had to be overcome in the opening of the new line, and the disappointment which the Company sustained in reference to the passenger traffic.

It will be a matter of congratulation, both for the Colonies and the United Kingdom, when some feasible scheme is adopted for providing regular and more frequent postal communication between the Mother Country and the Australasian Colonies.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

It will be observed that the total revenue of the year 1868 shows a very slight decrease (£29 16s. 4d. only) on the amount collected during the year 1867, which may be accounted for by the diminution of the number of letters and packets posted for foreign despatch, alluded to elsewhere in this Report, and by the reduction of the registration fee from 6d. to 4d.

The augmentation under the head of salaries is occasioned by the extension of the Postal Service, necessitating the appointment of additional postmasters, and increases to the salaries of others, as well as the appointment of two junior clerks and six extra letter carriers.

It is gratifying to observe that while the Postal Service has been materially extended, the various services cost considerably less in 1868 than in 1867, a saving of about 1 per cent. having been effected in the total expenditure of the year 1868.

The amount voted for mail conveyance during 1868 was £59,020, irrespective of the subsidies paid to the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company, and to the Panama and New Zealand Royal Mail Company, towards the English mail contracts, which are not included in the above returns.

In 1868 there were 274 distinct mail contracts, of which twelve were transferred at the request of the original contractors, and three were cancelled during the year.

As it is usual to publish what information may be at the command of the department in respect to the number of letters, books, and newspapers posted, the above tabular statement is given; but for the reasons already largely dwelt upon by my predecessors in previous reports, I do not attach much reliance upon the figures which appear therein.

It will be seen that in almost every item a decrease is shown, which may be explained by the fact that postmasters are beginning to give their returns more correctly, and consequently for some time decreases may be expected to appear in the inland returns, which, it has been ascertained, have hitherto been very much overestimated. I may here state that the revenue collected during 1868 proves that there have been no such decreases in the number of inland letters, newspapers, and parcels, as the above figures represent; but there has been a diminution in the letters and parcels posted for foreign despatch, which perhaps may partly be accounted for by the present time table of the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company not having been found so conducive to speedy replies to correspondence as that previously in existence.

The opening of the railway to Marulan in 1868 enabled several important accelerations in the transit of mails to be effected in the Southern District, and in many other parts of the Colony also the mails were accelerated by the adoption of new Time Tables.

The Inspectors report that the mail contracts throughout the Colony have generally been well performed, and that the Postmasters who have received previous instructions from them have exemplified on their second inspection a marked improvement in the performance of their postal duties.

I may add that since the Postal Inspectors have been appointed much reliable information has been obtained by this Department, as to the mail lines and distances, as well as regards the nature of the country through which the mails are conveyed and the difficulties which Contractors have to contend with in the performance of the various mail services.

In the appendix will be found reports from the Superintendent of the Money Order Department and Superintendent of Telegraphs, shewing the progress of the business of the Departments under their management, during the year 1868.

With reference to your Despatches stated in the margin, I have the honor to transmit to you a copy of a letter from the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, upon the subject of the determination of your Government to withdraw from the arrangement under which the subsidy for the Mail Service *via* Suez is apportioned between England and the Australian Colonies.

Sir,

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have had before them your letters, dated the 31st July and 19th August last, covering Despatches from the Governor of New South Wales, relative to the inconvenience of the existing arrangements for the Mail Service between this country and New South Wales by the route of Suez, and in which attention is called to the Minute of the Executive Council, of May, 1866, conveying the determination of that Colony to withdraw from the arrangements under which the subsidy for the Mail Service *via* Suez is apportioned between the Mother Country and the several Australian Colonies; and I am directed by their Lordships to request that you will state to the Duke of Buckingham that, at the period when the notice of withdrawal was given by New South Wales, the whole question of the conveyance of the India, China, and Australian Mails was under the consideration of the Government (resulting in a new contract with the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company for the conveyance of the India and China Mails, and a reference to the Australian Colonies themselves on the subject of their Mail Service). Their Lordships forbore to signify to the Government of New South Wales their acceptance of the notice of withdrawal from the arrangement under which the subsidy for the Mail Packet Service *via* Suez is apportioned, in the hopes that the result of the reference to the Colonies of the question of their Packet Service would have been an arrangement satisfactory alike to themselves and to the Imperial Government.

I am further to state that their Lordships much regret that the alteration of the Australian Packet Service from once a month to once every four weeks, necessitated by the alteration of the Indian Packet Service into a Weekly Packet Service, has not proved satisfactory to the Colony of New South Wales; but they trust that the subject of the Packet Service having again, in October last, been referred to the Colonies, they may be able to submit some arrangement which, while reconciling their conflicting interests, will at the same time be free from the very great objection, *viz.*, expense, which attended the arrangements previously submitted.

Pending the receipt of replies from all the Australian Colonies, their Lordships trust that the Government of New South Wales will consent to their notice of withdrawal being held in abeyance.

With reference to Mr. Elliot's letter, dated the 25th ultimo, forwarding a Despatch from the Governor of New South Wales, enclosing a Minute drawn up by the Postmaster General of the Colony, upon the subject of increased postal facilities with this country, and having reference to the Despatch sent out from the Colonial Office in October, 1867 (above referred to), I am to acquaint you that their Lordships have caused these papers to be transmitted to the Postmaster General for his consideration, and have at the same time requested His Grace's attention to Mr. Docker's able Minute.
