In obedience to the direction contained in the thirteenth clause of the "Inscribed Stock Act of 1883," I have now the honor to submit the Third Annual Report "showing the particulars of every creation and inscription of Stock, whether such Stock was created for the purpose of raising a Loan or for the conversion of outstanding Debentures—the capital amount of such Stock—the rate of interest thereon, and its currency and condition of redemption—also, particulars of every redemption or payment of the capital amount of any Loan or of any portion thereof; together with copies of all agreements, appointments, rules and regulations effected, entered into, or made under authority of this Act, prior to such date of meeting."

THE TREASURER'S STATEMENTS OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDI-TURE OF THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND, AND OTHER MONEYS, FOR THE YEAR 1885.

(Under Act 33 Victoria No. 18.)

- 1. In accordance with the directions of section 38 of the "Audit Act of 1870," I have the honor to lay before the Legislative Assembly the Treasurer's Statements of his Receipts and Disbursements of Public Moneys within the year 1885, together with the following Report and Explanatory Statements. The Abstracts were received for audit on the 29th of March; were returned to the Treasury for necessary corrections and suggested emendations on the 31st of May; and were received back, amended in the particulars required, on the 5th instant.
- 2. The same method of analysis as that employed for the past two years will afford a ready means of comparing the results of the year's transactions with those of 1883 and 1884 as a whole, and as distributed under the three principal Divisions of the Public Account.

- 7. It thus appears that although the liabilities stated in last Report have only been reduced by £272,188 10s. 4d., yet it is most likely that the greater part of the balance still retained will be written off; but under the system of Appropriation recommended for adoption in my Report on the Accounts of 1883, the Finance Accounts would not be embarrassed in this way by Appropriation Liabilities to an undefined extent for past years.
- 8. The above figures show a nominal deficiency in Ways and Means of £1,553,829 19s. 5d., or an increase of £725,386 8s. 6d. over the corresponding deficiency at the close of 1884, but the extent to which the nominal may become real liabilities is so uncertain as to render it next to impossible to arrive at results which can be considered satisfactory. While the Statements of Liabilities are based upon the sums actually appropriated or sanctioned by Act of Parliament, many of those sums are found to be either very insufficient to meet the expense of the Services for which they have been set apart or to be much in excess of actual requirements. This is doubtless due in a great measure to a want of sufficient care and foresight in preparing the Estimates of Expenditure. But, however that may be, and whether the actual expenses of the Public Service be covered or not by Parliamentary Appropriation, the actual Revenue of the year forms the limit of its Whatever payments therefore have to be made for the Services of a year over and above its Revenue must necessarily become a liability upon the growing Revenue of the following year, and such liability can only begin to accrue upon the occurrence of an actual overdraft.
- 9. According to the Account Current at page 16, there is shown a balance at the credit of the Revenue Account of £2,900 3s. This balance is exclusive on the one hand of the whole of the advances to the Trust Fund for the Treasurer's Advance Account to the 31st December, £500,000, and of some smaller issues on account to the amount of £4,624 4s. 1d., which may be taken as likely to become permanent charges, and on the other hand excludes all payments in London subsequently to the 30th September, which fall to be adjusted in the current year. The amount of the unadjusted London payments chargeable to the Revenue Account is found to be £190,763 6s. 11d., and Receipts to be credited, £776 7s. There was therefore at the 31st December upon the joint Revenue Account in Sydney and London a cash overdraft of £187,086 16s. 11d. which represents a realized deficiency at that date in the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and which can only be met out of the current Revenue from whatever source arising.
- 10. All other subsequent payments required to be made for services actually performed or contracted for to 31st December, 1885, must of course be considered as an addition to the overdraft, and with it to constitute the real deficiency in the Revenue at that date. There is, however, one exception, namely, that all votes to which the condition "irrespective of date of claims" is attached are liable only for payments to 31st December, and hence all outstanding payments under such votes are payable after that date out of the corresponding votes of the succeeding year to which the same condition is attached. If this were strictly attended to a considerable difference would appear in the number and amounts of balances retained for expenditure and probably in the Supplementary Estimates.

11. The excessive balances at the credit of the Revenue which have since the close of 1878 been treated as a surplus Revenue Account being now practically exhausted, a fitting opportunity is afforded of showing, in an abstract form, the operations by which those balances have been arrived at and disposed of. 12. The expenses under the Rabbit Nuisance Act having exceeded the assessment, collected under section 19, a portion of the vote taken under item No. 518 of the "Appropriation Act of 1885," £58,072, and the whole of item No. 523, £30,000, have been transferred to the credit of the Rabbit Account, under which, as one of the Special Deposit Accounts, the actual expenditure is recorded. By that arrangement the cost of the Rabbit extermination service appears twice in these Statements to the extent of £88,072. A similar double charge appears in the Statements of 1884 to the amount of £40,000. These two transfers from the Consolidated Revenue Fund show that the Rabbit Account has become indebted to the Revenue Account in a sum of £128,072. In addition to this the Treasurer's Advance Account was drawn upon to the extent of £8,188 18s. 10d. at 31st December, but why this was done is not clear, seeing that there still remained a balance of £46,260 on the vote No. 518 above quoted, besides an apparent cash balance in the Trust Fund of £1,298 17s. 2d. (Vide page 93.)

- 13. The Annual Amount for 1885 of £3,500 provided for Pensions to Superannuation Officers, under Schedule B to the Constitution Act, appears charged in full to the Revenue Account at page 39. It is, however, a transfer only to the Civil Service Superannuation Account where the actual Pensions heretofore paid direct from the Schedule B Fund have since been charged. This procedure was initiated by a temporary issue on the 31st January, 1885, of £3,500 from the Treasurer's Advance Account.
- 14. Upon application being made subsequently for my certificate that the sum was legally available for recoup from the Revenue to the Advance Account, I had considerable doubt as to complying with it for it did not appear to me that it could have been intended to make a transfer of more than the unappropriated balance of the Account in question, and then of course only when it could be ascertained at the end of each year. I did not therefore feel justified in certifying the necessary instrument for the purpose. It seemed unreasonable while the greater portion of the Schedule B Fund was under liability to pay old outstanding Pensions that it should be transferred at once and in globo, thus involving the charge upon the Revenue of 4 per cent. upon the daily balance unexpended of the same and compound interest at every half-year in addition.
- 15. A reference was made accordingly to the Attorney-General for his opinion as to the interpretation of the 53rd section of the Civil Service Act, so far as relates to the point raised. Almost at the same time the Treasury made a similar reference, suggesting that the reason for the transfer was the intention of the Act to make one Pension Account. The opinion of the Attorney-General, given in identical terms upon both references, having overruled my objections, I had no alternative but to give the required certificate. The correspondence is given in Appendix C No. 1, to which special attention is invited.
- 16. A transfer was also made in January of the whole amount of £20,000 granted for 1885 (being the first of five annual grants of a like amount) as an endowment out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the "Civil Service Superannuation Account," for the express purpose of securing to it a whole year's interest at 4 per cent. as apparently provided by section 51 of the Civil Service Act. The effect

effect of this procedure was to saddle the Revenue Account not only with interest at 4 per cent. for the whole year, but no portion of the endowment having been required for expenditure, with interest at 31st December upon the interest credited to the Fund at 30th June, and with compound interest so on at every half-year until drawn upon. Whether or not it was really contemplated that the Revenue should pay interest upon its own endowment and upon the Schedule B Fund, it appeared to me an improvident arrangement to issue the whole amount at the commencement of the year, and that unless actually required for the purposes it was supposed to provide, the claim of the Superannuation Account to the endowment would have been sufficiently met by a transfer being made at the close instead of the commencement of each year, thus saving to the Revenue upwards of £800. At any rate there would appear no sufficient reason why the payment of the endowment should not be made, as in other cases, in periodical instalments, distributed over the year; and a letter was addressed to the Treasury in December, 1885, suggesting the adoption of that course in future, on the ground that grants of this nature are authorised out of the Revenue of each year as a whole, and not therefore properly due until the accruing Revenue has provided the means in whole or in part for meeting them, and that the Public Account suffers in the way of interest whenever a payment is made in anticipation of a date when it becomes fairly due.

17. The Treasury submitted the matter for the opinion of the Attorney-General, who advised that the words "every year," in section 53 of the Civil Service Act, should be construed as "at the commencement of every year," and accordingly the second issue of £20,000 was made on the 4th March, 1886. The correspondence is given in Appendix C, No. 2. It will be observed that the objection indicated in the preceding paragraph has not been met, and that, notwithstanding the interpretation put upon the clause by Mr. Attorney-General Simpson, I consider it was open to the Treasurer, as a matter of Finance, to have dealt with the issue of the endowment in such a manner as not to give the Superannuation Account an apparently undue advantage as against the Revenue.

18. The additions for 1885 to the salaries of classified Officers, under section 3 of the Civil Service Act, so far as actually paid to the 31st December, are included under the respective Services where they occur, as they could not conveniently be stated separately. The amount placed to the credit of the Departmental Votes for the purpose was in all £56,123, for which a formal Minute was passed by the Governor in Council in the month of August. The distribution of that sum to the various Services is given in Appendix A, and more in detail with the Supplementary Estimates for 1885.

19. At page 51 will be found an item of £1,418 11s. 8d. as expenses under the Civil Service Act, 48 Victoria, No. 24. This sum consists of £499 9s. 2d., fees to the Board, and for salaries and contingencies, £919 2s. 6d. Finding no appropriation in the Act for any "expenses"—except the fees to the Civil Service Board, which are fixed by section 14 at £500 annually, and payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund—the salaries and contingencies paid therefrom were disallowed. The expenditure was, it appears, assumed to have been covered by an entry of £1,500 as estimated expenses of the Civil Service Act in the general abstract of the Estimates of Expenditure for 1885, but no such sum is included in any Act of Appropriation. The payment of the salaries and other expenses was, however, continued out of the Treasurer's Advance Account to the amount of £928 8s. 11d., making a total sum paid of £1,847 11s. 5d. without Parliamentary sanction.

20. It seems to me, however, that these expenses of management over and above the fees to the Board may not improperly be made a charge on the Superannuation Account, the opening words of section 53, "for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Act" seeming to imply as much.

The annual expense incurred so far is estimated at £1,875, which is virtually a further endowment of the Pension Fund, if it is to be ultimately paid by the revenue, a course inconsistent with the limitation of the specific endowment to £20,000 for five years. It may be right also to call attention to the income derived by the Pension Fund from the half-yearly addition to it of 4 per cent. interest, which already exceeds in amount the expense of management.

- 21. The sums of £100 each, which appear under Schedule C for the service of 1882 and 1883, and corresponding payments included in the same account as for 1884 and 1885, represent an allowance for those years to the Bishop of Goulburn, which had been previously paid from the Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue—the charge arising out of the death in 1882 of the late Bishop of Sydney. The admission of these claims on the Public Funds was strongly contested, the issue turning mainly on the point whether upon the Act, 26 Victoria No. 19, coming into force, the allowance of £100 per annum was at that date a liability under it. The correspondence was at length submitted by the Treasury to the Attorney-General, whose opinion was given in favour of the claim being recognised, but on grounds different from those on which it had been resisted. The Papers given in Appendix C, No. 3, fully explain this peculiar case.
- 22. The votes out of the Surplus Revenue Account, No. 575, 1881, and No. 900, 1883, for £100,000 each, for the purchase of lands set apart as places for public recreation, having now been all but expended, Schedules showing the particulars of the expenditure, as required by the terms of the votes, are now given in Appendix D Nos. 1 and 2.
- 23. In the same Appendix D No. 3 will be found an abstract of the payments made in connection with the Soudan Expedition, so far as they can be readily classified, and explanatory of the item £121,630 9s. 7d. under that head, at page 41.
- 24. The Treasurer's Advance Votes for 1883 and 1884 (together £250,000) should, in terms of the Appropriation, have been replaced to the Revenue Account not later than the 31st December, 1884, and the 31st December, 1885, respectively. The great bulk of the payments made from these Advance Votes require to be covered by Supplementary Votes, and the non-adjustment of them within the proper time is doubtless to be accounted for by the absence of any General Parliamentary Appropriation since the Act of 1885, passed in November, 1884. The Advance Vote for 1885, £100,000, and the unauthorized additions to it of £150,000 in November and December, raised the total advance to be accounted for by the Colonial Treasurer to the amount of £500,000 at the close of the year. Further remarks upon this anomalous condition of the Treasurer's Advance Votes will be found under Trust Funds, where the transactions are placed.
- 25. Against the vote of £10,000, "Towards buildings for the residence of His Excellency the Governor," taken in the Surplus Revenue Estimates for 1883, item No. 924, there will be found charged in 1884 £1,000, and in 1885 £1,942 18s. 4d. (page 54). These sums were for "alterations" to the residence purchased at Sutton Forest in 1882, £2,112 11s. 10d.; and for "furniture" for the same, £830 6s. 6d.

The papers seem to show that the "alterations" carried out would render unnecessary the immediate erection of new buildings, but, if so, a vote should have been obtained for the cost, and the vote 924 cancelled.

26. The expense of furniture is however quite outside the terms of that vote, and has been disallowed as a charge against it. A special tender was accepted in 1884 for the supply of certain furniture to the amount of £1,008 8s. The first instalment under that contract—£500—was paid from the "Advance Vote" in 1884, showing that it was understood to be an improper charge against the Building Vote, and is now included in the Supplementary Estimates yet to be voted. The second instalment of £508 8s., with a further payment of £321 18s. 6d. for "extras," makes up the £830 6s. 6d. referred to above, and which requires to be covered by the sanction of a further Supplementary Vote.

THE TRUST FUNDS ACCOUNT.

27. The Trust Funds again show a small expansion in the balances at their joint credit of £88,571 11s. 9d. upon receipts, or rather receipts and credits, during the year, to the amount of £3,964,049 18s.—payments and transfers having been made of £3,875,478 6s. 3d. for the same period.

The total credits at the 31st of December were £2,246,153 15s. 5d., of which £1,441,394 2s. 1d. belonged to the Government Savings' Bank.

28. The united accounts of the Police Reward and Police Superannuation Funds show an improved credit cash balance of £5,553 13s. 3d. on the year's operations, due however to the Police Reward Fund alone. The annual pension charge at 31st December, 1884, was £9,902. Twelve new pensions having been granted to the amount of £1,358 6s. and fourteen pensions at the total annual rate of £1,029 13s. 4d. having fallen in, the year closed with an authorised pension rate payable from both funds of £10,230 12s. 8d., showing an increased annual rate of £328 12s. 8d.

29. The Civil Service Superannuation Account (page 81) shows a credit cash balance of £70,455 10s. 8d., but the statement being merely a cash account requires a supplement to show the financial results of the fund for the year, which on this occasion it may be useful to give. In the first place the 4 per cent. deductions from salaries for 1885 have to this date amounted to £58,854 15s. 1d., of which £8,360 14s. 11d. were credited after the close of the year, and the addition of 4 per cent. to the credit balance on 31st December, under section 54 of the Civil Service Act, namely, £1,142 9s. 11d., was deferred till January.

30. On the disbursement side of the account there requires to be added the balance of pensions due under Schedule B, £472 7s. 8d., and under the Act £52 4s. 5d. With these supplementary items and a surcharge recovered of £7, the credit balance will be increased from £70,455 10s. 8d. to £79,441 3s. 5d. Only four pensions were sanctioned during 1885, constituting an annual rate charge of £626 14s. 5d., and eleven gratuities to the aggregate amount of £1,415 13s. 4d. Deducting these two sums from the contributions by officers of the Civil Service, there remains a balance on their contributions alone of £56,812 7s. 4d., a sum nearly equal to six times the annual average contributions of 4 per cent. under the repealed Act 27 Victoria No. 11 from 1864 to 1873, and with the remainder of the balance, arising from the endowment by the Consolidated Revenue Fund and interest, considerably more than equal to the whole amount of pensions and gratuities paid under the old Act for the first five years of its life.

As already suggested under paragraph 19, it seems to me this fund ought to be charged with the expense of its administration, and further, that the accumulating balance should be invested towards meeting the half-yearly additions of 4 per cent. under section 54.

THE TREASURER'S ADVANCE ACCOUNT.

- 31. The Account of the Treasurer's Advance Votes (page 93) is shown to have had on the 1st January, 1885, a balance at its credit of £103,004 18s. 5d. The whole of that sum was, however, then due for repayment to the Consolidated Revenue Fund, together with £146,995 1s. 7d. expended under the Advance Votes of 1883 and 1884, but not then adjusted either by cash or votes, making a total sum of £250,000 really at the debit of this Account at the commencement of the year.
- 32. The vote for 1885 of £100,000 was transferred to the Trust Fund on the 15th January, raising the Treasurer's liability to £350,000. The Supplementary Estimates laid before the Legislative Assembly on the 11th December not having become appropriations by the end of that month, the ordinary means were unfortunately wanting for fulfilling, at that date, the terms on which the advance votes were granted.
- 33. The whole of the money which had been legitimately placed at the Treasurer's disposal for emergencies had become exhausted by the end of October, and the pressure for the settlement of claims then unpaid, but unprovided for, appears to have become so great that no less than £150,000 were withdrawn from the Revenue to supplement the Treasurer's Special Advance without Parliamentary sanction, and of course without the warrant of the Governor. By this means further drafts were made on the Public Account by the end of the year in anticipation of Supplementary Appropriations to the amount of £112,685 16s. 7d., and a balance shewn as at the credit of the advance vote of £37,622 6s. 7d. This money, however, from the nature of the case legitimately belonged to the Revenue although by the Treasury Accounts standing technically as Trust Money.
- 34. These illegal drafts upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund, together with two further sums of £50,000 and £75,000 similarly drawn in January, 1886, have already been brought under the notice of the Legislative Assembly by my letter of 27th January last, but this report would hardly be complete without the correspondence being attached to it, including additional Minutes of the Proceedings of the Governor in Council explanatory of the draft of £50,000 on the 30th December, 1885, and also of the last draft quoted of £75,000.
- 35. On receipt of the Executive Council Minutes Nos. 85/41, 85/48, 85/56, 86/1, and 86/2, the Colonial Treasurer was informed that the transactions being outside of any appropriation of Parliament must necessarily be disallowed in his Accounts, and further, that all payments made out of such illegal transfers or out of any recoups of such payments that might not at the time be covered by a statutory appropriation would, as a matter of course, be likewise disallowed.
- 36. In regard to the transfer of £75,000 on the 11th January it will be seen that it was made exclusively for meeting the wages of the Railway and Tramway employès. At the date of the receipt of the Executive Council minute referring to it, namely, the 4th February, the Temporary Supply Act for the Services of January had been passed, and in intimating to the Treasurer, as before, that the transactions

transactions must be disallowed, it was pointed out that the irregularity should so far be corrected as to at once replace the £75,000 to the credit of the Revenue out of the Supply Act. Only £59,253 6s. 1d. were actually paid for Railway Service, and that sum was in March charged to the Supply Act of January, but made a "credit" to Treasurer's Advance Account 1886; thus, instead of replacing to the Revenue the whole amount of £75,000 as suggested, the indebtedness of the Advance Vote Account was actually increased by £59,253 6s. 1d. This credit, however, is not legitimately available for reissue except to the Revenue.

- 37. It may be as well at this point to explain that hitherto the Annual Advance Vote has been transferred to a Trust Account to be operated upon as a cash credit for such time as it was not due for adjustment with the Revenue. The terms of the votes giving a full year after the year of appropriation as the extreme date for adjustment, to afford time for obtaining Supplementary Votes and other means of liquidation, all sums that were recovered after next year's vote had become available were placed to the credit of the Trust Fund as a whole instead of the year's vote out of which the recovered payments had been made. This practically gave the Treasurer always two years' votes to operate upon and rendered adjustment difficult, if not impossible, at the proper time. Considering that on the granting of a new vote the previous one should cease to be treated as an open Cash Credit Account, I have declined to allow any credit by way of recoveries on account of previous votes, except to the Revenue, and consequently have disallowed them as available for reissue in continuance of the cash credit.
- 38. The fact of there appearing a credit balance on this Account when it was admittedly overdrawn shows that the unauthorised drafts should have more properly been placed to an Account apart from the legitimate transactions under the Treasurer's Advance Account proper, and should have included only such sums as had actually been irregularly paid.
- 39. A Statement has been prepared in abstract showing the unadjusted drafts upon the advance votes, and the drafts improperly made upon the Revenue, under the various heads of Service to the end of the year, and has been placed as Appendix F. A further Statement has been prepared, and included in the same Appendix, of similar drafts during the current year, in anticipation of the Accounts of 1886, as they formed part of the same series of irregularities, and may conveniently be brought under notice now, in view of any action which the Legislative Assembly may take in the matter. A glance at this latter Statement, and at the outer column of the former one, will serve to indicate the nature and amount of the claims which were considered to have been of such an urgent character as to justify the violation of law in drawing upon the Revenue to meet them, without Parliamentary sanction.
- 40. The total credits being shown as £607,476 14s. 2d., and the disbursements as £569,854 7s. 7d. in lump sums, the Account affords no information as to the nature of the transactions which, from their peculiar character, as well as from their considerable amount, ought more properly to be shown in the form of a detailed Account Current.
- 41. In my Report on the Accounts of 1884 (page 119) I ventured to submit that the advance vote should be put on a different footing, and I would now very respectfully again invite the attention of the Legislative Assembly to the suggestions therein made.

- 42. It may be proper here to remark that a loyal observance of the sections 10 to 15 of the "Audit Act of 1870," especially of section 13, would effectually prevent, as was intended, any such unauthorised dealings with the Public Account, as the unprecedented transactions already referred to in connection with the advance votes. But so long as the Colonial Treasurer is in a position to exercise sole control over the Public Account, and command the obedience of the Banks keeping the same, there is no effectual check against its being employed for purposes beyond the sanction of Parliament. Any change, therefore, that may be made in the mode of providing for unforeseen expenditure, should be accompanied by definitions and restrictions such as to limit the provision to cases of a really emergent character.
- 43. The advance vote has been regarded as a Reserve Fund, to be drawn upon at pleasure for additions to the staff of existing establishments, excesses of contracts over sums voted for Public Works, deficiencies in votes for ordinary services, which are already largely provided for by the 18th section of the Audit Act, and a great variety of other matters (foreign to the original purposes of the votes) many of which involve a permanent addition to the Annual Expenditure of the Colony, and very many of which it is believed might readily wait for the proper sanction before the expense was incurred or paid. It may not be too much to say that the too facile use which has been made of the Treasurer's Advance Vote is largely responsible for the present state of the Finance Accounts.

GENERAL LOANS ACCOUNT.

44. The new or fifth Loan of £5,500,000, negotiated in October, 1885, is ascertained to have realized in gross £5,042,041 3s., or at a rate of £91 13s. $5\frac{3}{4}$ d. per cent., but deducting the Bank commission, brokerage, and miscellaneous charges, £60,326 19s. 8d., and £34,375, commutation of stamp duty, the net proceeds available for expenditure under appropriations were £4,947,339 3s. 4d., or at a net realized rate of £89 19s. $0\frac{1}{2}$ d. per cent., which gives an interest rate of £3 17s. 10d. instead of the nominal one of £3 10s.

The proceedings connected with the inscription of this fifth Loan as well as of the previous (fourth) Loan in October, 1884, are explained in the third Report presented to Parliament in January last, under the Inscribed Stock Act of 1883, 46 Victoria No. 12.

45. The particulars of the results of the fourth Loan are given in paragraph 39 of my Report on the Accounts of 1884, and at page 96 of the present Accounts.

The credit of the proceeds of the fourth Loan, negotiated in October, 1884, £5,066,648 13s. 6d., and of £1,250,000 on account of the fifth Loan, negotiated in October, 1885, making together a sum of £6,316,648 13s. 6d., extinguished the overdraft of £3,664,704 0s. 3d. on the General Loans Account at 31st December, 1884; but the further payments charged as for authorised Loan Services during 1885 having been £3,883,822 5s. 8d., the year closed with a balance still to the nominal debit of this account of £1,231,877 11s. 10d.

If, however, the transactions in London up to the 31st December, 1885, which had not at that date been adjusted in the Sydney Accounts, be now added, the balance will stand thus, namely,—

These sums are in addition to those referred to as disallowed in the Accounts of 1884, viz.:—Railway Wallerawang to Mudgee, £16,737 9s.; Albury to the Murray, £816 17s. 7d.

- 47. The Treasurer's Advance Λccount has also been utilized to the extent of £38,658 0s. 9d. for sundry Loan Services in anticipation of future provision. (*Vide Appendix* F.) This sum, however, includes a moiety of the cost of the Railway Bridge at Albury, which has to be recovered from the Government of Victoria, and amounts to £16,259 19s. 6d.
- 48. By the addition of the Loan of October, 1884, £5,500,000, brought to credit in 1885, and a further reduction in the Million Loan of 1867, £37,700, the Public Debt has been raised to £30,064,259 9s. 2d. To complete the amount appropriated for Loan Services there is still to be raised exclusively of the Loan of last October, which has been credited this year, a sum of £14,266,135 1s. 11d. The unexpended balances of Appropriations at 31st December amounted to £16,731,596 13s. 5d. together with a debt to the Public Account of £1,231,877 11s. 10d.
- 49. The total annual charge for interest has been raised correspondingly to £1,261,681 1s. 8d., or a net increase of £190,615. The new interest, however, commenced to run from 1st October, 1884, but being payable half-yearly on the 1st April and 1st October a year's interest only is chargeable to the year's Revenue. The same being the case with the following Loan of October, 1885, the interest on it will fall to be added to the liability of the current year.
- 50. It should be remarked here that as the Accounts are presented, and since the recent Loans have been taken in the form of Inscribed Stock at the Bank of England, the interest on the new Loans appears as always placed in full in the hands of the Bank of England before the close of the half-year for which it falls due. The Public Account is thus always charged, as it ought to be, with this primary liability to the public creditor at the time when it matures, but the same provision is not made to meet the interest on the old Debenture Loans, hence there is always more or less of an outstanding liability in regard to it, the coupons for interest being

only paid as they are presented. This difference in procedure unnecessarily complicates the interest Account which ought certainly to be dealt with uniformly by an actual transfer of the whole amount of interest, known to be due for each half-year, on or before the 30th June and 31st December, as is now done with the interest on the Inscribed Stock Debt only.

51. The distribution of the Public Debt at 31st December, 1885, among the Services for which it has been incurred, together with the interest accruing thereupon from 1st January, 1886, so far as can be readily computed is as follows, viz.:—

As a set-off against this charge there was received as interest on Deposits with the Banks a sum of £26,395 10s. 9d., which consists of interest on the daily credit balances £17,383 9s. 4d., and interest on Special Fixed Deposits £9,012 1s. 5d. This latter source of income has, however, now ceased, the Special Deposits of Surplus Loans and Revenue which commenced to be made in 1875 having now been all withdrawn, the balance of £2,277 remaining at 31st December last having been retransferred from the Australian Joint Stock Bank to the Public Account on the 6th January of this year.

THE

THE RAILWAY RECEIPTS.

- 53. The cash receipts at the Treasury from Railway and Tramway Traffic in 1885 are stated at page 18 to be £2,492,690 14s. 1d.; of this amount the sum of £19,585 3s. 7d. was received on account of traffic beyond Albury, and has been repaid to the Government of Victoria. The balance, £2,473,105 10s. 6d., shows an increase on the corresponding receipts of 1884 of £186,826 18s. 4d.
- 54. The contributions towards the receipts from funds at the disposal of the Government were in all £177,125 ls., as detailed in Appendix G, and the amounts are here set in comparison with the like figures for the two previous years.

- 55. It may be as well to state again here that the figures given represent only the cash actually credited at the Treasury within the year, either by direct remittance, or by transfers from funds chargeable with the expense of services rendered on their behalf by the Railway Department. While these credits constitute the realized earnings and ought in strictness to be made the only basis of calculations respecting the relations between the income and expenditure, the nominal earnings as recorded in the Commissioner's Accounts for any one year never agree with the Treasury credits within the same period. The only check upon these latter credits consists in the monthly attested Accounts of Receipts furnished by the Commissioner for Railways under the Audit Act, the detailed audit of the daily remittances to the Treasury making up the declared monthly totals being still carried on by the Commissioner's own Auditors.
- 56. The special review audit by the Department has, as formerly explained, become limited to a local inspection of the accounts of the station-masters. This has been and is still being carried out along the whole of the lines of railway opened for traffic, and appears to be very well worth the time and money expended upon it.
- 57. The principal points which have given rise to queries and correspondence are the following, namely :—

Rates of tolls fixed without previous sanction of the Governor and Executive Council.

Rebates and other concessions not provided for by published rates.

Variations in rates from those stated in the rate books.

Ledger or credit accounts opened with and without bonds.

Outstanding accounts of earnings.

Cash balances and stock of tickets at date of inspection.

58. In a number of cases the authority of the Governor and Executive Council has been obtained upon its being shown to be required by the terms of the 100th section of the Railways Act. In others this has not yet been supplied, as for instance, for the issue of season tickets to Railway employés at half rates. The authority was asked for by query in October, 1884, a copy of which, together with the correspondence arising out of it, has been placed as Appendix H, to which special attention is invited, as it will serve to show exactly the position in which the question of authority stands respecting interference in any way with the rates of tolls established by the Governor and Council under the provisions of the 100th section of the Railway Act.

In the same Appendix will be found some further information, consisting of extracts from a report recently furnished to me by the Inspecting Officer-in-Charge as to the nature and position of the audit so far as applied by this Department to the Railway Receipts.

- 59. The importance of an effective audit of this branch of the Revenue, derived as it is through so many channels and under so many varying circumstances, cannot be too highly estimated. It is of greater importance that efficient arrangements be made for the due collection and registration of the receipts. If those arrangements be devised to provide so far as possible for checks and counter checks within the collecting and recording offices of the Railway Department, an effective basis is provided for an external and independent audit by whomsoever such an audit may be applied. It has already been urged that an audit forming virtually a part of the collecting and recording work of the Commissioner for Railways, and thus necessarily under his own control, cannot be deemed to be an audit at all in the ordinary acceptation of the term, nor as being equivalent to or rendering unnecessary an examination ab extra on the part of the public into transactions in which they are so largely interested as the Railway Revenue.
- 60. If any change be made in the administration of the Railway Department, as appears to be contemplated, it is most desirable that the opportunity should be taken advantage of for the establishment upon a satisfactory basis of an effective and independent audit of the Railway receipts.

THE PUBLIC BANK ACCOUNT.

- 61. The agreement with the Bank of New South Wales for the conduct of the Government Banking Business was brought to a termination on the 5th January, 1885, and a new arrangement made, by which the Public Account was distributed among nine of the Banking Companies carrying on business in the Colony and through Branches or Agencies in London. A copy of the Minute of the Executive Council authorising the change has already appeared in the Votes and Proceedings of the Legislative Assembly, under date 11th September, 1885, together with a copy of the Agreement between the Government and the nine Associated Banks, showing the terms and conditions on which the Government Business was to be conducted by them, commencing from the 6th January, 1885.
- 62. The new arrangement involves a considerable multiplication of the Banksheets required to be supplied daily by the Banks, under section 19 of the Audit Act; and the daily transactions and general balance for audit purposes have now to be gathered from nine separate Accounts, instead of from one Account, as formerly. The London Bank-sheets are forwarded monthly only, but they show the daily transactions, as in the Sydney Accounts.
- 63. In addition to the nine Banks or Agencies in London representing the Associated Banks in the Colony, the London and Westminster Bank acts as General Banker in London for all, and furnishes a separate Account Current, showing the intromissions with the nine Banking Institutions which supply the funds for carrying on the Λccount.
- 64. The Bank of England of course keeps the Account of the proceeds of Loans negotiated and of the moneys placed in its hands for meeting the interest payable half-yearly on the Inscribed Stock Loans; but the Accounts Current are received in a very abstract form, and do not admit of check in detail.
- 65. At the date of the new Banking Agreement the Public Λ ccount with the Bank of New South Wales was considerably overdrawn, and a settlement of the balances

balances then due with other claims by the Bank against the Government have only so far been partially arranged for pursuant to an action in the Supreme Court, it being understood that there is still a balance claimed by the Bank, with of course interest accruing thereupon.

MISCELLANEOUS.

- 66. The Certificates of Discharge to the Treasurer have this year been accompanied by an unusually large amount of disallowances, to which reference has in some items already been made, but an abstract of the particulars is given in Appendix I.
- 67. The Mint Bullion Accounts and the Savings' Bank Accounts have been subjected to the usual review, and have been certified to correspond with the books and documents on which they were framed.
- 68. The following Statements and Returns in continuation of those given in former years are herewith submitted, namely,—
 - Statements of Advances to Public Officers and Trustees of Roads, &c., awaiting adjustment. (Appendix J.)
 - Statement of Surcharges raised and recovered upon the Expenditure and Revenue Accounts. (Appendix K.)
 - Statement of authorities granted by the Governor and Executive Council under the 18th section of the Audit Act. (Appendix L.)
 - Statement of Authorities granted by the Governor and Executive Council in relief of Public Accountants under sections 30 and 31 of the Audit Act. (Appendix M.)
 - Statements of Receipts and Disbursements in connection with the Registration of Brands and the Public Abattoirs Funds. (Appendix N.)
- 69. The following cases of default have come under notice during the year, viz.:—
 - Mr. J. H. Price, Mining Registrar, Windeyer, was convicted of embezzlement of a sum of £2, with a sentence of imprisonment for twelve months. It is understood that the defalcations in this case were considerably more, but the exact amount has not been ascertained.
 - Mr. J. Y. Smedley, Warden's Clerk and Mining Registrar, Ironbarks (Stuart Town), was convicted of embezzlement, with a sentence of imprisonment for twelve months. The Treasury reports that the amount of the defalcations cannot be exactly stated.
 - Constable Walsh, Acting Clerk of Petty Sessions at Dandaloo, was ascertained to be in default £5 10s., but as he absconded no prosecution was possible.
- 70. Subject to the foregoing observations, and to any further corrections of classification that may be necessary on the final adjustment of advances to Public Departments still outstanding, I consider that the Statements of Accounts now submitted correctly represent the Treasurer's Receipts and Disbursements within the year 1885.

Schedule B—£3,278 4s. 3d. Explanation is requested of this item, ½ of £3,500 having been already certified for viz., £291 13s. 4d. under instrument No. 16.

If it is intended to transfer this sum to the Civil Service Superannuation Account (as is surmised) the Auditor-General has considerable doubts as to whether any more than the balance unappropriated of the £3,500 should be at once transferred to that account, as it seems to him that the existing pensions chargeable to Schedule B should be paid as heretofore direct from the Schedule B Fund.

The Treasury, N.S.W., Sydney, 16 February, 1885.
UNDER the 53rd section of the Civil Service Act the sum £3,500 was transferred from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Superannuation Account, that being the amount annually appropriated under 52nd section of the Imperial Act, 18 and 19 Victoria, cap. 54, for Pensions to Superannuated Officers. This sum is subject, however, to the claims of such officers as are, or may become, entitled to be paid pensions

The Auditor-General declines to sign the warrant submitted to him for the purpose of this transfer, as he has considerable doubts as to whether any more than the balance unappropriated of the £3,500 should be transferred to the Superannuation Account, as it seems to him that the existing pensions chargeable to Schedule B should be paid, as heretofore, direct from Schedule B Fund.

The view taken of the matter by the Treasury Officers is, that the intention of Parliament was to have but one Superannuation Account, and that the mere transference of the £3,500 to the new account in no way lessened the legal claims against that sum.

Perhaps the opinion of the Hon. the Attorney-General might be sought on the question at issue.

Sir,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 28 February, 1885. I have the honor to enclose a case for the opinion of the Attorney-General as to the interpretation of part of section 53 of the "Civil Service Act of 1884."

It seems to me that the words "hereafter" and "subject to the claims of such officers as are * paid pensions out of such sum, and in the absence of any direction to pay the pensions referred to out of the Civil Service Superannuation Account," militate strongly against the transfer of the whole sum of £3,500 at once to an account unknown to the Constitution Act.

It seems to me also that it could never have been intended to saddle the Revenue with interest at 4 per cent. upon the unexpended balance of the £3,500, after transfer waiting the discharge of the liabilities proper to it, and already absorbing the greater portion of it.

I shall feel obliged by an early reply, as I am asked to certify a warrant for a transfer of the schedule B money in globo, which I do not feel justified in doing.

Case for the Opinion of the Attorney-General.

Section 53 of the "Civil Service Act, 1884."

THE pensions to Superannuated Officers, hitherto authorized to be paid from the £3,500 portion of Schedule B to the Constitution Act, are held by the Auditor-General to be still payable direct from the Schedule B Fund, section 53 of the "Civil Service Act of 1884" giving no authority apparently for the payment of such pensions from the Civil Service Superannuation Account, and the words "shall hereafter be payable," applied to the annual sum of £3,500, are held to refer to the whole sum only when free from existing liabilities, or only in proportion as those liabilities cease, that is to say, only to such portion of the Schedule B Fund payable to Her Majesty under section 49 of the Constitution Act, as may annually "revert to the Consolidated Revenue Fund" in terms of the Schedule.

The Treasury ask a warrant for the transfer of the whole sum of £3,500, provided by Schedule B to the Civil Service Superannuation Account. The opinion of the Attorney-General is requested as to whether the Auditor-General would be justified in certifying that the sum quoted is legally available and applicable to that purpose.

I THINK it is clear from section 53 of 48 Vic. No. 24, that the Civil Service Superannuation Account should be credited with the whole amount of £3,500 payable from the Consolidated Revenue Fund under section 52, 18 and 19 Vic. c. 54. This was manifestly intended by Parliament in order, I presume, to secure the object that there should be but a single fund for superannuation. The latter part of the section abundantly provides for the protection of all officers who have any title to be paid pensions out of the £3,500, so that no diminution of that sum to their prejudice could be made.

Referring to the transfer of £20,000 made on the 5th February last from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Superannuation Account under the Civil Service Act, I desire to state, for the information of the Colonial Treasurer, that I consider the transfer at that date to have been premature, and to have involved an excessive charge for interest at 4 per cent. upon the revenue in favour of the Superannuation Account.

It appears to me that payments of this nature are authorized out of the revenue of each year as a whole, and are not therefore properly due until the accruing revenue has provided the means in whole or in part for meeting them, or, in other words, that they should be distributed over the year in proper proportions. This seems all the more reasonable, inasmuch as the Public Account suffers in the way of interest whenever

a payment is made in anticipation of a date when it becomes fairly due.

The expression "every year" in reference to the transfer from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Superannuation Account, as provided by section 53 of the Civil Service Act, seems to me very strongly to support the view of a distribution over the whole year of the endowment of £20,000 (for five years), and could only be held as justifying a payment in full at the commencement of the year in case of claims under the Act becoming due to a larger amount than the balance available at the credit of the Superannuation Account. I have therefore the honor to suggest, for the consideration of the Colonial Treasurer, that the endowment of the Civil Service Superannuation Account for 1886 and future years be issued in equal quarterly proportions, commencing at the 31st March next, and I make this suggestion thus early to obviate an objection which I shall feel bound to take to a transfer of the whole amount being made as before I have, &c., E. A. RENNIE, immediately after the commencement of the year.

Minute Paper.

Subject:—Transfer of the second instalment of £20,000 to the Civil Service Superannuation Fund under the Act 48 Vic. No. 24.

The Treasury, 7 January, 1886. The 53rd section of the "Civil Service Act of 1884" authorizes the payment of £20,000 annually for five years as an endowment of the Civil Service Superannuation Fund. On the 13th January, 1885, I made a memorandum, suggesting the transfer of the endowment for that year, which the then Treasurer (Mr. Dibbs) approved. The transfer was duly made on the 5th February following. I attach for the Treasurer's information the papers connected with that transaction, from which it will be seen that the Auditor-General considered that the transfer ought to have been authorized by the Colonial Secretary, who is the officer charged with the administration of the Act. That authority was subsequently obtained. From a letter received from the Auditor-General, dated 21st December, 1885, herewith, it will be observed that he considers that the payment of these annual endowments of £20,000 should be made by quarterly instalments only. Why he takes this view it is difficult to understand, as the wording of the clause would lead rather to the supposition that it was the intention of the Legislature that a lump sum of £20,000 should be paid at the beginning of each year. By this means the Superannuation Fund would get the benefit of 4 per cent. on the amount for nearly a whole year.

The matter might be referred to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, whose authority for the transfer

seems necessary.

I AM of opinion without doubt that section 53 of the Civil Service Act should be construed as if the words "at the commencement of every year were in the section instead of merely the words 'every year."

It follows that the Auditor-General has—according to my view—fallen into an error in supposing that the payment of the £20,000 should be distributed over the year in proper proportions.

The provisions of section 54 almost conclusively show that my construction of the 53rd section is G.B.S., 3/2/86. correct.

Subject:—Payment of £100 per annum to the Bishop of Goulburn from Schedule C, in lieu of Church and School Estate.

In terms of a recent communication from the Audit Office the stipends heretofore paid to the Revs. Messrs. Ewing and King, of £200 each, from the Church and School Estate, are now paid from Schedule C, which (by reason of the death of the late Bishop of Sydney) is now largely in funds. The Colonial Treasurer would be glad to have the opinion of the Auditor-General whether the annual allowance to the Bishop of Goulburn—also a charge on the Church and School Estate—might not in like manner be paid from Schedule C.

Treasury Minute, 82-67—Payment of £100 to the Bishop of Goulburn from Schedule C.

THE payment of the annual allowance of £100 to the Bishop of Goulburn is in a different position to the payment of the stipends of the Revs. Messrs. Ewing and King. These clergymen had fulfilled the necessary payment of the superior of the Revs. Messis. Ewing and King. These dergymen had further the necessary conditions, and were entitled to stipends under the provisions of the Church Act, and were paid from the Bishopthorpe Estate Fund by a circuitous process through the Clergy and School Estates Revenue Fund, under an arrangement proposed by the late Bishop of Sydney about the year 1859, and agreed to by the Government of the day. Their stipends were thus virtually paid from the Schedule C Fund, to the credit of which the Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue, over and above £500 a year, was always payable in reduction of the charge upon Schedule C for the Bishop of Sydney's stipend of the charge upon Schedule C for the Bishop of Sydney's stipend.

Strictly speaking, the stipend of the Bishop of Sydney was (as intended by the grant) payable direct from the Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue, and any balance short of £2,000 a year was the only amount really

payable at the Treasury from the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

The accompanying copy of authority shows that the allowance of £100 per annum was to be paid direct from the Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue from the date of consecration of the Bishop of Goulburn, on condition of its being in funds sufficient for that purpose.

The authority is dated 6th May, 1862, and the date of consecration was certified to be 25th March, 1863; and an Abstract of Allowance from that date to 30th June, 1864, = £126 17s. 7d., was paid at the Treasury on 29th July, 1864, from the Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue Fund Account, to which an equal sum—viz., £126 17s. 7d.—was immediately afterwards credited—viz., on 3rd August, 1864.

The annual allowance to the Bishop of Goulburn has since been paid direct from the Bishopthorpe

Estate Revenue (Trust) Account, and equal sums have been paid to the credit of that account by the Bishop

of Sydney from time to time as required.

These facts appear to show that the annual aid of £100 to the Bishop of Goulburn's stipend, paid all through from the Trust Account Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue, has no claim to be paid from Schedule C, and if claimed under the Act 26 Vic. No. 19, there are two grounds on which such claim is open to question. The first is that at the date of passing said Act the Bishop of Goulburn was not actually in receipt of a stipend, no payment having been due to him until 25th March, 1863, and no payment made until July, 1864, while the Act was gazetted on 20th December, 1862; and the second is that the Bishopthorpe Estate Revenue does not appear to come under the description of public funds or moneys involving a liability to a continuous of a stipped paid therefrom involving a liability, to a continuance of a stipend paid therefrom.

In reply, I beg to say that I have no fund from which this amount can be paid; and, further, that I was given to understand that the payment of stipend to the late Bishop of Sydney from Schedule C ceased on the 31st December, 1881, and from that date the stipend of the Bishop of Goulburn would be

paid out of the saving thus effected in the Church of England's share of that fund.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 17th ultimo (S. 129, 799 misc.), together with copy of the minute of the Auditor-General (28th September, 1882), upon the subject of

the payment of £100 per annum to the Bishop of Goulburn from Schedule C.

In this minute the Auditor-General states that the payment of the annual allowance of £100 to the Bishop of Goulburn is in a different position to the payment of the stipends of the Reverend Messrs. Ewing and King, inasmuch as these gentlemen had fulfilled the necessary conditions, and were entitled to stipends under the provisions of the Church Act. With reference to this I beg to draw your attention to the following extract, from the proceedings of the Executive Council, of the 12th January, 1853, with respect to the distribution of the Public Worship Fund:—

"(5.) The result of this distribution is shown in the table annexed, but it is understood that

the sum allotted to each communion is liable to be charged with special salaries to the superior clergy—in any case in which the Government and the head of the particular communion may concur in thinking the allowance of such special salary advisable."

The provisions of the Church Act relate to the granting of stipends to the parochial clergy, but do not

apply to stipends granted to the superior clergy.

The head of the denomination and the Governor and Executive Council having concurred in the granting of this stipend to the Bishop of Goulburn, in accordance with the terms of the minute above quoted, it does not appear that the Bishop's stipend is in a different position from that of any other duly authorized stipend.

The Auditor-General goes on to say that the stipends of the Reverend Messrs. Ewing and King were virtually paid from the Schedule C fund, to the credit of which the Bishopthorpe Estate revenue, over and above £500 a year, was always payable in reduction of the charge upon Schedule C for the

Bishop of Sydney's stipend.

The Auditor-General admits that the Bishopthorpe Estate revenue paid to the Treasury was "in reduction of the charge upon Schedule C," and that the stipends of Messrs. Ewing and King were virtually paid from Schedule C. This view has been adopted by the Treasurer, who has recognized the claims of these gentlement to a continuance of their stiplinest from Bishopthorpe but in precisely the

The Bishop of Goulburn's stipend was not paid direct from Bishopthorpe, but in precisely the same manner and from the same source as the stipends of Messrs. Ewing and King; and there does not appear to be any reason why the Bishop's stipend should be treated in a different manner to the stipends of the clergymen above referred to.

The money paid in from Bishopthorpe, being in reduction of the charge upon Schedule C, became public money, and the stipends paid therefrom have been treated by the Government as payments from

public funds. In support of this statement I beg to bring under your notice—

(1.) A return, ordered to be printed by the Legislative Assembly on the 15th September, 1870, in which it is stated that the Bishop of Goulburn is in receipt of £100 per annum, payable from Schedule C. A foot-note states that it is "contributed from Bishopthorpe Estate."

(2.) The Votes and Proceedings of the Legislative Assembly, 27th September, 1870, in which the then Premier is reported to have stated, in reply to a question by the late Mr. W. Forster, in reference to the stipends paid to the Bishop of Goulburn and Messrs. Ewing and King, that "the Schedule Fund for public worship having been relieved of the payment of a portion of the Bishop's stipend, these allowances were sanctioned in the usual way as a charge upon it."

The Auditor-General further expresses his opinion that if the stipend be claimed under the Act

26 Victoria No. 19 there are two grounds on which such claim is open to question.

With reference to the first objection, that the Bishop of Goulburn was not in receipt of a stipend at the date of the passing of the Act, I would observe that the Bishop became entitled to his stipend from the date of his consecration—25th March, 1863; and that the Act 26 Vic. No. 19 was reserved for the Queen's assent, and did not come into force until the 21st July, 1863.

The second objection, that the fund from which the Bishop's stipend has been paid does not appear to come under the description of public funds, has been dealt with in my remarks upon the former part

of the Auditor-General's minute.

I venture to submit that the facts above stated show that the Bishop of Goulburn was in receipt of a stipend of £100 per annum from public funds at the date of the Act 26 Vic. No. 19, and that he is entitled to such stipend so long as he officiates within the Colony.

Subject:—Treasury 83-1273. Payment of £100 per annum to the Bishop of Goulburn from Schedule C. In further explanation of this matter it will be proper to quote the authorities and state the action under them.

The Colonial Secretary's letter of 3rd September, 1856, guarantees the Bishop of Sydney a stipend of £2,000 per annum, to be charged in the first instance to the Church of England's share of the Public Worship Fund, but the net income derived from Bishopthorpe to go in diminution of the said guaranteed stipend, and that any saving thus effected on the Church of England's share of the Public Worship Fund

should be appropriated annually, as was the practice at that date, the arrangement to commence from the 1st January, 1857. At that date there were a number of stipends sanctioned under the Church Act, but could not be issued as the funds available were fully appropriated, the whole amount of £14,634 6s. 5d., forming the Church of England's share of the Public Worship Fund, being fully distributed, and including

the stipend of £1,500 hitherto paid from Schedule C.

In the year 1857 the Bishop paid in £966 13s. 4d. from Bishopthorpe, and that amount was distributed as follows:—Additions to the Bishop's stipend, £200 (the remaining £300 being then paid from a temporary increase vote); Rev. H. S. King, £200; Rev. T. C. Ewing, from 1st September, £66 13s. 4d.; Rev. J. Barnier, £200; Rev. T. Hayden, £100; Rev. G. F. McArthur, £50; Rev. J. S. Hassall, £50;

Rev. J. Barnier, £200; Rev. T. Hayden, £100; Rev. G. F. McArthur, £50; Rev. J. S. Hassail, £50; Rev. A. H. Stephen, £50; Rev. J. Gunther, £50.

The stipends of the Reverends Messrs. King and Ewing were distinctly authorised by the Colonial Secretary's letters of 24th December, 1857, and 12th January, 1858, "out of the saving of the Church of England's share of the Public Worship Fund arising from the revenue of the Bishopthorpe Estate."

Those stipends are therefore held to have been paid and payable from the Schedule C Fund up to the date of the Act 26 Victoria No. 19, 21st July, 1863, and from that date onward in terms of that law.

At that same date the whole amount of the Church of England's share of the Schedule C Fund, £14,624,65,5d, was being issued in payment of stipends previously authorised therefrom but it did not

£14,634 6s. 5d., was being issued in payment of stipends previously authorised therefrom, but it did not include any sum for the Bishop of Goulburn, and consequently no authority could have been given for it under the minute of 1853, quoted in the Registrar's memorandum. For the year 1863 the Bishop paid to the Treasury £900 from Bishopthorpe, which were applied to the payment of the Bishop's own extra stipend of £500 per annum, and of £400 for the stipends of Messrs. Ewing and King, as already ${\bf explained}.$

The authority for the issue of £100 to the Bishop of Goulburn, as addressed to the Bishop of Sydney, is dated 22nd March, 1862, and was communicated by the Colonial Secretary to the Treasury under date 6th May, 1862. The terms of it are "from the date of consecration of the Bishop of the proposed See, subject to the condition that the funds from the Bishopthorpe Estate, which may from time

proposed See, subject to the condition that the funds from the Bishopthorpe Estate, which may from time to time be paid into the Treasury, are equal to the amount required to meet this claim, as well as other charges authorized to be defrayed by the Government in consequence of such payments."

The Bishop of Goulburn was, it would appear, consecrated on 25th March, 1863, but no payment was made to him until 29th July, 1864, and then, in accordance with the authority, out of the Bishopthorpe Estate revenue. At that date no addition could be made to the charges on Schedule C, and as a matter of fact no payments have ever been made to the Bishop of Goulburn from the Schedule C Fund.

The Return quoted, of 15th September, 1870, prepared at the Treasury, is erroneous in showing the stipend of the Bishop of Goulburn as paid from Schedule C, and of the Reverend Messrs. Ewing and King as from Bishopthorpe, and consequently the replies of Mr. Cowper to questions upon said return are incorrect.

It should be added that since the death of the late Bishop, on 6th April, 1882, the Bishopthorpe revenue is no longer payable to the Treasury.

The question appears to resolve itself into one of law, namely, whether the payment of £126 17s. 7d. to the Bishop of Goulburn on the 29th July, 1864, as stipend from the 25th March, 1863, to 30th June, 1864, from the Bishopthorpe Estate revenue of 1864, constitutes a claim to a payment from the Public Funds in terms of the Act 26 Vic. No. 19 Funds in terms of the Act 26 Vic. No. 19.

Re payment of stipend-£100 per annum-to Bishop of Goulburn.

THERE is no doubt this is an extremely complicated case, and its difficulties are very much increased by the arrangement made in connection with the revenues of the Bishopthorpe Estate. I have come to the the arrangement made in connection with the revenues of the Bishopthorpe Estate. I have come to the conclusion that the condition on which the stipend of the Bishop of Sydney ceased to be paid out of public funds, that is when the revenues of Bishopthorpe reached the sum of £2,000, did not and ought not to affect the title of the Bishop of Goulburn to his £100. As far as the Bishop of Sydney was concerned his financial relations with the Government were to be regulated by the Bishopthorpe income, and the Treasury was to be relieved of contributions for his maintenance when the Bishopthorpe Estate gave him the sum which he was entitled to receive out of the public funds, to which, until that period arrived, the income of Bishopthorpe contributed. This being so, I cannot see how the Government, who were compolled to pay the Bishop of Goulburn his £100 a year while the Bishop of Sydney's income was partially income of Bishopthorpe contributed. This being so, I cannot see how the Government, who were compelled to pay the Bishop of Goulburn his £100 a year while the Bishop of Sydney's income was partially defrayed from the public Treasury, could be relieved from paying the former when no longer under any liability to pay the latter. It seems to me clear that the case of the Bishop of Goulburn precisely corresponds with those of the Revd. Messrs. King & Ewing, whose stipends are derived from the same source as that which contributed, and ought now to contribute the stipend of the Bishop of Goulburn. Holding these views I am of opinion that the Colonial Treasurer was not justified in ceasing to pay from the 1st January, 1882, the stipend of the Bishop of Goulburn on the grounds that on the 31st of December, 1881, it was found the income of Bishopthorpe had reached £2,000.

In consequence of the prorogation and subsequent dissolution of Parliament before any provision had-been made for the supplementary expenditure of 1885, it now becomes necessary to make some arrange-ment for the payment of claims on account of Services (principally Public Works), the votes for which have been found insufficient, pending Parliamentary authority being obtained.

The Treasurer's Advance Account being nearly exhausted by previous charges of a similar nature to those above alluded to, I would suggest, as a convenient way of meeting the present difficulty, that a sum of £50,000 be transferred from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Trust Fund, as a temporary advance on account of the Treasurer's Advance Account. When this transfer is made, then the claims referred to can be paid, as they arise out of that Account. This arrangement will obviate the necessity of asking the nine associated Banks to make advances on the personal guarantee of the Government, for which nine separate accounts would have to be opened.

As the Auditor-General could not grant a warrant for the transfer of the sum mentioned it would be advisable to have it made under the special approval of the Executive Council, whose minute should be forwarded to that officer for his information.

Sir, Referring to your letter of the 3rd January last, enclosing papers relating to season tickets granted to Railway employés at half rates, on the authority of the Minister for Works, and requesting that as, under the provisions of the 100th section of the Act 22 Vict., No. 19, the sanction of the Governor and the Executive Council is necessary for any departure from the published rates, I will obtain and furnish to your Department such authority in the case now under question, I have the honor to inform you that you are so far right that all rates and fares require the approval of the Governor and Executive Council, but as you put it in the Audit query (No. 383) of the 6th October last, this approval was to remedy a suggested departure from the provisions of the 100th section of the Railway Act in respect of partiality. If it were really a breach of the 100th section of the Act there is no power, not even the power of the Governor and Executive Council, which could heal the breach, or legalize

I need, however, hardly say, that there has been in this respect no departure from the provisions of the Act, and it is straining the Act, and placing a wrong construction upon its intent and meaning to contend otherwise.

There is nothing exceptional as regards the railways of this Colony in the provisions of this 100th section. The British Parliament has not conferred the right to charge tolls upon any Company in England without surrounding the concession with this condition; and if any Railway Company attempts any real breach of the provisions there are opportunities which are eagerly availed of to obtain a remedy; but making concessions to certain classes of people is not, as you and some other persons suppose, a departure from the terms of the section. The condition is governed by the words "under the same circumstances," and it would be only a breach of the provisions if a concession made to one section of a class were denied to another section of the class the conditions governing which were precisely the same. If, for instance, two theatrical parties were travelling (say), one to Bathurst and the other to Goulburn, and one was allowed a rebate of 20 per cent. on the fares, and the other was refused, that would be a breach of the provisions, although, to grant both Companies a rebate would not be a breach, notwithstanding the ordinary passenger is not allowed a rebate.

If the two Companies were travelling, one to Melbourne, and the other to Nyngan, and were reated differently, that would not be a breach, because the circumstances would not be the same.

If the theatrical company going to Melbourne did not get the rebate they might travel by sea at a cheaper rate; not so with the Company going to Nyngan—the railway must necessarily be their cheapest mode of transit, and they could not claim the concession merely because the Company going to Melbourne obtained it.

I quote the case of theatrical companies, because you have, on other papers, taken exception to our practice on the ground of its being a departure from the terms of the 100th section.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 8th July last, stating that in your opinion, the concession of 50 per cent. granted to cricketing teams and others is in conflict with clause 100 of the Railway Act, and to inform you that a clause similar to that quoted is contained in every English Railway Act, and yet the practice of the English companies is to carry theatrical companies, commercial travellers, and huntsmen and their horses, etc., at cheaper rates than those charged I have, &c to ordinary passengers. CHAS. A. GOODCHAP.

P.S.—I would draw the Auditor-General's attention to the words "under like circumstances," which govern the conditions of the 100th section referred to, and has been held by the Railway Commissioners of England to give a latitude to the English Companies in this respect which the clause, without these words, would not give.—C.A.G.

Department of Audit, 11 October, 1884. In reply to your letter of 4th instant, referring me to the English practice of carrying theatrical companies and others at lower rates than those charged to ordinary passengers, for answer to my request for a copy of the Minute of the Governor and Executive Council, allowing 50 per cent. discount on fares of cricketing and other teams, I have the honor to point out that whatever discretion may have been allowed to be exercised in varying authorised fixed rates under the interpretation quoted by you of the clause "under the (like) same circumstances" in English private Companies, it does not appear to me that it is open to you, as Commissioner for Railways, to exercise the like discretion, except under the express authority of the Governor and Executive Council, by whom the law directs the rates to be fixed to be fixed.

The proviso in the 100th section of the Railway Act, 22 Victoria No. 19, appears to me to be very explicit. The tolls, "all such tolls," are those specifically "determined upon by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council"; and "no reduction or advance in any such tolls shall be made either directly or indirectly in favor of or against any particular company or person travelling upon or using the railway.'

Except, therefore, differential rates be specifically included among those determined upon by the Governor and Executive Council, no such rates of tolls, so far as I am at present informed, can be recognised under any less authority, and I must therefore again ask you to furnish it in the cases under I have, &c., E. A. RENNIE. question.

Department of Audit, 24 July, 1885. Sir, I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 27th ultimo having special reference to season tickets granted to Railway employés at half rates, and in which you agree with me that the authority of the Governor and the Executive Council is required for all rates and fares. I conclude, therefore, that the requisite authority will be furnished to me in due time in satisfaction of my request

I desire to explain, however, that it was never my idea to ask for Executive sanction for any differential rate, which appeared to me to be a breach of the provisions of the 100th section of the Act as being a partial rate in favor of certain parties using the line under the same conditions, while others were debarred the advantage of such rate, because I am fully aware that the Governor and Executive Council could not grant such authority; and, so far as regards all questions bearing upon this 100th section which have formed the subject of communication to you, it will, I think, be seen that I have confined myself to a request for the sanction of the Executive for differential rates only, which authority you admit to be necessary and when supplied will of course be sufficient for my number you admit to be necessary and, when supplied, will of course be sufficient for my purpose.

In regard to the wording of the query which has given rise to your remarks, I fear that it has misled you. The use of the word "partial" had no reference to a discriminative rate among the parties to whom the concession was made, but that the granting of it to certain employés of the Department and not to all, appeared to me to be tantamount to an increase of pay to those who lived along the line, and that there seemed no reason why all the Railway employés should not have the privilege of travelling at half rates, nor why the same privilege should not be extended to all employés of the Government of a similar class. It was not my intention, however, to raise that question, but the word "partial" occurred in my minute on the subject, and was inadvertently introduced into the query.

I regret that I cannot see my way to accept the extramely wide interpretation you place man the

I regret that I cannot see my way to accept the extremely wide interpretation you place upon the words "under the same circumstances," as such an interpretation ignores entirely all the words after those quoted to the end of the section, and extends their application beyond their immediate, and, it appears to me, exclusive reference to the words immediately preceding, commencing with "and conveyed."

In the example offered by you of the string commencing managing to Melhamma. I could be the

In the example offered by you of theatrical companies proceeding to Melbourne, I could better appreciate the force of your arguments were they used as a contention for a general reduction of the fares to Melbourne for every one, seeing that the sea route is open to all alike, but I fail to see why this should be advanced as a reason for a special allowance to a theatrical company, or to any two or more individuals who might band themselves together and ask for a similar indulgence.

I do not wish it to be understood that I object to concessions in any case, as it would certainly not be to the interest of the public that the charges for railway traffic should be regulated in such a manner as to limit the usefulness of the railway lines, and consequently to reduce the legitimate profit which, considered as a private commercial enterprise, they might be expected to afford. My only contention is that, as Commissioner for Railways, you have no power of yourself to extend or reduce the rates of tolls notified to the public as established by the Governor and Executive Council, and that whenever any variation shall appear in such rates of tolls, or that the full rates have not for any reason been fully collected, you are bound to show that such variation has been made by you under their orders, directions, or regulations, or that you have been relieved from your responsibility for such short collection by the I have, &c., same authority. Extracts from Report of the Inspecting Officer-in-charge of the Review Audit of the Railway Receipts for the year 1885-6.

I STATED in my last yearly report, submitted to the Auditor-General on the 29th July, 1885, that in consequence of the action of the Commissioner for Railways in declining to send us any more papers our work of reviewing the Railway Revenue Accounts was limited to a local inspection of the accounts at the

railway stations.

Upon this point I have now only to add that as regards the supply of papers we are still in precisely the same position, and I have no figures to submit as a check on, or verification of, the statements

The only means of examination open to the Auditor-General is therefore through the system of local and necessarily occasional inspections of the stations on the lines; and the utmost advantage has been taken of these inspections to obtain an insight into the revenue earnings of the department other than the cash account of collections attested monthly by the Commissioner.

By means of these inspections we are enabled to:

1. Obtain information of all rates and charges made for the conveyance of passengers and merchandise, and see that such charges are in accordance with the rates approved of by the Governor and Executive Council.

2. To test the state of each station's cash account down to date of visit, taking the outstandings

at the close of the previous month as the basis of the balance.

3. To test the genuineness of the stations outstanding accounts, and to see that all credit given is either under proper bonds or security, or that the discretionary credit given by station-masters with the knowledge and consent of the Commissioner (vide Commissioner's letter to Auditor-General, of 7 January, 1884) is not unduly exceeded.

4. To obtain a record of and reference to all refunds of revenue earnings written off, &c., by whatever authority, and then to demand those papers from the Commissioner in support of the writing off of the sums.

5. To check, take stock of, and count periodically the large stock of tickets held at the various stations and to compel the accounting for all missing ones.

Of course the insight gained in the manner indicated by these five paragraphs is considerable, and enables a very salutary check to be exercised, and a restraining influence placed upon the actions of the

Where our audit is defective or incomplete is that we do not, under present arrangements, get from the Traffic Auditor in a concentrated form any record of the earnings as a whole, including the station's outstandings, which we can make use of as a check against the Commissioner's attested accounts of cash collected.

With reference to the great inattention to queries from this office on the part of the Commissioner, so noticeble in my former reports, I ought here to say that this source of complaint no longer exists, and although there are a few old queries on important points (as hereafter shown) still unsatisfied the attention paid to recent queries is satisfactory.

I should not omit to state also that the review of the refund and special credit papers for the past twelve months shows that much greater care is now exercised than formerly in granting concessions without obtaining, as prescribed by the 100th section of the Railway Act, the previous sanction of the Governor

and Executive Council.

With reference to the whole of the refunds of revenue and concessions granted by the Commissioner and certain of his officers it is broadly contended by the Auditor-General that they have technically no power to grant them, and, as will be seen elsewhere, the Commissioner has been requested to show under what authority this is done. No reply has yet been received to that enquiry, but in the meantime all concessions are being passed on their merits, as there is no allegation so far as this question is concerned that the Commissioner is acting improperly in an equitable sense, but simply beyond his legal powers.*

These remarks apply only to the ordinary refunds and special credits made in the department, and do not touch the more serious question of departures from the rates fixed by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council, under the Act 22 Vic. No. 19.

These points have given rise to much correspondence between this department and the Commissioner, who contended that the view taken by the Auditor-General was incorrect, that differential rates were allowed under the Act, and granted them on his own or the Minister's authority, or on that of both combined.

The latter practice however was admitted by the Commissioner to be wrong in his letter of 27th June, 1885, and Executive authority has been obtained since then without demur. It was still held however that differential rates were allowable under certain circumstances, and examples as to theatrical

companies were offered to support this view.

The Auditor-General in replying showed that he could not accept the very wide interpretation placed by the Commissioner, upon the wording of the 100th section of the Act, but as it was not intended at present to question any rates or concessions, provided they bore the approval of the Governor and Executive Council, and as the Commissioner had admitted that such approval was necessary, the contention as to the differential rates has virtually ended.

STATION INSPECTIONS.

During the year the inspections of the accounts of stations has been proceeded with, and although the work was to some extent interrupted full advantage has been taken of these visits to obtain a knowledge of the working of the line as hereinbefore indicated.

Cablegram from Agent-General to Colonial Treasurer.

London, 27 June, 1885. Consulted Bank England. Will consider proposal. I will cable fully Tuesday. Much last loan still in first hands. If you can wait until end of year, and I could make known that no loan coming out at present, would have good effect.

London, 1 July, 1885.

The criticism of the Standard should be met by a counter statement that the loan is for the rapid construction of railways and other reproductive works.

Cablegram from Agent-General to Colonial Treasurer.

Bank considers variation from the well-considered terms before suggested likely to militate against the success of the loan, and strongly recommends dividend from first April. Present market price about 93, including dividend from first April. Time presses; reply quickly.

Both these documents have reached me; the former is an impertinent attempt at dictation. Times also says the Government will estimate both documents at their true value. We believe that the Government will have little diffiulty in getting the money, large as is the sum to be asked for, even if the Syndicate sulks, though it may possibly not obtain quite as high a rate as on the last occasion. The universal opinion of the Press of this country is that an instant exposure of this attempt should have been made by you. Adverting to my letter of the 10th instant, I will endeavour, as concisely as I can, to continue the narrative of what has since taken place in connection with the contemplated loan of £5,500,000; and I trust that I shall be able to show that, if the loan has not been floated in accordance with your wishes, it is due to no fault on my part

wishes, it is due to no fault on my part.

Nothing was known here by the public of the contemplated issue of the loan, until the announcement was made by "Reuter's" telegram from Sydney on the 10th instant, stating that "the New South Wales Government is about to issue, in London, a new loan of five and a half millions, bearing interest at the rate of three and a half per cent."

It is not the practice of the Bank of England to make known the issue of a loan before the prospectus is ready for distribution. The Governors consider it prejudicial to announce it beforehand, if it can be avoided.

The result of the publication of "Reuter's" telegram was that, on the 13th instant, a number of leading brokers and bankers signed a protest complaining of the issue of another New South Wales loan for five millions and a half so soon after the former one of the same amount.

for five millions and a half so soon after the former one of the same amount.

This protest is not addressed to any person in particular, and was, I believe, presented in the first instance, to the Bank of England, who declined to receive it, and subsequently to Messrs. Mullens, Marshall, & Co., the brokers to the Bank, and was by them handed to me during the time I was engaged with the Governors in the Bank.

The Bank authorities advised that no notice should be taken of the protest, as the memorialists did not in any way question the value of our securities, but only the time for placing the loan on the market.

You will have learned also from my telegrams that the Governors themselves, and the brokers to the Bank, held a strong opinion that we were coming out too soon with a very large loan, and that eleven millions was an extraordinary amount for the Colony to place on the market within nine months.

On the following day, the 14th instant, articles appeared in the newspapers condemning the action of the Syndicate in their attempt to dictate to the Government when they should place their loans on the market; but these articles at the same time questioned the policy of the issue of the loan at this particular time. In consequence of their publication I again waited upon the Governors, and solicited their advice as to whether I should write to the newspapers in reply to the Syndicate's remonstrance, and they strongly urged me not to do so, but to leave the remarks thereon in the *Times* and other newspapers, condemning the action of the Syndicate, to have their effect, as they considered these rejoinders (which were evidently inspired by friends of the loan) were quite sufficient answer to the objections raised.

On the following day (the 15th) I received your telegram, instructing me that I should at once write to the *Times*, in order to prevent any public misapprehension involving injury to the loan; and your message also further informed me that you could not agree to the minimum suggested by the Bank of England, and that it must be ninety-two, with interest from the 1st July, and not with accrued interest from 1st April, as advised by the Bank of England. Immediately on the receipt of this telegram I again proceeded to the Bank to make it known to the Governors, who, with the brokers, again strongly advised that I should not write to the Press, as they feared it might lead to irritation and controversy, and so prejudice the loan. They at the same time expressed surprise that, with their great experience and knowledge of the market here, you should not have accepted their well-considered suggestion with regard to the minimum, as, by giving in the interest from 1st April to date of issue of loan, it would make the new loan run with the last one (a matter of some importance), and that the amount of interest given in would be made up in the price. They advised me to again communicate with you before either writing to the Press or issuing the loan. This I accordingly did in my two messages of the 16th instant.

On the 16th instant I received your telegram instructing me that, in consequence of a reported panic on the Stock Exchange, to use my discretion to withdraw the loan. In exercise of this discretion, I at once postponed the issue of the loan.

On the 17th instant I received your telegram, expressing your opinion "that the advice I had received should not have affected your specific instructions, as to its being essential to point out, through the *Times*, in a forcible letter, the value of our public securities," &c. In accordance, therefore, with your express directions in this respect, I wrote to the *Times*, and I send herewith a copy of my letter.

In consulting with the Bank of England, I did so in accordance with the instructions contained in your telegram of the 26th June. It is absolutely necessary, if this institution is to continue to have the issue of our loans, to consult with the Bank authorities and to inform them of all our proceedings in connection therewith, as, unless they are so consulted and kept well informed, there is a danger of their declining to issue them, as they did, I understand, in the case of one of the other Colonies not long since.

The telegrams which I have sent to you in connection with this matter have been decided upon after consultation with the Governors of the Bank; they are therefore their communications to you as well as mine.

To attempt to issue the loan during this period of the year, when everybody is leaving London for the holidays, would be extremely hazardous, and I have little doubt that in the course of a short time the large amount of the last loan now in first hands will become absorbed, and that if there is no war our $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cents, like our 4 per cents have done, will rise considerably in the market, and that a new loan may then be advantageously placed.

Our securities now stand higher in this market than those of any of the other Colonies, and it is particularly desirable that we should so manage as not to lessen their value.

It is a fact which we must not ignore, that the Syndicates and brokers do much to keep up the value of colonial stocks, and that the high price maintained is largely due to their influence; and if the present system of tendering is to be continued, they are always likely to get a large portion of the loans offered, as they tender at a high price.

I annex copies of telegrams that have passed between us on this subject.

P.S.—Since writing the foregoing I have received your telegram of this day, as follows—"If the present a good time to float the Egyptian, why not equally suitable for ours? As the news appears more pacific, what is there to prevent our loan being floated at once?" Upon its receipt, I immediately waited upon the Governors of the Bank of England and had a long interview with them. They strongly objected to issue the loan before October, not only because the holidays had commenced and that so many persons were leaving London, but their views remained unchanged with regard to the desirability of putting our loan on the market at the present time; more particularly as its postponement had been announced, and that this postponement was not considered as deferring its issue for a few days only.

With regard to the Egyptian loan—as I convey to you in my telegram, copy of which is annexed—there is no analogy between this loan and ours. The money required is of great pressing necessity, and is guaranteed by the great European Powers. It is to be issued by Rothschilds, who will offer it in the great centres of the guaranteeing Powers. This loan is known as a "Bankers' loan," and will be taken up by the large Banking Institutions here and on the Continent, with whom arrangements have doubtless been made already to secure its success, whilst colonial loans are dealt in by an entirely different class of people and investors.

the honor to represent. I respectfully submit that I have taken no action not directed by the Government, and I have offered no advice other than that fully concurred in by the great financial institution of this country, viz., the Bank of England, with whom I was, by express direction of the Government of the Colony, instructed to consult. Of this concurrence I have the fullest proofs, as explained in my correspondence, which will

have reached you in due course. The imputation conveyed in your telegram, now under notice, applies therefore with more force to that institution than to myself, and I should have conceived that its high character and importance

would have placed it beyond such a serious charge.

I trust, therefore, that on a review of the circumstances, the request conveyed in my telegram of the 30th July may have received the favourable consideration of the Government, and that the minute of the Council may have been recalled, pending the receipt of my explanatory letters, which, I am sure, will fully justify my own actions.

I annex a copy of a letter which I had the honor of sending to the Colonial Treasurer on the 24th ultimo (prior to the receipt of your message under acknowledgment), which will fully explain my course of action in the matter of the proposed loan.

From it, and an examination of the telegraphic correspondence preceding, it must be seen that I

am in no way at fault for the loan not having been issued at the time desired by the Colonial Treasurer.

The communications which passed between that gentleman and myself, on the subject of the "minimum" suggested by the Bank of England, establish that the Colonial Treasurer declined to approve of the advice so offered, and under his direction the issue of the loan was subsequently deferred.

This fact was thereupon publicly announced, as instructed, and from that time no other instructions have reached me; but I have been asked by the Government why, if the Egyptian loan could be issued, that of our Colony could not also be issued, as the Treasurer was unable to see the difference in value between the two.

I accepted this as an expression of regret, on his part, that the loan could not be offered as originally projected, and I again conferred with the Governors of the Bank and their broker, Mr. Daniel, on the subject, submitting the purport of the Treasurer's telegram. Surprise was at once expressed that the difference of the two securities should not have been valued, and it was pronounced that the time was passed for the issue of the New South Wales loan, and that, in view of the public announcement that the issue was deferred for the present, no offer of it ought to be made until October next, as otherwise there would be a risk of injurious consequences. Of course I would not make in any way public the communications until we received your reply, nor even then unless some circumstances called it forth; but I think it is only fair to you that no time

nor even then unless some circumstances called it forth; but I think it is only tair to you that no time should be lost in placing you in a position to reply to the strictures of the Colonial Treasurer, as submitted to the Cabinet, under his minute of July 21st.

The Cabinet have the impression that on each occasion of bringing out a loan the difficulties have rather been magnified by you, and, in this last proposal, that your sympathies, and consequently your advice, have been rather with the speculators or holders of our last loan than with the Colony. As long as those persons still held in first hands a considerable amount of our previous loan it was quite natural that they should dearn any attempt to put a fresh loan upon the market but the very quite natural that they should decry any attempt to put a fresh loan upon the market, but the very fact of their doing so should, in the opinion of the Cabinet, have been your opportunity for stepping forward boldly and showing that although, without explanation, the charge of over-borrowing might with some show of reason have been laid against the Colony, yet, with the explanation which you were able to furnish, the charge was entirely unfounded. For with just as much reason might the capital and debt of all the leading Railway Companies be put forward as showing that the indebtedness of England was attaining undue proportions. Had you done this on the day after the Stock Exchange objectors put forward their statement—the very day on which the *Times*, actuated solely by the love of fair play, found fault with their attempt to crush the loan—the Cabinet feels that the result would have been that the objectors would have at once withdrawn, and the loan floated successfully. It was no doubt unfortunate that within two or three days a panic ensued, but that panic was very short-lived, and before the day upon

which our loan should have been floated had entirely passed away.

It would be a grievous mistake to permit those speculators to be the dictators to us of our policy in regard to loans. We quite admit the necessity of carrying their good feelings with us as far as we can, and we recognize the value of the services which it is in their power to confer by cordial co-operation; but we fear that the giving way to them by postponing the issue of our loan after it had been publicly announced will have the dangerous effect of causing them to assume a position to which they are not entitled, and to which no Colonial Ministry could submit.

It may be quite true that October is generally a better time to float a loan than July, but at the present time who can foretell the course of events between this and October. Some injudicious actions or words may kindle the torch of war and cause a monetary panic throughout the world, and thus render it impossible to float a loan at any price. Should such an untoward event unhappily occur, the blame and responsibility would fall not on those irresponsible speculators but upon us and upon you, who permitted yourself, in the advice you tendered to us, to be led, as the Cabinet thinks, by the interested views of those gentlemen who had their own interests rather than those of the Colony to look after.

I SUBMIT, for the consideration of the Cabinet, copies of the cable correspondence which has passed between the Agent-General in London and this Office, in reference to the floating of a new loan for £5,500,000, as authorized by the Governor and Executive, and I desire to offer a few remarks for the information of my hon. colleagues.

It will be observed that the first communication from this Office was dated 26th June, and the last from the Agent-General, advising the Government that he had stopped the issue of the loan, 16th July.

It will be seen that in all the Agent-General's cablegrams there has been a strong tendency to advise delay in issuing the loan. In his reply of 27th June to our message of 26th idem he says—"If you can wait until end of year and I could make known that no loan coming out at present, would have good effect." In his message of 1st July he states—"but so large amount following so quickly on last loan considered prejudicial." On the 2nd July, after meeting with Governors of Bank of England and brokers, the following was sent by the Agent-General:—"Money market favourable, but colonial stocks depressed; in consequence large amount of recent loans not yet placed. This likely to prejudice fresh loan. If deferred for some months, surplus stock probably be absorbed and delay prove beneficial. I can arrange for advance, &c."

On 9th July instructions to issue loan were sent in our message of that date, with request to cable suggested minimum for our approval before advertising.

Further delay occurred in fixing the minimum, the Agent-General (on the Bank of England's advice evidently) suggesting 92, with accrued interest from 1st April, tantamount to a present minimum of 91.

Finally, on 14th July, our minimum was fixed at 92, with interest from 1st July, and orders sent to issue at once. The Agent-General was instructed to meet the criticisms of the Standard by a counter statement "that the loan was for the rapid construction of railways

gram of 14th July from the Agent-General informed us of the Times comments of 14th, on action of stock-brokers, interested parties, &c.

To this a cable was promptly despatched, instructing the Agent-General how to act, and to write to the Times in answer to adverse criticisms, and specific orders for this action to be promptly taken. This cable was despatched because no action appeared to have been taken to refute the position assumed by the Standard.

To this cable a reply was received dated 16th July, that the Agent-General was strongly advised not to write to the Times, as it might be prejudicial to the loan if he assumed the action of the syndicate had caused any misapprehension involving injury to the loan. On the same day (16th July) I received a further cable—"That the Bank was ready to issue loan although contrary to their own judgment, but hesitate to do so under greatly altered conditions of market without giving you (the Government) the opportunity of reconsidering instructions, which, if carried out, may result in failure, which would be serious."

Late in the evening of the 16th a private message was shown me, which interpreted to some extent the message above

which interpreted to some extent the message above given, and saying that the Russian complication had caused a panic on the London Stock Exchange and Paris Bourse, and at 10·30 p.m. (Sydney time) of the 16th July I wired as follows:—

"Reported panic on Stock Exchange. We will not attempt our loan in face of this news. Advise fully, but in your discretion to withdraw."

This message apparently reached London about noon on the 16th (London time), and was answered at 5 p.m. of the

same day:—

The old issue of 3½ per cent. stock, which had been quoted on the London Stock Exchange at 94·10 prior to commencement of our negotiations for the new loan, appears to have fallen with marvellous rapidity, whether from the action of the stock-brokers or as the result of European complications I do not know, to 91; but to have recovered itself to 94 immediately the announcement was made by the Agent-General of the temporary suspending of the issue of the new loan, and I am now led to the belief that the Agent-General has permitted himself to be influenced in the tone of his cables to this Government by the stock-broking protesters.

In my cable of the 16th, advising the Agent-General of the reported panic of the Stock Exchange, &c., and giving him a discretion to withdraw the loan, it was clearly on the understanding that such panic really existed. Of this the Agent-General says not one word, but immediately announced the withdrawal of the loan. The panic, if it existed at all, and it was upon such existence the loan was countermanded, seems to have improved colonial 3½ per cent. stocks, which have since risen from 91 to 94.

I cannot help feeling that the Agent-General has seized upon the report of 16th July as an excuse for following out his foregone conclusion, namely,—to delay floating the loan.

In conclusion, 1 think that the Government has reason to complain, and if the Cabinet agrees with me, the Agent-General should be informed that his tardiness in not meeting criticisms in leading London papers on our loans, by prompt replies in the Times, from material always within his reach, is deemed by the Cabinet to be strongly prejudicial to the best interests of the Colony. And I take exception to his allowing himself to be influenced by outside advice, from whom-soever

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, dated the 6th August, No. 85/8,522, in which you inform me that you had sent me a telegram on the 29th July last, and received my reply of the 30th idem, copies of which you enclose. I observe that my telegram, to which you refer, is not correctly interpreted, as you will see by the copy annexed.

You state further, that of course you would not make in any way public the communication addressed to me until you received my reply, nor even then unless some circumstance called it forth; but yet, strange to say, the same mail that brought me your letter brought newspapers from South Australia, dated only six days later, in which appeared a telegraphic communication from Sydney stating that a strongly-worded minute had been sent to Sir Saul Samuel, censuring him for having withdrawn the loan.

Although you desire your communications should be considered "confidential"—as intimated to me in your telegraphic message of 7th August, sent to me through the Government of Victoria—after the publications which I have since seen in the various Sydney newspapers, the treating of these letters as "confidential" can of course have no force; and so far as I am concerned, I have no desire that there should be any confidence or secrecy either in the communications you have made to me or in mine to you. On the contrary, I court the fullest inquiry and publicity with regard to my own action in reference to the issue of the proposed loan in July last, and in relation to all matters connected with my administration of this Department. The reply in my letter of August the 7th should be a complete answer both to your letter and the Colonial Treasurer's Minute, but there are some points referred to which, in justice to myself and the interests of the Colony, I wish to comment upon; but before proceeding to do so, I desire to say, the sending to me the so-called censure, and its publication in the newspapers, before I had been afforded an opportunity of making any explanation, is without precedent, and most unfair to me; and this you admit by the statement to which I have already referred, namely, that of course you would not make in any way public the communications addressed to me until you received my reply, nor even then unless some circumstance called it forth, more particularly as I requested you by telegram of the 30th July "in all fairness to withhold minute of Council pending receipt of letter from me. Action justified by circumstances under advice of and approval of Bank of England, following instructions from Treasurer." Instead of this telegram being published, I find a semi-official notice in the Sydney papers stating that I had asked the Government to postpone any decision until they received my explanatory letters—which I am sure you will admit is not a correct interpretation of my telegram.

Before proceeding to deal with the Colonial Treasurer's minute, I will reply to your letter, which, although addressed to me privately, is of an official character, and bears the office No. 85/8522. In this letter you say that the Cabinet have the impression that, on each occasion of bringing out a loan, the difficulties have rather been magnified by me, and that in my last proposal my sympathies, and consequently my advice, have been rather with the speculators or holders of our last loan than with the

Colony.

To the first charge I may say that I am at a loss to know whence the Cabinet has derived its information, as most certainly I have never magnified the difficulties of any loans that have been issued since I have been here, during which time six loans have been placed on the market, including the one of this month, amounting altogether to £21,000,000, in a period under five years. All of these loans have been wonderfully successful, realizing higher prices than any previous ones, or those of any other Colonies. I will refer to these loans seriatim. The first two, of £2,000,000 each, were issued during the time Mr. Watson was Colonial Treasurer, and I received the thanks of that gentleman for the success which had attended their issue. The next loan, of £3,000,000, was raised and issued under circumstances of the greatest difficulty—difficulty which it was impossible to magnify. It was contemplated by the Financial Agents of the Government, the Bank of New South Wales, that the loan would not float, and in financial circles its failure was predicted, and up to within half an hour of the opening of the tenders very few tenders had been sent in. It then became a matter of great anxiety to Mr. Larnach and myself lest the loan should fail. A conference was then held with the brokers of the Bank, who stated that unless the financial agents of the Government and myself would pledge ourselves that the whole of the loan would be taken, the brokers would not tender; but said, if they received an assurance that it would be all taken they would then tender for a considerable amount. In this emergency I proposed to the Bank that if they would tender through the brokers for £500,000 of the loan, I would incur the responsibility of guaranteeing them against loss. After some hesitation the Bank of New South Wales agreed to act upon my proposal, and the loan was floated at £100 0s. 8d. The amount of tenders when opened was found to be only £140,000 over the sum required, and the average being only 8d in excess of the mi

With regard to the second £3,000,000 loan, which followed only five months after its predecessor, the feeling of opposition to the loan was so strong on the Stock Exchange that the members gathered together all the prespectuses they could obtain, with a view to making a bonfire of them, and it was only through the influence of one broker that this was prevented. At the same time the Governor of the Bank of England (Mr. Gilliat) sent for Mr. Larnach and myself, and complained of the issue of another loan so soon after the last, and said it was calculated to damage the credit of the Colony. There is no doubt that Mr. Larnach and myself felt great anxiety lest this loan should fail, but fortunately a favourable change in the money market, and other circumstances combined which were not foreseen, made the loan an unexpected success.

In these two instances I think you will admit, from what I have stated, and which can be confirmed by reference to the correspondence, that the difficulties could not under any circumstances have been magnified.

Of the last £5,500,000 loan, it is not necessary that I should say more than that I was assisted with the advice of Mr. Knox, Mr. Larnach, Sir D. Cooper, and the Governors and brokers of the Bank of England,

England, and that I received the congratulations of the Honorable the Colonial Treasurer upon the See Treasury splendid success of the first 3½ per cent. loan, and his thanks for the admirable way in which the operation 1884. L120. had been conducted.

In spite, therefore, of what may have been said to the contrary, I feel I am justified in asserting most emphatically that every loan which has been raised since I have been here has been a great success,

when the special circumstances under each issue are taken into consideration.

With regard to the statement that my sympathies, and consequently my advice, were rather with speculators or holders of our last loan than with the Colony, I give the statement a most positive denial; and I respectfully submit that it is most unjust that this charge should be made against me, when I acted under the advice of the Bank of England, by the express instruction of the Honorable the Colonial Treasurer.

In relation to the Honorable Treasurer's minute, which I am glad to find is not a Minute of the Cabinet or Executive Council, as I was led to believe from your telegram of the 29th July last that it would be, I can only say that I feel convinced that had all the correspondence and telegrams that have passed between the Honorable Treasurer and myself on this subject been fully set forth in that document, it would have been seen that I am not open to any of the imputations conveyed therein. These telegrams have all been furnished to you; and I cannot help feeling that Mr. Dibbs would not have signed such a minute had he well considered all the circumstances attaching to the responsibility and difficulties of the issue of a large loan here, and realized the fact which is clearly shown in the correspondence, that under his instructions I consulted with and acted under the advice of the authorities of the Bank of England, and that every telegram sent relating to the issue of the loan was prepared and sent with the concurrence and approval of the Bank authorities.

I have refrained from going very fully into details in reply to the Honorable Treasurer's minute, as you have now all the correspondence before you, and the Government will be able to form their opinion thereon; but I would point out that the telegraphic correspondence will show that I was instructed by the Colonial Treasurer to consult with the Bank of England authorities, and that I did so, and that he, the Colonial Treasurer, was fully informed to this effect, and I took advice from no other source

than that I was instructed to seek.

The Colonial Treasurer complains of the brevity of my messages as to information in reference to state of the money market, and the causes for its disturbance on the Stock Exchange. will be found that my telegrams were very full, and conveyed all the information necessary. I was not asked for more, and no complaint was ever made to me at the time that further particulars were expected. So far from my evincing any anxiety to withdraw the loan, it will be seen on reference to the telegraphic correspondence, that I frequently urged the necessity of prompt action, and if there were delay, it was occasioned by the Colonial Treasurer declining to accept the Bank of England's advice with regard to the minimum. Had the Colonial Treasurer accepted this advice the loan would have been issued, although contrary to the judgment of the Bank of England authorities.

The Colonial Treasurer states that I did not refer to the reported panic on the Stock Exchange of

which he was advised by a private telegram on the 16th July. Although I had an interview late on the evening of the 15th July with the Bank of England authorities, I was not informed of any panic; but there was a scare existing, and this I reported in my telegram of that day, as follows:—

15 July, 1885. v. Consols down RECEIVED telegram late this afternoon. Communicated to Bank. Shall have their decision to-morrow. one. Supposed unfavourable Russian news. Markets unsettled and sensitive. Quotations, 92, 93.

This is all that the Bank of England authorities thought it necessary that I should send, and on the following day I telegraphed-

BANK ready to issue loan, although contrary to their own judgment, but hesitate to do so under greatly altered condition of market without giving you the opportunity for reconsidering instructions, which if carried out may result in failure, which would be serious.

The Colonial Treasurer states that he takes exception to my allowing myself to be influenced by outside advice, from whomsoever tendered, when it is in opposition to positive instructions. I respectfully submit that if this is to be a hard and fast rule, and that the Agent-General, in financial matters which are of such vast importance to the interests of the Colony, is not to be permitted to take the advice of those fully competent to advise him, but is to act upon the instructions, given perhaps under a want of knowledge of all the circumstances surrounding such a grave matter as the issue of a large loan, then

serious injury to the Colony may ensue.

I do not feel that I am open to the charge of not meeting the criticism of the Press, but there may be, and indeed have been occasions when silence has been more advantageous than a newspaper controversy, in delicate financial transactions. I have, &c.

In accordance with the provisions of the 12th section of the Government Savings Bank Act, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the following Amended Regulations for the guidance of Postmasters and other Officers authorised to transact Government Savings Bank business; and Amended General Regulations,—to date from the first proximo.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF POSTMASTERS AND OTHER OFFICERS AUTHORISED TO TRANSACT GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK BUSINESS.

To the Postmaster of

Postmaster authorised to receive deposits.—Hours of business.

1. The Postmaster General having selected your office to be, on and after receipt for deposits in the Government Savings Bank, you are hereby instructed to keep it open for that purpose, and for the repayments to depositors, during the hours appointed for the transaction of Money Order business, and on Saturdays, in addition, from 7 until 9 o'clock p.m., for receipt of deposits only.

Forms and books supplied.

- 2. You are supplied herewith with the undermentioned forms and books, viz.:—

 A.—Copy of general regulations for your own use.

 B.—Copy of general regulations for exhibition to the public.

 C.—Declaration forms for ordinary depositors. (See clause 3 of Regulations.)

 D.—Declaration forms for deposits on trust. (See clause 7 of Regulations.)

 E.—Depositors' books numbered. (See clause 5 of Regulations.)

 F.—Forms of daily account, for reporting deposits and repayments to the Postmaster General.

 (See clause 5 of Regulations.)
- (See clause 5 of Regulations.)
 G.—Forms of daily Money Order and Savings Bank account.)
 H.—Notices of withdrawals. (See clause 16 of Regulations.)
 I.—Orders to pay warrants when depositors cannot attend in person. (See clause 17 of Regulations.)

You must return to the Controller of the Money Order Office any old forms of money order daily account or monthly statement which may be in your possession on the day of commencing Savings Bank business.

One copy Regulations to be posted up for public information. One copy for Postmaster's use. If not understood, apply to chief office.

3. You will place the large copy of the printed Regulations in some conspicuous position in your office, where the public can read it conveniently. You will retain the small copy for your own guidance, and study it carefully; and if there be any part of the Regulations, or of these instructions, which you do not understand, you will at once apply for further information to the Controller, Savings Bank Department, General Post Office, Sydney.

A deposit of one shilling or any number of shillings, or pounds and shillings, may be received. Copper coin need not be refused if of the value of one shilling.

4. You will learn from clause 2 of the Regulations that you may receive deposits of one shilling, or of any number of shillings or of pounds and shillings, from any depositor. You are not to understand from this clause that deposits of copper coin may not be made, but that every deposit must be of the value of one shilling, or of some number of shillings.

Deposits

Deposits how to be received.—Declaration to be made and witnessed.—Money to be next taken.—Entry in depositor's book.—Entry in daily Savings Bank account.—No. of book and name of office to be entered on declaration.—Depositor to be informed that he is to expect the Postmaster-General's acknowledgment, and if necessary to report its non-receipt.

5. When a person applies to you to receive his first deposit for transmission to the Government Savings Bank, furnish him with the form of declaration required by clause 3 of the Regulations (Form Savings Bank, furnish him with the form of declaration required by clause 3 of the Regulations (Form S.B., No. 8), and direct him to read it. If he cannot read, you must read it to him. He must sign it, and his signature must be witnessed by yourself, or by some person known to you, or by a clergyman, or by a Justice of the Peace. If he cannot write he must affix his mark, and his mark must be witnessed. Next obtain the money intended to be deposited. Next take one of the numbered depositors' books referred to in clause 5 of the Regulations. Next enter in the book the Christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the depositor, the date of the receipt of the deposit, and its amount, sign your name against the entry, and affix an impression of your dated stamp in the place prepared for the same in the depositor's book. against the entry, and aim an impression of your dated stamp in the place prepared for the same in the depositor's book. You will next enter the whole of the particulars of the deposit in the form of daily account supplied to you for that purpose (Form S.B., No. 2), and after satisfying yourself that you have made correct entries of every item, namely, the number of the depositor's book, the amount deposited, the Christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the depositor, you will insert on the form of declaration in the place indicated thereon the name of your office, and the number of the depositor's book, which you will copy from the book itself, and then deliver the book to the depositor, whom you must inform that in a few days he will receive an extraveled green the Postmaster General that the must inform that in a few days he will receive an acknowledgment from the Postmaster General that the deposit has been entered in the books of the Government Savings Bank, and that if he does not receive that acknowledgment within ten days he must write to the Postmaster General and state that he has not received it. This course is enjoined in clause 5 of the Regulations.

Second and subsequent deposits.

6. On making every deposit after the first the depositor must bring his book with him, and you must enter in that book the correct amount of such deposit, with the date on which it is made, affix your signature against the entry, and affix in the proper place an impression of your dated stamp.

Entry in daily Savings Bank account.

7. You will enter the particulars of every deposit, as it is made, in your daily Savings Bank account as before; and in any case in which the previous deposits entered in the depositor's book were made at another post office, you will be careful to enter the name of that office, as well as the number of the book, in the proper column of the account.

Deposits may be received from trustees on joint account.—From minors under twenty-one years of agc.—From women, whether married or single. Refer such depositors to clause 9 of Regulations.—From trustees of Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Societies legally established.—After reference to the Postmaster General who will give you the necessary instructions.

8. You may receive deposits-

A .- From a trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint names of that person and the trustees. (See clause 7 of Regulations.) In such cases the declaration must be made by the trustee on the form specially provided; but the names of both parties must be entered in the depositor's book and in your daily Savings Bank account.

B.—From persons under twenty-one years of age. (See clause 8 of Regulations.)
C.—From women, whether married or single. (See clause 9 of Regulations, which clause you must recommend female depositors to read carefully.)

-From the trustees of any Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Society, the rules of which have been duly certified. (See clause 10 of Regulations.) As it will not be in your power to ascertain whether the rules of any of these institutions have been duly certified, you must, upon a first application from the trustees of any one of them to be permitted to deposit, refer the applicants to the Postmaster General, from whom you will receive the necessary instruction and form of declaration.

Withdrawals.—If depositor cannot write he is to be identified.

9. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or any part of his deposits, and applying to you for information as to the proper mode of effecting his object, must be supplied with one of the forms of notice of withdrawal (Form S.B., No. 4; see clause 16 of Regulations); but before supplying the form you will of course satisfy yourself, by inspection of the depositor's book, or otherwise, that the party applying is a depositor. You will instruct the depositor how to fill up the form, and impress on him the necessity of stating accurately on the form the name of the place where the first deposit entered in his book was made, and the number of that book. A few days after the receipt of the notice in Sydney a warrant for the amount to be withdrawn will be issued, and sent to the post office named theroon for payment. When payment is applied for by the depositor, you must compare it with the advice, and require the When payment is applied for by the depositor, you must compare it with the advice, and require the depositor to sign his name to the receipt at the foot of the warrant. You must then ask him for his depositor's book, and if you are satisfied that he is the party entitled to receive the amount, and the signature corresponds with that in the application previously made, you must pay the amount accordingly. If the depositor cannot write this comparison cannot be made, and you must then require him to bring some person known to you who can identify him as the person named in the warrant. In such a case the depositor's mark must be witnessed by the person identifying him. If you have reason to think that the person applying is not entitled to receive the amount, you must refuse payment, and report the same to the Controller, Savings Bank Branch, General Post Office, Sydney,

Payment of warrants when depositor cannot attend in person.

10. Warrants can only be paid to the depositor in person, or to a person authorized by him in the Form S.B., No. 7, a copy of which you must supply if applied for. The order must be signed in the manner prescribed in class 17 of the Regulations, and when the warrant has been duly paid you must Warrant attach the order to it.

Warrant to be stamped with the date of payment and entered in depositor's book.—Entry of paid warrants in daily Savings Bank account.

11. When you have paid the amount, stamp the warrant with your office stamp, enter the particulars in that portion of the depositor's book appropriated to withdrawals, giving the date of payment and the amount withdrawn; sign your name, and affix an impression of your dated office stamp in the proper place in the depositor's book. When this has been done, enter the warrant on the credit side of your daily Savings Bank account, giving in each column of that account the information required by the respective headings of those columns.

Transfer of deposit from Penny Savings Bank to the Post Office Savings Bank.

12. If any depositor in any Penny Savings Bank shall present to you his deposit book and claim repayment, you must supply him with a notice of withdrawal (Form S. B., No. 4a), and direct him to fill it up and forward it with his book (in a cover which will be supplied to you for the purpose), to the Postmaster General, Sydney, and inform him that he will obtain payment and a new Government Savings Bank deposit book if required, within ten days. If any depositor of a Penny Savings Bank wishes to make further deposits at your office, he must also be requested to forward his Penny Savings Bank deposit book to the Postmaster General, Sydney, and a new Government Savings Bank deposit book will be supplied to him within ten days. The necessary instructions will be forwarded to you, to enable you to enter the amount due to the above-described depositors in a Government Savings Bank deposit book, to be issued from your office.

Savings Bank account to be added up, and totals to be entered in daily money order account.—Paid warrants and declarations to be enclosed in Savings Bank account.—All to be sent up with daily money order account.

13. At the close of business you must carefully add up both sides of your Savings Bank account, and enter the respective totals in the places indicated on the account. You must then enter on your money order account, in the places marked for the purpose, in the form of money order daily account, the total number and total amount of Savings Bank deposits received by you during the day, and the total number and total number and total amount of Savings Bank payments made by you during the day. You must add the total amount of Savings Bank deposits to the total amount of orders issued, and the total amount of Savings Bank payments to the total amount of orders paid, and these totals must also be entered in your money order cash book. You must then tie up the paid warrants and the declarations made by new depositors, and enclose them in the Savings Bank account, which must then be placed inside the daily money order account, and sent up with it in the ordinary envelope to the Money Order Office.

Surplus money to be remitted.

14. The balance of the moneys received and paid by you on Savings Bank account will thus have become part of the balance due from you on the money order account, and you must remit, as at present, any sums which may be in your possession in excess of your money order reserve.

Notice of no Savings Bank transactions.

15. Should no Savings Bank transactions take place at your office on any day, you will not be required to send up a form of account, but you will be required to enter in each of the places set apart for Savings Bank totals in the daily money order account the word nil.

When Savings Bank transactions occur, and no money order business.

16. Should any Savings Bank transactions have taken place during the day on which no money order transactions have taken place, you will be required to send up a money order account with the word nil written across that part of it which refers to money orders, and the totals of the Savings Bank transactions inserted in the part which refers to them.

17. The daily totals of the Savings Bank transactions are to be entered in places prepared in the

new money order cash book now supplied to you.

Secrecy.

18. You are forbidden by the Government Savings Bank Act to give any information, except to the Postmaster General and the proper officers of the Post Office, as to the name of any depositor, or the sum deposited or withdrawn by him, and disobedience to this rule will incur the severe displeasure of the Postmaster General. You will also be liable to forfeit a penalty not exceeding £100 for an offence against, or a wilful neglect or omission to comply with, this or any other of the Regulations.

GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK.

AMENDED GENERAL REGULATIONS.

Hours of business.

1. The chief office, Sydney, and every post-office, being a money order office, at which the Post-master General shall permit deposits to be received for remittance to his principal office, will be open for that purpose, and for the repayment of moneys withdrawn, during the hours appointed for the transaction of money order business at the said office, and for receipt of deposits on Saturdays, in addition, from 7 until 9 o'clock p.m., or earlier, or later, as the Postmaster General may from time to time direct.

Amount of deposits.

2. Deposits of 1s., or of any number of shillings or pounds and shillings will be received from any depositor at the Government Savings Bank.

All deposits must be made in cash, or in notes issued by New South Wales Banks.

Name, address, and occupation of depositor to be furnished.—Declaration to be made by depositor.

3. Every depositor on making a first deposit shall be required to specify his Christian name and surname, occupation and residence, to the officer of the Postmaster General appointed to receive the deposit and make and sign the following declaration, to be witnessed by the officer of the Postmaster

General appointed to receive deposits, or by some person known to him, or by a Clergyman, or a Justice of the Peace; and if such declaration or any part thereof, shall not be true, the depositor making the same shall forfeit and lose all right and title to his deposits:

6. Interest, calculated yearly at the rate of four pounds per cent. per annum, shall be allowed on every complete sum of one pound, or some multiple thereof, up to £200 deposited, and shall be computed from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which the sum of one pound shall have been deposited, or on which deposits of a less amount shall have made up the sum of one pound, up to the first day of the calendar month in which moneys are withdrawn. No interest shall be allowed on any sum in excess of that amount.

The interest will be calculated to the 31st December in every year, and will then be added to and become part of the principal money.

Trust

Trust account.

7. Deposits may be made by a trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint names of such trustee and the person on whose account such money shall be so deposited; but repayment of the same or any part thereof, shall not be made without the receipt and receipts of both the said parties, or the survivor, or survivors, or the executors or administrators of such survivor, whose receipt and receipts, either personally or by agent appointed by power of attorney, which power of attorney may be executed by an infant of or exceeding the age of fourteen years, shall alone be a valid discharge, except in case of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Postmaster General may, on the proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow repayment to be made to the trustee alone.

And in case any such declaration shall not be true, or if any person shall at any time have or hold or be possessed of any deposit or funds in more than one Government Savings Bank within the Colony of New South Wales, every such person shall forfeit and lose all right and title to any deposit in or to any funds of every such Savings Bank.

Minors.

8. Deposits may be made by any person under twenty-one years of age, or by a parent or other relative of a person under twenty-one years of age, in the name and on behalf of such person; and repayment shall be made to such minor in the same manner as if he were of full age, in case he shall have made the deposit, or to the parent or other relative who shall have made the deposit, on the application in writing of such parent or relative.

Married women.

9. Deposits may be made by married women; and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such woman: Provided that if any such deposits are made by a married woman by means of moneys of her husband without his consent, the Court or Magistrate may upon application under section nine of the "Married Women's Property Act," 42 Vic. No. 11, order such deposits or any part thereof to be paid to the husband.

Friendly and Charitable Societies and Penny Banks.

10. The trustees of any Friendly Society, the rules of which have been certified by the Registrar of Friendly Societies in the Colony of New South Wales, or of any Charitable or Provident Society, may deposit their funds, without restriction as to amount, in the Government Savings Bank: Provided always that such deposits shall not be of less amount than one shilling, nor of any sum not a multiple thereof, and that a copy of the rules be forwarded by post to the Postmaster-General, with the names and addresses of the trustees, who will then be furnished with the necessary instructions.

Every depositor shall, once in each year, on the anniversary of the day on which he made his first deposit, forward his book to the principal office of the Postmaster General, in a cover to be obtained at any Government Savings Bank, in order that the entries in the said book may be compared with the entries in the books of the Postmaster General, and that the interest due to the depositor may be inserted in his book.

Depositors'

Depositors' books.

14. No charge shall be made upon depositors for the books at first supplied to them, or for books issued to them in continuation thereof; but if any depositor shall lose his book, and shall desire a new book, application must be made by him to the Postmaster General by letter, stating the circumstances, and enclosing postage stamps of the value of 1s., to pay for the new book, should the application be granted; and the Postmaster General shall, as he thinks fit, issue a new book, or return the stamps to the applicant.

Postage.

15. No charge for postage shall be made upon the depositors for the transmission of their books to the Postmaster General, or the return thereof to them.

Withdrawals.

16. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole, or any part of the sum deposited by him, must make application for the same to the Postmaster General, in the following form, a printed copy of which may be obtained at any Government Savings Bank:-

In this form the depositor must specify the number of his book, and the name of the office at which his first deposit was made, the sum he wishes to withdraw, his occupation and residence, and the Post Office at which he wishes to receive his money. On receipt of this application, a warrant for the amount required will be sent to the paying office.

The deposit book must be presented by the depositor at the post office named, and the Postmaster shall enter the amount repaid, and attest the entry with his signature and the dated stamp of his office.

The Postmaster shall take a receipt from the depositor on the warrant for the amount repaid to him.

The Postmaster General will endeavour to prevent fraud, and to identify every depositor transacting business with the Government Savings Bank; but if any person shall fraudulently represent himself to be a depositor, and by forwarding the proper notice of withdrawal, and by presentation of the depositor's book and compliance with the rules of the Department, shall obtain any sum of money belonging to that depositor the Postmaster Congress will not be represented for the last through to that depositor, the Postmaster General will not be responsible for the loss thereof.

Repayment to a depositor unable to attend personally.

17. Except as hereinbefore mentioned, repayments shall be made only to a depositor in person or to the bearer of an order under his hand. If the depositor resides out of New South Wales, his signature must be verified by some constituted authority of the place in which he resides.

Withdrawals by Friendly or Charitable Societies, and receipts for the same.

18. Applications to withdraw money deposited by any Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Society, must be signed by two of the trustees of any such Society, or when there is no trustees, then by the treasurer, and the names of the trustee, or treasurer, or other officer of the Society, authorized to receive the amount to be withdrawn shall be stated in the retire of mild like the society of the state of the society. amount to be withdrawn, shall be stated in the notice of withdrawal; and the warrant for payment of the amount shall be made out in the name of such trustee, treasurer, or officer, and the receipt of such person apparently authorized shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

Funds of a deceased depositor not exceeding £100.

19. In case any depositor shall die, leaving any sum of money not exceeding £100, exclusive of interest, deposited in the Government Savings Bank, and probate of his will or letters of administration be not produced to the Postmaster General, or if notice in writing of the existence of a will, and intention to prove the same or to take out letters of administration, be not given to the Postmaster General at his principal

principal office within the period of one month from the death of the depositor, or if such notice be given, but such will be not proved or letters of administration be not taken out, and the probate or letters of administration (as the case may be) produced to the Postmaster General within the period of two months from the death of the depositor, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General, after such period of one or two months as the case may be, to pay and divide such funds, at his discretion, to or amongst the widow or relatives of the deceased depositor, or any one or more of them; or, if he shall think proper, according to the Statute of Distributions.

Funds of deceased depositor above £100.

20. In case any depositor shall die, leaving any sum of money in the Government Savings Bank which (exclusive of interest) shall exceed the sum of £100, the same shall only be paid to the executor or administrator on the production of the probate of will or letters of administration of the estate or effects of the deceased depositor to the Postmaster General.

Payment on death of a depositor, being illegitimate and dying intestate.

21. If any depositor, being illegitimate, shall die intestate, leaving any person or persons who, but for the illegitimacy of such depositor, and of such person or persons, would be entitled to the money due to such deceased depositor, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General with the authority in writing of the Attorney General, to pay the money of such deceased depositor to any one or more of the persons who in his opinion would have been entitled to the same according to the Statute of Distributions, if the said depositor and such person or persons had been legitimate.

Incapacitated depositors.

22. If any depositor shall become insane, or otherwise incapacitated to act, and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Postmaster General, and if the Postmaster General shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, he may authorize payment, from time to time, out of the funds of such depositor, to any person whom he shall judge proper, and the receipt of such person shall be a good discharge for for the same.

Settlement of disputes.

- 23. If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster General and any individual depositor, or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor or assignee of a depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor, or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Government Savings Bank, then and in every such case the matter in dispute shall be referred in writing to the Attorney General; and whatever award, order or determination shall be made by the said Attorney General shall be final, to all intents and purposes, without any appeal.

The officers of the Postmaster General engaged in the receipt or payment of deposits shall not disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount deposited or withdrawn by him, except to the Postmaster General, or to such of his officers as may be appointed to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Government Savings Bank Act, 1870.

Interpretation.

25. In the construction of these Regulations, unless there is something in the subject or context repugnant thereto, every word importing the singular number only shall mean and include several persons or things as well as one person or thing, and the converse; and every word importing the masculine gender only shall mean and include female as well as male; and the word month shall refer to a calendar and not a lunar month.

The Petition of the undersigned, as Chairman of a Public Meeting, held at the Protestant Hall, on Tuesday, the 2nd February, 1886,—

HUMBLY SHOWETH :-

That at a Public Meeting of the citizens, convened by the Chamber of Manufacturers, to consider the financial position of the Colony and the depressed state of trade and manufacturing industries, the following resolutions were unanimously agreed to:—

- 1st. That, in the opinion of this Meeting, the financial requirements of the Government, the claims of the industrial classes to continued employment, and the duty of the State to use its best efforts to open channels of employment to the rising generation, can be best met by the Legislative Assembly supporting only such Government as will adopt the policy of collecting a large portion of the fresh revenue required from a 10 per cent. ad valorem duty on such staple articles as can be in part produced here, so as to afford continued employment to men having families to support, and offer openings for admitting the rising generation into the ranks of industry.
- 2nd. That, in the opinion of this Meeting, the financial and industrial circumstances of New South Wales at this juncture imperatively demand that the Legislative Assembly should restrain any Government that may be in power from continuing the late extravagant expenditure of borrowed money; and, on the other hand, should induce such Government to borrow only sufficient funds to carry out the most necessary public works of a really productive character only.
- 3rd. That the foregoing resolutions be embodied in a Petition to the Legislative Assembly, and signed by the Chairman on behalf of the Meeting.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that your Honorable House will give the foregoing resolutions your favourable consideration.

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

That a proposal is now before your Honorable House providing for the imposition of a tax upon the unimproved value of all lands in New South Wales to the extent of one half-penny in the pound on estates of over £1,000 in value per annum.

Your Petitioners desire to point out that this proposal will operate as a tax upon the energy, industry, and perseverance of the inhabitants of the Colony.

That landholders are already specially taxed as such under "The Diseases in Sheep Act," "The Rabbit Act," and "The Pastures Act," while the Local Government Bill, which will doubtless ere long become law, will be an additional tax upon landholders exclusively.

That the imposition of this tax will necessitate the appointment of a large number of officers, causing its collection to absorb a large percentage of the income from this source, and the Civil Service is already too large; and the annual expenditure in this way is capable of being very materially reduced.

That, as it is acknowledged that the taxation now sought to be imposed for the reduction of the deficit will only be required for a limited period, we would suggest the imposition of taxation through the Custom-house, as entailing no extra expense in collecting, and being more acceptable to the inhabitants of the Colony generally.

Your Petitioners therefore respectfully pray your Honorable House not to pass the proposed Land tax into law, and we, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c.

Your Petitioners, therefore, pray your Honorable House to take the foregoing into your consideration, and take such steps as will give permanent relief and prosperity to the trades of your Petitioners.

(PETITION IN FAVOUR OF PROPOSED ALTERATIONS IN-ELECTORS OF THE HUME.)

Received by the Legislative Assembly, 23 June, 1886.

To the Honorable the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of the undersigned Electors of the Hume Electorate,—

HUMBLY SHOWETH:-

That various modes of taxation have been placed before you by the Honorable the Treasurer, having for their object an increased revenue, and while we heartily agree with the proposal to impose ad valorem duties and to increase the number of articles subject to specific duty, we would respectfully suggest the following as sources of revenue with comparatively little expense in collecting, and their imposition, we feel assured, would be more acceptable to the majority of the electors than direct taxation:—

- 1. That, in order to reach the wealthy classes and those who live in affluence, a special list of ad valorem duties be imposed of 25 per cent., to include musical instruments, jewellery, silks, satins, and other articles of luxury.
- 2. That a special Income Tax be imposed of at least 6d. in the pound upon all incomes received by absentees from Colonial investments of whatever nature. We would respectfully point out that non-residents whose income may be derived from bank shares, debentures, and securities, virtually escape taxation, while they share in the benefits of Government, contributing nothing in return.
- 3. That an excise duty of 6d. per gallon be imposed on all beer and other malt liquors brewed in the Colony. We desire respectfully to urge that as imported beer is subject to duty, the absence of a tax on beer brewed in the Colony is virtually protection to the brewers, which is undesirable.
- 4. That the duty on spirits be increased to 15s. per gallon. We would urge regarding this proposal that as additional revenue is required and taxation generally is increased, that consumers of spirits should contribute increasingly in common with others.
- 5. That agricultural products and live stock be added to the list of articles liable to fixed duties. Your Petitioners feel that they are under great disadvantage owing to the Victorian import duty on grain and live stock, which are introduced to this Colony free. We are thus unable to trade with them on equal terms. The great distance from Sydney of the grain-producing land in the Colony encourages the importation of wheat and flour from California and other places, which they can land in our ports as cheaply as we can by road or rail.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that you will consider the foregoing suggestions worthy of your consideration, and trust that you will in your wisdom see fit to include them in the tariff proposals now before your Honorable House; and your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c.

Your Petitioners have perused with feelings of apprehension and alarm the alterations and amendments proposed by the Honorable the Colonial Treasurer in the Tariff, more especially that portion relating to the imposition of ad ralorem duties.

Your Petitioners submit to your Honorable House that the measures proposed will tend not only to fetter and hamper commerce, but also to obstruct and destroy the large intercolonial trade of this Colony.

Your Petitioners would also point out-

- 1. That imposing duties on a large number of minor articles hitherto on the free list, and which can only be productive of a very small amount of revenue, is opposed to, and is destructive of, the hitherto free fiscal policy of the country.
- 2. That a large number of the proposed increased specific duties being protective in their incidence, are opposed to the avowed free trade policy of the Government, as indicated by the Honorable Treasurer in his Financial Statement, and are not likely to produce the amount of revenue estimated to be derived therefrom.

Your Petitioners therefore respectfully entreat your Honorable House to devise some other scheme for meeting the present deficit in the Public Accounts.

That during the year 1885 the Manchester Unity in New South Wales expended amongst its

members in providing medicine and medical attendance the sum of £13,353 10s.

That by inculcating and promoting habits of prudence and forethought the Manchester Unity contributes to a very material extent towards placing (in the hour of need) a large number of persons

above the demands of either individual or State charity.

That your Petitioners view with feelings of alarm the proposal of the present Government of New South Wales to impose an enormous duty on medicines imported into the Colony (which have hitherto been exempt from Customs levies) inasmuch as should such proposal become law it will entail a very serious increase in the expenditure of the said Manchester Unity, necessitating an entire reconstruction of the rates of contribution, and generally placing an additional burden on a section of the community ill qualified to bear it.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honorable House will be pleased to give your earnest consideration to the question of the withdrawal of proposed duties on medicines; and your

Received by the Legislative Assembly, 13 May, 1886.

To the Honorable the Speaker and to the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of George Peacock, of Hobart, in the Colony of Tasmania, and of Sydney, in the Colony of New South Wales, jam and preserve manufacturer and importer,-

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

1. That your Petitioner carries on a large business as a jam and preserve manufacturer in the city of Sydney, in this Colony, and has there fitted up extensive manufacturing premises with costly machinery, and all usual and necessary appliances.

2. That the said business has been in operation in this city since the year one thousand eight

hundred and seventy-nine.

3. That owing principally to the fact that the quantity and variety of native-grown fruits in this Colony is insufficient and unsuitable for the particular business carried on by your Petitioner, he has been accustomed since the establishment of his said business in this Colony to import such fruits as gooseberries, strawberries, raspberries, black and red currants, and occasionally plums, from the neighbouring Colony of

Tasmania, for the purpose of converting same into jams.
4. That in or about the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, your Petitioner, having returned to Tasmania from a voyage to England, then for the first time in these Colonies introduced a system largely used on the continent and in England, for the conveyance of green fruit intended for jam-making over long distances, and for lessening the bulk of same whilst in transit, and affording greater protection

against the immediate decay to which whole fruits loosely packed in heaps or large quantities are liable.

5. That the system so used consists of taking the green fruit plucked from the tree and placing same in "boiling-pans" at once without the addition of water (except occasionally with hard fruits, and then only in a very small quantity-sufficient to prevent the pan from burning and for no other purpose) or sugar, or In a very small quantity—sufficient to prevent the pan from burning and for no other purpose) or sugar, or any other article or preserving substance. The fruit is then brought to the boiling point, and at once removed from the pans and placed in large tins or casks and closed against contact with the air. In this state the boiled fruit is technically known as "pulp fruit," and in that condition is not fit, nor is it used for, any purpose or for any commercial use other than that of being made into jam. The pulp fruit is then shipped from Tasmania and landed at Sydney, where the tins and casks are opened on arrival at the manufactory, and thereupon manufactured into jam. The process employed in so manufacturing the "pulp fruit" into jam is in every respect the same and in your way different from the process employed in some into jam is in every respect the same, and in no way different, from the process employed in converting the green fruit plucked from the tree into jam. The same boiling is necessary and the same quantity of sugar is used as in the case of fruit fresh plucked from the tree.

6. Upon the first introduction into this Colony of pulp fruit for the purpose of manufacturing it into jam, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and for some time afterwards, the article was admitted free of import duty at the Customs until representations were made by other jam manufacturers in Hobart to the then Colonial Treasurer of this Colony, that the pulp was a dutiable article, and was being admitted free, when an import duty of one penny per pound was levied upon a shipment of the pulp fruit under the one hundred and thirty-third clause of the Customs Regulation Act, 42 Victoria, No. 19. Your Petitioner paid the duty thereon under protest, and upon appealing to the then Colonial Treasurer, the Honorable James Watson, and after a searching investigation into the nature of the article, including an appealing and after a searching investigation into the nature of the article, including an analytical examination which proved the absence of any preserving substance, the duty was refunded, and on the thirty-first day of July, 1882, a Treasury order was issued in respect of the said article in the following terms:—" Fruits green, raspberry, black and red currant, and strawberry pulp, boiled with-

out the addition of water, sugar, or any other article, and packed in tins containing not less than 8 gallons, free, T.O., 9019—31/7/82."

7. That from that time until the third day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the said article was admitted free of duty to this Colony; but that on the fourth day of October the present Collector of Customs, by order of the then Colonial Treasurer, issued a notice rescinding the Treasury Order above mentioned from and after the third day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

8. That on the seventeenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, your Petitioner received a shipment of fourteen thousand pounds of raspberry pulp, valued at one hundred and twenty pounds sterling, in tins containing not less than eight gallons, on which a duty of one penny per pound was levied, amounting to fifty-eight pounds six shillings and eight pence; and also two thousand one hundred and thirty-nine pounds of gooseberry pulp, contained in seven casks, and valued at twenty-three pounds sterling, on which a duty of one penny per pound was levied, amounting to eight pounds eighteen shillings and three pence.

9. That your Petitioner applied to the Treasury to be informed under what head the duty was demanded, and was informed by letter from the Treasury that the duty was so levied under the head

of preserves.

10. That your Petitioner paid the said duty under protest, and appealed to the Commissioners of Customs by whom an inquiry was held, at which the Collector of Customs attended and evidence taken and a decision given that the article was not jam or preserve and was not liable to duty under the tariff.

11. That immediately after the decision of the Commissioners of Customs had been given a notice or

order was issued by the Hon. the Colonial Treasurer imposing a duty of one penny per pound on pulp fruit under section one hundred and thirty-three of the Customs Regulation Act.

12. On the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, after the issuing of the above notice, your Petitioner received a shipment of pulp fruit at Sydney, packed in tins and casks, containing not less than eight gallons and consisting of seven thousand two hundred and eighty-five pounds of pulp, of the value of sixty pounds sterling, on which a duty of one penny per pound was levied, amounting to thirty pounds seven shillings and one penny; and on the first day of December following your Petitioner received a further shipment of eleven thousand eight hundred and thirty-six pounds of pulp, of the value of one hundred pounds sterling, on which a duty of one penny per pound was levied, amounting to forty-nine pounds six shillings and four pence, and your Petitioner paid the duty in each case under protest.

13. That your Petitioner thereupon in accordance with the provisions of the Customs Regulation Act commenced proceedings in the Supreme Court of this Colony against the Collector of Customs for the

recovery of the respective amounts so paid under protest.

14. That the said action was tried on the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, before his Honor Mr. Justice Innes, and a jury of four persons, at Sydney, and a verdict returned in your Petitioner's favor, the jury finding specially, in answer to a question put by his Honor, that the article on which the duty had been levied was not jam or preserve, but was the raw material.

15. That green fruits which are the raw material in jam-making have always, as far as your Petitioner is aware, been admitted into this Colony free of duty according to the tariff, yet about the twentieth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the then Colonial Treasurer, the Honorable George Richard Dibbs, inspected at the Grafton Wharf some samples of fresh raspberries in their natural state belonging respectively to Messrs. Floyd, Turner, and your Petitioner, imported from Tasmania, and thereupon issued instructions to levy a duty upon them of one penny per pound, which was accordingly done, and the duty so imposed was paid by your Petitioner under protest, upon the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, amounting to twenty-eight pounds seven shillings, and the fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, amounting to twenty-one pounds and ten pence, which duty has not been refunded your Petitioner.

16. That your Petitioner now views with alarm the fact that the fiscal proposals of the present Government include a definite duty of one penny per pound on all pulp fruit imported into this Colony, inasmuch as such a proposal if carried into effect will have the effect of practically closing the large and important industry carried on by your Petitioner in this Colony, and sacrificing his manufactory, machinery,

and appliances, and throwing a large number of workmen out of employment.

17. That the relative cost of jam manufactured in this Colony under such a tariff, compared with jam manufactured in Tasmania, is shown in the following table :-

18. That your Petitioner is already a large contributor to the revenue of this Colony in the shape of duty at the rate of five pounds sterling per ton on sugar, on which no drawback is allowed as in Tasmania, and of which article one ton is required to every ton of fruit pulp in the process of jam manufacture.

Your Petitioner humbly submits that pulp fruit is really only green fruit, which is now on the free

list, and on which no duty is proposed to be levied.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that your honorable House will not consent to the imposition of a duty thereon; and further that he, or Counsel learned in the law, on his behalf, should be heard at the Bar of your Honorable House, as to the true character of this article, and to represent the circumstances under which the proposed duty will be levied, and the mischief which will be caused thereby to your Petitioner and others, and generally on behalf of your Petitioner's case.

And your Petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever humbly pray, &c.

(PETITION FROM WILLIAM PEACOCK.)

Received by the Legislative Assembly, 14 September, 1886.

The Honorable the Speaker and the Honorable Members of the Legislative Assembly.

The Petition of the undersigned, a manufacturer in the Colony of New South Wales,-

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:-

That in February, 1885, under the Customs' Tariff Act of New South Wales, green fruit was allowed to be imported into this Colony, free of duty.

That in February, 1885, the Honorable G. R. Dibbs, as Colonial Treasurer, being head of the Customs' Department, visited the Grafton wharf with the Collector of Customs and having ascertained from the landing-waiter, in charge of that wharf, that certain fruit, then landing from the steamship "Flora" from Hobart, was green fruit, ordered the said landing-waiter to allow none to leave the wharf till duty at the rate of one penny per lb. had been paid.

That certain casks of green fruit imported respectively by Messrs. Griffiths, Floyd, Turner, and Peacock, solely for use for manufacturing into jam in Sydney (being raspberries, strawberries, and currants) were so levied upon at the rate of one penny-per lb. duty.

That entries were received at the Customs' House from your Petitioner paying duty under protest for twenty casks green fruit (raspberries), amounting to £28 7s., upon 21st February, 1885, and upon fifteen casks of green fruit (raspberries), amounting to £21 0s. 10d., upon 5th March, 1885, and such moneys have never been refunded to your Petitioner.

That in February, 1885, your Petitioner's agent, Henry John Pryde, waited upon the Honorable G. R. Dibbs, at the Treasury, in company with William Floyd, to protest against the illegal levy upon green fruit above referred to.

That the Honorable G. R. Dibbs then offered to these importers if they would not contest such levy upon green fruit that he (the Honorable G. R. Dibbs) would order a refund of one half of the duty levied.

That if the importers did contest such levy of duty upon green fruit he (the Honorable G. R. Dibbs) would send the Inspector of Nuisances to the wharf to condemn the shipment.

That under instructions from the Honorable G. R. Dibbs, as Treasurer, the Customs' Department, in September, 1884, levied duty upon pulp fruit as being a preserve.

That such levy was declared illegal by the Commissioners of Customs upon 17th November, 1884.

That the day following the decision given by the Commissioners of Customs a Government proclamation was issued, signed by the Honorable G. R. Dibbs, ordering levy upon pulp fruit on the grounds of its approximation to jam and preserves, under the authority of 133rd clause of Customs' Act, while at this date such clause was *ultra vires* by decision of the full Court of this Colony.

That upon 3rd June, 1885, the Supreme Court, presided over by Mr. Justice Innes, decided that pulp fruit did not approximate to jam or preserve.

That upon 10th May, 1886, an appeal by the Collector of Customs from the verdict of Supreme Court was upheld by the full Court upon the grounds that the Privy Council had decided that the Law Courts could not go behind the Collector of Customs' "opinion," no matter how absurd such opinion might be.

That your Petitioner humbly believes that no part of the 133rd clause of Customs Act was ever intended by your Honorable House to confer upon the Collector of Customs the power to levy duty upon any article that does not as a matter of fact approximate to some other and dutiable article.

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That under Schedule B of the Customs' Tariff Bill, recently before your Honorable House, green fruit is again admitted free into this Colony.

That under Schedule A of the same Bill all soft green fruits (raspberries, strawberries, and currants) are subject to duty at the rate of one penny per lb.

That your Petitioner has, in consequence of unjust charges brought against him by the Honorable G. R. Dibbs, as Colonial Secretary, suffered much in fortune and reputation.

That your Petitioner has been informed that an agent for the sale of Tasmanian jams in Sydney has publicly stated that Mr. A. Hilder and himself induced the Honorable G. R. Dibbs to levy duty upon pulp fruit.

That the Mr. A. Hilder referred to has acted as chairman of an election committee formed to secure the election of the Honorable G. R. Dibbs to your Honorable House.

That as your Honorable House is the only tribunal that can take cognizance of the matters referred to in this petition, your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that your Honorable House will in such manner, as in your wisdom seems proper, cause full inquiry to be made into the matter herein referred to; as also of the nature and character of pulp fruit and the various actions taken by the Customs' Department in reference to pulp fruit since its first introduction into New South Wales.

And your Petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever humbly pray, &c.

(PETITION! FROM CIGAR-MANUFACTURERS AND OTHERS.)

Received by the Legislative Assembly, 20 May, 1886.

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament.

The humble Petition of the undersigned Cigar-manufacturers and others interested in the cigar trade,—

Most respectfully Showeth:-

That for some time prior to the first day of March, A.D. 1884, your Petitioners were following their business of Cigar-manufacturers in the city of Sydney and elsewhere in the Colony of New South Wales, obtaining therefrom a respectable livelihood for themselves and families.

That the business up to the date mentioned was a growing industry and afforded lucrative employment to many operatives, and additional manufactories were from time to time being opened.

That in the early part of the year A.D. 1884, the then Government of New South Wales passed a Bill through your Honorable House levying an excise of two shillings and sixpence per pound upon all cigars manufactured in this Colony, which said measure is so restrictive and prohibitory as to render it impossible for your Petitioners to follow their business except at a loss, and they have in consequence abandoned it.

That your Petitioners having been bred to the said business of cigar-manufacturing, which is of so light nature, requiring delicacy of touch rather than muscular exertion, have much difficulty in adapting themselves to other pursuits, especially in these times of commercial depression, and therefore pray that your Honorable House will be pleased to take the premises into consideration, and repeal such portions of the measure mentioned in the foregoing paragraph as press in a prohibitory manner upon their business.

Your Petitioners respectfully submit that, if the excise regulations were amended by your Honorable House so that the duty or excise chargeable on cigars manufactured in the Colony were assimilated to and made identical with that chargeable upon tobacco so manufactured, they would be relieved and be enabled to resume their business.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that your Honorable House in its wisdom will, in the manner suggested above, or in such other way as you in the exercise of your judgment may deem expedient, afford them the relief prayed for by the removal of the present prohibitive excise.

And your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c., &c., &c.
