## NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## AUDITOR-GENERAL

ON

THE TREASURER'S STATEMENT OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE OF THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND, AND OTHER MONEYS, FOR THE YEAR 1889.

(Under Act 33 Victoria No. 18).

1. THE Treasurer's Statements of his Receipts and Disbursements, under all divisions of the Public Accounts during the year 1889, were received for examination on the 22nd March, and were returned for correction on the 22nd May. The Statements were received back from the Treasury on 24th June, amended as required, except in one particular, which, however, was finally acceded to on 12th July, and I have now the honor to submit those Statements of the Public Accounts for 1889 to the Legislative Assembly, with the following Report and explanations, as directed by the 38th section of the Audit Act of 1870.

## GENERAL STATE OF THE BALANCES.

2. The gross amount of the year's operations under the three General Divisions of the Public Account, namely, the Consolidated Revenue Fund, the Loans Fund, and the Trust Fund, together with the Balances resulting at the close of the year, are as follow:—

4. Under the authority of the Act 53 Victoria No. 9, however, Treasury Bills were issued to the amount of £1,907,100, and the proceeds were credited to the Consolidated Revenue Fund, upon condition of being redeemed at a rate of not less than £150,000 annually, to commence with the present year. This arrangement was made to provide temporarily for the extinction of the actual and estimated overdraft on the Revenue Account of £2,600,000. The actual overdraft, however, had only reached at Sydney, on the 31st December, the sum of £1,362,940 18s. 4d., as shown above, but by the credit of £1,907,100 on the 31st December there was created a financial surplus of £544,159 1s. 8d. towards meeting further overdrafts, estimated to accrue subsequently to the close of the year, by the discharge of liabilities outstanding at that date.

5. As the balance surplus just quoted differs considerably from what is stated at page 11 to be at the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, it is necessary to explain that, for the purposes of this Statement, the sum set out as "Balance of Old Loans Account" must be treated, by the Acts under which it arose, as part of the Revenue Account; and further, that the amount of "Other Payments," being of a temporary nature and recoverable, cannot properly be treated as a part of a deficiency debt. 6. In regard to placing the Balance on the "Old Loans Account" to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Account, an explanatory memorandum is attached (Appendix B). The Revenue being pledged to the repayment of the Loans is entitled to credit for all unexpended or unused Balances of the sums borrowed towards meeting its obligations when they mature, and those Balances cannot be "appropriated" to any other service except under an Act of Parliament. Reference was also made to the matter in my Report on the Accounts of 1883, in which it was suggested that advantage should at least be taken of this Balance to apply it in redemption of the old Debentures as they mature, and so far reduce the annual charge against the Revenue for interest thereupon. An opportunity for doing this will occur again during next year, when there falls to be paid off £225,000 of the Old Loans Bonds.

7. It should be remarked here also that the amount of the Temporary Issues, taken credit for above as a recoverable asset, has been increased by the amount of the expenditure in advance on account of the Centennial Park (51 Victoria No. 9), as explained in paragraph 8 of last year's report. With the additional expenditure of £56,915 2s. 8d. now shown in 1889 as a recoverable item, the total advance on this account reached £143,986 14s. 1d.

8. There is another matter that also requires adjustment, namely, the expenditure in connection with the Vote of £150,000, taken in 1879, for the erection of a new Free Public Library, out of what was then treated as Surplus Revenue. The bulk of that Vote was applied in payment of compensation for land and buildings, resumed between Elizabeth and Castlereagh Streets in 1880, with the presumed intention to erect thereupon the new Library Buildings, while a part of the Vote has since been expended in the reconstruction and extension of the old building in Macquarie-street. A portion of the resumed land and buildings has in the meantime been used for High Schools for Boys and Girls and for a new Public School. Now that the original purpose of the Vote of 1879 has been carried out otherwise, it is necessary that the actual expenditure for other than Library purposes should be transferred to some other head of service, as Parliament may direct. Fuller details will be found in Appendix C.

9. Although the Revenue Account is now shown to have a balance on the credit side it must be borne in mind that, until the actual Revenue balances the excess of expenditure over income, it must yet be considered as overdrawn to the extent of that excess. Until they be paid off the Treasury Bills merely constitute a fixed or legal form of the liability which existed prior to and independently of their issue on the part of the Revenue for the repayment of temporary drafts upon the Trust Funds.

10. There is, however, another element affecting the condition of the Cash Balance, as it stood at the close of the year, to which attention was drawn in the sixth paragraph of last year's Report, namely, the establishment of Cash Credit Accounts with the Banks for the discharge of public liabilities prior to their being brought into the Public Account. By that process expenditure on account of Railway Working Expenses had been met by drafts on a Cash Credit Account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank to the amount of £81,345 18s. 1d., which, not having been transferred to the Public Account on or before the 31st December, does not, of course, appear in the Treasurer's Statement. As there was a sufficient balance (£181,005 13s. 7d.) on the Vote for the Working Expenses of the Railways for 1889 to have allowed of the transfer within the year there is no apparent reason why it was not made.

11. The Cash Credit just referred to was established in June, 1889, upon a letter from the Secretary for Railways, dated 1st March, asking that "a Credit to the amount of £100,000 in favour of the Railway Commissioners be opened with the Bank doing the Railway business, and be maintained at that amount during the year." A Treasury Minute of 31st May explains the arrangements under which it was proposed to open a Cash Credit Account to meet the request of the Commissioners, but the arrangement differs materially from that pointed out in my Minute of 29th April, 1889, replying to the Treasury reference to me on the Commissioners' letter. The statement that the proposal to substitute a Cash Advance for a Cash  
Credit



Credit would unnecessarily weaken the General Account of the Government in the Bank" is hardly intelligible in the face of a Bank Credit Balance at the time of £1,370,463 Os. 2d., and the fact that early in this year, when the Bank Balance was only £913,492 19s. 8d., a Cash Advance was actually made for the same amount in closing the Credit Account, goes to show that there was little force in the argument against it.

12. The drafts against the credit, or, in other words, the sums advanced by the Australian Joint Stock Bank, up to the close of the year, amounted to no less a sum than £1,204,876 1s. 4d., of which, as above stated, there remained a balance against the Treasury of £81,345 18s. 1d. The whole of those Advances, with further sums to the extent of £113,980 2s. 8d. up to the close of the Account in March of this year, making in all £1,318,856 4s., have unquestionably been made in a manner quite opposed to the principles of the Audit Act.

Moreover, the repayments to the credit of the Commissioners, by way of periodical recoups to the Bank for their Advances, were made upon Vouchers bearing acquittances couched in terms inadequate to meet the facts of the case. This was pointed out to the Treasury in my minute of 25th September, which will be found with the other correspondence on the subject in Appendix D.

As the Treasury declined to furnish any other acquittances in substitution for those, which there was no alternative but to reject, an acquittance was obtained from the Bank covering specifically each amount repaid to cover the Commissioners' drafts, and thus enabled me to pass the Vouchers and allow the Treasurer credit for the same.

13. The Cash Credit Advances by the Associated Banks which remained untransferred on 31st December, 1888, have been cleared during the year, after being first enlarged to the amounts following, viz. :—

As the Audit Act recognizes no arrangement for making payments of any kind on account of the Public Revenue without appropriation by the Legislature, nor, when such exists, for making, or arranging for, payments, except in the manner prescribed by sections 11 to 14, the whole of these cash credit transactions must be held to have taken place contrary to the Audit Act.

14. It is difficult to understand why this course should have been followed when there was statutory provision, in one form or other, for making the payments in the regular way, and it is very much to be regretted that the salutary provisions of the Audit Act for the regulation of the Public Accounts have been disregarded in the way above stated.

15. The Vote of £20,000, item 615 of 1886, and the Supplementary Vote thereto of £30,000, taken in 1887, having been passed subject to a schedule of particulars of the expenditure thereof being laid before Parliament, a detailed statement showing the disposal of these Votes is given in Appendix E.

16.

16. In the item of £1,084 16s. 2d. for Preliminary Expenses of Municipal Institutions (page 54) there is included a sum of £294 18s. 3d. for the conveyance, by railway, of representatives to the Annual Conference of the Municipal Association of New South Wales, held at the Town Hall, Sydney, in September last; but, as the Municipalities Act of 1867 affords no sanction for such an expenditure, the Treasury have been asked to provide a Parliamentary authority for the payment of the amount, which has, in the meantime, been disallowed in the Treasurer's Accounts.

17. The Nominal Liabilities of the Revenue, under statute and otherwise, so far as known to the close of the past year, are set forth as usual in Appendix A. The apparent balance of undischarged claims, £1,770,309 3s. 5d., is of course subject to modification by the lapsing of unrequired balances of appropriations. It is much to be regretted that as yet no provision has been made for absolutely closing the accounts at the 31st December in such a manner as to remove the uncertain elements in them which now preclude a satisfactory and definite statement of the position of the Revenue Account at the close of the Financial year.

18. The current demands of the Public Service were provided for by Temporary Supply Acts up to 10th October, the date of the passing of the Appropriation Act of 1889.

Those Acts covered an appropriation of moneys to the extent in all of £5,493,252 in anticipation of the final Act of Appropriation for the year, and include appropriations which are not represented in the final Act to the amount of £111,700.

There appears to be no reason why omissions of this kind should occur from year to year—on the contrary their occurrence is calculated to create confusion and apparent discrepancies in the accounts. The correct course is undoubtedly to enumerate in the final Act all previous temporary Acts of Appropriation for the same services.

19. The first of the Temporary Supply Acts for 1889, 52 Victoria No. 18, provided for current claims up to 31st March, but as it did not pass until the 8th of that month, payments were made at the Treasury during the month of February without appropriation or warrant to the amount of £625,611 1s. 4d. The Act referred to contains a schedule of those payments, and likewise an indemnity to the Colonial Treasurer and all other persons for having thus anticipated the sanction of Parliament in making them. This is the second occasion on which an Act of Indemnity has been passed for the expenditure of the Revenue without Parliamentary sanction since the Audit Act of 1870.

#### THE TRUST FUNDS ACCOUNT.

20. The Trust Funds show a comparatively small augmentation of the balance at their united credit of £30,448 19s. upon the transactions of the year. Exclusive of investments, the gross receipts and transfers were £4,713,589 16s. 10d., and the reissues, £4,683,140 17s. 10d., leaving, with the balance from the year 1888, a gross credit balance of £2,893,618 3s. 3d. at 31st December.

21. The greater portion of that balance (£2,319,227 12s. 3d.) has now been invested in Government securities, Treasury Bills at par, bearing interest at 4 per cent., having been issued under the Act 53 Victoria No. 9, to the amount of

£1,652,100, in lieu of temporary advances to the Revenue Account. As interest at 4 per cent. was paid upon the overdraft of the Revenue Account, the actual investment of the amount in Treasury Bills, while placing both the Revenue and Trust Funds in a legal relation to each other, does not practically make any immediate difference in the condition of either fund. The investment was only completed on the 31st December.

22. The extent of operations upon each separate head of account may be seen at pages 11 and 113, where also are shown the variations in the balances between the commencement and close of the year. The investments in Treasury Bills were distributed as follows, viz. :—

23. The Superannuation Account of the Civil Service exhibits considerable expansion, the year closing with an increase of £68,301 6s. 7d. in the balance at its credit, which then amounted to £362,119 4s. 3d., as the result of five years' operation.

The number of pensioners paid within the year was 321, as against 203, the total amount showing £34,793 3s. 9d., as against £22,004 15s. in 1888. The recipients of gratuities numbered 155, as against 66 in the previous year, and the expense to the Fund reached the sum of £21,375 10s. 6d., the amount for 1888 having been only £10,449 4s. 3d.; but as there was a special contribution by the Consolidated Revenue Fund towards a portion of those gratuities of £13,088 8s. 3d., the cost, as a whole, to the Superannuation Account was only £8,287 2s. 3d., or a decrease of £2,162 2s.

24. The annual rate of pensions in course of payment, exclusive of those provided from Schedule B, amounted, at 31st December, to £41,358 14s. 5d., or an increase during the year of £15,606 11s. 6d. The increased rate, however, together with the gratuities, is still considerably within the nominal income of the Fund, derived from the deduction of 4 per cent. from the salaries of Public Officers, augmented, as that now is, by the interest payable on the accumulated funds under the 54th section of the Civil Service Act of 1884. The Report of the Civil Service Board for 1889 affords further information as to the condition and prospects of the Superannuation Account.

25. The pensions and gratuities paid from the Police Superannuation Fund amounted to £15,272 7s. 2d., an increase of £1,545 15s. 7d. over the previous year, and in excess of the year's income by £7,730 3s. 6d. That excess was partly met, as usual, by a transfer of £6,596 14s. 3d. from the Police Reward Fund, leaving still a reduction of £1,133 9s. 3d. on the balance at the credit of the Superannuation Fund, the balance on the combined funds being reduced upon the year's operations by £2,132 7s. 8d.

26. Finding that a large portion of the "Over Issues" Account was taken up with transactions connected with Loan Services, it was suggested to the Treasury to state these in a separate line. That suggestion was acceded to, and it may now be observed that the Loan portion of the Account stood at the close of the year with a balance credit of £70,164 6s. 4d., distributed to the several services in Statement D, at page 114.

Many of these items arise out of the temporary use of moneys at credit of Loan Votes for services that were not permanently chargeable thereto. This has perhaps been in some cases unavoidable, but there is reason to believe that, to meet a present exigency, sufficient care has not always been exercised in correctly placing expenditure when first incurred where it is intended to be finally charged.

Some provision is made for temporary charges by the "Railway Stores Account" and the "Advances to Contractors Account," but it would seem to be insufficient, especially since the Railway Service has reached such large dimensions, and is likely to require a very much larger margin of funds available for preliminary purchases, and for services at first of a necessarily mixed character.

27. In connection with the Public Schools Property Fund, a question arose as to the interpretation of the provisions of the fourth section of the Public Instruction Act of 1880. An advance of £10,000 (and subsequently a further sum of £4,904 7s.) was made to the Public Instruction Department in general terms for "additional expenditure" to be charged to the fund quoted, without any specific authority for the application of the moneys raised by the sale of school property to the purposes described in section 4 of 43 Victoria No. 23. On application for such authority, minutes of the proceedings of the Governor and Executive Council were furnished for the sale of the school sites, &c., but they contained no directions for the disposal of the proceeds.

To use the money so raised in a general way for any new sites or buildings, except in replacement of those sold, appeared to be an irregular course of proceeding, as it practically involved the expenditure of money outside the limits of Parliamentary sanction. This would obviously be the case where a school property had been obtained for a comparatively small sum out of a Vote, and disposed of at a large profit, unless the larger sum was specifically required for and devoted to the replacement of the old property by a new and better one for the same purpose.

28. That view of the case, so far as relates to the investments, was disputed by the Minister for Public Instruction, and was also declared by the Attorney-General to be untenable, but both the Minister and the Attorney-General claim that the power to sell includes the power to convey, a power that could not well be, nor was, in any way disputed. The Attorney-General's opinion is, however, to the effect that the authorities of the Governor and Executive Council were imperfect, and advised that in future they should include not only power to sell, but also to convey and to invest. This has been attended to in recent authorities of the kind.

29. The object of the section 4 in question appears to be the same as that of section 37 of the Public Works Act of 1888, adopting the principle of section 21 of the Railway Act 22 Victoria No. 19, and which is held to mean that ample authority is intended to be conveyed in cases where lands resumed or purchased are unavoidably in excess of requirements in one direction, and not sufficient in another, for the sale of excesses, and the application of the proceeds to make good deficiencies for the same purposes.

This view of the matter seems certainly to be supported by the further provision of section 95 of the Public Works Act, for the disposal of superfluous lands (as also in section 22 of 44 Victoria No. 16), but, there being no similar provision in the Public Instruction Act, the wording of clause 4, as it stands, may seem to justify the wider interpretation contended for by the Minister for Public Instruction; but in that view the procedure under it, as already indicated, is certainly liable to irregularity, if not abuse. See Appendix F for explanatory correspondence and the opinion of the Attorney-General above referred to.

#### THE TREASURER'S ADVANCE ACCOUNT.

30. The Treasurer's Advance Vote for 1888 was duly adjusted by the 31st December, 1889, and upon the corresponding Vote for 1889 there remained, at the same date, a credit balance of £91,944 3s. 6d. (For details of the application of the difference, £108,055 16s. 6d., see Appendix G.) Excluding the transfer adjustment to the Revenue of the Vote of 1888, the operations upon the account as a Trust Fund during the year represented credits to the amount of £593,353 12s. 1d., and issues to the amount of £501,409 8s. 7d. These figures serve to indicate that a very free use is made of the Advance Account for temporary payments, many of which, it is believed, might very properly have been postponed until the ordinary funds became available to which they were chargeable.

31. This free use of the Advance Fund is calculated also to create difficulties in clearing payments which, under pressure, are so apt to be made without due inquiry into the circumstances in which they are alleged to be required. A notable instance of this occurred on 31st December, 1888, where a payment in advance was made to the Railway Revenue of £5,000 to meet a claim supposed to be due to the Railway Department for the conveyance of exhibits to the Melbourne Centennial International Exhibition. The payment having been made, it had of course to be covered, and a Supplementary Vote to the amount was taken for it, and carried to the credit of the Advance Account.

Through an incidental query it came under notice that the great bulk of the exhibits were not sent by rail at all, but were sent to and returned from Melbourne by sea. On being pressed for a statement to justify their charge of £5,000, the Railway Department utterly failed to show that they had any claim to more at the very outside than £600 or £700 for the service, and in consequence a surcharge of £4,300 was forwarded to the Treasury, with a view to an adjustment of the error before the close of the year, but no attention was paid to it, leaving the Railway receipts of 1888 overcredited by £4,300, and the ordinary revenue overdebited in a like amount. Further particulars of this case are given in Appendix H.

## GENERAL LOAN ACCOUNT.

32. The year opened with a cash balance at the credit of the General Loan Account of £3,055,574 17s., raised under Loan Acts up to 48 Victoria No. 26, inclusively. To this was added a credit of £1,500,000 as part proceeds of a new loan negotiated in July under the Acts 48 Victoria No. 26, and 52 Victoria No. 16.

The disbursements for Loan Services detailed at pages 71 to 79 show that for all such services up to 48 Victoria No. 26, inclusively, only £259,970 11s. 11d. were required, and under 52 Victoria No. 16, £896,100 authorized by that Act for Renewal of Loans were brought to account by the close of the year. The remaining payments were made on account of services authorized (£1,209,810 14s. 6d.) in connection with Loan Acts 50 Victoria No. 28, 52 Victoria No. 17, and 53 Victoria No. 23—on account of neither of which Acts has any loan yet been raised.

33. The additional loan above referred to was for three and a half millions sterling, and was placed as Inscribed Stock by the Bank of England under the Act of 1883, bearing interest at £3 10s. per cent., for thirty years from the 1st June, 1889. The gross proceeds—£3,584,104 19s.—show that the loan was negotiated at a premium of £2 8s. 0 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per cent., but the usual charges having amounted to £57,894 10s. 10d., and the net proceeds being, consequently, £3,526,210 8s. 2d., the nominal premium is reduced to 14s. 11 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. nearly.

34. The whole Loan having been brought to credit in London by the 31st December, and bearing interest from the 1st June previous, the principal must be treated as an addition to the Public Debt for the year 1889, although, following the practice of former years, where a Loan cannot be fully credited in Sydney within the year, it is excluded from the Annual Statement of Outstanding Debt which accompanies the Accounts.

35. The over-issue of Debentures under 39 Victoria No. 18, noticed last year, has been corrected by a retransfer to the Assurance Fund of the principal and premium, £7,668 (with a corresponding retransfer of the interest paid thereon to the Revenue Account). Debentures were also paid off to the amount of £946,600—by renewals, £901,100, and by revenue, under the Million Loan Act of 1867, £45,500.

36. The operations of the year have therefore left the Public Debt at the close of it as follows:—

37. The total annual expenditure to the end of 1889 for Loan Services amounted to £44,748,551 12s. 1d., as detailed at pages 115-116, and in Appendix I.

38. An additional Loan Act, 53 Victoria No. 23, giving authority to borrow a further sum, in all of £5,089,896, was passed in October, covering a large and varied range of services. Towards meeting those services there was expended a sum in all of £324,952 5s. 1d., taken out of the General Loan Balance in hand in anticipation of the Loan authorized to be raised for them.

39. Attention was directed in last year's Report to the anomalous condition of the General Loans Fund, consequent on the want of agreement between the purposes for which moneys had been raised and the purposes to which the moneys had been applied.

Excepting the amount required for the renewal of Loans under 52 Victoria No. 16, £1,390,600, the Loan of 1889 is credited as a further instalment on account of the Act 48 Victoria No. 26, or an addition of £2,135,610 8s. 2d. to the amount already borrowed in excess of authorities to expend under it, making a total of £8,840,828 7s. 5d. raised for railway lines for the construction of which no sufficient authority had been, nor has yet been, obtained. This is the more remarkable that the Public Works Act, passed on the 5th June, 1888, practically repealed the appropriations of 1884, or at all events precluded action in regard to the railway lines referred to until each had passed through the process prescribed by that Act, including a specific Act of Parliament to fully authorize its construction.

In the circumstances, to have further exercised the borrowing powers granted under the Loan Act of 1884 for railways or other works where the authority for the construction of them beyond a certain limit of cost was liable to be negatived by the operation of the later Act of 1888 appears to require explanation and justification.

40. Inasmuch, moreover, as there is not in any of the Loan Acts of 1871 and subsequent years, nor in the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879, any provision whatever for disposing of any surplus money arising out of excessive Loans, or short expenditure of appropriations, there would seem to be a necessity for some supplementary Act of Parliament to direct the manner in which such surplus money shall be applied. There are already considerable sums in the position referred to which, although treated as written off from the Appropriation Accounts, cannot be expended for their original purpose, nor be "appropriated" to any other purpose except in the

reduction of the debt incurred by the Loan for it. In the meantime the money merely goes to swell the cash balance on hand, of course bearing all the while a profitless charge for interest.

41. The Unapplied Balances of sums authorized to be raised by Loan, for all services classed under the General Loan Account, at the close of the year amounted in gross to £19,525,183 4s., but a large proportion of this is subject to the operation of the Public Works Act of 1888, and consequently the amount as a whole may not improbably be reduced, and the details of the appropriations may have to be varied. To meet this sum, including the Loan of 1889 in full, there was a balance on hand in Sydney and London, in cash and Exchequer Bills, of £4,208,235 18s. 9d., thus showing that to complete the whole of the services, if carried out, and at their estimated cost, so far as stated in the several Loan Acts, there would still require to be raised a sum of £15,316,947 5s. 3d.

#### THE RAILWAY ACCOUNTS.

42. The balance of collections from intercolonial traffic with the Colonies of Queensland and South Australia for the year was in favour of this Colony, and has been credited at the Treasury in due course. The like accounts with the Colony of Victoria showed sums due by New South Wales through the year to an amount in all of £20,261 16s. 1d., which has been adjusted, as usual, with the Treasurer of Victoria. The collections on account of the tramline traffic to Lady Robinson's Beach from Rockdale were £1,343 18s. 1d.

Prior to June last the freight and traffic charges, as between the Railway Commissioners and the steamship companies, were adjusted at the Railway Traffic and Audit Branches at Newcastle, and the net amount only was remitted to the Treasury, but since the abolition of the local offices the gross collections by the Commissioners are credited at Sydney, and the claims of the companies are paid direct from the Treasury. In this way a sum of £4,723 2s. 7d. will be seen at page 53 as steam freight refunded.

The above figures include, as usual, sums paid out of Votes of Parliament, or other sources, for the value of work done by the Railway Department, and brought to account during the year. Those sums amounted in all to £132,247 11s. 8d., an increase over the similar credits of 1888 of £25,950 12s. 4d.



43. The gross receipts realized and credited to the close of the year exceeded the gross payments within the year for working expenses by the sum of £900,133 18s. 5d., or an advance on 1888 of £67,645 11s. 10d. The following table shows the progressive condition of the relation between income and expenditure within each year from 1884 to 1889, and of the balance of realized earnings in reduction of the annual charge for interest on capital, and other items not accounted for as working expenses :—

44. In regard to the accounts of the Railway receipts furnished for audit, a question of some difficulty arose as to the signatures which should be attached to the monthly attested accounts required by the Audit Act to be furnished by the officer or officers responsible for the collection of the Railway revenue under the Government Railways Act of 1888, and also to the collection vouchers furnished daily to the Treasury in support and explanation of the sums deposited in the name of the Railway Commissioners in the Bank appointed to receive the Railway collections on behalf of the Public Account.

From the commencement of the new Railway administration in October, 1888, to the 31st December, 1889, a monthly attested account was supplied, signed by one of the Commissioners for himself and colleagues, but upon requiring a similar signature to the daily receipt or collection vouchers, the Commissioners demurred on the ground that their signature to the attested accounts was sufficient, and also that it would involve the consumption of a large amount of time that was wanted for more important work. It should be stated that the vouchers in question are signed by the Accountant or some other subordinate officer "*pro* Commissioners."

Finding that the Audit Act in no way recognized the signature of a delegate to any document which, by the nature of it, is intended to fix the responsibility of its contents upon the Accounting Officer himself, and that the Commissioners declined to affix their own signatures to the documents in question, a case was submitted for the opinion of the Attorney-General upon the point. That opinion was to the effect that as a matter of strict law there could be no doubt that the Public Accountant should himself sign the vouchers, and not by a deputy.

45. The Commissioners, thinking that the case had not been put fully before the Attorney-General, obtained a further opinion upon their view of matters, but that second opinion emphasized the former one at greater length, with a suggestion, however, that "if the Auditor-General thinks fit to dispense with the signatures of the Commissioners to the vouchers, and the transmission of the returns and the subscription of the declarations by them, he may legally do so." There is a further suggestion that the toll-collectors might sign the vouchers, transmit the returns, and subscribe the declarations as Public Accountants, and expressing "a hope that the Auditor-General and the Commissioners may be able to come to a satisfactory arrangement between themselves, by which the public interests may be conserved, and, at the same time, the law maintained."

At

At an interview with the Chief Commissioner on this subject, one way out of the difficulty appeared to be that the Government should be asked to appoint the Commissioners' Accountant to be the Accounting Officer for the Railway receipts under the Audit Act, and also to be the Accounting Officer for the Railway expenditure. If the Commissioners should succeed in obtaining such an authority from the Governor and Executive Council, it was stated that, of course, the vouchers would have to be accepted in that form. Two separate minutes were accordingly prepared with that view, and forwarded by the Commissioners to the Minister for Railways, and those minutes were subsequently by the Treasury referred to me, asking confirmation as to my assent to the proposition.

46. Feeling that there were grave objections to the proposal on several grounds, however well disposed to assist in getting over the difficulties started by the Commissioners, I considered it necessary to take the opportunity of stating reasons why the proposed appointment was inconsistent, at several points, with the relation in which the Commissioners stand to the Government under the Railways Act, as solely responsible for both the collections of the Railway revenue and the expenditure of the Votes for the maintenance of the Railway establishment.

Special attention is invited to the opinions of the Attorney-General and to the correspondence in connection with this subject, more especially to my minutes of 26th March, 1890, in reply to the Treasury reference, as the points raised reach beyond the Railway Commissioners, and may affect other Public Officers who are held responsible as Public Accountants.

If to meet the supposed difficulties it should be contemplated to make an alteration in the law, it appears to me that any alteration in the direction indicated would destroy the principle of personal responsibility on which the Railways and Audit Acts are framed. [*Vide Appendix J.*]

47. In the meantime the local inspection of the accounts of the Toll-collectors or Station-masters is carried out as frequently and as fully as the Staff of Inspectors at my command will allow. The results are compared with certain returns supplied from the Commissioners' Traffic Auditor's Office, and hitherto with the Commissioners' Attested Accounts, and the Treasury Collection Vouchers in support thereof. In the absence of the attested accounts there is no authoritative basis on which the audit of the Commissioners' accounts can be rounded up, but the process of inspection and audit by this Department in its ultimate results is effective in ascertaining that all cash, reported by the Station-masters as collected, is actually credited to the Public Account, and in ascertaining what sums remain uncollected or outstanding from any cause at the respective collecting stations so far as actual debits appear in the station books. As, however, there are necessarily considerable intervals between the visits of the Inspectors, the ultimate audit cannot be completed so early as might be desired.

48. During the past year 269 stations were visited once, with results very much about the same as were secured during 1888, and such results as continue to show the value of the independent inspection by this Department of the local station accounts. With the increasing numbers of collecting stations that will have to be formed on the new lines of railway now in course of authorization, there must be provided extra inspecting strength to successfully cope with additional accounts, and it may then become a question whether or not such inspection should take a wider scope than at present. Being chiefly a review audit, attention is given  
more

more to the ground work of the accounts than to their details, those being of course dealt with daily by the Commissioners' Audit Staff, while the local inspection is for the most part limited to the cash transactions of a few weeks prior to the visit of the Inspectors.

49. A schedule of variations in rates, or of additional rates, that have come under notice in the course of examination by the Inspectors as wanting a higher authority than that of the Commissioners, in terms of the Railways Act, but for which such authority was subsequently supplied, will be found as Appendix K.

50. It may be of some interest to note that at the 31st December, 1888, the amount outstanding in the Railway station books as uncollected earnings to that date was £106,512 2s. 6d., and that during the year 1889 there was debited as earnings the sum of £2,580,122 14s. 6d., or a gross total of £2,686,634 17s. to be accounted for by the Commissioners, and at the close of the year was represented by—

The special refunds and credits making up the above sum of £23,989 0s. 6d. are very numerous, and as they do not come into the Treasury Accounts in any way the Inspectors take special care that in every case they are justified by existing regulations, or are otherwise properly authenticated. Similar arrangements are carried out in the Accounts of the Tramway traffic.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

51. The Certificates of Discharge to the Treasurer have been issued subject to certain disallowances, which are set forth in Appendix L.

52. The Mint Bullion Accounts and the Savings' Bank Accounts have, after the usual examination, been certified to correctly represent the books and vouchers supporting the same.

53. The following Special Statements in continuation of similar ones accompanying former years' Accounts are appended, viz. :—

Statement of Advances to Public Officers and others awaiting adjustment (Appendix M).

Statement of Surcharges raised and recovered upon the Expenditure and Revenue Accounts (Appendix N).

Statement of Authorities granted by the Governor and Executive Council in relief of Public Accountants under Sections 30 and 31 of the Audit Act (Appendix O).

Statement of the Registration of Brands Account, 30 Victoria No. 12; of the Rabbit Account, 46 Victoria No. 14; and of the Abattoirs Fund, 14 Victoria No. 36 (Appendix P, Nos. 1, 2, and 3).

54. The cases of default that have come under notice during the year were the following, viz. :—

- Mr. W. P. Jones, Railway Goods Clerk, Petersham, found deficient £116 8s. 1d. He was allowed to make good the deficiency, and was dismissed the Service.
- Mr. J. T. Abbot, Railway Clerk, Quirindi. Deficiency, £5 16s. 10d., which was made good, but he was dismissed.
- Mr. W. Webb, Railway Goods Clerk, Albury, was found deficient £239 1s.; absconded. £17 12s. was due for salary, and Guarantee Society made good the remainder.
- Mr. J. R. M'Garrety, Station-master, Coolabah, was prosecuted at Dubbo in April, 1889, and sentenced to five years' imprisonment in Bathurst Gaol. His default was ascertained to be £414 16s. 7d. Of that sum £16 12s. 5d. was recovered by salary due and £100 from Guarantee Society. The remainder, £298 4s. 2d., was written off as loss to the Revenue.
- Mr. W. Calcutt, Clerk, Parramatta Gaol, embezzled £66 18s. 7d. of moneys entrusted to him, of which £27 1s. were recovered. £18 0s. 7d. short adjustment of amount for gratuities to prisoners were written off by authority of the Governor and Executive Council; deficiency otherwise, £21 17s. The defaulter is understood to have left the Colony. There was no prosecution in the case.
- Mr. J. Dick, Gaoler, Mudgee (sentenced to imprisonment for life for shooting a warder) was found to be a defaulter in the sum of £108 19s., of which £104 16s. were recovered. Deficiency was £4 3s.
- Mr. C. G. S. M'Shane, Clerk in the Registrar-General's Office, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment for embezzling £47 5s.
- Messrs. H. C. S. Hiddilston and S. E. Raper, Clerks in the Registrar-General's Office, were also prosecuted for embezzlements. The latter, after three trials, was discharged, and the former has been sentenced to ten years' imprisonment, but the amounts cannot be stated pending the issue of further proceedings at law in connection with them.

55. Under this head may be mentioned an accumulated deficiency in the accounts of the Money Order and Government Savings Bank during a period of eighteen years, from 1868 to 1885, amounting to £2,263 16s. 8d., arising out of robberies by bushrangers, sundry frauds, &c., in twenty-four cases. These sums were, at my suggestion, written off to debit of Profit and Loss Account, in the books of the Department named, by an Executive Council minute of date 30th April, 1889. That minute also directs the values of forfeited money orders as they occur from time to time to be placed to the credit of the same account.

56. Subject to the exceptions noticed in the foregoing observations and explanations, and to the adjustment of outstanding advances in full accordance with the Services and Votes to which such advances have been charged in the accompanying statements, subject, also, to the disallowances specified in Appendix L, I consider that the Abstracts of Accounts now submitted are correct Abstracts of the Treasurer's Receipts and Disbursements within the year 1889.

## APPENDIX B.

MEMORANDUM respecting the Unexpended Balances of Appropriations for Loan Services hitherto included in the "Old Loans Account," but the sum of which forms part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, in terms of the Acts under which the moneys were borrowed.

THE balance unexpended upon the "Old Loans Account" is now £132,326 0s. 4d., and ought to stand as a part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, in accordance with the several Appropriation Acts out of which it arises.

The statement of those Old Loans Services prior to the Act 35 Victoria No. 5, which introduced a new system of account for receipts and expenditure under Loan Appropriations, was made a separate one, purely for convenience in keeping the accounts; yet, while the sum of the Old Loans has existed and

and has appeared as if a separate fund, the amount at its credit at any time has always been and is now legally a part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund. The amount now at credit of the account is the remnant of the proceeds of debentures to the amount of £450,000, issued in 1870, to balance up all previous loans to that date, without regard to whether the amount was actually wanted or not, a by no means provident arrangement, for it covered (besides a multitude of small balances, which at the time could not have been wanted) three whole appropriations for a sum, in all, of £55,000, viz. :—£20,000 for a Wesleyan College, £10,000 for District Courts, Sydney, £25,000 for a Penitentiary. The first of these services was provided for 34 years ago by the Affiliated Colleges Act as a contingent liability of the revenue, but has never been applied for; and the second and third have never been carried out, although voted, the one 27 and the other 24 years ago. A glance at the latest Ways and Means Estimates shows that there are none of the balances retained for expenditure and forming the balance of £132,326 Os. 4d. that can now be required, nor, if required, but what could probably be met without much difficulty. At all events, the original appropriations are now of so old a date (the latest now nearly 20 years old) that it becomes a question whether they ought now to be any longer considered to be operative without a new appropriation either from Revenue or Loans. The money belongs to the Revenue, as the Revenue is pledged to the repayment of the Loans of which those balances form a part.

### APPENDIX C.

MEMORANDUM respecting the operations upon the Vote (item 844) taken in 1879 of £150,000 in part appropriation of the Surplus Revenue for the erection of a New Free Public Library.

ON the strength of a vote of £150,000, late in 1879, for the erection of a new Free Public Library, there was resumed by the Government in November, 1880, the block of land, on which then stood St. James' Church of England school buildings, and likewise the land between those buildings as far as Market-street, with frontage to Elizabeth and Castlereagh streets, but no portion of the property so resumed has ever been applied to the erection of a new Free Public Library. In 1885, on the other hand, a new Free Public Library was arranged for by the rebuilding and extending of the old Library in Macquarie-street, and by the resumption of additional land adjoining thereto. Towards that expense there was applied an old unexpended Loan Vote of £25,000 (25 Vic. No. 19), and to the present time a sum of £18,358 6s. 10d. only out of the vote of £150,000 above referred to, leaving still a balance of £2,314 6s. 6d. unexpended, as shewn in statement below.

The remaining portion of the vote was disposed of by writing off in 1888 and 1889 a sum of £31,503 8s. 1d., the payment in 1881 and 1882 of compensation for land resumed, other than St. James' School property, £59,805 19s. 6d., and for the school property itself, £37,930 9s. 1d., with a small sum of £87 10s. for expenses of the Colonial Architect's Department in connection therewith.

The St. James' School building was converted into High Schools for boys and girls, at a cost of £2,478 11s. 1d., and a new building for a Public School in Castlereagh-street was erected on a portion of the resumed land outside of the St. James' School property, at a cost of £2,199 7s. 9d., both of these sums having been charged to the Consolidated Revenue Fund under the annual votes for Public Instruction.

Some Parliamentary sanction, whether by loan or otherwise, ought now to be made for the rectification of the past charges for school purposes against the vote of 1879, for a Free Public Library, that is to say, for the cost of resuming the St. James' School property, and also the proportionate cost of the block occupied by the new Public School adjoining the High Schools in Elizabeth and Castlereagh streets. Whatever may be done with the remainder of the land the cost of it ought now, that a new Free Public Library has been constructed elsewhere, to be transferred to some other vote applicable to the purpose, whether from the Revenue or Loans Account, and so much of the old vote as has not been legitimately applied be written off to the credit of the Revenue.

## APPENDIX D.

MEMORANDUM for the Under Secretary for Finance and Trade upon a letter of the Secretary for Railways, dated 1st March, 1889, asking "that a credit, to the amount of £100,000, in favour of the Railway Commissioners, be opened with the Bank doing the Railway business, and be maintained at that amount to the end of the year."

Department of Audit, 29 April, 1889.

A FIXED advance, to be recouped as drawn upon by the Commissioners, is, in the Auditor-General's opinion, preferable to a credit account, as the latter is not in accordance with the Audit Act.

A cash advance of £100,000 will be amply sufficient for the purpose, as it can *at any time* be recouped to the extent of the pay vouchers, which the Commissioners may forward to the Treasury. Those pay vouchers will form a final pay voucher to the Treasurer's disbursement, and so come under immediate audit here. It would be a very desirable condition that the recoup vouchers should not be for more than a fortnight's payments. It is, however, desired that in connection with this arrangement the Railway Commissioners should be directed to furnish the Auditor-General with a monthly account current, certified by themselves personally, showing their operations upon the proposed advance, and giving references to the cheques drawn, and to the vouchers which may be sent to the Treasury for recoup. This account current, accompanied by their Bank pass-book, will afford an effective means of check upon the transactions of the Commissioners.

There would be no charge for interest to the Commissioners by this arrangement, but if there were their proposal to use the railway receipts to meet it is quite inadmissible.

## Treasury Minute.

*Subject* :—Proposed advance of £100,000 monthly to the Railway Commissioners.

The Treasury, New South Wales, Sydney, 31 May, 1889.

REFERRING to the letter of the Secretary for Railways, dated 1st March last, asking "that a credit to the amount of £100,000 in favour of the Railway Commissioners be opened with the Bank doing the railway business, and be maintained at that amount to the end of the year," I beg to state, for the information of the Colonial Treasurer, that I have conferred with the Auditor-General, and am now in a position to make the following recommendations:—

1. The credit required might be opened as suggested. In this recommendation I differ from the Auditor-General, who thinks the credit should be opened by an actual transfer of cash, the effect of which would be to unnecessarily weaken the general account of the Government in the Bank.
2. The credit should be limited to the payment of salaries and wages, leaving all contractors' accounts to be paid, as at present, over the counter at the Treasury.
3. The account should be operated upon by cheques signed by the Accountant, and countersigned by the Paymaster for Railways. The fidelity of these gentlemen should be guaranteed in a sum commensurate with the liability (say) £1,000 cash.
4. Adjustment of the payment for wages should be made fortnightly by lodgment of the vouchers at the Treasury. It will then permit of the advance account being recouped by transfer from the Railway Appropriation Vote. The same remark applies to the salaries, which should also be recouped as soon as possible after payment. The object is to have the least possible interval between the payments and the receipt of the vouchers at the Treasury.
5. This mode of advancing the public funds is foreign to the system which has prevailed at the Treasury since 1864, but under the circumstances of the new railway administration it is considered that the experiment may be tried, without in any way constituting a precedent for other Departments.

Memorandum *re* Cash Credit Account of £100,000 in favour of Commissioners of Railways.

Department of Audit, 26 September, 1889.

In returning the papers explanatory of an arrangement establishing a cash credit account of £100,000 with the Australian Joint Stock Bank in favour of the Railway Commissioners, it is pointed out, for the information of the Treasurer, that the arrangement is quite opposed to the provisions of the Audit Act, sections 10 to 13, and that, consequently, no transactions under it can in any way be recognized in this Department. Should it appear, however, by the Bank sheets that drafts against the said cash credit affect the interest that may be due by the Bank to the public by way of reduction thereof, such reduction will have to be made the subject of a surcharge against the Treasurer. It is noticed, moreover, that by the 4th paragraph of the Treasury minute of 31st May, it was provided that the vouchers to the drafts by the Commissioners against the cash credit were to be lodged at the Treasury, and would consequently, when covered by Treasury cheques, form complete vouchers to the cash sheet entries of payments, and thus come under audit as final payments.

Instead of such a process the voucher under query and subsequent ones of the same character are made advances to be accounted for exactly in the same way as hitherto. The new arrangement is therefore no improvement upon the old one, but on the contrary has superadded to it an arrangement which is very correctly described as a "mode of advancing the public funds foreign to the system which has prevailed at the Treasury since 1864," and which is beyond doubt, as already stated, an illegal one in view of the Audit Act of 1870.

It is urged, therefore, that the cash credit be at once cancelled, and the requisite advances be henceforth made to the Commissioners for Railways in accordance with the system previously in operation. Adverting, however, to the acquittance on the voucher No. 19,050 under query (the first I am informed which has appeared under the cash credit arrangement), it is further pointed out that the form of it is quite inadmissible, inasmuch as while the funds are placed to the credit of the Commissioners for Railways, the acknowledgment of receipt and the obligation to account for the money so advanced to them is signed in the first person by an officer to whom the money is not paid.

It is requested therefore that in place of "I," at the commencement of the acquittance, the words be substituted "The Railway Commissioners, New South Wales," and that the second "I" on the eighth line be corrected to "they," also that all the words from "cheques" to "Bank" be expunged.

The signature at the foot should also be signed by one or other of the Commissioners over their designation "Railway Commissioners, New South Wales." This change is required under the opinion of the Attorney-General as to the legality of delegate signatures to revenue documents, a copy of which was forwarded to the Treasury on the 24th instant, as in accordance with the opinion of the Crown Solicitor, given at a personal interview with that officer on the subject, the same principle stated by the Attorney-General as applying to Revenue vouchers applies also to acquittances for money issued to Public Accountants as advances to be accounted for. The acquittances to subsequent vouchers which may be found in the form objected to will be forwarded for amendment at an early date.

## Interpretation of section 4 of the Public Instruction Act 43 Vic. No. 23.

Department of Audit, 15 July, 1889.

Memorandum in reply to a reference from the Treasury upon a letter dated 3rd July, 1889, from the Department of Public Instruction, asking for the transfer of £4,904 7s., the balance to the credit of the Public Schools Property Trust Account to the credit of the Department.

THE fourth section of the Public Instruction Act of 1880 seems to me to require that the sale of any land acquired for the purposes of public instruction, and the reinvestment of the proceeds of such sale be in each case effected under the authority of the Governor and Executive Council. The account entitled the "Public School Property Trust Account" should not therefore be operated upon without such authority. It appears, however, that an advance was made to the Under Secretary for Public Instruction on the 15th February last, of £10,000 on his application, and an obligatory receipt taken to account for it in three months. The purposes of the advance are described to be for "Additional expenditure during the current month, such advance to be charged to Public School Property Trust Account."

Accounts have not yet been received (but have now been specially asked for) to show whether the money so advanced has been expended "in the purchase of other lands, or in the erection of school buildings," under the specific authority in each case of the Governor and Executive Council, payments for which fell to be made in the month of February last.

Until a proper adjustment be made of the advance already made of £10,000, I am of opinion that no further issue should be made out of the special fund in question.

I desire to add that it seems to be very doubtful whether in case of a sale of land or buildings, the proceeds should be applied to any other general purpose of public instruction than to the providing of a site or a building, in substitution for the one disposed of as unsuitable or otherwise. The cost of the original acquisition is paid from the Revenue for a specific purpose. Should the sale realize a sum greater than that cost the excess becomes a receipt to the Revenue, the appropriation of which, except to provide a substitute for the property sold, can hardly have been intended by the clause of the Act referred to. On the other hand, should the cost of substitution be less than the proceeds of the sale, the difference should go to the credit of the Revenue and not be expended, except under a vote of Parliament.

Minute by the Minister of Public Instruction.

Subject:—The Auditor-General's Memorandum, 15th July, 1889.

Department of Public Instruction, Sydney, 22 July, 1889.

THE Auditor-General is evidently usurping a power which he does not possess when he seeks to impose certain duties upon this Department beyond what the law requires. His contention is that the legal construction of the 4th section of the Public Instruction Act requires that the sanction of the Governor shall be obtained to *the sale of land*, and again, separately, to the investment of the proceeds. Now it is a strange thing that the Act mentions the sanction of the Governor, and follows with three consequences of such sanction *to sell, to convey, and to invest*. The general sanction can never be construed to include only one of these Acts, but without doubt governs them all. No lawyer has yet refused his title for his client because the sanction of the Governor was not given *to convey* by specific Act; and if the general body of lawyers admit that the Executive authority to sell includes to convey, we may take it that their interpretation is correct, and likewise applies to investment.

However, as this is simply a point of law which the Auditor-General has raised, and on which I strongly differ from him, I must ask him if he has any objection to the Attorney-General's opinion being obtained for mutual guidance.

As to the mode of investment, I really think the view taken by the Auditor-General is one which he hardly has arrived at with any certainty. *Parliament has expressed in a broad way how the investment may take place*, and no narrow construction of the language of the Act can for one moment be defended. To limit the investment only to the *replacement of land sold* is to take the most narrow view possible, and certainly is in most express and direct conflict with the plain and clear language of the Act.

Memorandum.

Subject:—Minute by the Minister of Public Instruction upon the Auditor-General's memorandum of 15th July, 1889 (Try. 89-5,677).

I CAN have no possible objection to the proposal of the Minister of Public Instruction that the opinion of the Attorney-General should be obtained as to the interpretation or legal construction of the 4th section of the Public Instruction Act for mutual guidance.

It is most probable that such opinion will coincide with that of the Minister so emphatically expressed against the views stated in my memorandum, and also at greater length in a later communication to the Under Secretary for Public Instruction (an extract from which I append for the information of the Colonial Treasurer); but in stating those views I have been guided by the general principles laid down in the Audit Act as to requirements for checking the public accounts. One of those requirements is that due authority shall be produced to me for the collection of public money, and also for the expenditure of the same. In the case in question authorities are issued under the 4th clause of the Public Instruction Act, which refers only to the sale of certain lands (and such sale of course includes a proper legal conveyance to a purchaser); but it is very respectfully submitted that while one who has the right under instructions to sell as a trustee is of course also bound to convey, he must also in dealing with the proceeds act under specific instructions coincident with, and directly arising out of, the instructions to sell. Hence I consider that the minutes of the Executive Council are imperfect, inasmuch as they do not include directions for the application of the proceeds of sale in terms of the Act. It is very far from any desire on my part to usurp functions which the Audit Act does not invest me with, but I am bound

at

at least to ask for such authorities as may seem in my judgment to be necessary for the due protection of the Revenue, and to the best of my ability to secure that the intentions of Parliament in regard to it are duly observed, and if the authorities or explanations sought are not furnished to me, or appear to be insufficient or unsatisfactory, it becomes my duty to report the facts to Parliament.

The general principle appears to me very clear, that any process by which moneys come into the possession of the Government in connection with the Revenue, over and above what is specifically voted out of it, cannot legally be expended without the express sanction of Parliament, and I do not think, however otherwise a purely legal interpretation may indicate the intention, that in this case it could have extended to the expenditure of large profits which are most likely to accrue from the sale or exchange of properties acquired originally at comparatively small cost, and thus add to the annual appropriation of the Revenue for Public Instruction.

1. I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 26th instant in reply to mine of the 11th, requesting an adjustment of a special advance of £10,000 made to you in February last, from which I gather that that advance has been used for the general expenses of school-sites and buildings, and that this has been done under the assumption that the Minister is invested with the sole power of so applying the moneys derived from the sale of lands acquired for school purposes under Act 43 Vic., No. 23, section 4.

2. The section referred to, however, limits the action of the Minister, not only in the sale of acquired property but also in the specific application of the proceeds of the same for the purchase of "other lands," or in the erection of school buildings for the maintenance of the several classes of schools provided for by the Act, and for no other, &c., by being made subject to the authority of the Governor and the Executive Council.

3. I have therefore to request that I may be informed whether that authority has been obtained for the expenditure of the proceeds of the sales which, so far as they are concerned, would appear to have had the prior sanction of the Governor and Executive Council.

4. I desire to add, that in my judgment a general authority to expend whatever money may be on hand at the credit of the Public School Property Trust Fund for general purposes would not properly meet the case. It appears to me very doubtful—perhaps I should say extremely unlikely—that the Legislature, in framing the 4th section of the Public Schools Act, contemplated giving the Minister power to add to the Votes of Parliament sums derived in the way specified, or to use such sums in any way except in the way of replacing sites or school buildings found to be in unsuitable positions by others of equal value, and in the immediate vicinity of those disposed of. In the case of a school being abandoned altogether, the cost of the site or building has, it may be assumed, been defrayed out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund; and in such a case it is clear, according to the general principles ruling in regard to the administration of the public revenue, that the revenue has a right to the proceeds until the amounts shall have been appropriated to such purposes as Parliament may determine. In like manner, if the cost of replacement should be less than the proceeds of sale of the old property, the balance in excess is undoubtedly due to the revenue, and is not available for any other purpose except as may be voted by Parliament.

5. The transactions in regard to the year 1884, to which you refer in a previous letter of the 22nd instant, were in many respects irregular, as noted in my report upon the Treasurer's accounts of that year, and it now appears that the mode of dealing with a previous advance of £7,233 8s. 11d. for that year's purposes was also irregular, but unfortunately was not brought under my notice at the time. The whole matter, however, having been brought before Parliament in the report of your Department for 1884, and in my general report for the same year, it cannot now well be gone back upon. But the precedent afforded by the action of 1884, irregular in my judgment, does not preclude the question being now raised as to the interpretation of clause 4 of the Public Schools Act.

## Copy of clause 4, 43 Vic. No. 23.

ALL land, acquired under this Act, or by grant, purchase, or bequest in future for the purposes of public instruction, shall be held by the Crown in trust for the maintenance of the several classes of schools herein provided for, and for no other, except in cases wherein other conditions shall be imposed by law, and the Minister shall have power, subject to the Governor, to sell any such lands, and to convey the same to the purchasers thereof, and to invest the proceeds arising therefrom in the purchase of other lands, or in the erection of school buildings for the purposes aforesaid.

COPY opinion of the Attorney-General *re* section 4 of the Public Instruction Act as to the appropriation of the proceeds from the sale of Public School property.

I AM of opinion (although the matter does not seem to me to be so clear as it appears to the Minister for Public Instruction) that the words in section 4, "subject to the Governor" (which mean "when authorized by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council"), govern merely the words "*shall have power to sell*," and the special Executive authority is *not* necessary to enable the Minister to convey the land, or to invest the proceeds therefrom in the purchase of other land, &c., &c.

"If you grant anything you are presumed to grant to the extent of your power, that also without which the thing granted cannot be enjoyed": per Sir John Coleridge, in *Lord v. The Commissioners for the City of Sydney*, 12 Moore's Privy Council cases, page 499.

The authority to sell therefore includes the authority to convey, and, unless special authority to convey is required, special authority to invest is not required. If the words "subject to the Governor" do not—as I think they do not—govern the words "*and to convey the same*," neither do they govern the words "*and to invest the proceeds, &c.*" It would be as well, however, in future, for greater security, if the Executive minute were drawn so as to give special authority to sell, to convey, and to invest the proceeds, &c., &c.

The contention of the Auditor-General that the investment of the money is to be restricted in the way suggested by him is untenable.

## APPENDIX H.

Sir,

Department of Audit, Railway Branch, Sydney, 5 August, 1889.

I have the honor to draw your attention to the enclosed papers, having reference to the payment to the Railway Department of a sum of £5,000 in December last out of the Treasurer's Advance Account, to be recouped by vote of Parliament, for the conveyance of exhibits to Albury *en route* to the Melbourne Exhibition.

The papers disclose that the amount was estimated on the assumption that a large number of exhibits would be forwarded by rail, whilst the letter of the Secretary to the Exhibition Commission distinctly states that as a matter of fact a very small number were sent, the bulk going by sea.

As in these circumstances it would appear that the railway revenue has reaped an undue advantage, it seems very desirable that an investigation should be made with a view of ascertaining the value of the service actually performed by the Railway Department for the £5,000 for which it has obtained credit, and which sum it is understood is now on the Estimate before Parliament.

PRECIS.

Carriage of exhibits by rail to and from Melbourne Exhibition.

In August, 1887, the Exhibition Commission applied for free carriage of all exhibits, under proper supervision, to and from the Exhibition. This was granted by the Minister for Works.

In January, 1888, the Minister asked the Commissioner to report as to the probable cost of conveying the exhibits over the New South Wales Railways, and from estimates of the trainage of exhibits promised for the Exhibition the Commissioner, assuming that the quantity of exhibits stated thereon would go from Sydney to Albury by rail (and return same way), ascertained that the freight would be about £10,233, and submitted that this loss should not fall upon railway revenue.

Later on (24/3/88) the Commissioner suggested that the Railway Department charge only the actual working expenses for this service—assumed to be 50 per cent. and that the amount (£5,000) be charged to a vote to be taken for the purpose.

To this the Treasurer agreed, and directed the amount to be noted for the Estimates, which was done by the Chief Inspector of the Treasury.

On 29th December, 1888, the Railway Department applied for payment of the £5,000, which was paid at Treasury on 31st December from the Treasurer's Advance Account pending the passing of the Estimates.

Upon perusal of the papers in this Department it would appear that the sum of £5,000 paid to Railways is largely in excess of the legitimate charges for freight in connection with this service.

In his report of 18th August, 1888 (after the opening of the Exhibition), the Goods Superintendent stated that thirty-five trucks of exhibits had been forwarded to Albury from Sydney and other stations (which, on an average of 6 tons per truck, would be 210 tons); and further "freight charges, &c., would have amounted to over £600." Two of the trucks contained only 15 cwt. and 17 cwt. respectively.

On 9th April the Secretary to Exhibition Commission, in his S9-S64, disputing his liability for freight on two rolls of paper from Liverpool to Darling Harbour, said: "As a matter of fact, the proportion of exhibits forwarded to Melbourne by rail has been exceedingly small; and up to the present date the quantity of exhibits returned in that way has been very greatly less. By far the greater number of exhibits have been \* \* \* transmitted by sea to Sydney, and, as above stated, by sea to Melbourne."

THESE papers after a long detention in the Railway Department have apparently been returned to this Department in error, instead of through the Under Secretary for Finance and Trade, to whom they are now forwarded.

It is abundantly clear that the Railway Department had no legitimate claim to the full amount of £5,000 now under question. The estimate of the service which the Department might possibly be called upon to perform was imaginary and misleading, and was based upon the assumption that the promised exhibits would be conveyed overland, an assumption which events have proved to have been incorrect. (*Vide* Audit Office *procès* of 18th July, 1889.)

According to the papers the Railway Department has only established a claim to about £600 or £700, and taking the latter sum as representing the service, all in excess of that must be regarded as having been erroneously credited to railway revenue.

It is therefore requested that the sum of £4,300 be refunded from Railway Tolls, 1888, and placed to credit of votes as on account of item £5,000: "Cost of conveyance by railway of exhibits to the Melbourne Centennial Exhibition" on Supplementary Appropriation for 1888, Miscellaneous Services, Colonial Secretary's Department.

A surcharge note for £4,300 is enclosed for the overpayment under voucher 12,447, Trust Fund, 1888, and which is requested to be acted on not *later than* the 31st instant.

I have the honor to request that you will have the goodness, at your earliest convenience, to submit the enclosed case for the opinion of the Attorney-General.

The accompanying correspondence will serve to explain the circumstances under which I have thought it desirable to obtain a legal opinion, more especially as the question of accepting delegated signatures both for revenue and expenditure accounts is constantly recurring.

Your attention is specially requested to my memorandum to the Treasury, dated 1st November, 1888, a copy of which is with these papers, as it explains more fully the nature of the case. It may seem unnecessary to require a definition of responsibility in the circumstances, but it has been found difficult to get accounting officers to regard their own signatures as anything more than mere formalities, or as involving any possible legal consequences to themselves.

A collection voucher (2) and an attested account are also enclosed (to be returned) for reference if requisite.

Case for the opinion of the Attorney-General.

By sections 1, 2, and 3 of the Audit Act of 1870, a "public accountant," that is a person "charged with the duty of collecting or receiving revenue," is required to pay his collections to the Treasury or to a Bank, as may be directed by the Governor in Council, *accompanied by vouchers bearing his signature*, and shall transmit to the Auditor-General a return in a form prescribed by the Act, to which he shall make and subscribe the solemn declaration directed by the Act 9 Victoria No. 9.

The collections by the Railway Commissioners (sections 19 and 20 of the Railway Act) are paid daily to one of the Banks duly authorized to receive them, and are credited daily in the Treasury Accounts, but the vouchers giving the particulars of such collections are signed by the Railway Accountant, *pro* Commissioners, and neither by the Commissioners collectively nor by one of them for himself and colleagues.

The



The Auditor-General objected to accept the signature of any officer as a delegate for the purpose indicated, and required the signature of at least one of the Commissioners, and then as covering the joint responsibility of himself and his two colleagues; but that, provided a voucher containing the full particulars of the daily collections, say for a month, were so signed by one or more of the Commissioners, he was prepared to accept such voucher as probably sufficient to satisfy the requirements of the Audit Act.

The Railway Commissioners demur to signing either a daily or a monthly voucher, on the ground that they sign the monthly attested account for the Auditor-General, specifying the sums in gross paid daily to the Bank, as in their opinion that account renders unnecessary their daily signature, or their signatures at all, to the vouchers which they are required to send "to the Treasury."

The advice of the Attorney-General is respectfully solicited as to whether the daily vouchers to the collections by the Railway Commissioners can be legally accepted without their personal signature, or whether a weekly or monthly collections voucher can be legally accepted in lieu of a daily one, provided it bear the personal signature of one or more of the Commissioners?

In returning these papers, I desire to call attention to the fact that the Audit Act recognises no delegation to another of responsibility by a public accountant for his dealings with public moneys, and that, consequently, any documents that require certificates of correctness or obligatory receipts to account, or in any other way require evidence upon the face of them sufficient for a Court of Law to fix the responsibility upon the public accountant concerned should have his own signature attached thereto.

It is observed that this proposed authority refers to expenditure accounts only, and has been given as sanctioning a continuance of a practice which I have always objected to as unsound in principle. It has been consequently necessary for me, for example, where a certificate by the Secretary only averred that the expenditure set forth in a pay voucher had been duly authorised to call for the minute paper in which the responsible officer has recorded his authority by his own signature or initials.

Unless, therefore, the Secretary or other Railway Officer be duly invested with the responsibility contemplated by the first and relative sections of the Audit Act, I cannot legally accept such officer's signature. If the authority of the Commissioners is not in some way produced to me I shall have no evidence that the moneys appropriated by Parliament for railway purposes have been expended under their own control and management as directed by the 19th section of the Government Railways Act of 1887.

It would probably be very inconvenient that in every case a payment should wait for the signature of one or other of the Commissioners, but whether to an abstract or schedule covering a number of pay sub-vouchers, as in the case of advances or to a single separate account, such signature should undoubtedly be appended before being sent on here for audit, and certainly all obligations to account for advances or for moneys placed to their credit should be signed by one or other of the Commissioners in the name of the rest, as I conclude they are jointly responsible.

It appears to me, further, that in regard to revenue documents no other signature than that of the Commissioners, or of one of them for the rest, ought to be admitted, except as a temporary measure: the daily collection voucher, if signed for immediate convenience by the Secretary or Cashier, should be covered as soon as possible by the signature of the responsible accountant, either upon the voucher itself or by a weekly or monthly recapitulatory voucher.

Of course the monthly attested account of collections can only be signed by the Chief Commissioner, or by one or other of the Commissioners on behalf of the rest, unless indeed they be wholly relieved from the responsibility involved, a course which would be at variance with the 19th and 20th sections of the Railway Act.

Copy opinion of the Attorney-General.

THERE can be no doubt that as a matter of *strict* law moneys collected or received by every "public accountant" when paid into the Treasury or a Bank *should be accompanied* by vouchers bearing the signature of such "public accountant," and not the signature of some one deputed to sign for and on behalf of such accountant.

The returns transmitted to the *Auditor-General* in the form in the First Schedule to the Audit Act are altogether separate and distinct from the vouchers.

I have the honor to refer you again to my letter of 19th February last, and subsequent correspondence enclosed herewith and to inform you that, I having referred to the Attorney-General the question as to the necessity of your attaching your own personal signatures to the vouchers furnished every day by your Department to the Treasury as explanatory of the amounts of your daily collections pursuant to the opinion which the Attorney-General has favoured me with, and of which I enclose a copy. I have now to renew my request for statements of receipts from the 23rd October, 1888, as conveyed in my letter of 19th February last, duly signed by you or by one of your number as for the Railway Commissioners, New South Wales.

I desire to state further that should you prefer to sign covering statements only, instead of each daily voucher, it will be necessary that such statements include the particulars of all miscellaneous items of receipts not classified as tolls collected on the railways or the tramways as now specified in the daily collection vouchers.

I have to request therefore that in accordance with the direction of sections 1, 2, and 3, of the Audit Act, collection vouchers, furnished in support of credits in the Treasurer's cash sheets, in future bear the personal signatures of the public accountants responsible for the collection of the public revenue or of other moneys payable into the Treasury.

The Honorable the Minister for Railways,—

THE Auditor-General having requested us to attach "our personal signatures to the vouchers furnished every day by the Railway Department to the Treasury, as explanatory of the amounts of our daily collections," and in doing so stated that he is supported in his request by an opinion given by the Honorable the Attorney-General, we deem it necessary to lay the matter specially before you, as it is practically impossible for us to meet the wishes of the Auditor-General except by attaching our signatures to a mass of papers in a purely perfunctory manner; and, even in doing this, much time, which should be devoted to important duties in connection with the management of the railways, would be expended. Apart from this objection, we venture to say that the case submitted by the Auditor-General does not fully disclose the true position of the matter or the bearing of the Government Railways Act of 1888 upon it. Under this Act the Commissioners have power to confer a legal right to their officers to collect tolls (section 31), and the Commissioners, in doing so, make them (the officers) collectors of public revenue under the Audit Act, and they therefore are the persons legally liable to account for such revenue.

The Commissioners, not being the direct receivers of this revenue, and not having any personal knowledge in the matter, cannot be asked to make any declaration or sign vouchers.

Further, the Commissioners do not authorise them to collect tolls, &c., as their agents, but confer upon them (the officers) offices which give them the legal right to receive the money payable for tolls, &c.

In bringing this matter under notice, we think that its importance warrants our asking that it may be placed before the Honorable the Attorney-General.

## Opinion of the Attorney-General.

I HAVE delayed "reviewing this case" and writing an opinion upon it, at the request of the Crown Solicitor, who wished, I think, to place before me—in a personal interview with one of them—the views and contentions of the Railway Commissioners. I have now seen Mr. Oliver, with the Crown Solicitor, and have read the memo. of the Commissioners, which was submitted to the Minister for Railways on the 5th, and forwarded to the Crown Solicitor on the 30th December last. My opinion of the 19th September was simply that, "as a matter of strict law, moneys collected or received by every 'public accountant' when paid into the Treasury or Bank, should be accompanied by a voucher bearing the signature of such 'public accountant,' and not the signature of some one deputed to sign for and on behalf of such 'accountant.'" The question to be determined, as I understand it, is as to whether the vouchers referred to in sections 2 and 3 of the "Audit Act of 1870" are to be signed by the Commissioners or by the persons who actually receive the money, and as to the persons by whom the returns are to be transmitted and the declarations subscribed. I am of opinion that as a matter of the very strictest compliance with sections 2 and 3, the Railway Commissioners should sign

sign the vouchers, transmit the returns, and subscribe the declarations. Section 20 of the Railway Act provides that all moneys payable to the Commissioners under that or any other Act "shall be collected and received by them on account of, and shall be paid into the Consolidated Revenue" and that the provisions of the "Audit Act of 1870" and of any other Act relating to the collection and payment of public moneys and the audit of the public account shall save as in that Act otherwise expressly provided apply to the Commissioners, and to all officers and employees under that Act. The Commissioners are charged with the duty of *collecting and receiving revenue*, and also with the duty of disbursing money on account of the Public Service. (See section 19, Railway Act.) They are therefore, by section 1 of the "Audit Act of 1870," "public accountants" and as such public accountants they "collect and receive" moneys payable to them on account of the Public Revenue, although under section 31 they appoint persons to whom the tolls are *actually* paid. The Commissioners are the persons who alone can recover such tolls by action at law. The "toll collectors" are mere servants of the Commissioners, although I am of opinion that if a very strict compliance with the provisions of sections 2 and 3 of the "Audit Act of 1870" is considered necessary by the Auditor-General, the Commissioners should sign the vouchers, transmit the returns, and subscribe the declarations. I am also of opinion that the provisions of those sections can be complied with if the vouchers are signed—the returns transmitted and declarations subscribed by the "toll collectors." They are also "public accountants" within the definition of a public accountant, contained in section 1. They are charged by the appointment of the Commissioners with the duty of collecting or receiving, and they do collect and receive revenue (although the tolls are due to the Commissioners), and they are officers and employees under the Railway Act to whom, under section 20, the provisions of the "Audit Act of 1870" apply. Considering the difficulty in the way of the Commissioners signing the vouchers and transmitting the returns, and the almost impossibility of their being able conscientiously to subscribe the declarations, I advise that if the Auditor-General thinks fit to dispense with the signature of the Commissioners to the vouchers and the transmission of the returns and the subscription of the declarations by them he may legally do so.

I have given the question every consideration with a desire to relieve the Commissioners of irksome obligations requiring the sacrifice of very valuable time and the imposition of very considerable labor, and also with a desire to point out as clearly as I can the legal aspects of the case, and to prevent the Auditor-General from being compelled to require such a very strict compliance with the Audit Act as will necessitate the irksome obligations and the sacrifice of valuable time, and the imposition of labor to which I have alluded. I hope that the Auditor-General and the Commissioners may be able to come to a satisfactory arrangement between themselves by which the public interests may be conserved, and, at the same time, the law maintained. If such an arrangement cannot be come to it may be considered desirable that legislation should take place. I don't at present, for the reasons I have mentioned, see any necessity for such legislation.

THERE has for some time been a question under consideration between the Railway Commissioners and the Auditor-General in regard to a certificate, under the provisions of the Audit Act, in connection with the Railway revenue. The Auditor-General has requested the Railway Commissioners to give a personal attested account in regard to the total daily and monthly receipts. The Railway Commissioners find themselves in a difficulty in giving such a certificate, as, in addition to their inability to go into the necessary details, they have no personal knowledge of the actual cash takings, and they consider that Mr. Wickham, the Accountant, is the officer who has full knowledge of the Railway receipts, and should give, on their behalf, the attested account asked for.

The opinion of the Honorable the Attorney-General has been obtained, and, *inter alia*, he states:—

"Considering the difficulty in the way of the Commissioners signing the vouchers and transmitting the returns, and the almost impossibility of their being able conscientiously to subscribe the declarations, I advise that if the Auditor-General think fit to dispense with the signature of the Commissioners to the vouchers, and the transmission of the returns and the subscription of the declaration by them, he may legally do so."

The Chief Commissioner has discussed the matter with the Auditor-General to-day, and the latter is agreeable to accept the signature of Mr. Wickham, if he is appointed under the authority of the Governor and Executive Council to be the Accounting Officer for the Railway receipts under the Audit Act.

The Railway Commissioners ask, therefore, that the Honorable the Minister for Railways will agree to and obtain the necessary sanction to this course.

In reply to Treasury Papers Nos. 142 and 143.

Proposed appointment of an officer to relieve the Railway Commissioners from personal responsibility in regard to their signing attested accounts of their collections and other documents representing receipts and payments in connection with the Railway Service now requiring their signatures under the Audit Act.

Paper No. 143.

THE statement made in the paper marked Treasury, No. 143, 1890, viz., that the Auditor-General "is agreeable to accept the signature of Mr. Wickham if he is appointed under the authority of the Governor and Executive Council to be the Accounting Officer for the Railway Receipts under the Audit Act" is a correct statement, but without explanation it is liable to be misunderstood, and it is not impossible that the Chief Commissioner at my interview with him did not perceive the full bearing of it. It will be observed that the agreement to accept the signature of Mr. Wickham is made contingent upon a condition which I did not, nor do I now, recommend should be fulfilled, and which, in my judgment, the Government are not likely to fulfil in the face of the decided opinion of the Attorney-General respecting the relative bearings of the Railway and Audit Acts upon the responsibilities of the Railway Commissioners. Nevertheless, should the Government see fit to grant the authority asked for by the Commissioners, I should feel bound to pass the documents now, in my view requiring the personal signature of one or other of the Commissioners, although signed by any other officer who may be so authorized; but, considering as I do that the granting of such authority would be irregular, if not illegal, I should feel also bound to call the special attention of Parliament to the matter.

I take it that the whole gist of the "Government Railways Act of 1888" is to invest the Commissioners appointed under it as a body corporate with full responsibility for all details of management, including the collection and accounting for all tolls or other receipts arising out of the Railway traffic.

Accordingly the whole of the clerks, officers, and employes in the Railway service have been made by the Railway Statute the servants of the Commissioners only; are appointed by them to assist in the execution of the Act; and, so far as any of them are collectors or receivers of Railway moneys, they are accountable directly to the Commissioners, and not to the Government, for their collections or receipts. They cannot, therefore, be classed as public accountants in the sense of section 1 of the Audit Act, nor be required to observe the directions of sections 2 and 3 of the same Act.

Were the Government to appoint Mr. Wickham, or any one of the Commissioners' Officers, to be the Accounting Officer to the Government for the Railway revenue, the effect would be to make him an officer of the Government while still a servant of the Commissioners, and to invest him with responsibilities which by law are laid upon the Commissioners alone, an arrangement which, in certain conceivable circumstances, would prove an embarrassing one. In any case a signature is of no value if it is not expressive of responsibility. Hence for audit purposes (as well as for others) the signature to a document of a person responsible for its contents is a *sine quâ non* prior to its acceptance or examination. In the case in question the Government, having committed the whole railway property, and the appointment of all persons required for its management, to the control of the Commissioners, can look to them only, and not to any of their servants, for such a tangible expression of the results of their proceedings in regard to money matters, and of their responsibility for them, as is designed by the Audit Act in requiring their personal signatures to statements of facts connected with their duties as collectors of Railway Receipts on behalf of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

In asking the Government to relieve them from the responsibility of signing the papers, and to accept the signature of their Accountant, it must be presumed that his signature is a satisfactory certificate to the Commissioners themselves of the *bona fides* of the statements he puts before them, and if so, why should they not do what they ask the Government to do, viz., endorse or rather adopt his statements as their own—a course which every head of a department is obliged to follow?

The reply appears to be that it involves, in checking and comparing returns and other documents, such an immense amount of labor on the part of the Commissioners to satisfy themselves before attaching their signatures to papers, as seriously to interfere with other duties. Now, apart from the fact that one of their principal duties is the collection and accounting for moneys to an amount of nearly three millions annually, what is absolutely required of the Commissioners for audit purposes amounts to no more than a monthly attestation to the accounts which reach their office daily from their station-masters, and the lodgment of the same in one of the Government Banks to the credit of the Public Account, together with a daily voucher to the Treasury, under the signature of one or other of the Commissioners, not necessarily with all the detailed particulars now given on the face of the receipt voucher, as those might be stated on the back of it by the Accountant. With very effective machinery for the purpose, and a staff of servants for working it, absolutely under the control of the Commissioners, and with the Bank's acknowledgment of the receipt of moneys paid in daily, as received by their cashier (which it is presumed the Commissioners take care to see) it is hard to conceive what real difficulty there can be in the way of their endorsing to the Government the statements above referred to.

The moneys daily received by the cashier, and shown by him to be actually banked, with the Traffic Auditor's check on the same, constitute the basis of the declaration that a statement embodying the facts of such receipts is a true and faithful account of all moneys collected, &c., and the evidence before them that such moneys have been received and paid to the Treasury, ought to be sufficient to satisfy the Commissioner who may attest the account that to the best of his belief it is a true statement. The evidence simply of the daily Bank receipt as agreeing with the total of the daily vouchers sent to the Treasury ought, it appears to me, in the same way to leave no difficulty as to the signing of it.

Were the statements and vouchers intended to show "earnings" instead of actual cash receipts, the case would be different.

Treasury paper, marked 90/142.

THE question here as to relief from the personal signatures of the Commissioners to expenditure vouchers is virtually the same as that in regard to receipt statements and vouchers, although it refers to operations proceeding upon a different basis, yet with a similar statutory obligation. The 19th section of the Railways Act directs that the whole amount appropriated by Parliament for the working expenses of the Railways and Tramways "shall be expended under the control and management of the Commissioners." The amount so appropriated for 1890 is £1,852,762, and ought to be placed to the credit of the Commissioners in such instalments as may be arranged by the Treasury. For each of such instalments, if not  
made

made under accountable receipts, the Bank receipt, as for the Commissioners, should be a sufficient discharge to the Treasurer. If portions of the vote only are issued to the Commissioners, and those under accountable receipts, such receipts ought undoubtedly to be signed by one or other of the Commissioners, in token of their joint responsibility, and such other portions of the vote as are now paid direct by the Treasurer ought not to be so paid, except under some document bearing the signature of one or other of the Commissioners, as an assurance that the expenditure is being made under their control and management. The present and recent arrangements for the expenditure of the working expenses vote are, however, in my judgment, very unsatisfactory, and not in accordance with the terms of the 19th section of the Railways Act, nor in regard to the acquittances for moneys paid over to the Commissioners, under accountable receipts, in accordance with the Audit Act. The proposal to make the Railway Accountant the accounting officer for the railway expenditure would not in my view improve the position of matters, nor for reasons already given would it be at all a legal or expedient measure. At present the Commissioners furnish me with schedules, approved under their own signature, of all claims which they have passed for payment, but except in a recent instance there is no personal acquittance given to the Treasury for the money with which those approved claims are paid, nor, so far as I am aware, have the Treasury any knowledge that the so-called advances are approved by the Commissioners, or that the individual vouchers in which those issues are made are covered by such approval.

I think that all the requirements of the case can be sufficiently and simply met by the following course, which I strongly recommend to be adopted, viz. :—

The Commissioners, under their own hands, to make requisition on the Treasury monthly, or even fortnightly, for so much of the vote placed by Parliament at their disposal for working expenses as they may require. (say £50,000 or £100,000 at a time; the Treasury to place such amounts to the Commissioners' credit as a public account, and obtain a Bank acquittance for the same.

The Commissioners to pay *all claims* against the working expenses vote. The Railway Accountant to prepare a fortnightly or monthly account current, to show the receipts from the Treasury, the payments, and the balance on hand, certifying to the Commissioners the correctness of the entries and of the vouchers in support thereof, and such certified account current to be approved simply by any two of the Commissioners.

The account current to be sent to the Auditor-General, with the vouchers in support. (The schedules of approved accounts to be furnished separately as hitherto.)

I desire to add, in conclusion, that I have thought it advisable to avail myself of the opportunity afforded me to state at some length, but as concisely as possible, the views I entertain in the matter now referred to me by the Treasury, and respectfully to urge, whatever conclusion may be arrived at in regard to the questions under review, that the present unsatisfactory arrangements respecting the Railway Accounts of Receipts and Payments, as they appear to me, may be speedily brought into closer harmony with the Railway and Audit Statutes.

New South Wales Stock, 3½ per cent. (1918)—Second issue of £3,500,000.

To the Governor and Company of The Bank of England,—

Gentlemen,

9, Victoria-street, Westminster, S.W., 21 August, 1889.

Referring to my previous communication with you and to my written instructions to you of the 27th June last to place upon the market a loan of £3,500,000, and referring to your letters of 2nd and 12th June, 1885, to the Agent-General for New South Wales, I have now formally to request that you will be good enough to undertake the inscription of the loan of £3,500,000 which has so been raised by the New South Wales Government through you.

For this purpose, I and Mr. Donald Larnach, in exercise of the powers conferred upon us by certain Letters Patent with which you are acquainted, have created a further amount of stock called "New South Wales Stock," "Three and a half per cent.," and determined that the amount of such stock shall be issued at the rate of £100 of stock for every nominal amount of £100, which shall be represented by the scrip certificates or letters of allotment respectively, to be issued to subscribers for any part of the said loan, and in proof thereof I enclose a duplicate of a Deed Poll under date 8th day of July last, which has been duly enrolled.

To enable you to carry out the inscription and management of this further amount of stock under the Colonial Stock Act, I have duly made and lodged with the Inland Revenue Commissioners the necessary declaration to bring the stock under the provisions of that Act, and I send you herewith a print of that declaration, dated 9th July last.

In further exercise of the powers conferred on me as aforesaid, I beg to adopt and confirm with reference to this new issue of New South Wales Stock, the terms and conditions for the inscription and management of the same by you, as set out in your letters above referred to of the 2nd and 12th June, 1885.

In accordance with the usual practice, you will please pay to the Commissioners of Inland Revenue the composition for stamp duty, so as to enable the stock that shall be inscribed in your books to be transferred, free of duty, and the Commissioners will no doubt receive the duty from you under a similar arrangement to that made with reference to the previous issue of New South Wales Stock.

On behalf of the New South Wales Government I have to request that you will be good enough to carry out this arrangement, and to pay to the Commissioners the amount of composition payable for stamp duty in respect of the stock as inscribed in your books.

On behalf of the New South Wales Government I authorize you, on the terms of your letters of the 2nd and 12th June, 1885, above referred to, to issue to the holders of inscribed stock, who may desire the same, from time to time stock certificates to bearer, in pursuance of the provisions of the Colonial Stock Act, 1877; and I further authorize you to transfer the dividend warrants by post in the same manner and on the same conditions as the warrants for dividends on Government funds are sent.

## NEW SOUTH WALES STOCK.

It is hereby declared that by an Act of the Legislature of the Colony of New South Wales, being Act 46 Vic. No. 12, to be cited as the "Inscribed Stock Act of 1883," provision is made in the terms following, that is to say:—

Section 2.—Whenever by any Act now or hereafter in force, power is given to the Governor to raise any sum or sums of money by way of loan for the Public Service of the Colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor to raise the whole or any portion of such sum or sums in the form of Inscribed Stock (hereinafter termed "Stock").

Section 3.—All such stock shall be styled "New South Wales Stock," and subject to the provisions of this Act, shall be issued in such amounts, in such manner, at such times, bear interest at such rate (not exceeding 4 per centum per annum), and shall be redeemable at such times, and on such conditions, and shall be subject to such terms and conditions as the Governor, before exercising the aforesaid power, shall from time to time determine and appoint.

Section 7.—The Governor may from time to time enter into such agreement with any bank carrying on business in London as to him seems fit to provide for all or any of the following matters (*inter alia*):—

- (i) For the inscription and issue of stock.
- (ii) For effecting the conversion of debentures into stock, and regulating transfers of stock.
- (iv) For securing stock certificates, and as often as occasion shall require reinscribing or reissuing such certificates.
- (viii) For conducting generally all business connected with stock or loans.

Section 8.—Every agreement made with any such bank shall be as valid and effectual as if the terms thereof had been enacted by this Act.

Section 9.—The Governor may appoint two or more persons in London as Agents for the purposes of this Act, of whom one shall be the Agent-General for the Colony for the time being, and may empower such agents, or any one or more of them, to exercise such powers by this Act exercisable by the Governor as the said Governor may authorize or direct.

Section 14.—The word "Governor" in this Act means "Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council."

And

And it is hereby further declared that the Right Honorable Sir Augustus William Frederick Spencer Loftus (commonly called Lord Augustus Loftus), Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being of the said Colony and its Dependencies, with the advice of the Executive Council by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the said Colony, and bearing date the 14th day of April, 1883, in virtue of power conferred by the "Inscribed Stock Act of 1883," did appoint Sir Saul Samuel, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Agent-General resident in London of the said Colony; Sir Daniel Cooper, Baronet, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George; Donald Larnach, Esquire, Frederick Holkam Dangar Esquire, and Edward Knox, a Member of the Legislative Council of the said Colony of New South Wales, Agents in London, for the purposes of the same Act, and did thereby empower them or any one or more of them, to exercise such powers as are by the Governor exercisable under the same Act:—

And it is hereby further declared that the said Sir Augustus William Frederick Spencer Loftus, as such Governor as aforesaid, with such advice as aforesaid, did on or about the 24th day of September, 1885, revoke the said appointment of the said Edward Knox, and by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the Colony, bearing date on or about the same 24th day of September, 1885, in virtue of the powers conferred by the "Inscribed Stock Act of 1883," did appoint William Richmond Mewburn, Esquire, and Nathaniel Cork, Esquire, additional agents in London, for the purposes of the same Act, and did thereby empower the said Sir Saul Samuel, Sir Daniel Cooper, Donald Larnach, and Frederick Holkam Dangar, and the said William Richmond Mewburn, and Nathaniel Cork, hereinafter called the said Commissioners, or any one or more of them, to exercise such powers as are by the Governor exercisable under the same Act.

And it is hereby further declared that by another Act of the said Legislature entitled the "Public Works Loan Act of 1881" it was enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to raise by the sale of Debentures secured upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 4 per centum per annum such several sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of £7,807,500 as might be required for the purposes in the said Act mentioned, and that the loan so authorized might be negotiated in the form of funded stock in London at such times and for such amounts as might be directed by the Governor with such advice as aforesaid.

And it is hereby further declared that by another Act of the said Legislature entitled the "Public Works Loan Act of 1881, No. 2," it was enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor with such advice as aforesaid to raise by the sale of Debentures secured upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 4 per centum per annum, such several sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of £1,000,000 as might be required for the purposes in the same Act mentioned, and that the loans so authorized might be negotiated in the form of funded stock in London at such times and for such amounts as might be directed by the Governor with such advice as aforesaid.

And it is hereby further declared that by another Act of the said Legislature entitled the "Public Works Loan Act of 1883," it was enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor with such advice as aforesaid to raise by the sale of Debentures or the issue of Inscribed Stock secured upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 4 per centum per annum such several sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of £2,000,000, as might be required for the purposes in the same Act mentioned.

And it is hereby further declared that by another Act of the said Legislature, entitled the "Public Works Loan Act of 1884," it was enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor, with such advice as aforesaid, to raise by the sale of Debentures, or the issue of Inscribed Stock, secured upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Colony, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 4 per centum per annum, such several sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of £14,388,303, as might be required for the purposes in the same Act mentioned.

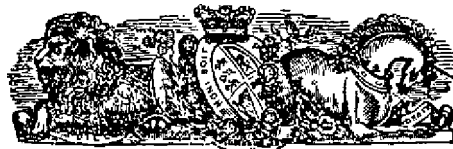

OLD LOANS ACCOUNT.

(MINUTES RESPECTING DISPOSAL OF BALANCE AT CREDIT OF.)

*Ordered by the Legislative Assembly to be printed, 24 July, 1890.*

The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 31 July, 1889.

I have the honor to request that you will have the goodness at your earliest convenience to submit, for the consideration of the Treasurer, the following observations and suggestion in regard to the Old Loans Account, on which at this date there is a balance unexpended of £132,326 Os. 4d.

That balance ought to stand as a part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, in accordance with the several Appropriation Acts out of which it arises.

The statement of those Old Loans Services, prior to the Act 35 Victoria No. 5, which introduced a new system of account for receipts and expenditure under Loan Appropriations, was made a separate one purely for convenience in keeping the accounts, yet, while the sum of the Old Loans has existed and has appeared as if a separate fund, the amount at its credit at any time has always been and is now legally a part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

The amount now at credit of the account is the remnant of the proceeds of debentures to the amount of £450,000, issued in 1870 to balance up all previous loans to that date, without regard to whether the amount was actually wanted or not, a by no means provident arrangement, for it covered (besides a multitude of small balances which at the time could not have been wanted) three whole appropriations for a sum in all of £55,000, viz. :—£20,000 for a Wesleyan College; £10,000 for District Courts, Sydney; £25,000 for a Penitentiary.

The first of these services was provided for thirty-four years ago by the Affiliated Colleges Act as a contingent liability of the Revenue, but has never been applied for, and the second and third have never been carried out although voted, the one twenty-seven and the other twenty-four years ago.

A glance at the latest Ways and Means Estimates shows that there are none of the balances retained for expenditure, and forming the balance of £132,326 Os. 4d., that can now be required nor if required, but what could probably be met without much difficulty. At all events the original appropriations are now of so old a date (the latest now nearly twenty years old), that it becomes a question whether they ought now to be any longer considered to be operative without a new appropriation, either from Revenue or Loans.

I would suggest therefore, and strongly urge that the whole of this Old Loan Account be at once written off, and carried back to its proper position to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and thus so far reduce the nominal overdraft on that Account.

The Auditor-General's suggestion respecting the Balance at the credit of the Old Loans Account.

[Memorandum.]

The Treasury, New South Wales, 15 August, 1889.

I would be very glad to recommend the adoption of the course suggested and strongly urged by the Auditor-General in his letter of 31st July, namely, to write off the appropriations and balances of Appropriations for Loan Services provided for by Acts, prior to the Act, 35 Victoria No. 5, and transfer the sum of £132,326 Os. 4d. at the credit of the Old Loans Account to the Consolidated Revenue Fund, were it not that I consider such a proceeding would be a most improper one, and fraught with unpleasant and probably dangerous consequences.

In order to maintain the high position to which our securities have attained in the money market of the world it is necessary, I consider, that moneys raised by Loans should be expended on reproductive, or on public works of a permanent character.

To

To make use of £132,000, borrowed for certain public works, for the purpose of reducing to that extent the overdraft on the Consolidated Revenue Fund, because the works for which the moneys had been raised had not been, and probably would not be, carried out, would, when known, have a prejudicial effect on the securities of this Colony.

In addition to this, however, the course suggested seems to me to be illegal. The Acts under which the loans referred to were raised, contain each a clause to this effect:—"All sums borrowed under this Act shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer, and shall be by him placed to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and shall be applied towards the respective purposes for which the same shall have been so raised, and shall be accounted for in the same manner as if they had formed part of the current annual revenue of the Colony."

The moneys raised under the various Loan Acts referred to were not placed to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, but to the credit of an account called the Loans Account as a matter of convenience, and also because it was considered, and rightly too, I think, that by placing the money to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund it was probable some amount might not be applied towards the purpose for which it was raised. If, however, the Auditor-General's suggestion were adopted the moneys would not be applied as directed by the Acts; but in another way and for another purpose never contemplated when the Acts were passed.

The proper procedure under the circumstances would seem to be to apply the sums, not required for the purposes for which raised, for such other services as have been or may hereafter be provided for by loans.

I regret that for the reasons stated I cannot recommend the adoption of the Auditor-General's suggestion.

The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 24 July, 1890.

I have to acknowledge receipt of a letter, dated the 7th instant, signed for you by Mr. Kirkpatrick, and enclosing a copy of a minute prepared by him, under date 15th August, 1889, respecting a matter which I considered it my duty to submit for the consideration of the Colonial Treasurer, by my letter of 31st July, 1889, but which it would appear was only brought under his notice on the 4th of the present month.

I take leave to say, in the first place, that I consider I have reason to complain that such a minute as that penned by Mr. Kirkpatrick should have been sent to me at all, and sent it would appear by the direction of the Treasurer, containing, as it does, expressions of opinion that I had proposed a "most improper proceeding, fraught with unpleasant and dangerous consequences, illegal, &c.,"—language for which, as applied to the substance of my letter of 31st July, there are certainly no just grounds. The minute assumes that I proposed to expend the money in question for Revenue purposes. There is nothing in my letter to justify such an interpretation, nor any other than what I stated in my Report to Parliament on the accounts of 1883, and also in reply to a letter from the late Chief Inspector of Accounts, Mr. Thomson, dated in 1883, asking my views on this very subject. Holding, as I do, that the money always formed part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and that there were now really no liabilities attached to it for expenditure, my proposal was not to make it revenue for any purpose, but that there being no longer any necessity to keep it standing as a separate portion of the Consolidated Revenue Fund Account, it should, like any other balance of appropriation, be written off, and "so accounted for in the same manner" as any other "part of the current annual revenue of the Colony"—strictly in terms of the Acts under which the money was directed to be "placed to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund."

The suggestion that my proposal to state the accounts in accordance with the law would, "if known," seriously affect quotations of the Colony's securities on the London market, is surely far-fetched and imaginary. But if anything respecting the disposal of the comparatively paltry sum in question could have such an effect, it would, in my opinion, be the publication of a minute, which avowedly declares that the money borrowed under those old Loan Acts had not been dealt with according to law, for reasons which never existed when the loan expenditure was first made a separate statement, as a part of the Consolidated

Revenue Fund Accounts, in the year 1856, and which seeks to justify the proceeding, while it proposes to dispose of the residue in a manner which the Acts containing the clause quoted, commencing "all sums borrowed, &c," give no countenance to. I take it that the holders of, and investors in, our Colonial bonds chiefly concern themselves to be satisfied that their interest is punctually paid, and the principal met at maturity. Of this the lenders have had abundant experience during the last thirty years, and the fact is doubtless one main reason why our securities hold so high a place. If the holders of the remaining bonds in the old form of debentures were to hear that, instead of expending the few thousands that have accrued as savings on their loans in a sort of spendthrift fashion—perpetuating the debt, in fact—they were retained to redeem some of their bonds, their sense of the value of their securities would certainly be all the greater.

I had written thus far when I perceived, by the Votes and Proceedings, that the papers under reply had been laid upon the Table of the Legislative Assembly. I have, therefore, the honor to request that you will move the Colonial Treasurer to now have the goodness to supplement them by likewise placing before the Assembly this communication.

### No. 3.

#### Memorandum from The Consulting Accountant to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

The Treasury, New South Wales, 4 August, 1890.

I THINK it will be found, upon perusal of this letter (24th July, 1890), that the Auditor-General is in error when he states that there is nothing in his communication of 31st July, 1889, to justify the interpretation that he proposed to expend the balance at the credit of the Old Loans Account for Revenue Services.

In the concluding portion of that communication the Auditor-General "suggests, and strongly urges, that the whole of this Old Loans Account be at once written off, and carried back to its proper position, to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and thus so far reduce the nominal\* overdraft on that account."

The effect of this operation, if carried out, would be to pay Revenue obligations to the extent of £132,326 Os. 4d. out of Loan moneys, and this is the course which I still venture to think would be a most improper one, and fraught with unpleasant and probably dangerous consequences, and which I also venture to think would be an illegal course.

But as the Auditor-General now disavows the suggestion of any such course of action, the objections taken in my minute of 15th August, 1889, no longer apply; and, with a view to a settlement of the question, the Treasurer will probably consider the propriety of making provision in the next Loan Bill for the application of this unused balance towards meeting new Loan Services.

## METROPOLITAN FIRE BRIGADES BOARD.

(SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.)

Presented to Parliament, Pursuant to Act 47 Vic. No. 3.

## The Chairman of The Fire Brigades Board to The Colonial Secretary.

Sir, Head Quarters Fire Station, Castlereagh-street, Sydney, 17 March, 1890.

I do myself the honor to submit, on behalf of the Fire Brigades Board, its Sixth Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1889. Incorporated with it is to be found the Annual Report and Statistical Returns of the Superintendent of Fire Brigades. There is also appended lists of the names of the Insurance Companies and Municipal Councils which contributed to the revenue of the Board during the year, in accordance with the 15th section of the Act. It will be observed that at the beginning of the year the names of five new Companies were added, viz., the British and Colonial, the Mutual, Hong Kong, Netherlands India, and Straits. During the year, however, two Companies ceased business, viz., the Equitable of New Zealand and the Industrial Mutual. Taking the list of Insurance Companies first into consideration, it will be noticed that the amount held at risk attained the enormous amount of £53,583,000, and when comparing this amount with that of the previous year, viz., £50,528,368, it will be observed that there has been an increase of the insurances of property in the city and suburbs of £3,054,632. Since the inauguration of the Board in 1884, when the amount held at risk was £36,690,987, each year has seen an increase of an amount reaching more than £2,000,000. It cannot be ascertained whether the whole of this increase is natural or artificial, that is attributable to the more extensive use of insurance by the public, and to an increase in the number of buildings and in value, of the contents of warehouses and dwellings, or to the increased valuation, resulting either from speculation or rise in wages and cost of material. It is evident, however, that this additional increase of £16,882,013 extra, means that precautions must be taken for the prevention and extinction of fires. The Board is fully alive to this, and has given effect to its deliberations by—first, thoroughly equipping the Brigade with first-class plant and appliances, and the erection of stations; and, second, by the extension of the Fire Alarm System throughout the city, and most part of the thickly-populated suburban districts and localities of importance; and, thirdly, by maintaining and subsidizing efficient Volunteer Fire Companies in suburban districts.

In respect to the Municipalities which contribute in accordance with the Act, an increase in the ratable value of the property is found. Last year's total for all Municipalities was £4,419,293, showing an increase of £125,331 on the previous year's amount. The increase from the first assessment in 1884, which then aggregated £3,053,604, is £1,365,489. The necessity of a general extension of fire protection is thus further demonstrated.

The Report of the Superintendent will show that, while carefully guarding against any lavish expenditure, or of increasing the annual levies to any extent, the work so far has been carried out satisfactorily. Speaking from a commercial point of view, it cannot be denied that the department has, in a large measure, checked incendiarism, and has besides, materially prevented the spread of fire. Up to this time the northern part of the city with its large warehouses and shipping has been practically unprotected, owing to the difficulty of securing a site suitable for a fire-station. During the past year, offers of sites were invited from persons owning property in the vicinity of the Circular Quay, but though a few eligible sites were offered, there were none which the Board could thoroughly recommend, owing to the exorbitant prices asked, although the Board did submit for your consideration two sites, which, excepting their price, would have been suitable. These matters were duly represented to yourself as the Head of the Department, and after considering all the facts and the importance and requirements of that part of the city, a promise was made that the subject should have the early attention of the Government. This promise has been fulfilled, and it is pleasing to record that the Government has so promptly taken the matter up, and decided to dedicate a site at the Circular Quay. It is therefore hoped that the erection of the station will be an accomplished fact during the year 1890.

The question of procuring a site for the fire-station at Newtown has also engaged the attention of the Board. Its recommendation to the Government for the lock-up to be dedicated for the purpose has again and again been urged, and during the past year a deputation of the Board waited on you, and pointed out the special advantages of the site for the erection of a fire-station for the protection of Newtown and the surrounding boroughs.

In

In the Superintendent's report reference is also made to the efficiency of the department, which, he states, is very satisfactory. He also refers to the water supply of the City and Suburbs, and the Board fully endorses his remarks. In regard to the extension of fire protection generally, the Board's recommendations in the past still hold good, and whilst having no desire to again repeat them, or to cause any undue alarm, there are still one or two matters which perhaps might be referred to in this report. While assisting the Volunteer Companies, as a whole, to tide over difficulties in regard to extra requirements, so long as good service is given in return, the Board has had under consideration the formation of an Auxiliary Corps, which would in all cases work more in conjunction with the Permanent Brigade, as it would be more under its immediate control and direction. It is believed that such a Corps would materially aid the operations of the Brigade without adding much more to the expenses of the department. Whatever may be the success attained, the Board has resolved to try the experiment.

The Board again call attention to its anomalous position, which can be surmised from the various proposed amendments in the Act, as embodied in the last annual report. The Board is made responsible under the Act for the protection against fire of the lives and property of the inhabitants of these Municipalities of the County of Cumberland, which are brought under its provisions, and yet it is not clothed with the authority possessed by an ordinary Inspector of Nuisances. At present the Superintendent can report to the Board, but the Board have not the power under the present Act to remedy the evil. It cannot cause the removal of the smallest of the innumerable hazardous elements with which the city of Sydney is at present charged. The warehouses, offices, &c., recently erected and in course of erection, which outwardly appear the picture of solidity, are in many instances honeycombed with passages, well-holes, lifts, and shafts; others are little better than stone and brick shells, with wooden boxes, called offices, the ceilings and walls being frequently cased in soft wood, and there is no public authority which can enforce regulations for the public safety against fire. The Board and the Insurance Companies know that the regulations of the Building Acts are a dead letter; that rows of apparently separate buildings are allowed to be converted into one risk; that in some instances rows of apparently harmless-looking shops are immediately over cellars knocked into one, containing combustible goods. There are no provisions for the storage of combustible matter or for the removal of combustible rubbish, or for providing against the possible spread of fire through awnings, or woodwork, windows, skylights, or the electric lighting of buildings. Surely if buildings reaching an altitude of 130 feet, or higher, are allowed to be built, particularly in narrow streets, some provision should be made whereby any disaster resulting therefrom should be visited on the contractors or owners.

It may be said, let the Insurance Companies look after these matters, but many companies decline to have anything to do with such risks, and besides which, there are many dangerous risks which are absolutely uninsurable, and should be suppressed or relegated to parts where their power of mischief would be at an end.

The Board, as a Board, has nothing to do with the indemnity against losses occasioned by fire. To it has been entrusted the responsibility of protecting the citizens against fire, and of preventing fire. It is scarcely fair to impose such responsibility without enabling it to fulfil its functions.

The Board feel that it has only done its duty by calling attention to these matters, and express a hope that you will give the suggested Amended Act your early consideration.

## APPENDIX VII.

Mr. Superintendent Bear's Report.

To the Fire Brigades Board,—  
Gentlemen,Metropolitan Fire Brigade Head-quarters Station,  
Sydney, 3 February, 1890.

I do myself the honor to submit to your Board herewith my Sixth Annual Report of the working and general efficiency of your Brigade and the several Volunteer Fire Companies, together with the details of fires attended in the City and Suburbs of Sydney, for the year ending 31st December, 1889.

The total number of alarms received for fires or supposed fires was 272; of these 33 were false alarms, 14 proved to be only chimney alarms, and 225 were actual fires. Of the actual fires 179 were slight or trifling, 17 were serious, and 29 resulted in total destruction.

Of the 225 actual fires 157 were insured, 28 not insured, and in 40 instances insurances on the buildings or contents could not be ascertained.

In addition to the ordinary fires there have been 31 chimney-fires, requiring the attendance of firemen with hand-pump only, and 2 casualties in which life was lost or endangered, but in which no damage was done to buildings or their contents, making an aggregate total of 305 calls for fires, false alarms, chimney-fires, and casualties.

The fires of 1889 as compared with those of 1888 show a decrease of 41; in chimney-fires attended with engines an increase of 4; and those attended by firemen with hand-pump a decrease of 20.

In fires which were slight there has been a decrease of 43; in serious a decrease of 2; and in fires which resulted in total destruction an increase of 4. Among the buildings totally destroyed are classed shed-buildings, weatherboard cottages, &c., the damage done in five cases only being of an extensive character, one of which was outside of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade area.

Attached are detailed statements of the various fires attended by the Brigade and the Volunteer Fire Companies, as well as those unattended, but which have been reported to the Brigade from various sources, and a member of the Brigade was sent to obtain the necessary particulars.

The various summaries appended show the particular dates, time of calls, time of outbreak, trades, localities, insurances, hourly and daily, weekly and monthly. There is also appended a summary of the "Supposed origin of Fires" for the year.

Referring to the summary of localities, it will be noticed that in the City of Sydney alone there were 171 calls, 122 of which were for actual fires, 19 were false alarms, 9 were chimney-fires reported as houses on fire, and 21 were chimney-fires attended by firemen with hand-pump only.

Of the actual fires in the City there were in Denison Ward 21; Cook and Macquarie Wards, 20 each; Bourke Ward, 16; Gipps Ward, 14; Brisbane and Phillip Wards, 12 each; and Fitzroy Ward, 7.

In the suburbs there were 134 calls—of which 103 were for actual fires, 14 were false alarms, 5 were for chimney-fires reported as houses on fire, 10 were for chimney-fires which were attended by firemen with hand-pump only, and two casualties.

The suburbs affected in regard to actual fires only were as follows, viz. :—Newtown, 11; Balmain and Paddington, each 10; Redfern, 9; Marrickville and Petersham, each 7; Ashfield and Woollahra, 6 each; Leichhardt and Parramatta, 5 each; Glebe, 4; Darlington, Manly, and Waverley, 3 each; Alexandria, Enfield, and Waterloo, 2 each; and the other suburbs, one fire each.

In summarizing the trades it will be observed that private dwellings have been mostly affected by fires, the number for all classes of damage being 84; but taking the actual trades into consideration the most notable stand in the following order, viz. :—Licensed victuallers, 15; grocers, 8; Government buildings, produce merchants, and stables, 6 each; butchers and engineers, 4 each; boarding houses, bootmakers, and boot manufacturers, confectioners, drapers, and milliners, fancy goods dealers, importers, and printers, 3 each; bakers, banks, bedding manufacturers, chemists, furniture dealers, general dealers, ironmongers, jewellers, merchants, publishing offices, ships, storekeepers, skating rinks, timber merchants, and wharfingers, 2 each; other trades affected, one each; and are to be found in the "Summary of Trades."

During the year telephonic communication has been established between the Head-quarters Fire Station and Messrs. Hoffing & Co., Pitt-street, and between the Head-quarters Fire Station and Darlington Hall; between No. 2 Station and the Redfern Police Station, and each of the Volunteer Fire Stations at Parramatta were connected by telephone. All Volunteer Fire Stations (with the exception of Ashfield, Burwood, Manly, and Parramatta), all theatres and all music halls (with the exception of the Academy of Music), the Government Printing Office, the Railway Department and the Town Hall are in direct telephonic communication with our three permanent fire stations.

The various police stations are also connected up through the Central Police Station. The various wharves, warehouses, business houses, and many public buildings are also in telephonic communication, though indirectly, through the Telephone Exchange at the General Post Office, which is open to receive and transmit calls for fires at any hour of the day or night. In the month of May the 200-shutter exchange board arrived, and was fitted up in the Head-quarters Fire Station, and has proved a success.

I trust that during the year 1890 we shall be able to place Ashfield, Camperdown, and Randwick in telephonic communication.

On the 21st of January, 1890, thirty telephone fire-alarms were landed, and before the end of the month twenty of them were erected and put in full working order at the following positions, viz. :—

Your Board will remember that as far back as July, 1888, I placed myself in communication with Messrs. Kingsbury and Co., agents for the Western Electric Telegraph Company, with the view of getting a Special Telephone made to my own ideas and measurements, to be fitted in iron boxes suitable for the telegraph poles. In the month of June of last year the model was supplied, which I considered very suitable for the purpose, and thirty of them were ordered by your Board on the 8th of July, and arrived as before stated, the manufacturers had delayed the delivery of them for further improvements.

I am very confident of their success, especially so if I obtain the co-operation of the police and the public, as the instruments in question are very simple. Keys have been given to the police and other public bodies, and persons living in the vicinity of the said alarms.

I am pleased to be able to report that the Government has recognized the necessity for a permanent Fire Engine Station for the protection of the enormous properties at the northern end of the city, and I have reason to believe that a very suitable site has already been decided upon. The importance of a fully-equipped station in this locality cannot be exaggerated, and I trust that before long practical steps will have been taken towards its erection. The delay occasioned by sending to a station upwards of a mile away, and the time required for an engine weighing three tons to travel the same distance, gives every opportunity for a fire to get good headway before we can reach the vicinity.

Since the 19th of March a man has been stationed on watch in the tower at the Head-quarters Station from sunset until 6 a.m., and a watchman's electric clock has been placed in my office in communication both with the tower and the telephone room, the man on duty in each place being required to record every quarter of an hour. Eleven calls for fires and four false alarms were given from the tower.

In the three stations of the Brigade the duties now number 17 watches of 8 hours each during the 24 hours. This is exclusive of attending fires, watching at fires, cleaning and repairing engines and appliances, cleaning stations, attending drills, learning the position of fire plugs and hydrants, and various other work. All this cannot be carried out without bringing a severe strain on all hands, especially so after a large fire, and if the watching duty in the tower is to be kept up when the system of telephone fire-alarms is complete, and the 1,000 screw-down hydrants are put down in the City, which will entail a great deal of extra labour in periodical inspections, additional men should be employed.

During the past year a light fire-escape has been built by the Brigade for the No. 2 Station, George-street West, which will be run to all fires within a certain radius from that station.

The fire-escape which was built in 1888 for the Head-quarters Station is now being altered for the purpose of running it to fires with a horse in accordance with my report to your Board on the subject. This will not only be the means of getting the escape to fires more quickly, but the men with it will be fit for work when they arrive.

Many high buildings have been erected during the year both within the City and beyond it, and although our large telescopic fire ladder, hoisting out to 75 feet is sufficient for the majority of houses, I fear it would be of little use to some of them. With the object of placing us in a more favourable position in this respect I have written several letters to London, America, and Germany, for particulars of the different ladders in use, especially those reaching to a height of about 100 feet, and the number of men required to work them. This I need hardly point out is an important consideration with the small force at my command.

Five of our Volunteer Fire Companies, viz., Ashfield, Newtown, North City, Waverley and Woollahra have made special arrangements for taking their appliances on to a fire by means of horses, and as a consequence these Companies are enabled to attend fires more quickly than was formerly the case.

The water supply generally has been much improved during the year, but there are still many streets in the City to which this remark does not apply, some having very little water and some none at all. However, the Water and Sewerage Board are gradually doing away with the old state of things and have resolved to put down 1,000 screw-down hydrants in the City, and many of the old water mains which are almost choked up are to be replaced by new and larger pipes, and to abolish the old fashioned fire-plugs altogether. When these works are carried out and most of the City supplied with water from the Paddington Reservoir, or from the proposed new reservoir near the present Woollahra Reservoir we shall be very well off, and there will be sufficient pressure for the extinction of most fires happening in buildings on the lower levels. For the large buildings on the higher levels we shall always have to trust to steam fire engines.

The boilers of the two steam fire engines which were taken over from the Insurance Fire Brigade are both very much worn, and will require either to be renewed or to have new tube boxes fitted to them.

These engines which were built in the years 1870 and 1871 have done a great deal of work, and the engine-work requires thoroughly overhauling. As the repairs or renewals of these boilers will occupy some time, I propose in a future report to recommend the purchase of a large steam fire engine and after this is supplied to disable the old engines one at a time, and then thoroughly to go into the question of cost. In the meantime I have sent to the makers of the engines for an estimate for supplying new boilers.

The whole of the Volunteer Fire Companies when at fires have worked in entire unison, both with the Metropolitan Fire Brigade and amongst themselves, and through your Board I desire to express my obligations to them for their valuable co-operation during the past year, especially so at the late wharf fire. My best thanks are due to the officers and members of the Police Force, and to the city Turncocks for the very valuable assistance which I have received from them on every occasion.

I have also to offer to your Board my sincerest acknowledgment for the unvarying support accorded to me, and I trust it is pleased with the result of the year's working.

In conclusion I have to state that the condition of the Brigade with regard to discipline and general efficiency is very satisfactory; but it is my duty to point out that the rapid growth of the city entails much extra labour on all hands, and the work at times brings a very severe strain on so small a force. In all cases, however, our men have worked cheerfully and well.

**FIRE BRIGADES ACT, 1884.**

(GOULBURN FIRE BRIGADES BOARD—FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.)

Presented to Parliament pursuant to Act 47 Vic. No. 3, sec. 7.

The Chairman of the Goulburn Fire Brigades Board to The Colonial Secretary.

Sir,

Goulburn, 31 January, 1890.

We have the honor to present you with the fifth Annual Report of the Goulburn Fire Brigades Board.

We regret we are unable to report that the erection of the new fire-station has been commenced. A suitable site has been purchased by the Government, and for some time has been vested in the Crown, but in consequence of the decision of the Supreme Court in the Deniliquin case this Board has not seen their way to proceeding with the building, though having the necessary funds in hand. They had, however, accepted a tender for the building just before the decision referred to was given, but with the consent of the contractor the commencement of the work has been delayed. As the new station is much needed they have suggested that the formal contract may be made nominally with your department, the Board undertaking to pay for and to supervise the work. To this proposal no answer has been received. This Board has several times urged upon the Government the desirability of amending the Fire Brigades Act, 1884, so as to put the position of the country Boards into an efficient state of working.

We also beg to report not having received any contributions from the Insurance Companies during the year as provided for in the Fire Brigades Act, 1884. The Government and the Municipal Council have however, hitherto paid their respective contributions. The payments made by the Government and the Municipal Council have enabled the Board to meet current engagements, but if the contributions of the Insurance Companies continue to be withheld, it will become necessary to limit expenditure, and the Board do not see how this is to be done without the risk of decreasing the efficiency of the Brigade, and the certainty of neglecting repairs and renewals of the apparatus. The Companies in refusing to pay are availing themselves of a technical objection to evade an obligation the Legislature intended to impose upon them; and this Board cannot refrain from pointing out that if the country Brigades were to be disbanded the Companies would be the greatest sufferers by fires. In one or two cases Brigades have passed resolutions against working at fires where the property is covered by insurance, and although this Board cannot recommend that a similar course should be generally followed, they yet see that its adoption is but the natural result of the short sighted policy the Companies have chosen to pursue.

The Board have again much pleasure in reporting on the thorough efficiency of the Brigade, which at present numbers 26. The plant is sufficient for all requirements, and is in good order.

The Board have held ten meetings during the year, which have been attended as follows, viz. :—

**FIRE BRIGADES ACT, 1884.**

(WOLLONGONG FIRE BRIGADES BOARD—FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.)

Presented to Parliament pursuant to Act 47 Vic. No. 3, sec. 7.

**The Wollongong Fire Brigades Board to The Colonial Secretary.**

Sir,

Wollongong Fire Brigades Board Office, Wollongong, 19 June, 1890.

We have the honor to present you with the First Annual Report of the Wollongong Fire Brigades Board, for the year ending 31st March, 1890.

The Wollongong Fire Brigade was duly registered under the Board, dating from 1st April, 1890. The Brigade consists of sixteen members, including captain, foreman, engineer, and caretaker.

The Board labour under great disability through not having a centrally situated site upon which to erect a suitable fire station. The building at present used as a fire station is erected upon a site held only on sufferance, a most unsatisfactory tenure, as orders might be received at any moment for its removal, in which event the Board would be put to great inconvenience. This being so, the Board respectfully urge upon the Government the necessity of providing, without delay, a suitable site upon which to erect a fire station and office.

The Board regret to report that they have not received any contributions from the different Fire Insurance Companies holding risks in the Borough during the year. The Fire Brigades Act of 1884 provides that they shall contribute one-third of the annual amount required by the Board for the carrying on of its operations. This they refuse to do. The Government and Borough Council have paid their respective contributions, which have enabled the Board to meet their engagements, but their operations have been more circumscribed than would have been the case had the Insurance Companies fulfilled their obligations. These Companies, in thus refusing to pay their share of expenditure, are taking advantage of some technicality to evade an obligation the Legislature most certainly intended to impose upon them when the Fire Brigades Act of 1884 was passed into law. As the Insurance Companies are invariably the greatest sufferers in the event of fire, it seems most extraordinary that they should be so short-sighted as to refuse to contribute towards the support of a thoroughly-equipped and efficient brigade, to cope with any fires that may occur. In one instance during this year the Wollongong Fire Brigade, through their efforts and exertions, without doubt saved buildings covered by insurance to the amount of £4,000 from destruction by fire. Had there been no fire brigade in the Borough the Insurance Companies would have been called upon to pay this sum. The Board most respectfully impress upon the Government the necessity that exists for the passing of the proposed amended Fire Brigades Act, in order that the Fire Insurance Companies may be compelled to contribute their share towards the carrying on of the operations of country Fire Brigades Boards.

The Board have pleasure in reporting upon the efficiency of the Brigade, the plant being also in good working order.

The Board have held thirteen meetings during the year.

To the Honorable The Minister of Justice for New South Wales.

The humble Petition of the undersigned Ratepayers of the Borough of Lismore, on the Richmond River—

SHOWETH,—

1. That on Wednesday, the 31st day of October last, Alexander James Simpson was charged with a breach of section 38 of the “Municipalities Act of 1867,” by supplying goods to the Council of Lismore, he being a member of the Council at the time.

2. That when the case was called, upon the morning of the above date, the said Alexander James Simpson asked for a postponement until Saturday, the 3rd of November, on the ground that Mr. Norrie, who was engaged for the defence, had telegraphed that he would be unable to attend at Lismore before the Saturday following (November 3rd).

3. That, on the Bench deciding to go on with the case (the application for adjournment having been refused on the ground that there had already been one adjournment of four weeks), the said A. J. Simpson objected to the Police Magistrate sitting and adjudicating on the case, stating at the same time that he had good grounds for making the objection; but the Police Magistrate insisted upon adjudicating upon the case, notwithstanding the objection raised.

4. That the Bench adjourned the case until 1-30 p.m. of the same day to enable the said A. J. Simpson to obtain legal assistance.

5. That, at ten minutes to 2 o'clock on the same day, the Court was reopened, and the case called, when Mr. Conly Dickey, solicitor, appeared for Mr. Simpson, and asked the Bench to adjourn the case for seven days, to enable him to prepare a defence; but the Bench refused the application, and Mr. Dickey retired from the case, as he was not allowed to prepare for the defence.

6. That the said A. J. Simpson was compelled to defend the case himself, without professional assistance, and submitted that the 38th section of the Municipal Act referred to continuous contracts, and not to small sales across the counter, quoting the late Chief Justice, Sir James Martin, in support, and contended that he, the said A. J. Simpson, had not knowingly committed any breach of the Act in question.

7. That the Bench convicted the said A. J. Simpson of the offence with which he was charged, and fined him in the sum of £50, but did not insert in the order made anything about the said A. J. Simpson being disqualified from the office of Mayor, nor did the said Bench notify the Lismore Council that the said A. J. Simpson had been convicted on the charge brought against him, and was therefore disqualified from filling the office of Mayor.

Your Petitioners, therefore, being fully convinced that the said A. J. Simpson did not knowingly commit the offence with which he has been charged, and considering that he has been very hardly and unjustly dealt with, humbly request your honorable Minister of Justice as follows:—

- (1.) To cause the £50 fine to be remitted to the said A. J. Simpson.
- (2.) To waive and condone that part of the penalty which refers to disqualification from office of the said A. J. Simpson for 7 (seven) years—in case such disqualification follows by implication after a conviction under the 38th section of the Municipalities Act, as your Petitioners are of opinion that if the said A. J. Simpson is excluded from the Lismore Council, and disqualified from representing your Petitioners in Council, the interests of the town of Lismore must suffer very seriously in consequence.

And your Petitioners will ever pray, &c., &c.

Barrie v. Simpson.

With reference to a petition from the Honorable the Minister of Justice in the above case, I desire to make the following remarks in explanation:—

1. My objection to the P.M. (Mr. J. Bray) adjudicating in the case was based on the notorious fact that Mr. Bray had actively and energetically opposed my election to the Lismore Council by addresses to the ratepayers from the balcony of the "Royal Hotel," and from the stage of the Albert Theatre, at an electioneering meeting, as well as in other ways endeavouring to prejudice my candidature.
2. That whether from defects in the merits of the cases or otherwise, verdicts were seldom given in favour of the Council by Mr. Bray during my mayorship.
3. That I had been called upon to give evidence in the inquiry as to Mr. Bray's conduct as a Magistrate, and was treated by Mr. Bray and his solicitor as a hostile witness. Incidentally, I may mention that for making the objection referred to Mr. Bray lectured me in very severe terms, and threatened to commit me for contempt of Court, as he also did subsequently for being a few minutes late in my attendance, while he himself detained the Court for a longer time the previous day.
4. In the conduct of the case, I felt aggrieved at the fact of the prosecutor, Mr. Barrie, and the P.M., Mr. Bray, being constantly in intimate association during the trial, generally coming together to the Court, remaining together in the Magistrate's room before the case was called upon, and usually going together to various hotels in town, where they were frequently in company for considerable periods of time. Indeed, so intimate was the association that I had every reason to believe that I was being tried by one of the prosecutor's warmest friends (these facts are incontrovertible), while I, on the contrary, rarely exchanged a word with any member of the Bench.
5. The absence of the solicitor, Mr. Norrie, greatly prejudiced my case, and I might have had other legal aid but for the fact that the majority of the ratepayers specially urged me to employ that gentleman, and his inability to attend was known too late to allow the local solicitors time to prepare a defence.
6. During the hearing of the case I was persistently denied the right to introduce any evidence to prove that the prosecutor had himself committed a breach of the Act by supplying goods to the Council, as had also other aldermen, friends of the prosecutor, or of introducing evidence to prove that an intention of getting me out of the Council had been publicly expressed by prosecutor's friends. The decision in Pinkstone v. McBeath seems to allow this right.
7. The evidence proved that no account was rendered to the Council by A. J. Simpson (myself), nor any money paid to him.
8. Accounts were admitted and examined of an older date than three months prior to the issue of the summons.
9. The penalty and disqualification prove that the intention was not that now ascribed to the Act.
10. No intimation of the disqualification or penalty was given to the Council in any legal way.
11. The Council's seal was not on this so-called contract.
12. The police demanded the fine, and came to enforce a distress warrant before the time allowed by law for appeal had elapsed, having been urged by some persons interested in the prosecution.

Mr. Ewing may be informed that I cannot review the legality of the conviction of Mr. Simpson, or suspend the operation of the disqualification contained in the latter portion of section 38 of the Municipalities Act, but that if exception were taken to the legality of that conviction application should have been made to the Supreme Court for a writ of prohibition; and, further, that as the Municipalities Act provides that all fines, penalties, and forfeitures imposed and recovered under that Act shall be paid into the corporate fund of the municipality (*vide* section 194), and so long a time has elapsed since the date of prosecution, I must decline to recommend any refund or remission of the penalty inflicted on Mr. Simpson by the Bench, unless the municipality desire such recommendation. Attention of P.M. who adjudicated in this case should be directed to the serious charges contained in paragraphs 1 to 4 in Mr. Simpson's letter of 25th April, with a request for a report thereon (*vide* endorsement on letter from P.M., Lismore, of 2nd July).—A.J.G., 2/8/89.

*Barrie v. Simpson.*

HAVING an interest in a contract with the Municipal Council of Lismore without being the proprietor or shareholder of any joint stock company.

Mr. Allingham for Plaintiff.

Plea—Not guilty.

*Charles A. Barham*, sworn, states :—I am Council Clerk at Lismore; I produce the *Gazette* dated 5th March, 1879, containing a proclamation of the Lismore Municipal District, above the signature of Henry Parkes; I also produce the *Gazette* showing the election of aldermen, dated 21st February, 1888, showing the election of aldermen James F. O'Flynn, Alex. James Simpson, James S. Drew; and also a notice that Alexander James Simpson has been elected Mayor of the Borough; I also produce the declarations of defendant as Mayor and alderman; that as alderman is dated 13th February, 1888, and that as Mayor is dated like 15th February, 1888, first marked second; the defendant has exercised his office as Mayor and alderman of this municipality since his election this year; I now produce accounts of M. A. Simpson rendered to the Council since the month of June last; one, as attached, dated 30th June, 1881, which should be 1888; this account was rendered to me in July, 1888, and was passed for payment by the Finance Committee of this Council on July 16th of this year, and is for £7 12s. 9d.; defendant is an ironmonger at Lismore; I know M. A. Simpson; he is an assistant to his father, I believe; I did not order these goods myself; I now produce other bills, marked and dated 1st April, 1888, one for £2 0s. 4d., the other £1 3s. 5d., both made out as due to George Larkin; these goods were purchased for the Council from Mr. Simpson's shop; for the account marked "E"—M. A. Simpson £7 12s. 9d.—M. A. Simpson received the money; George Larkin received the money for the accounts rendered in his name, and he signed the voucher; goods have been obtained from defendant's shop for the Council ever since he has been Mayor, and the accounts have been rendered as stated, sometimes in name of G. Larkin, and sometimes in name of defendant's son; on April 23rd, 1888, the Mayor presided and passed for payment all accounts, including Mr. Larkin's for £2 0s. 4d. and £1 3s. 5d., and marked F and G; on July 16th the defendant, as Mayor, presided and passed the accounts for payment, and amongst them the one marked E for £7 12s. 9d. to M. A. Simpson, a son of defendant, aged about 20, and there is no business man in town of that name that I know of except defendant's son; the Council's cheques are signed by the Mayor, Alderman O'Flynn, and myself—that is, the cheques referring to the amounts named £2 0s. 4d., £1 3s. 5d., £7 12s. 9d.

*By Mr. Simpson*: I have bought goods from your store for the Council, but from no authority from you, and I do not know of your having given authority to anyone to purchase at your store for the Council; your son served me, I believe.

*By Bench*: I have got goods myself from defendant's shop for the Council, and they were sent if I did not take them with me, and it was understood they were charged to the Council; the defendant had an account with the Council before he became alderman.

*Malcolm Alexander Simpson*, sworn, states:—I am a son of A. J. Simpson, Mayor of Lismore, and assistant in my father's store, and sometimes carry on business on my own account. (Q.) Do you produce your father's books according to your summons? (A.) No; I refuse to produce them; my father objected to my doing so; I look at exhibit E, £7 12s. 9d.; it is in my handwriting, and I can't say if it is an extract from father's books, and will not swear the goods were got in my father's store; I believe portion of the goods in exhibit E were in my father's stock, but I can't state which of them I supplied, but I supplied some of them to the Council as my father's goods; the Council Clerk paid me the account, and it belonged to me, and I will not say whom I gave it to; I got the money; it belonged to me for the time; I received it as my own; I got a cheque, and I will not tell you what I did with the cheque; I made out the account in the name of A. M. Simpson, as I had an idea it would be better; I carry on some business on my own account at times; I can't say if I paid the cheque into the bank or gave it to father.

*By Mr. Simpson*: I have had business transactions in my own name entirely, and kept the account at the A.J.S. Bank apart from my father's; I am 19 years of age.

*George Larkin*, sworn, states:—I am a magistrate of the territory, and reside at Lismore; I look at exhibits F and G, and believe the writing in the body of the bills is in the handwriting of young Simpson, and "George Larkin" is in my own handwriting; I did not supply the goods named in them to the Council; I can't say if defendant supplied the goods; I got the accounts from young Simpson; I had an account against defendant, and also against the son, and the accounts F and G were given to me to collect; I can't say if they were given to me to collect because defendant could not collect the amounts safely himself.

*By Mr. Simpson*: You did not ask me to render accounts to the Council in your name; I am not of opinion that there has been any breach of the Act in supplying goods to the Council in the ordinary course of business by aldermen.

BARRIE v. SIMPSON.

May it please your Worships,—

I RELY in my defence in the above case upon the following points, which I will here briefly submit :—

First. With reference to the accounts produced between Mr. Larkin and the Council, and to which I objected at the time, I believe it will be found that the latest item in those accounts is over six months prior to the 1st of October, the date upon which the information was laid, and in any case the 1st April and 1st October cannot be included in one six months ; therefore these accounts, even if they were between myself and the Council, should not have been admitted and examined upon.

Secondly. There is no evidence to show that I supplied any of the goods in the account furnished by M. A. Simpson ; on the contrary, I think it will be found that all the witnesses swore that I did not sell them any goods. Nor is there any evidence of their having paid me ; therefore there is no proof of any contract with me, as no contract was completed by me, nor could I have compelled its completion in a court of law.

Thirdly. I submit that the question of whether section 38 of the Municipalities Act refers to ordinary sales out of one's store in the usual course of business is not yet so absolutely and unquestionably decided that there can be no difference of opinion with reference to it. Clearly, if I had been brought before Sir James Mairtin he would unhesitatingly have declared the charge against me one showing no contravention of the Act ; therefore, the innocent man before the greatest lawyer New South Wales, or indeed Australia, has ever had, would be a guilty man before Judges Windeyer and Faucett ; but then, again, Judge Windeyer held that a mayor could not even supply goods to a contractor with the Council, an opinion opposed to that of Sir J. Martin and Sir W. Manning. I would also refer to the decision of the Bench in the case of Mr. Crouch, who, at Casino, was charged with selling goods to the Council. In that instance there was a very intelligent Bench, who read the Act as nine out of every ten would do, and dismissed the information. Under these circumstances, and until the matter is positively settled by the highest legal tribunal, I think the Bench are justified in taking the common-sense view of the matter, and deciding that ordinary sales out of the store of an alderman do not constitute an offence (even if proved).

I would specially remind your Worships that there was no previous arrangement in any instance as to where any goods were to be bought by the Council's employees, nor was there any agreement or contract as to price, nor any instructions of any kind with reference thereto.

Fourthly. I respectfully submit that I must be proved to be wilfully and knowingly contravening the Act before I can be convicted of committing a breach of it (as well as being wilfully and knowingly engaged in a contract). There is no proof that I had any knowledge of the decisions of Judges Windeyer and Faucett on this point ; in fact, the contrary is true—the only books ordinarily available for the Council not having this case (which is a recent one) cited. My accusers even attempted to prove me as having given public expression through the Press to this opinion, and to have acted upon it. If necessary, I can bring witnesses to prove that I was quite unaware of the interpretation of this section of the Act adopted by the Judges above referred to, and I also think that the Bench will at once recognize the difference between "knowing the law" and knowing the most recent interpretation of an obscure passage of it.

Fifthly. Your Worships decided that I could not call evidence as to the previous practice of aldermen in the Council in the matter. With all due deference to your decision, I think that the case of M'Beath *versus* Pinkstone shows that I should at least have been permitted to examine witnesses with reference to the doings of the prosecutor. In the case referred to M'Beath condoned an offence committed by Pinkstone over two years previously, and afterwards attempted to have him ousted on the ground of his previous disqualification. The Full Court decided that M'Beath was not competent to proceed against Pinkstone, as "he did not come into Court with clean hands."

Finally, had such evidence been admissible, I could have produced either witnesses or documentary proof that Aldermen in the Council have for years past sold goods to the Council, possibly under an impression that it was perfectly legal ; and if such a course had no other effect, it was at least calculated to put myself and other Aldermen off our guard in this matter. The Council Clerk prepared an abstract of transactions between the Aldermen and the Council, and that body as a Corporation, and I believe there were other transactions of an indirect nature, of which proof could have been given, as some of my witnesses were prepared to swear to such dealings.

In addition to the foregoing, I had proof that this prosecution was not got up in the interests of justice, or for the public good, as it has been publicly stated by some of the late members of the Council that the object in view was to remove me and others from the position we occupy in the Council.

Had it been otherwise, some friendly suggestion as to the possibility of myself or any other Alderman committing an offence against the Act in the way charged might have been made to us, but it was not given, nor, apparently, was there any desire to follow so neighbourly a course.

## EXHIBIT J, 1/11/88.

To the Editor of the *Northern Star*.

Sir,

Mr. Barrie's letter needs a reply from me only upon one point, but before I come to that I cannot resist the temptation to say that Mr. Barrie's deprecation of any desire to enter into a controversy on municipal questions with me is as absurd as unnecessary. If he will trail his coat offensively I claim an Irishman's privilege of treading on its tail. This is not an uncommon course of procedure with that gentleman, however, and if my letters are "characteristic," as Mr. Barrie invariably describes them, I am confident that his correspondence will never cause posterity the same difficulty that the famous "Junius" letters did as to their authorship.

The statement in Mr. Barrie's letter to which I specially take exception, and but for which I need not have answered it, is that "If Mr. Simpson continues to be as wise in his day and generation as he is said to be in making the most of his opportunity to benefit himself by bringing what grist he can to his own mill through them," i.e., the gasworks and water-works. Most people will agree with me I think that such phrases as "It is said," "They say," "It is reported," and so on, are generally used in cases of this kind by persons who make a cowardly attack upon their opponents while they wish to shirk the responsibility. In this instance "it is said" falsely, whoever is the author. I have supplied some goods to the Council out of my store in the ordinary course of business; so have others, while in the Council during Mr. Barrie's time of office. I do not see anything in the Act which would lead me to suppose I must refuse to supply the Council in this way. But if it is wrong, why was it not discovered years ago? And as for the general principle of the thing, why not apply it in other matters? I should like to exchange my municipal account for Mr. Barrie's hospital account, for instance. So far as my objection goes it is not customary for the officers of public institutions in Lismore to ignore their own interests, and while I do not profess to be doing so in municipal matters, I emphatically deny ever instructing anyone connected with the Council to procure their goods from me. They go where they choose.

A couple of other points I will allude to, only because strangers who may read these letters may be deceived by the half-truths in some of them. The bulk of the people know better. They are these:—I did not oppose the construction of works for a water supply for Lismore. On the contrary, I suggested and advocated it over five years ago. Not the existing scheme, however. Next, "The well-merited rebuke" from the Minister of Works. (That sentiment has been trotted out before.) Some 120 or so of the ratepayers sent their petition to the Minister for Works direct, instead of through the Council, because the Council had declined just previously to forward on a petition sent in to them upon the subject of the 3-chain road. This petition was rescued from the wastepaper-basket, and we did not want a second one similarly treated. There was no time for fooling, as tenders were being called for the work. The Minister requested the Council to ascertain the wishes of the ratepayers, as they "did not wish to force the water-works upon an unwilling people." We could have put up with the "well-merited rebuke" if the Minister's instructions had been acted upon, instead of the petition being returned with a document affirming that the statements contained in it were untrue, and advising its being ignored.

Sir,

Wollombi, 25 August, 1889.

I do myself the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 8th instant, conveying to me a complaint made by Mr. Simpson, a late Mayor of Lismore, wherein he makes twelve objections to a decision of the Lismore Bench, when he was fined £50; and judging from the manner in which some of the charges are aimed at me, it would appear as if I sat alone. Dr. Pratt and Mr. Gray sat with me, and we were unanimous.

This complaint has taken me by surprise, as nearly twelve months have elapsed since the case was tried, and nearly six had elapsed before he discovered he had any grievance.

At this distance of time it is not an easy matter for me to call to mind all the circumstances surrounding the case. I have no records or dates to refer to, but on a day about September, 1888, Mr. Simpson appeared before the Court to answer a charge of having supplied goods to the Council while holding the office of Mayor. The evidence went to show that Mr. Simpson's store had supplied the goods, and Mr. Simpson had sat as Mayor and passed the accounts. These accounts had been sent into the Council by others, not Mr. Simpson, and, if I remember rightly, the cheques were traced to Mr. Simpson's account. I think there were three bills before the Court, but two, being over six months, were not considered in giving the verdict.

Complaint (1.) I do not remember having said a single word against him publicly. I took the chair for a candidate, and after the election was over and Mr. Simpson was elected Mayor, I told him I had voted against him, but was prepared to give him all support as Mayor, and as far as I know we continued on the same friendly terms as previously.

(2.) I presided over a very large district at Richmond—six towns—three incorporated—and never heard any complaint against my decisions except from Lismore, and I do not hesitate to say that several of the Council's by-laws are *ultra vires*. I stated so from the Bench, and if I was wrong, why did not he take steps to set me right? I do not think he signed a single information while Mayor, and I feel sure his predecessor, Dr. Bernstein, lost more cases than he did from the same cause. I now ask that Mr. Simpson be called on to name his cases, and let the depositions and by-laws be perused by a competent person, and I feel sure it will be found I was not in error.

(3.) Mr. Simpson made an objection to me. I did not threaten to commit him. I doubt the power. I informed him that litigants could not pack the Bench to suit themselves. That my duty was a very sacred one. I was sworn to do my duty without fear or favour, and I would do it. My remarks were copied into the *Northern Star* that week. My remarks were very similar to those of the Chief Justice in reply to Mr. Salomons *in re* Winifred Butler, 22/8/89, a copy of which I attach. Mr. Simpson, as a Magistrate, should know that we are not sworn for each case like a juror; if he goes on the Bench unmindful of his oath, I do not.

I never kept the Lismore or any Court in my district waiting a minute except Coraki, and that only when the steamer was late.

The "Royal Hotel" was my place of call. I always dined there. He, as well as Mr. Barrie, has frequently been in my private parlour. Mr. Barrie's place of business joins the "Royal," and I have sometimes stood under the colonnade in conversation with Mr. Barrie. I was never at Mr. Barrie's private house, and was not more intimate with him than with any of my other brother-Magistrates. Mr. Barrie never alluded to Mr. Simpson's case in my presence. I am not conscious of having walked to the Court with Mr. Barrie, or met him in the Magistrates' room, but may have done so in company with others; but this is too frivolous for serious consideration.

Unless

Unless at a public dinner, I feel confident I did not any time meet Mr. Barrie at any other hotel, and there was no intimacy to be worthy of remark. We were friends, and that was all. I always got the credit of being a most impartial Magistrate; even Mr. Bagot, who perhaps persecuted me more than any other man there, was never satisfied unless I was on the Bench, and on one occasion wrote to the Ballina Bench stating that he would not appear to a summons unless I was on the Bench. Several of my cases were brought under the notice of Judge Dowling, who found no fault with me or my administration of the law.

Mr. Simpson had every opportunity to get Mr. Norrie, or any other lawyer. He asked for a postponement, and got several weeks. When the case came on for hearing, seeing he was undefended, I once or twice told him his line of cross-examination was really an admission, for which he thanked me, and the people in Court who had heard him object to me applauded my conduct; and if there was the slightest foundation for his charges, why did he not go for a prohibition? Surely this would have helped him.

I did shut out the evidence as to whether other aldermen had been guilty of the same act—it had nothing to do with the charge against him. Two wrongs cannot make a right.

I think he is in error as to the police demanding the fine. I do not think any distress warrant was issued. He asked me when he would be required to pay it, and I told him he would not be hurried.

He gave some evidence against me at the inquiry, and stated at the same time that he was only there in obedience to a summons to do so. My lawyer was not present.

In conclusion, and with great respect, I ask that the Hon. the Minister peruse the information and depositions in this case, for the purpose of ascertaining if it were possible for the Bench to regard their oath and not convict; and as the charge of malice against any Magistrate is a serious one, may I ask that the serjeant of police at each of the towns in that district be requested to state whether the public did not always consider me a most just Magistrate.

I omitted to observe, with regard to this objection, "that the seal was not on the papers," I presume it was the Mayor's duty to affix it, and the omission gives it the appearance of premeditation.

*George Edward Harrison* having been sworn, states:—I am a constable of Police stationed at Parramatta; about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, from information received from Mr. McMillan, I proceeded to Wentworthville, and about a quarter of a mile from Mr. McMillan's residence, on a bush track leading on to the Western Road, I found the body of the deceased; he was lying on his back near some bushes; his coat was off, lying on the ground near the body; his shirt-sleeves were rolled up above the wrist, and a walking cane was on the ground near the body, and in a piece of metal-plate under the handle the name of O. Sinclair was scratched; at the bottom of his right foot I found the revolver now produced; it is an English constabulary revolver, six-chambered; two chambers had been discharged, and the other four are still loaded; the chamber under the hammer had been recently discharged, the other not so recently; on examining the body I saw a bullet wound on the right side of the head, over the right ear, which appeared to have been recently done; the right arm was scarred by the black ants, of which there were a quantity on the body; there were also marks, caused by the ants, on other parts of the body; they are the marks seen on the body now; on the ground underneath where the wound in the head was there was fresh blood, but not much in quantity; the body was perfectly dead, stiff, and cold; on searching the clothing I found twopence in the right hand trousers pocket, two keys and a tweezers in the left trousers pocket; in the coat-tail pocket I found a pipe, a knife, and a box of matches; in the breast pocket of the coat I found a small Sands' diary and also a written statement, without a date, signed Ossian St. Clair; the diary contains two or three addresses, but no other entries of any importance; I also found two North Shore Ferry tickets and one tram ticket; I produce the whole of the articles mentioned; there were no signs of any struggle about the place; there is not much traffic in the place at the present time; there used to be some time ago; I have made inquiries at the addresses contained in the diary, but nothing was known of deceased, and he has not been identified as yet; I brought the body to the mortuary of this hospital in a cart belonging to a man named Weekes; deceased was about 5 feet 5 inches, light-brown bushy hair, very little light moustache; he was dressed in light fancy tweed vest and trousers, black walking coat, black hard felt hat, lace-up boots, considerably worn, pink and cream coloured necktie, white shirt, bone studs and solitaires with a monogram O.S.; I should take him to be about 30 years of age; he is not known to the Parramatta Police.

GEO. E. HARRISON.

The Coroner read the statement referred to by Constable Harrison.

*William McMillan* having been sworn, states:—I am a merchant and reside at Dunmore, Wentworthville; about a quarter to 3 o'clock on yesterday (Sunday) afternoon, I was taking my usual stroll in the grounds known as the Wentworthville Estate, and was returning by a track which has not been in use for the last couple of months; I came across the body on which this inquest is being held, lying just outside the track; at first I thought it was an ordinary case of death from exposure, but on seeing the revolver lying at feet of deceased I more closely examined the body; I then found that the head was lying in a pool of blood, and every appearance of a bullet wound just above the right ear; I returned to my house; I placed the gardener, Benjamin Jacob, in charge of the body, giving strict instructions that nothing should be moved until the Police were communicated with; I then drove into Parramatta and gave the necessary information to the police; I never saw deceased before; deceased was about one-eighth of a mile from the Western Road on this deserted track; there were no signs of any struggle where the body was lying.

W. McMILLAN.

*George Henry Phillips* having been sworn, states:—I am a legally qualified medical practitioner, and reside at Parramatta; I have examined the body of the deceased on which this inquest is being held; it is that of a man from 30 to 35 years of age, about 5 feet 5 inches in height, dark complexion, black hair, blue eyes, clean shaven cheeks, front teeth sound, body well nourished; externally I found a wound over the right ear penetrating into the skull; the arms, neck, and about the face had been partly eaten by ants; I found no other marks of violence; there were vaccination marks on the left arm; on removing the scalp I found a quantity of clotted blood, and the skull was fractured on both sides, some of the cracks being quite 3 inches in length; on opening the skull I found a penetrating wound nearly half-an-inch in diameter passing through the right parietal bone; in the left parietal bone there was a stellar fracture, the broken pieces being pushed outwards; small pieces of lead were attached to the fragments of bone; I found the bullet produced lying in the base of the skull; it is such as would have produced the injuries described, and had passed completely through the brain, and had caused injuries which would probably have produced instantaneous death; it appears to be a similar kind of bullet as would be fired from a pistol such as that produced; from the appearance of the wound, and the direction the bullet took, I am of opinion that the wound was self-inflicted; the hair round the wound was scorched as if from the discharge of the pistol close to deceased's head; the direction of the wound was across the head, and slightly upwards; deceased was a short man, and if the pistol had been fired by any other person the wound would probably have had a downward or straight direction.

#### EXHIBIT A.

WHAT is there in life?—Nothing; it is a blank. There is nothing in this world to make me happy now. Five years ago I was as happy as anyone; then I took to the sea and went to the Brazils, and whilst there I done a deed which has caused me a life of terror and misery ever since. That hellish curse of mankind, drink, was the cause of it all. Having a good pay, and being in a good position on board ship, with very little work and plenty of time to myself, I used to spend all my money on keeping up a great style of dress, and as I had learnt a good deal of the Portuguese language, I used to mix rather freely with the passengers on board. During one of our voyages from Monte Video to the port of Rio de Janeiro, I attracted the attention of a beautiful young lady passenger named Isadora de Alvinez. We soon formed an acquaintance, but she, being a first-class passenger, our meetings were always kept secret. Every night it was the duty of one of the stewards to keep watch in the saloon, and then be allowed to sleep all day. This is the duty I took, so that I should be able to talk with the young lady whom I madly loved. When the other passengers had retired to sleep we would sit on deck and talk love as much as my Portuguese would allow me to. This thing went on until we reached Santos, the next port to Rio de Janeiro, where the young lady went ashore. I kept up a correspondence with her, and in several of her letters she hinted about marriage; but I only regarded them as jokes. When I had made the next trip, and had once more arrived in Santos, I got an invitation to go up to the house of her brother, Senor Leale De Alvinez, with whom Isadora was staying. She looked more beautiful than ever. In the evening we both went out for a walk. I told her of my love, proposed, and was accepted; but her brother would not hear of such a thing as a marriage between us, in consequence of which my betrothed left her brother's house and went to a hotel, whilst I proceeded in my ship to Rio de Janeiro, where I left.



left. I told everyone I was going to England, and as they had no suspicions of me, they believed me; but instead of going to England, I took the first steamer for Santos. On my arrival there I went to the hotel where Isadora was staying and got married to her. Along with my bride I received the sum of £5,000, her father having died and left £16,000 between her and her brother. After our marriage we went to an island some distance from Santos, called San Sebastian. Here my wife, being well known, bought a good-sized house, a large coffee plantation, and a number of slaves. We had a manager and two overseers. They done all the working of the plantation. I began to think I was in Fairyland, but alas, for me, the spell was broken. About three months after our marriage my wife's brother condescended to pay us a visit. When he saw how comfortably we were situated he became very friendly to me, and together we used to drink a lot. One day, after having drank more wine than we could stand, he went into the house and insulted my wife. I called him outside, and as he made to draw his knife on me, I drew my revolver and shot him. As he fell I rushed into the house, kissed my wife, who was crying like to break her heart. I snatched her photo. off the table, and then I ran to the wharf, got a boat to the mainland, and then I changed my name, and went to Rio de Janeiro, where I hid myself, as I wanted to hear what would be done before I left for England. Then I saw in the papers a paragraph to this effect: "A few days ago, whilst Senors De Alvinez and Santa Clara were amusing themselves, the latter's revolver accidentally went off, the bullet lodging in the thigh of Senor De Alvinez. It is not believed to be a fatal wound. Senor Santa Clara, thinking he had killed his brother-in-law, fled, and it is feared that he must have committed suicide, as no trace of him can be found. The affair is causing great excitement in the Island of San Sebastian."

Later.—Senor Leale De Alvinez is dead. Mortification set in. He was past medical aid. Later.—We regret to announce the death of Senora Santa Clara, who died this morning. It is believed she died of grief, through her brother's death and the strange disappearance of her husband. My brain reels as I write this. I went on board an English ship, and took a passage to Liverpool, via New York. My God, far better had I drowned myself at once. I have never had a night's rest since; only in the mornings have I been able, for a few hours. As soon as I reached home I was laid up with the terrible excitement. I told my people it was fever and ague. Thinking to drive it out of my mind, I took to the sea again, and sailed almost all over the world. It was no good. Then I came ashore in Australia. Since then I have squandered all my money, and as this thing is killing me, I have lost all heart to work, so that it is far better for me to put an end to myself at once. The loss of my wife makes me do it. When I think of her it makes me mad. If I lived any longer I should do some desperate act. All this will explain to my friends and relations the reason of my strange ways at times. May God forgive me for what I am going to do. Behind the photo. of my wife, in the large frame, will be found a lock of hair. Place it with my body. All my things my relations can claim, with the exception of my oil portrait and my wife's photo. and frame (large), which will go to Miss Bella Stephens, and my banjo and music to Mr. Rhodes, in payment of board. My last wish is, may God bless my father, sisters, and brothers, and may they never know how I met my death. Justice will be served—a life for a life. Beware of drink, even in small quantities. It has ruined me.

Enclosed I submit a petition which I have received from my constituents in the Corowa district, asking that a portion, if not the whole, of the sentence passed upon one Clayton at the Albury Court be remitted. I have known Clayton personally for a number of years, and was never more surprised in my life than when I heard of the sentence he had received. He was always considered a somewhat peculiar man, but not one that would deliberately attempt the life of another, excepting in self defence. His character, as far as I have ever known, has always been of the best, and I must say it seems to me that he laboured under very great disadvantage in not having counsel to defend him when the case was tried. The names, which number nearly 400, to the petition, contain those of all sections of the community in which Clayton has resided for so many years, and the feeling is very widespread amongst all those who know him that he has got into this trouble more through error of judgment than wilfully and deliberately intending to do injury. I do not desire to cast any reflection whatever upon the Judge who awarded the sentence (and at this moment I do not know which Judge it was), because, even if I had not known the man and his character so well, I think it more than likely I should have been led away by his peculiar manner and the many peculiar characteristics (which no doubt showed themselves in Court) to think that he was, perhaps, a dangerous character; but such an impression would be entirely erroneous, and it is not my desire to do more than seek fair justice for this unfortunate man that I now write. I trust you may see your way clear to take such steps as will verify, or otherwise, the opinion expressed in the petition and in this letter, and, if verified, I hope you will take steps to give effect to the prayer of the petition.

I have for some time past, unfortunately, been completely prostrated through illness, or should have personally presented this petition, but it is a matter that should not be delayed one hour, and I will call upon you in reference to it as soon as I can leave my room.

To the Honorable the Minister of Justice, Sydney,—

The humble Petition of the undersigned residents in Corowa and the surrounding District,—

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH :—

1. Your Petitioners desire to bring under your notice the case of one Edward Clayton, the elder, a resident of this town, who, at the Circuit Court at Albury on the 10th instant, was sentenced to three years penal servitude upon a charge of shooting at Benjamin Brame, with intent to murder.

2. Your Petitioners desire at the outset to assure you that they have no sympathy with indiscriminate and unreasonable attempts by petition or otherwise to interfere with the ordinary course of Justice; but they justify the following Petition by the peculiar circumstances that it sets out, and they particularly disclaim any intention or desire to find fault with the conduct of the trial by anyone engaged in it.

3. Edward Clayton, the elder, has been a resident in this town and district for twenty-five years. Many of your petitioners have known him for the whole of that period, and your Petitioners can all attest that during the time that they have known him, he has been a reputable and respectable person, whose mode of conduct and life make it hard for them to believe that he was guilty of the crime with which he was charged.

4. His financial circumstances at the time made it impossible for him to obtain legal assistance in the preparation and conduct of his defence. Your Petitioners believe that had he had such assistance, and had the evidence for the defence been properly marshalled and adduced, the result of his trial would have been an acquittal.

5. At the trial, owing to the want of legal assistance, the prisoner pleaded "justification," and "not guilty," meaning and intending by the plea of justification (as he informed your Petitioner, Edward Reginald Nicholson, solicitor, Corowa, who was present at the trial) that he was justified in having firearms in his possession, but not intending to admit the act of shooting. The Jury, however, in the absence of explanation, probably, as was natural, presumed that the plea of justification was intended to go to the charge before the Court, and thus admitted the act.

6. The prisoner, to the knowledge of your Petitioners, has been for some time living in a cottage on the bank of the Murray River near the Corowa and Wahgunyah Bridge, a spot where tramps and doubtful characters are constantly camped, and the prisoner would naturally and reasonably feel that he might at any time be called upon to defend his property, or even his person. He is an old man, not very strong, and it is within the knowledge of many of your Petitioners, and can be evidenced by the Corowa police, that about \_\_\_\_\_, 1889, he was set upon at this very place and brutally maltreated. Had this been properly explained to the Jury and the Judge on behalf of the prisoner, the act of his buying the revolver would have been naturally accounted for, and the presumption of deliberate preparation to shoot at any particular person rebutted.

7. It is the firm opinion of your Petitioners that the prisoner, conscious of his innocence of any attempt to murder, viewed too lightly the charge, and so did not take the necessary steps to procure the evidence that might have exonerated him.

8. The prisoner is about sixty years of age, and, as has been previously stated, has hitherto borne a good character. He has a family residing at Corowa who are greatly esteemed and respected. It is feared by your Petitioners that if he has to undergo the punishment imposed by the Court, his health will be entirely shattered, or at least greatly impaired.

Your Petitioners, therefore, humbly pray that, in the exercise of a merciful discretion consistent with the due administration of Justice, you may take this, their Petition, into your favourable consideration, and take such steps as you can and may to procure the remission of the whole or such part of the sentence in this case as may be thought to be just and right.

Mr. Lyne to be informed that I regret I cannot recommend any remission of the sentence passed upon this prisoner. That it was proved at the trial that prisoner had only bought the revolver a few hours before he fired at the prosecutor, and that it was then fully loaded for him by the shopman from whom he bought it. The punishment prescribed by the "Criminal Law Amendment Act of 1883" for the offence for which Clayton was convicted is imprisonment for life or not less than seven years. The Judge, however, availing himself of the Amending Act (the Jury having recommended prisoner to mercy), reduced the term of imprisonment to three years.—A.J.G., 3/7/90. **PARTICULARS of conviction and prison history of Edward Clayton, a prisoner in Albury Gaol, petitioning for remission of sentence.**

Referring to your letter of the 18th ultimo, enclosing a petition from certain residents of Corowa, praying for a remission of the sentence passed on the prisoner named in the margin, I have the honor to inform you that the Minister of Justice has written a minute on the papers, of which the following is a copy, viz. :—

Edward Clayton,  
Albury Gaol

"Mr. Lyne to be informed that I regret I cannot recommend any remission of the sentence passed upon this prisoner. That it was proved at the trial that prisoner had only bought the revolver a few hours before he fired at the prosecutor, and that it was then fully loaded for him by the shopman from whom he bought it. The punishment prescribed by the "Criminal Law Amendment Act of 1883" for the offence for which Clayton was convicted is imprisonment for life, or not less than seven years. The Judge, however, availing himself of the Amending Act (the jury having recommended prisoner to mercy), reduced the term of imprisonment to three years."

*Benjamin Brame*, on oath, states: I am a cook, residing in Corowa; I know the accused now before the Court; I remember the day before yesterday, the 5th instant; I was standing at my own door of a house situated on the bank of the Murray River, near the bridge; accused was standing at his door, and beckoned to me; I sent my wife over to see what he wanted; she returned, and told me something, and I went to him and asked him what he required; he said, "You owe me 15s., and 5s. for a week's advance"; I am a tenant of his; I said, "I don't owe it to you"; he put the key in the door and locked it, and then put his right hand into his shirt and said, "I must have key or money"; he took a revolver out of his shirt, and pointing it at me, fired one shot, and I heard something whistle by my ear—the right ear; I then tried to take the revolver away from him, and in struggling to obtain it it again went off, and I felt the wind of the shot go past my hand and thigh; my wife was standing close to me at the time; I said to her, "Take this revolver, and take it to the police, for he (the accused) may do some damage if he gets it again"; she then went away with the revolver; I was very excited, and sat down on the ground; nothing further took place between myself and accused after my wife went away; I then went to Mr. Freyer; I saw the barman and asked him for the revolver, which he refused to give me; I then went up to the police station, but could not see any of the police; I returned a second time and saw no one, but on going a third time I saw Sergeant Bedingfeld and reported the matter to him, and accompanied him to Mr. Freyer's "Terminus Hotel" in Corowa, where I pointed out the revolver to him, and saw him take possession of it; my wife accompanied me to the police station.

*By Prisoner*: You beckoned to me from your door; I did not go to you myself at first; my wife met you outside your door; when I met you it was outside your door; the door you locked was the one facing the river; I will swear that what I have said did not happen in the large room in your house; I was not in your house, and did not throw you down in the house; when I wrenched the revolver from you you were outside the house; I did not strike the door in your face, or threaten that I would hang for you; I was not in your house that day.

*Emma Brame*, on oath, states: I am the wife of the last witness, Benjamin Brame; I know the accused; I remember Wednesday, the 5th instant; my husband and I were standing at the door of our house near the Murray River; accused was standing at his own door, about 20 or 30 yards from us, and I saw him beckon to us; I went over to him, and he said, "I don't want you, but I want your husband"; I returned and told my husband, and we both went over to accused; he said to my husband, "I want 15s. and 5s. in advance, and I must have the money or the key"; my husband said, "I don't owe it to you"; accused then took a revolver out of his shirt and said, "Take that," and fired a shot; my husband then tried to take the revolver away, and while they were struggling another shot went off; my husband then gave me the revolver, and told me to take it to the police; I went to the house to get my hat, and when I was coming out of the house I met my husband at the door; we both went away from the house, but my husband took bad and sat down under the bridge, and I took the revolver up to the "Terminus Hotel," and the barman there took it away from me; I then went up to the police station, but could not see any of the police; I returned to my husband and accompanied him back to the police station, but finding no one there we went away and returned a third time, and saw the sergeant, and reported what had occurred, and went with him to the "Terminus Hotel."

*By Prisoner*: The struggle took place outside your door, on the side facing the river; I am quite certain it was not in the big room inside your house; I am quite certain I was not in your house at any time that day; the paper which I am now shown I gave to you when you were standing at your own door; I gave it to you earlier in the day than when the occurrence I have stated took place; I am not in the habit of standing at your door; when I first went to live in the cottage I used to tidy up your kitchen; I was not in your house on Sunday; did not see you in bed, or ask you what was the matter with you; did not take a handkerchief from your hat containing money; I cannot say where the shots from the revolver went to; I did not see any shots fired but the two I have stated in my evidence as having been fired by you; if my husband has said you locked the door of your house before you fired the revolver he has stated the truth; to my knowledge no notice to quit the house we are living in has ever been given to us by you; I did not come to you on Wednesday and abuse you for giving my husband notice to quit; it is not true that you have complained to me about the bad character of the house; we were not singing on Sunday night; I don't owe you any rent, if the 13s. owing for washing is taken off.

*By Prisoner*: The two reports appeared to be about a minute and a half between them; about a week or ten days since I remember hearing loud words and screaming from some one in the room occupied by Brame and his wife; heard singing in the same room on Sunday night about 11 p.m., and fancied it was the voices of Brame and his wife.

*By Prisoner*: You did not appear to be labouring under any excitement at the time I sold you the revolver.

*James Brown*, on oath, states: Am a barman at the "Terminus Hotel," Corowa; remember the 5th instant; saw Mrs. Brame on that day, between 3 and 4 p.m., coming across the bridge near the "Terminus Hotel," and leading to Saugar-street; she came to the "Terminus Hotel," and went into the parlour, and presented a revolver at me, and asked me how I would like a little of this; I said I would not care much for that sort of thing, and, walking over to her, I asked her to give me the revolver; she refused to do so, and I took it from her; she was under the influence of spirits at the time; I heard a report as from a revolver, apparently from under the bridge, between 3 and 4 p.m.; this was prior to my taking the revolver away from Mrs. Brame; I saw Brame under the bridge, and he was staggering about as if under the influence of drink; the bridge I refer to is about 50 yards from the hotel verandah; have known Brame and his wife about two months; I know nothing against the character of Mr. Brame and his wife, with the exception that they are both addicted to drink; I have known them about two months and know nothing about how they get a living; I have no knowledge of Mrs. Brame having pointed a revolver at her husband any further than from hearing the report of the revolver.

*By Police*: I cannot swear that Brame was drunk when I saw him staggering about under the bridge, but was under the impression that he was; when I took the revolver away from Mrs. Brame she said it belonged to Mr. Clayton; she never told me what she was going to do with the revolver; from the time I heard the report of a revolver until I took the revolver away from Mrs. Brame might have been about fifteen minutes interval.

## Statement of the Accused.

EDWARD Clayton stands charged before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the Colony aforesaid, this 7th day of February, in the year of Our Lord 1890, for that he, the said Edward Clayton, on the 5th day of February instant, at Corowa, in the said Colony, did shoot at one Benjamin Brame, with intent to murder him, and the examinations of all the witnesses on the part of the prosecution having been completed, and the depositions taken against the accused having been caused to be read to him by me, the said Justice, (by or) before whom such examination has been so completed; and I, the said Justice, having also stated to the accused and given him clearly to understand that he has nothing to hope from any promise of favour, and nothing to fear from any threat which may have been holden out to him to induce him to make any admission or confession of his guilt, but that whatever he shall say may be given in evidence against him upon his trial, notwithstanding such promise or threat; and the said charge being read to the said Edward Clayton, and the witnesses for the prosecution being severally examined in his presence, the said Edward Clayton is now addressed by me as follows:—"Having heard the evidence, do you wish to say anything in answer to the charge? You are not obliged to say anything unless you desire to do so; but whatever you say will be taken down in writing, and may be given in evidence against you upon your trial." Whereupon the said Edward Clayton saith as follows:—

For certain reasons I desired to get rid of Brame and his wife from my premises; on Tuesday, the 4th instant, I called Brame into my house, and desired him to make fresh arrangements for a domicile, and to return to me all the furniture he had belonging to me; next morning his wife came into my room and asked me why I should speak to her husband when she was the person who had taken the house from me; she got very excited; Brame followed her in, and became very excited also, threatening that he would hang for me, wait for me, and do for me; he struck the inside door with his closed fist on several occasions, and appeared to be half frenzied; this was about 10 a.m. on the 5th instant; being in an isolated condition I did not consider my life safe, and came into Corowa and purchased a revolver, which I had loaded, and took it home with me; I was sitting at my office table, after writing a business letter, when Mrs. Brame came in and handed me the paper, which has been produced at the trial, and marked A, which she had previously compounded for by having a week's rent taken off; I refused to take the paper, and while talking to her, Brame came into the room in a very excited state, shook his fist in my face, and repeated the threats he had formerly used; I told him I was not going to be knocked about, and drew a revolver from my shirt, upon which he closed and grappled with me, his wife assisting him; I was thrown on the floor, and the revolver taken from me by Brame, who gave it to his wife; immediately afterwards I heard a shot fired, as from a revolver, and immediately after that Mr. Brame came running up towards me in a very excited manner, and said, "Why, you bloody dog, it was loaded; if there had been another shot in it I would have shot you, or 'I would shoot you.'"

The prisoner when arrested gave the name of Henry Williams, and stated he came from Goondiwindi, *via* Kunopia. The sergeant had the prisoner remanded, and wired to Sergeant Johnson, Goondiwindi,

The constable arrived at 4.30 p.m. on the 30th instant, and after looking at the prisoner swore he was not identical, but answered the description of the escaped prisoner, including the burn on his nose. The prisoner was at once brought up and discharged.

At 6 a.m. on the 31st instant the constable stated that he had made a mistake, and was sure he was the escaped prisoner. The constable also informed the Police Magistrate he had made a mistake in not identifying the man, and was quite sure he was the escaped prisoner.

The sergeant declined to rearrest the man, or have anything further to do with the case, but informed the Queensland constable he would not prevent him from rearresting the man on his own responsibility.

The constable appeared to be a man of experience, but after he first swore in the Court that the prisoner was not identical, and then to say he was, the sergeant had no confidence in him.

Whilst passing through this town on Monday last I was arrested on suspicion of being identical with a man who escaped from the lock-up at Goondiwindi; I was brought before the magistrate and remanded for eight days without being allowed to speak; and yesterday the magistrate informed me that if the witness did not appear he would further remand me for another eight days. I wish you to see the Minister of Justice, and ask him to advise the magistrate by wire to have the witness brought immediately, as the place is only between 80 and 90 miles of this town. Trusting you will give this prompt attention, as my wife will be uneasy at not hearing from me, as I do not deem it advisable to write to her from here.

Mr. Henry Williams to The Minister of Justice.

Dear Sir,

Balmain, 21 June, 1889.

Whilst travelling through Moree on May 27th, I was met by a man, who asked me if I wanted a job. I said, "Yes." He asked which way I had come. I said, "From Warwick, through Goondiwindi." He asked when I came through Goondiwindi. I told him on the previous Saturday week. He then asked my name, and I said, "You are pretty inquisitive; have you a job for me." He said, "I am a policeman." I told my name was Henry Williams. He asked if anyone in Goondiwindi knew. I said, "No; the postmaster is the only man that knows my name." I asked him to forward my letters to Mungindi, and he made an entry in a book to that effect. I told, in answer to questions, that I had called at the two blacksmiths' shops and asked for work, and had done a job to a lamp for one named Ryan, that I had camped in a hut with a man named Skelton, and had left Goondiwindi at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and came to Bobra Station, in New South Wales, and stayed with the only two men employed on the station that night, 12 miles from Goondiwindi. He then said he arrested me on suspicion of being identical with John Fitzmaurice, who escaped from Goondiwindi lock-up. I was taken to the Court, and remanded for eight days. I protested against the time being so long, and the magistrate remarked that owing to the flooded state of the country it would probably be longer. I then suggested that he would remand me to Goondiwindi, as it would save time, and be more satisfactory, but the Bench told me he wanted no dictation from me. I was then taken to the gaol, and as soon as I got inside I was caught of roughly by the warder, and told I was not in a lock-up, but in Her Majesty's gaol. When being annoyed, I used language not polite, and was deemed guilty of insubordination, and got twenty-four hours bread and water, my blankets being taken, and I was not even allowed to wash myself. On the 30th, at about half-past 4 o'clock, the constable came from Goondiwindi, and swore I was not the man, and I was discharged. On 1st June, at 12 o'clock, I was rearrested. On asking what for, the Queensland constable said, "On suspicion of escaping from Goondiwindi lock-up." I said, "I have already been tried for that." He then read a warrant, charging John Fitzmaurice with stealing a pair of boots, and escaping from Goondiwindi lock-up, and said he arrested me on suspicion of being Fitzmaurice. He then took me to Millie lock-up. On the 2nd I asked the policeman Sewell to serve some witness I wanted with summonses to attend the Court, and he said he was not going to kill horses for me. On the 3rd I was brought John Eckford, J.P., and asked to be allowed to call witnesses to prove I was not in Queensland at the time this man was apprehended, but he said he was not there to try me, only to grant a remand. I demanded to get justice, but he remanded me. I told him I was a sufferer from the piles, and it probably cause my death, but he took no heed, and remanded me at about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and I was forced to ride 30 miles, which took till 2 o'clock in the morning, with rusty handcuffs on me. On the following day we had to cross a flooded river in a boat, and the policeman refused to unhandcuff me till some of the bystanders interfered. That night we camped in a hut, among a lot of travellers, and my legs were fastened together, one ring being put through another, thus  $\odot$ , and the twist cutting into my legs, so that I could not sleep. On the next day I was ill with the piles, and vomiting. We got to an hotel at half past 11 in the forenoon, and they kept me there all day, although at first I begged, and afterwards demanded, to be taken on. I told them I would report them, when M'Kenna said he would chain me to a tree if I did not hold my tongue. The leg-irons were put on the same as the night before, and my arms were in a dreadful state with the handcuffs. The next day I had to ride 43 miles, it raining all the

the time, and got to Goondiwindi at about half-past 7 o'clock in the evening, and had to grope in a dark cell for blankets as best I could. I asked for something to eat, and was banded in some tea in a pint-pot, and a bit of bread and meat in my hand, although I heard the senior-constable tell his wife I was the wrong man. I never saw anyone till the next morning, at about 10 o'clock, when a Chinaman brought in some tea and bread and meat in such condition that I, being ill, could not look at. I was then brought into the Court, not being allowed to comb my hair, although I had a comb of my own. The same constable, Christopher M'Kenna, who in Moree swore I was not the man, went into the witness-box and swore I was the man. The other three witnesses swore I was not the man. The senior-constable then asked for a remand for three days, saying he was unable to procure his principal witness. On the following day I was brought into the Court, and the senior-constable said his principal witness had left the district, and he did not wish to go on with the case. I was then discharged. I then asked for some assistance to get back to where I was taken from, as I was ill, and told the magistrate so. He said he could do nothing for me; it was a case of mistaken identity. I afterwards went to get a warrant for perjury against M'Kenna, and then magistrate told me I would have to Warwick, some 130 miles, and swear an information through a solicitor. I then started, and got laid up on the Tuesday, and have been ill ever since. On last Saturday I called on Mr. Henry, the Police Magistrate at Moree, and he expressed his opinion that the Queensland authorities have been guilty of culpable negligence, as he has had the opportunity of seeing the man that got away, and the description sent does not tally with the man, and he requested me to refer the authorities to him. I have suffered both in point of character, in bodily health, and mentally, as has also my wife, in consequence of this occurrence, and I feel I am not asking half what would recompense me when I ask for the sum of five hundred pounds (£500) from whoever is to blame in this matter. As a reference of my character, I refer you Thomas Colls, Esq., M.P. for Yass Plains, who has known me all my life, and for whom I have worked. Trusting you will cause as full an investigation into this as possible.

The policeman from that colony said at first he was not the man, but after his discharge said he was mistaken, he was the right man, and he had him remanded back to Queensland, and escorted him there. I sent the reports I received to the Commissioner of Police, Queensland, but have no reply. It would appear that Williams' claim should be made in Queensland, but I will afford further information, if desired, when I get the papers back to refer to, as I write this, to save time, from recollection. I have the honor to direct your attention to the case of Henry Williams, the papers in connection with which are now in your Department. The facts are briefly these:—Williams, who had resided in Balmain for several years, and is a blacksmith by trade, owing to slackness of trade, left Sydney early in the present year, seeking work in Queensland and the northern part of this Colony. In the course of his travels he arrived at Moree, where he was arrested on the charge of being identical with a prisoner who had escaped from the lock-up at *Goondiwindi, Queensland*. After being imprisoned several days he was discharged, the constable from Queensland swearing that he was not the man wanted. The following day Williams was continuing his journey when he was rearrested by the Queensland constable on the same charge. He was taken to *Goondiwindi, Queensland*, and en route was treated in a most harsh manner, handcuffed and leg-ironed, and made to ride on horseback while suffering from piles. He was brought up before the Bench at *Goondiwindi* and again discharged, as he was in no way like the man that was wanted.

Williams, after great suffering (aggravated by the treatment he had received at the hands of the Queensland police), reached home, and was laid up for some time. He now seeks damages at the hands of the Queensland Government for wrongful arrest by their officer on *New South Wales* territory.

The papers have been sent on to you from the Justice Department, and I await with confidence your action in this matter, feeling sure you will not allow a resident of this Colony to suffer an injustice, however humble the individual may be.

I am in receipt of yours of the 11th instant, enclosing an extract from letter of the Colonial Secretary, Queensland, referring to the case of Henry Williams.

In reply, I have to state that I am informed that the supposed resemblance between Williams and the prisoner does not exist, which is proved by the fact that as soon as the Queensland constable went into the witness-box at Moree he swore that Williams *was not the man wanted*. And subsequently (after Williams' illegal rearrest on New South Wales territory by a Queensland constable), on being brought before the Goondiwindi (Queensland) Bench, he was at once discharged, as he was in no way like the man who had escaped from the lock-up, he being very dark, while Williams is very fair.

I have, therefore, to request that the whole of the papers may be sent on to the Police Magistrate, at Moree, for a report on the case, but especially as to the supposed likeness between the prisoner that was wanted and Williams.

I would also point out that since Williams' return to Sydney he has been suffering from the effects of the brutal treatment he received at the hands of the Queensland police when taken from Moree to Goondiwindi.

In conclusion, I would say that if this poor man is to get no compensation for the pain and disgrace he has suffered, then justice in New South Wales must not only be blind, but stone dead.

In compliance with the request contained in your B.C., 90-7,165, of the 20th instant, and previous papers, *re* the arrest of one Henry Williams, by virtue of a warrant issued in Queensland, I have the honor to state, for the information of the Honorable the Minister of Justice, that it was an unfortunate fact for Williams that he so resembled the man wanted, both as to complexion, build, occupation, even to a mark on his nose, and the time that prisoner escaped gaol agrees with the date on which Williams left Goondiwindi. When the constable from Queensland first saw prisoner he said he was not the man, but like him, on which evidence I discharged him. Within an hour's time, however, the constable considered he had made a mistake, and wished the man to be rearrested, but as the Moree police rightly declined to do so, he was once more arrested by the Queensland man. I may say that I never had to deal with a more insolent fellow before whilst he was in the Moree lock-up, awaiting the arrival of the witnesses, his conduct being so bad that I had to give him solitary confinement and bread and water to eat. Of course his bad conduct did not tend to make me sorry for him, or consider that he was not guilty, which, after all, the unfortunate fellow's trouble, he proved to be.

Lord Howe Island, 8 January, 1890.

Kindly permit me to bring under your notice a matter which occurred here to-day.

Mr. Edmund Jeune had occasion to appear before the Visiting Magistrate, Mr. Icelly, to settle a dispute about some crops. Mr. Icelly, in giving a decision against Mr. Jeune, accused him of being a “mean contemptible man,” and of having seduced a young girl, he being already married.

In answer to those very grave charges, Sir, I beg to say that I am the young girl in question. I am 34 years of age, and Mr. Jeune and I have lived together for four years. We have two little children, and no man could be a kinder husband or better father than he is. We shall be married as soon as we legally can. We hope next month.

Mr. Icelly’s accusation was not only altogether false but also very cruel. We are on this little island quite penniless, and have to depend a good deal on the kindness of the people. Mr. Jeune is suffering from heart disease, as two leading doctors in Sydney can certify. What our position would be if Mr. Icelly succeeded in diverting the favour of this little community from us, I tremble to think. Apologising for troubling you.

Lord Howe Island, 8 January, 1890.

I have the honor to inform you that I came to Lord Island on 17th March, 1889, for the benefit of my health. After staying a short time I derived great benefit from the climate and change, and I determined to become a settler on the island. I entered into an agreement with one Perry Johnson, who had gardens. I was to receive a third of all remunerative productions from the said gardens, I to assist to work and cultivate the same. After the crops were in the ground, and I had laid the foundation of a house, the said Perry Johnson, without any fault of mine, or any breach of the said agreement, informed me he wished to dissolve partnership. I agreed, on conditions that I was to receive one-third of crops, as per agreement. Portions of such produce I did receive, except a share of forty bunches of bananas. When I applied for my shares of the said bananas he repudiated my claim, and I brought the matter before the Visiting Magistrate (Mr. Icelly), who decided the case against me, and who, in the presence of Mr. Robins and Stevens, two special constables, and my former partner, made use of the terms, “You are a mean, contemptible man, you have taken P. Johnson in;” and when I attempted to defend myself said, “Put him out! put him out!” I send you a copy of my stamped agreement, which was drawn out by Captain T. G. Nicholls, who is a particular friend of Mr. Icelly’s and the said Perry Johnson, and was also witnessed by him. I beg most respectfully to ask whether a visiting magistrate has a right to use insulting language, to wit, “You are a mean contemptible man, and seduced a woman above yourself,” which I aver is totally untrue and foreign to the case brought before Mr. Icelly. These remarks were said by Mr. Icelly to me in the presence of two special constables and Perry Johnson. I hope you will give the matter your serious consideration, and advise me at your earliest convenience. I would add that the respectable portion of the inhabitants who are acquainted with my case sympathise with me.

Should the partnership be dissolved, the said house to become the property of Perry and Sarah Johnson, and the said Edmund Jeune to give up peaceable possession of the said house. Edmund Jeune to hold no share in the cattle, nor will the said Edmund Jeune hold any right to put any cattle inside Perry and Sarah Johnson's fence.

### The Visiting Magistrate, Lord Howe Island, to The Principal Under Secretary.

Sydney, 17 January, 1890.

THE writers of these letters are the people referred to by me in my report of the 20th May last. Upon my first interview with them they both told me all sorts of falsehoods, the woman, who is not only clever and accomplished, writing to me under a false name. Failing, however, in the object of the original deception by which the lady hoped to get the appointment of school-teacher, they induced Perry Johnson, an aged but hard-working black man, who has been upon the island for many years, and has nice gardens, to take them into partnership, Jeune putting nothing into the partnership, but agreeing to build a house, which house was to become the property of Johnson upon the dissolution of the partnership; before however the house was built the partnership came to an end,—lasting, indeed, only a little over three months.

Some weeks after the dissolution Perry Johnson shipped some forty bunches of bananas, upon which Jeune put in his claim for one third of the sum they realised. Johnson refused to give it to him, and the case coming before me, I decided that "inasmuch as Jeune had not either helped to plant the bananas or to pick them, that he was not entitled to any portion of them, and that although I thought the document of agreement then before me had no legal standing—that, equitably, inasmuch as it had induced him (Jeune) to do certain work that he (Jeune) was entitled to one-third of all such crops as he (Jeune) had helped to put in, but to none other."

It was upon Jeune becoming impertinent that I made use of the expression that "it was mean and contemptible of him to try and take advantage of the old man—that it was only in keeping with my experience of him; that he had commenced by telling me lies by the number; that he had not only told lies himself, but had induced a respectable woman whom he had seduced to write me lies also, until I did not know what to believe and what not to."

Extract of Report of Visiting Magistrate, Lord Howe Island, dated 20th May, 1889.

Then, again, in the *Echo* of the 26th March last, appears this paragraph:—

"JEUNE v. JEUNE.—Mr. Ralston appeared for the petitioner (the wife), and moved to dispense with further service on the respondent, who had been served personally with the citation, but had not appeared. An affidavit was read stating that respondent, who had been a hotelkeeper in Sydney, had left the Colony and gone to Lord Howe Island. Further service was dispensed with, and the issues were settled as—marriage on the 10th December, 1882, and adultery between 1885 and 1889. The hearing was set down for the 4th June, without a jury."

Upon my arrival, sure enough I found a Mr. and Mrs. Jeune, who had shortly before been brought down to the Island in a little schooner called the "Index," by a Mr. Langley, a gentleman who has had some connection with the Island for some few years past.

Of my own observation I should have had nothing to say against either Mr. Jeune, or the lady who is with him, *who calls herself Mrs. Jeune*, but the islanders, upon discovering the above paragraph, quickly drew my attention to it, and are specially indignant at the idea of the lady offering herself as "school-misses." Having

Having brought these two instances of recent immigration to the Island specially under your notice, giving you at the same time a brief outline of my reason, &c. I shall be glad to have from you such direction as will convey to me the view you take of the matter, as also the general policy in the case of new arrivals upon the Island that you would wish me to pursue.

You must have observed since your arrival how very desirable it is that the position of teacher, vacant since the resignation of Mr. Stevens, should be filled, and as it is probably your intention to mention the matter to the authorities in Sydney, I venture to call your attention to the fact that I have been engaged in tuition for several years, and that as I reside on the island it may be found advisable for many reasons to comply with my request for the appointment. In the first place, a female teacher is asked for by all the inhabitants who have an interest in the matter, and I fancy few women would care to come here where they would be entirely cut off from intercourse with their friends except at irregular intervals; and then the fact of my teaching needlework would decrease the expense. The last master's wife had £20 extra for this. It is true I do not hold a certificate, but then my being appointed without a certificate would not be without precedent, as there has been already one or two teachers on the island appointed by Captain Armstrong, neither of which were certificated.

Should the authorities consider my application I can refer them to the wife of Dr. Brady, Lyons' Terrace, and [also to Mr. Percy Johnson, of Annandale, in whose family I have taught; both, I am sure, would speak well of me. All the inhabitants, as you are aware, would be pleased at my appointment, and I would conscientiously try to do them justice.

### Certain Residents of Lord Howe Island to The Colonial Secretary.

To the Hon. Sir Henry Parkes, G.C.M.G., Premier of New South Wales, &c.

Sir,

Lord Howe Island, 18 March, 1890.

We the undersigned have heard with regret that an attempt has been made by a resident of this place to cast injurious reflections upon the conduct of our Visiting Magistrate, T. R. Icelly, Esq.

In justice to that gentleman and to ourselves as law-abiding colonists we desire to state that during all his visits here, Mr. Icelly has conducted himself as a gentleman impressed with a due sense of his position and the dignity and impartial characteristics of the magisterial office. Undoubtedly we have amongst us those who are antagonistic to the visitations of recognised authority, or the presence of controlling power; but we feel assured that unless the Government of New South Wales was in some way represented here the doctrine of "Might is right" would be exemplified to the injury of the more peaceable portion of the settlers;—indeed as a matter of fact we know that some of those who are opposed to magisterial visits or Government control have attempted to obtain land held by others, and public land without the authority of the Government representative.

We feel much pleasure in assuring you that so far as has come under our knowledge and observation, Mr. Icelly has discharged his duties with credit to himself and the Government, and that he possesses the confidence of the majority of the residents.

We would also, Sir, respectfully protest against any person or persons assuming the right to represent the opinions of this community unless authorised to do so at a public meeting of the settlers. It might also be advisable that, as far as possible, all meetings for the discussion of matters affecting the general welfare should be presided over by the official representing the central Government.

## Mr. W. E. Langley to The Colonial Secretary.

Sir,

Merchants' Exchange, Sydney, 18 July, 1890.

I regret to feel it my duty to call your attention to the administration of justice at Lord Howe Island. Never before was the place in such a disturbed state as when I left it, and I feel sure that unless some steps are taken by you matters will assume a more unpleasant aspect.

On Mr. Icely's first visit he found on the island a number of children named Douglas, whose mother and step-father had returned to Sydney. Numerous complaints were made about them, and Mr. Icely officially reported on the matter to the Premier. The children were afterwards removed, and about four months ago the whole family returned. Mrs. Harland at once began to cause disturbances of various kinds, and during Mr. Icely's last visit kept his time rather occupied. In her presence I applied to him for a summons or information on a charge of criminal libel, in that she had stated to two residents that a conspiracy was being hatched in my house between Captain Garth, of the "Mary Ogilvie," Messrs. Thompson, Wilson, Hamill, and myself, and that we were concocting villainous charges against Mr. Icely, in order to have him removed, adding that his life was not safe if it were known that she had talked about it. Mrs. Harland then positively denied that there was one word of truth in my statements. I then gave the names of my witnesses, and Mr. Icely fixed 2 p.m. of the 16th ultimo to hear my complaint. Before opening the case I asked him to take the evidence on oath, but he declined doing so, and after hearing the statements of Messrs. Captain Nichols and Mrs. Dathe, Mrs. Harland admitted she had made them, asserting at the same time that Captain Powell, mate of the "Mary Ogilvie," was her informant. Now, as it happened, Captain Garth, owner of that vessel, had heard prior to the opening of the Court, that Mrs. Harland had mixed Powell's name in the matter, and had sent him written notice that he must attend the Court and give evidence. Powell was therefore in attendance, and on being called, demanded that his evidence should be on oath, as from what he had heard his situation depended on his ability to disprove the statement he understood to have emanated from Mrs. Harland, and this he certainly could do; but again Mr. Icely refused to have the evidence on oath. Powell then positively asserted that "such a statement as that made by Mrs. Harland could never have entered his head, and that with the exception of Captain Garth, when on business, he had never even seen me speaking to the other alleged conspirators, much less seen them at my house." It was well known to all the residents that there were none of their number I kept at such a distance as Wilson, Thompson, and Hamill. The latter was in Court, and asked permission to make a statement, but Mr. Icely refused to hear him, alleging that he had nothing to do with it. He asserted that he had, as his name was mentioned as one of the conspirators, yet his statement was declined. Mrs. Harland was then asked if she had any evidence to disprove Powell's assertion, and called her husband, but all that he could say was that, acting upon his wife's information, he had asked Powell, and that the latter apparently did not know what he meant.

Then followed the strangest feature of the case. Mr. Icely stood up, and addressing me, said, "Mr. Langley, you are exonerated." I replied, "What do you mean, Sir?" He then added, "from this charge," and upon my saying, "Mr. Icely, there is a slight mistake; it is my charge of libel against Mrs. Harland," I was peremptorily ordered to sit down, as he would not hear another word from me.

I at once left the Court, and when Mr. Icely came out I said, "I think, Sir, I have fully proved my case; what are you going to do in the matter?" His reply was, "What can I do?" to which I rejoined, "Surely it is not my business to dictate to you your duty as Magistrate." As I saw that he did not intend taking any further action, I intimated my intention of taking the matter to higher quarters. While this case and others were pending against Mrs. Harland, Mr. Icely was constantly at her house, or walking about with her daughter, Miss Douglas, and I am credibly informed that on the evening of the day upon which he dealt with this case in such an extraordinary manner he dined with the family.

Equally strange has been his action in land disputes in which Mrs. Harland has been mixed up, and as the Islanders must at present have acquired a strange idea of how justice may be dispensed in the future, I would respectfully ask for an immediate inquiry, so as to prevent any further injustice being done.

Captain Hamill, now under committal for bigamy, against whom I am one of the principal witnesses, and Powell, of the "Mary Ogilvie," will, I am sure, bear out all I have said regarding the proceedings in Court.

In the matter referred to herein I acted as I thought most prudently.

The complaint was one originating out of "repeated conversations." Thus:—

Mrs. Nichols told Mr. Langley that Mrs. Harland had told her, that Captain Powell had repeated to her (Mrs. Harland) a number of scandals supposed to have originated in his (Mr. Langley's) house.

I listened to a long story (of, as I say above, nothing but "repeated conversations"), and when all had told me all they had to say, I summed up, saying:—

"There certainly is nothing to show that any such meeting was held in Mr. Langley's house—or, indeed, in any house—so Mr. Langley is most certainly exonerated from imputation.

"I can say no more. No doubt somebody started the story, but whether Mrs. Harland or Captain Powell, it is impossible for me to say—the one saying one thing, and the other quite the reverse."

Mr. Langley then interjected: "I consider it a case for criminal libel," to which I replied, "I won't hear any more of the case."

With reference to my refusal to put certain people upon their oath, I have to say that, at Lord Howe Island, many cases come before me, in which I deem it best to simply hear what people have to say. Of such nature was that case to which Mr. Langley refers, as also was that which, next but one, immediately preceded it.

It was a case originating in the fact that someone had one night made "a mess" in Mr. Langley's fishing-boat, and that someone else had said that it was done by Hamell's child, Hamell repudiating and bringing evidence to show that the colossal character of "the mess" was in itself proof that it must have been the act of some one bigger than his child, &c., &c., &c.

I listened, as before told, to all that had to be said; and then, expressing the conclusion at which I had arrived, said, "Although it is evident that Mr. Langley's boat has been dirtied, and in a very disgraceful way, nothing has been said to fix the disgusting act upon any particular person; but I certainly judge that it was not the act of the accused child."

So also, in the matter of the paper marked A. I told Mr. Langley I would not swear him; that this (alluding to the paper) was the first I had heard of it; but that, if he liked, I would accept the document as a declaration.

As to land questions, I settled before I left the Island all cases brought before me, save only that in the intestate estate of Charles Williams (referred to in my report of the 4th July instant), and an application from T. H. Wilson for extension of boundary, which, for local reasons, I postponed deciding upon.

I have the honor to report my return this morning to Sydney, after paying a second visit, for the current year, to Lord Howe Island.

4. Referring to a hasty report, written by me upon the eve of my last leaving Sydney, in reply to a complaint emanating from the pen of Mr. Langley, I desire further to say, that at Lord Howe Island, a vast number of the cases that come before me have a character peculiarly their own. People upon the Island, proverbially for the most part of sober habits, do not fight, nor do they often meet and squabble, nor do they rob each other, but they are for ever repeating conversations and saying behind each other's backs things which, when retold, create the bitterest of feeling, followed by vicious complaints, revealing little other than crimination and recrimination, and rendering it frequently most difficult to decide which of the litigating parties is least in the wrong.

It is as much as anything to meet such cases that I usually ask complainants when they come to me what their case is, and, without putting them to the expense which attends the bringing of a case formally before a Police Court, fix a time when I will hear it. Under such circumstances I do not swear, for, the case not being thus in required judicial-form before me, I doubt if I should be doing right were I to examine the litigants and their witnesses upon oath.

It might be suggested that I should act otherwise, and have all cases brought properly and formally before me, but this would, in the first place, deprive me of a good deal of discretion, which I am now frequently enabled to exercise with advantage, and would, I fear, cause many of the people to say, "What is the use of a magistrate? we can't go near him unless we have money in our hands," which would, as I take it, frustrate to a certain extent one of the very objects of my visits, which is to bring me, as the representative of the New South Wales Government, as much as possible in direct contact with the people—and to keep them orderly, by deciding their sundry troubles in as simple and in as inexpensive a way to them as is possible—thus keeping them in mind of their position, viz,—that while permitted to "locate" upon Lord Howe Island, paying neither rent nor tax, their welfare is not forgotten by the Colony, of which the Island forms an outlying and distant part.

Then again—although it is true that I have the Statute books of the Colony to direct me, there is a practical impossibility of my carrying them out in simple cases, which will be evident when I say that there is not practically any money upon the Island to pay fines, nor is there any lock-up, so that, really, in nine cases out of ten, there is no other course open to me but to act, as in each particular case, I think most prudently, obeying statute directions as far as I can, but being at the same time careful, not, by doing so too closely to exhibit the absolute weakness of my position, and thus run the risk of upsetting authority.

I wish, however, these remarks to apply only to matters of simple character with which I have so many to deal.

In cases of crime of serious nature, being furnished with both handcuffs and leg-irons, my course is clearer.

I write this after an experience of eighteen months, during which time I have made special study of the interests and the best mode of managing the people of Lord Howe Island, who, having from the first, for a civilized community, been peculiarly situated, have engendered peculiarities which require peculiar management. No ownership of land, no rent, no tax, no church, no lockup, whilst, outside "talky-talky" scandal, there is but little vice.

Apart, however, from all these arguments, I was induced to treat the case of which Mr. Langley complains in the way that I did from the fact that I had only a short time before he brought it before me received a communication from him [*annexed and marked B*],\* accusing Mrs. Harland of the very same thing that he in his case says Mrs. Harland accuses him, that is, of a conspiracy to induce the Government to remove me. The origin, however, of the major part of the subject matter of Mr. Langley's letter (if not in the fruitful mind of Mr. Langley himself) I am unable to imagine † Apart from Mr. Langley, I am not aware that there is anyone upon the Island who would think of making any such charges as are set forth in his letter to the Colonial Secretary; and I have the honor to suggest that unless he can substantiate in its meaning what he has written against me, that he, my subordinate officer, may be removed from the official position which he holds, viz, that of District Registrar of Lord Howe Island.

The details of his statement to Mrs. H. you will hear from herself. She appeared quite surprised when I said it was the first I heard of the matter, as she understood from Thompson that he represented the general wish of the islanders regarding your removal.

No doubt you may think it strange that I, who, of all others, seems to think I have had most reason for dissatisfaction, should have taken action in this matter; but through life I have always had an aversion to hitting foul blows, and in this case the blow appears to have been given behind your back. Jeune was made use of as the ostensible combatant, and Thompson appears to have come forward as a disinterested witness. I informed Captain Nichols of what I had heard, and he interviewed Mrs. H., who has also narrated the matter to him. As a result I have drawn up and had signed a letter to Sir H. Parkes in reference to the matter. Should you not be shown the original I have retained a copy.

Thompson, Wilson, Robins, Stevens, and King, have had several meetings at the school-house recently. Captain Nichols was invited, but wrote declining. Wm Nichols called and asked me to go, but as Wilson had sent written invitations to all the residents except myself I declined, and said to Nichols I thought it a most improper proceeding to take in your absence. He told them as much at the first meeting, and never went back. He understood that their chief object was to prevent any strangers from settling here, but nothing was done while he was present. I hear that Wilson drew

drew up a petition which goes by this mail, and if so you will probably see it. Of this you may be assured, Captain Nichols, his sons, his brother, Johnson, Wilson, Mosely, Darthe, and myself, disown any connection with the affair, and if you take away the acting forest-rangers, who have no right to be mixed up with the matter, it seems confined to the Thompson family that a hole and corner affair of this kind should have any influence at head quarters seems absurd—but it might. If my remarks on the subject are not excused from my letter to the *Herald* it may place their actions in a true light before others than those who may have been duped by Thompson. Will you kindly bring me papers in which it appears.

Thompson and Wilson have been found by Mrs. H. to have acted towards her with cleverly arranged duplicity and now neither she or her family hold any intercourse with them. Mosely has agreed to stand by his former lease so far as rental is concerned, leaving other details until your arrival. It is also partly arranged that the Harlands take up all Mrs. Field's gardens except that which I have, they agreeing to maintain her for the rest of her life, but she will sign nothing unless you are present. Mrs. H. has revealed a veritable crop of slanders emanating from one source and making relations here more strained than ever, but these things will probably come before you officially.

Taking all things into consideration, I must say that during my connection of eight years with the island, I have never known matters so unsettled as they now are; I sometimes wonder how it will end.

If this Thompson episode had not transpired it was my intention to have written to you regarding a libellous statement made to me before Captain Nichols in connection with certain letters Jeune is said to have sent to Sydney, one being addressed to Mr. H. Levien, M.L.A. However our joint communication to Sir H. Parkes covers all the ground. As from misrepresentations made to Mr. Levien, he may have promised to bring the affair before Parliament, it might be well for Mr. Street to ask him if it is so, and to say upon my authority that he has been wilfully misled. Levien knows me sufficiently well to feel assured that he will rely upon my word especially as I have no interest in the matter except to uphold the cause of truth. It is to be hoped that you will not find your path of duty here as thorny as that which Captain Armstrong travelled, but so long as I reside on the island I for one though I stand alone will not allow our malignants to attack the representative of the Government—whether it be yourself or a stranger—so long as I feel satisfied he is doing right. I shall raise my voice against it even though my protest may make me additional enemies.

P.S.—When Mrs. H. first came down I heard her say that the next magistrate would be a doctor a particular friend of hers. I replied, "I think the appointment will depend upon who is in power when a vacancy occurs"; upon this she said, "Oh no it is all settled." Since then and that she and Thompson have been washing their dirty linen, it turns out that both thought your removal assured. I fear that you will find that her return here has been the most baneful incident in the history of the island, a very firebrand amongst tinder.—W.E.L.

Dear Sir,  
You were so courteous in replying to my last letter that it has encouraged me to trouble you still further to ascertain whether you are prepared to formally recognise me as a *bona fide* settler in the Island when I take up my abode there with my wife, and before I launch out into expense over buildings, &c. My solicitors told me some months ago that only you were empowered to do this, and only by this could I legally reside there.

It is greatly to be regretted I did know this earlier; it would have saved me much expense and anxiety, instead of foolishly accepting the opinions of parties who had interests on the island or by trading there. Could you, dear sir, kindly define somewhat my position on the Island as a settler there—that is, I presume Government could at any time dispossess me.

But do you think there is much probability of their doing so in our case, having antecedents that would not preclude us from any society. And if this should come to pass, do you think my improvements would be confiscated, or would I be able to remove them?

[In confidence.] I am sorry to inform you that Mrs. Harland in her letter to me says very grave things about certain of the islanders and their dissatisfaction with you. My wife expresses her indignation in such terms that she advised me to repeat her statements to you to put you on your guard. However, in the absence of proof on my part, I defer saying anything definite until our return to the island, when I expect Mrs. Harland will be her own newsbearer.

I have your letter of yesterday's date. In reply, I do not know of objection to any person of respectability going to Lord Howe Island.

I judge by your letter that you are aware that it is a reserve, as also of the terms upon which residence and improvement is permitted by the New South Wales Government.

That portion of the island fit for cultivation is, as you know, limited, and will support only a few families; this fact induces me to specially respect the claims of those already settled upon it—not, however, to the prejudice of all others, my duty being to study the greatest good for the greatest number.

## CRIMINAL LAW AMENDMENT ACT OF 1883.

(AMENDED REGULATIONS FOR GIVING EFFECT TO SECTION 409, IN RESPECT OF LICENSES.)

Presented to Parliament, pursuant to Act 46 Vic. No. 17.

Department of Justice,  
Sydney, 25th July, 1890.

His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the following amended Regulations for giving effect to provisions of section 409 of the "Criminal Law Amendment Act of 1883" in respect of Licenses.

ALBERT J. GOULD.

AMENDED Regulations for giving effect to provisions of section 409 of the "Criminal Law Amendment Act," in respect of written Licenses to Offenders to be held at large within specified limits.

Prisoners under sentences to penal servitude and to hard labour on the Roads and Public Works, and to imprisonment with hard labour, will become eligible for licenses under the following conditions, viz. :—

1. Prisoners under sentences from three to five years, who have not been punished for misconduct within the previous six months and who are favourably recommended by the gaolers, at a period twelve months before they would become eligible for discharge under the ordinary remission regulations, and in anticipation of such discharge; in sentences of five to ten years, similarly at a period of eighteen months anterior to discharge; in sentences of ten years and upwards, at a period of two years.

2. The Governor may under exceptional circumstances grant a license to any offender at any period of his sentence.

3. Prisoners granted the privilege of licenses will be formed into the intermediate class, and will be designated license holders.

4. The license holders will be employed upon the works at Trial Bay Prison, in connection with the Department of Harbours and Rivers, and will be confined to the proclaimed boundary of that prison.

5. They will occupy such quarters as may be assigned to them, and they will be liable to ordinary prison punishment for any offences or disorder, in like manner as if they were serving their sentences, and will be subject to all the rules laid down for their treatment by the Comptroller-General, authorized by the Minister of Justice.

6. The licenses will be in the form hereto attached, and will be held by the prisoners.

7. License-holders will be supplied with rations according to the scale subjoined, and with clothing other than of the prison pattern.

8. They will further be allowed wages on accomplishment of specified tasks, or on the recommendation of the officers directing their work, according to the authorized scale. The wages will be credited to them until their discharge; but they will be allowed, at the discretion of the Superintendent, a certain proportion, not to exceed one-third, for the purchase of extra articles of consumption. Those who may wish to do so may also remit money, subject to the approval of the Superintendent, to any immediate relatives who are in destitute circumstances, but such remittances must not exceed one-third of the total amount earned. Those who may avail themselves of this concession will still be permitted to expend the proportion allowed for extra articles of consumption.

9. No license-holder will go beyond the proclaimed prison boundaries without a pass from the Superintendent, specifying the purpose for which it was granted, and any license-holder so going beyond will be an escapee as from ordinary imprisonment, and be liable to like arrest and penalties. Any infraction of this or other condition of the license will, apart from other penalty, involve forfeiture or suspension thereof, on the recommendation of a Justice, by authority of the Governor.

10. Any license-holder who, through misconduct, may have his license revoked, must defray the cost of his transfer to the gaol whence he came, to be paid from the wages which may have accrued during his servitude at Trial Bay.

11. All prisoners to be eligible for licenses will have to be passed as physically fit for quarrying, or other such labour, by the surgeons of the prisons, and the favourable recommendation of the gaolers must express a belief that the prisoner will conduct himself properly, and not abuse the privilege.

12. In case of prisoners who may not be eligible either from physical or other causes, and therefore have to serve their sentences in ordinary prisons, the consideration will be allowed of an additional remission period beyond that specified in the Prison Regulations, on the following scale:—

In sentences of from 3 to 5 years, 2 months.  
5 to 10 years, 4 months.  
10 years upwards, 6 months.

13. Prisoners under commuted sentences, and who are thereby debarred remission, may be allowed licenses as may in each case be determined by the Governor.

License in connection with the Public Works Prison at Trial Bay.

His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to authorize the bearer of this License in terms of section 409 of the Criminal Law Amendment Act, to be employed on the works in connection with the Public Works Prison at Trial Bay, within the prescribed boundary of the portion of land at Arakoon, appointed as a place at which certain male offenders shall be detained, and be liable to be kept to hard labour, by proclamation dated 4th March, 1886, under the conditions specified in the Prison Regulations indorsed thereon.

(IN BANKRUPTCY.)

Presented to Parliament, pursuant to Act 51 Vic. No. 19, sec. 119.

In the Supreme Court of New South Wales.  
IN BANKRUPTCY.

RULES FOR PROCEDURE in Motions under Section 130 of the "Bankruptcy Act of 1887," made in pursuance of Section 119 of the "Bankruptcy Act of 1887."

Friday, the 29th August, 1890.

1. These Rules shall come into force on the 1st day of September, 1890.

2. Rule 11 of the Bankruptcy Rules of the 1st day of February, 1888, so far as the same applies to motions under Section 130 of the Act of 1887, is hereby repealed.

3. Any motion under Section 130 of the said Act may be set down for hearing on any Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, after the expiration of fourteen clear days from the filing and serving on the respondents of the notice of motion, and notice of the day of hearing shall be contained in such notice of motion: Provided that the Judge may upon application made ex parte direct that such hearing take place at an earlier date than herein provided, and give leave to serve short notice of hearing upon such terms and in such manner as the Judge shall think fit.

4. The applicant shall at the foot of any such notice of motion state whether he desires upon the hearing thereof to use oral evidence or affidavits, or partly oral evidence and partly affidavits, and shall in case he desires to use affidavits set forth at the foot of such notice of motion the names of the deponents thereof; and all affidavits intended to be used in support of any such motion shall be filed by the applicant with the Registrar of the Court, together with such notice of motion, or within such further time as the Judge may direct.

5. The notice of motion shall bear an indorsement in the form or to the effect set out in the Schedule to these Rules.

6. Any respondent to such notice of motion shall—if resident within 50 miles of Sydney within six clear days, or if resident more than 50 miles from Sydney, within eight clear days after service of any such notice of motion—cause to be filed with the Registrar a memorandum of appearance to the effect either that he disputes or admits the claim of the applicant or some part thereof, and specifying what part, or that he desires to submit to any order the Judge may think fit to make, or that he disclaims all right, title, and interest to and in the subject matter of the claim of the applicant.

7. Such memorandum of appearance shall in addition to the name and address of the respondent state some address (within one mile from the Bankruptcy Court), as an address for service; and service of all subsequent pleadings, notices, and documents at such place of address shall be deemed good service upon such respondent.

8. If such memorandum of appearance does not contain such address for service the same shall not be received by the Registrar, and if such address be illusory or fictitious the appearance may be set aside by the Judge on the application of the applicant.

9. If any respondent shall be desirous of opposing the claim of the applicant or any part thereof he shall at the foot of the memorandum of appearance state whether he desires to use in opposition thereto oral evidence or affidavits, or partly oral evidence and partly affidavits; and in case he desires to use affidavits he shall at the foot of such memorandum of appearance set forth the names of the deponents thereof; and all affidavits so intended to be used by him shall be filed with the Registrar, together with such memorandum of appearance, or within such further time as the Judge may direct.

10. If any respondent desires the matter to proceed on both sides by oral evidence alone (of which desire he shall give notice in his memorandum of appearance) the matter shall be so heard unless the respondent consents to the applicant using on the hearing of the motion any of the affidavits already filed by the applicant, and of such consent gives notice in his memorandum of appearance: Provided that the Judge may, on the hearing of any such motion, make any order he may deem fit as to the cost of any affidavits filed by the applicant as before directed.

11. When any respondent is duly served with a notice of motion and does not cause to be filed a memorandum of appearance within the time limited and in the manner provided by these rules, the Judge may, at the time appointed for hearing the said motion and upon proof of such service, make such order therein as he may deem fit: Provided that any respondent, notwithstanding such default of appearance, may at any time before the hearing of the said motion apply to the Judge for leave to file such memorandum of appearance upon such terms as to costs or otherwise as the Judge shall direct.

12. Where the matter is to be heard upon affidavits, either wholly or in part, the applicant shall, unless the Judge shall otherwise order, file with the Registrar and serve upon the respondent, or if more than one respondent, then upon each respondent, copies of all affidavits intended to be used by him in reply not less than two clear days before the day appointed for the hearing: Provided that no further affidavits shall be used upon the hearing unless the Judge shall so direct.

13. If either party desires that any deponent shall be in attendance for cross-examination, he shall give notice to the party relying upon the affidavit of such deponent not later than two clear days before the day of hearing. And if any deponent shall not be in attendance for cross-examination after such notice given as aforesaid, the party to whom such notice has been given shall not (unless the Judge shall otherwise order) in any way make use of the affidavit of such deponent.

14. It shall not be necessary for the party giving such notice to tender the expenses of any deponent required to be in attendance for cross-examination: Provided that the Judge may, at the hearing, make any order he may deem fit as to the expense and costs occasioned by such notice.

*Reference to Registrar.*

15. All rules now in force in Equity with reference to proceedings before the Master in Equity and regulating the mode of inquiries before such Master, and the time for and mode of appealing from such Master to the Chief Judge in Equity, shall, so far as the same are applicable, regulate inquiries directed under any motion under this section before the Registrar and appeals from any decision or report made by him thereon.

*Indorsement on Notice of Motion.*

A memorandum of appearance must be filed with the Registrar of the Bankruptcy Court, Chancery-square, King-street, Sydney, by you the within named respondent (or one of the within named respondents), within six (or eight) clear

days after the service on you of this notice of motion. Such memorandum of appearance must state whether you dispute or admit the whole or any part, and if so, what part of the applicant's claim, or whether you submit to any order the Judge may think fit to make, or whether you disclaim all right, title, and interest in and to the subject matter of the claim. Such memorandum must also comply with the provisions of Rules 7, 8, 9, 10 of the Bankruptcy Rules of the 1st day of September, 1890. If you neglect to enter such appearance and comply with the said Rules, the Judge may in your absence make such order as he shall think fit on the hearing of this motion.

In pursuance of the several powers vested in us in that behalf, we do hereby order that rule 24 of the Equity Consolidated Standing Rules of 29th June, 1883, be hereby repealed, and, in further pursuance of the said several powers, we do hereby further order and direct in the manner following:—

1. All powers by any rules of Court now in force delegated to or performed by the Chief Clerk, shall henceforth be delegated to and performed by the Deputy Registrar and Assistant Taxing Officer, provided that the Chief Clerk may still continue to perform the duties stated in rules 9, 10, 23, 30, and 33 of the Consolidated Standing Rules of 29th June, 1883, and in rule 3 of Regulæ Generales of 6th September, 1889, together with the Court duties of Registrar.

2. The Deputy and Assistant Taxing Officer, when directed by the Court or Master, may discharge the duties of Registrar and the duties of Taxing Officer, and he may take accounts and prosecute inquiries as directed by the Court or Master.

3. Certificates of taxation and of fund in Court may, in the absence of the Master, be signed by the Deputy Registrar and Assistant Taxing Officer.

# RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

(IN EQUITY JURISDICTION.)

Presented to Parliament pursuant to Act 44 Vic. No. 18, sec. 81.

In the Supreme Court of New South Wales.

## REGULÆ GENERALES.

Friday, the twenty first day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in us by the Equity Act of 1880, and of all other powers in that behalf enabling us, we do order that from and after this date Rule 7 of the Consolidated Standing Rules of 26th June, 1883, Rule 3 of the Regulæ Generales of the 21st May, 1883, be rescinded, and we direct as follows:—

### Chamber Orders.

All Chamber Orders shall be entered in the same manner and in the same office as orders made in open Court are entered.

Save as aforesaid the practice as to orders made in Chambers shall be the same as at Common Law.

### Appeals to Full Court.

In Equity appeals to the Full Court, the moving party, unless a Judge otherwise order or allow further time, shall, within twenty-eight days after the filing of the notice of appeal, lodge in the Equity Office seven printed copies of the pleadings (including petition notice of motion and summons), the evidence (other than the exhibits), the decree or order appealed from, and the judgment of the Judge on making such decree or order approved by him, and shall, within the like time, also serve a like number of such printed copies on each opposing party, or upon each solicitor, on the Record.

### Orders on further directions.

When any suit shall, at the original or any subsequent hearing thereof, have been adjourned for further consideration, the plaintiff or party having the conduct of the suit shall, after the expiration of eight days and within fourteen days

from the filing of the certificate of the Master in Equity, set down the suit for hearing on further directions on some day (except by leave of the Court) not earlier than the eighth and not later than the fourteenth day after setting down the same, and the plaintiff or party having conduct of the suit shall forthwith serve notice of the suit being so set down upon the defendants or parties thereto other than the party having the conduct of the suit.

If the plaintiff or other party having the conduct of the suit does not set down the suit for hearing on further directions within fourteen days from the filing of the Master's certificate as aforesaid, any defendant or party having the conduct of the suit may set down the same for such hearing within the periods as hereinbefore provided for setting down by the plaintiff, and shall forthwith serve on the plaintiff or party having the conduct of the suit notice thereof.

When any suit is so set down for hearing on further directions as aforesaid, the party so setting down the same shall at the same time lodge in the Master's Office short minutes (omitting formal parts) of the decree or Order he deems himself entitled to.

Regulæ Generales of the 3rd day of August, 1887, is hereby varied in so far as the Equity Jurisdiction of this Court is concerned in the manner following, that is to say:—

The Master in Equity may of his own motion part with the custody of any exhibits put in evidence in the course of taking any accounts or making any enquiry before him.

Thursday, the 4th day of September, A.D. 1890.

1. I, WILLIAM CHARLES WINDEYER, being the Judge duly appointed under the Divorce and Matrimonial Causes Act of 1873, do hereby, in pursuance of the several powers vested in me by the said Act, order and direct that in all cases of appeal to the Full Court for a new trial under the provisions of the above-mentioned Act the moving party, unless the Judge appointed under the said Act otherwise order or allow further time, shall, within fourteen days after the filing of the Notice of Appeal, file with the Registrar in Divorce four printed copies of the issues and evidence other than the exhibits, and shall within the like time also serve a like number of such printed copies on each opposing party, or upon each Solicitor on the record.

2. All documents of which printed copies are, by the preceding Rule, ordered to be printed shall be printed upon cream-wove white foolscap folio paper, in pica type, leaded, with an inner margin an inch wide and an outer margin two inches and a half wide.

## CHAPTER 37.

### AN ACT TO CONSOLIDATE THE FOREIGN JURISDICTION ACTS. [4th August 1890.]

WHEREAS by treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has jurisdiction within divers foreign countries, and it is expedient to consolidate the Acts relating to the exercise of Her Majesty's jurisdiction out of Her dominions:

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

#### Exercise of jurisdiction in foreign country.

1. It is and shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen to hold, exercise, and enjoy any jurisdiction which Her Majesty now has or may at any time hereafter have within a foreign country in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had acquired that jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory.

Exercise of jurisdiction over British subjects in countries without regular governments.

2. Where a foreign country is not subject to any government from whom Her Majesty the Queen might obtain jurisdiction, in the manner recited by this Act, Her Majesty shall, by virtue

of this Act have jurisdiction over Her Majesty's subjects for the time being resident in or resorting to that country, and that jurisdiction shall be jurisdiction of Her Majesty in a foreign country within the meaning of the other provisions of this Act.

#### Validity of acts done in pursuance of jurisdiction.

3. Every act and thing done in pursuance of any jurisdiction of Her Majesty in a foreign country shall be as valid as if it had been done according to the local law then in force in that country.

Evidence as to existence or extent of jurisdiction in foreign country.

4. (1) If in any proceeding, civil or criminal, in a court in Her Majesty's dominions or held under the authority of Her Majesty, any question arises as to the existence or extent of any jurisdiction of Her Majesty in a foreign country, a Secretary of State shall, on the application of the court, send to the court, within a reasonable time, his decision on the question, and his decision shall for the purposes of the proceeding be final.

(2) The court shall send to the Secretary of State, in a document under the seal of the court, or signed by a judge of the court, questions framed so as properly to raise the question, and sufficient answers to those questions shall be returned by the Secretary of State to the court, and those answers shall, on production thereof, be conclusive evidence of the matters therein contained.

#### Power to extend enactments in First Schedule.

5. (1) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council, if She thinks fit, by Order to direct that all or any of the enactments described in the first schedule to this Act, or any enactments for the time being in force amending or substituted for the same, shall extend with or without any exceptions, adaptations, or modifications in the order mentioned, to any foreign country in which for the time being Her Majesty has jurisdiction.

(2) Thereupon those enactments shall, to the extent of that jurisdiction, operate as if that country were a British possession, and as if Her Majesty in Council were the Legislature of that possession.

Power to send persons charged with offences for a trial to a British possession.

6. (1.) Where a person is charged with an offence cognisable by a British court in a foreign country, any person having authority derived from Her Majesty in that behalf may, by warrant, cause the person so charged to be sent for trial to any British possession for the time being appointed in that behalf by Order in Council, and upon the arrival of the person so charged in that British possession, such criminal court of that possession as is authorised in that behalf by Order in Council, or if no court is so authorised, the supreme criminal court of that possession, may cause him to be kept in safe and proper custody, and so soon as conveniently may be may inquire of, try, and determine the offence, and on conviction punish the offender according to the laws in force in that behalf within that possession in the same manner as if the offences had been committed within the jurisdiction of that criminal court.

Provided that—

- (a.) A person so charged may, before being so sent for trial, tender for examination to a British court in the foreign country where the offence is alleged to have been committed any competent witness whose evidence he deems material for his defence and whom he alleges himself unable to produce at the trial in the British possession :
- (b.) In such case the British court in the foreign country shall proceed in the examination and cross-examination of the witness as though he had been tendered at a trial before that court, and shall cause the evidence so taken to be reduced into writing, and shall transmit to the criminal court of the British possession by which the person charged is to be tried, a copy of the evidence, certified as correct under the seal of the court before which the evidence was taken, or the signature of a judge of that court :
- (c.) Thereupon the court of the British possession before which the trial takes place shall allow so much of the evidence so taken as would have been admissible according to the law and practice of that court, had the witness been produced and examined at the trial, to be read and received as legal evidence at the trial :
- (d.) The court of the British possession shall admit and give effect to the law by which the alleged offender would have been tried by the British court in the foreign country in which his offence is alleged to have been committed, so far as that law relates to the criminality of the act alleged to have been committed, or the nature or degree of the offence, or the punishment thereof, if the law differs in those respects from the law in force in that British possession.

(2.) Nothing in this section shall alter or repeal any law, statute, or usage by virtue of which any offence committed out of Her Majesty's dominions may, irrespectively of this Act, be inquired of, tried, determined, and punished within Her Majesty's dominions, or any part thereof.

Provision as to place of punishment of persons convicted.

7. Where an offender convicted before a British court in a foreign country has been sentenced by that court to suffer death, penal servitude, imprisonment, or any other punishment, the sentence shall be carried into effect in such place as may be directed by Order in Council or be determined in accordance with directions given by Order in Council, and the conviction and sentence shall be of the same force in the place in which the sentence is so carried into effect as if the conviction had been made and the sentence passed by a competent court in that place.

Validity of acts done under Order in Council.

8. Where, by Order in Council made in pursuance of this Act, any British court in a foreign country is authorised to order the removal or deportation of any person from that country, that removal or deportation and any detention for the purposes thereof, according to the provisions of the Order in Council, shall be as lawful as if the order of the court were to have effect wholly within that country.

Power to assign jurisdiction to British courts in cases within Foreign Jurisdiction Act.

9. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council, by Order, to assign to or confer on any court in any British possession, or held under the authority of Her Majesty, any jurisdiction, civil or criminal, original or appellate, which may lawfully by Order in Council be assigned to or conferred on any British court in any foreign country, and to make such provisions and regulations as to Her Majesty in Council seem meet respecting the exercise of the jurisdiction so assigned or conferred, and respecting the enforcement and execution of the judgments, decrees, orders, and sentences of any such court, and respecting appeals therefrom.

Power to amend Orders in Council.

10. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council to revoke or vary any Order in Council made in pursuance of this Act.

Laying before Parliament, and effect of Orders in Council.

11. Every Order in Council made in pursuance of this Act shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament forthwith after it is made, if Parliament be then in session, and if not, forthwith after the commencement of the then next session of Parliament, and shall have effect as if it were enacted in this Act.

In what cases Orders in Council void for repugnancy.

12. (1.) If any Order in Council made in pursuance of this Act as respects any foreign country is in any respect repugnant to the provisions of any Act of Parliament extending to Her Majesty's subjects in that country, or repugnant to any order or regulation made under the authority of any such Act of Parliament, or having in that country the force and effect of any such Act, it shall be read subject to that Act, order, or regulation, and shall, to the extent of such repugnancy, but not otherwise, be void.

(2.) An Order in Council made in pursuance of this Act shall not be, or be deemed to have been, void on the ground of repugnancy to the law of England, unless it is repugnant to the provisions of some such Act of Parliament, order, or regulation as aforesaid.

Provisions for protection of persons acting under Foreign Jurisdiction Acts.

13. (1.) An action, suit, prosecution, or proceeding against any person for any act done in pursuance or execution or intended execution of this Act, or of any enactment repealed by this Act, or of any Order in Council made under this Act, or of any such jurisdiction of Her Majesty as is mentioned in this Act, or in respect of any alleged neglect or default in the execution of this Act, or of any such enactment, Order in Council, or jurisdiction as aforesaid, shall not be or be instituted—

(a.) In any court within Her Majesty's dominions, unless it is commenced within six months next after the act, neglect, or default complained of, or in case of a continuance of injury or damage within six months next after the ceasing thereof, or where the cause of action arose out of Her Majesty's dominions within six months after the parties to the action, suit, prosecution, or proceeding have been within the jurisdiction of the court in which the same is instituted ; nor

(b.) In any of Her Majesty's courts without Her Majesty's dominions, unless the cause of action arose within the jurisdiction of that court, and the action is commenced within six months next after the act, neglect, or default complained of, or, in case of a continuance of injury or damage, within six months next after the ceasing thereof.

(2.) In any such action, suit, or proceeding, tender of amends before the same was commenced may be pleaded in lieu of or in addition to any other plea. If the action, suit, or proceeding was commenced after such tender, or is proceeded with after payment into court of any money in satisfaction of the plaintiff's claim, and the plaintiff does not recover more than the sum tendered or paid, he shall not recover any costs incurred after such tender or payment, and the defendant shall be entitled to costs, to be taxed as between solicitor and client, as from the time of such tender or payment ; but this provision shall not affect costs on any injunction in the action, suit, or proceeding.

Jurisdiction over ships in certain eastern seas.

14. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council to make any law that may seem meet for the government of Her Majesty's subjects being in any vessel at a distance of not more than one hundred miles from the coast of China or of Japan, as fully and effectually as any such law might be made by Her Majesty in Council for the government of Her Majesty's subjects being in China or in Japan.

Provision as to subjects of Indian princes.

15. Where any Order in Council made in pursuance of this Act extends to persons enjoying Her Majesty's protection, that expression shall include all subjects of the several Princes and States in India.

Definitions.

16. In this Act,—  
The expression "foreign country" means any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions :

The expression "British court in a foreign country" means any British court having jurisdiction out of Her Majesty's dominions in pursuance of an Order in Council whether made under any Act or otherwise :

The expression "jurisdiction" includes power.

Power to repeal or vary Acts in Second Schedule.

17. The Acts mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Act may be revoked or varied by Her Majesty by Order in Council.

## Repeal.

18. The Acts mentioned in the Third Schedule to this Act are hereby repealed to the extent in the third column of that schedule mentioned: Provided that,—

- (1.) Any Order in Council, commission, or instructions made or issued in pursuance of any enactment repealed by this Act, shall, if in force at the passing of this Act, continue in force, until altered or revoked by Her Majesty as if made in pursuance of this Act; and shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to have been made or issued under and in pursuance of this Act; and
- (2.) Any enactment, Order in Council, or document referring to any enactment repealed by this Act shall be construed to refer to the corresponding enactment of this Act.

## Short titles.

19. (1.) This Act may be cited as the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890.

(2.) The Acts whereof the short titles are given in the First Schedule to this Act may be cited by the respective short titles given in that schedule.

## FOREIGN JURISDICTION CONSOLIDATION BILL.

## MEMORANDUM.

The object of this Bill is to consolidate the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts with such amendments only as are necessarily incidental to the process of consolidation. The amendments appear from the following notes:—

## Section 4.

The words "or held under the authority of Her Majesty" are added to include courts established under the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts.

## Section 5.

The Evidence by Commission Act, 1865, has been added to the Acts comprised in the schedule to the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1878, as being an enactment amending the Acts in that schedule.

## Section 6.

Words have been added giving power to define by Order in Council what is meant by the expression "supreme criminal court."

## Section 7.

In consequence of the alteration of the law with respect to penal servitude, sections 5 and 6 of the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1843, cannot be exactly reproduced. The new section reproduces in substance the power given by those sections of removing offenders for punishment, but substitutes the machinery provided by the more recent Colonial Prisoners' Removal Act of 1869.

## Section 12.

This section sets out the provisions of 28 & 29 Vict. c. 63 instead of applying them by reference.

## Sections 17, 18.

The Acts 24 & 25 Vict. c. 31, as to territories near Sierra Leone, and 26 & 27 Vict. c. 35, as to certain portions of South Africa, are practically superseded by section 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1878 (41 & 42 Vict. c. 67), which would extend to the whole of Africa and not merely to the limited portions mentioned in the above Acts. Accordingly, an Order in Council could at any time supersede the provisions of those Acts. The Act 20 & 21 Vict. c. 75 as to Siam would have been unnecessary if the Order in Council to which it referred had been made since the passing of the latter Act, 29 & 30 Vict. c. 87, s. 1 (reproduced by section 9). The amending Act, 33 & 34 Vict. c. 55, merely declared what court was to exercise jurisdiction under the previous Order in Council. This might now be done by a supplemental Order in Council. Accordingly, it is proposed to repeal all these Acts as Acts, but to leave them in force as if they were Orders in Council issued under the present Bill. A precedent for this course may be found in 37 & 38 Vict. c. 29 s. 3.

Sections 6 and 7 of the Pacific Islanders Protection Act 1875 (38 & 39 Vict. c. 51), are in much the same position, but as the powers given by section 6 were mostly to be exercised by Orders in Council, slightly different language is required.

(DESPATCH RESPECTING THE EXTRADITION BETWEEN HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF COLOMBIA AS TO.)

I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 28th of November, 1889 ("The London Gazette," 6th December, 1889—Extract), for giving effect to the Treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Colombia for the mutual extradition of Fugitive Criminals, signed at Bogotá on the 27th of October, 1888, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Bogotá on the 21st August, 1889.

The Treaty came into operation on the 16th of December, in conformity with Article XVIII.

WHEREAS by the "Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873," it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications, as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer.

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals. And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, 1888, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provisions of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer.

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Colombia, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following :—

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Colombia, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice, and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty, that is to say :

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, William John Dickson, Esquire, Her Minister Resident to the Republic of Colombia; and

His Excellency the President of the Republic of Colombia, Vicente Restrepo, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the said Republic;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :—

#### ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engaged to deliver up to each other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II, committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

#### ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences :—

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
2. Manslaughter.
3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.
4. Rape.
5. Unlawful carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age, if the evidence produced justifies complaint for those crimes according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties.
6. Indecent assault.
7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child-stealing.
8. Abduction.
9. Bigamy.
10. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
11. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
12. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
13. Perjury or subornation of perjury.
14. Arson.
15. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
16. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

17. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.

18.—(a.) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.

Su Excelencia el Presidente de la Republica de Colombia y Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, habiendo juzgado conveniente, para la mejor administración de justicia y para la prevención del crimen en los dos países y en sus jurisdicciones respectivas, que las personas acusadas ó convictas de los delitos que en seguida se enumeran y que se hallen huyendo de la justicia, sean entregadas reciprocamente en ciertas circunstancias, han nombrado Plenipotenciarios para concluir un Tratado, á saber :

Su Excelencia el Presidente de la Republica de Colombia, á Vicente Restrepo, Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores de la misma; y

Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, á William John Dickson, su Ministro Residente en la Republica de Colombia :

Quienes, despues de haberse comunicado sus respectivos plenos poderes y haberlos hallado en buena y debida forma, han convenido en los Artículos siguientes, y los han estipulado :—

#### ARTICULO I.

Las Altas Partes Contratantes se comprometen á entregarse reciprocamente, en las circunstancias y con las condiciones que en el presente Tratado se establecen, todas las personas que, siendo acusadas ó estando convictas de alguno de los delitos enumerados en el Artículo II, cometidos en el territorio de una de las Partes, se hallaren en el territorio de la otra Parte.

#### ARTICULO II.

La extradición se concederá reciprocamente para los siguientes delitos :—

1. Homicidio (incluyendo asesinato, parricidio, infanticidio, envenenamiento), ó tentativa ó conspiración para cometerlo.
2. Homicidio atenuado.
3. Administración de drogas ó uso de instrumentos con propósito de causar el aborto.
4. Violación ó forzamiento de mujer.
5. Ayuntamiento carnal ilegítimo ó tentativa para tenerlo con una niña de menos de 16 años de edad, si las pruebas que se produzcan justifican el enjuiciamiento por tales delitos conforme á las leyes de ambas Partes Contratantes.
6. Ultraje al pudor.
7. Secuestro de personas, retención ilegal robo de niños.
8. Rapto.
9. Bigamia.
10. Heridas ó lesiones corporales graves hechas con intención.
11. Asalto que ocasione daño corporal efectivo.
12. Amenazas, sea por cartas ó de cualquier otro modo, con propósito de estafar dinero ó otras cosas de valor.
13. Perjurio ó soborno de testigos.
14. Incendio voluntario.
15. Escalamiento ó forzamiento de habitación con intento criminal, robo ejecutado con violencia ó hurto.
16. Abuso de confianza ó defraudación por un depositario, banquero, agente, factor, administrador, director, miembro ó empleado público de una Compañía, que se haga criminal conforme á las leyes vigentes.
17. Estafa de dinero ó papel moneda, de prendas valiosas ó de mercancías con falsos pretextos; recibo de dinero ó papel moneda, de prendas valiosas ó de otras propiedades con conocimiento de que han sido robadas ó ilegalmente obtenidas.
18. (a.) Falsificación ó alteración de moneda ó papel moneda, ó circulación de moneda ó papel moneda falsos ó alterados.

(b) Forgery, or counterfeiting or altering or uttering what is forged, counterfeited, or altered.

(c) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin, or forgery of any paper money of the respective countries.

19. Crimes against Bankruptcy law.

20. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway.

21. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

22. Crimes committed at sea:—

(a) Piracy by the law of nations.

(b) Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

(c) Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

(d) Assault on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

23. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

#### ARTICLE III.

Either Government may, in its absolute discretion refuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or the person claimed on the part of the government of Colombia, has already been tried and discharged, or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of Colombia or in the United Kingdom respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or on the part of the Government of Colombia, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of Colombia or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

#### ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

#### ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

#### ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial, in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed *in contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

(b) Falsificación, imitación, alteración ó emisión de lo que ha sido falsificado, imitado ó alterado.

(c) Construcción, á sabiendas, sin autorización legal de instrumento, utensilio ó aparato adaptado y destinado á la fabricación de moneda falsa, ó á la falsificación de papel moneda de los dos países.

19. Delitos contra las leyes sobre bancarrota.

20. Toda acción maliciosa ejecutada con propósito de poner en peligro la seguridad de cualquiera persona que viaje en ferrocarril ó se halle sobre la línea férrea.

21. Daño malicioso á la propiedad, si el acto está erigido en delito.

22. Delitos que se cometan en el mar, á saber:—

(a) Piratería, calificada conforme al derecho de gentes.

(b) Hundimiento ó destrucción de un buque en el mar, ó tentativa y conspiración para ejecutar estos hechos.

(c) Sublevación ó conspiración para sublevarse, formada por dos ó más personas á bordo de un buque en alta mar contra la autoridad del capitán.

(d) Asalto á bordo de un buque en alta mar con propósito de quitar la vida ó hacer grave daño corporal.

23. Trata de esclavos ejecutada con las circunstancias que la constituyen delito conforme á las leyes de ambos Estados.

Asimismo se concede la extradición por la complicidad en cualquiera de los delitos antedichos, con tal de que esa complicidad sea punible conforme á las leyes de ambas Partes Contratantes.

La extradición puede también ser concedida á voluntad del Estado de quien se solicite respecto de cualquiera otro delito por el cual pueda otorgarse de acuerdo con las leyes vigentes de ambas Partes Contratantes.

#### ARTICULO III.

Cualquiera de los dos Gobiernos tendrá absoluta libertad para rehusar la entrega de sus propios súbditos al otro Gobierno.

#### ARTICULO IV.

La extradición no tendrá lugar si la persona reclamada de parte del Gobierno de Colombia ó de parte del de Su Majestad Británica ha sido ya juzgada y absuelta ó castigada, ó se halla todavía sometida á juicio en el Reino Unido ó en el territorio de Colombia respectivamente por el delito que motiva la demanda de extradición.

Si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno de Colombia, ó del de Su Majestad Británica, se hallare procesada por cualquier otro delito en el Reino Unido ó en el territorio de Colombia respectivamente, se diferirá su extradición hasta la conclusión del juicio y el pleno cumplimiento de cualquier castigo á que haya sido sentenciada.

#### ARTICULO V.

No tendrá lugar la extradición si, con posterioridad á la comisión del delito ó á la iniciación de la causa, ó á haberse declarado convicto el individuo, ha quedado éste, por el trascurso del tiempo, exento de enjuiciamiento ó de castigo, conforme á las leyes del Estado á quien se le reclama.

#### ARTICULO VI.

El criminal fugitivo no será entregado si el delito respecto del cual se pide su extradición tiene carácter político, ó si él prueba que la demanda para su entrega ha sido hecha positivamente con la mira de juzgarlo ó castigarlo por un delito de carácter político.

#### ARTICULO VII.

La persona que heya sido entregada por extradición no podrá en ningún caso ser mantenida en prisión ó sometida á juicio en el Estado á quien se ha hecho la entrega, por ningún otro delito ni en consideración á ninguna otra causa que aquellos por los cuales haya tenido lugar la extradición, á menos que haya sido restituida ó haya tenido oportunidad de volver al Estado que la entregó.

Esta estipulación no es aplicable á los delitos cometidos después de la extradición.

#### ARTICULO VIII.

La demanda para la extradición se hace por medio de los Agentes Diplomáticos de las Altas Partes Contratantes respectivamente.

La demanda para la extradición de un acusado debe ir acompañada de la orden de arresto expedida por la autoridad competente del Estado que exija la extradición, y de aquellas pruebas que, conforme á las leyes del lugar donde se encuentre el acusado, hubieran de justificar su aprehensión si el delito hubiese sido cometido allí.

Si la demanda se refiere á un reo rematado, debe ir acompañada del fallo condenatorio dictado contra la persona convicta por el tribunal competente del Estado que hace la demanda de extradición.

La sentencia dictada *in contumaciam* no se considerará como fallo condenatorio; pero la persona sentenciado de esta manera pueda tratarse como cualquier individuo acusado.

## ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

## ARTICLE X.

A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed, or the person convicted, in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction; provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in Colombia as in the United Kingdom, if, within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country, in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty.

The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

## ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

## ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating, the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating, the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by law where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

## ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

## ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

## ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

## ARTICULO IX.

Si la demanda de extradición estuviere de acuerdo con las anteriores estipulaciones, la autoridad competente de Estado al cual se dirija ésta, procederá a la aprehensión del prófugo.

## ARTICULO X.

Un criminal fugitivo puede ser aprehendido por orden expedida por cualquier magistrado de policía, juez de paz, u otra autoridad competente en ambos países, por informes ó quejas, y por pruebas, ó después de procedimientos que, en opinión de la autoridad que dió la orden, justificarían la expedición de ésta, si el delito hubiese sido cometido ó el criminal condenado en aquella parte del territorio de los dos países contratantes en la cual el magistrado, el juez, u otra autoridad competente ejerzan jurisdicción; con tal, sin embargo, que en ese caso, en el Reino Unido el acusado sea enviado con la brevedad posible á un magistrado de policía en Londres. De acuerdo con este Artículo, el acusado será puesto en libertad, tanto en Colombia como en el Reino Unido, si en el término de treinta días no se solicitare su extradición por el Agente Diplomático de su país conforme á las estipulaciones de este Tratado.

La misma regla se aplicará en los casos de personas acusadas ó convictas de los delitos especificados en este Tratado, y cometidos en alta mar, á bordo de algún buque de cualquiera de los dos Estados que llegue á un puerto del otro.

## ARTICULO XI.

La extradición solo tendrá lugar si las pruebas fueren suficientes conforme á las leyes del Estado de quien se solicita, bien sea para justificar el sometimiento del procesado á juicio, bien que el delito haya sido cometido en el territorio del mismo Estado, ó bien para probar que el reo es la misma persona sentenciada por los Tribunales del Estado que hace la demanda, y que el delito de que ha sido convicta es de aquellos respecto de los cuales podría haber sido concedida la extradición al tiempo de la sentencia, por el Estado de quien se solicita. Ningun criminal será entregado antes de haber trascurrido quince días desde la fecha en que fué reducido á prisión en espera de la orden de entrega.

## ARTICULO XII.

En la investigación que hayan de hacer, conforme á las anteriores estipulaciones, las autoridades del Estado demandado admitirán como pruebas las declaraciones juradas ó las deposiciones de testigos tomadas en el otro Estado, ó sus copias, así como también los autos y sentencias producidos allí, y los certificados que acrediten el hecho de la condenación, ó los documentos judiciales que la establezcan, con tal de que tales piezas se hallen autenticadas como sigue:—

1. Toda orden debe llevar la firma de un Juez, Magistrado, ó agente público del otro Estado.

2. Las declaraciones ó atestaciones ó sus copias deben ser certificadas de puño y letra del Juez, Magistrado, ó agente público del otro Estado, con expresión de que son declaraciones originales, ó sus copias fieles según el caso.

3. Todo certificado de condenación, ó todo documento judicial en que conste el fallo condenatorio, debe ser certificado por un Juez, Magistrado, ó agente público del otro Estado.

4. En cada caso, la orden, declaración atestación, copia, certificado, ó documento judicial, debe ser autenticado, ora por el juramento de algún testigo, ora por el sello oficial del Ministro de Justicia ó de algún otro Ministro del otro Estado; pero cualquiera otro modo de autenticación permitido por las leyes vigentes al tiempo de la investigación puede sustituirse por el anterior.

## ARTICULO XIII.

Si el individuo reclamado por una de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes conforme al presente Tratado fuere asimismo reclamado por otro ó otros Gobiernos, con motivo de otros delitos cometidos en sus respectivos territorios, la extradición se concederá al que primero haya hecho la demanda.

## ARTICULO XIV.

Si dentro de dos meses contados desde la fecha de la aprehensión del prófugo no se hubieren producido pruebas suficientes, ó dentro de la prórroga que ordene el Estado de quien se solicita la extradición ó el Tribunal competente de él, entónces el detenido será puesto en libertad.

## ARTICULO XV.

Todos los bienes embargados al tiempo de su aprehensión al individuo reclamado se entregarán también cuando tenga lugar la extradición, si la autoridad competente del Estado de que ésta se solicita lo ordenare; y la entrega no sólo se extenderá á los objetos robados, sino también á todos aquellos que puedan servir como prueba del delito.



## ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

## ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by the chief Consular officer of the Republic of Colombia in such Colony or possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Colombian criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

## ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

The Treaty, after receiving the approval of the Congress of Colombia, shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Bogotá as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto their respective seals.

Done at Bogotá, this twenty-seventh day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged at Bogotá on the twenty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Colombia, and of the said Treaty with the President of the Republic of Colombia.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the Republic of Colombia and to the said Treaty, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.

## ARTICULO XVI.

Todos los gastos relacionados con la extradición serán de cargo del Estado que la solicitare.

## ARTICULO XVII.

Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables á las Colonias y á las posesiones extranjeras de Su Majestad Británica, hasta donde lo permitan las leyes vigentes en tales colonias y en tales posesiones extranjeras respectivamente.

La demanda para la entrega de un reo prófugo que se haya refugiado en alguna de tales Colonias ó posesiones extranjeras, se dirigirá al Gobernador ó á la autoridad principal de la Colonia ó posesión por el principal empleado Consular de la República de Colombia residente en ella.

Tal demanda pueda resolverse por dicho Gobernador ó por la principal autoridad, quienes quedan en libertad de conceder la extradición ó referir el asunto á su Gobierno, sujetándose hasta donde sea posible, á este Tratado en cuanto las leyes de la Colonia ó de la posesión extranjera lo permitan.

Su Majestad Británica queda, sin embargo, en la libertad de hacer arreglos especiales en las Colonias Británicas y en las posesiones extranjeras para la entrega de criminales Colombianos que se refugien en tales Colonias ó posesiones extranjeras, sobre la base de la disposiciones de este Tratado, en cuanto sea posible y hasta donde lo permitan las leyes de tal Colonia ó posesión extranjera.

Las demandas para la extradición de un reo prófugo procedentes de alguna Colonia ó posesión extranjera de Su Majestad Británica se ajustarán á las reglas establecidas en los Artículos anteriores del presente Tratado.

## ARTICULO XVIII.

El presente Tratado empezará á regir diez dias después de su publicación, en consonancia con las formalidades prescrita por las leyes de las Altas Partes Contratantes; y puede suspenderse por cualquiera de ellas, dando aviso á la otra dentro de un plazo que no exceda de un año ni sea menor de seis meses.

Este Tratado se ratificará después de su aprobación por el Congreso de Colombia, y las ratificaciones se canjearán en Bogotá, en el mas breve término posible.

En fe de lo cual los respectivos Plenipotenciarios firman el presente, y ponen sus sellos particulares.

(DESPATCH RESPECTING CONVENTION BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AS TO THE EXTRADITION OF)

I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 21st of March, 1890, giving effect to the Convention between Her Majesty and the United States of America, with respect to the mutual extradition of Fugitive Criminals, signed at Washington, on the 12th of July, 1889, the ratifications of which were exchanged at London, on the 11th of March, 1890.

It will be observed that the Convention came into operation on the 4th instant, in conformity with Article IX.

## ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Extradition between Great Britain and the United States.  
Windsor, 21st March, 1890.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things, enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof

subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886, should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Convention was concluded on the twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, between Her Majesty and the United States of America, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Convention is in the terms following:—

"Whereas by the Xth Article of the Treaty concluded between Her Britannic Majesty and the United States of America, on the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, provision is made for the extradition of persons charged with certain crimes;

"And whereas it is now desired by the High Contracting Parties that the provisions of the said Article should embrace certain crimes not therein specified, and should extend to fugitives convicted of the crimes specified in the said Article and in this Convention;

"The said High Contracting Parties have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Convention for this purpose, that is to say:—

"Her Majesty, the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; Sir Julian Pauncefote, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of Her Britannic Majesty to the United States;

"And the President of the United States of America, James G. Blaine, Secretary of State of the United States;

"Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

"ARTICLE I.

"The provisions of the Xth Article are hereby made applicable to the following additional crimes:—

- "1. Manslaughter when voluntary.
- "2. Counterfeiting or altering money; uttering or bringing into circulation counterfeit or altered money.
- "3. Embezzlement; larceny; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been embezzled, stolen, or fraudulently obtained.
- "4. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director or member or officer of any Company, made criminal by the laws of both countries.
- "5. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
- "6. Rape; abduction; child-stealing; kidnapping.
- "7. Burglary; housebreaking or shopbreaking.
- "8. Piracy by the law of nations.
- "9. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas, against the authority of the master; wrongfully sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting to do so; assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to do grievous bodily harm.
- "10. Crimes and offences against the laws of both countries for the suppression of slavery and slave trading.

"Extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the crimes mentioned in this Convention or in the aforesaid Xth Article, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both countries.

"ARTICLE II.

"A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered, if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded be one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

"No person surrendered by either of the High Contracting Parties to the other shall be triable or tried, or be punished for any political crime or offence, or for any act connected therewith, committed previously to his extradition.

"If any question shall arise as to whether a case comes within the provisions of this Article, the decision of the authorities of the Government in whose jurisdiction the fugitive shall be at the time shall be final.

"ARTICLE III.

"No person surrendered by or to either of the High Contracting Parties shall be triable or be tried for any crime or offence committed prior to his extradition, other than the offence for which he was surrendered, until he shall have had an opportunity of returning to the country from which he was surrendered.

"ARTICLE IV.

"All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, whether being the proceeds of the crime or offence charged, or being material as evidence in making proof of the crime or offence, shall, so far as practicable, and if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place. Nevertheless, the rights of third parties with regard to the articles aforesaid shall be duly respected.

"ARTICLE V.

"If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties, in pursuance of the present Convention, should also be claimed by one or several other Powers on account of crimes or offences committed within their respective jurisdictions, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is first received.

"The provisions of this Article, and also of Articles II to IV inclusive, of the present Convention, shall apply to surrender for offences specified in the aforesaid Xth Article, as well as to surrender for offences specified in this Convention.

"ARTICLE VI.

"The extradition of fugitives under the provisions of this Convention and of the said Xth Article shall be carried out in Her Majesty's dominions and in the United States, respectively, in conformity with the laws regulating extradition for the time being in force in the surrendering State.

"ARTICLE VII.

"The provisions of the said Xth Article and of this Convention shall apply to persons convicted of the crimes therein respectively named and specified, whose sentence therefor shall not have been executed.

"In case of a fugitive criminal alleged to have been convicted of the crime for which his surrender is asked, a copy of the record of the conviction, and of the sentence of the Court before which such conviction took place, duly authenticated, shall be produced, together with the evidence proving that the prisoner is the person to whom such sentence refers.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"The present Convention shall not apply to any of the crimes herein specified which shall have been committed, or to any conviction which shall have been pronounced, prior to the date at which the Convention shall come into force.

"ARTICLE IX.

"This Convention, shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

"It shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties, and shall continue in force until one or the other of the High Contracting Parties shall signify its wish to terminate it, and no longer.

"In witness whereof, the undersigned have signed the same, and have affixed thereto their seals.

"Done in duplicate, at the city of Washington, this twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

"(U.S.) JULIAN PAUNCEFOTE.  
"(U.S.) JAMES G. BLAINE."

And whereas the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged at London, on the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the United States of America, and of the said Convention with the United States of America.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada, as far as relates to the United States of America and to the said Convention, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.

I have the honor to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 1st day of May, 1890 (extract from the *London Gazette* of 6th May, 1890), for carrying into effect an arrangement concluded on the 31st of December, 1889, between the Government of Her Majesty and the Government of the French Republic acting in the name of His Highness the Bey of Tunis, for extending to Tunis the provisions of the Treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the French Republic, dated the 14th of August, 1876, for the mutual extradition of fugitive Criminals.

You will observe that the extension of the Treaty to Tunis came into operation on the 16th instant.

## ORDER IN COUNCIL.

## EXTRADITION TREATY: GREAT BRITAIN, FRANCE, AND TUNIS.

*Windsor, 1st May, 1890.*

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, between Her Majesty and the President of the French Republic, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, in the case of which Treaty the abovementioned Acts of Parliament were applied by an Order in Council of the sixteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight:

And whereas an arrangement was concluded on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, between the Government of Her Majesty and the Government of the French Republic, acting in the name of the Government of His Highness the Bey of Tunis, for extending the provisions of the said Treaty of 14th August, 1876, to Tunis, which arrangement is in the terms following:—

"THE Government of Her Britannic Majesty on the one part, and the Government of the French Republic, acting in the name of the Government of His Highness the Bey of Tunis, on the other part, with a view to insure as far as possible the arrest and delivery to the competent jurisdiction of criminals who seek to escape by flight from the action of justice, have agreed as follows:—

"The provisions of the Anglo-French Convention of the fourteenth August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, are extended to Tunis, except that the period of fourteen days, stipulated by Article IX of the said Convention, is prolonged to two months.

"The present arrangement shall have the same duration as the Convention of Extradition to which it relates.

"In witness whereof the undersigned His Excellency the Earl of Lytton, Her Britannic Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, and His Excellency M. Spuller, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the French Republic, have prepared the present arrangement, and have affixed thereto their seals.

"Done at Paris, the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

"Le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique d'une part et le Gouvernement de la République Française, agissant au nom du Gouvernement de Son Altesse le Bey de Tunis, de l'autre, en vue d'assurer autant que possible l'arrestation et la remise à la juridiction compétente des malfaiteurs qui cherchent à se soustraire par la fuite à l'action de la justice, sont convenus de ce qui suit:—

"Les dispositions de la Convention Franco-Anglaise du 14 Août, 1876, sont étendues à la Tunisie, sauf que le délai de quatorze jours stipulé par l'Article IX de la dite Convention est porté à deux mois.

"Le présent arrangement aura la même durée que la Convention d'Extradition à laquelle il se rapporte.

"En foi de quoi les Soussignés, son Excellence le Comte de Lytton, Ambassadeur de Sa Majesté Britannique à Paris, et son Excellence M. Spuller, Ministre des Affaires Etrangères de la République Française, ont dressé le présent arrangement, et y ont apposé leurs cachets.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Tunis in conformity with the said arrangement with the French Republic.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to Tunis and to the said arrangement, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.

## EXTRADITION AND FUGITIVE OFFENDERS.

## MEMORANDUM.

I. The return of fugitive criminals escaping from the United Kingdom may be obtained—

- (a.) from foreign countries with which there are Extradition Treaties.
- (b.) from British possessions.
- (c.) from foreign countries in which the Queen has jurisdiction, and to which the Fugitive Offenders Act has been applied by Order in Council as if they were British possessions.

The surrender of fugitives taking refuge in the United Kingdom is granted reciprocally in each of these cases.

The procedure is governed in the first case by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873 (33 and 34 Vict. c. 52, 36 and 37 Vic. c. 60.), and by the terms of the Extradition Treaty in force with each country :

In case (b) by the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881 (44 and 45 Vic. c. 69.) :

In case (c) by the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, and the Orders in Council applying it. In this case only British subjects and persons subject to the Queen's jurisdiction in the foreign country in question can be dealt with.

There have been a few cases in which a foreign country with which Great Britain has no extradition treaty has surrendered a criminal as an act of international comity : but there can be no reciprocal surrender of criminals by Her Majesty's Government in the absence of an extradition treaty.

Where a fugitive criminal charged with a serious crime has escaped to a country with which there is no treaty, Her Majesty's Government will generally be prepared to inquire whether his surrender can be granted, if they are satisfied that the indemnity and evidence required in extradition cases (para. IV.) will be furnished, and that, in the event of his surrender, it is intended to proceed with the prosecution.

## EXTRADITION.—FUGITIVES FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM.

*Cases in which Extradition can be applied for.*

II. When a person charged with crime in the United Kingdom is believed to have fled to a foreign country, the questions to be considered before an application for extradition is made are—

- (1.) Whether the country to which he has fled is one with which there is an Extradition Treaty.  
A list of the Extradition Treaties now in force (31st March, 1890) is given in Appendix A.
- (2.) Whether the crime with which he is charged is an extradition offence, and one included in the particular treaty.  
A list of the extradition offences, showing the treaties in which each is included, is given in Appendix C.
- (3.) Whether the offender is a subject or citizen of the country to which he has fled.

Most Extradition Treaties provide that neither of the contracting parties may surrender its own subjects. The Treaties with the United States, containing no reference to nationality, extend to the subjects of each country equally with other fugitive criminals. The Treaties with Austria, Belgium (as amended by declaration), Russia, Mexico, and Colombia, allow each Government the option of surrendering at discretion its own subjects. The Treaties with Spain, Switzerland, and Luxemburg exclude the surrender of their own subjects by the Governments of Spain, Switzerland, and Luxemburg, but stipulate for the surrender of British subjects by Her Majesty's Government. In the Treaty with Ecuador there is no express exclusion from extradition of the subjects or citizens of either contracting party, though it contains a provision to the effect that naturalization is not to be a bar to extradition. In all the other Treaties the surrender of subjects by either party is expressly excluded.

*Application for Extradition addressed to Secretary of State.*

III. The application for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from a foreign country must be addressed by the prosecutor or the police to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, who will communicate through the Foreign Office and the proper diplomatic channels with the authorities of the place where the fugitive is supposed to be.

The chief officers of English police forces may communicate direct with the police of foreign countries for the purpose of giving or obtaining information, but under no circumstances should direct application be made to foreign police for the arrest of a fugitive. Serious difficulties have arisen in cases where this direction has been overlooked.

Where the apprehension of the fugitive is a matter of urgency, the Secretary of State will apply by telegram for his provisional arrest in anticipation of the formal demand for surrender.

*Particulars and Documents to accompany application.*

IV. The application to the Secretary of State should be made by letter, stating briefly the facts of the case, and giving in detail the information as to the fugitive's supposed whereabouts and the means of tracing and identifying him. It must be accompanied by—

- (a.) The warrant of arrest or a certified copy of it.
- (b.) The other documents to be used in support of the demand for extradition. (See para. V.)
- (c.) A description of the accused sufficient for purposes of identification, with, if possible, a photograph. (It is usually advisable that the description should form part of the formal evidence.)
- (d.) An indemnity for expenses. (See para. VIII.)

The letter should also state whether it is desired that the provisional arrest of the fugitive should be asked for by telegram.

In cases of urgency, if the information or depositions required to support the demand for extradition have not been completed, it will sometimes be sufficient, in order to obtain the provisional arrest of the fugitive, to furnish in the first instance only a warrant of arrest and the indemnity for expenses, provided an explicit undertaking be given to complete the informations and other documents, and forward them with the least possible delay.

*Documents.—Warrant, Informations, &c.*

V. A warrant for the arrest of the fugitive on the charge for which his extradition is sought, or a certified copy of it, must in every case form part of the documents to be used in support of the demand. As regards the other documents, the requirements of different treaties vary somewhat. In the case of France and some other countries, it suffices if the warrant is accompanied by an information showing exactly the nature of the offence charged, and by sufficient evidence of the identity of the person arrested. In most cases, however, informations or depositions containing *prima facie* evidence of the commission by the fugitive of the offence charged—such as in this country would justify committal for trial—are required.

The requirements of the various Treaties with regard to the documents to be furnished are quoted in Appendix D.

*Documents.—Special requirements as to Warrants, Informations, &c.*

VI. It is necessary that the utmost care should be taken in extradition cases to secure that the documents—warrant, informations, and depositions—are correct in form, and that the evidence is complete in material points. Several cases have occurred in which, after a fugitive criminal has been apprehended in a foreign country, inaccuracies in the warrant or defects in the evidence have led to his being set at liberty before steps could be taken to remedy the mistakes.

Where the flight of the accused is not known until after the warrant has been issued, and especially where an information is hastily laid in order to obtain his immediate arrest, it is in many cases advisable to issue a fresh warrant, on an amended information, before applying to a foreign country for his surrender.

The offence stated in the warrant should be set forth in the terms of the Treaty.

If copies of the informations or depositions are sent instead of the originals (as is usually the more convenient course, fresh copies of these documents being often required when the demand for extradition has to be made to several countries successively), the copies should be authenticated by a magistrate,—if possible by the magistrate by whom the originals were issued or taken.

In the case of extradition from the United States special care should be taken to have the evidence complete from the first.

*Application*



*Application for Extradition on several charges.*

VII. Where there are several charges against the fugitive, there should be evidence in the informations or depositions with regard to every charge on which it is proposed that he should be tried after his surrender. After his surrender he cannot be tried on any other charge than the charge or charges on which he was extradited, unless he is restored, or an opportunity given him of returning, to the country from which he was surrendered.

*Indemnity for Expenses.*

VIII. The indemnity for expenses, which is required in all cases except those undertaken by the Director of Public Prosecutions, must be in the form given in Appendix E, and must be signed by the prosecutor. It need not be stamped.

In the case of most Extradition Treaties (all those now in force, except the Treaties with the United States, Russia, Mexico, and Colombia) the foreign Government bears all the expenses which it incurs within its own territories. All expenses not so defrayed by the foreign Government, and not payable as police expenses under the ordinary regulations, must be borne by the prosecutor.

*English Police Officers sent abroad in connection with Extradition cases.*

IX. It is sometimes considered desirable, when an application for extradition is made, that an English police officer should be sent out to assist the foreign police in tracing and identifying the accused.

When this is done the officer should take with him a letter of introduction, which he may present as occasion requires to British ministers or consuls abroad. He should attend for this purpose at the Home Office, with an introduction from the chief officer of his force; or, if it is not convenient that he should attend personally, the chief officer should apply to the Home Office by letter stating the name and rank of the officer about to be sent out. It is also generally advisable that he should be provided with a passport.

He should, where possible, see the warrant and depositions signed, as cases have occurred where his evidence to this effect has removed difficulties.

An officer sent abroad in an extradition case must confine his action strictly to tracing the fugitive, and furnishing the foreign police with information. Under no circumstances may he himself attempt to arrest the fugitive, interfere in any way with his liberty in a foreign country, or endeavour by threats or undue pressure to induce him to return to England without awaiting the formalities of extradition. If a fugitive whose extradition has been demanded should voluntarily consent to return with the officer without formal extradition, the concurrence of the authorities of the foreign country must be obtained before this course is taken.

*Further Evidence.*

X. After the fugitive has been arrested, further evidence is sometimes required by the courts of the foreign country, which must be supplied by the prosecutors. Occasionally the attendance of a witness is required to prove the identity of the person arrested.

*Conveyance of Prisoner to England.*

XI. When the decision of the Government of the foreign country to concede the surrender of the fugitive is notified, the conveyance of the prisoner to England is a matter of arrangement between the police of the two countries, and should be carried out with as little delay as possible. The Metropolitan Police have standing arrangements with the police of most continental countries with regard to the conveyance of extradition prisoners.

In United States cases it is necessary to send out an officer to bring the prisoner, if surrendered, to England; and it is usually convenient that he should be sent out as soon as information is received of the arrest of the fugitive, as the presence of an experienced officer who can furnish the United States courts with information they may require is found in some cases to facilitate proceedings.

In the case of extraditions from Spain an officer is usually sent out when the demand for extradition is made.

*United States cases.*

XII. Information as to the extradition proceedings in the United States, and as to the particulars required by the United States courts when an arrest on a charge of forgery is applied for by telegram, are given in the papers reprinted in Appendix G.

## EXTRADITION—FUGITIVES FROM FOREIGN COUNTRIES IN THE UNITED KINGDOM.

XIII. For the arrest of a foreign criminal in the United Kingdom, two alternative procedures are provided in sub-section (1) and sub-section (2) respectively of section 8 of the Extradition Act, 1870.

*Arrest after formal requisition.*

XIV. The first—that under sub-section (1)—is adopted in cases where the arrest of the fugitive is not urgent.

A requisition for the surrender of the accused, supported by the warrant of arrest and documentary evidence, is addressed by the representative of the foreign Government to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and transmitted by him to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, who thereupon makes an order to the Chief Magistrate at Bow-street Police Court, requiring him, if satisfied as to the sufficiency of the evidence, to issue his warrant for the arrest of the fugitive. The Chief Magistrate's warrant is effective without endorsement throughout the United Kingdom (and also in the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man), and is usually executed by an officer of the Metropolitan Police, who brings the prisoner direct to Bow-street, where all the subsequent proceedings take place.

*Provisional arrest.*

XV. The alternative procedure, under sub-section (2), is adopted in cases where the arrest of the fugitive is a matter of urgency. In this case any police magistrate or justice of the peace in the United Kingdom\* may issue the warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive "on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would in the opinion of the person issuing the warrant justify the issue of a warrant, if the crime had been committed in that part of the United Kingdom in which he exercises jurisdiction."

In practice, a sworn information showing a reasonable suspicion of the commission of the crime and of the guilt of the alleged offender is required before the issue of a warrant under sub-section (2). This information may, according to the opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown (Sir Richard Baggallay and Sir John Holker, 25th March, 1875), and the practice of the Bow-street Police Court,† be based upon a letter or telegram purporting to be from a diplomatic, judicial, or police authority, stating—

- (a.) The alleged offence;
- (b.) That a warrant has been granted for the apprehension of the alleged criminal;
- (c.) That his extradition will be demanded.

The letter or telegram should in every case clearly specify the offence with which the fugitive is charged (which must be one within the Treaty with the country from which he is alleged to have fled), and must state in distinct terms that a formal request for extradition will be preferred.

\* In Scotland, any sheriff, sheriff's substitute, or magistrate.

† See also the remarks of Jessel, M.R., in *Reg. v. Well*, 16 Cox. C.C. 193. "All that the Act requires is that the evidence should be sufficient 'in the opinion of the person issuing the warrant.' That is a matter of judicial discretion. There must be some evidence but very little will do, for it is merely for the purpose of detaining the man."

There is no restriction in the Act as to the person by whom the information is to be laid, and it may, where necessary, be laid by a police officer; but, as a rule, it is desirable that the information should be laid before the magistrate or justice by the consul or other accredited agent of the foreign Government, who should also produce the despatch, letter, or telegram on which the information is founded. A copy of the form of information in use at Bow-street is printed in Appendix F.

On the issue of the warrant of arrest under sub-section (2), the Justice forthwith sends to the Secretary of State "a report of the fact of such issue, together with the evidence and information or complaint, or certified copies thereof."

On the arrest of a fugitive by a warrant under sub-section (2), if the warrant was issued at Bow-street, the prisoner is at once brought to that court; if the warrant is issued elsewhere, the prisoner is brought before the justice who issued the warrant, or some other justice having power to issue such warrant, who immediately orders him to be brought before a police magistrate at Bow-street.

The evidence of the officer making the arrest is required in the examination at Bow-street. It is therefore usual, when the arrest has been made elsewhere than in London, that the officer who made the arrest should bring up the prisoner to London and attend with him at Bow-street.

See the remarks of Brett J. in *ex parte Terraz & Ex. D. 63, 42 L. J., Ex. 214.*

XVI. The arrest of an offender with a view to extradition should not take place without a warrant under section 8 of the Extradition Act, save in the most urgent and exceptional cases, and should then be guided by the ordinary law of arrest. If a person has been arrested without warrant, a warrant under section 8 (2) should be obtained as quickly as possible. *Reg. v. Weil, 15 Cox, C.C., 193.*

#### *Proceedings at Bow-street Police Court.*

XVII. After the prisoner is brought to Bow-street, the subsequent proceedings take place in that Court, in accordance with the requirements of the Extradition Acts and of the several Treaties. If the prisoner is committed for surrender, a period of fifteen days is allowed him in which he may apply to the High Court for a writ of Habeas Corpus. If he makes no application, or if the application is made and refused, the Secretary of State issues his warrant for the surrender of the prisoner, and he is handed over by the Metropolitan Police to the officers of the Government demanding his surrender, either at an English or a foreign port according to the arrangement in force with the different countries.

#### *Extradition of Convicted Offenders*

XVIII. The proceedings for the arrest of an offender convicted in a foreign country and escaping to England are the same as those in the case of an accused person. The only difference is as to the nature of the evidence required in the hearing of the case at Bow-st.

#### *Crimes committed at Sea.*

33 & 34 Vic. c. 52 s. 10.

XIX. In cases of crimes committed on foreign vessels on the high seas, when the vessel comes into a British port, and the surrender of the criminal is sought, the stipendiary magistrate\* having jurisdiction in, or in the place nearest to, the port, exercises the powers which in other cases are exercised by the chief magistrate at Bow-street. The Secretary of State directs to him the order made under section 7; the accused, if provisionally arrested, is brought before him. He hears the case with the same powers as the chief magistrate, and commits the prisoner for extradition. His warrant, however, is not effective without endorsement beyond his ordinary jurisdiction.

#### *Expenses.*

XX. The Governments of the United States, Russia, Mexico, and Colombia, under the terms of the treaties with these countries, defray all expenses incurred in connection with cases in which they demand the extradition of fugitives. In the case of all other countries, expenses incurred within the United Kingdom are defrayed by the English Government, those incurred outside the British territories are borne by the foreign Government.

The accounts for the expense incurred in each extradition case are submitted by the Metropolitan Police to the Secretary of State, who claims from the Treasury and foreign Government the sums payable by each respectively. Where a person whose extradition is claimed is arrested by provincial police, the expenses incurred in connection with the arrest, including the conveyance of the prisoner to London, and the attendance of the officer at Bow-street, should be reclaimed from the Metropolitan Police, who will include them in the accounts submitted to the Secretary of State.

#### FUGITIVE OFFENDERS ACT, 1881.—FUGITIVES FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM.

44 & 45 Vic. c. 69 s. 2.

XXI. When a person who has committed a crime in the United Kingdom has fled to any British possession (*i.e.* to any part of Her Majesty's dominions exclusive of the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man), his surrender can be obtained, if the offence he has committed be treason or piracy, or any offence for the time being punishable in the United Kingdom by imprisonment with hard labour for a term of twelve months or more, or by any greater punishment.

No question of nationality arises in this case.

#### *Application for Surrender.*

XXII. The application for the surrender of a fugitive from a British possession should be addressed by the prosecutor or the police to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, who will communicate through the Colonial Office with the Governor of the British possession where the fugitive is supposed to be.

The Fugitive Offenders Act does not exclude direct applications by the prosecutor to the authorities of the British possession. The arrest of a fugitive (section 3) may be made on a warrant endorsed by a Judge of a Superior Court, or by the Governor of the British possession; and, by section 4, in cases of urgency, a magistrate in the place to which the offender is supposed to have fled, may issue a warrant for his apprehension, "on such information and under such circumstances as would in his opinion justify the issue of a warrant if the offence of which the fugitive is accused had been committed within his jurisdiction." Direct applications by the prosecutors or the police are, however, found to be attended with difficulties, as the colonial authorities usually refuse to take proceedings on applications from private persons, especially in the case of telegrams where they have no guarantee as to their genuineness, and no assurance that the expenses they may incur will be repaid. The practice is therefore that all applications are made through the Home Office and Colonial Office, and in cases of urgency a telegram asking for the provisional arrest of the fugitive is sent by the Colonial Office at the request of the Secretary of State for the Home Department.

#### *Particulars and Documents to Accompany Application.*

XXIII. The application to the Secretary of State should be made by letter, stating briefly the facts of the case, and given in detail the information as to the fugitive's supposed whereabouts, and the means of tracing and identifying him. It must be accompanied by—

- (a.) The warrant of arrest in duplicate;
- (b.) The documents (depositions, &c.) containing the evidence on which the surrender of the fugitive is claimed, with certified copies of the same (see para. XXIV.);
- (c.) A description of the accused sufficient for purposes of identification, with, if possible, a photograph. (It is usually advisable that the description should form part of the formal evidence).
- (d.) An indemnity for expenses (see para. XXVII.).

The letter should also state whether it is desired that the provisional arrest of the fugitive should be asked for by telegram.

In cases of urgency, if the depositions, &c., required to support the demand for extradition have not been completed, it will usually be sufficient in order to obtain the provisional arrest of the fugitive, to furnish in the first instance a warrant of arrest and the indemnity for expenses, an explicit undertaking being given to complete the depositions and other documents and forward them with the least possible delay.

*Documents*

\* In Scotland, the sheriff or sheriff-substitute.

*Documents sent in duplicate.*

XXIV. The warrant, informations, and depositions are sent to the Home Office in duplicate, in order the two complete sets of documents may be authenticated with the Secretary of State's seal. One set (including the original depositions) is then returned, in order that if a police officer is sent out in connexion with the application, he may take them with him; the other set (which includes the copies) is despatched to the Governor, through the Colonial Office, to support the official request for the surrender. 41 & 45 Vict. c. 69, s. 29.

*Requirements as to Warrant, Informations, and Depositions.*

XXV. It is necessary that the utmost care should be taken in cases under the Fugitive Offenders Act to secure that the documents—warrant, informations, and depositions—are correct in form, and that the evidence is complete in material points. Cases have occurred in which after a fugitive criminal has been apprehended, inaccuracies in the warrant or defects in the evidence have led to his being set at liberty before steps could be taken to remedy the mistakes.

(a.) The evidence supporting the demand for the surrender of a fugitive must be such as "according to law ordinarily administered by the magistrate" before whom he is brought, "raises a strong or probable presumption that the fugitive committed the offence mentioned in the warrant," that is, generally speaking, there must be informations or depositions containing such *prima facie* evidence of the commission of the offences charged as in this country would justify committal for trial. 44 & 45 Vict. c. 69, s. 5.

(b.) Evidence necessary for the identification of the fugitive as the person named in the depositions must be furnished.

(c.) There should be a distinct allegation in the evidence, and, if possible, the warrant should also show on the face of it that the offence is one punishable in the United Kingdom, either on indictment or information, by imprisonment with hard labour for a term of 12 months or more, or by some greater punishment. Home Office Circular of 14 Dec. 1883.

Where the flight of the accused is not known until after the warrant has been issued, and especially where an information is hastily laid in order to obtain his immediate arrest, it is in many cases advisable to issue a fresh warrant, on an amended information, before applying for his surrender from a British possession. Home Office Circular of 2 Feb 1886.

Depositions, may for the purpose of the Fugitive Offenders Act, be taken in the absence of the accused. 44 & 45 Vict. c. 69, s. 29.

The copies of informations or depositions should, if possible, be authenticated by the magistrate by whom the originals were taken.

*Application for surrender on several charges.*

XXVI. Where there are several charges against the fugitive, there should be evidence in the informations or depositions with regard to every charge on which it is proposed that he should be tried after his surrender.

*Indemnity for Expenses.*

XXVII. The indemnity for expenses which is required in all cases, except those undertaken by the Director of Public Prosecutions, must be in the form in Appendix E, and must be signed by the prosecutor. It need not be stamped.

The whole of the expenses incurred, including the cost of telegrams and the expense of sending out an officer to bring home the prisoner, must be borne by the prosecutor.

*English Police Officers sent out to British Possessions.*

XXVIII. It is sometimes considered desirable when an application is made under the Fugitive Offenders Act that an English police officer should be sent out to assist in tracing and identifying the accused.

When this course is taken the Home Office should be informed of the name of the officer, and of the date of his intended departure, in order that the colonial authorities may be informed officially through the Colonial Office.

The officer sent out should, if possible, see the warrant and depositions signed, as his evidence to this effect sometimes removes difficulties. In any case he will take with him the warrant and original depositions, as mentioned in part XXIV.

*Further Evidence.*

XXIX. After the fugitive has been arrested, further evidence is sometimes required by the courts of the British possession, which must be supplied by the prosecutors.

Occasionally the attendance of a witness is required to prove the identity of the person arrested. If the evidence of identity can be given by a police officer, his services will also be available for the purpose of bring home the prisoner (para. XXX).

*Conveyance of Prisoner to England.*

XXX. When the decision of the courts of the British possession to concede the surrender of the fugitive is notified, the conveyance of the prisoner to England is matter of arrangement between the police of the two countries. In practice the prisoner is almost invariably brought home by an English officer. If an officer has not already been sent out to trace the fugitive, one is usually sent as soon as the arrest is notified by telegram, as his evidence (see para. XXVIII. and XXIX) sometimes facilitates the proceedings in the courts, and his presence in the British possession prevents delay in bringing back the prisoner if his surrender is granted. The prisoner can claim his release if not removed from the British possession within one month after his committal, unless sufficient cause can be shown to the contrary. 44 & 45 Vict. c. 69, s. 7.

## FUGITIVE OFFENDERS ACT, 1881.—FUGITIVES FROM BRITISH POSSESSIONS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM.

XXXI. For the arrest of a fugitive from a British possession in the United Kingdom, two alternative procedures are provided:—

(a.) Apprehension under an endorsed warrant (section 3).

(b.) Apprehension under a provisional warrant (section 4).

*Apprehension on Endorsed Warrant.*

XXXII. The first course, apprehension under an *endorsed warrant*, is adopted in cases where the arrest of the fugitive is not urgent.

The warrant may be endorsed in the United Kingdom, either by the Secretary of State, by a judge of a Superior Court (High Court or Court of Appeal, or by a police magistrate at Bow-street, provided the person endorsing is "satisfied that the warrant was issued by some person having lawful authority to issue the same." In ordinary practice applications for arrest under this section are addressed by the Colonial Governments to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and are forwarded by the Colonial Office to the Secretary of State for the Home Department. An endorsed warrant may be executed either by any of the persons named in the endorsement, or by any of the persons to whom it was originally directed, or by any constable in any part of the United Kingdom, in the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man; and the prisoner when arrested may be brought either before a police magistrate at Bow-street Police Court, or before any justice of the peace, who will then order him to be brought before such police magistrate. 45 & 45 Vict. c. 69, s. 3.

him to be brought before such police magistrate.

*Apprehension on Provisional Warrant.*

XXXIII. The process of apprehension on *provisional warrant* is intended for cases of urgency, and most cases from the colonies fall under this head. A provisional warrant may be issued (section 4) by any justice of the peace for the apprehension of any fugitive who is or is suspected of being in or on his way to the United Kingdom, "on such information and under such circumstances as would, in his opinion, justify the issue of the warrant if the offence of which the fugitive is accused had been committed within his jurisdiction."

In practice a sworn information, showing a reasonable suspicion that a crime has been committed, and that the alleged offender is the guilty party is required before the issue of the provisional warrant. This information may be based upon a letter or telegram purporting to be from the Government or from any judicial or police authority of a British possession, stating:—

(a) the alleged offence;

(b) that a warrant has been granted for the apprehension of the alleged criminal;

(c) that further proceedings in accordance with the Fugitive Offenders Act will be taken.

There

There is no restriction in the Act as to the persons by whom the information is to be laid, and in practice it is usually made by a police officer.

A provisional warrant may, if necessary, be backed for execution.

The justice issuing a provisional warrant forthwith sends a report of the issue, together with the information, or a certified copy thereof, to a Secretary of State, who may, if he thinks fit, discharge the fugitive.

Id. s. 30.

The magistrate before whom the fugitive offender who has been apprehended under a provisional warrant is brought orders him to be brought before one of the police magistrates of the Bow-street Police Court.

The evidence of the officer making the arrest is required in the examination at Bow-street. It is therefore usual, when the arrest has been made elsewhere than in London, that the officer who made the arrest should bring up the prisoner to London and attend with him at Bow-street.

#### *Remand of Prisoner.*

Id. s. 5. ad fin.

XXXIV. The magistrate at Bow-street, before whom a prisoner arrested on a provisional warrant is brought, remands him for such reasonable time, not exceeding seven days at one time, as under the circumstances seems to him requisite for the production of the endorsed warrant.

After the production of the endorsed warrant, the proceedings are the same as if the arrest had been, in the first instance, on an endorsed warrant.

#### *Proceedings at Bow-street.*

XXXV. When the prisoner has been brought before the police magistrate, and the endorsed warrant produced, the magistrate proceeds to hear the case, in accordance with the provisions of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, and subject to these provisions in the same manner and with the same jurisdiction and powers as if the prisoner were charged with an offence committed within his jurisdiction. If he is satisfied that the evidence produced raises, according to English law, a strong or probable presumption that the fugitive committed the offence mentioned in the warrant, he commits him for surrender. A period of 15 days is then allowed him in which he may apply to the High Court for a writ of habeas corpus. If he makes no application, or if the application is made and refused, the Secretary of State issues his warrant for the surrender of the prisoner, and he is either handed over to an officer deputed for that purpose by the Governor of the British possession, or is taken out to the British possession by an English officer, according to the arrangement that may be made in each case.

The prisoner must be removed within one month of his final committal to await his surrender, otherwise a Superior Court, on application by the prisoner, will, unless sufficient cause is shown to the contrary, order him to be discharged.

#### *Surrender of convicted Offender.*

XXXVI. The proceedings for the arrest of an offender convicted in a British possession and escaping to England are the same as those in the case of an accused person. The only difference is as to the nature of the evidence required in the hearing of the case at Bow-street.

#### *Scotland and Ireland.*

XXXVII. In Scotland the powers exercised in England by a police magistrate at Bow-street, of hearing a case and committing a prisoner to await his return, are exercised by the sheriff or sheriff substitute of the county of Edinburgh; those of a justice of the peace (to issue a provisional warrant, &c) are exercised by any sheriff or sheriff substitute; and those of a Superior Court by the High Court of Justiciary.

In Ireland the powers of the police magistrate are exercised by one of the police magistrates of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District, and those of a Superior Court by the Court of Appeal and High Court of Justice at Dublin. The power of the Secretary of State may be exercised as regards Ireland not only by the Secretary of State, but also by the Lord Lieutenant, Lords Justices, or Chief Secretary.

#### *Expenses.*

XXXVIII. The expenses of arresting and surrendering a fugitive under the Fugitive Offenders Act are to be borne by the Government or the individual applying for his surrender, and cannot be charged either to imperial or police funds.

The police should, therefore, as a rule incur no expenditure, and take no steps,—as by causing an application to be made either for a provisional warrant or for an endorsement of a warrant, or by directing the execution of an endorsed warrant, unless they are either acting under instructions from the Secretary of State, or have obtained an adequate indemnity or pre-payment from the persons seeking the surrender. If, without such indemnity or pre-payment, the Metropolitan Police should receive from any private person, or directly from the Colonial Police, a request to take any of such steps, they should, wherever time admits, apply for instructions to the Secretary of State, who, where necessary, will cause inquiry to be made at the Colonial Office. Only in the event of emergency, where the loss of a few hours would be irretrievable, will they be justified in taking such action as may be imperatively required; but in that case the matter should, as soon as possible afterwards, be reported to the Secretary of State.

In the case of provincial police forces it is advisable that the same rule should be observed, so far as circumstances admit.

#### APPLICATION OF FUGITIVE OFFENDERS ACT, 1881, TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

XXXIX. By section 30 of the Fugitive Offenders Act, Her Majesty may, by Order of Council, direct that the Act shall apply to any place named in the Order out of Her Majesty's dominions, but in which Her Majesty has jurisdiction, as if such place were a British possession. The Order may provide for carrying out the application of the Act, which may be made subject to conditions, exceptions, and qualifications.

Under this section the Fugitive Offenders Act has been applied to various countries in which Her Majesty's Consular Courts have jurisdiction under the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts.

A list of these countries, with the section of the Order in Council applying the Fugitive Offenders Act in each case, is given in Appendix B.

The preliminary steps to obtain the surrender of a fugitive who has fled from England to any of these countries will be the same as in the case of a British possession, as will also the steps for the arrest within the United Kingdom of a fugitive from any of these countries. Only persons subject to the Queen's jurisdiction in the foreign countries can be dealt with under these Orders, and in most of them the application of the Fugitive Offenders Act is expressly restricted to British subjects.

APPENDIX D.

#### MINUTE.

Procedure which at present obtains in Extradition cases under Article X of the Treaty of 1842 and Act of Congress of 1892:—

- I. The demand for Extradition is made under Article X of the Treaty of 1842.
- II. The reply thereto states that when the necessary forms of law have been complied with, the usual warrant of surrender will be issued.
- III. No warrant for the preliminary arrest of a fugitive criminal is issued by the Secretary of State.
- IV. The application for arrest is made directly to the Commissioner, or other judicial officer in whom the function of arrest and examination is specifically vested, by the Consular Officer in whose consular jurisdiction the fugitive criminal may be found, at the instigation of Her Majesty's Representative, and upon affidavit of the Consul of his identity.
- V. The depositions and warrants duly authenticated are then submitted to the judicial authority or Commissioner, who takes cognizance of the case under the Treaty and Act of Congress.
- VI. If held for Extradition thereunder, the papers and certificates are submitted to the Secretary of State.
- VII. If the Commissioner's decision in favour of Extradition is approved by the Secretary of State, the warrant of surrender is issued.
- VIII. The warrant of surrender is sent to Her Majesty's Representative, who authorizes the Consular Officer, or such person as he may designate, to receive the fugitive criminal.

#### OBSERVATIONS.

The demand for Extradition need not necessarily be made before the case is sent to the Secretary of State by the Commissioner, for it is only when he is satisfied that the forms of law have been complied with that the warrant of surrender can be issued.

It is when the case comes before the Commissioner that the defect in the legal procedure is seen to allow of the escape of criminals. To secure the preliminary arrest, it is only necessary for Her Majesty's Representative to instruct the Consular Officer to make the demand pending the arrival of the necessary papers, and that the Consul should have means of identifying the criminal. In places where there is no Consular Officer, a difficulty would undoubtedly arise in finding some person who could be authorized to act in the case, and it would be advisable therefore, that an officer should be sent out who could be authorized by Her Majesty's Representative to make the demand for the arrest, and to identify the fugitive. It is essential therefore for the preliminary arrest, that the Consular Officer or person authorized to make the demand should have the means of identifying the fugitive, in order to be enabled to make the necessary affidavit before the Commissioner.

Sir Julian Pauncefote presents his compliments to Sir A. F. O. Liddell, and begs to enclose for his information an extract from a letter from Messrs. Marbury, Counsel to Her Majesty's Consulate General at New York, concerning the particulars required by the United States Courts when a request for Extradition for the crime of forgery is transmitted by telegraph.

Foreign Office, July 24, 1884.

(Extract.)

It is of prime importance, where a person is apprehended upon a telegraphic despatch, to have as far as possible complete particulars of the character of the offence committed, to secure his detention until the deposition and documentary evidence shall be received. In cases of forgery, the despatch should contain a description of the instrument claimed to be forged, date, amount, if draft or bill, upon whom drawn, name of payee, place of utterance, name forged or character of forgery, and the person defrauded, or as much of these as can be furnished, and more to be supplied as soon as obtained. Where adequate particulars are contained in the despatch, which is the foundation for the complaint, there will be no difficulty in having the accused remanded until the arrival of the papers.

## AUTHENTICATION OF PAPERS.

*Act of Congress "Regulating Fees and Practice in Extradition Cases," of August, 1882.*

Section 5.—That in all cases where any depositions, warrants, or other papers, or copies thereof, shall be offered in evidence upon the hearing of any Extradition Case under title sixty-six of the Revised Statutes of the United States, such depositions, warrants, and other papers, or the copies thereof, shall be received and admitted as evidence on such hearing for all the purposes of such hearing, if they shall be properly and legally authenticated, so as to entitle them to be received for similar purposes by the tribunals of the foreign country from which the accused party shall have escaped; and the certificate of the principal diplomatic or consular officer of the United States resident in such foreign country shall be proof that any deposition, warrant, or other paper, or copies thereof, so offered, are authenticated in the manner required by this Act.

HER MAJESTY, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf vested in Her by the Colonial Prisoners' Removal Act, 1884, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

The following Regulations are hereby made as to the removal and return of prisoners and criminal lunatics under the said Act :—

1. Every prisoner removed under the said Act from a British Possession to the United Kingdom for the purpose of undergoing the residue of a sentence involving confinement in a prison combined with hard labour, shall, in the United Kingdom, be dealt with as follows, that is to say :—  
If the original period of his sentence did not exceed two years, in the same manner as if he had been sentenced in the United Kingdom to imprisonment with hard labour for the same period :  
And if the original period of his sentence exceeded two years, in the same manner, as nearly as may be, as if he had been sentenced in the United Kingdom to penal servitude for the same period.
2. Every prisoner removed under the said Act from one British Possession to another British Possession for the purpose of undergoing the residue of a sentence shall in such last-mentioned British Possession be dealt with in the same manner as if he had there been sentenced to such punishment authorized by the law thereof as in the opinion of the Secretary of State signing the Order of Removal shall most nearly correspond to the punishment to which he was sentenced in the first mentioned British Possession, and for the same period.
3. The forms in the Schedule to this Order or forms to the like effect varied as circumstances may require may be used under the said Act.

## COLONIAL COURTS OF ADMIRALTY ACT, 1890.

(DESPATCH RESPECTING.)

Sir,

Referring to the Earl of Derby's circular despatch of the 7th of March, 1885, in which the draft of a "Bill to amend the Law respecting the exercise of Admiralty Jurisdiction in Her Majesty's dominions and elsewhere out of the United Kingdom" was transmitted, I have now the honour to forward a copy of the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890 (53 & 54 Vict. c. 27.), which has been passed into law during the recent session of Parliament. The passage of this measure has been delayed by various causes which I need not now detail, but for which Her Majesty's Government are not responsible.

2. Having regard, however, to the time that has elapsed since the date of Lord Derby's Circular Despatch it may be convenient that I should remind you of the state of things which led to the introduction of this measure, and that I should draw your attention to the changes which it effects, and to the more important provisions which are contained in it.

3. A Vice-Admiralty Court can be established by commission of the Admiralty in any colony, even though it has a representative legislature (30 & 31 Vict. c. 45); and the Court as you are aware, is an Imperial and not a Colonial Court.

4. If the Admiralty do not appoint a judge, registrar, or marshal of a Vice-Admiralty Court in a colony, the chief justice or principal judicial officer of the Colony is ex-officio judge (26 & 27 Vict. c. 24. s. 4); and the judge of the court, with the approval of the governor of the colony, appoints persons to act as registrar or marshal (26 & 27 Vict. c. 24. s. 5). In practice, appointments by the Admiralty have been rarely made.

5. This state of things was unsatisfactory in many ways, as, side by side with the Colonial Civil Court, it maintained another court with a separate judge, separate officers, a separate procedure, and separate fees; and although the same persons were usually judges and officers both of the colonial and of the Vice-Admiralty Court, yet the fact that they exercised jurisdiction by virtue of different offices tended to create difficulties.

6. A chief justice might appoint each of his puisne judges to be a deputy judge, but the Admiralty jurisdiction was exercised by each judge personally as judge or deputy judge of the Vice-Admiralty Court, and not as exercising the power of the civil

court of the colony; and the appeal from one judge in Admiralty lay to the Queen in Council only, and not to the full court in the colony, so that there was no local appeal.

7. The inconvenient limitations on civil Admiralty jurisdiction which were removed in the case of the Admiralty Court of England by the Acts of 1840, 1854, and 1861, still existed as regards Vice-Admiralty Courts.

8. The main idea of the Act is to remedy this state of things and to confer on the chief court of every colony the whole of the civil Admiralty jurisdiction of the High Court in England, so that that jurisdiction may be exercised by the court and its officers, and not merely by a member or officer of the court in his individual capacity.

9. Inasmuch, however, as Admiralty jurisdiction is necessarily of an imperial character, because it deals with acts on the high seas all over the world, and affects the interests of foreign nations and the Imperial Government, some control over the Colonial Courts so far as regards the Admiralty jurisdiction conferred by the Act is important for the purpose, both of obtaining uniformity throughout the empire, and also of guiding the courts in the exercise of jurisdiction in matters of international law, wherein responsibility may ultimately rest with the Imperial Government.

10. The Act reserves this control partly by requiring the consent of the Queen in Council to the Rules of Procedure, and partly by reserving power to the Crown to establish a Vice-Admiralty Court; but in the case of India or a colony having a representative legislature (section 9), the latter control is retained only for certain special purposes, such as prize, slave trade, Foreign Enlistment Act, &c.

11. As regards the procedure, the colonial authorities are authorised to make the rules, subject to the approval of the Queen in Council. Matters of detail or local concern may, however, be left to be varied by the local authority without such approval, as otherwise a slight alteration of the ordinary rules of a Colonial Court could not be applied to Admiralty proceedings in the court without a reference to the Queen in Council. Colonial legislation affecting the Rules of Procedure is to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, so as to maintain the imperial control.

12. The Act does not interfere with the present rule-making powers of Colonial Courts, and those powers will therefore remain exactly as heretofore with respect to the ordinary civil jurisdiction of the courts.

13. The intention is that the chief court of every colony shall have the same Admiralty jurisdiction as the High Court in England, and that inferior courts in the colony may have conferred upon them limited Admiralty jurisdiction, such as for instance, is exercised in England by the County Courts; but inasmuch as the judicial arrangements of different colonies vary, a general enactment to the above effect was impossible. Colonial legislatures are therefore authorised by the Act to make any court of unlimited civil jurisdiction in their colony a Court of Admiralty, and also to confer upon inferior courts partial or limited Admiralty jurisdiction.

14. Section 2 (c) excludes from the jurisdiction of the Colonial Court of Admiralty the criminal jurisdiction of the High Court of Admiralty, that is to say, the jurisdiction to try and punish a person for crimes committed on the high seas. This jurisdiction is exercised now by Colonial Courts under 12 & 13 Vict. c. 96.

15. The Act secures the same local appeal as in ordinary civil cases (section 5), and declares that where the local right of appeal is exhausted, the appeal shall lie to the Queen in Council, as do other appeals from Colonial Courts (section 6).

16. The Bill when circulated to the colonies by Lord Derby was generally accepted as supplementing the autonomy of the Colonial Courts, and was objected to by four colonies alone, viz., New South Wales, Victoria, British Honduras, and St. Helena. It will be observed that by section 16 (a) these four colonies are excluded from the operation of the Act, but that power is given to bring them hereafter within the Act by Order in Council, should they desire it.

17. As before mentioned, the power to establish a Vice-Admiralty Court is reserved to the Crown, as, owing to the circumstances of some of the colonies, or to complications with foreign nations, it may be desirable to establish such a court. In colonies with a representative legislature, however, such a court will only be established for purposes outside the ordinary Admiralty jurisdiction.

18. Thus, if a Vice-Admiralty Court were established in Canada or New Zealand for the purpose (say) of being a prize court, the Admiralty might assign to that court all jurisdiction in relation to the slave trade or the Foreign Enlistment Act, but could not assign to it Admiralty jurisdiction in relation to salvage, or collision, or similar questions.

19. In the case of some of the smaller colonies (for instance, those where the governor is the only court), Admiralty cases may arise of much greater importance than the ordinary civil cases, and therefore a judge of superior judicial training may be required to determine them. In such a case a Vice-Admiralty Court for all purposes might be established.

20. If a Vice-Admiralty Court is established, the Admiralty may confer on it, except in a colony with a representative legislature, the whole of the Admiralty jurisdiction conferred by this Act upon a Colonial Court of Admiralty or by colonial legislation on inferior courts. Thus, if a court were established in the Falkland Islands or Hong Kong for the purpose of the Foreign Enlistment Act, that court may have given to it not merely jurisdiction under the Foreign Enlistment Act, but either the whole jurisdiction of the High Court of Admiralty in England, or such portion of it as the Admiralty choose to assign.

21. It may be convenient by way of explanation to refer to some minor points which arise on particular sections:—

#### Section 2.

22. Sub-section (2) of section 2 confers on the Colonial Court the Admiralty jurisdiction of the High Court of Justice in England.

23. The words "by virtue of any statute" refer specially to 3 & 4 Vict. c. 65, 17 & 18 Vict. c. 78, and 24 & 25 Vict. c. 10, which enlarged the jurisdiction of the High Court of Admiralty in England.

24. Of the jurisdiction given to the High Court of Admiralty in England by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, that given by ss. 217-18, 464, and 468 would, it is apprehended, not pass to Colonial Courts of Admiralty, but the jurisdiction given by s. 476 does pass. The important jurisdiction given by s. 527 of the same Act to the High Court of Admiralty is limited to ships found within three miles of the United Kingdom, and would therefore in practice not pass to the Colonial Court of Admiralty.

25. The words "regard to international law and the comity of nations" refer to cases connected with foreign vessels (such as a suit by the seaman of a foreign vessel for wages) in which the Admiralty Court has jurisdiction, but abstains from exercising it without the intervention of the consul or other recognised authority of the foreign country to which the vessel in question belongs. See *The Agincourt*, 2 Probate Division, 239.

26. It is assumed that the provisions of the above Acts respecting procedure will not apply to the Colonial Courts, and that even if they were held to be applicable, the rules of court under clause 7 of the Act will supersede them.

27. Sub-section (3) confers on the Colonial Court the jurisdiction given by imperial statute to a Vice-Admiralty Court, as, for instance, by the Slave Trade or Pacific Islanders Acts, and also the jurisdiction which is conferred by the law of a colony on a Vice-Admiralty Court in that colony.

28. Proviso (a) refers to those cases where the statutory jurisdiction of the Admiralty Court is limited by reference to England or Wales; as, for instance, in 24 & 25 Vict. c. 10, s. 5, where the jurisdiction is ousted if the owner of the ship is domiciled in England or Wales; and ss. 6, 8, where the jurisdiction exists only over goods carried into a port in England or Wales, or in respect of a ship registered in England or Wales.

29. Proviso (b) excludes from the jurisdiction of the Colonial Court of Admiralty the powers not at present possessed by Vice-Admiralty Courts owing to their being conferred (by the Acts here mentioned) on the High Court of Admiralty exclusively as a court for reviewing or enforcing a decree in another court, or as a court to control grants out of the Imperial Exchequer. See 27 & 28 Vict. c. 25, ss. 4, 13, 52, and 36 & 37 Vict. c. 88, ss. 19, 20.

30. The practice has been to establish prize courts *ad hoc* on a war breaking out. This it is proposed to leave untouched by the present Act, but a Bill to alter it has been prepared and is under consideration. The question is one of some difficulty as the decisions of prize courts may seriously affect both the Imperial Exchequer and our relations with foreign Powers.

31. I may observe that the Act 3 & 4 Vict. c. 65, s. 22 confers on the High Court of Admiralty jurisdiction to determine all matters concerning booty of war which it shall please Her Majesty to refer to the Court; and as the jurisdiction here depends on a reference by the Queen, the jurisdiction will not pass to a Colonial Court of Admiralty unless the Queen chooses to refer any such matter to it.

32. Proviso (d).—Contempt in Breach of Regulations for Her Majesty's Navy.—This refers to s. 11 of the Vice-Admiralty Courts Act of 1863.

33. Under the Naval Discipline Act (29 & 30 Vict. c. 109 & 30) officers of Her Majesty's ships appointed to convoy merchant ships, are liable in case of misconduct to pay to the owners of the ships such damages as the Court of Admiralty may adjudge. No definition is given of "Court of Admiralty," and, therefore, it might be contended that the jurisdiction can be exercised by Vice-Admiralty Courts. By this proviso in the Act the jurisdiction is restricted to the High Court of Admiralty unless the Queen confers it on the Colonial Court.

#### Section 8.

34. It is understood that the proceeds of condemned derelicts and of goods captured from pirates are droits of Admiralty, and that ships taken by private persons without letters of marque, also enemy's goods found derelict, also the proceeds of forfeitures under the Slave Trade Acts, the Pacific Islanders Acts, the Foreign Enlistment Act, or other Acts, are droits of or forfeitures to the Crown.

35. The Board of Trade is, under 17 & 18 Vict. c. 120, s. 10, the Receiver-General of droits of Admiralty, and the vice-Admirals have by their commission the duty of recovering droits of Admiralty. Either through the Board of Trade or Vice-Admiral, or through the Vice-Admiralty Court as an Imperial Court and the Admiralty Registry of the High Court in England, the droits of Admiralty and the droits of and forfeiture to the Crown are reported and remitted to England, and paid into the Imperial Exchequer; subject to the payment made either by custom or by statute to the persons concerned in the bringing in of the derelict or the capture of the pirate or other forfeited vessel. The droits are part of the hereditary casual revenues surrendered by the Queen during her life (1 & 2 Vict. c. 2).

36. As the court in which these droits and forfeitures will under the Act be condemned will be a Colonial Court and not a court appointed by the Admiralty, it was necessary to provide, as in this section, for their being accounted for and dealt with.

37. In many cases it will probably be more convenient that the proceeds of the droits and forfeitures should go to the Colonial instead of the Imperial Exchequer, and therefore the Queen is authorised to surrender the droits and forfeitures to a colony on such terms as may seem fit. It must, however, on any such surrender to a colony, be borne in mind that under section 9 a Vice-Admiralty Court may be set up in the colony, and in such a case a question may arise whether the droits and forfeitures are to revert to the Imperial Exchequer or are to be accounted for by the Vice-Admiralty Court to the Colonial Exchequer.

38. In the Circular Despatch transmitting the Bill to the colonies, Lord Derby, in drawing attention to section 8 of the Bill, which is similar to section 8 of this Act, intimated that any colony desiring to retain these droits and forfeitures would be required to assume responsibility for any damages which

Her Majesty's Government might become liable by reason of the exercise of the jurisdiction transferred under this Bill, and special reference was made to the 23rd section of the Foreign Enlistment Act.

39. The only colonies which have declared their acceptance of these terms are Canada, Tasmania, New Zealand, and the Cape of Good Hope. But the non-acceptance of these terms by a colony need not prevent the application of the Act to that colony, for the section has been so drawn as to leave matters in *status quo*, but to enable the Secretary of State from time to time to make arrangements with the several colonies. Thus the section providing for the transfer of droits and forfeitures has no immediate operation, and any changes to be effected by Order of Council under it will be dependent upon political and administrative considerations peculiar to the individual colonies.

40. It seems probable, indeed, that in New South Wales and Victoria the droits and forfeitures referred to have already been surrendered by Her Majesty. The New South Wales Act, 17 Vict. c. 41 (scheduled to 18 and 19 Vict. c. 54, the New South Wales Constitution Act) s. 50, provides as follows:— "The said several sums mentioned in Schedules A, B, and C, shall be accepted and taken by Her Majesty her heirs or successors, by way of civil list, instead of all territorial, casual, and other revenues of the Crown (including all royalties) from whatever source arising within the said colony, and to the disposal of which the Crown may be entitled either absolutely or conditionally or otherwise howsoever." The same provision is to be found in s. 47 of the Victorian Act scheduled to 18 and 19 Vict. c. 55; and it may be observed also that by a Customs Act of Victoria (21 Vict. No. 13, s. 67) "derelict, jetsam, flotsam, and wreck, brought or coming into the colony, and all droits of Admiralty sold in the Colony," are subjected to import duty.

#### Section 13.

41. As the slave trade is a peculiar matter outside the ordinary Admiralty jurisdiction, and the jurisdiction relative to it is exercised by consular courts and mixed courts as well as Vice-Admiralty Courts, the Act leaves the rules to be made by the Queen in Council so that there may be uniformity of procedure in the Courts. Vice-Admiralty Courts are mentioned having regard to action under section 9.

42. Sub-section (3) is required in consequence of s. 4 of 36 and 37 Vict. c. 53, referring, as regards appeals, to the Vice-Admiralty Courts Act, 1863, which is repealed.

#### Section 17.

43. Sub-section (3).—At present the judge, registrar, and officers of a Vice-Admiralty Court in a Colony are remunerated by means of fees. The holder of any of these offices is usually also a judge or officer of the Supreme Court of the colony, but performs his Admiralty business independently of his connexion with such Court, and consequently receives the fees in addition to the salary he receives as judge or officer of the colonial court.

44. The Act, by making the Admiralty business part of the business of the Colonial Court, will put an end to this system. The business will be transacted by the judge, registrar, &c., as part of the ordinary business of his court, and the fees will, it is presumed, go to the same fund as the other court fees.

45. Any injustice to an individual who at present receives fees should be prevented, and this may be done in two ways: compensation for this purpose may be given not merely by a money payment either as a lump sum or annually, but also by improving his official position, or by continuing to pay him the fees (whatever they may be), which are for the time being paid in respect of the business for which he at present receives fees. To effect this object sub-section (3) is inserted.

46. The work of the Vice-Admiralty Courts is in most colonies small and intermittent: and in but few is there sufficient to afford any basis upon which to settle compensation to officers whose appointments will cease with the abolition of the Vice-Admiralty Courts; and under these circumstances the great majority of the colonies propose that the fees shall be continued to the present holders of the offices. Where this is proposed the fees would be taken like other court fees, and paid into the Colonial Treasury, and the "compensation" would consist in the payment out of that Treasury of equivalent sums to the present holders of offices.

47. It has been represented that in cases where under section 16 (3) the Vice-Admiralty rules will be continued in the Colonial Court, a scale of prescribed fees will be in force, but there will, on the abolition of the Vice-Admiralty Courts, be no officers entitled to take such fees. That sub-section accordingly allows the fees to be taken in manner directed by the court, but the amounts are to be paid to the officers at present entitled to them.

48. Nearly all the colonial Governments recognise the obligation to be incumbent upon them of providing that the existing officers (who it is believed are in every case colonial civil servants) shall not suffer pecuniary loss by the abolition of the Vice-Admiralty Courts. It may be pointed out, with reference to the few colonies where a doubtful opinion as to

this obligation has been entertained, that under the new state of things practically the same fees will be payable to the colonial Governments as have hitherto been payable to the officers of the Imperial Court, and that the compensation required to be made under section 17 (3) will not exceed the average amount of fees actually taken, and that the demand is subject to a continued performance of the duties.

#### COLONIAL COURTS OF ADMIRALTY ACT, 1890 (53 & 54 Vict., chap. 27).

An Act to amend the Law respecting the exercise of Admiralty Jurisdiction in Her Majesty's Dominions and elsewhere out of the United Kingdom. [25th July, 1890.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

#### Short title.

1. This Act may be cited as the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890.

#### Colonial Courts of Admiralty.

2. (1.) Every Court of law in a British possession, which is for the time being declared in pursuance of this Act to be a Court of Admiralty, or which, if no such declaration is in force in the possession, has therein original unlimited civil jurisdiction, shall be a Court of Admiralty, with the jurisdiction in this Act mentioned, and may for the purpose of that jurisdiction exercise all the powers which it possesses for the purpose of its other civil jurisdiction, and such Court in reference to the jurisdiction conferred by this Act is in this Act referred to as a Colonial Court of Admiralty. Where in a British possession the Governor is the sole judicial authority, the expression "Court of law" for the purposes of this section includes such Governor.

(2.) The jurisdiction of a Colonial Court of Admiralty shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, be over the like places, persons, matters, and things, as the Admiralty jurisdiction of the High Court in England, whether existing by virtue of any statute or otherwise, and the Colonial Court of Admiralty may exercise such jurisdiction in like manner and to as full an extent as the High Court in England, and shall have the same regard as that Court to international law and the comity of nations.

(3.) Subject to the provisions of this Act any enactment referring to a Vice-Admiralty Court, which is contained in an Act of the Imperial Parliament or in a Colonial law, shall apply to a Colonial Court of Admiralty, and be read as if the expression "Colonial Court of Admiralty" were therein substituted for "Vice-Admiralty Court" or for other expressions respectively referring to such Vice-Admiralty Courts or the judge thereof, and the Colonial Court of Admiralty shall have jurisdiction accordingly.

Provided as follows:—

(a) Any enactment in an Act of the Imperial Parliament referring to the Admiralty jurisdiction of the High Court in England, when applied to a Colonial Court of Admiralty in a British possession, shall be read as if the name of that possession were therein substituted for England and Wales; and

(b) A Colonial Court of Admiralty shall have under the Naval Prize Act, 1864 (27 & 28 Vict., c. 25), and under the Slave Trade Act, 1873 (36 & 37 Vict., c. 82), and any enactment relating to prize or the slave trade, the jurisdiction thereby conferred on a Vice-Admiralty Court and not the jurisdiction thereby conferred exclusively on the High Court of Admiralty or the High Court of Justice; but, unless for the time being duly authorised, shall not by virtue of this Act exercise any jurisdiction under the Naval Prize Act, 1864, or otherwise in relation to prize; and

(c) A Colonial Court of Admiralty shall not have jurisdiction under this Act to try or punish a person for an offence which according to the law of England is punishable on indictment; and

(d) A Colonial Court of Admiralty shall not have any greater jurisdiction in relation to the laws and regulations relating to Her Majesty's Navy at sea, or under any Act providing for the discipline of Her Majesty's Navy, than may be from time to time conferred on such Court by Order in Council.

(4.) Where a Court in a British possession exercises in respect of matters arising outside the body of a county or other like part of a British possession any jurisdiction exercisable under this Act, that jurisdiction shall be deemed to be exercised under this Act and not otherwise.

Power of Colonial Legislature as to Admiralty jurisdiction.

3. The Legislature of a British possession may by any Colonial law,

- (a) Declare any Court of unlimited civil jurisdiction, whether original or appellate, in that possession to be a Colonial Court of Admiralty, and provide for the exercise by such Court of its jurisdiction under this Act, and limit territorially, or otherwise, the extent of such jurisdiction; and
- (b) Confer upon any inferior or subordinate court in that possession such partial or limited Admiralty jurisdiction under such regulations and with such appeal (if any), as may seem fit:

Provided that any such Colonial law shall not confer any jurisdiction which is not by this Act conferred upon a Colonial Court of Admiralty.

Reservation of Colonial law for Her Majesty's assent.

4. Every Colonial law which is made in pursuance of this Act, or affects the jurisdiction of or practice or procedure in any court of such possession in respect of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act, or alters any such Colonial law as above in this section mentioned, which has been previously passed, shall, unless previously approved by Her Majesty through a Secretary of State, either be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, or contain a suspending clause providing that such law shall not come into operation until Her Majesty's pleasure thereon has been publicly signified in the British possession in which it has been passed.

Local Admiralty appeal.

5. Subject to rules of court under this Act, judgments of a court in a British possession given or made in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred on it by this Act, shall be subject to the like local appeal, if any, as judgments of the court in the exercise of its ordinary civil jurisdiction, and the court having cognizance of such appeal shall for the purpose thereof possess all the jurisdiction by this Act conferred upon a Colonial Court of Admiralty.

Admiralty appeal to the Queen in Council.

6. (1.) The appeal from a judgment of any court in a British possession in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act, either where there is as of right no local appeal or after a decision on local appeal, lies to Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

(2.) Save as may be otherwise specially allowed in a particular case by Her Majesty the Queen in Council, an appeal under this section shall not be allowed—

- (a) From any judgment not having the effect of a definitive judgment unless the court appealed from has given leave for such appeal; nor
- (b) From any judgment unless the petition of appeal has been lodged within the time prescribed by rules, or if no time is prescribed within six months from the date of the judgment appealed against, or if leave to appeal has been given, then from the date of such leave.

(3.) For the purpose of appeals under this Act, Her Majesty the Queen in Council and the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council shall, subject to rules under this section, have all such powers for making and enforcing judgments, whether interlocutory or final, for punishing contempts, for requiring the payment of money into court, or for any other purpose, as may be necessary, or as were possessed by the High Court of Delegates before the passing of the Act transferring the powers of such court to Her Majesty in Council, or as are for the time being possessed by the High Court in England or by the court appealed from in relation to the like matters as those forming the subject of appeals under this Act.

(4.) All Orders of the Queen in Council or the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, for the purposes aforesaid or otherwise in relation to appeals under this Act, shall have full effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions, and in all places where Her Majesty has jurisdiction.

(5.) This section shall be in addition to and not in derogation of the authority of Her Majesty in Council or the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council arising otherwise than under this Act, and all enactments relating to appeals to Her Majesty in Council or to the powers of Her Majesty in Council or the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in relation to those appeals, whether for making rules and orders or otherwise, shall extend, save as otherwise directed by Her Majesty in Council, to appeals to Her Majesty in Council under this Act.

Rules of Court.

7. (1.) Rules of court for regulating the procedure and practice (including fees and costs) in a court in a British possession in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act, whether original or appellate, may be made by the same authority and in the same manner as rules touching the practice, procedure, fees, and costs in the said court in the exercise of its ordinary civil jurisdiction respectively are made:

Provided that the rules under this section shall not, save as provided by this Act, extend to matters relating to the slave trade, and shall not (save as provided by this section) come into operation until they have been approved by Her Majesty in Council, but on coming into operation shall have full effect as if enacted in this Act, and any enactment inconsistent therewith shall, so far as it is so inconsistent, be repealed.

(2.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, in approving rules made under this section, to declare that the rules so made with respect to any matters which appear to Her Majesty to be matters of detail or of local concern may be revoked, varied, or added to without the approval required by this section.

(3.) Such rules may provide for the exercise of any jurisdiction conferred by this Act by the full court, or by any judge or judges thereof, and subject to any rules, where the ordinary civil jurisdiction of the court can in any case be exercised by a single judge, any jurisdiction conferred by this Act may in the like case be exercised by a single judge.

Droits of Admiralty and of the Crown.

8. (1.) Subject to the provisions of this section nothing in this Act shall alter the application of any droits of Admiralty or droits of or forfeitures to the Crown in a British possession; and such droits and forfeitures, when condemned by a court of a British possession in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act, shall, save as is otherwise provided by any other Act, be notified, accounted for, and dealt with in such manner as the Treasury from time to time direct, and the officers of every Colonial Court of Admiralty and of every other court in a British possession exercising Admiralty jurisdiction shall obey such directions in respect of the said droits and forfeitures as may be from time to time given by the Treasury.

(2.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council by Order to direct that, subject to any conditions, exceptions, reservations, and regulations contained in the Order, the said droits and forfeitures condemned by a court in a British possession shall form part of the revenues of that possession either for ever or for such limited term or subject to such revocation as may be specified in the Order.

(3.) If and so long as any of such droits or forfeitures by virtue of this or any other Act form part of the revenues of the said possession the same shall, subject to the provisions of any law for the time being applicable thereto, be notified, accounted for, and dealt with in manner directed by the Government of the possession, and the Treasury shall not have any power in relation thereto.

Power to establish Vice-Admiralty Court.

9. (1.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by commission under the Great Seal, to empower the Admiralty to establish in a British possession any Vice-Admiralty Court or Courts.

(2.) Upon the establishment of a Vice-Admiralty Court in a British possession, the Admiralty, by writing under their hands and the seal of the office of Admiralty, in such form as the Admiralty direct, may appoint a judge, registrar, marshal, and other officers of the court, and may cancel any such appointment; and in addition to any other jurisdiction of such court, may (subject to the limits imposed by this Act or the said commission from Her Majesty) vest in such court the whole or any part of the jurisdiction by or by virtue of this Act conferred upon any courts of that British possession, and may vary or revoke such vesting, and while such vesting is in force the power of such last-mentioned courts to exercise the jurisdiction so vested shall be suspended.

Provided that—

(a) nothing in this section shall authorise a Vice-Admiralty Court so established in India or in any British possession having a representative legislature, to exercise any jurisdiction, except for some purpose relating to prize, to Her Majesty's Navy, to the slave trade, to the matters dealt with by the Foreign Enlistment Act, 1870 (33 & 34 Vict. c. 90), or the Pacific Islanders Protection Acts, 1872 and 1875 (35 & 36 Vict. c. 19; 38 and 39 Vict. c. 51) or to matters in which questions arise relating to treaties or conventions with foreign countries, or to international law; and

(b) in the event of a vacancy in the office of judge, registrar, marshal, or other officer of any Vice-Admiralty Court in a British possession, the Governor of that possession may appoint a fit person to fill the vacancy until an appointment to the office is made by the Admiralty.

(3.) The provisions of this Act with respect to appeals to Her Majesty in Council from courts in British possessions in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act shall apply to appeals from Vice-Admiralty Courts, but the rules and orders made in relation to appeals from Vice-Admiralty Courts may differ from the rules made in relation to appeals from the said courts in British possessions.

(4.) If Her Majesty at any time by commission under the Great Seal so direct, the Admiralty shall by writing under their hands and the seal of the office of Admiralty abolish a Vice-Admiralty Court established in any British possession under this section, and upon such abolition the jurisdiction of any Colonial Court of Admiralty in that possession which was previously suspended shall be revived.

Power to appoint a Vice-Admiral.

10. Nothing in this Act shall affect any power of appointing a Vice-Admiral in and for any British possession or any place therein; and whenever there is not a formally appointed Vice-Admiral in a British possession or any place therein, the Governor of the possession shall be *ex-officio* Vice-Admiral thereof.

Exception of Channel Islands and other possessions.

11. (1.) The provisions of this Act with respect to Colonial Courts of Admiralty shall not apply to the Channel Islands.

(2.) It shall be lawful for the Queen in Council by Order to declare, with respect to any British possession which has not a representative legislature, that the jurisdiction conferred by this Act on Colonial Courts of Admiralty shall not be vested in any court of such possession, or shall be vested only to the partial or limited extent specified in the Order.

Application of Act to Courts under Foreign Jurisdiction Acts.

12. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council by Order to direct that this Act shall, subject to the conditions, exceptions, and qualifications (if any) contained in the Order, apply to any Court established by Her Majesty for the exercise of jurisdiction in any place out of Her Majesty's Dominions which is named in the Order as if that Court were a Colonial Court of Admiralty, and to provide for carrying into effect such application.

Rules for procedure in slave trade matters.

13. (1.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen in Council by Order to make rules as to the practice and procedure (including fees and costs) to be observed in and the returns to be made from Colonial Courts of Admiralty and Vice-Admiralty Courts in the exercise of their jurisdiction in matters relating to the slave trade, and in and from East African Courts as defined by the Slave Trade (East African Courts) Acts, 1873 and 1879. (36 & 37 Vict. c. 59; 42 & 43 Vict. c. 38.)

(2.) Except when inconsistent with such Order in Council, the rules of Court for the time being in force in a Colonial Court of Admiralty or Vice-Admiralty Court shall, so far as applicable, extend to proceedings in such Court in matters relating to the slave trade.

(3.) The provisions of this Act with respect to the appeals to Her Majesty in Council, from Courts in British possessions in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act, shall apply, with the necessary modifications, to appeals from judgments of any East African Court made or purporting to be made in exercise of the jurisdiction under the Slave Trade (East African Courts) Acts, 1873 and 1879.

Orders in Council.

14. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time to make Orders for the purposes authorised by this Act, and to revoke and vary such Orders, and every such Order while in operation shall have effect as if were part of this Act.

Interpretation.

15. In the construction of this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,—

The expression "representative legislature" means, in relation to a British possession, a legislature comprising a legislative body of which at least one half are elected by inhabitants of the British possession.

The expressions "unlimited civil jurisdiction" means civil jurisdiction unlimited as to the value of the subject-matter at issue, or as to the amount that may be claimed or recovered.

The expression "judgment" includes a decree, order, and sentence.

The expression "appeal" means any appeal, rehearing, or review; and the expression "local appeal" means an appeal to any Court inferior to Her Majesty in Council.

The expression "Colonial law" means any Act, ordinance, or other law having the force of legislative enactment in a British possession and made by any authority, other than the Imperial Parliament or Her Majesty in Council, competent to make laws for such possession.

Commencement of the Act.

16. (1.) This Act shall, save as otherwise in this Act provided, come into force in every British possession on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

Provided that—

(a.) This Act shall not come into force in any of the British possessions named in the First Schedule to this Act until Her Majesty so directs by Order in Council, and until the day named in that behalf in such Order; and

(b.) If before any day above mentioned rules of court for the Colonial Court of Admiralty in any British possession have been approved by Her Majesty in Council, this Act may be proclaimed in that possession by the Governor thereof, and on such proclamation shall come into force on the day named in the proclamation.

(2.) The day upon which this Act comes into force in any British possession shall, as regards that British possession, be deemed to be the commencement of this Act.

(3.) If, on the commencement of this Act in any British possession, rules of court have not been approved by Her Majesty in pursuance of this Act, the rules in force at such commencement under the Vice-Admiralty Courts Act 1863, (26 & 27 Vict., c. 24), and in India the rules in force at such commencement regulating the respective Vice-Admiralty Courts or Courts of Admiralty in India, including any rules made with reference to proceedings instituted on behalf of Her Majesty's ships, shall, so far as applicable, have effect in the Colonial Court or Courts of Admiralty of such possession, and in any Vice-Admiralty Court established under this Act in that possession, as rules of court under this Act, and may be revoked and varied accordingly; and all fees payable under such rules may be taken in such manner as the Colonial Court may direct, so however that the amount of each such fee shall so nearly as practicable be paid to the same officer or person who but for the passing of this Act would have been entitled to receive the same in respect of like business. So far as any such rules are inapplicable or do not extend, the rules of court for the exercise by a court of its ordinary civil jurisdiction shall have effect as rules for the exercise by the same court of the jurisdiction conferred by this Act.

(4.) At any time after the passing of this Act any Colonial law may be passed, and any Vice-Admiralty Court may be established and jurisdiction vested in such Court, but any such law, establishment, or vesting shall not come into effect until the commencement of this Act.

Abolition of Vice-Admiralty Courts.

17. On the commencement of this Act in any British possession, but subject to the provisions of this Act, every Vice-Admiralty Court in that possession shall be abolished; subject as follows,—

(1.) All judgments of such Vice-Admiralty Court shall be executed and may be appealed from in like manner as if this Act had not passed, and all appeals from any Vice-Admiralty Court pending at the commencement of this Act shall be heard and determined, and the judgment thereon executed as nearly as may be in like manner as if this Act had not passed:

(2.) All proceedings pending in the Vice-Admiralty Court in any British possession at the commencement of this Act shall, notwithstanding the repeal of any enactment by this Act, be continued in a Colonial Court of Admiralty of the possession in manner directed by rules of court, and, so far as no such rule extends, in like manner, as nearly as may be, as if they had been originally begun in such court.

(3.) Where any person holding an office, whether that of judge, registrar, or marshal, or any other office in any such Vice-Admiralty Court in a British possession, suffers any pecuniary loss in consequence of the abolition of such court, the Government of the British possession, on complaint of such person, shall provide that such person shall receive reasonable compensation (by way of an increase of salary or a capital sum, or otherwise) in respect of his loss, subject nevertheless to the performance, if required by the said Government, of the like duties as before such abolition.

(4.) All books, papers, documents, office furniture, and other things at the commencement of this Act belonging, or appertaining to any Vice-Admiralty Court, shall be delivered over to the proper officer of the Colonial Court of Admiralty or be otherwise dealt with in such manner as, subject to any directions from Her Majesty, the Governor may direct:

(5.) Where, at the commencement of this Act in a British possession, any person holds a commission to act as advocate in any Vice-Admiralty Court abolished by this Act, either for Her Majesty or for the Admiralty, such commission shall be of the same avail in every court of the same British possession exercising jurisdiction under this Act, as if such court were the court mentioned or referred to in such commission.

Repeal.

18. The Acts specified in the Second Schedule to this Act shall, to the extent mentioned in the third column of that schedule, be repealed as respects any British possession as from the commencement of this Act in that possession, and as respects any courts out of Her Majesty's dominions as from the date of any Order applying this Act:

Provided that—

(a.) Any appeal against a judgment made before the commencement of this Act may be brought and any such appeal and any proceedings or appeals pending at the commencement of this Act may be carried on and completed and carried into effect as if such repeal had not been enacted; and

(b.) All enactments and rules at the passing of this Act in force touching the practice, procedure, fees, costs, and returns in matters relating to the slave trade in Vice-Admiralty Courts and in East African Courts shall have effect as rules made in pursuance of this Act, and shall apply to Colonial Courts of Admiralty, and may be altered and revoked accordingly.

## ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE AT CATHERINE HILL BAY. (INFORMATION RESPECTING.)

*Ordered by the Legislative Assembly to be printed, 19 August, 1890.*

*[Laid upon the Table of this House in answer to Question No. 2, of 19 August, 1890.]*

### Questions.

2. MR. STEVENSON *asked* THE COLONIAL SECRETARY,—

- (1.) Is it a fact that at Wallarah, Catherine Hill Bay, situate on the sea coast, between Sydney and Newcastle, there is a mining township, with a population of between 300 and 400 souls, and daily increasing?
- (2.) Is it a fact that a constable is stationed in the above township?
- (3.) Is it a fact that when anyone is arrested after 2 p.m. for drunkenness, or any petty offence, that the party has to be detained for twenty-four hours, and then has to be conveyed by land for 6½ miles, thence by steamer, train, and tram, a further distance of 25 miles, to Lambton, where he is again locked up for the night, and brought before the Court next day, thus causing a compulsory incarceration of three days?
- (4.) Is it a fact that, before the issue of the last two lists of appointments to the Commission of the Peace, the want of a resident magistrate at the above-named mining township was pointed out to him, and a gentleman, in every way qualified for the position, recommended by the Member for the Wollombi and by the Board of Directors of the Wallarah Coal Company; if so, has any notice been taken beyond a formal acknowledgment of the letters, or has any gentleman been appointed?
- (5.) Is it a fact that at the township of Swansea, a distance of some 6½ miles from Wallarah, situate on Lake Macquarie, in the same district, there is a resident constable and lock-up, but no magistrate, and is there also a constable and lock-up at Belmont, also situate on the Lake, 3 miles from Swansea; and has all police-court business of the said townships to be dealt with at Lambton?
- (6.) If it is found that the above state of things exists, will he have the gentleman recommended appointed as a resident magistrate at Wallarah, and cause an inquiry to be made, with a view to the establishment of a monthly Court of Petty Sessions at Swansea—for which the present police building could be used—and will the Police Magistrate of Brisbane Water be requested to attend and preside over such Court, and could the police business of the three townships named, as well as Toronto, and the whole of the Lake Macquarie District, be dealt with at Wallarah, and, at the same time, effect a saving to the revenue?

### Answers.

- (1.) The present population of the Mining Township of Wallarah, Catherine Hill Bay, is between 300 and 400, and it is probable the number will increase.
- (2.) A constable is stationed at Catherine Hill Bay, and a lock-up cell will be erected there in the course of a few weeks.
- (3.) It is not a fact that any person arrested at Catherine Hill Bay has been detained twenty-four hours before being brought to Swansea, preparatory to being taken to Lambton for disposal. In fact, there has been but one arrest made at Catherine Hill Bay—a man deemed to be insane—and he was brought direct to Swansea, and thence to Newcastle.
- (4.) Mr. Thomas Parton, Manager of the Wallarah Coal Company, was recommended by Mr. R. Stevenson, M.P., and Mr. R. W. Saddington. This name was duly considered with other gentlemen, but it was not deemed necessary to appoint a magistrate in the locality.
- (5.) There is a constable stationed at Swansea, where there is a police-station and also a lock-up, but there is neither constable nor lock-up at Belmont, which is situated about 5 miles distant. The police business of Catherine Hill Bay, Swansea, Belmont, and Toronto has up to the present been dealt with either at Lambton or Wallsend. Mr. James E. Hannell, J.P., resides in the Lake Macquarie District.
- (6.) It would be a matter of great convenience if a Court of Petty Sessions were established at Swansea, which is centrally situated, although not so populous as Catherine Hill Bay. The matter will receive attention.

"REPEATING RIFLES AND AMMUNITION."

SIR,—Now that the strike is drawing to a close, I would advise the Unions to close up their ranks and set to work to renew the struggle at the earliest opportunity. It was quite evident the Unions were not prepared for such a struggle as they have been engaged in. A great many of them have only recently been formed. They are all in an impoverished state, and one and all were too young and too poor to stand the strain of a long strike. My advice then to all the Unions is to set to work with a will and organize your forces. Let each member contribute to his Union the sum of £5 per twelve months for three or four years. After each member has got £15 or £20 to his credit he is to be in possession of a good repeating rifle and 200 rounds of ball cartridge. Then they should call a conference with the employers, and lay down their proposals for the "Reconstruction of Society." There are about 40,000 shearers, all men in the prime of life, who know the interior of the country well. They are nearly all in possession of a horse, and, if gathered together, would make a splendid cavalry force. Then we have about an equal number of Unionists belonging to the other trades in the Colonies. We have thousands of the hardy, sunburned, horny-handed labouring class of men who would, no doubt, play their part with energy and patient perseverance. It would not be beyond the mark to state that in four years the Unionists could be made to number 1,000,000 strong—1,000,000 of the real workers, the real wealth-producers, educated in the cause of working out their own social destiny. What power is there that could prevent them from compelling their oppressors and tyrants to give them a more equal share of the wealth which the worker in the sweat of his face produces? The axiom if you want peace be prepared for war, is as applicable to Trades Unions as it is to the state of affairs in Continental Europe. I appeal to every Trades Unionist, to every man who has to earn his bread by the sweat of his brow, to come forward and stand shoulder to shoulder until the "Reconstruction of Society" is an accomplished fact. Who is to take the initiative in this great and noble work but the leaders of the powerful Unions that exist all over the world at the present day? Will the leaders show themselves worthy of the trust that is placed in their hands, and will the workers show that they are worthy of the cause entrusted to them? Time alone will tell.

I have to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 2nd instant, in which you inform me that my name has been removed from the Commission of the Peace.

I must, however, protest against the indecent haste of the Premier in this matter, especially as I had already caused him to be notified that I would forward him a statement. I kept my promise, and forwarded the enclosed statement on the 25th of last month by a careful and trusty messenger, with instructions to deliver it directly into the hands of Sir Henry Parkes. As you know, the Premier refused to see the messenger, who was, moreover, prevented by you from delivering the enclosed letter.\* Your own knowledge of the actual facts of the case, as stated above, will be confirmed by the enclosed sworn declaration of the messenger himself.

\* I have no recollection of any messenger interviewing me in this office from Mr. W. N. Willis, M.P., with a letter for Sir Henry Parkes; and my statement is borne out by the messengers in the Department, who positively assure me that no such individual was refused admission to the Premier on the days mentioned in the declaration.—CRITCHETT WALKER, P.U.S. 6/12/90.

I shall be pleased, therefore, to have the matter again brought before the Governor-in-Council, with a view to the revision of the decision so hastily come to, on insufficient grounds.

Personally, I am not greatly concerned about the position of J.P., but I trust that the present action of the Premier will be submitted to close scrutiny and revision, in order that it may not in future serve as a precedent, or warrant for unconstitutional proceedings for persons, who like Sir Henry Parkes, are inclined to abuse positions of public trust.

In reply to your letter of the 19th instant, calling my attention to a letter in the issue of *Truth* of the 16th instant, signed "Bathurst Burr," I beg to state that, although the sole proprietor of that newspaper, I had not either read or heard of the letter in question until you sent it to me. The Hon. the Colonial Secretary, as an old newspaper proprietor, knows that although, technically, a proprietor is responsible for everything which appears in his journal, such as libel, &c., yet, practically, almost everything which is published is authorised solely either by the editor or sub-editor on his own individual responsibility.

Having,

Having, now, carefully perused the letter, and having consulted my editor and sub-editor about it, they pointed out that the letter is a mere satire on some wild and foolish proposal made by someone lately for the "reconstruction of society." The idea of seriously suggesting that 40,000 shearers should violate the laws they themselves make is too ridiculous for serious comment. And, if possible, still more absurd is the statement in the letter that in "four years the unionist could, by some magical process, be increased to one million strong."

The letter of "Bathurst Burr" merely "pokes fun" at the foolish man who recommended that Utopian absurdity, the "reconstruction of society," in this free country, where, in reality, the working classes have the supreme power to make and repeal laws and to elect or reject candidates for Parliamentary position, thereby making or unmaking Ministries at their mere will and pleasure.

I am not surprised that Sir Henry Parkes should for his own purposes "pretend" to take the letter seriously. It is mere "pretence," and nothing else. But if he takes my advice he will not attempt to pose before the country as its sole Protector, for the purpose of indirectly avenging himself on me, one of his most determined political opponents, by striking my name off the Commission of the Peace.

The portion of this letter marked with asterisks has been excised by direction of the Colonial Secretary and returned to the writer as having nothing whatever to do with the matter in hand, being only a tirade of abuse of Sir Henry Parkes.—C W., 8 12 90.

THE SELECT COMMITTEE of the Legislative Assembly, appointed on the 30th April, 1890,—“with power to send for persons and papers to inquire into and report upon the charges made by Mr. O'Maley against Mr. Manning, the Chairman of the Licensing Bench at Ryde,” and to whom was referred “the Return to Order—‘Mr. Manning, Chairman of the Licensing Bench at Ryde’—laid upon the Table on the 4th December, 1889, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of and Evidence taken before the Select Committee on this subject during the second Session of 1889”; and before whom John Edyc Manning of Ryde had leave to appear and “be heard personally and by Counsel and Attorney,”—have agreed to the following report:—

Your Committee having examined the witnesses named in the list\*, and having made as careful and painstaking an investigation and consideration as the importance of the inquiry demanded, find as follows:—

See List, p. 7

1. That Mr. Manning is the Chairman of the Licensing Bench at Ryde, and a Justice of the Peace for the Colony of New South Wales.

2. That, on the 5th October, 1889, Mr. P. O'Maley addressed a letter to the Minister for Justice containing charges of a grave nature against Mr. Manning in his capacity as a Licensing Magistrate. These charges may be briefly stated as follows:—

“1. That Mr. Manning, in his position of Licensing Magistrate, improperly met an intending applicant and discussed the intended application.

“2. That Mr. Manning used his position and power as such Licensing Magistrate to endeavour to dissuade a Mr. Cuneo from leasing O'Maley's property, known as the ‘Fig-tree Inn,’ by informing him that the house would never be licensed while he, Mr. Manning, had a seat on the Bench.

“3. That Mr. Manning, as an inducement to the said Cuneo to purchase a block of land known as Bennett's corner, promised that on the completion of the purchase he would call a special meeting of the Licensing Bench and grant him a license.

“4. That the circumstances surrounding the refusal of the application for the renewal of the license of the ‘Fig-tree Inn’ showed that Mr. Manning used his position to injure O'Maley, for the purpose of enabling a license to be granted for Bennett's corner.”

3. That Mr. Manning, on the 12th October, 1889, replied to the charges contained in Mr. O'Maley's letter, and that the statements contained in such reply are not borne out by the evidence.

4. That the “Fig-tree Inn” had been licensed for ten years, and no sufficient reason has been shown for closing the house.

5.

5. That the requirements of the neighbourhood justified a renewal of the license, as shown by the fact that the Bench, of which Mr. Manning was Chairman, granted a license for an hotel a few hundred yards from O'Maley's premises, and that Cunco, the applicant for the conditional license, was a fit and proper person to hold a license.

6. That Mr. Manning improperly met Mr. Cunco on several occasions, and discussed with him the question of granting a license at Hunter's Hill.

7. That Mr. Manning was desirous of closing O'Maley's place.

8. That Mr. Manning was anxious to grant a license for Bennett's corner, and even went so far as to write out a recommendation to the Bench, of which he was Chairman, in favour of granting a license for the said corner. That he then had this copied by his son, alleging as a reason that he did not wish his brother-Magistrates to recognize his handwriting, and then had the copy signed by Solomon.

9. That Mr. O'Maley's charges are substantially sustained, and your Committee are of opinion that Mr. Manning should not hold a seat on the Licensing Bench at Ryde.

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- Mr. J. E. Manning. 15. When was that? I do not remember.
- 14 May, 1890. 16. *Mr. Kidd.*] March, 1882? No; the first Bench for the district was that at Parramatta. I am an ordinary member of the Licensing Bench there.
17. Do you remember how often you have been reappointed? I think I have been reappointed once. I am in my second term for Ryde, I think, and my third term for Parramatta.
18. About when will your term for either expire? I could not tell you. We are appointed for a term of three years.

Thomas Cuneo called in, sworn, and examined:—

- Mr. T. Cuneo. 19. *Chairman.*] You gave evidence before the Select Committee during the last session of Parliament? Yes.
- 14 May, 1890. 20. That Committee was appointed to inquire into and report upon the charges made by Mr. O'Maley against Mr. Manning, the Chairman of the Licensing Bench at Ryde? Yes.
21. Where do you live? At Hunter's Hill.
22. You were an applicant for a publican's license? Yes.
23. For where? For the "Fig-tree Inn," Hunter's Hill.
24. Is that in the Licensing District of Ryde? Yes.
25. Do you remember the date of your first application? Yes—12th June, 1889.
26. That was an application for what? For a conditional publican's license.
27. You put in certain plans with that application? Yes.
28. What sized house did they show? Twenty-six rooms.
29. Did those plans show a new house, or one which had already been licensed, with alterations? A house that had already been licensed for ten years, with alterations, so as to make a twenty-six-roomed house of it.
30. Who was on the Bench when the application came on? Mr. Manning and Mr. C. E. Jeanneret.
31. What became of the application? It was refused.
32. Upon what grounds? I do not know; no grounds were mentioned.
33. No grounds were given? No.
34. *Mr. Kidd.*] There was no license existing when you applied for a conditional license? Yes, there was.
35. *Chairman.*] You say that your first application was made on the 12th June, 1889. The license should not run out until the end of June, so that it was during the currency of the license that you applied for a conditional license? Yes.
36. That application you say was refused, and the Bench stated no grounds for their refusal? No grounds were stated.
37. Did you see Mr. Manning? Yes.
38. How did you come to see him? I went up to his house. I saw Mr. Manning before the first refusal.
39. How did you come to see him? I had heard that the house was going to be closed, and I went and saw Mr. Manning, and asked him if he would be agreeable to give me a renewal of the license when the license ran out, and he said "No," and that the house would be closed. I had to make application because I was under contract with O'Maley, and had paid a deposit.
40. This house was owned by O'Maley? Yes.
41. At that time—before the end of June, 1889,—who was the tenant? Mr. George Solomon.
42. His lease, I believe, ended on the 30th June? Yes.
43. On the same date that the license ran out? Yes.
44. You had made arrangements with O'Maley for a lease? Yes.
45. How far had you gone with your arrangements? We had the agreement drawn out, and I had made a deposit.
46. That being so, you went and saw Mr. Manning in the manner stated? Yes.
47. Can you remember the exact conversation you had with Mr. Manning on that occasion? I went to him and told him that I had bought a lease from Mr. O'Maley for the "Fig-tree Inn" for seven and a half years, and I asked him if he would be agreeable to give me a transfer and a renewal of the license, which was to expire when Solomon's term was up. He said, "No; you take my advice, and have nothing to do with that place; I will not be agreeable to giving it a license."
48. *Mr. Kidd.*] Was the house condemned? The house was never condemned—not to my knowledge.
49. *Chairman.*] Did he give any reason for saying that the house would not be licensed? No.
50. Did he say anything in reference to O'Maley? No; I do not think he did.
51. Were you at the Court when Solomon's term ran out? Yes.
52. Can you tell us what occurred there in reference to this house? Yes.
53. Did Solomon apply for a renewal? Yes.
54. What became of that application? It was refused.
55. Who sat on the Bench? Mr. Manning, and Mr. C. E. Jeanneret, I think.
56. Did you hear any reasons given by the Bench for the refusal of his license? Well, no; I could not say.
57. Did you then put in a subsequent application? Yes.
58. *Mr. Manning.*] For a renewal? No, for a conditional license.
59. *Chairman.*] On account of the refusal of the renewal to Solomon the house had to be closed? Yes, on June 30.
60. And you subsequently put in another application for a conditional license? Yes, on the 17th July, 1889.
61. What plans did you lodge? The same plans, for twenty-six rooms.
62. What became of that application? It was refused also.
63. Who were on the Bench? The same magistrates.
64. Did you then go and see Mr. Manning again? Yes.
65. I want you to tell the Committee, as clearly as you can recollect, what Mr. Manning said to you, and what you said to him? In the meantime I had come to terms—that if I could get the license on smaller plans I was to have three years more lease for £500. I drew a small plan and took it up to Mr. Manning. He was on the top of his stable at the time.
66. I suppose O'Maley would be agreeable to give you an extended lease, because it would cost him so much less to build a smaller house? Between £1,100 and £1,200 less. The first improvements would cost £1,800, and the second improvements £500 or £600.



67. You prepared a small plan, and went and saw Mr. Manning? Yes.
68. Tell us the conversation as nearly as you can recollect it? Mr. Manning said to me, "Well, license again." I said, "Yes." He said, "What is the matter now?" I said, "I have come to see if you would be agreeable to give me a license on these plans." He said, "What property?" I said, "O'Maley's." "No," he said, "I will have nothing at all to do with it." I had not unrolled the plans at that time. We were up on the stable loft at the time, and we went downstairs, and I said, "I suppose there is no harm in having a look at the plans?" He said "No"; and I opened them out and showed them to him. He said they were smaller than the others; and I told him they were quite large enough for the requirements of the district at the present time.
69. *Mr. Kidd.*] It did not strike you that it was an unseemly thing to go to a licensing magistrate, who was out of Court, to ask him about anything of the kind? Yes.
70. Is it the usual way you do business? No; but one wants to know before going to any great expense whether he has any show at all.
71. *Chairman.*] You were up in the loft, and you came down and you showed him the plans? Yes.
72. What was said? I said I would not mind giving £200 to M'Culloch, or any other solicitor, if I could get a license on those plans. We then walked towards the gate, and we stood talking there for some time. Then we went away, and got talking about O'Maley's property. Mr. Manning asked me how much he owed upon it. I said, "He does not owe anything." I was certain of that, because Mr. O'Maley had said, only a few days before, that if the license were refused he could let the property stand, as he owed no money, and it would not cost him anything. Mr. Manning said he wanted me to buy Bennett's property.
73. Follow the conversation as closely as you can remember it? I think it was before this day that he mentioned Bennett's property to me.
74. What did he say in regard to Bennett's property? He said, "I will tell you what you ought to do; you ought to buy Bennett's property." I said, "Yes."
75. Did you ask him where Bennett's property was? No; I knew where it was.
76. Tell us what was said? He said a person had got it from Mrs. Bennett for three months; they had three months to decide whether they would buy it or not.
77. Where is Bennett's property? About 100 yards or 150 yards from the "Fig-tree Inn."
78. He told you that a person had it under offer for three months? Yes; and he told me that if I went to Mr. M'Culloch, a solicitor in Sydney, I could get all the particulars from him. I did not know M'Culloch's address, so I wrote it on the cuff of my shirt-sleeve. He said, "It is no use you going to Mrs. Bennett, because she knows nothing at all about it." That was in the morning. Before I went home I went and saw Mrs. Bennett.
79. Had you any conversation with her? Yes. She seemed surprised that I knew so much about the property, and asked me to tell her how I got to know, and of course I would not do so.
80. Did you go to Sydney then? Yes.
81. Whom did you see? Mr. P. V. M'Culloch. I told him I had come to see him about the Bennett property, and I asked him what price was wanted for it. He said, "They want £1,000 for a twenty-five years' lease, and 30s. a week rent, you make your own improvements; or £2,000 would buy the property right out." I told him it was too much.
82. "£2,000 cash would buy the property right out?" He did not say cash, but £2,000. I told him I thought it was too much, but that I hoped there was no harm done, and I then left.
83. Did you see any one in connection with this property afterwards? Yes; when I went home that night Mrs. Bennett came down to my house. She said, "How did you get on?" I said, "They want too much; they want £2,000 for it." She said, "Yes, they do want too much; I wish they would give me one-half."
84. Is Mrs. Bennett still living? Yes.
85. Pass on to the time you saw Mr. Manning again? Yes.
86. Did you go up and see him after seeing M'Culloch? Yes.
87. What conversation had you with him? He said, "Did you go to M'Culloch?" I said, "Yes; they want too much money for the property." I also said I could not get £2,000. We had a long conversation.
88. Tell us what it was? He said, "I know a man who would build a house upon that property if he could get a good tenant." I said, "Yes." He said, "What would you be agreeable to give him for it?" I said, "£4 a week." He said, "Why you are giving that to O'Maley, besides a bonus." I said, "I would give £5 a week." He said, "That is better." The matter about building the place then dropped, and he said, "Go to M'Culloch again, and I will give you a note to take to him." He said, "Come inside and I will show you the plans of Solomon's house." Solomon had already applied for a conditional license for Bennett's property, and these were the plans he was going to use. We were looking at them, and he said, "I will tell you what you want to do." He held his hands out and said, "You want to draw a large plan like this, and draw a line through it to show the Bench, and only build a portion."
89. He said, "You want to put large plans before the Bench, and only build a portion of them?" Yes. A portion now, so that the other could be built when it was required. He went in and wrote the letter for me, and gave it to me.
90. Did he say anything to you? Yes; he said, "Go down and see M'Culloch. If you come to terms with him I will call a special meeting next month and grant the license—leave that to me."
91. What did you do? I went home. I did not go to see M'Culloch. I knew it was of no use, as I could not raise £4,000.
92. That was £2,000 for the place, and £2,000 it would cost you to build and furnish. The note he gave you I believe was in an envelope? Yes.
93. Did he tell you he had any interest in Bennett's property at all? No.
94. You opened that envelope, I believe? Yes. From the start I thought, in my own mind, he had an interest in the property.
95. Is this the note (*produced*) which was inside that envelope? Yes. The note is as follows:—

Dear Percy,

I have told Cunco that I thought you could arrange for him to have the Bennett property for £2,000 on paying £1,000 cash, the balance on interest. If he agrees to this, as he will, he will have to deposit £1,000 with you in trust till Mrs. B. can convey and he gets the other matter. He had better be told also to keep the matter quiet until he gets his conveyance, &c.

- Mr. T. Cuneo. 96. That was the note in the envelope you opened? Yes.
- 14 May, 1890. 97. Do you know Mr. Manning's handwriting? No; I could not swear to it.
98. When did you see Mr. Manning again? About a week after.
99. What did he say to you? The first thing he said was, "Why didn't you go to M'Culloch." I said it was no use going, because I could not raise the money.
100. Did he say anything about the letter? Yes. He said, "Where is the letter?" and I said, "It is at home." He said, "Let me have it," and I said, "All right."
101. *Mr. Kidd.*] What letter did he refer to? The one just read.
102. *Chairman.*] That is the only letter you got from him? Yes.
103. Was that the occasion upon which he went on to speak about the man who would build the house? Yes.
104. *Mr. Kidd.*] Why did you not let him have the letter? I had it at home.
105. *Chairman.*] You have already said that you had opened the letter then? Yes.
106. And had read its contents? Yes.
107. *Mr. Kidd.*] And that letter was not sent to you? No, not to me.
108. Then you did not take the letter to the party it was addressed to? No.
109. *Mr. Plumb.*] But you went to the party? Yes, before I got the letter, but not after.
110. *Chairman.*] You had seen M'Culloch before receiving this letter? Yes.
111. Then you saw Mr. Manning, and he asked you to see M'Culloch again, and gave you this note? Yes.
112. *Mr. Kidd.*] Why did you not take it to the person it was addressed to? It was of no use me going to him, because I could not find the money.
113. Is it usual for you when you get a letter from anybody to stick to it? Well, I understood that all that was in it was in reference to myself and M'Culloch, and that I was to give a certain price.
114. But did you not think it was a wrong thing to open the letter? Well, I did, but from the conversation I had with Mr. Manning I thought that all was not straight.
115. *Mr. Plumb.*] You swallowed your scruples? Yes, I did.
116. *Chairman.*] You have already stated you had a suspicion that Mr. Manning was interested in the Bennett property? Yes; and I can bring proof in regard to it too.
117. *Mr. Kidd.*] Knowing that you could not undertake to purchase this property, was your motive to entrap Mr. Manning if you could? No.
118. Not even by opening and sticking to the letter? No. My intention was to try and get a license for the "Fig-tree Inn," which is the best position in the district, and has been licensed for ten years.
119. You did not hold the license before? No.
120. Then where was this building going to be put up in connection with which you applied for a conditional license? That was the old "Fig-tree Inn."
121. Then they were going to pull it down? They were going to extend it. There are more rooms there now than are required by the Act. The only fault in the house is in the kitchen.
122. However, they would not renew the license, and you tried to obtain a conditional license and failed? Yes. We had a plan of twenty-six rooms drawn out; we were given to understand that if we spent a certain amount on the place we would obtain a license, and we did it. I saw a telegram which came to Mr. Cornwell, which said "Tell Cuneo to put in his application; all right."
123. *Mr. Plumb.*] For what hotel? For the "Fig-tree Inn." That is the application I had in at the time.
124. *Mr. Kidd.*] Although that telegram was apparently from Mr. Manning, you have no evidence that Mr. Manning has sent it? Of course not; I could not say who sent it.
125. *Mr. Plumb.*] Whose telegram was it? It was a telegram to Mr. Cornwell, of the firm of brewers. They got a telegram in reference to the "Fig-tree" signed by J. E. Manning.
126. When was this? I had to have my application in for fourteen days, and it must have been between the 12th June and fourteen days previous to the application.
127. *Chairman.*] That was before your first application? Yes; before the first refusal.
128. *Mr. Manning.*] And that was signed "John E. Manning"? I would not swear to that.
129. You said you saw a telegram signed J. E. Manning? I may have made a mistake about the signature.
130. *Mr. Plumb.*] But you said you saw a telegram signed "John E. Manning"? I saw the telegram, but I would not swear I saw the signature.
131. *Mr. Manning.*] You said just now you saw a telegram signed "John E. Manning"? Well, it is so long ago; it is eleven months ago.
132. *Mr. Kidd.*] There is no doubt that the brewers would be very anxious that you should procure the license. You would be a good customer to them, if you had done so. They would have a motive in trying to get you to push on with your application? Yes; the application was in before I saw the telegram.
133. How long before the day of hearing must the application be in? Fourteen days.
134. *Mr. Manning.*] You say you saw this telegram within fourteen days prior to the 12th June? Yes.
135. Where did you see the telegram? At Mr. Cornwell's brewery.
136. Mr. Cornwell showed you it? Yes, Mr. Sam. Cornwell.
137. *Chairman.*] After the second refusal, did you take O'Maley up to Mr. Manning? Yes. On the day I had the plans with me Mr. Manning and myself were walking up towards the gate. A publican named Garland had recently come to Ryde, and Mr. Manning was telling me what a good trade he was doing. He said that he was spoiling the trade of Jordan, the other publican. At that moment Police-sergeant Banks came through the gate, and Manning said, "We have just been talking about Jordan's place." That was on the day he asked me to send O'Maley up. I said, "If I buy O'Maley's place, would I get a license," and he said, "No." After a time he asked, "What does O'Maley want for his place," and I said "About £2,000." He said, "Do you live near O'Maley?" I said, "Yes." He said, "When you see him send him up to me, as I know a man who would buy that property. If he does buy it you would have the first chance of getting a license for it, of course, on the same terms that anyone else would give."
138. *Mr. Plumb.*] That means, I suppose, that the house would have to be altered and put into a proper condition? Yes, I suppose so.

139. *Mr. Kidd.*] The expression "Same terms" did not mean that there was to be a consideration for getting the license;—you do not mean that Manning would get anything? No, not at all.
140. *Chairman.*] Did you bring O'Maley to see Mr Manning? Yes; I drove him up myself. O'Maley went inside, and I do not know what took place, excepting what he told me. Mr. T. Cunco.  
14 May, 1890.
141. Was anything said that day about the letter Mr Manning gave you? Yes; when I was going away he said, "Don't forget to post that letter."
142. Did O'Maley hear him say that? No; this was on the first day when he asked me if I had the letter. When I was leaving he said, "Do not forget to post the letter."
143. Did you put in another application? I saw Mr. Manning again after that. I saw him on the Thursday. I drove O'Maley up on the Friday, and I saw Mr Manning again on the Monday.
144. What conversation did you have with him? I was speaking about licensing the "Fig-tree Inn" again, and he said, "No; the house will never be licensed whilst O'Maley or anyone belonging to him owns it." He said that if O'Maley built a house as big as a castle he would not be in favour of licensing it. That was the last day I saw him. Two or three days afterwards I put in another application upon small plans.
145. Whilst that application was in, was there a letter of complaint sent to the Minister? Yes.
146. And it was subsequent to this complaint being sent in by O'Maley that your application came on? Yes.
147. Did Mr. Manning take his seat on the Bench? Yes.
148. What was done? I do not think there was a Court on that day. Mr. Jeanneret was away.
149. The matter was adjourned? Yes.
150. It came on again afterwards—a fortnight or three weeks afterwards? Yes.
151. Who were on the Bench? I think Mr. Manning, Mr. Jeanneret, and Mr. D'Ardier.
152. Was the matter gone into then? I think it was.
153. The matter was then further adjourned upon some technical points? Yes.
154. Do you remember what it was—what Mr. Manning contended? Yes—that we had already been refused twice, and the matter could not be heard until after a certain lapse of time.
155. What decision was come to upon that point? They had to hear the case; they were wrong.
156. Then what was done in reference to Mr. Manning? I think he left his seat on that day.
157. Why? Well, there had been a complaint sent to the Minister of Justice, asking that he should not sit.
158. Did he say anything in regard to that matter? He did say something; but I could not state the exact words just now.
159. However, he did not sit? No.
160. And the matter was gone into? Yes.
161. The remaining two magistrates would be Mr. Jeanneret and Mr. D'Ardier? Yes.
162. The license was not granted on that day? No.
163. Was either of the magistrates in favour of granting it? Yes, strongly in favour.
164. Who? Mr. D'Ardier.
165. Do you know whether Mr. D'Ardier has sat on the Bench since with Mr. Manning and Mr. Jeanneret? No; I am nearly sure he has not.
166. Mr. Jeanneret was one of the magistrates who had before refused the license, in company with Mr. Manning? Yes.
167. *Mr. Kidd.*] Did Mr. D'Ardier express himself as being strongly in favour of granting the license from the Bench, or did he tell you that privately? He did not say it; but you could see he meant it.
168. He did not say anything of the sort from the Bench? No.
169. You have heard it second-hand some other way? No.
170. How did you come to know it? Well, that was my impression.
171. *Chairman.*] Did the magistrates go out to deliberate? No.
172. They sat on the Bench? Yes.
173. Where were you sitting during the time that they were deliberating? At the table in the front of the Bench.
174. What distance was there between you and the Bench? About 6 feet.
175. Did Mr. Jeanneret say that Mr. D'Ardier was in favour of granting the license? No.
176. *Mr. Paul.*] Did Mr. D'Ardier say so? No.
177. What was the decision? Mr. Jeanneret said, "One for and one against"; and the Chairman had the casting vote.
178. *Mr. Kidd.*] Who was the Chairman? Mr. Jeanneret. Mr. Manning was not on the Bench.
179. *Chairman.*] Did Mr. Jeanneret say, "I am opposed to granting the license; my colleague thinks otherwise"? Yes.
180. Did I then say, "Then your Worships will make no order"? Yes. Mr. Jeanneret's excuse was that the place was close to a church, and he had told me before that the church was going to be closed.
181. Did Mr. Jeanneret ever go down to look at these premises? He did.
182. In company with whom? He looked through them with me.
183. This house, you state, had been licensed for over ten years? Yes.
184. During the time this license was in operation, was a fresh license granted to a place near at hand by the Ryde Bench? Yes.
185. How far away? About 600 yards.
186. Was Mr. Manning on the Bench which granted that license? Yes.
187. How long have you lived in this district? Over twenty-seven years.
188. Has the district greatly increased in population and settlement during the last ten years? It has a good deal.
189. It is better now than it was when this license to O'Maley was granted? Yes.
190. What is O'Maley's house built of? Stone.
191. Substantial and well built? Yes; a well-built house, excepting the kitchen, which is weatherboard.
192. Is it situated on the straight road from Sydney to the North Shore? Yes.
193. *Mr. Plumb.*] Have you any arrangement with O'Maley in regard to this matter? No.
194. There is no collusion between you and O'Maley? No; I pay rent for the house I am living in.

- Mr. T. Cuneo. 195. *Mr. Manning.*] Is it a fact that you have been living in this house whilst you have been trying to get a license? Yes, I have.
- 14 May, 1890. 196. It is next door to O'Maley's? Yes; there is a fence between.
197. *Mr. Kidd.*] You said that one plan was to cost £1,800, and the amended plan was to cost from £500 to £600 less, or £1,100 or £1,200? Yes.
- 198-9. Then if you have already stated that the second plan was only to cost £700 it would not be correct. I notice that your previous evidence contains the following question by Mr. Plumb and your answer:—  
You said that you would give Mr. M'Culloch or anybody else £200 who would get you a license? Not anybody else. I can tell why it would have paid us to give £200 to get a license. The first plan, if carried out, would cost £1,800, but the improvements according to the second plan would only have cost about £700, so that if we could have got a license on the smaller plan it would have paid us to give any solicitor £200.
- To-day you say the second plan would cost £500 to £600? The first plans were drawn by Mr. O'Neil, and he said the improvements would cost £1,800. The second plans I sketched out roughly, and I took them to Mr. Huntley, but he had not time to draw up any specifications. We thought these plans would cost from £500 to £600.
200. *Chairman.*] Before Mr. Manning gave you this note you had seen M'Culloch, and he told you it would cost you £2,000 to buy this property right out? Yes. When I went to Mr. Manning the second time I told him I could not find the money—it was too much.
201. Did he tell you, when he gave you this note, that you would have to pay £1,000 on trust to Mr. M'Culloch? No.
202. He did not tell you anything about the price at all? He just told me how Mrs. Bennett was situated, and that somebody had got the place for three months.
- 203-4. *Mr. Paul.*] Question 58 in your previous evidence is as follows:—  
Did he make any remarks to the policeman in reference to the matter? No.  
I understand you to say to-day that when the policeman came Mr. Manning told him you were just discussing Jordan's hotel? Yes; he said, "We are just speaking about these two hotels."
205. *Chairman.*] Again referring to this note—you knew then that £2,000 was the price of the land? Yes; I knew it before I got the note.
206. You had seen M'Culloch? Yes.
207. Did he tell you Mrs. Bennett would have any difficulty in conveying? He said there might be some difficulty. He said that she had not proved the will.
208. Was this the occasion upon which he said he would call a special meeting of the Licensing Bench? Yes; that was the time I got the note.
209. He told you she had not proved the will? Yes; he said she was a foolish woman.
210. Did he ask you to keep the matter quiet? No.
211. *Mr. Kidd.*] But you did keep it quiet by sticking to the letter? Yes.
212. *Mr. Manning.*] Is it not a fact that when you came back on the occasion upon which I gave you that note you stated you had seen Mr. M'Culloch about Bennett's land? Yes.
213. And that he had made some proposal to you which you could not carry out? Yes.
214. Did I not tell you that I could not understand what you were after at all, as it was impossible that Mrs. Bennett's corner could be licensed, as it had been already twice refused? No; it had not been twice refused.
215. Is it not a fact that Solomon was twice refused for Mrs. Bennett's corner; and is it not a fact that O'Maley's house has been twice refused, and Page's house, and Merry's house, and that this very corner, which you say I was so anxious to sell you, was actually shut out from the possibility of being licensed? Well, you never said anything about that to me.
216. But was it not twice refused? I would not swear to that.
217. Is it not a fact that Solomon, while he was a tenant of O'Maley, was twice refused for this very piece of land? No; I am quite certain he was not. It was refused once whilst he was a tenant, but I am sure he did not live there whilst there were two refusals, because the house was closed when the second refusal came on.
218. Was not Solomon refused a conditional license for this bit of land of Mrs. Bennett's on the 12th June? Yes; but I understand that it is not the whole piece of the property.
219. I am asking you whether Solomon was not refused a conditional license for this very piece of land of Mrs. Bennett's? I believe there was only part of it.
220. But was it Mrs. Bennett's corner? Yes.
221. That was on the 12th June? Yes.\*
222. And on that same date was not Page refused? Yes.
223. And you were refused? Yes.
224. And had not Solomon been refused previous to that? I do not think so.
225. Do you know whether Solomon was refused twice for Mrs. Bennett's land? I could not say. I am sure he was not refused twice whilst he was living in O'Maley's.
226. Is it not a fact that Solomon was refused twice, the same as you and Page and Merry were refused? I have said before that I do not think so. I think he was only refused once.
227. You spoke about coming to ask me to give you a transfer and a renewal of Solomon's license? Yes.
228. How long before the expiration of that license;—it expired on the 30th June? There was a special meeting called on the 12th June. Before that I went up and saw you.
229. I am asking you if you did not apply to me for this transfer and renewal, and whether it was not just towards the end of Solomon's lease? Of course it would be during the month.
230. That was the month of June? Yes.
231. Was it a short time before the house was to be closed? Well, it would not be very long before.
232. What do you call very long—two or three weeks? More than that; inside of two months.
233. But you know that on the 12th June you submitted a plan yourself? Yes; it was before then that I saw you first.
234. Did you not come to me and say that O'Maley had at last come to some arrangement with the outgoing tenant, Solomon, and ask me whether the Bench would give me a transfer and a renewal? That was afterwards.

\*NOTE (on revision) :—This is a mistake; it was not refused on the 12th June.

235. How long was that before the house was closed? About two weeks; but I saw you before that. Mr. T. Cuneo.
236. Were you not told that the Bench had refused a renewal, and that I had no power to comply with your wishes? No. 14 May, 1890.
237. Did I not say so? No; I am sure you did not.
238. *Chairman.*] Do I understand that Bennett's property was refused twice? I don't think it was.
239. *Mr. Manning.*] When you came to me a few days before the lease and license ran out, you asked me if I could transfer to you, and also give you a renewal;—what was my reply? You said, "No," and that the house would not have to be licensed again.
240. That this license had been refused at a quarterly meeting? Oh, no; I think Solomon's renewal had been refused.
241. That is the same thing. Solomon's renewal was refused at the quarterly meeting in April, was it not? Yes.
242. And towards the end of June you, having come to some terms with Solomon, came to me and asked me to grant you a transfer? Yes.
243. Did I not tell you then that it was perfectly impossible for me to do anything of the sort? No.
244. What did I say? You said, "The place will never be licensed again whilst O'Maley owns it." It was not the first time you said the same thing.
245. Did I not tell you that the renewal had been refused at the quarterly meeting, and that it was perfectly beyond the power of any magistrate to grant a renewal even if he wished to do so? No.
246. Do you not know, as a matter of fact, that it is so? I do not know. The granting of a conditional license is easy enough.
247. This is not a conditional license. You said just now you asked me for a transfer and renewal? The place was open before any improvements were made.
248. You said just now you asked me for the renewal and transfer, you having at the last moment come to terms with Solomon. Do you not know, as a matter of fact, that this renewal could only be granted at the quarterly meeting, and that it had been refused at the quarterly meeting? Yes, but there had been a special meeting. The license expired on the 30th June, and we could have got a new one.
249. You are not new to the public-house business? I was up to this time.
250. Is it not a fact that you were a barman in your father's hotel? No.
251. Then you have not served in it? I have; but my brother is the one who looked after it, and he is dead.
252. Were you never in the bar? I was very little in the bar.
253. When you got this note from me, did you not tell me that you had seen Mr. M'Culloch? Yes.
254. And that he had made some offer to you of the premises of Mrs. Bennett, and that you were unable to comply with it unless he gave you certain terms? No.
255. And did you not ask me to oblige you—as you did not know Mr. M'Culloch personally—by asking him if he would not do certain things for you, which I stated in the letter? No.
256. I want to know if you did not ask me, as a favour, to write that note for you to Mr. M'Culloch really to assist you in the matter? No, I did not. You first proposed the note to me.
257. How came you to get the note at all? You said, "If you will go to M'Culloch again I will give you a note. If you will come to terms I will call a special meeting next month and grant you the license."
258. Do you not know, as a matter of fact, that licenses cannot be granted at special meetings? I do not know.
259. You know that I have been a licensing magistrate for a great number of years? Yes.
260. Having been a licensing magistrate for a number of years, how do you suppose I could have said that I would call a special meeting? Well, there was a special meeting called.
261. To grant this license? Not this license. The first time that I, Solomon, and Page applied was at a special meeting on the 12th of June.
262. You say that I said I would call a special meeting to grant you a license? Yes; you said, "Leave that to me."
263. You say that after you came back to me I asked you what you had done with my letter? Yes; you said, "Where is the letter?"
264. Did you not tell me you had seen Mr. M'Culloch previously? The day you met me I told you I had seen Mr. M'Culloch.
265. You took the note and went away, and saw me again? Yes.
266. What occurred then? That was the day I came up with the plans, I think. I had a rough pencil sketch.
267. What happened? The first thing you said to me was, "Why don't you go to M'Culloch?" I replied that it was of no use, as I could not raise the money.
268. Did I not ask you if you had sent the letter to Mr. M'Culloch? No.
269. What did I say about the letter? You said, "Where is the letter?" and I said, "It is at home." You said, "Let me have it." The last thing you said was, "Don't forget to post that letter to me."
270. Did I not say it was usual when people had letters given to them—especially when they were given to oblige them—either to deliver them to the person they were directed to, or to return them to the person who gave them? No. You asked me to post the letter to you.
271. And you never did? No.
272. You have made a remark to the effect that I told you that if O'Maley's place was made as big as a castle you could not get a license? Yes.
273. Is it not a fact that I told you that the place having been twice refused it was perfectly impossible to grant you a license, no matter what you did to the place or how big you made it? No.
274. Is it not a fact that at one time you believed the house was shut out from a license because it had been refused twice? At one time I thought so.
275. That was your impression? You thought it was the third time; and I thought so too. You said, "One more refusal will put you out of Court for three years." That was as much as to say I could not apply for a fresh license.
276. Were you not under the impression at that time that two refusals shut a house up? No; I thought it was three refusals.

- Mr. T. Cunco. 277. Did I not tell you at the time that there was no possibility of any of these houses being licensed, even if the Bench were willing, because they had all been shut? No.
- 14 May, 1890. 278. Do you recollect the first time we had any conversation about Bennett—do you recollect me telling you that Bennett's property was in the same position as O'Maley's premises, which has been refused? No.
279. Will you swear it was never said? Yes, I will swear it.
280. When you came pestering me about this house, did I not ask you what on earth you had come about? No, you never did.
281. Did I not ask you why you came pestering me about the place, as it was quite impossible to license the premises? No, you never said that.
282. When you came to see me about the house, did I not, on each occasion, tell you that nothing could be done under any circumstances, as it was excluded by the Act? No; you told me O'Maley would never get a license until the time you proposed this person to buy the property, and that if he bought the property I should get a license.
283. That was quite recently you say—that was the last meeting of all? No; I saw you again after that.
284. Did I not on every occasion tell you it was quite impossible to license O'Maley's premises? No, you never did.
285. But you have stated in your evidence that I never would grant the license? Yes, but still it is not impossible for all that.
286. Did I not tell you O'Maley's place could never be licensed? You said it would never be licensed.
287. Did I never, on any occasion, give you any reasons for it? Yes, you did. You said that O'Maley, when he kept the premises himself, did not carry the place on properly, and that when he was taken to the Court at Parramatta it was through you that he had the chance of selling his license again, and that he did not seem to acknowledge the favour which you had done.
288. I do not quite understand you? What I understood was that you did O'Maley a favour in allowing him to sell his license, instead of having the house closed upon him five years ago.
289. That is a fact, is it not? Yes, it is a fact. The way in which I understood it was that he did not seem to acknowledge the favour.
290. That was the deduction you drew? That was what I thought.
291. You know, as a matter of fact, that I did save O'Maley's license for him? I do not know as a matter of fact, but from what you have told me. O'Maley said it was against the law for him to lose the license at all, because he was only fined once for allowing a man to be drunk on his premises. He had never been fined before, and the Act states you must be fined three times before you can lose your license.
292. You have stated that a remark was made to you about submitting another plan? Yes.
293. And that I showed you some plan of Solomon's? Yes.
294. Is it not a fact that the plan you saw on one occasion with the red line through it was a plan of Merry's for the opposite corner? I do not say there was a red line through it.
295. Is it not a fact that you saw a plan of Merry's in the Court? Yes.
296. And that had a red line through it? I would not swear it was red.
297. It had a line through it—is not that where you got the idea about the red line? No; I got that from you in your dining-room. I went in and you pulled the plans out and showed them to me, and said, "You want to have a large plan drawn to show the Bench," and that I should strike a line through and build a certain portion, and that the other portion could be built when required.
298. Did you not make a remark that the plans you originally exhibited were much too large, and did I not suggest to you that in any plans exhibited you should do the same as was done in Merry's case by showing the plans you proposed finally to carry out, and that a red line should be drawn showing how far you proposed to carry out the building at the present time? No. The only time you made reference to the big plan was when I came with the small ones, and I said, "They are quite sufficient for the present time; they show sixteen rooms."
299. You say Solomon's plans had no red line? I don't think so.
300. They were not very large plans? About fourteen rooms.
301. Then there would not be any possibility of a red line being drawn through plans of a small building like that? You were telling me to get a fresh plan drawn. You were telling me about the improvements which could be made on Solomon's plans, and that the stairs would be better in another place.
302. What is the width of the stairs in O'Maley's house which you are living in at the present time? There is one staircase, which is, I suppose, between 3 and 4 feet.
303. That is in the new building? Yes.
304. What is the width of the staircase in the original part? It is very narrow.
305. Is it 18 inches wide; can you come down them straight without going sideways? Yes. I have seen Solomon going up them, and he is a man of 16 stone.
306. Is that staircase 18 inches wide? I dare say it is.
307. And that is the sole means of access to the upper portion of the old premises? Yes; there are only two attics, and they have to come down.
308. Is it not a fact that that is the only means of access to that part of the building? Yes.
309. And the staircase goes from top to bottom without any break? They are straight stairs.
310. There is no landing on the top? The stairs are straight.
311. And that is the only means of access to that part of the house? That part of the house is never used at all.
312. But you count that part as rooms in the house? Hardly. They would not have been called rooms in the new plans. The house is up to the requirements of the Act without these rooms.
313. You have known O'Maley for many years? Yes.
314. Is he a sober man? I have never seen him anything else.
315. Have you never seen him drunk? No.
316. Have you not seen him drunk hundreds of times? No; I have not seen him drunk in my life.
317. Has he ever been in a private lunatic asylum? This is the first time I have ever heard of it.
318. You have never heard that he was other than a steady man? Of course you hear a lot of things.
319. Have you ever seen him the worse for liquor? I have never seen him drunk in my life, and I have known him a long time.





- Mr. S. Cornwell.  
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365. Whom did he say he had engaged? Slattery and Heydon, I believe.
366. Did you write to anybody on his behalf? No.
367. Did you tell him at any time to put in the application, that it would be alright, and that you had received a telegram? No.
368. And you again swear that you never received any such telegram? From Mr. Manning?
369. From anybody connected with the Licensing Bench, and in connection with this license? No.
370. From anyone at all? Not to my knowledge.
371. Did Cuneo speak to you twice in regard to this telegram? During the time the inquiry was proceeding?
372. Yes? No.
373. Has he at any time spoken to you twice about this telegram? No.
374. Only once? Only once.
375. Have you had any conversation with Mr. Manning? No; I do not know Mr. Manning.
376. Or anybody from Mr. Manning? No.
377. Has anyone besides Cuneo spoken to you about this telegram? No.
378. No one at all? No.
379. Which is the nearest telegraph office to where you live? I could not tell you.
380. Tell us the ones which are nearest? Waterloo, Redfern, and Surry Hills.
381. In what street is the one at Surry Hills? Crown-street.
382. And at Redfern? I do not know. The Crown-street office is the only one I am acquainted with.
383. What is your brother's name? John Cornwell.
384. Is there another brother in the firm? No.
385. Is there a brother at home? Yes.
386. Did you speak to him in reference to this telegram? No.
387. Have you the summons with you which has been served upon you? Yes.
388. Did you show it to your brother? Yes.
389. Had you any conversation with him in regard to the telegram mentioned in the summons? Yes.
390. Did your brother know anything about it? Nothing whatever.
391. *Mr. Wall.*] Were you, when this interview took place, on friendly terms with Cuneo? Yes.
392. Are you still on friendly terms with him? I only know him through his being a son of a person at Ryde, whom my brother knew personally.
393. Did he ask you civilly for the telegram? Yes.
394. Are you in the habit of turning your back upon people when they ask a civil question, and not giving an answer? No.
395. Why did you do it on this occasion? From what he told me about some letter with which I did not want to have anything to do.
396. From what he told you? Yes.
397. What did the letter refer to? I could not say distinctly. It was a letter from Mr. Manning to some one else which was intercepted or in his possession.
398. What was the question he put to you when he interviewed you in reference to the telegram? He spoke to me about the letter first.
399. But what did he say in reference to the telegram? I could not say the exact words.
400. You have a very bad memory, you are very clear as to turning your back upon him, and not replying? I could not say that I exactly turned my back upon him—I walked away.
401. Do you know anything at all about the interview which took place;—is your memory as defective upon every point as upon this? I know clearly what actually took place.
402. We want to know clearly what actually took place—what questions were put to you in reference to the telegram, and what your replies were (if any);—I ask you again, what was the conversation which took place between you when you were asked for the telegram? I could not tell you the exact words he used.
403. You may tell us the demand he made? He asked me if I had any telegrams or letters from Mr. Manning in my possession, and I believe I said no.
404. Did you receive any telegram in reference to this application? Not to my knowledge.
405. From no person whatever? From no person.
406. Did any member of your firm receive a telegram in reference to the granting of this license or application? Not that I know of.
407. You appeared to be in some doubt a little while ago when this question was put to you as to receiving a telegram from any person in reference to the application? Yes, because I have no knowledge of any.
408. *Chairman.*] When Cuneo called upon you on the second visit after this inquiry was ordered by the House, what did he say to you? I do not recollect him coming on a second visit.
409. Did he say he had come in reference to the telegram which you had received? No; I believe he asked me if I had any telegram or papers in my possession.
410. *Mr. Wall.*] You state in one part of your evidence that you did not reply, and that you turned round and walked away. In the latter part of your evidence you state that you said "No" when asked for the telegram—which is the correct statement? I could not swear exactly.
411. Then you are not certain as to whether you walked away or not? I know I went away abruptly.
412. You do not know whether you gave an answer or not. It is as well that we should know which part of your evidence we should rely on; I would like to know which of your statements we should take as correct? Both. I said "No," and walked away.
413. But you have stated that you made no reply whatever? Well, I would not be certain.
414. I should recommend you to correct your evidence. We want a clear statement in regard to the case, and what you have said is certainly very conflicting. In one instance you said you walked away without giving a reply, and in the other instance you say you replied "No," and then walked away. If your memory will not serve you in the matter it will be better for you to say so? [*No answer.*]
415. Was the first visit of Cuneo in reference to the proposed license made by appointment? No; O'Maley brought him. O'Maley did not think he could get a license himself for the house and he recommended Cuneo, and agreed with Cuneo to give me, I believe, £1,000 for a fresh lease, and he came to us to get a portion of the money advanced.

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416. On that occasion, did Cunco, after some conversation, tell you that his application was already in, so that it was all right. Do you remember advising him to put his application in? Yes.
417. And did he tell you it was already in, and that it was all right? Something to that effect.
418. How many visits has Cunco paid to you on this subject—two or three? I could not say exactly; it is more than two.
419. There was a third visit? There may have been a third visit.
420. *Chairman.*] You have already stated that there was only one visit? There was only one visit after the inquiry was instituted.
421. *Mr. Paul.*] In answer to the Chairman you have stated positively that you did not receive a telegram from Mr. Manning? Yes.
422. And then you are asked “did you receive one from anyone,” and you hesitated and said, “I could not say.” Does not that mean you did not receive one, or could not say that you received one? I have no recollection of one.
423. *Mr. Kidd.*] Did you tell O’Maley that you got a telegram from anybody? No, not to my knowledge; I do not recollect.
424. Did it not strike you as very strange for Cunco to come and inquire about a telegram which you had never received? Yes, very strange.
425. If you deemed the application such a strange one, why did you not tell the man you had not received a telegram? I believe I did tell him I had not received one.
426. Would it not strike you that Mr. Cunco must have obtained information from somebody that you had received a telegram. Supposing I came to you and inquired about a matter of which you were totally ignorant, would you not say, “It is impossible; you must be dreaming,” or something of that kind. You see that Mr. Cunco comes here and states that he saw a telegram, and that you stated you had received it? [*No answer.*]
427. *Mr. Paul.*] Did you tell Cunco that you would not give him the telegram, but would bring it to the Committee if required?—
428. *Mr. Kidd.*] You cannot account for not replying to him—you have no recollection? No; he made some remark to the effect that if it were not produced he could get a copy.
429. That would be an admission so far, on your part, that you had really got a telegram from somebody. Supposing anyone else charged you with having received a telegram, and stated that if you did not produce it he would get a copy, would it not induce you to say something in denial or as to the truth of the statement he was then making? Yes, it would.
430. *Mr. Paul.*] Was O’Maley in company with Cunco upon either of the visits? I believe O’Maley was with Cunco when he saw me in reference to the telegram, but he was not absolutely present, but on the premises.
431. Was O’Maley with him on a previous visit when you recommended him to put in his application? I could not say for certain.
432. *Chairman.*] Did not you say that O’Maley introduced him to you? O’Maley brought him before that.
433. *Mr. Paul.*] To where? To the brewery, before putting his application in.
434. So that you have now fixed at least three visits of Cunco’s? I could not say exactly how many visits there were. There must have been three at least.
435. Do you remember on the occasion of the second visit whether O’Maley was present or not? I could not say for certain.
436. *Chairman.*] You say O’Maley had brought Cunco to see whether you would advance the money;—were they to call again for an answer? I believe so.
437. In the meantime, of whom did you make inquiry? I saw my brother about it. I wanted to know if he knew Cunco, and whether he was willing to make the necessary advances.
438. Did you send anybody to see the premises? No.
439. Have you an agent at Ryde or Hunter’s Hill? No.
440. Who attends to your business up that way? We have no business up that way—at least we had not at that time.
441. You still swear that you did not receive from anybody a telegram in connection with this application of Cunco’s? To the best of my belief I did not.
442. Cunco told you that he was to give O’Maley £1,000 for the lease? I believe that was the amount.
443. So that you had some thought as to the conditions under which Cunco was getting the lease? Yes.
444. Was your brother present? No; not that I know of. I do not think he was on that occasion.
445. If Cunco has sworn that you showed him a telegram in connection with this application for the license, are you prepared to deny the correctness of the statement? I have no recollection of showing him any telegram; I may have had some telegram in my hand in connection with the business.
446. Do you remember having a telegram in your hand at any time when you were speaking to Cunco? No; but I might have had one.
447. *Mr. Wall.*] You say Cunco visited you on three occasions;—on how many occasions during the three did he refer to this telegram? Only once.
448. Was that on the last occasion? Yes, on the last occasion.
449. *Mr. Manning.*] Have you ever seen me before to-day? Not to my knowledge.
450. Not to know me? No.
451. Have you ever had any communication of any sort whatever from me in your lifetime? No.
452. Therefore you never could have received a telegram from me? No.
453. Did you ever receive any telegram in which my name appeared—I do not mean as a signature, but in which it appeared at all? No.
454. If Mr. Cunco states that you showed him a telegram from me, is that true or not? It cannot be true.
- 454½. It is not true? No.
455. If he says you showed him a telegram upon which my name appeared, is that true? He must have made a mistake.
456. If he says you told him you had received a telegram from me, is that true? It must be a mistake, for I never received one.
457. It is impossible, for you never received one? Yes.
458. Did you show him any telegram, and say, “Here you are; are you satisfied now?” Not to my knowledge.

- Mr. S. Cornwell.  
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459. Did you show him any telegram and say, "Here you are; are you satisfied now?" I never showed him such a telegram.
460. You are Mr. Samuel Cornwell—are you not? Yes.
461. Cuneo says he went to you on the occasion of the last visit for a telegram. Did you reply, "No, I cannot give it to you; it was sent to me in confidence"? No.
462. Then that is not true? It is not true.
463. And did you tell him then that it came from me? No.
464. If he has stated that on two occasions he told you that he had received a telegram from me that also is untrue? It is a mistake.
465. When he came to you on the first occasion, did he say anything as to why he wanted help from you? I do not recollect him saying why he wanted help. I understood him that he had not got the whole of the money to purchase.
466. I am speaking in reference to O'Maley's premises. Did O'Maley say anything to you about wanting money to repair the building, or to make alterations? To make such alterations which would bring it up to the details of some plan which he had.
467. Did he say anything on either occasion about me being the objectionable magistrate, or anything of that kind? He seemed to think he was not being properly treated in regard to the hotel, and your name came into the matter in that way.
468. Did he make use of any threats against me? I do not know that he used any threats. He seemed to consider that you had treated him harshly in the matter.
469. Mr. Kidd.] Was that O'Maley? Yes.
470. Mr. Manning.] What were Cuneo's remarks? I do not recollect Cuneo making any remark about it. He only mentioned your name in connection with the matter.
471. I ask you again did you or your firm at any time receive a verbal or written communication at any time from me? No.
472. Or in my name? No.
473. Chairman.] Why do you swear your firm never received any such communication? I open all letters addressed to the firm.
474. Including telegrams? Yes.
475. And they are never opened by anybody but you? Well, they may be opened by my directions when I am away, but still I see them when I come back. They are put before me. My brother is never there to open letters.
476. Mr. Manning.] You swear positively you never showed anybody a telegram received from me, and that you never stated you received a telegram from me? Yes.
477. Mr. Kidd.] About what month did this interview between yourself, O'Maley, and Cuneo take place? I think it would be the early part of June.
478. Some time in June? Yes.
479. Mr. Plumb.] As a matter of fact, then, you never showed or told Cuneo that you had a telegram from Mr. Manning stating that the license would be all right? No.
480. Mr. Manning.] When these people applied to you for assistance, did you make any inquiry about them before you thought of lending the money? We asked Cuneo as to whether the police had any objection to him.
481. Did you make any inquiries outside? The only thing we can do is to find out if the police have no objection, and then, of course, we have no objection.
482. Are you in the habit of advancing money to anybody who applies to you so long as the police are not against him? Yes, so long as the police have no objection, and their general character is good.
483. Did you make any inquiries upon that point? Well, we have no means of inquiring. The only thing my brother took into consideration was the fact that he had a slight knowledge of him when he was serving his father, but personally I never knew anything at all about Cuneo.
484. Did you know anything about O'Maley? We know from what he told us some time ago that he blamed Mr. Manning for compelling him, as it were—I cannot recollect the exact words he used—to sell out; and that seemed to be still in his mind. It seems that he was fined for having, as he told us, a drunken man on his licensed premises. The man was fined first, and he was fined afterwards, and he said the police had an objection to him holding a license, and he was obliged to transfer the license to save the house from being shut up.
485. Mr. Plumb.] O'Maley did not stand well with the police then? We only know what he told us; we did not know the real facts of the case. He also said that recently his house had been condemned for some leaky roof.

Patrick O'Maley called in, sworn, and examined:—

- Mr. P. O'Maley.  
21 May, 1890.
486. Chairman.] Where do you reside? At Hunter's Hill.
487. How long have you been residing there? I first went there in 1860, but I have been away for fourteen years since that time.
488. When did you first apply for a license for the "Fig-tree Inn"? In May, 1879.
489. Was it granted? Yes.
490. How long did you hold that license? For five years and a month or two.
491. What became of the license then? It was transferred to another man.
492. Do you remember his name? Charles Braddick.
493. How did that transfer come about? I was summoned for allowing a man to be drunk on my licensed premises, and I was fined a certain amount. That was in the month of June.
494. How much were you fined? £3 odd. I do not know exactly how much.
495. Had you ever been fined before that? Never.
496. Nor charged with any offence under the Licensing Act? Never.
497. What was your next proceeding in regard to your license after you were fined for allowing a drunken man to remain on the premises? In that same month the license had to be renewed at Parramatta. At that time I was a juror at Darlinghurst, and when the application for the renewal came on I sent my wife to the Court. She met the police-sergeant on the steamer, and he said to her, "You have no occasion to

go up to-day, because there are no complaints against you." She replied, "My husband has sent me up for a certificate, so that we can get on with our business." I am told that when the policeman went into court he lodged a complaint against me as being an habitual drunkard.

498-9. Had you ever been fined for drunkenness? Never.

500. Can you tell us who were on the Bench on that occasion? Mr. John Manning and another magistrate—Mr. Byrnes, I think.

501. What was the result of the constable's objection? They postponed the application, I think, for a week or two until I could appear, and then the result was that I got leave to sell out.

502. They made that a condition of granting you a renewal? Yes; they gave me so many days to get another man to take the house.

503. The house was then held by tenants, and it came into the hands of a man named Solomon? Yes.

504. When would Solomon's lease terminate? On the 30th June, 1889.

505. Did Solomon make application for a renewal of that license? He did.

506. On the 30th June the license would expire? Yes. The lease and the license expired on the same day.

507. Before the expiry of the lease, had Solomon made proposals to you for its renewal? Yes.

508. How long had Solomon been in the house? Sixteen and a half months.

509. And he made application to you for a renewal of the lease? Yes.

510. Did he say for how long? He said for five years.

511. At the same rental? Yes.

512. He did not ask for a decreased rental? No.

513. Had he been doing well in the house? Very well indeed. If he had not he would not have asked for a new lease.

514. So that the house was wanted in the public interests? Yes.

515. It was well patronised by the public? Very well indeed. It is in the best position in the whole of the district.

516. *Mr. Kidd.*] Patronised for what? For accommodation.

517. Did many people put up there? Yes. It was at the corner of the main road from Sydney. You cannot go to the North Shore or North Willoughby without passing it.

518. Did many people lodge there? Occasionally.

519. How often? I could not say that.

520. *Chairman.*] You were not living in the hotel after you let it? Not for the last five years.

521. *Mr. Kidd.*] It was a handy place for refreshment for people passing? It was.

522. And that was the principal business, I suppose? That was part of it, I dare say.

523. *Chairman.*] Since your license was granted another has been granted to a place near at hand? Yes.

524. Who was that granted for? To a man named Nuttman.

525. For what place? The "Gladstone Hotel."

526. Is that a large hotel? Yes; it is eighteen rooms.

527. Did you hear the landlord say, on oath, in the Ryde Court that it was nearly always full? Yes; I heard him say that one time, but I heard him say differently another time.

528. You say that Solomon applied to you for a renewal of the lease? Yes.

529. Did you come to any arrangement with him? No.

530. Whom did you come to an arrangement with? Cuneo.

531. What was Cuneo to give you for the lease? £1,050 for a seven and a half years' lease, and £4 a week rent, and he was to keep the place in order.

532. Did you ever have any talk with Solomon with regard to the renewal of the license? No; I do not think so.

533. Was anything said about improvements wanted for the place? Solomon was only there for three or four months in the previous year, when he applied for a renewal of his license, and there was some objection, because of the leakage in the roof. Solomon got so many days to make the repairs, and he came to me to do it. There was a small staircase in the house, and it has been there since the day it was first licensed. Solomon came to me and said, "I have so many days to put the roof in order; will you do it?" I said I would, and I went and obtained men and put them on the work next day.

534. When the time for the next renewal was approaching, did you see Solomon in regard to the carrying out of certain repairs to the house? Yes.

535. What occurred then? I went to Solomon and asked him if he were willing to allow me to make some alterations and additions to the place. He said he had an objection, and that he would not allow me to shingle the roof or do anything to the place without coming to his terms. I asked him what were his terms, and he said, "I will give you £200 on a five years' lease if you like; or you give the money I paid on going into the house, and I will give up the place to you." I said, "I cannot take your £200, for I can get a lot more for it." "Well," he said, "I will keep on until my lease expires, and I will shut your house." He said, "Your place will never be open again as long as Mr. Manning has a seat on the Bench." I said, "How do you know that?" and he replied, "I know it," but he did not tell me how he knew it.

536. Did he say he had seen Mr. Manning at all? No; but that is what he told me. After the house was shut up I was speaking along with Cuneo to Solomon. Solomon said, "O'Maley, you must not blame me for your license running out. If I had allowed you to do anything to your place Mr. Manning would have cancelled my license." I replied, "That is pretty hard, Solomon; you never told me that before."

537. *Mr. Kidd.*] That was in the month of June, just before he was leaving? No. It was after the house was shut.

538. Was it in June that Mr. Manning held out that threat? That was some time before the license expired. I could not tell you in what month.

539. In making that statement to you he knew at the time that you would not agree to any compromise with him, or rather that you were not likely to agree? Yes.

540. *Chairman.*] How much of his lease and license was there to run when the Court for the renewal was held;—do you remember when the renewal Court was held? I think it must have been in June.

541. Was it not in April? Very likely. I am not sure.

542. The Court was held in April? I cannot say that it was held in April. April would be the quarterly licensing month, and in this instance the applications would be for renewals and transfers.

543. You are aware that Cuneo made application for a conditional license? Yes.

544.

- Mr. P. O'Maley. 544. What sized house did the plans show? About twenty-six rooms.
545. Is the house as it stands now substantial and well built? Yes; it is stone-built. When it was first licensed, after the new Act of 1882, I put on an addition which cost me over £500.
- 21 May, 1890. 546. Whilst you were holding the license the Bench thought there was room for another house, and granted another license? They granted the "Gladstone" license.
547. Do you remember whether Mr. Manning sat on the Bench which granted that license? Yes.
548. What was done in connection with the renewal of the license for the "Fig-tree"? It was refused.
549. Upon what grounds? They had some sort of charge that there was a leakage in the roof. There was the same complaint when I put the roof in order the year before, and they never withdrew the complaint, but left it as it stood.
550. Was Mr. Manning on the Bench when the license was refused? Yes.
551. And who else? Mr. Jeanneret, I think.
552. You subsequently put in an application yourself? Yes.
553. Who sat on the Bench then? Mr. Manning and Mr. Jeanneret.
554. They refused your application? Yes.
555. Upon what grounds? Firstly, that the reasonable requirements of the district did not justify it; secondly, that it was close to a place of public worship; and thirdly, that I was a person not fit to hold a publican's license. That was the sergeant's report.
556. Was the place of worship in existence when your house was licensed over ten years ago? Yes; it has been there for twenty-eight years.
557. And I believe it was there when you got your license? Yes.
558. What convictions and charges did they allege against you on the ground that you were not a fit person to hold a license? I was never summoned to a Court in my life except for allowing a man to be drunk on my licensed premises.
559. Mr. D'Ardier did not sit on the Bench with Mr. Manning and Mr. Jeanneret? Not the last time.
560. Do you know whether he has sat on the Bench at all since Mr. D'Ardier and Mr. Jeanneret sat together, and Mr. Jeanneret refused Cuneo's application? Mr. D'Ardier and Mr. Jeanneret sat together on one occasion, when Mr. Jeanneret did all he could to get Mr. D'Ardier to go with him in refusing the application.
561. But can you say whether Mr. D'Ardier has sat on the Bench since? I am not quite sure, but I don't think he has.
562. You say that Mr. Jeanneret tried to get Mr. D'Ardier to go with him? Yes.
563. That was the time when Cuneo's application was refused? Yes.
564. Have you seen Mr. Manning to speak to since your house has been shut up? Yes.
565. How did you come to see him? He sent for me.
566. Who told you he wanted you? Cuneo told me he wanted to see me.
567. Did you go? Yes; Cuneo drove me as far as the gate, and I saw Mr. Manning in the yard.
568. Did you go in, or did he come out to you? I went within the gate. The first words he said were, "Cuneo was here yesterday." I said, "Yes; he told me you wanted to see me." He said, "Yes, I want to see you—will you sell that property of yours: how much land is there to it?" I told him.
569. Did he wait for an answer when he asked you if you would sell the property, or did he immediately say, "How much land is there to it?" As soon as he asked me to sell the place I said, "No; I do not intend to sell it"; and he then said, "How much land is there to it; and in case you would sell it, what would you want for it?"
570. Did you make a reply? Yes; I said I was offered £4,000 for it, and he said, "You ought to jump at the half of it." He said, "I know the reason why you did not take that amount;" and I said, "What is the reason?" He said, "Because you do not want to rob people." I said, "I never robbed a man in my life." "Well," he said, "If you will sell it I know a person who will buy it." He also said, "We can get two or three other corners which will do as well." I asked, "Where are they?" and he said, "Why, there is Derham's corner, for instance," and I replied, "It is not for sale." He said, "That is all you know about it." I said, "Very well; I won't sell mine." "Very well," he said, "if you do not sell it, as long as you own it, or anyone belonging to you, it will never be licensed while I have a seat on the Bench, so you can make up your mind. I will give you forty-eight hours to consider."
571. Was Cuneo's name mentioned at all? He said, "Cuneo was here yesterday"; that is all.
572. Mr. Kidd.] Did the police report against the house when the renewal was sought for by Solomons? I have had no notice of any reports.
573. You are not aware that the police reported against the house? No.
574. Did the police report against you as being an improper person to hold a license when you made application for a conditional license? No.
575. Did they lodge any objections in the Court? They never gave me notice of what they did in the Court. They gave me notice to the effect that the reasonable requirements of the district did not justify the license, that the house was close to a place of public worship, and that I was not a fit person to hold a license. That was after I put in my applications for a conditional license.
576. Mr. Wall.] How long have you been a holder of a license? Five years.
577. Have you ever held a license anywhere else? Never.
578. Did you erect those premises? I did.
579. How many hotels were there in the vicinity when you erected it? Only the "Garibaldi" at that time; it was half a mile away.
580. Has the population increased since then? Terribly. It has increased one and a half times as much as it used to be. A great many buildings have been put up, and a great many alterations made.
581. Has the hotel accommodation increased with the population? Yes; two hotels have been built,—one of them about 2 miles away from me.
582. How long is it since those hotels were licensed? I think the "Gladstone" has been licensed for four years.
583. How long is it since the other hotel was licensed? I could not tell you, but it was about the same time, I think.
584. How long is it since your house was licensed? It was first licensed in May, 1879.
585. And it is four years since the other houses were licensed? It may be more, but I am not certain.

586. Has the population increased during the last four years? Not a great deal, I should think.
587. *Mr. Kidd.*] No new licenses have been granted since the refusal of yours? No.
588. *Chairman.*] You have never let a meeting of the Bench go by without having an application in? No.
589. *Mr. Plumb.*] You have put in an application at every licensing meeting since the license was refused twelve months ago? I do not know about every meeting.
590. *Chairman.*] But an application has been put in on behalf of your house? Yes, by Cuneo or somebody.
591. *Mr. Wall.*] Is this house, for which a license has been refused, an inferior or a superior house to those which have been licensed;—is the accommodation better or worse? I do not think the accommodation is so good as the house which was licensed since the refusal.
592. You think that the accommodation is better in the other house than in the new? Yes; I only speak what is true.
593. Is the accommodation in the two houses which are now licensed better than the accommodation in yours? I believe that both houses are larger than mine. In the Court, however, I showed plans of additions to my place which would make it larger than the others.
594. And you asked for a license in accordance with the plans produced? Yes.
595. *Mr. Manning.*] Were not the magistrates who sat upon your case at Parramatta, Mr. Byrnes (the Chairman), Mr. Stewart, and myself;—was there not a full Bench? I could not say. I recollect Mr. Byrnes and yourself.
596. You do not know whether Mr. Stewart was there? I do not know.
597. You were reported against by them as being of drunken habits, were you not? Yes.
598. Whom by? Sergeant Beatty.
599. That is the man that was shot the other day at Parramatta? That is the man whom you reported as an habitual drunkard.
600. I never did anything of the sort? You did; it was tried in the Court at Ryde.
601. He was Licensing Inspector in the Ryde District at the time? Yes.
602. And the Bench gave you two or three weeks to transfer your license to some one else? Yes.
603. And that was in consequence of this inspector reporting that you were of drunken habits? Yes.
604. How came you to say just now that it was because you had been fined through some drunken men being on your premises? I said I was summoned to the Ryde Court, and was fined a certain amount for allowing a man to be drunk on the premises. In the same month I had to make application at Parramatta for a renewal of the license, and Sergeant Beatty told my wife on the steamer that there were no complaints against me.
605. Was the reason of your license being taken from you at Parramatta because you had been fined for having drunken men on your premises? I could not say that it was. Sergeant Beatty once said to me, "Never blame me for taking your license away, for I had to do it; I was compelled to report you by Mr. Manning." Beatty is dead now.
606. Were you not frequently cautioned, and Solomon also, about putting your premises at Hunter's Hill in proper order? No; I never got notice at all.
607. You never got notice at any time from any policeman or official to put your premises in proper order at Hunter's Hill? No; Solomon told me you objected to a narrow staircase in the place, and that he was to see that that was altered before he again applied for a renewal to you. I wanted to make the alterations and additions, and Solomon refused to allow me. Solomon afterwards distinctly told me that if he had allowed me to make these alterations you had threatened to cancel the license.
608. Did Sergeant Dove, the inspector of the district, ever call upon you to put your house in proper order, and caution you that if you did not do so what would be the result? Could I do it when the tenant would not allow me?
609. Did Dove ever call upon you to put your house in proper order? No, he did not.
610. Did Sergeant Dove and Constable Harper at any time call upon you at Hunter's Hill in reference to your house? No.
611. Were you ever spoken to in open Court at Ryde, from the Bench, about putting your premises in order? No; but I asked the Bench if they would allow me to make these alterations, and I got no reply from them.
612. *Chairman.*] When was this? On the different occasions when we produced the plans.
613. *Mr. Wall.*] Do you know whether the police at any time directed Solomon's attention to the house, in consequence of its being in a bad state of repair? I was not aware of it.
614. *Mr. Manning.*] Do you know Mr. Pope, the Clerk of Petty Sessions at Ryde? Yes.
615. Did you ever have any conversation with him about the disputes between you and Solomon? No.
616. Did Mr. Pope ever caution you that your and Solomon's quarrelling in the way you were doing would probably result in the loss of the license? No.
617. Did you ever have any conversation with Pope upon that subject? I could not tell you; I cannot remember.
618. You say you never spoke to him, and that he never gave you any advice? I could not say whether I ever spoke to him.
619. But you say he never cautioned you as to what the result would be if you went on in the way you were going? I do not understand what you mean by saying the way in which I was going.
620. You say Pope never spoke to you? I do not say Pope never spoke to me.
621. Upon that subject? The only difference between Solomon and myself was because I would not give him a new lease.
622. Did Mr. Pope ever caution you as to what would be the result if you did not carry out certain repairs? No, he did not; and I did not consider it was any of his business. He told me if I did not give Solomon a new lease he was afraid my house would be shut.
623. After the house was closed, did you not say to Pope, "I see you were right after all in the advice you gave me"? I did not.
624. *Chairman.*] Do you know Cornwell, the brewer? Yes.
625. Did you ever go to their place with Cuneo? Yes, at different times.
626. How often? Five or six times, I daresay.
627. Do you know Mr. Samuel Cornwell? Yes.
628. Have you seen him outside to-day? Yes. I know him well, and he knows me.

629. Did you introduce Cuneo to him? I did.
630. Was that before an application had been made by Cuneo for the license? I think it was about that time.
631. Did you hear any conversation between Cornwell and Cuneo in regard to this license? Many a time. Mr. John Cornwell told me I could not get a better man than Cuneo to take the house.
632. Did you ever see Mr. Samuel Cornwell when he read or handed a telegram to Cuneo? Yes; we were together at the time.
633. Do you remember what that telegram was about? As far as I can remember it was, "Tell Cuneo to put in his application, all right."
634. After Parliament had ordered this inquiry, did you go down in company with Cuneo to Cornwell's? Yes.
635. Whom did you see? Sam. Cornwell.
636. What conversation took place? I cannot exactly remember, but Cuneo asked him for the telegram.
637. What did Cornwell say? He said, "No; I would not divulge anything which has been sent privately to me. I would not be mixed up in a dirty affair for what the brewery is worth."
638. That was the second time reference was made to the telegram in your presence? Yes.
639. Did you see the telegram? I saw it in Cornwell's hands.
640. You did not read it yourself? No.
641. And you cannot say who signed it? No.
642. Mr. Wall.] You are sure you were present at the conversation? Yes.
643. Chairman.] When Cuneo mentioned the telegram, did Cornwell turn on his heel and walk away without speaking? No. He said, "You will find things will be all right."
644. On the second occasion, when Cuneo said he wanted the telegram for the purposes of the Committee, did Cornwell turn on his heel and walk away? No. Cornwell was very friendly with him.
645. Mr. Paul.] Did he say whom the telegram was from? Yes. He said, "I have received a telegram from Manning this morning, stating, 'Tell Cuneo to put in his application—it is all right.'"
646. Mr. Kidd.] That was after Cuneo had put in his conditional application? Yes.
647. When you went down, did you introduce Cuneo to Mr. Samuel Cornwell? I am not sure I introduced him to him or his brother John Cornwell.
648. Are you certain you were in Cornwell's office with Samuel Cornwell when Cuneo was present? Yes; we were together—not in the office, but upstairs in the building. I was there.
649. And if he says you were not there he must have made a mistake? Yes, for I was there.
650. Was this shortly after he had put in the application for a conditional license? Yes.
651. Some months afterwards you went back again for the purpose of having the telegram given up? Yes, and he would not do it.
652. Mr. Wall.] Were you present at all the conversations which took place? Yes, both times.
653. If Mr. Cornwell states that when he was asked to give up the telegram he turned on his heel and walked away, is he making a correct statement? No; he said, "I would not do the like of that, because it was sent to me privately, and I would not be mixed up in this dirty affair for what the brewery is worth."
654. Mr. Manning.] Did you see my name upon the telegram? No; I did not read it.
655. What you say is that Mr. Cornwell read the telegram, and told you it came from me? Yes.
656. You are quite sure? Yes. He said, "I have received a telegram this morning from Mr. Manning."
657. You swear he said that? I do.
658. Mr. Paul.] Did he do anything with the telegram when reading it—did he hand it to any one? No; I do not think so.
659. Mr. Manning.] Did Cuneo have the telegram in his hand? I could not tell you that. Cornwell held it out so that Cuneo could read it. I do not think Cuneo had it in his hand, but I would not like to swear that he did or that he did not.
660. Mr. Kidd.] When Solomon first rented the hotel from you he did not give you any of the money which was to be the consideration for the purchase of the license? No.
661. What rent was he paying you then for it? £4 a week.
662. You did not intend to increase the rent? No.
663. What were you going to charge him the £1,050 for? It was Cuneo who agreed to give me that amount.
664. Chairman.] Why was Cuneo to give you this amount? For a lease of seven and a half years.
665. Mr. Kidd.] And you were to get £4 a week rent besides? Yes.
666. Chairman.] Were you to do anything to the house? I was to make some additions to it.
667. Mr. Manning.] I understand that you gathered from this telegram which Cornwell read to you, and which you state he said came from me, that I was going to assist you in getting a license for the "Fig-tree Inn"? That you were going to assist Cuneo.
668. How do you reconcile that idea with the statement that I am the person who has been opposing the license all through? I say you are opposing me all the time. If you ask my honest opinion, I think you are trying to shut the lot of them up, and that you are humbugging us.
669. Your idea then was that you were going to be humbugged in the same way? Exactly.
670. Mr. Kidd.] Did you believe when you saw the telegram that you were going to be humbugged? No; I thought he had changed his mind.
671. Mr. Manning.] Then you thought I was going to assist you to get the license? We could not think anything else. We thought that you had changed your mind.
672. How do you reconcile that idea with the fact that you had all along fancied I had been opposing you in some mysterious way or other? Well, there was good proof of it.
673. I ask you how you reconcile the two matters? People have been telling me that you would never grant the license.
674. Mr. Kidd.] Do you not think that Solomon would humbug you too, seeing that you were humbugging him, and were not going to give him the renewal of the lease? I was not going to humbug Solomon. He did not go in with the expectation of getting a renewal of the lease from me. He asked me what I wanted for the lease, and I said, "About £1,000," and he replied that it was a power of money, but he would take Mrs. Vaters' lease over.
675. What is the value of the house now? I daresay it has cost me about £1,600 to build it.

676. What is the ground worth? It ought to be worth £12 a foot. Ground which is not so well situated is sold at £9 and £9 10s. a foot.
677. *Mr. Manning.*] How many times did Solomon apply for a conditional license for Mrs. Bennett's corner? Once, and once for the corner just opposite Mrs. Bennett's.
678. You know Solomon was refused twice? Yes.
679. Do you know who were the magistrates on the Bench at the time? No; but I know you were there.
680. Do you recollect Mr. Rodd and myself? Mr. Rodd was there; Mr. Jeanneret was in England at the time.
681. Do you not know that Solomon applied subsequently in connection with the same land? The first time he applied was for the corner where the carpenters are, and he was refused; and the next time he applied for Mrs. Bennett's corner.
682. Will you swear he ever applied for any land at Hunter's Hill except Mrs. Bennett's? I will swear he did.
683. What was the land he applied for? The two corners—one opposite the other.
684. You swear that he never applied twice for Bennett's land? I cannot swear that, but he did once, and Davies applied once for it.
685. Since this Committee sat before—since last month, in fact—you applied for a license in your own name for your own house? Yes.
686. Who was your solicitor? Mr. Crick.
687. In connection with the previous applications, who appeared as solicitor for Cuneo? I believe Mr. Crick appeared on behalf of somebody else.
688. Who appeared for Cuneo on the last occasion? I could not say.
689. Has Mr. Crick appeared more than once? Yes.
690. How many times? I could not tell you.
691. When he appeared for you the other day, did you pay him? I paid his clerk.
692. Did you pay Mr. Crick when he was appearing for Cuneo? I did not.
693. When Williamson appeared for Cuneo, who paid him? I did not.
694. When Mr. Roberts appeared for Cuneo, who paid him? I did.

Mr.  
P. O'Maley.  
21 May, 1890.

Mr. Samuel Cornwell recalled and further examined:—

695. *Mr. Plumb.*] Were Mr. O'Maley and Mr. Cuneo together on a certain occasion when they asked you to give them a telegram which had been sent from Mr. Manning? As far as I recollect, Mr. Cuneo saw me personally, and Mr. O'Maley was out at the gate.
696. Was he not in the same room with you? I do not think so. When Cuneo spoke to me at the door of the office O'Maley was standing at the gate or behind the gate. I did not see him at the time.
697. Did you tell him on that occasion that the telegram referred to was a private communication, and that you would not show it on any account, and that you would not be mixed up with a dirty transaction like the refusal of his license? No; I did not. I said I did not wish to be mixed up in the opening of the letter.
698. *Chairman.*] How could you possibly be mixed up in the opening of the letter when Cuneo opened it? Well, Cuneo wanted me to assist in having an inquiry made. He wanted to know if I had any information which would go against Mr. Manning.
699. Are copies of telegrams usually kept in the office? They are usually piled away with letters.
700. I want you, if you can, to fix the month upon which you first saw Cuneo and O'Maley? I could not tell you.
701. Can you tell us within a month or two? It was sometime prior to June of last year.
702. Was your brother ever a traveller for Mr. Tooth? Yes.
703. That being so he would be pretty well acquainted with the innkeepers of Sydney, suburbs, and district? Yes.
704. And would have known Cuneo pretty well? I do not know whether he would know Cuneo, but he knew his father.
705. You said that O'Maley introduced Cuneo to you? Yes; he brought him to the brewery about the purchasing of the hotel.
706. You say that on the occasion they came about the telegram O'Maley stood behind the gate, and you did not see him? Cuneo told me O'Maley was there; but he was not with Cuneo when Cuneo spoke to me.
707. Did Cuneo ever see you without O'Maley;—were they not always together? Not always.
708. How often did Cuneo see you when O'Maley was not present;—do you remember the occasion of Cuneo coming to the brewery without O'Maley being with him? Yes.
709. When? I could not tell you the date.
710. Before or after Cuneo asked about the telegram? Before.
711. How often before? On one or two occasions.
712. Then that would be four or five occasions that Cuneo was at the brewery? I could not say. Between the beginning of the year and June they came on a good many occasions.
713. In the early part of your evidence you said you could not remember whether they had been once or twice, and you say now that they came on a good many occasions? I am speaking of O'Maley.
714. You say "them," and I take it when you say "them" you mean the two? I could not say on how many occasions O'Maley came to the hotel with Cuneo. I know he came two or three times, and he may have come more.
715. And, in addition to that, you said that Cuneo came once or twice by himself;—do you say that now? I believe he did.
716. Why would O'Maley stop behind when Cuneo came up to see you? I recollect on one occasion Cuneo made an appointment with O'Maley, and O'Maley did not turn up at the time.
717. What has that to do with the question I have asked you? I know on one or two occasions he came by himself.
718. Why did O'Maley not come along with Cuneo when he was there and see you in reference to this telegram? I do not know.

719. Both these men have sworn distinctly, and they closely corroborate one another, that on two occasions you told them you had received this telegram, and that on one occasion you showed it to Cuneo;—do you say now that what they have stated is not correct? I never showed them any telegram.
720. Of any sort? Not to my knowledge, and I am certain I never showed them any telegram from Mr. Manning.
721. You are certain you never showed them any telegram having any reference to the licence of the "Fig-free Inn"? Not to my knowledge.
722. When Cuneo came and asked you about that telegram, did he tell you that an inquiry was going to be held by a Committee of the House;—did you know at that time that the Committee could compel you to come here and give evidence? No.
723. You thought they could not? I did not think anything of the sort. I knew if they summoned me I would be bound to come.
724. Did you then say you would not be mixed up in the dirty affair for the value of the brewery? I said I would not be mixed up in the matter relating to the letter.
725. Did you say anything about the brewery? Not that I know of.
726. When did Cuneo tell you about the letter? Only on that day, to the best of my belief.
727. Do you swear you are not acquainted with Mr. Manning? Yes.
728. You never saw him before to-day? Not to my knowledge, to know him.
729. Do you know whether your brother is acquainted with him? I could not say, but I do not think he is.
730. Or with Mr. Jeanneret? No.
731. *Mr. Manning.*] If Mr. O'Maley has stated that you read out a telegram, and told him that telegram was received from me, is that statement true or false? It must be a mistake, for I never received any telegram.
732. Then it is not true? It is not true.
733. You say again, as you have done before, that you have never received any communication in any shape or form from me? No.

Patrick O'Maley recalled and further examined:—

Mr.  
P. O'Maley.  
21 May, 1890.

734. *Mr. Manning.*] You have stated in your evidence that upon the occasion you came to see me in consequence of being informed by Cuneo that I wanted to see you I asked you questions about the sale of the house;—is it not a fact that when you came in I asked you what you had come for? No; you knew what I had come for.
735. Did you not complain about the way Solomon had treated you? No.
736. Did you say anything about Solomon on that occasion? No.
737. And you swear that what I said to you that I could find someone to buy your premises, or some other corner, was said on that occasion? Yes; you said you knew a party who would buy it.
738. Did I ever bring any party to you to buy it? No; because I told you I would not sell it.
739. You still adhere to the statement that it was in regard to the purchase that I spoke to you on that occasion? Yes.
740. Was anyone there when you had the conversation with me? No.
741. How long did it last? I could not tell you, but it could not have lasted any length of time.
742. You swear you did not speak to me at all about the way in which you had been treated by Solomon? I never mentioned Solomon to you on that day.
743. You have spoken about him on other occasions? I could not remember.
744. Did you ever speak to me about the way you have been treated by Solomon? On one occasion after the Court was over I said, "It was a great pity I am treated like this; I am prepared and willing to make any alterations."
745. Treated whom by? I said it was a pity I was not allowed to do what was required to be done for the place, and your answer was, "Go and see your solicitors about it; I know nothing about it."
746. And you do not recollect at any time saying anything to me about the way you had been treated by Solomon? No; I do not.

Mr. J. E. Manning recalled and further examined:—

Mr. J. E.  
Manning.  
21 May, 1890.

747. *Chairman.*] You stated in your evidence, in answer to the questions I asked you on the last occasion, "Before you examine me I wish to point out that evidence has been given before the Committee by persons bringing charges against me, and I have had no opportunity of seeing this evidence nor is this evidence complete." Had you read the evidence which had then been given? No; I had seen it, but I had not read it through.
748. Where did you see it? I saw it here.
749. Did you ask the official in charge to allow you to have the evidence? Yes, to look at it.
750. How long were you here with the evidence? Five minutes, I should think.
751. Then it is not correct that you had not seen the evidence? I have not gone through the evidence; I saw that there was evidence.
752. You said, "I applied for a copy of the evidence"? Well, I applied to you, Mr. Chairman, by letter.
753. Was that the application you referred to? Yes.
754. Then Mr. Plumb said, "You have not seen a copy of the evidence?" and you replied, "No; and apparently the evidence is not complete." That is not correct; you had seen the evidence, but you had not read it? I had not read it.

WILLIAM PATRICK CRICK, ESQ., IN THE CHAIR.

Mr. J. E. Manning attended on his own behalf.

Margaret Bennett called in, sworn, and examined:—

Mrs.  
M. Bennett.  
29 May, 1890.

755. *Chairman.*] Where do you reside? In Sydney at present.  
 756. Did you live at Hunter's Hill? Yes.  
 757. When did you leave there? About three months ago.  
 758. I believe you own property there? Yes.  
 759. Is it a corner block? Yes.  
 760. Do you know the "Fig-tree Inn"? Yes.  
 761. Is your property far away from the "Fig-tree Inn"? Not very far.  
 762. Do you know a man named Cuneo? Yes.  
 763. Did he come to you in reference to the purchase of your lease of that property? Yes; he seemed to know a great deal about my place. I asked him where he got his information from, and he replied, "The fountain head." I said, "That must be Mr. Manning."  
 764. Tell us the conversation as well as you can remember it? There was nothing more then; but he was to go and see Mr. M'Culloch in reference to the property.  
 765. You mean Mr. M'Culloch the solicitor? Yes.  
 766. Did Cuneo say he would go and see Mr. M'Culloch? Yes, and that he would come back in the evening and tell me, but he did not come.  
 767. Did you go to see him? Yes; I went to his house.  
 768. Did he tell you what price Mr. M'Culloch had asked for the property? Yes.  
 769. What did he say? £2,000.  
 770. What did you say to that? I said, "Why did you not buy when you could have had it for £1,400." I offered him the corner for it—for £1,400.  
 771. Was the property under offer at this time to anybody? Mr. M'Culloch had the sale of it. I had the deeds, but I never did anything with them after my husband's death.  
 772. You did not administer your husband's estate? No.  
 773. Did you have any conversation with Mr. Manning before this in reference to the property? Yes; I went to see Mr. Manning to ascertain whether he could do anything for me in reference to the corner.  
 774. Do you remember what you said to him? Mr. Manning said I should apply to the Bench.  
 775. For what? For a license.  
 776. Did he tell you to go to Mr. M'Culloch the solicitor? Yes; and that I could do nothing until my husband's estate was administered.  
 777. Did you go and see Mr. M'Culloch? Yes.  
 778. Did you give Mr. M'Culloch or Mr. Manning the property for sale? Mr. M'Culloch.  
 779. For how much? Not under £1,400.  
 780. So that £1,400 was the price you were prepared to take? Yes, for the corner piece.  
 781. Did you authorize Mr. M'Culloch to ask £2,000? He was to get as much as he could for it, but not to let it go under £1,400; and if the house I was living in was to be sold too it was not to go for £1,400, but to bring more.  
 782. How much more? As much as he could get.  
 783. How much were you to get when the corner was sold? I could not say. When all expenses were paid I was to get what was coming to me.  
 784. Did you ever have any talk with Mr. Manning as to the amount you were to get for the property? No; I do not think Mr. Manning knew anything about the price of it.  
 785. Did you know that Mr. M'Culloch was in any way connected with Mr. Manning? Not at that time.  
 786. Did you know subsequently? Yes.  
 787. What relation are they? Mr. M'Culloch is Mr. Manning's son-in-law.  
 788. When Cuneo told you he had been asked £2,000 for the property, did you say you wished they would give you half that amount? No; I would not have been satisfied with half.  
 789. Would you have been satisfied with £1,400 clear? Not if I had to leave the property altogether.  
 790. I refer to that part for which a conditional license had been applied;—would you have been satisfied with £1,400 for that? Not if more could have been got for it.  
 791. But if you could not get more you would have taken £1,400? Yes; on condition that I was to live in the house I was in.  
 792. Did you say anything to Cuneo about taking the property out of their hands, and that you yourself would build an hotel? That was at the brewery.  
 793. You said something about taking the property out of their hands? I do not think I said anything about that.  
 794. What do you mean by making reference to a brewery? I said that the brewery could put it up for me.  
 795. Do you remember Cuneo saying to you that it would be of no use, as if you took the property out of their hands you would never get a license for it? No; I never said that.  
 796. Did he say anything about your chance of getting a license? No.  
 797. You say that he stated he got it from the "fountain head"? Yes.  
 798. And you then said that must be Mr. Manning? Yes.  
 799. You knew at once whom he meant? Yes; because no one else knew anything at the time about my business excepting Mr. Manning.  
 800. Is Mr. Manning known at Ryde as the "fountain head";—does he pass by that name? No; but that is what Cuneo said.

Mrs.  
M. Bennett.  
29 May, 1890.

801. Was that the first time you had heard him referred to as the fountain head? Yes.
802. And you knew at once whom it was? Yes.
803. Did you go next morning and see Cunco again? No.
804. Do you remember telling him that you and your son had calculated what it would cost to build a place, and that the interest would be too much for you? Yes.
805. When did you tell him that? Next day.
806. Did you go to see him, or did he come to see you? I went to him.
807. Therefore it is clear to you now that you did have a conversation about building a house on this land? No; it would be impossible for me to build a house.
808. It is clear to you, however, that there must have been some conversation between you and Cunco about building a house? There was something said about it, but it would be an impossibility for me to build a house; I could not do it.
809. So you found out afterwards? Yes; it might have been only talk.
810. Did Mr. Manning tell you that there was a man coming up to make you an offer for the property, and for you to ask as little as you could, as there were other corners for sale? No; he never said that.
811. What did he say in reference to that matter? I never heard anything about it before.
812. Did Mr. Manning tell you anybody was coming after the property? No.
813. Did he ask you the price? No.
814. Did you tell him the price? No.
815. Then he did not know the price you wanted? No. Mr. Manning never asked me any questions about it. He was passing one day, and I called to him and asked him to look at the place, and he did so, and then I showed him the deeds.
816. I want you to fix the date of that conversation? I could not tell you the date.
817. Could you tell us the month? No.
818. Could you tell us in what month Cunco went to Mr. M'Culloch? I could not. I have not a good memory.
819. Could you tell me when you got your letters of administration? I have not got them yet.
820. Have they been applied for? I could not say.
821. Who is acting for you now? Mr. M'Culloch is getting them for me.
822. Is that Mr. Percy M'Culloch? I do not know his Christian name. I went to see him this morning to ask him what I was wanted by the Committee for, and he said, "Simply to answer whatever questions they put to you. Answer them truthfully."
823. Did you then have a talk over this matter? No.
824. Did you ask him anything about your letters of administration? No; I asked him some time ago whether the expenses would be much, and he said he did not think so.
825. Is it twelve months ago since you gave instructions for your letters of administration? I could not say.
826. Is it six months ago? I could not tell.
827. You have no objection to Mr. M'Culloch giving us the information? No.
828. A man named Solomon applied for a conditional license for these premises? Yes.
829. Was that before or after Cunco saw you? Before.
830. How often did Solomon apply? Twice.
831. Did you have any talk with Mr. Manning about Solomon being refused the license? No.
832. What was Solomon to give you for the place? He was to give me nothing; it was the brewery.
833. What brewery? Marshall's Paddington Brewery.
834. What were they to give you? He was to allow me 10s. a week whilst the building was going up, and £1 for twenty-one years, and my own house to live in, and a portion of the yard.
835. Then you were to give him a twenty-one years' lease? Yes; and this property was to fall to me after that time.
836. What was the building to cost? I do not remember.
837. Who transacted the business with Solomon on your behalf? Some gentleman from the brewery.
838. Not Mr. M'Culloch? No.
839. So that it was after Solomon had these transactions with you that you saw Mr. Manning for the first time? No; I saw Mr. Manning before this.
840. Then it was necessary for you before you could give Solomon a lease to have your letters of administration? I do not know.
841. Do you not know that Mr. Manning told you so? Yes; he told me I could do nothing with it.
842. And he told you to go to Mr. M'Culloch? Yes.
843. And you went? Yes.
844. Then you did go to Mr. M'Culloch before Solomon had these transactions? I could not tell you when I went to him.
845. You saw Solomon, and had these interviews with him, after Mr. Manning had told you you could do nothing with the property until you got it in your own name? I could not say; I do not know whether Solomon's business was going on at the same time or not.
846. Was anything drawn between you and Solomon in the agreement? Yes.
847. Did you sign one? Yes.
848. Who brought that agreement? The clerk of the brewery.
849. Was it drawn by a solicitor? No.
850. And you cannot tell us how much they were to expend on the land for this twenty-one years and £1 a week? I could not tell you the amount, but I know it was to be a substantial and good building.
851. Would it have been £1,000 they were to spend upon it? I could not say.
852. *Mr. Manning.*] That property of yours at the corner is divided by a fence, and there are two cottages upon it? Yes.
853. You live in a cottage on the Gladesbury Road—a little shop? I did at that time.
854. Then there is another building, which used to be a police office? Yes.
855. When you say you were going to sell part of the property for £1,400, what property did you refer to—the part where you lived, or the other part? The corner piece.
856. On the Ryde Road? Yes.

857. Then you would still have had a piece with your house upon it? Yes.
858. And you wanted £1,400 for the other piece, and you would still have had the remainder to the good? Yes.
859. When you were told that £2,000 was asked for the land, what was to be included in the land;—was Cuneo to have the whole land? Yes; he was to have the entire block.
860. *Mr. Plumb.*] Both cottages? Yes.
861. *Mr. Manning.*] Was that an out-of-the-way price? No.
862. Is it not a fact that at this time there was a great deal of speculation in land in consequence of it being believed that Tarban bridge would be erected opposite? Yes.
863. And that was the reason that there was a rush for land at the time? Yes.
864. So that really land was worth more then than it is now? Yes.
865. I think you said in answer to the Chairman that I never entered into any negotiations with you for the purchase of your land, but simply advised you to take out your letters of administration, as you could do nothing with the property without them? Yes.

George Solomon called in, sworn, and examined:—

866. *Chairman.*] Where do you reside? At the "Sir William Wallace Hotel," Balmain.
867. Did you ever reside at Hunter's Hill? Yes.
868. Do you know the "Fig-tree Inn" property? Yes.
869. You were a tenant of it once? Yes.
870. Who was the tenant before you? A person named Vaters.
871. I believe your lease expired on the same day as your license, in 1889? Yes.
872. Before the expiration of your lease, did you see the owner of the property, O'Maley, with a view to renewal? Yes.
873. What was the result of your negotiations with him? The result was that my price was not satisfactory.
874. So you did not come to terms for an extension of the lease by way of renewal? No.
875. Before your license expired, had you any conversation with Mr. Manning in reference to this house? The only conversation was that I made an application for a renewal, and a report went in against the house. The result of the report, and the dilapidated condition of the house, was that the application was refused.
876. Had you seen Mr. Manning before that? Yes.
877. Did you tell him that O'Maley wished to make some repairs? Yes; I told Mr. Manning that O'Maley wished to make some repairs. Mr. Manning told me that I had not the authority unless I made application to the Bench to make the repairs.
878. Did he say he would do anything if you did allow O'Maley to make the repairs? I think he told me that if I allowed him to make the repairs without consulting the Licensing Bench he would cancel the license.
879. Did he ever tell you that the "Fig-tree Inn" would never be licensed again while he was on the Bench? No.
880. Did he at any time have any conversation with you in regard to re-licensing the hotel? No.
881. Did you make application for Bennett's corner? Yes.
882. How often? Once.
883. Did you see Mr. Manning before you applied for the license for Bennett's corner? Yes.
884. What steps were taken to assist you in getting a license for Bennett's corner? I produced my plans to Mr. Manning.
885. Where at? At his private residence. He pointed out one or two defects, and asked me to get them remedied. I consulted an architect about the matter, and had them remedied.
886. Did Mr. Manning at any time write a letter to you in reference to Bennett's corner, recommending the corner to the Bench? Mr. Manning did not.
887. Who did? Some other gentleman.
888. His son? I could not swear that it was his son or not.
889. Was Mr. Manning there at the time? Yes.
890. Why did the young gentleman write it out;—did Mr. Manning ask him to do so, so that the Bench would not know his hand-writing? I could not swear to that.
891. What was in the note? It asked me to recommend Mrs. Bennett's corner as a site for an hotel.
892. And that was addressed to the Licensing Bench? I could not say whether it was.
893. Whom was it to go before? That I could not say.
894. What was it for? Just a recommendation for Mrs. Bennett's corner.
895. Would not the Licensing Bench at Ryde hear the application? Yes.
896. Is not Mr. Manning Chairman of the Bench? Yes.
897. So that the letter would go before him as Chairman if he was on the Bench? Yes.
898. This recommendation, then, was to himself, as a member of the Licensing Bench at Ryde? Yes.
899. And written in his own private residence, before the application came on? But there was no application came on.
900. What were the plans for? This occurred when I left. It was not any application for me, or anyone I have known since.
901. Who was applying at that time? No one.
902. And you were asked to recommend the corner as a fit place for an hotel, although nobody was applying for a license for it? That is a fact.
903. Did you know at that time that negotiations were being conducted between Mr. McCulloch and Cuneo for the sale of Bennett's corner? No.
904. Will you tell me how you came to sign this recommendation to the Licensing Bench at Ryde in favour of Bennett's corner;—who asked you to do it? Mr. Manning.
905. Where were you at the time he asked you to do it? In Mr. Manning's private residence.
906. How came you to be there? I had to go there on business to ask Mr. Manning for a character in reference to going into the house where I am living now.

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907. And it was on that occasion he asked you to sign that recommendation to the Bench? Yes.
908. Will you swear he did not write it out first, and that then this young man to whom you refer copied it? Certainly Mr. Manning did write it out.
909. He did write it out, and then got this young man to copy it;—was that young man his son? I could not swear.
910. Do you think he was;—is he known as his son? I think so.
911. And you signed it? Yes.
912. And then Mr. Manning gave you a certificate of character? Yes.
913. I ask you again, did not you at that time, or some other time, in conversation with Mr. Manning, hear him say that O'Maley's corner would not be licensed again? Well, I could not exactly swear to the words.
914. Let us have the effect of what Mr. Manning told you in regard to O'Maley's corner? I saw Mr. Manning before I left, at his residence, and I asked him if he would sit on the Bench to renew the license for me, and he said no, he would not. I had seen Mr. Jeanneret in King-street, and spoke to him; and he told me to go and see Mr. Manning. I saw Mr. Manning, and he said he would not sit on the Bench to renew the license.
915. Did he say it would not be renewed? Yes; he said the license for the house would not be renewed again.
916. And that was before the matter came on in Court? Which matter?
917. Before your application for renewal came on in Court? It was a long time after.
918. You say you first asked Mr. Jeanneret to sit for your renewal, he referred you to Mr. Manning, you went and saw Mr. Manning, and yet you say it was after your application for your renewal? A long time after.
919. How could that be? Because I made application in April.
920. How could you ask them to sit in connection with your application for renewal if your application had been previously refused? O'Maley and Cuneo had come to terms with me to make the alterations. That was in the meantime.
921. Then it was after the application had been refused that you saw Mr. Manning? Yes.
922. Before that you saw Mr. Jeanneret? Yes. I asked him if he would sit on the Bench if Mr. Manning were agreeable to renew the license. He said, "Go and see Mr. Manning; if Mr. Manning is agreeable, I am."
923. You went and saw Mr. Manning? Yes.
924. Did you tell him what you had said to Mr. Jeanneret? No.
925. Did you mention that you had seen him? No.
926. Did you mention that you had come to terms with O'Maley and Cuneo, and that you intended to apply for a renewal? I told him I had come to terms with O'Maley, but I did not tell him what the terms were.
927. What did Mr. Manning say? He said he would not sit, and he would not renew the license.
928. Did he say that the house would not be licensed while O'Maley owned it? He did.
929. You denied that some time ago—I would like you to remember you are on your oath? On that occasion?
930. I asked you on any occasion? You were referring to a future occasion.
931. He told you the house would never be licensed while O'Maley owned it? Yes, on this occasion. I have spoken to Mr. Manning on two or three occasions.
932. You are not here to fence questions, but to tell the truth? I am speaking the truth.
933. What became of the plans you deposited when you applied for a license for Bennett's corner;—did you lodge them in Court? No; I did in connection with my own application.
934. I mean your own application;—did you take them out after your application was refused? Yes.
935. Can you explain how they came to be at Mr. Manning's private residence? When I lent them to Mrs. Bennett to make the application for the corner I requested Mr. Manning to look after them for me, or I sent word to him.
936. Whom did you send word by? I am not certain. I think I saw Mr. Manning.
937. Where did you see him? In Balmain, I think.
938. And you gave him the plans then? No; I gave the plans to Mrs. Bennett's son.
939. What did you say to Mr. Manning? I asked him to detain and look after the plans.
940. Did Mr. Manning tell you that Cuneo was negotiating for the purchase of Bennett's corner? No.
941. Who told you Cuneo was negotiating for the purchase of Bennett's corner? Cuneo came to my place and showed me a letter which had been written by Mr. Manning, and told me what the negotiations were between himself and Mr. McCulloch.
942. What did you say to Cuneo on that occasion in reference to Mr. Manning? Nothing more than that I had recommended the corner to Mr. Manning.
943. It was then that you told Cuneo about Mr. Manning writing a letter, and his son copying it? Yes; of course I was not certain about it being his son.
944. You say you asked Mr. Manning to look after the plans;—is it not a fact that you had some considerable difficulty in finding out where they were? Yes.
945. How do you reconcile that with the statement you have made just now;—you said first that you told Mr. Manning to look after them? It is easily accounted for. I gave the plans to Mrs. Bennett's son, for Mrs. Bennett to make an application for Davis. Of course I think Mr. Davis's application was illegal.
946. Then you had some trouble to find the plans, although you knew all along that Mrs. Bennett or Mr. Manning had them? Yes.
947. Is that your evidence? Yes.
948. Do you know a man named Merry? Yes.
949. Who is he? He keeps the "Gladstone Hotel."
950. Did he come to your house in Balmain not long ago? Yes.
951. What did he say to you when he came? He said, "Anything you know about Mr. Manning keep to yourself." He said it would do me no good, and that it would be a disadvantage to my future interests.
952. Did he ask you to meet Mr. Manning himself in Sydney next day? Yes.
953. What did you reply to that? I said no; I had no business to do it.

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954. Did he refer to this inquiry? No. He said, "I have to see Mr. Manning in town; if you have no objections, I will see you also." I said, "No; I cannot leave my business."
955. Did he tell you about this inquiry? No.
956. Then why did he ask you to keep what you knew about Mr. Manning to yourself? That I could not say.
957. Did Mr. Manning sit on the Bench when Merry got his license for the "Gladstone Hotel"? The license to the "Gladstone" was granted before Merry took it.
958. And Merry got a transfer? Yes.
959. From Mr. Manning? Yes.
960. Mr. Jeanneret was quite agreeable to give Cuneo a license if Mr. Manning was agreeable? I could not say that.
961. What do you say? Mr. Jeanneret was agreeable to renew my license for the "Fig-tree Inn." He did not say anything about being agreeable to renew, but he was agreeable to sit. He said he would sit on Saturday if Mr. Manning would sit with him, and that he had no objection to the license being renewed if Mr. Manning had not.
962. Then if Mr. Manning was agreeable he was agreeable? Yes, he was agreeable to sit; but he made no reference to renewing, or anything else.
963. Who else has seen you in reference to this matter besides Merry? In what respect?
964. In reference to not giving evidence against Mr. Manning? No one that I am aware of.
965. Where was Merry to meet you and Mr. Manning—in Sydney? He did not mention the place.
966. You afterwards told Cuneo that Merry had asked you to see Manning? No; on one occasion I told him Merry had called upon me.
967. But did you tell Cuneo Merry had asked you to see Manning? Yes.
968. Whom else did you tell? No one.
969. Did you tell O'Maley? No.
970. Did you tell anybody that Merry had asked you to see Mr. Manning in Sydney? Yes; I told Cuneo; but no place was appointed for us to meet at.
971. And Merry said it would be against your interest to say anything against Mr. Manning? Exactly.
972. Have you ever seen the letter which was written by Mr. Manning, and copied by the young gentleman whom you believed to be his son, and signed by you, and addressed to the Licensing Bench at Ryde—have you ever seen that letter since? No.
973. Do you know whether it has been used at all since? No.
974. Do the requirements of the district justify another hotel? An hotel is urgently required. There is no other site at Hunter's Hill equal to that or to Bennett's corner.
975. You are quite satisfied that the hotel was doing well when you wanted a renewal? I am quite satisfied.
976. *Mr. Manning.*] How many days do you think the lease had expired when you came and told me you had at last come to some terms with O'Maley? Sixteen or seventeen.
977. Are you quite sure? I would not be sure; but I know it was near that time.
978. Did you not tell me that you had at last come to some arrangements with O'Maley? Yes.
979. And you asked to have the license transferred? No—renewed.
980. Can you tell me how such a thing could be possible, because your license was refused at the quarterly meeting in April. Supposing I had wished to do so, how could I have given you a renewal at the end of the few days before your lease ran out? You did it one year previously. You gave me a renewal on the 27th June.
981. At what meeting was that? The June meeting.
982. What notice is required for those meetings? You gave me fourteen days, if you recollect, to make certain repairs.
983. But what notice had to be given before calling a special meeting. Was it possible at that late stage to have granted you a renewal? I am not aware of that.
984. Was it possible to do it? It was possible to do it if you wished.
985. But I mean in accordance with the Licensing Act? I should think if you could do it one year you could do it another.
986. About the time you came to me for a character, as you say, did you not ask me to give you a reference to enable you to obtain a license in Sydney? Yes.
987. And did I not say, "Solomon, you are leaving the district; there has been a great deal of dispute, and you have been a resident in the neighbourhood; which do you consider the best position for an hotel in the neighbourhood?" Exactly.
988. And what did you tell me? I told you Mrs. Bennett's corner.
989. What did I ask you to do then? You asked me to write out a recommendation.
990. Did I not ask you to write a few lines stating that in your opinion Mrs. Bennett's corner was a good position? Yes.
991. What did you tell me? I told you that I could not write; that I could only sign my name.
992. Then I sketched out something from what you told me, got it copied, and you signed it? Yes.
993. Was there any question at all about any house being licensed at that time? No.
994. *Chairman.*] What month was this? I could not tell you exactly. It was either the 16th or 17th of last July, because I took possession of the house I am in now on the 19th.
995. *Mr. Manning.*] With reference to the repairs to the house,—did you not tell me quite late in the day that O'Maley wanted to take the roof off your house, or something to that effect, and that you did not wish to be inconvenienced for the remainder of your lease, and did you not ask me if he had power to do it? Exactly.
996. And then I told you I thought no alterations could be made without the consent of the Licensing Bench? Exactly.
997. Was that all that occurred? Yes.
998. *Chairman.*] You say that is all that occurred? On that occasion Mr. Manning had told me that if I allowed him to effect any repairs without consulting the Bench he would cancel the license.
999. Was that on the occasion Mr. Manning is referring to? Yes.
1000. *Mr. Manning.*] Did I not say to you that if a man did do it you, as tenant of the place, could prevent

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- prevent it, and that if you brought the matter before the Bench the Bench would see that it was properly dealt with, or words to that effect? Nothing was said about bringing the matter before the Bench. I asked you if I should allow him to come in and effect these repairs, and you said no, I had better not, because if I did you would cancel the license.
1001. Then you came to me to find out what your position was, and that was the advice I gave you? Exactly.
1002. *Chairman.*] Then it was after Mr. Manning told you that O'Maley's house would never be licensed again while he was on the Bench that he got you to sign this recommendation for Bennett's corner? It was when I was leaving the district.
1003. Then it was after? Yes. This was the last interview I had with Mr. Manning.
1004. Bennett's corner is immediately opposite? No, further along the road.
1005. But in quite as good a position as O'Maley's "Fig-tree Inn"? If anything, O'Maley's corner is the better of the two.
1006. *Mr. Manning.*] With reference to the note,—did not I write it word by word from you in pencil? Yes.
1007. And then it was copied? Yes.
1008. Did Mr. Manning ask this young gentleman to copy it so that the Bench would not know his writing? Yes.
1009. Were you not pressed for time, and was not he to write it whilst I was writing something else for you? You had already written.
1010. You will recollect that you had to catch a train? I had to catch a 'bus.
1011. You were pressed for time, and I sketched the letter out, and called the young man in to write whilst I was writing out something else personally for you? You had written out the character for me and had laid it on the table.
1012. *Chairman.*] The recommendation as to your character was written first by Mr. Manning? Yes.
1013. *Mr. Manning.*] Were they not sketched out together and then copied? It was all done at one time.
1014. I know it was all done on one occasion; but is it not a fact that whilst he was writing one thing I was writing another, to save time? No; you had written the character out, and had called him in.
1015. Whilst I was writing the reference you required, and which I sketched out roughly, was he not writing the other matter? No; you called him in.
1016. You do not answer the question? He was not writing it out. He was not present at the time you wrote out my character.
1017. Was he not present copying one thing while I was writing the other;—was it not done to save time for you? Yes; but I know it was all done at one time.
1018. *Mr. Paul.*] Would it not have been a greater saving of time if Mr. Manning had handed you what he had written? Mr. Manning had written the character first, and of course the other matter was written afterwards.
1019. *Chairman.*] And then he called this young man? Yes.
1020. *Mr. Paul.*] Would it not have been a greater saving of time if you had signed the one Mr. Manning had written, instead of waiting for the second? Yes.

John E. Manning recalled and further examined:—

- Mr. J. E. Manning.  
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1021. *Chairman.*] I wish to ask you a few questions in reference to your reply to the charges made by O'Maley. In your letter to the Minister you say, on page 4 of the printed documents:—"I am given to understand that Mr. Crick has been engaged for my special benefit to try and drive me off the Bench." Will you tell me upon what grounds you stated that to the Minister? I heard so.
1022. Will you tell me whom you heard it from? I could not tell you. I do not recollect.
1023. You cannot tell me who told you that? No.
1024. You then referred to some charges made by Mr. Farnell against you in the House, and you say:—"Since then some of these people here, who suffer for their misdeeds, or do not get what they want, run off to an M.P." Will you tell me who else has sought the aid of a Member of Parliament? I have heard of several instances.
1025. Will you enumerate them? Mr. Farnell told me they had been to him in this very case, and that he had refused to have anything to do with it.
1026. Any other case? I have heard of other cases.
1027. Could you name them? I do not know that I could. I have not been interested, but I have heard of several cases.
1028. And yet you cannot enumerate them? No, because I have not been personally interested.
1029. *Mr. Paul.*] You were speaking in that letter of your own actions in regard to people in whom you are interested? I did not mean it to have any reference to myself.
1030. You say:—"Since then some of these people here, who suffer for their misdeeds, or do not get what they want, run off to an M.P.";—when you said that did you mean it to refer to your own actions, and to persons who suffered for their misdeeds in connection with your capacity as a magistrate? I was not thinking of myself.
1031. When you penned those words, did you not mean the Minister of Justice to understand that they applied to your administration of justice at Ryde? No.
1032. *Chairman.*] Will you tell me the name of anybody who has sought the aid of an M.P., or who has made any complaint against any other magistrate sitting at Ryde? I do not know. I have heard of and seen comments in the paper.
1033. In what paper? I really could not tell you.
1034. Do you know what magistrate was complained of? No.
1035. Do you know all the magistrates sitting at Ryde? Yes.
1036. And yet you cannot tell what magistrate was complained of? No.
1037. On page 3 of the printed documents you say in your report:—"I have for some time been aware that the disappointed parties in reference to these premises were planning some charges against me, with

a view of preventing my sitting in their particular case, which they are kind enough to say is all they care about; but I was not prepared for the barefaced falsehoods and perversion of facts stated as emanating from Cuneo." How long were you, before you wrote this reply, aware that the disappointed parties were planning charges against you? I could not say.

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1038. What were the charges they were planning against you? I did not hear. I heard that they simply wanted to get me off the Bench, and to get Mr. Jeanneret on to get the license.

1039. Can you tell me whom you heard that from? I have heard it at different times, but I could not tell you whom from. Many people spoke to me about the matter.

1040. Had you heard it for a couple of months before? I could not tell you.

1041. Did you ever hear it? Certainly.

1042. Could you give us an idea of how long before writing the report you heard it? I could not.

1043. Would it be two months before? I could not say.

1044. Do you think it would be more or less? I cannot say.

1045. Neither more nor less? I should think it would be less than two months, although I could not say. I pay very little attention, although I hear these things.

1046. I would point out to you that you gave a very confidential note, on the 22nd of August, to one of the disappointed parties, and this report was only written by you on the 12th of October? What was the confidential note?

1047. The letter you gave to Cuneo, to take to Mr. McCulloch, the solicitor. That was given on the 22nd of August, and this report was written on October 12th? I could not tell the date I heard it.

1048. You can neither tell the date, nor from whom you heard it? No. I heard it through the district.

1049. And, although you knew that they were planning charges against you, of an unfounded nature, and charges affecting your character, you did not think it worth while to pay any attention to them? No.

1050. Not so much as even to remember the names of the parties you heard it from? I heard it spoken of.

1051. Whom did you hear speaking of it? I could not tell you.

1052. You have heard the evidence given by Cuneo;—is that evidence correct or incorrect? Most of Cuneo's evidence is incorrect.

1053. You have heard O'Maley's evidence;—what do you say to that? I think there is only one matter in regard to which O'Maley's evidence comes into collision with me, and that is in regard to the interview at my house.

1054. What do you say to that? I say that there was nothing whatever said on that occasion about my purchasing O'Maley's property. He simply spoke about his trouble in losing his license.

1055. Did you tell Cuneo to bring him up, so that he might renew his lamentations to you? I did not tell Cuneo to bring him up at all.

1056. So that is incorrect? Yes.

1057. You have heard Solomon's evidence;—what do you say to that? In what way.

1058. In regard to the conversations you have had with him respecting O'Maley's house? Solomon is partly correct. He came to me, and asked whether O'Maley could force his way into the house and take the roof off, and I told him he could do nothing without the permission of the Licensing Bench.

1059. Did you tell him then that if he allowed O'Maley to touch a shingle of the roof you would cancel the license? No.

1060. Then, when Solomon swears that, he is not a truthful witness? That is not true.

1061. When Solomon swears that you said, in his presence, that you wanted that letter for the Bench in favour of Bennett's corner copied, so that the Bench would not know your handwriting, that is not true? That is not true.

1062. *Mr. Paul.*] Did you write that letter? I sketched it; the man was in a great hurry, and to save time I got my boy to copy it whilst I was writing the other letter.

1063. *Chairman.*] Was it your son who copied the letter? Yes.

1064. What do you mean by saying that you saved time by getting him to copy it out? The man was in a great hurry to get away.

1065. Has there been any application for Bennett's corner since that time? No.

1066. What have you done with that letter? I looked for it at home. I may be able to find it yet, but I could not find it.

1067. Whom is it addressed to? I do not think it is addressed to anybody.

1068. Whom would it come before? What I kept it for was to show my brother-magistrates.

1069. But there was no application, you say, in regard to that corner? No; but we always like to know the best positions, and I could have shown them that letter as bearing upon the question.

1070. *Mr. Paul.*] But you have had a long experience of Ryde;—did you need any such communication to strengthen your opinion? No, nor would Mr. Jeanneret; but we get such a variety of contradictory opinions that I thought that this man who had carried on the house, and was then out of it, would be able to give an opinion which would be worth more than the opinion of others.

1071. Mr. Jeanneret has a similar acquaintance with Ryde to yourself? Yes.

1072. Would a document of that character, suggested by yourself, be of any good at all to you or to Mr. Jeanneret in your official positions as Licensing Magistrates? I have not said it would. It would have been a matter simply for consideration between ourselves. Of course it could not have gone in as evidence, or anything of that kind.

1073. *Chairman.*] You got that document before giving the letter to Cuneo with regard to the purchase of Bennett's property, and in regard to which he was to go and see your son-in-law, Mr. McCulloch? I never asked Cuneo to go to Mr. McCulloch.

1074. Then do you deny the letter? No.

1075. Then why did you give him the letter? Because Cuneo had been to me, and had stated that he had been to Mr. McCulloch about the matter, and that Mr. McCulloch had asked him certain terms which he was not prepared to carry out unless he could get certain facilities. He urged me, as he did not know Mr. McCulloch, to give him that note.

1076. I think you have already stated that he had been to see Mr. McCulloch before coming to you? Yes, he said so.

1077. And you now say he did not know Mr. McCulloch? That was what he said himself; he did not know him sufficiently to get him to give him favourable terms, and he asked me to write that note, and it



- Mr. J.E. Manning. was virtually dictated by him. Everything was put in at his request. I refused to write it for a long while, but he kept bothering me, and said, "I wish you would write it; you know Mr. M'Culloch better than I do, and he will, perhaps, do what is wanted."
- 29 May, 1890. 1078. Then the letter was given by you, and addressed to your son-in-law, with the view of getting favourable terms to Cuneo? It was simply done at Cuneo's request.
1079. Why did you do it? Because the man simply "dunned" me to do it.
1080. You knew your son-in-law was acting for Mrs. Bennett? I knew he was her solicitor.
1081. Then you wished him to give Cuneo terms unfavourable to his client, and to Cuneo's benefit? I never dreamt of anything of the sort.
1082. Although this letter was appended to the report sent in to the Minister by O'Maley, you did not think it of sufficient importance to notice,—the Minister had to call upon you a second time to explain? Yes.
1083. In this letter you say:—"If he agrees to this, as he will, he would have to deposit £1,000 with you in trust till Mrs. Bennett can convey, and he gets the other matter." In your explanation to the Minister you say that "he gets the other matter," should read, "she gets the other matter." I wish to ask you whether you still advance this as your explanation of this peculiarity? Certainly; I see no reason for altering it.
1084. Then you say further on:—"Why I suggested that Cuneo had better be told to keep the matter quiet was because Mr. M'Culloch had told me that there might be some difficulty in taking out letters of administration for Mrs. Bennett, as her husband had been dead some years, and she had neglected to prove his will";—did Mr. M'Culloch tell you that? Yes.
1085. Did Bennett leave a will? Yes.
1086. Do you know that of your own knowledge? Yes; I saw it. Mrs. Bennett has told you that she came to me on one occasion and showed me the will.
1087. You say now that Mr. M'Culloch told you there would be difficulty in proving the will;—do you not know, as a magistrate, that there is a very heavy penalty attaching to people who do not prove wills? I do not; I know nothing about that.
1088. Do you know that before a person can take out either probate or letters of administration they must give fourteen days notice in the *Government Gazette*? I know that a public notice has to be given.
1089. And yet it was necessary to intimate to a solicitor who knew all the circumstances of the case that the matter had better be kept quiet? Yes; I made that remark in consequence of what he said to me, but whether there was anything in it or not I do not know.
1090. You say that Cuneo knew all about the contents of this letter? Yes.
1091. And you say it was written at his dictation? You can call it dictation. He knew the purport of every word in it, and I read it to him, and everything that was put in it was put in it at his request. There is something in it about "trust." He evidently is a suspicious man, and he was afraid of parting with his money, and that is why I put "in trust."
1092. You say that Cuneo suggested everything in this letter;—why did he ask you to tell M'Culloch to advise him to keep the matter quiet? Of course he would not have asked me that. That was spoken of, and that was a suggestion of mine to M'Culloch to renew the caution, as it were.
1093. To renew the caution with what object? Because M'Culloch apparently anticipated some difficulty about this will. I could not tell you what, because I do not know sufficient about it.
1094. You knew of your own knowledge that the reason Mrs. Bennett could not convey was that she had not administered to her husband's estate? Yes.
1095. I would draw your attention to this part of your letter:—"If he agrees to this, as he will, he will have to deposit £1,000 with you in trust, until Mrs. B. can convey, and he gets the other matter";—what do you mean by that? Cuneo was suspicious. He was afraid he might be paying money, and that Mrs. Bennett might not be able to give him any title, and he did not want to pay any money unless it was held in trust.
1096. The letter states "until Mrs. Bennett can convey." You knew she could convey immediately she proved the will? No, I did not; there was something beyond that.
1097. What was it? This property is held under the Act.
1098. What Act? Torrens' Act, so I understand.
1099. You know that property, although passing to a wife or son, has to be advertised in the same way as though it were passing to an utter stranger, so that there was no necessity for keeping matters quiet and confidential, because you knew that it would have to be advertised? I do not say that; I simply say I heard it had to be advertised.
1100. When you say further "until Mrs. Bennett can convey and he gets the other matter," you wish us to understand that that means the conveyance? Yes.
1101. Why do you say:—"He had better be told also to keep the matter quiet until he gets his conveyance"? Because I knew Mr. M'Culloch did not want anything done in the matter until he had got Mrs. Bennett's title.
1102. Then you had had a long conversation with Mr. M'Culloch about this matter? Not a long conversation.
1103. You saw M'Culloch, and talked the matter over? Yes.
1104. You knew Mrs. Bennett was not in a position to convey? Not there and then.
1105. Mr. Paul.] What is the meaning of this:—"If he agrees to this, as he will, he would have to deposit £1,000 with you in trust, till Mrs. Bennett can convey, and he gets the other matter. He had better be told also to keep the matter quiet until he gets his conveyance." The conveyances are distinctly referred to in the other paragraphs, but this seems to point to some other matter. What is the meaning of "he gets the other matter"? That is the conveyance.
1106. But this letter refers twice to the conveyance, and then to the other matter;—what is the other matter? Will you swear that the other matter refers to the conveyance? Undoubtedly. There is nothing else meant.
1107. Mr. Plumb.] I think you said just now that the other matter referred to the probates or administration? The words should be "she gets the other matter."
1108. Chairman.] Look at the original document. Do you say again that you meant to write "she gets the other matter"? The original document is "he gets the other matter." 1109.



1109. *Mr. Plumb.*] In your explanation to the Minister you say that the word "he" should be "she"?  
Yes.
1110. *Chairman.*] Will you swear that the other matter does not refer to the license? Certainly; there was no reference to the license in any shape or form.
1111. What was your object in underlining the word "trust"? Because that was the very thing Cuneo wanted.
1112. Did he tell you to underline it? No, but he laid particular emphasis upon its being held in trust, and that is why I underlined it? I was not aware I had marked it, but I see that I have.
1113. What did he want with this corner? I do not know, excepting that it was on account of there being a great deal of speculation going on, but I understand now what he wanted it for.
1114. And you did not know until now? No.
1115. Have you not already admitted that you spoke to him in reference to plans for the hotel? No.
1116. I ask you if you have not already admitted that you had a conversation with Cuneo about plans for an hotel? Some time afterwards he spoke about some plans, and showed me some.
1117. Very long afterwards? When I say afterwards, I mean after he had been refused.
1118. I am talking about this note. Was it before or after you wrote this note that you had a conversation with Cuneo about plans? He wanted me to look at some plans.
1119. Will you answer the question;—was that before or after you wrote the note? What is the date of the note?
1120. August 22nd? Then I should say it was before that note was written.
1121. So you now say you and Cuneo had a talk about plans? Yes; he wanted me to look at them.
1122. In your reply to the Minister you say:—"As Cuneo states, shortly before the expiration of Solomon's license and tenancy, he, having then been refused a conditional license for the said premises, came to me and asked if I would grant him a transfer and renewal of license for these (O'Maley's) premises, if he came to terms with Solomon. I replied that the Bench had declined to renew, and that I had no power to do anything of the sort. On a subsequent occasion he saw me in reference to a second conditional application, and spoke about some plans, which he proposed submitting, but which he said were much too large for present requirements. I told him that I thought it much better that a plan should be submitted, showing what the whole building would be when completed, and that he could show by a red line what he proposed to erect at once, leaving it to the Bench to decide how much should be built." So you see you had conversation with Cuneo about plans? Yes; he wanted me to look at them.
1123. What I want to know is,—was that before or after this note was written? I have told you just now that I could not tell.
1124. Which do you think—before or after? I really do not know. If you ask me what I think, I think it was before.
1125. Where were the premises to be erected which he spoke about? At O'Maley's corner.
1126. Have I not just read to you, from your statement to the Minister, that you had told him you had no power to grant a license for O'Maley's place? Yes; but he was perpetually at me, and apparently he had found out from you that he had.
1127. What I want you to state is what occurred between you? I did not know he could do it, so that I could not understand why the man kept coming to me.
1128. You say that the premises he saw you about on the occasion that you talked about putting a red line across the plans, showing what was proposed to be erected, were on O'Maley's ground? He never spoke to me about any plans or premises of any kind, excepting for O'Maley's corner.
1129. Although you had told him it was of no use in speaking to you about them? Yes, I thought so, and I am still of the same opinion.
1130. There were considerable premises erected on O'Maley's ground? The premises occupied as the "Fig-tree Inn" had been put there.
1131. Has Mr. D'Ardier sat on the Bench lately? He sits very rarely.
1132. Have you heard any reason given why he will not sit with you? I heard a reason insinuated here the other day, and I spoke to Mr. D'Ardier, and he will be quite prepared to give his reason. I may tell you that he apologized for not being able to come, in the first instance.
1133. He must send an excuse according to the Licensing Act? I do not think so. He must not be absent two quarterly meetings in succession.
1134. Or send an excuse? What Mr. D'Ardier said in this instance was that the wife of one of his oldest friends—Mrs. Chisholm—was dead, and that he had to go and see Mr. Chisholm.
1135. Mr. D'Ardier was in favour of granting the license to O'Maley? I think he was in favour of a license for that neighbourhood.
1136. Have you not already stated in your report that he was in favour of granting it? Yes. With reference to this other matter, the quarterly meeting was adjourned. Mr. D'Ardier did not appear in the first instance, because of Mrs. Chisholm's death; and he did not appear at the adjourned meeting because of the chrysanthemum show. He is a great gardener and exhibitor, and he would not leave a flower-show at which he was exhibiting for all the Licensing Courts in the country.
1137. I wish to draw further attention to your letter on page 6 of the printed documents. You say there:—"I have replied to these questions fully, because I personally have nothing whatever to conceal; but at the same time I am not clear that I am right in disclosing a professional of Mr. M'Culloch's, especially when it is calmly admitted by Cuneo that he opened a private letter of mine to that gentleman in order to entrap me." Why do you refer to it as a private letter of yours to M'Culloch, when you say it was read to Cuneo, and written at his request? It is still a private letter.
1138. But he knew what was in it? He knew what was in it, because the contents were written at his instance; I do not say he knew every word in it.
1139. You remember the day Cuneo came to you with the plans? I recollect that he did come.
1140. Did he ever see you afterwards—was it afterwards that he drove O'Maley up to the gate? I think so.
1141. Did you see Cuneo that day? I did not know he was there until he stated so here.
1142. Did you ever have any conversation with Cuneo after he showed you the plans? I never saw the plans. He wanted me to look at them.
1143. How long was he talking to you on that occasion? I could not say; but I know that the statement he made about the constable coming in, and about his talking about offering £200, is false.

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1144. Whom did he offer the £200 to? Well, he did not offer it to anybody by name. He said, "I will give any one £200 who will get me the license." He looked very hard at me, as much as to say, "There is £200 for you."
1145. What did you do then? I ordered him off the premises.
1146. And yet you admit you subsequently had conversation with this man who tried to bribe you? No, because that is the last time he came on the place.
1147. And that was the time he asked you to look at the plans? No, the last time he came on the premises was when he mentioned about the £200.
1148. And it was before that that he showed you the plans? I think so.
1149. You subsequently sat on the Bench in connection with Cuneo's application? Yes; the matter had been referred to the Minister, and he left it to my discretion.
1150. Did you then ask Cuneo, or have him asked, anything in reference to his offer of £200? No; that would have been an extraordinary proceeding. I think his attorney would have asked me what it had to do with the business before the Court.
1151. However, the last time you saw him was when he made reference to the £200, and it was on a previous occasion that he showed you the plans? I am not certain that it was on a previous occasion that he showed the plans. One thing is certain, and that is that the last time I saw him on my premises was when he referred to the £200, and I ordered him off. He says, in order to show that I did not order him off, that the police-sergeant came up and joined in the conversation about local public-houses; and I say that is false. Not only did he not come in then, but he never came in at any time and joined in any conversation.
1152. Was it on the day after he made this suggestion about the £200 that O'Maley came up? No; it was the last time he was there.
1153. Then why do you say in your letter to the Minister, on page 3 of the printed documents:—"I said, 'The best thing you can do, Cuneo, is to clear off the place at once,' and he went. Nothing was said about my getting a purchaser for O'Maley's premises, as stated by Cuneo, and when O'Maley came up the following day I did not know what he came for."—Why did you write that if it is not true? It was the last time Cuneo was there. He may have been there on the day before O'Maley's business. I may be mistaken whether it was before or after Cuneo's visit; but I thought it was after.
1154. Then it was clearly after you wrote this note and gave it to him that he made the suggestion about the £200? Yes.
1155. You say that it was on the last occasion he came to you that he made the offer? Yes.
1156. It was on the last occasion he came to you that you were friendly enough to give him this letter? I think he was there once after this letter was written.
1157. Only once? Yes.
1158. And that was the occasion on which he made the offer of £200 by inuendo? Yes.
1159. So that it was before you gave him this letter that he brought O'Maley up? No; I do not think so. I don't think we had seen O'Maley at all at that time.
1160. So that it was subsequent to this that O'Maley came up? I could not tell you. I only know O'Maley did come.
1161. This report was written on the 12th October when the facts were fresh in your memory? Yes.
1162. What I refer to is on page 3 of the printed document, and the sentence is:—"Nothing was said about my getting a purchaser for O'Maley's premises, as stated by Cuneo; and when O'Maley came up the following day I did not know what he came for."—So O'Maley did come up on the following day, and you say that was the day after you had ordered Cuneo off the premises? I don't think it was. Probably, I did not see Cuneo when he came up with O'Maley.
1163. Again, on page 3 of the printed documents, you say:—"At the quarterly meeting, on the 27th July, Cuneo, represented by Mr. Roberts, applied for a conditional license for the O'Maley premises, and was refused a second time unanimously, and Mr. Roberts was heard to tell him that they could not apply again for three years."—Did you hear Roberts tell him that? No; I was told so.
1164. Who told you? I think it was the Licensing Inspector, and I know that is the opinion held now by most of the profession.
1165. How long has Mr. Merry held the license of the "Gladstone Hotel"? Merry's mother has held the license, and Merry has been the manager for a long time.
1166. How long is it since Merry got a license in his own name? Quite recently. There was some objection on the part of the police about Mrs. Merry not residing there, and it was put into his name.
1167. Was it at the last quarterly meeting that Merry got the license transferred to him? I am not sure, but it is quite recently.
1168. You stated that Merry had offered, if you granted a conditional license, to close the "Gladstone Hotel"? That is what he said in Court.
1169. You knew as Licensing Magistrate that he did not hold a license? I did not know it for some time.
1170. But did you not grant the license to the "Gladstone"? Yes.
1171. And you did not know whom you granted it to? Yes, of course we knew Merry, but I was not aware how the thing was being worked. He did not get it originally.
1172. Did you not know that the license was in Mrs. Merry's name? I must have known.
1173. Then you must have known that Merry's offer to shut the "Gladstone" was useless, and that he had no power to do anything of the sort? I took it that he was working for his mother.
1174. You mentioned something to Cuneo about a red line being drawn across the plans? There was something said when he brought the small plans. I think he said something about previous plans, which had been put in. Then some reference was made to Merry, and I told him that if he at any time submitted plans which were beyond the requirements of the district he should do as Merry had done, and put a red line through, showing what he thought was sufficient, and leaving the Bench to decide in the matter. It is quite a common thing—at any rate it is more satisfactory to the Bench to see what the place will be like when completed.
1175. Then, at that time you were on very confidential terms with Cuneo? I have known him many years.
1176. Do you make it a practice to inquire into the merits of every matter before it comes before the Bench? Certainly not. We thought the whole thing was at an end, or I should not have spoken to Cuneo at all.

1177. Do you know Salter's property up there? I know Mr. Salter has or had property.
1178. Did you make any inquiries about that property? I did.
1179. Whom from? From young Mr. Mitchelmore, I think.
1180. Was that after Cuneo's second refusal? I cannot say. There was some speculation going on about the land on account of the construction of the proposed bridge, and I inquired from curiosity.
1181. Did you ascertain the price they wanted? I did, but I have forgotten what it was.
1182. Did you get any offer of the place in writing? No; it was under offer to somebody else.
1183. But you made inquiries about this property? I inquired because a great deal of speculation was going on, and I was curious to see what was doing.
1184. Before that, had not Merry applied for a conditional license, and been refused by you? No; Merry bought some land from Salter at the opposite corner, and I understand he owns that property now. Some adjoining allotments, also belonging to Salter, were those I inquired about.
1185. I ask you whether you inquired the particulars of Salter's property after Merry had been refused a conditional license? I cannot say when I asked about that.
1186. You will not undertake to deny that it was after Merry applied and was refused? I could not tell you when it was.
1187. *Mr. Paul.*] Question 72 in Cuneo's original evidence makes reference to the £200. Question 85 is:—"Pass on to the time you saw Mr. Manning again?" Yes.
1188. Did you go up and see him after seeing M'Culloch? Yes. That was the time he got the note from me.
1189. Then you admit after he had made the suggestion about the £200 that you saw him again? No, never; Cuneo has never spoken a word to me since I ordered him off the premises.
1190. *Chairman.*] You state that the plans which he referred to in regard to the £200 were for O'Maley's property? Yes; I understood so.
1191. Was it not after he had been informed that he could not get a license for O'Maley's property that you gave him the note about Bennett's property? I cannot tell you. He has always been of opinion that he could get a license for O'Maley's property, because he has always been at me about it.
1192. You have already sworn that when he made a suggestion about giving £200 to get a license on certain plans these plans referred to O'Maley's premises? I understood so.
1193. It was subsequent to his applications and refusals for O'Maley's premises that you gave him the note about Bennett's property? Some of his refusals. He has had four, I think.
1194. *Mr. Plumb.*] I understood you to say, not long ago, in the course of your evidence, that the letter you wrote to Mr. M'Culloch was written on a day previous to the offer in which was suggested a bribe, or an equivalent to it? Certainly it was;—it must have been, because I have never seen him since.

WILLIAM PATRICK CRICK, ESQ., IN THE CHAIR.

John Murdoch called in, sworn, and examined:—

1195. *Chairman.*] You are a police constable? Yes.
1196. Where are you stationed? Peat's Ferry.
1197. Were you previously stationed at Hunter's Hill? Yes.
1198. *Mr. Manning.*] Do you know Patrick O'Maley, of Hunter's Hill? Yes.
1199. Do you recollect his making an application the other day for a publican's license at Ryde? Yes.
1200. Who appeared for O'Maley as solicitor in the case? Mr. Crick, I think.
1201. You gave evidence that he was of intemperate habits? Yes.
1202. Have you frequently seen him under the influence of drink? Yes.
1203. Did you state in your evidence that you had known him to be drunk for a week at a time? I think I did.
1204. He lives close to the "Fig-tree Inn," does he not? Yes.
1205. Did you state before the Licensing Bench that the landlord had often sent for you to remove him from his premises? I do not remember saying "often"; but I know of one or two instances in which I was sent for.
1206. The landlord, at all events, has sent you to remove him from the licensed premises known as the "Fig-tree Inn"? Yes.
1207. Did you remove him? No; he went before I got there.
1208. You did not remove him, in consequence of his being led away by his friends? Yes; I remember one occasion particularly.
1209. Did you state, in cross-examination by Mr. Crick, that you had seen O'Maley so drunk that it took two of his friends to take him away? Yes.
1210. *Chairman.*] You have seen O'Maley in two instances so much under the influence of liquor that he required assistance? Yes; I can remember one or two instances.
1211. How long ago? Over three years.
1212. Do you know a man named Cuneo who applied for a license for these premises? Yes, I know Thomas Cuneo.
1213. Have you anything to say against his character? No.
1214. He was a fit person to hold a publican's license? I should consider so, from what I know of him.
1215. *Mr. Manning.*] When you referred just now to seeing O'Maley twice drunk, you mean that you were twice asked to remove him from the house? It might be twice, or it might be more; it was at intervals. O'Maley would have a spell of drinking for a week or a fortnight, and then he would leave liquor alone for three or four months.
1216. When he had these fits on he was of drunken habits? Yes.
1217. Are you the officer whose duty it is to inspect the hotels in the locality? No.

- J. Murdoch. 1218. Was your evidence in the Licensing Court tendered by instruction from your superior officer? I was called on by my superior officer to give evidence.  
 24 July, 1890. 1219. From your knowledge of this man, do you think him a fit and proper person to hold an hotel license? No.  
 1220. And from your knowledge of his character you think the Bench were justified in refusing the license? Yes.  
 1221. *Chairman.*] You cannot say the same thing in regard to Cuneo—Cunco was a fit man to hold a license? I do not know anything against Cuneo.

George Miller Pope called in, sworn, and examined:—

- G. M. Pope. 1221½. *Chairman.*] What is your occupation? Clerk of Petty Sessions at Ryde.  
 24 July, 1890. 1222. *Mr. Manning.*] Do you produce the minute-book of the Licensing Bench at Ryde? Yes.  
 1223. Do you know Patrick O'Maley? Yes.  
 1224. He lately had his house under lease to Solomon? Yes.  
 1225. Do you recollect his having to be cautioned by the Bench at different times to put his premises in proper order, and that there were complaints about his premises not being in proper order. Do you recollect me, as Chairman, speaking from the Bench in regard to O'Maley? Some remarks were made to Solomon about O'Maley's premises.  
 1226. About their being in a bad condition? Yes, about their being out of repair.  
 1227. Did you yourself have any conversation with O'Maley about his premises? Nothing more than that I tried to persuade him and Solomon to come to terms. I told them that if they did not I could see that the license would lapse. Solomon's lease expired on the 30th June, and of course he could not get a new license if he had not the property.  
 1228. What did you mean by the lapse of the license—was it because of the repairs of the premises not being carried out? No, not because of the repairs. I do not know whether the police made any remark about the repairs; I do not think they did. I could see, however, that if Solomon did not come to some arrangement with O'Maley, Solomon would not have any claim to the premises.  
 1229. You mean that the two quarrelled? Yes, and they came to me and they said that they would arrange matters between them; but they did not.  
 1230. Did you give O'Maley any advice—did you urge him to get his premises put into repair? I did not say a word about his premises.  
 1231. What did you urge him to do? To come to terms with Solomon, or the license would lapse.  
 1232. After the license had lapsed, did you have any interview with O'Maley;—did he tell you he had wished he had followed your advice? Yes, I think he did, and he said that it had turned out as I had told him.  
 1233. If O'Maley has stated that he never had any conversation with you on the subject at all, is it true or not? I had no conversation with O'Maley concerning repairs, because that is a matter I had no right to interfere with.  
 1234. You had as much right to interfere in that matter as to give him advice concerning his arrangement with Solomon? No; I told him what was really a matter of fact, and what would certainly come to pass.  
 1235. At that time the renewal had been refused to Solomon? Not at that time, I think; I was urging O'Maley to come to terms with Solomon, so that the license would not lapse.  
 1236. When did this conversation occur? Some time before June, perhaps in April, when they were applying for a renewal.  
 1237. Do you know why the renewal was refused? No reason was given why it was refused.  
 1238. *Chairman.*] Will you look in the minute-book and see if any reasons are given for the refusal? It only states that it was refused—no reason was given.  
 1239. Will you refer to the police objections—what are they? I do not think there are any police objections. I do not think that there was any objection filed by the police to the renewal of the license. There was no objection filed to Mr. Solomon's renewal.  
 1240. *Mr. Manning.*] Since you have been summoned to appear before the Committee two meetings of the Licensing Bench have been held at Ryde? Yes.  
 1241. When was the last meeting? 11th June, 1890.  
 1242. Who were on the Bench? Yourself, Mr. Jeanneret, and Mr. D'Ardier.  
 1243. That is the full Licensing Bench? Yes.  
 1244. Are you aware whether any feeling exists between the members of the Bench. It has been implied here that one member would not take his seat because he objected to certain proceedings of the other members? I have not heard of it.  
 1245. You have been Clerk of Petty Sessions ever since there has been a Licensing Bench at Ryde? Yes.  
 1246. And I have been Chairman of the Licensing Bench ever since there has been a Licensing Bench at Ryde? Yes.  
 1247. Has there ever been any appeal from any decision of the Licensing Bench since it was established? No.  
 1248. Has there ever been any appeal against any case in which I have adjudicated in the ordinary Court at Ryde since I have been a magistrate? I do not think so.  
 1249. *Chairman.*] Do you know whether such a thing would be possible? I do not think so.  
 1250. *Mr. Manning.*] Have you ever known me to miss a single meeting at the Licensing Bench since it was established? Never, except when you were laid up with sickness.  
 1251. Has there ever been a meeting of the Licensing Bench when I have not been there? You retired on one occasion; there was some objection to your sitting on the Bench, and you left it.  
 1252. I ask you if there has ever been a meeting of the Licensing Bench since it was established at which I have not been present? No.  
 1253. Therefore I have attended to my duties as Licensing Magistrate? Yes.  
 1254. Have you ever heard any complaint, or has there been any cause for complaint known to you, with regard to my neglecting my duties? No.  
 1255. Have I not always attended when there has been anything to attend to? Yes. 1256.

1256. *Chairman.*] You never heard Mr. Manning or any other member of the Bench caution O'Maley about these premises? No, I have never heard O'Maley cautioned about the premises. G. M. Pope.
1257. And the only conversation you had with O'Maley was when you advised him to come to terms with Solomon? Yes; he came to me two or three times about it. He came the second time, and said he had been trying to arrange, and had not been able to do so. I urged him to try and arrange before the licensing day came on, or he perhaps would lose the license. 24 July, 1890.
1258. Do you know these premises? I have never been in them, but I have passed them.
1259. Are they situated at a place where a license is necessary? I should presume so, for they have been licensed a great number of years.
1260. And the reason the house was shut up was because O'Maley and Solomon could not come to terms? In my opinion that is the only reason. I could not see any other.
1261. *Mr. Manning.*] You do not mean that the Bench shut up the house because these people could not come to terms? Yes. If you recollect you asked Solomon how he could possess a license when he had no claim at all to the premises.
1262. *Chairman.*] Then you state that Mr. Manning told Solomon that he could not have a license because he had no claim on the premises? Those are the exact words. He asked him, "Have you the premises after June 30?" and he replied "No." Mr. Manning then said, "Then how can we grant a license?"
1263. *Mr. Manning.*] When was that? At the licensing meeting when he applied.
1264. *Mr. Paul.*] Was that in April? Yes, on April 17.
1265. *Chairman.*] How long have you lived in the district? About forty years.
1266. It is a progressive district? Yes; it has progressed more during the last few years than during previous years.
1267. Since this license was first granted there has been a license granted for a large house within a short distance? Yes, the "Gladstone Hotel."
1268. Do you know whether the place is doing well? I cannot say, because I have never been there.
1269. Did you hear the licensee swear in Court that his place was generally full? I do not know that he said it was always full; but I think he said there was a fair trade.
1270. It is a very large house? Yes; the largest, I think, in the district.
1271. And the license was granted, I think, since O'Maley's was first granted? Yes.
1272. And by the same Bench which refused O'Maley's license? By the same Bench; but O'Maley's license was originally granted at Parramatta.
1273. Mr. Manning sat on the Bench which granted the license to the "Gladstone Hotel"? Yes.
1274. Mr. Manning was on the Bench which refused the license to O'Maley's house? Yes.
1275. Do you know a piece of property belonging to Mrs. Bennett? I only know it by Cuneo telling me about it.
1276. So far as you can see, had Solomon and O'Maley come to terms the license would have been renewed? I expect so. So far as I can know and judge, there was no objection.
1277. No objection excepting, as stated by the Chairman, that Solomon had not the lease? That Solomon had no claim to the premises, and could not consequently hold a license.
1278. As an old resident of the district, and knowing all the circumstances of the case, do you not consider that O'Maley has suffered a great injustice by his house being closed? It seems to me that he has been rather hardly dealt with through no fault of his own. As I have said, the license unfortunately lapsed on account of his not coming to terms with Solomon.
1279. Were you in Court on the day when Mr. Manning retired from the Bench and left Mr. Jeanneret and Mr. D'Ardier on the Bench? Yes.
1280. The Bench were divided on that occasion? Yes.
1281. Mr. D'Ardier, the new magistrate, was in favour of granting O'Maley the license? So he told me.
1282. Whereas Mr. Jeanneret, who had previously sat with Mr. Manning and refused the license, adhered to his former decision? Yes; as Chairman he had two votes, which Mr. D'Ardier rather complained of when there were only two present. He said he thought it was rather a farce.
1283. Mr. D'Ardier was strongly in favour of granting O'Maley the license? I do not know about his being strongly in favour of it. He told me the house had been licensed for so many years, and he did not see why it should not be licensed still if Solomon and O'Maley had come to terms, and particularly if they had made the improvements which I think they promised to make.
1284. *Mr. Paul.*] When Solomon made application in April he had two months' lease to run? Yes; the license terminated on the 30th June.
1285. Would it not have been a great advantage to him to have had the license renewed? Yes.
1286. So that he might have been able to sell out better? Yes; I have no doubt it was a loss to him.
1287. Is it customary for the Licensing Bench to take into consideration the terms of the lease? I cannot venture to give an opinion; I never heard of such a thing happening before, so that I cannot give any opinion as to what the Bench might do under such circumstances.
1288. *Mr. Manning.*] Is it not a fact that you are mistaken in stating that he originally got his license at Parramatta;—did he not get it at Ryde, before there was any Licensing Bench at all? Yes, probably. I thought at the moment that it was at Parramatta. I believe that originally he did get his license from the Ryde Bench.
1289. *Chairman.*] How long have you known O'Maley? Twelve or fourteen years.
1290. What can you say as to his character? I know nothing about his character; I only see him when he comes to the Court.
1291. Have you heard anything against him? I have only heard what cropped up in Court—that he was occasionally found drunk.
1292. That was the policeman's evidence? Yes.
1293. Beyond that you have heard nothing? No.
1294. And you have lived in the district over forty years, and have known him for twelve or fourteen years? Yes. I have not heard anything about him excepting from Harper, the constable, who once made a remark that he got too much drink occasionally.
1295. *Mr. Manning.*] That is another constable? Yes; I think it was Harper, but it is so many years ago since the remark was made that I cannot recollect.
1296. *Chairman.*] How long have you known Cuneo? Since he was a lad. 1297.

- G. M. Pope. 1297. Is he a man in every way fitted to hold a license? I have never heard anything against him.  
 24 July, 1890. 1298. Is he a steady man? He seems to be a very steady young man, but he does not live near me, and I do not know much about him.
1299. As a matter of fact, the police lodged no objection to Cuneo personally? No; it was against the premises, I think.
1300. *Mr. Manning.*] When you say "the premises," do you mean that the premises were out of repair? I do not think that they had any objection to Cuneo personally. If there was any objection at all it would have been to the premises, I think.
1301. What is the good of saying you think—you are the Registrar of the Court, and have all the documents;—was not the license opposed for one reason—because the house was not required? That was in regard to O'Maley, not Cuneo.
1302. When Cuneo applied for a license, was not he objected to first because the house was not required? Yes; there were three reasons—that the house was not required, that it was next to a church, and that the premises were not in a fit condition. I was not aware that there was any trouble in regard to Cuneo.
1303. *Chairman.*] The objection was not that the house was next to a church, but in the vicinity of a church? Yes.
1304. That church was there when the license was first granted? Yes.
1305. *Mr. Manning.*] What was the third objection? I really could not say from memory. I was not aware that I should be asked anything in regard to Cuneo.
1306. Have you the official objections to Cuneo? No; because I was not aware I should be asked anything about him.
1307. Can you tell me from your papers what date O'Maley's last application for a conditional license was refused? Twenty-third April. The application was dismissed with three guineas costs, three grounds of objection being upheld.
1308. The third objection in O'Maley's case was that he was not a fit and proper person to hold a license? These are the objections [*producing document*]:—First,—That Solomon was refused a conditional license for a house to be erected at the corner of Ryde and Gladesville Roads, Bennett's land, twice, viz., 16th January and 12th June, 1889. Second,—That Solomon aforesaid was refused a renewal of license for the "Fig-tree Inn" on the 17th April, 1889. Third,—That on the 12th June, 1889, Page and Cuneo were refused conditional licenses, and on the 17th July, 1889, Page, Cuneo, and Merry were refused conditional licenses. Fourth,—On 13th November, 1889, Cuneo was refused a conditional license, and again on 5th January, 1890, making altogether four refusals for the same position. Fifth,—P. O'Maley was refused a conditional license on the 23rd April, 1890.
1309. Is that an extract which you made. You recollect me telling you that the Chairman required certain data? Yes.
1310. Is that an extract you made, and which was sent by you with the Licensing Bench stamp upon it? Yes.
1311. These positions were all close together? I do not know where Page's land is, but Cuneo, Solomon, and Merry were all in the immediate vicinity.
1312. If a house was wanted in one case it was wanted in the other—the objection as to their not being required would apply to either case? Yes.
1313. Therefore Cuneo and O'Maley were not the only ones who were refused, but others as well? Yes.
1314. Do you recollect seeing the plans which were submitted by Merry? Yes.
1315. Were they much superior to any others which were submitted? Yes; they were the best exhibited.
1316. And he was refused the same as the others? Yes.
1317. *Mr. Wall.*] Was the ground of refusal in all the other cases because the house was not required? Nothing was stated as to why they were refused.
1318. *Mr. Manning.*] What were the police objections? There was no objection to Solomon's renewal, but in regard to the conditional licenses there were objections lodged by the police in all cases.
1319. *Mr. Wall.*] Do you know what the nature of these objections were? Because it was against the peace of the neighbourhood, and that the house was not required.
1320. *Chairman.*] Have you any complaints which were sent in by Senior-constable Dove against these licenses of O'Maley? Not that I am aware of.
1321. Have you any quarterly reports? I cannot say whether I have a quarterly report. I could have brought the quarterly report, but I really cannot recollect whether there was anything in the quarterly report or not. To the best of my recollection, I think there was a remark that the premises were out of repair, but I do not think that there was much beyond that.
1322. *Mr. Wall.*] Do you remember Senior-constable Dove calling upon you in order to obtain some notes? To make a copy of the report.
1323. Have you a copy of the report with you? No. You asked me whether anything was said in the Court about these premises, and I do not recollect anything being said in Court, but if that is a copy there is some report concerning it.

George Dove called in, sworn, and examined:—

- G. Dove. 1324. *Chairman.*] What are you? Senior-constable, stationed at Parramatta.  
 24 July, 1890. 1325. How long have you been in the force? Since the year 1869.
1326. *Mr. Manning.*] You were for a long time the Licensing Sub-Inspector for the Ryde district? Yes; and I have been twice at Ryde.
1327. When did you leave the Ryde district? In April, 1889.
1328. Did you know the "Fig-tree Inn," at Hunter's Hill? Yes.
1329. Who held the license of that hotel during the time you were last stationed at Ryde? A man named Solomon.
1330. Did you, as Licensing Inspector, make complaints about the condition of that hotel? Yes, several times.
1331. To whom? To the Licensing Bench, by way of report.
1332. In writing? Yes.

1333.

1333. Did you serve O'Maley with notice? I served Solomon with a copy of this notice in the Licensing Bench. G. Dove.  
24 July, 1880.
1334. What notice did you serve on Solomon? That unless the defects complained of by me, as Licensing Inspector, were made good within a stipulated date, mentioned on the notice, objections would be tendered to the Licensing Court.
1335. *Mr. Manning.*] Against his renewal? Yes. I then went to Mr. O'Maley and advised him to negotiate to have the improvements made, and he said he would do nothing of the kind.
1336. Is it not a fact that you several times spoke to O'Maley, and urged him, not merely as Inspector, but as a friend, to get his premises put in order, so that he might be saved from losing his license? Yes; I went by night and by day to his residence, and spoke to him as a friend.
1337. On either of those occasions, were you accompanied by another constable, and by whom? Yes; on two occasions I was accompanied by Harper. I believe he is now a warder at the Goulburn Gaol.
1338. On those occasions, did you find O'Maley sober or drunk? I found him under the influence of liquor.
1339. What did he tell you when you urged him as a friend to do what you have stated? He became rather excited. I told him I was only acting as a friend, and he said he did not care for me or anybody else, as he had influence enough, and that he was not going to abide by my ruling.
1340. In point of fact you put yourself out of the way from a friendly feeling towards this man to urge him to save his own property? Having known him for such a long time, I did it as a matter of kindness.
1341. What was the state of the house? At that time it was very bad.
1342. Can you give us any idea of its condition? I have taken a note concerning it, and it is almost a copy of what was attached to the margin of my quarterly report. It states, "House out of repair in several of the public rooms; windows and skirting-boards eaten with white ants; also paper dilapidated; the guttering and spouting defective, causing insufficient supply of water to the house; stable not in conformity; rain comes through some of rooms' ceiling, creating a great dampness; and no privacy to some of the public rooms."
1343. What do you mean by that? According to the Act there should be so many rooms called public rooms, apart from private rooms, and in order to bring the house up to the standard required, one room was taken at the end of the bar as a public room, and to get to the public room you would have to go through the landlord's bedroom. Then I complained of the staircase; it is only about 1 foot and 8 or 9 inches in width, and you have to go up it sideways.
1344. And it is very steep also? Yes.
1345. Irrespective of other considerations, is that house fit to be licensed as an hotel? It was not then, without these improvements. I do not know what it is now.
1346. *Chairman.*] I do not think the house has been altered? I have not seen it lately. I am out of the district now, and stationed at Parramatta.
1347. *Mr. Manning.*] Were you there when it was originally a four-roomed cottage? I think it was little more than that; at any rate it was a small private place.
1348. Is it not a fact that the rain and the water poured down into the house? Yes, into some of the rooms. There were no boards, and the rain from the shingles on the western end fell inside, whereas if there had been a fascia board and spout the water would have been thrown off.
1349. Is it not a fact that people have had to put umbrellas up in the house in wet weather? I cannot say.
1350. Do you know Thomas Cuneo, of Hunter's Hill? Yes.
1351. Is he a fit person to hold a publican's license? That is a grave question to answer.
1352. What is your opinion? If I were a Licensing Inspector, and he were to make application, I would, doubtless, in the interests of the public, tender an objection.
1353. Upon personal grounds? Yes.
1354. On what grounds would you object to him personally? I do not know how to put it equitably.
1355. Put it straight—tell us what personal grounds you would have to Cuneo getting a license? I do not think he would be able to conduct the license in the way the Act requires.
1356. Why? Because he knows so many people at Hunter's Hill, as one naturally would who is born there. If he held a publican's license I think they would get the upper hand of him, and he would not be able to control his business in the way the Act requires.
1357. If you have any other such telling reason, let us have it? I do not wish it to be taken down.
1358. I insist on your answering the question to the fullest extent. You say he is personally unfit to hold a license, and one of the grounds is that he is a good fellow, that he knows so many people, and that they might get the upper hand of him. What is the other reason? The other reason is this—that most of these young fellows are in the habit of gambling, card-playing, and so on.
1359. *Mr. Manning.*] Is Cuneo addicted to gambling? I have known him to be in places where it is carried on.
1360. *Chairman.*] I suppose you have been on racecourses and in billiard-rooms yourself? Only in the discharge of my duty.
1361. Many respectable men frequent these places? Certainly.
1362. What other grounds would you lodge against Cuneo? I do not know of any other.
1363. Do you know Mr. Pope, the Registrar of the Court? Yes.
1364. He has lived in the district forty years? Yes.
1365. He is a very respectable man? Yes.
1366. And he gives an entirely different opinion of Cuneo to you? Yes.
1367. Is he not as capable of knowing Cuneo's character as you? Not by any means.
1368. He has known Cuneo from a boy? He may have.
1369. How old is Cuneo? I should say about 30 years; but Mr. Pope could have no knowledge of him.
1370. *Mr. Wall.*] You have stated that in consequence of the defective state of the spouting the water supply is inadequate—is there no other means of supplying the house with water but by spouting? Only by cart.
1371. Have you ever known a water famine to occur in the house in consequence of the defective state of the spouting? Yes, I have. I know of one occasion on which they had to cart water.
1372. But is it necessary that the supply of water for the purposes of the hotel should be obtained exclusively from spouting. You have stated that in consequence of the defective state of the spouting they had to cart water? Yes.



- G. Dove. 1373. But is it absolutely necessary that the water used for an hotel should come from the spouting;—is there any objection to carting water? No objection.
- 24 July, 1890. 1374. Another matter you have referred to is the narrowness of the staircase;—was this staircase there when the house was licensed, or has it been erected since? It is the original staircase.
1375. Then the house was licensed with this narrow staircase which you object to? It is too steep.
1376. But when the house was licensed the staircase was no wider than it is at present? No; I think the license was granted under the old dispensation?
1377. I believe there were some concessions granted to houses licensed under the old dispensation? Yes.
1378. You have stated that some of the private rooms had too much publicity? Yes.
1379. You have stated that people had to pass through a bedroom to get to a public room;—that, I presume, was one objection which would occur when the house was licensed. It was not in consequence of the erection of a bedroom or in any way altering the plans of the house that this objection arose? No.
1380. Have you any reason to suppose that any moral weakness attaches to Cuneo which would render him unfit to occupy the position of an hotelkeeper? If I had the power I would not grant him a license.
1381. I am not asking you about your power. You state that he is young? He is a man of the world; he has travelled a good deal, and what he does not know is scarcely worth knowing.
1382. Then you do not think that the young men of Hunter's Hill would get the best of him? That is all very well; but place him in a public-house, and then another question arises.
1383. *Mr. Wall.*] Are you in the habit of raising objections as to the probability of what would occur? No; but it is the customary thing to state to the Licensing Bench the character and the fitness of the applicant.
1384. It appears to me to be a very objectionable custom, if it does prevail. It appears from your statement that you have no objection to Cuneo's moral character, and the only objection is that, as a young man, he might be overcome by the influence of the people in the district? Yes.
1385. How long prior to the hearing of these applications were the quarterly objections raised? About a month.
1386. That would be in 1889? Yes.
1387. How long have you been inspector in the district? I went on the 1st April, 1888, and left on the 16th April, 1889.
1388. You were there about twelve months? Yes.
1389. What was the date of your first quarterly report? I cannot say exactly.
1390. From April, 1888, to April, 1889, there would be four quarterly reports, and they were all submitted to you? Yes.
1391. In how many of these reports were objections contained against this house? I may say that there were no actual reports which would injure the publican or the landlord, but I took a stand at last.
1392. *Chairman*] You referred to this house in your last report? Yes.
1393. *Mr. Wall.*] Did you refer to this house in any previous report? Yes; on the margin.
1394. You were responsible for four quarterly reports? Yes.
1395. In how many of them did you refer to the condition of this house? Two or three.
1396. *Mr. Manning.*] Can you tell us the ground of objection you made to the renewal of Solomon's license in your last report? [*No answer.*]
1397. *Chairman.*] Did you lodge objections as required by the Act to the renewal of Solomon's license? Yes, I did, upon foolscap.
1398. Notice of which would be given to the licensee? Yes.
1399. *Mr. Manning.*] If Mr. Pope says no objections were lodged against the renewal of Solomon's license he must be mistaken? Yes, because this is a copy produced of the notes taken from it.
1400. Then you, as Licensing Inspector, objected to the renewal of Solomon's license in consequence of the repairs which you had repeatedly said should be carried out not being effected? Yes.
1401. And the Bench refused the renewal upon your objections? Yes.
1402. *Mr. Wall.*] You stated that these were a copy of notes taken from the report sent in by you? Yes, abbreviated.
1403. And procured from Mr. Pope? Yes.
1404. When did you make these notes? The first time I was notified to come here.
1405. *Chairman.*] Before you sent in these objections, did you have any talk with Mr. Manning in regard to O'Maley's house? I think so.
1406. I want you to tell the Committee what that conversation was? I think I told Mr. Manning that I considered it was my duty to object to the house being licensed, on the ground that I could not get the lessee to do anything to it—that I had gone to the trouble of seeing O'Maley several times, and he refused to take any steps in the matter.
1407. Did you have any conversation with Solomon as to the repairs necessary? Yes.
1408. Did Solomon tell you he had seen Mr. Manning, and asked him about the repairs, and that Manning told him that if he allowed the repairs to be made he would cancel his license? No; I am positive he did not. Solomon and I were not in confidence.
1409. Why did you go to Mr. Manning and tell him you thought it was your duty to report against the house;—were you in the habit of going to talk to the Chairman of the Bench? No.
1410. Did Mr. Manning say anything when you told him this? It is so long ago that I cannot remember.
1411. Try and remember, as it is of some importance. Did Mr. Manning approve of the course you had taken? I know he said, "You have your duty to do, and I suppose you know it," or words to that effect.
1412. Did he then approve of you lodging your objections? Yes, I believe he did.
1413. That was before the objections were lodged, and subsequently he sat on the Bench, and heard those objections? Yes; I cannot really remember what he did say, but it was something to that effect.
1414. You do remember speaking to him and telling him you thought it was your duty to object to the house? Yes.
1415. And Mr. Manning approved of that? Yes.
1416. What else did he say? I do not remember anything else, it is so far back.
1417. Did you ever consult Mr. Manning off the Bench before in regard to any license in the district? I think so.



1418. Tell me the name of the person? Not in regard to objections, but with the object of putting before the Bench what was really necessary in regard to the house. Another thing, Mr. Manning would know that I would tender objections, because I have to place them before the Bench seven clear days before the hearing of the case. G. Dove,  
24 July, 1890.
1419. And have you not to give the lessee equal notice? Yes, equal notice.
1420. Where are you stationed just now? At Parramatta.
1421. Do you find any magistrate there who will talk with you about cases before they come before him? I am not the Licensing Inspector there.
1422. But you have cases there? I do not know what they do in regard to the inspectors.
1423. You say you have been in the force since 1869—do you know of a magistrate discussing cases with you before they come before the Bench? Yes, frequently.
1424. Could you give me the name of any magistrate besides Mr. Manning? I would not like to.
1425. It would be of great public interest to know these men? They sometimes get accustomed to the sergeant of police, and they perhaps meet and talk matters over, not thinking that it will be made capital of.
1426. And not thinking that it is unfair to the question to be tried? I should not think that a gentleman would take any advantage.
1427. Don't you know that Mr. Manning wanted to shut up O'Maley's house? No. I did not know there was any ill-feeling between them. He has spoken in good terms of O'Maley to me.
1428. Do you know Bennett's corner, opposite the "Fig-tree Inn"? Yes.
1429. Who owns it? Mrs. Bennett.
1430. Does she know Mr. Manning? She must know him.
1431. Did she ever tell you that Mr. Manning had given her advice as to her property? No.
1432. It would have taken very little to make the repairs you speak about? It would not have taken much.
1433. The requirements of the neighbourhoods justified the granting of this license to O'Maley? If it did in the first instance I should think it would do so now.
1434. More so now? Well, the population is increasing.
1435. And, as a matter of fact, a large hotel has been licensed within the last few years? Yes, the "Gladstone."
1436. Knowing the district as you do, could you have lodged an objection that the reasonable requirements of the district did not justify the granting of a license to O'Maley? No; I could not have done that. The only objection was as to the house being out of repair.
1437. *Mr. Manning.*] Could you not lodge the objection that it was adjacent to a church? That was done in the first instance, and I was overruled.
1438. Were you there when the house was first licensed? Yes.
1439. Is it not a positive fact that when you spoke to me about the state of the house I urged you to do all you could to get these people to put it into proper order? Yes.
1440. *Chairman.*] If you remember these things, tell us what was said? I can remember this, because, to the best of my recollection, Captain Goodridge was with Mr. Manning at the time. It was outside the Court-house. When Mr. Manning saw my report in the Court-house he said something to the effect that I was to do all I could for O'Maley.
1441. Captain Goodridge was very favourable to granting O'Maley's license? Yes; he was then.
1442. And he would hear all that Mr. Manning was saying? Yes.
1443. *Mr. Manning.*] When you told me that they would not repair the premises, did not I urge you to do all you could to get O'Maley to put the house in proper order, and to point out to him what the consequence would be if he failed to do it? Yes; that was made use of several times.
1444. Have I at any time expressed any feeling inimical to O'Maley or his house? No to me—in fact, I thought you were both good friends.
1445. *Chairman.*] You say that advice by Mr. Manning was made use of several times;—how often did you talk this matter over with Mr. Manning? I could not say.
1446. You must have talked it over several times, if he gave you this advice several times? Sometimes he would say to me, "Well, Dove, has anything been done?" He appeared to be anxious that the house should be repaired before the lease expired.
1447. Then you had been talking over it a considerable time? Yes; and so did O'Maley and I, and from the way O'Maley spoke I thought he was on the best of terms with Mr. Manning, because he told me he had every confidence in him.
1448. *Mr. Manning.*] He told you he had every confidence in me? Yes; he told me before his own wife. His wife was there, and she said she had known you for a number of years.
1449. *Chairman.*] Then you frequently talked about this house of O'Maley's? Yes, several times.
1450. *Mr. Manning.*] If O'Maley states in his evidence that you did not say anything to him about repairing the premises, is it true or untrue? It is untrue.
1451. Do you recollect me speaking from the Bench of Solomon or O'Maley, either or both, about having these premises put in order? Yes, they were both there.
1452. When was this? This would be the quarter before the report I sent in on the 17th April.
1453. *Chairman.*] Why should the matter of O'Maley's license be mentioned the quarter before. There was no application for renewal in connection with the house, and what brought them to the Court when they were not wanted? I imagine, on the margin, we have the privilege of making remarks as to the condition of the houses.
1454. What brought Solomon and O'Maley there when they were not wanted, and there was no question as to their houses being considered, and they had no notice. Will you swear they were there? I will swear Solomon was there beyond a doubt.
1455. What brought him there? Curiosity.
1456. How far from the Court is this house situated? Two and a half or 3 miles.
1457. And from curiosity left his business and went there? Yes; he knew there was some complaint to be brought before the Court.
1458. Did he have any notice of it? I told him.
1459. How could he bring any complaint before the Court when there was no question of his license coming before the Court? This was the quarterly return, and I told him I intended bringing it before the Bench.

- G. Dove. 1460. What brought O'Maley there? I cannot say, but I am almost sure he was there.  
 24 July, 1890. 1461. *Mr. Manning.*] Do you recollect, when the case was spoken of, O'Maley got up at the back of the Court and commenced some abuse of Solomon, and said they could not agree about the premises, or something of that kind? No, I do not recollect that.  
 1462. At all events you recollect the fact that I, as Chairman of the Bench, spoke to Solomon or O'Maley or both? [*No answer.*]  
 1463. Whom do you recollect me speaking to? To Solomon.  
 1464. Do you recollect me speaking to him in open Court about the premises? Exactly.  
 1465. *Mr. Crick.*] And that was at the January meeting, previous to the refusal of the renewal? Yes.  
 1466. Then it was nothing new to Mr. Manning when you spoke to him and told him you were going to object to Solomon's renewal? No.  
 1467. You have led the Committee to think that that was a justification why this matter should crop up between you shortly before the renewal meeting in April? No. When my returns were sent in Mr. Manning and I spoke several times upon the subject, and other Licensing Magistrates too.  
 1468. Your memory seems to be good about this January meeting;—tell me who were on the Bench? Mr. Manning was one, and I believe Mr. Linsley was the other.  
 1469. Who else? If I had my writing and returns I could tell you.  
 1470. But you had not your writings to remind you that Solomon was there, and that Mr. Manning made a statement from the Bench, but you cannot remember who constituted the Bench? I know Mr. Manning was there for one, because I remember the remarks he made to Solomon about his house.  
 1471. *Mr. Manning.*] Your quarterly report was then before the Bench? Yes.

THURSDAY, 7 AUGUST, 1890.

W. P. CRICK, ESQ., IN THE CHAIR.

Mr. C. E. Jeanneret called in, sworn, and examined:—

- Mr. C. E. Jeanneret. 1472. *Chairman.*] You reside at Hunter's Hill? Yes.  
 7 Aug., 1890. 1473. *Mr. Manning.*] You are a member of the Ryde Licensing Bench? Yes.  
 1474. Did you take your sitting for the first time in April, 1887? About that time.  
 1475. I believe you vacated your seat because of your leaving the Colony, and you were reappointed in March, 1889? Yes.  
 1476. You know the old "Fig-tree Inn," Hunter's Hill? Yes.  
 1477. You knew it before it was an inn? Yes.  
 1478. Were you on the Bench along with myself when an application by Solomon for a renewal of the license of the "Fig-tree Inn" was refused? Yes.  
 1479. Do you recollect why the renewal was refused? Because the place was in a very bad condition, and no arrangement could be arrived at between the lessee and the landlord. The lessee stated that the landlord would not allow him to repair the house, or something to that effect, and would not consent to a renewal of his lease. I recollect that the refusal was, in the first instance, owing to the bad condition of repair into which the place had fallen. It was frequently reported as being unfit.  
 1480. Reported by the police? Yes.  
 1481. And the police opposed the renewal? Yes.  
 1482. Have you seen this house yourself? Yes.  
 1483. In what condition was it at the time you saw it? Bad, very bad. It was leaking, and the place was in a dilapidated condition—in fact, the house never was properly fitted for an hotel as licensed in these days.  
 1484. You inspected it yourself and saw it in that state? Yes, shortly before the application for the renewal was made.  
 1485. Did you see it again? Yes.  
 1486. After the license had been refused, or after the house had been vacated? After the house had been vacated.  
 1487. Had anything been done to the house when you saw it the last time? Yes; it had been cleaned up.  
 1488. Who was living there then? Cuneo.  
 1489. You did not see it at the very last when Solomon vacated it? No.  
 1490. Was Solomon represented by Counsel when he applied for a renewal? Yes.  
 1491. Do you know whether it was Mr. Charles Bull? I believe it was.  
 1492. The whole matter was thoroughly gone into by the Bench? Yes.  
 1493. Consisting of whom? Yourself, myself, and Mr. Rodd, I believe.  
 1494. And the reason of the refusal of the application was because of the bad condition of the premises to be licensed, and of the hopelessness of any arrangement being arrived at to put the place in proper order? Yes.  
 1495. Was there any difference of opinion on the Bench as to the refusal of this license? There was no difference of opinion on the Bench at that time.  
 1496. Did I, as Chairman of the Bench, attempt to use any influence to persuade you as to how you should decide in that case, or in any other case? Never.  
 1497. Is it correct or not that no opposition was offered by the police to the renewal of Solomon's license? It is incorrect.  
 1498. Do you recollect my giving as a reason for the refusal of Solomon's license that he had no lease beyond a certain period? Solomon himself raised a question about the lease. He said there was a dispute between himself and O'Maley as to the extension of the lease, and he gave that as a reason why the place was in such a bad condition.

1499. Solomon, personally, was not very anxious to get a renewal;—was he interested in getting a renewal? He would have been interested if he got a renewal of the lease.

1500. I am talking about the renewal of the license. It was stated in Court that they were bound to apply under the lease? Yes.

1501. They were not very warm about it? No.

1502. *Chairman.*] Did not Solomon come to you afterwards and ask you to sit on the Bench to grant the renewal, and you referred him to Mr. Manning. Did he not see you in King-street, and speak to you about this very renewal? I am not sure, but I think that he did speak to me once about it. He did not ask me anything very particularly about it. He asked me if I would be at the meeting, or something of that kind.

1503. He asked you to sit for the renewal? Well, supposing he did. I would be bound to sit whether he asked me or not.

1504. *Mr. Manning.*] I think when Solomon spoke to you that it was at the tail-end of his holding? Solomon never made any special request privately to me.

1505. Did Solomon at any later time, towards the end of his tenure—(say) during the last week or two in June—speak to you again? He never spoke to me more than once on the subject.

1506. Did I ever make the statement from the Bench that we refused the renewal of a license to Solomon because he had got no tenure of the premises? No.

1507. Do you recollect a person named Davis applying, with others, for a conditional license? Yes.

1508. For Mrs. Bennett's corner? Yes.

1509. What was the result? It was refused.

1510. Do you recollect any particulars? I recollect the application was refused. Davis proposed to put up some buildings, and he was asked if he had any interest in the land, and he said he had none.

1511. A letter was sent to the Bench stating that this person was applying without authority? Yes.

1512. And when he was put into the witness-box he was asked what title he possessed in regard to the land for which he was applying? Yes.

1513. He said he could not show any, and his case was not entertained? Yes.

1514. Do you recollect any other instance in which any question as to the title of the land arose? No; but I recollect perfectly well the dispute between Solomon and O'Maley.

1515. That was going on for a long time? Yes.

1516. Do you recollect both Solomon and O'Maley being spoken to in Court about these premises, and being cautioned about putting them in order? Yes.

1517. Publicly, from the Bench, by myself as Chairman? Yes.

1518. And you were present on the Bench? Yes.

1519. Now we come to the different refusals in regard to Cuneo for this house;—do you recollect the grounds on which those refusals were made? There were several grounds—first of all that the license had lapsed, that the premises were not suitable, and that they were near the church. Those are three of the principal grounds.

1520. Did you sit on the occasion of Cuneo's applications for O'Maley's house? Yes.

1521. Do you recollect that in the first instance the Bench were of opinion that this house having been twice refused was shut out under a certain clause in the Act? Yes.

1522. Mr. Crick appeared for Cuneo in that case? Yes.

1523. Mr. Crick stated that a decision had been given otherwise, and the Bench adjourned the case to consider the matter? Yes.

1524. On that occasion Mr. Crick had objected to my sitting on the matter? Yes.

1525. When the case again came on for hearing, did Mr. Crick object to my sitting? Yes.

1526. Did I state that the matter had been referred to the Minister and decided by him, and that it had been left to my discretion as to whether I should sit or not? Yes.

1527. And I announced my intention of retiring from the Bench? Yes.

1528. What occurred then? Mr. D'Ardier requested you not to retire, but you persisted in doing so.

1529. Did not Mr. D'Ardier decline to sit, because he said he had no experience as a Licensing Magistrate? Yes; but he first said he would not sit unless you sat.

1530. Was it not entirely owing to my pressing him that he remained? It was.

1531. *Chairman.*] Was it not because I told him if he did not discharge his duties I would get a writ of mandamus and compel him? I know something of that kind was said.

1532. *Mr. Manning.*] Irrespective of my feeling in the matter, did I not retire from the Bench at the earnest solicitation of Mr. Crick? Yes.

1533. Is it not a fact that, in the first instance, I continued sitting principally because we thought that the merits of the case would not be entered into, and that the house was actually shut out under a particular section of the Act? Yes.

1534. Subsequently there were other applications by Cuneo? Yes.

1535. In those instances you continued to sit with Mr. D'Ardier? Yes.

1536. What was the result? The license was refused.

1537. Did you return to Sydney on that day—on the same conveyance as Mr. Crick;—did you come down in a steamboat with him? I think I did. I know I have come down once or twice with him, and I think I did so on that day.

1538. Did he tell you that they thought all they had to do was to get rid of me, and that then they would be certain of getting a license from the Bench through you? Mr. Crick made some remark to me that he thought I would be favourable to the granting of a license.

1539. *Chairman.*] State whatever was said. A question is put into your mouth, and you give an answer which does not bear it out. The question is asked: "Did I tell you that all I wanted was to get rid of Mr. Manning, or anything like it?" I do not know that you said that.

1540. It was not on the boat at all that I referred to the matter, but on the prorogation or opening of Parliament, in the refreshment-room? I know it was somewhere, and you said you thought I was favourable to the granting of a license.

1541. And that was the remark? Yes. I am sure I did not express to any one an opinion in favour of the granting of a license.

1542. *Mr. Manning.*] Is it not a fact that a great deal of influence was brought to bear upon you to get you to grant a license? Yes.

1543. *Chairman.*] By whom? Not by you.

1514. Was it by anybody of any weight? It was. I could mention the name if desirable, but as it is a family affair perhaps I had better not.
1545. *Mr. Wall.*] It would be much better if the evidence is to be given at all that we should have no respect for family matters? If the Committee ask the question I will answer it.
1546. *Mr. Manning.*] Were there any applications for other conditional licenses in the immediate vicinity? Yes. One by a person named Merry, and by Page and Solomon, and the one we are speaking about; and they were all in a more eligible position, and they were more eligible in regard to structure.
1547. And they were all refused? Yes. Some of them were petitioned against.
1548. *Chairman.*] There was a large petition in favour of Cuneo's application? Yes.
1549. *Mr. Manning.*] And against it as well? Yes.
1550. Was any favour shown in regard to one house or the other;—were they not all refused on the ground that the license was not required? Yes.
1551. Merry, I believe, submitted plans for a very fine hotel? Yes.
1552. And he also offered to remove his license from the "Gladstone Hotel" to the new one? Yes.
1553. At that time was there a great deal of speculation in land in the neighbourhood? There was some speculation. There was an expectation that a bridge would be erected over the Tarban Creek.
1554. And that led to this sudden demand for hotels? Yes.
1555. And it increased the value of land there? Yes.
1556. You know the "Gladstone Hotel"? Yes.
1557. Was it specially built for an hotel? Yes.
1558. What was the position in regard to that hotel for a number of years? The license was refused.
1559. In what district was it refused? In Sydney.
1560. Is it not a fact that although specially constructed for an hotel the house stood for six years before a license was obtained? I know it stood a number of years.
1561. Is it not a fact that it stood without a license for some years under the very section in regard to which we acted in the case of O'Maley? Yes.
1562. Do you know how that house eventually came to get a license? When the application came forward the Bench thought there was a necessity for a house offering better accommodation than existed at the time, and the Bench gave some kind of a promise that if the building was enlarged to a considerable extent, and made into a first-class hotel, the license might be granted.
1563. No promise was made on that occasion? I was not present. I was not on the Bench then, but I understood there was a tacit understanding that if the house was made into a first-class hotel the license would be granted.
1564. And the house possesses good accommodation, and is well kept? Yes.
1565. And it is about half a mile from the other place? Yes.
1566. *Chairman.*] You submit to Mr. Manning's opinion as Chairman in most matters dealt with by the Licensing Bench at Ryde? I submit to his opinion on matters of law connected with the Licensing Act, and I also defer to his judgment, because I know he has taken an extremely active interest in the welfare of the district in regard to hotels. Since he has been there he has wonderfully improved their condition. No one could have done more for the improvement of the licensed houses in the district.
1567. Having once given a judgment against the "Fig-tree Inn," you will be disposed to be consistent and maintain that judgment? Not if I thought it was wrong.
1568. Why did you go and inspect these premises, and who asked you to go? On the first occasion I went of my own motion. There was some talk about the place, and I was asked my opinion about it.
1569. Who asked you? I think it was Mr. Goodridge, but I am not sure. After that I went at Cuneo's own request.
1570. He was the applicant, and desired you to see the premises? Yes.
1571. Did you say that the premises were fit to be licensed on that occasion? I said they were better than when I saw them before—they had been greatly improved.
1572. If Cuneo swears that you then said the place was fit to be licensed, was he telling the truth? I never expressed an opinion to Cuneo as to what the result of the application would be.
1573. I am not asking that question. Did you say that the place was fit to be licensed—not that you would license it? I do not think I said anything to Cuneo one way or the other.
1574. But you have just admitted that you said the place was in a better condition;—you must have said something? Yes, but I am quite certain that I never expressed an opinion to Cuneo as to the fitness or otherwise of the place.
1575. You remember Solomon seeing you in reference to this license? I have a dim recollection of it.
1576. Did he tell you he had already seen Mr. Manning? I do not know that he did.
1577. Did you say this to him, "I will sit on Saturday if Mr. Manning will sit, and I have no objection to the license being renewed if Mr. Manning has not"? No.
1578. Did you ever say to him that Mr. Crick told you he was completely upset in his calculations—that he thought he had only to get rid of Mr. Manning, with you in the chair, and that he would be successful? I do not think that I told him in those words. I told him the substance of what I have stated—that you said you were very much disappointed, and you thought I was favourable to the granting of a license.
1579. The conversation you allude to was a private one in the refreshment-room? I do not recollect where the conversation took place, but we had a conversation.
1580. Wherever it was, it was a private conversation? Well, it was a private conversation. There is some difference between what you say and what I really felt about the matter. I should not like to be in conflict with either you or Mr. Manning about it, because it is impossible to recollect the exact words; but the substance was that if Mr. Manning was not there the license would be granted by myself and Mr. D'Ardier.
1581. Mr. D'Ardier was in favour of granting the license? Well, he was, partly.
1582. Do you not know that Mr. Manning has already reported that he was in favour of granting it? Yes.
1583. In fact, did not he hold out and refuse to concur with you in refusing it? He said he saw a difficulty in the matter.
1584. Did he not refuse to concur with you in refusing it? Yes; he said he thought it was very hard upon the man.

1585. Although you deliberated for some time you could not bring him round to your way of thinking? I did not wish to bring him round at all. Mr. C. E. Jeanneret.
1586. I suppose it was your desire that the Bench should concur, and that you should not exercise a casting vote? I thought it was better to leave the matter open. 7 Aug., 1890.
1587. Have you any interest in any hotels? In what way do you mean?
1588. Pecuniarily interested? Do you mean directly?
1589. Directly or indirectly? What do you mean by directly or indirectly?
1590. You or your wife? I do not see that the question as to whether my wife has an interest, by trustees or otherwise, has anything to do with the matter.
1591. Do you say, in view of that, that you have not an interest, directly or indirectly, in licensed premises in this Colony? The question is how the expression "directly or indirectly" comes in. It would, perhaps, require the presence of my solicitors to explain the matter. I have already answered in the negative.
1592. Did you ask anybody to take one of your hotels at any time? Since when?
1593. During the last eighteen months? No.
1594. Or two years? No.
1595. How long ago is it since you did? Before I became a member of the Licensing Bench.
1596. Are you still interested in that property in the same way as you were then? No.
1597. Have you disposed of it? Yes.
1598. Then, is your evidence now that you are not directly or indirectly interested in licensed premises in the Colony? It may be a question of law of which I am not competent to judge. In my opinion I am not, but if you want that question answered you had, I think, better ask my solicitor. I have given an answer that I am not interested.
1599. *Mr. Manning.*] Do you recollect our having a discussion as to which was the best position in that neighbourhood in case it was desirable at any time to have an additional house there? Yes; I recollect a discussion about it.
1600. And it depended very much at that time whether this bridge was to be erected? Yes.
1601. Do you recollect me telling you that I would try and find out from Solomon before he left the district what he thought was the best position? Yes; something of that kind was said.
1602. Do you recollect me telling you afterwards that I had got a memorandum from Solomon? Yes.

[The following memorandum was handed in.]

Sir,

In reply to your inquiry as to which particular position in the neighbourhood of my old hotel, the "Fig-tree Inn," Hunter's Hill, I consider the best for a public-house, I have no hesitation in saying that I consider Mrs. Bennett's allotment at the corner of Ryde and Gladsville Roads is by far the best, both for the publican and the public.

16 July, 1889.

1603. That is the purport of what I afterwards told you? Yes.
1604. Have you ever seen that document before? No.
1605. Have we ever had that document before the Bench, or have you seen it before to-day? No; but I have heard the substance from you.

John Theodore Merry called in, sworn, and examined:—

1606. *Chairman.*] What are you? Hotelkeeper, living at Hunter's Hill. J. T. Merry.
1607. *Mr. Manning.*] You are the landlord of the "Gladstone Hotel"? Yes. 7 Aug., 1890.
1608. How long have you been in the district? Two years and three months.
1609. I believe the house first stood in your mother's name? Yes.
1610. Did you know what is known as the old "Fig-tree Inn" whilst it was conducted as a public-house? Yes.
1611. Who was the landlord at that time? Solomon.
1612. Have you been in the house at different times during Solomon's lease? Yes, frequently.
1613. Were you in Court when the renewal to Solomon was refused in April of last year? Yes.
1614. And you have been present at the different quarterly meetings since? Yes.
1615. Were you friendly with Solomon? Yes.
1616. In what condition was the "Fig-tree Inn" at the time you saw it? It was in a very dilapidated state, both inside and out.
1617. How far back has that condition extended? I remember being taken through it when I first went into the "Gladstone Hotel." It was very bad then, and it was getting worse up to the time it was shut up.
1618. How long back will that be? About twelve months before the license was cancelled.
1619. Were you there off and on from that time to the time the house was closed? Yes.
1620. Did the house get better or worse? It got worse towards the last three months.
1621. Were you ever in the house when it was raining? Yes. I have seen the rain running down the wall on to the floor next to the bar.
1622. That was a public room? Yes—the bar parlour.
1623. Have you seen anything else showing the state of disrepair? The walls were in a bad state.
1624. Was that from damp? Yes; I should say it would be from damp.
1625. Or from general disrepair and neglect? It wanted thoroughly repairing.
1626. Was the house in such a condition that it ought to be a licensed house? I should think not. I can honestly say that I have never seen a worse house for dilapidation in Sydney.
1627. You have been holding a license for a great many years? About twelve years.
1628. Did you ever see a public-house in Sydney, or out of Sydney, in the bush, in such a disreputable state as that public-house? I may have seen one or two as bad, but never worse. Of course, under the old Licensing Act they were not so particular as they are now.
1629. Did you ever speak to Solomon about the condition of his house? Yes, often.
1630. What did he say about it? He was continually complaining about it.
1631. The landlord would not do anything for him? No.
1632. Do you recollect whether the last application for renewal, in April, was opposed by the police or not? Yes, it was.

- J. T. Merry. 1633. Upon what grounds? The principal ground was that the house was in a very bad state of repair, and not fit to be licensed.
- 7 Aug., 1890. 1634. Did you see Solomon after he left the neighbourhood? Yes, once, at his own home.
1635. How came you to go to see him? I had met him once or twice in the city. I received two letters from him in reference to a claim by a man named Parker, at Hunter's Hill. I went to see him for that reason. I have heard that he had been doing a large business in Balmain, and I was anxious to see what he was doing. His wife came over to see a man who was owing him £2 5s. I told his wife that this man had had a draft from Ireland for £105, and that I would, if I could, see that he paid the money.
1636. When you were there, was any reference made to me in any way at all? Yes. We were in conversation for about an hour. The conversation was generally about this disturbance going on at Hunter's Hill in regard to public-houses.
1637. Was anything said about my conduct? Yes; I took it from Solomon's conversation, generally, that he had a strong feeling of antipathy against you.
1638. Tell us what occurred? It is a long time ago.
1639. *Mr. Wall.*] Tell us, as far as your memory will serve you, of any matters bearing upon the antipathy which existed between Solomon and Manning? Solomon certainly expressed himself very strongly against Manning.
1640. *Chairman.*] What did he say? One expression was, that Mr. Manning, in his estimation, was a bloody dog. He expressed himself in that way on two occasions—once there and once in the city.
1641. *Mr. Wall.*] Did he state why? I do not know that he made any particular statement, but he inferred that Mr. Manning had not acted altogether as fairly to him as he had anticipated. He was an unsuccessful applicant for a conditional license at the Ryde Licensing Court, and I know he made sure he would obtain it, and therefore he was very much cut up about it.
1642. Can you tell us when this conversation took place? I could not tell even the month, it was when I visited Solomon's house.
1643. What year? It would be nearly twelve months ago.
1644. That would be about this time last year, then? I am not certain about the date.
1645. It was about twelve months ago? I think so.
1646. Have you heard of this letter that Mr. Manning got from Solomon twelve months ago—on the 16th July, 1889? No.
1647. Supposing they were on sufficiently friendly terms for Mr. Manning to give him a character at that time, and he to give Mr. Manning a recommendation for Bennett's corner;—in that case the man was acting a double part? I believe that previous to Solomon's refusal he was on good terms.
1648. Solomon's refusal was in April? I am not sure about the month the conversation took place. Those words were used.
1649. *Mr. Wall.*] After the refusal of the license? Yes, on two occasions.
1650. *Mr. Manning.*] Was it after Solomon had left the district and had gone to live in Balmain? Yes.
1651. And he was refused a conditional license twice, was he not? I believe he was.
1652. Did you ever propose to him that he should come and see me, or ask him not to say anything about me? I did not. I have no doubt that in the course of conversation I told him it was not advisable for him to mix himself up with the affairs of the district when he was clean out of it, but I made no allusion to this particular case.
1653. Did you ever ask him to go and see me anywhere in Sydney? No.
1654. If he says you did, is it true or untrue? It is untrue.
1655. *Mr. Wall.*] You have been keeping an hotel about two years in Hunter's Hill? Yes.
1656. Do you know Inspector Dove? Yes.
1657. Is he an energetic officer;—does he make thorough inquiry as to the condition of houses and so forth? I do not know a great deal about Dove, but he seems to be a very popular man there.
1658. He seems to discharge his duties? I think so. He was very particular about the inspection of my place.
1659. And you take him to be a man who is very particular in regard to hotels? I do, from the manner in which he inspected my house. It has never been inspected like it since.
1660. If the house was in the condition you have stated it to be in twelve months prior to the refusal of the license, would the inspector be likely to omit the fact from his report? I should not think so.
- [Quarterly Reports put in by Mr. Manning.]
1661. *Chairman.*] You state that you have seldom seen a house in such a state of repair as was the "Fig-tree Inn" when the license was refused? That is a fact.
1662. Then it must have gone into this wretched state of repair from the time of the previous granting of the renewal of the license—you say that the officer is a careful man, and would not allow such an hotel as you have mentioned to have a renewal of a license, so that it must have gone into that state of repair within twelve months? I did not say anything of the kind. I may tell you that when I went to Hunter's Hill with a view of buying the "Gladstone Hotel" I heard that there was a probability of the "Fig-tree Inn" being closed unless it was repaired. I went round purposely, and I was so impressed with the state of the place that it was one of the main inducements to buy the "Gladstone."
1663. When did you hear that? I believe Brooks, the hotel-broker, mentioned it in the first instance. I am sure he did.
1664. What time was that? Two years and three months ago.
1665. Two years and three months ago you heard that there was a probability of the "Fig-tree Inn" being closed? Yes, owing to the bad condition it was in.
1666. From Mr. Brooks? I believe it was.
1667. Are you sure? Yes, quite sure.
1668. The "Fig-tree Inn" must have gone into this bad state of repair within twelve months? I cannot say as to that.
1669. Have you seen it lately? I have not been inside it.
1670. Is it not much in the same state now as it was then? It may be from the outside appearance. It is a stone building.
1671. It suited you very well to have this place closed up? I do not know that it has made a great difference.
- 1672.

1672. How far is it from your place? About half a mile.
1673. Did you not swear before the Court that it was a quarter of a mile? I do not think so. To be correct, I should say that it is about 600 yards away. J. T. Merry.
1674. You have been treated very well by Mr. Manning? Mr. Manning could not do otherwise with the references I hold, nor could any other Licensing Magistrate. 7 Aug., 1890.
1675. Was anything urged against Cunco's character? I do not think so; I do not remember hearing it.
1676. So that in point of character Cunco is as good a man as you? That will have to be proved. I do not know anything about him. My character was proved.
1677. You say you attended the meetings of the Court? Yes.
1678. Did you work up the petition against Cunco? Certainly not.
1679. Did you sign it? No; and I would not allow anyone in the house to sign it—not even the boarders. I asked them particularly not to sign it.
1680. Did you appear and give evidence against the license? No; I was in the Court, and was asked as a matter of favour to go into the box.
1681. Did you give evidence against the house? I did not.
1682. Is your name John Merry? Yes. I gave evidence in the Court, but not against the application—not in opposition.
1683. It was upon an application of Cunco's that you gave evidence? I could not say; there were four applications on the same day.
1684. Were you called by the police? I believe I was. The police did not know I was there until they looked round, and they asked me to go into the box.
1685. You were there I suppose as a candid friend, and it was with great regret you were put into the box to give evidence against Cunco's application? I did not give evidence against Cunco.
1686. Did you give evidence for him? No.
1687. Did you not swear that the place did not require another house? I do not think so.
1688. How long is it since you have visited Solomon? I have only been there once.
1689. And you went to see him in connection with a letter he had written, and out of curiosity? Yes.
1690. Was that since this Committee was appointed to inquire into Mr. Manning's conduct? Yes.
1691. Did you say to him, "Anything you know about Manning keep to yourself"? No.
1692. Did you ask him to meet Manning and you in Sydney on the next day? No.
1693. How long after he opened the house in Balmain was it before you called upon him? I could not say.
1694. He was refused in April? Yes; and then he got a license in Balmain about two months afterwards.
1695. That would bring it into July? That would make it about twelve months ago.
1696. And he was very much incensed against Mr. Manning? He was.
1697. Why did he say Mr. Manning was a bloody dog? The only reason I can assign is that he was an applicant for a license before the Court and was refused.
1698. I want to know what Solomon said—not what you infer;—he must have been saying something detrimental to Manning? He made it a point of being very close, and would not make any definite statement.
1699. And although he was so careful not to say anything which you might carry to Mr. Manning he wound up by calling him a bloody dog? Yes, twice.
1700. And yet you tell us he was very careful about what he said? He did not make any particular reference to the case.
1701. Did he say anything about Mr. Manning being mixed up in Bennett's corner? I believe he has made reference to it on one occasion.
1702. What did he say about it? I do not know. It was something in connection with the refusal of Cunco's license. Cunco made an application for a license for that corner.
1703. And it was then that the conversation took place about Manning being interested? He never told me he was interested.
1704. What did he say? I could not remember every word. The conversation took place twelve or fourteen months ago.
1705. Then you wish the Committee to believe that Solomon, when you saw him in Balmain, which would be about July, was so incensed against Mr. Manning that he called him, not only on that occasion, but on another occasion, a bloody dog? That is a positive fact, and I will positively swear to those very words.
1706. Did you tell Mr. Manning this? No; I have told Mr. Manning that I was sure Solomon was very much incensed against him.
1707. When did you tell him that? I met Mr. Manning some few months ago three or four times.
1708. Have you had any conversation with Mr. Manning since this inquiry was started? Yes.
1709. What about? I saw him twice in connection with the license of my house up country.
1710. Did you say anything to him about what Solomon had said? I do not think so, but I may have expressed words showing that Solomon was bitter against him.
1711. Did Mr. Manning tell you what Solomon had sworn before the Committee? Yes; he mentioned that Solomon had stated that I had been over there.
1712. It was quite true? Yes; he said that Solomon had made a statement to the effect that I went over there purposely to see him. I told Mr. Manning that it was contrary to common-sense, and that if Solomon was summoned as a witness he must attend as a matter of compulsion.
1713. Solomon swore that you came to his house in Balmain, and that you said, "Anything you know about Manning keep to yourself." He then goes on to state that you said it would do him no good, and that it would be to his disadvantage in the future, and that you then asked him to meet Mr. Manning and yourself in the city on the following day? That is what I deny.
1714. Then that is absolutely untrue? It is absolutely untrue. Possibly in the course of conversation I may have told him that it was inadvisable for him to mix himself up in the quarrels of the district.
1715. Why did you give him this particular advice? Because we were always friends.
1716. But you have only called on him once since he went to Balmain? But we were on the best of terms.
1717. Who started the conversation about the Committee? I believe Solomon did. I was in the parlour with my wife, and I believe Solomon called me out of the room and started the conversation.



- J. T. Merry.** 1718. You give as a reason for visiting him that some letter was written? Yes; a man named Parker was indebted to Solomon for £2 5s., and Solomon could not get his money. The man got a remittance for £105, and could not get anyone to identify him, and I went into the city and paid it into my account.
- 7 Aug., 1890. 1719. What is the name of the Bank? The Mercantile Bank. He wrote to me twice, and his wife came over once to see this man. I wrote to Solomon and told him I had this money, and would endeavour to get him paid. I got permission from the man to pay him, and sent him a cheque.
1720. Was the draft paid into your account before you saw Solomon? Yes.
1721. And a cheque was sent after you saw him? Yes.
1722. What other conversation had you with Mr. Manning in reference to this inquiry? I told him of my perfect willingness to give evidence if it were required, and that I was in a position to contradict Solomon's statement.
1723. Had you seen a copy of the printed evidence? No.
1724. Did Mr. Manning show it to you;—did he read it to you? I believe he did read something to me.
1725. You are still of opinion that Solomon had a feeling against Manning? Yes; and I think he has now, judging from the last time I saw him.
1726. When did you see him last? I do not think I have seen him for five or six months.
1727. Where? In King-street.
1728. Did you start talking about this Committee again? Yes.
1729. Did you ask him what evidence he was going to give? No.
1730. Did you apply for a conditional license? Yes.
1731. Did you get it? No.
1732. When was this? When we all applied.
1733. Have you applied since? No.
1734. Who had the "Gladstone" at that time? My mother.
1735. Who has it now? I have.
1736. It would have been an advantage if you could have got a conditional license? It was my own land.
1737. Where is your own land? Opposite the "Fig-tree Inn."
1738. If you had a license granted there, you would have the whole sway of the place? No; I would not take it now if they offered it to me.
1739. What sort of an arrangement did the Bench make with you as to granting the license to the "Gladstone"? None whatever. I submitted my application, and it was granted immediately.
1740. *Mr. Manning.*] You mean the transfer? Yes.
1741. *Chairman.*] Who was the original holder of the license—who got the license first? Nuttman.
1742. How long ago was that? A little over three years.
1743. Have you heard that Solomon wrote a letter, at the request of Mr. Manning, recommending Bennett's corner? I do not think I have heard that before.
1744. Did Solomon ever tell you that Mr. Manning had written a letter, getting his son to copy it, and Solomon to sign it, recommending Bennett's corner? I may have heard it, but I am not positive.
1745. You say that in July last Solomon was so hostile that on two occasions he called Mr. Manning a bloody dog? Yes.
1746. *Mr. Manning.*] On how many occasions did you see Solomon in Sydney? I saw him once at the "George," and twice in King-street.
1747. Did he on each of those occasions display bitter feeling against me? He did.
1748. Did he express his intention of doing all he could against me? Yes—on one occasion particularly.
1749. Did you ever hear in your bar any reference made to catching me on licensing matters? Yes.
1750. By whom? I could not state by whom. This was some twelve months ago; I did not then know the names of the parties, nor do I now, but had I anticipated this inquiry would have been possessed of this information.
1751. Did I at any time ask you to see Solomon on my account, or have anything whatever to do with him? You did not.

Harrie Stuart Banks called in, sworn, and examined:—

- H. S. Banks.** 1752. *Chairman.*] What are you? Senior police constable stationed at Ryde.
- 7 Aug., 1890. 1753. How long have you been there? Eighteen months.
1754. Are you a Licensing Inspector? Yes, and have been since the 26th April, 1889.
1755. *Mr. Manning.*] Do you know Thomas Cuneo? Yes.
1756. You live opposite to my gate? Yes.
1757. Did you ever enter my premises and join Cuneo and myself in conversation? No. I have seen him come out of the premises, but I do not think I was ever present at a conversation between him and yourself. I saw him once come out of your gate, and I had a conversation almost immediately afterwards, and he went away towards the Court. I have seen him leave the premises prior to that time.
1758. Did you at any time enter my premises whilst Cuneo was there and join in any conversation with me? No, I think not; I have no recollection of it.
1759. Did you ever join in any conversation with Cuneo about the two hotels at Ryde? No; I never spoke to Cuneo in your presence about any of the hotels in Ryde.
1760. *Chairman.*] You say you have seen Cuneo and Manning together, and Cuneo coming from Manning's place? Yes.
1761. Do you remember an occasion on which Cuneo and Manning were speaking together, and you went up, and Cuneo turned to go away, when Manning said, "We were just talking about these two hotels"? No, but I recollect the occasion. I was on the opposite side of the street waiting to see Mr. Manning, and when Cuneo was going I walked across, and Cuneo went towards the Court. I afterwards saw him at the Court.
1762. Do you recollect what remark Manning made on that occasion? No. I believe I went over to see him about an order for some property in connection with an inquest which had been held by him.
1763. Do you remember what Cuneo went to the Court for—was it a licensing day? It was not a licensing day. I think he went there to lodge plans, or to obtain some information.



J. E. Manning further examined :—

1764. *Chairman.*] You have heard Merry swear that Solomon was antagonistic to you? Yes.
1765. Is that correct? How can I possibly tell.
1766. You know nothing beyond what you have heard Merry say to bear it out? No; I have not seen Solomon except in this room.
1767. He was on good terms with you in July, 1889; he came to your house, and you gave him a recommendation? Yes, I did. I thought he was rather an ill-used individual. I thought he had been rather hardly used by O'Maley.
1768. Is that why you gave him a certificate of good character? No.
1769. You knew him to be a man of good character? I knew nothing to the contrary.
1770. On that occasion you got him to sign this document, which has been put in evidence? Yes.
1771. Recommending Mrs. Bennett's corner as the best site? That was his recommendation. I did not ask him to recommend it.
1772. Are you not aware that you wrote it out yourself, and got your son to sign it? Yes, but if you look back to the evidence you will see that we discussed the matter, and that that was the result of what he stated to me.
1773. *Mr. Paul.*] I think you have sworn that you dictated the letter? We talked the matter over, and I sketched the letter from what we said.
1774. *Chairman.*] You did not put upon the letter the name of anyone to whom it was addressed? No.
1775. Who wrote the figures "16th July, 1889?" I did. I noticed afterwards that it was not dated, and I put them on.
1776. You have nothing further to say as to your reason for getting this letter written? No.
1777. At this time, had you seen Cuneo and had some conversation with him about Bennett's corner? He came and spoke to me about it—I think it was after the letter was written.
1778. You have heard Constable Banks say that he has seen Cuneo coming from your place more than once, and that on this day to which Cuneo referred he saw him leave you and walk in the direction of the Court-house;—is that correct? I cannot tell what day he refers to.
1779. Do you remember the day which the constable refers to—when he walked over to see you about some matter immediately after Cuneo left? No.
1780. You cannot tell us what you were talking to Cuneo about on that day? No.
1781. Did you ever say that this property would not be licensed whilst O'Maley held it? No.
1782. Have you had any conversation with Merry as to the evidence he would give? I showed him what Solomon said the other day, and asked him what occurred.
1783. Did you show him the whole of Solomon's evidence? No. I think I read out two or three lines relating to Merry.
1784. Do you wish to offer any other explanation as to the letter you gave to Cuneo? No; it was given at his earnest solicitation.
1785. And you have nothing further to say as to the meaning of the words "he gets the other matter"? "She" gets the other matter.
1786. What other matter would that be? That has something to do with the letters of administration.
1787. You say, "If he agrees to this, as he will, he will have to deposit £1,000 with you in trust until Mrs. Bennett can convey, and he gets the other matter"—you meant, "She gets the other matter":—what is the other matter? Letters of administration.
1788. Why was this £1,000 to be deposited in trust? That was Cuneo's idea. He was suspicious of the position.
1789. And being suspicious he wanted to deposit £1,000 in trust;—would he not prefer to keep it in his pocket? I suppose he wanted to conclude the transaction.
1790. Did Mrs. Bennett tell you that £1,000 was to be paid down? No.
1791. Who told you that the price was to be £2,000? Cuneo.
1792. You had no talk with M'Culloch about it? No; I simply told him who the woman was—that she had never done anything about her husband's estate, and that I recommended her to go to him.
1793. Why should he keep the matter quiet? Because M'Culloch had some doubts about getting probate of the will, the matter having gone on so long.
1794. Did M'Culloch tell you he had any doubt? He told me something about it.
1795. Where was the necessity for keeping it quiet? His idea was that it would be foolish to do anything with the property until he had got the whole of her matters put through.
1796. You have heard O'Maley and Solomon swear that you told Solomon that if he allowed O'Maley to touch a shingle of the roof you would cancel the license;—do both of these people swear what is false? O'Maley does not swear it.
1797. O'Maley swears it, and so does Solomon? Then they both swear falsely. Solomon came to me, as I stated in my letter to the Minister, and complained that O'Maley wanted to do something to the house during his short balance of tenure, and I told him no alteration could be made without the permission of the Licensing Bench.
1798. Not even to do up the place? I think he said he wanted to take the roof off.
1799. And you were so anxious to protect Solomon that you refused a renewal? But the renewal was gone ages before that.
1800. What do you mean by ages? Six weeks or two months.
1801. In your report to the Minister you say, "The report of the premises was so unfavourable, and Solomon himself so complained of them, that the renewal was refused unanimously." That means that Solomon applied for his own renewal, and yet gave the Bench grounds for refusing it;—do you adhere to that? I know Solomon did complain of the premises. I did not say he did so on the application for his own renewal.
1802. What I have read is your report to the Minister—is it correct? Yes. I do not say that Solomon complained in connection with that particular application, but he had frequently complained.
1803. *Mr. Wall.*] Is there any other matter upon which you desire to give evidence? Some questions were asked about the "Gladstone Hotel." If the Committee wish to know anything about it, I can state the circumstances as to how it came to be licensed. I may say that I never knew anything about Cornwell Brothers in my life, and therefore the statement which has been made about the telegram is imaginary. I swear that I know nothing at all of Cornwell Brothers in any shape or form, nor did I ever see Mr. Cornwell excepting in this room.
1804. *Chairman.*] You never spoke to Cornwell before you saw him in this room? No; I never saw him before. I adhere to all my statements to the Minister of Justice; I see no reason for altering them.

Adjourned till Tuesday next, at *half-past Eleven* o'clock.

(NOTE.—In consequence of the prorogation of Parliament intervening no further meeting of the Committee was held.)

18 Dec., 1889.
20. This was whilst the license which Solomon held was still in existence? Yes; he was in the house at the time.
21. His license would expire at the end of June? Yes, on the 30th.
22. So that this conversation with Mr. Manning, as Chairman of the Licensing Bench, was whilst the house was still licensed? Yes.
23. What further conversation had you? We did not have any more conversation, but I was under contract with O'Maley, and I had to apply for a license.
24. You had no further conversation with Mr. Manning until after the refusal of your application on the 12th June? No, not until the 17th July.
25. After your refusal on the 17th July, did you see him again? Yes.
26. What conversation took place between you then? I went to him to see if I could get him to grant a license for the "Fig-tree Inn."
27. What we want is not your construction of the conversation, but the conversation itself? I asked if he would grant a license to the "Fig-tree Inn," and he said, "No." He said, "I will tell you what you ought to do; you ought to buy Mrs. Bennett's corner."
28. Where is Mrs. Bennett's corner? About 100 yards further up the Gladesville Road.
29. What further conversation took place? He said it is no use you going to Mrs. Bennett. She has given it over into some other persons' hands, and they have three months to decide whether they will take the premises or not. He then told me the solicitor I had to go to. He said that Mrs. Bennett, the foolish woman, had not proved the will of her late husband, although the husband had been dead for some time, and he said, "You go to Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch, solicitors, in Pitt-street, who will give you particulars as to price." I then left him. Mrs. Bennett's place is close to where I live, and when I went over I had some conversation with her on the subject. I afterwards came down to Sydney and saw the solicitors to whom Mr. Manning had directed me.
30. What was the next step after that? I went home, and Mrs. Bennett came down to my house and asked me how I had got on.
31. And you had some further conversation that night with Mrs. Bennett? Yes.
32. And when did you next see Mr. Manning? In about another week I went to see Mr. Manning.
33. Was any one with you? No. He said, "How did you get on?" and I said, "The price is too big for me."
34. Did you name the price? Yes. They wanted £1,000 for twenty-five years' lease, and 30s. a week rent, the tenant to make his own improvements, or they would sell the place out for £2,000.
35. What did Mr. Manning say to that? We had a good deal of conversation. He said, "You go to Mr. M'Culloch again, and I will give you a note to take to him." He went inside to write it, and he said, "I will show you the plan Solomon had for Bennett's property." Solomon had applied for a license for Bennett's property, but the license was refused. Mr. Manning took me inside, and brought out the plan, which he showed to me, showing me where they wanted a little alteration. Then he gave me the note.
36. You had some talk over the plan? Yes, and after a while he said, "Of course you have to produce a very large plan to show to the Bench; strike a line through it, and only build a portion of it." When I was leaving him he said, "Well, if you come to terms with Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch I will call a special meeting of the Licensing Board next month, and grant you a license: leave that to me."
37. That was for Bennett's property? Yes.
38. What happened then? I did not go to Messrs. M'Culloch & Co.
39. Did Mr. Manning give you anything? Yes, he gave me a note.
40. Did you see the note? Not at that time. It was in an envelope addressed to Percy M'Culloch.
41. What did you do? I took the note, and I thought from the conversation that he had an interest in the property, and that I had a right to see what was in the note.
42. Then what did you do? I opened it.
43. Is this what you found inside? Yes. The note is as follows:—

Dear Percy,

22nd August, 1889.

I have told Cunco that I thought you could arrange for him to have the Bennett property for £2,000, on paying £1,000 cash, the balance on interest. If he agrees to this, as he will, he will have to deposit with you in trust till Mrs. B. can convey and he gets the other matter. He had better be told also to keep the matter quiet until he gets his conveyance, &c.

44. On that, what did you do? I did not go near Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch.
45. Did you see Mr. Manning again? Yes, in about a week's time.
46. Under what circumstances did you see him? As soon as I met him he said, "How is it you did not go to Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch?" and I said, "It was of no use, that I could not raise the money, and that it would cost £4,000 before the place would be open—£2,000 for the property, and £2,000 to build and furnish a house."
47. What did he say? He said, "Where is the letter?" and I replied, "At home." Mr. Manning then said, "Well, don't forget to send it to me," and I said, "All right." He then said, "I know a man who would build a house at that corner if he could get a good tenant—what would you be agreeable to pay him per week for it?" I said, "£4 a week." "Oh," he said, "You were giving O'Maley £4 a week and a bonus." I then said, "Well, I will give £5." Mr. Manning then said, "That's better." I then left him. He said that if I did not look sharp I should lose my chance, as a man was coming from the country who would buy Bennett's property. He did not know who the man was, he had forgotten his name, but he knew that he used to be a member of the Union Club. I saw him again a week or a fortnight after, and I had a small plan drawn representing a sixteen-roomed house. He said, "What have you got there?" and I said, "I have a plan which I should like to show you." He said, "Is it a plan for O'Maley's property?" and I said, "Yes." He then said, "It is of no use, I will have nothing to do with that place at all; you are only wasting your own time and my time too." I said, "I should like you to see it." "Oh, yes," he replied, "I suppose there is no harm in seeing it." When I showed the plan to him he did not say anything about it. He then said, "It is of no use trying for O'Maley's place, because whilst O'Maley, or anybody belonging to him, owns it it will never be a licensed house—not if he made the establishment as big as a castle." I said, "Suppose I bought O'Maley's property, would you give me a license?" and he said, "No." He asked how much O'Maley wanted for it, and I said, "About £2,000." He then said, "Do you often see O'Maley?" and I told him that I lived next door to O'Maley.
- He

- He said, "Would you mind sending him up to me. I know a man who will buy his place." I said, "Yes, I will send him up," and he said, "If he does buy you will have the first chance of getting a license for it. Of course," he said, "on the same terms that any one else would give." Then he asked me if O'Maley was going to apply again. I said, "Yes"; and he asked who was going to apply for O'Maley. I said, "I do not know." He said, "Don't you apply, or you will spoil your chance, because if you have three refusals you will not be eligible to apply for three years." We then had some conversation about two hotels in Ryde. At that moment a policeman came in, and I left him. I think that was on the 12th September. On the following day I drove Mr. O'Maley up to his gate. I did not speak to Mr. Manning on that day, but I saw him again on the 16th, when there was very little said. He said, however, that he would not be agreeable to give Mr. O'Maley a license.
48. Was that the whole conversation? There were a lot of other things said about the bridge. He said that Bennett's was the best corner; I said that O'Maley's was the best. I said that the bridge was intended to come across Tarban Creek in a line with the "Fig-tree Hotel."
49. Was that all the conversation that you had on that occasion? Yes.
50. There was something said in the reply of Mr. Manning in regard to £200? Yes; I can explain that. The day that I was showing Mr. Manning the plans, as I was opening them, I said, "If Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch can get me a license on these plans I will give them £200."
51. Mr. Manning in his report says this, "I told him that it was quite out of the question for the reasons previously stated, when he turned round and said, 'I will give £200 to any one who will get me a license for O'Maley's place.' I said 'The best thing you can do is to clear off at once, and he went';—is it true that he said, "The best thing you can do is to clear off the place at once"? He never said a word of it."
52. To whom was the offer of £200? To Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch.
53. Personally? I made it through the licensing magistrate.
54. *Chairman.*] Are Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch relations of his? I believe so; I think one of them is a son-in-law.
55. You say that you did not offer a bribe of £200, as stated by Mr. Manning in his report? It is not true.
56. *Mr. Plumb.*] You said that you would give Mr. M'Culloch or anybody else £200 who would get you a license? Not anybody else. I can tell why it would have paid us to give £200 to get a license. The first plan, if carried out, would cost £1,800, but the improvements according to the second plan would only have cost about £700, so that if we could have got a license on the smaller plan it would have paid us to give any solicitor £200.
57. *Chairman.*] In connection with that, did you part from him in a friendly way on that day? Yes, the same as any other day; that was the day on which the policeman came in.
58. Did he make any remark to the policeman in reference to the matter? No.
59. *Mr. Plumb.*] Was anyone present at your conversation? No; not at any time.
60. *Chairman.*] On the following day you brought O'Maley up? Yes.
61. Where were you at the time you have spoken of? At the house gate. I saw him on the Monday again, and had a further conversation, which I have given.
62. When did you see him again after the last time you have mentioned? I have not seen him at all to speak to. When I was leaving him he said, "Don't forget to post the letter to me."
63. You then, with O'Maley, I believe, gave what you know to be the particulars of the case to O'Maley's solicitor? Yes.
64. And, I believe, that a letter of complaint was sent in to the Minister? Yes.
65. Dated the 5th October, 1889? Yes.
66. Whilst that matter was under consideration, did your application come on in the Licensing Court? Yes, on the 9th October.
67. Did Mr. Manning take his seat on the Bench? Yes.
68. And what was done? The case was postponed as there was no Bench.
69. When did it come on again? I am not sure whether it was a fortnight or three weeks after; it came on at a subsequent date.
70. And who were on the Bench? Mr. Manning was there, Mr. Jeanneret, and Mr. D'Ardier.
71. Was the matter gone into then? No.
72. Was objection taken to Mr. Manning's sitting? Yes.
73. Was there a further adjournment? Yes.
74. When the case came on again, who was on the Bench? Mr. Manning again.
75. Who else? Mr. Jeanneret and D'Ardier.
76. What took place? They raised an objection, and the case was again adjourned. On the third occasion Mr. Manning did not sit.
77. Did he take his seat? He did, but he said that there had been a complaint made to the Minister of Justice, and that it had been left to his discretion whether he should sit or not.
78. *Mr. Plumb.*] So he withdrew? Yes.
79. You said that you could make certain terms with Mr. Solomon on condition that you could get the renewal of the license? We came to terms with Mr. Solomon for the remainder of his lease, but before I paid him I wanted to make sure that I could get a renewal of the lease.
80. *Chairman.*] He was tenant for Mr. O'Maley, whose license expired on the 30th June? Yes.
81. *Mr. Plumb.*] I gather from your remarks that Mr. Manning did not positively say that he would give you a license? He said, "If you come to terms with Messrs. M'Culloch and M'Culloch, I will call the Bench together to give you a license."
82. Were you on friendly terms with Mr. Manning? Oh, yes.
83. You have no personal interest in O'Maley's house? No.
84. *Mr. Willis.*] Do you live at Ryde? No, at Hunter's Hill, 4 miles from Ryde.
85. *Chairman.*] Do you know anybody who received a telegram from Mr. Manning? Yes.
86. Will you give me the name of the gentleman? Mr. Cornwell, of the firm of Cornwell Brothers, brewers.

## Protest.

I respectfully object to the constitution of the Select Committee appointed to inquire into my conduct as the Chairman of the Ryde Licensing Bench, in connection with certain charges brought against me by Patrick O'Maley. My objection is against Mr. Crick (against whom I have no personal feeling) being on the said Committee, on the grounds that he has been the paid advocate of O'Maley on several occasions when applications have been made to me as such Licensing Magistrate in reference to the very matters now before the special Committee.

Further, Mr. Crick has quite recently—and since my case was gone into by the original Committee—again appeared before me as O'Maley's paid advocate, when O'Maley's application for a license was refused unanimously by the Ryde Licensing Bench.

Though in no way fearing inquiry into my conduct, I protest against such treatment, as being tried virtually by my accuser, who is not only appointed a member but the Chairman of the Select Committee, and who is professionally interested in establishing against me the charges referred to. Mr. Crick, in his letter to the Minister of Justice, No. 9 on the printed papers before the Committee, and dated 31 October, 1889, requests that I should not be allowed to sit in a case, "in the highest interests of justice, in keeping its administration above the breath of suspicion, &c." In the interest of the justice that he so refers to, I urge that he, Mr. Crick, should not act in any way on the special Committee.

Senior-Sergeant Musgrove reports, for the information of the Superintendent, with reference to the attached letter from Mr. Paul, M.L.A., concerning the working of the Licensing Act in Bathurst, that, notwithstanding Mr. Paul's statement and Mr. Bateup's declaration, he must again most emphatically deny that he ever received, either from the late Superintendent, or the present Superintendent, verbally or otherwise, the directions *re* 11 o'clock closing of public-houses and Sunday selling referred to in the said statement; nor did he at any time make the statements that have been attributed to him. The facts are that Messrs. Paul and Bateup and the senior-sergeant were on friendly terms and often met in Mr. Paul's shop; the conversation occasionally turned to the provisions of the Licensing Act, and the alleged neglect of the police in enforcing it. It is very probable that the senior-sergeant (on its being remarked that the public-houses were not visited often enough) said, that a circular had been issued, stating that the police were not to harass the publicans, nor to enter licensed premises without they were satisfied that a breach of the law was being committed. The senior-sergeant begs to add that these conversations were intended to be of a purely private nature, and is not surprised that after a lapse of four or five years they have been so misconstrued.—R. (SPIRITS, WINE, AND BEER—CONVICTIONS UNDER THE LICENSING ACT.)

*Ordered by the Legislative Assembly to be printed, 10 July, 1890.*

FURTHER RETURN (*in part*) to an Order of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, dated 15th February, 1884, That there be laid upon the Table of this House, for the years 1881, 1882, and 1883, respectively,—

- “(1.) The quantity, in gallons, of spirits, wines, and beers, respectively,  
“imported into this Colony.  
“(2.) The quantity, in gallons, of spirits, wines, and beers, respectively,  
“manufactured in this Colony.  
“(3.) The quantity, in gallons, of spirits, wines, and beers, respectively,  
“imported and manufactured, per head of the population of the Colony.  
“(4.) Also, Returns from each Police District of the Colony, including the  
“Metropolitan District, under the following heads:—  
“*(a)* The number of licensed houses in each district.  
“*(b)* The number of Colonial wine, wholesale wine and spirit, and  
“brewers’ licenses, respectively, in each district; also, the number of  
“licenses to distil spirits.  
“*(c)* The number of convictions for drunkenness.

Letter-carriers and Mail-boys, each allowed one scarlet cloth tunic, one scarlet serge sac, two pairs blue cloth and one pair blue serge trousers, one helmet or one cap. Mail Guards each allowed one scarlet cloth tunic, one scarlet serge sac, two pairs blue cloth and one pair serge trousers. Shipping Clerk, Shipping Clerk's Assistant, Overseer of Letter-carriers, and Gate-keeper, each allowed one blue cloth and one blue serge sac, two pairs blue cloth and one pair serge trousers. Mounted Letter-carriers are allowed three pairs of strapped Bedford cord trousers and one cap each in lieu of helmet, and cloth and serge trousers. Overtime allowances are granted to the officials of the Mail Branch of the Head Office, in consideration of giving their attendance whenever called upon, either during day or night, to sort English or Foreign Mails received and despatched.

Postmasters are allowed quarters, fuel and light, and in some instances small sums for keeping their offices clean.

The Post and Telegraph Masters at Botany, Camperdown, Hunter's Hill, Lambton, Leichhardt, Randwick, Waratah, and Waverley, are allowed £10 per annum each for keeping their offices open daily until 8 p.m.

Mounted Letter-carriers are allowed forage.

In accordance with the provisions contained in the 54th section of the Constitution Act, the Governor recommends for the consideration of the Legislative Assembly the expediency of making provision to meet the requisite expenses in connection with a Bill to make provision for taking the Census of New South Wales in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and for obtaining certain Industrial, Commercial, and other Statistics, and certain particulars relating to the Live Stock, Crops, and Occupation of Land, in and for the said Colony, and for other purposes in connection with the aforesaid objects.
