(COPIES OF TELEGRAMS THAT PASSED BETWEEN THE PREMIER OF NEW SOUTH WALES AND THE PREMIERS OF OTHER COLONIES IN REGARD TO A CONFERENCE AFTER THE FEDERAL REFERENDUM HAD BEEN DECLARED.)

Printed under No. 1 Report from Printing Committee, 6 September, 1898.

From The Premier of New South Wales to Premiers of Victoria, South Australia, and Tasmania (copy also sent to Premiers of Western Australia and Queensland), dated 4th June, 1898.

"CONFIDENTIAL.—I could not cordially support the Bill framed by the Convention, and tell you frankly that its prospects will not improve; but I should be sorry to see all our labours brought to a standstill. I am going to submit to Cabinet on Tuesday a proposal that the Premiers of Victoria, South Australia, and Tasmania and myself (Sir John Forrest being, I fear, too far away to join, though afterwards to be consulted) meet to see if it is possible to arrive at any alteration of the terms of the Bill that would make it more acceptable to the people of New South Wales. It would also be advisable, I think, to invite the Premier of Queensland to join in this meeting. I should like to be able to take the Bill, in a more acceptable shape, to the country as a vital part of my Ministerial policy. It may be said how can the Bill be altered? The simplest way would be by inserting in the Addresses of Parliament in each Colony transmitting the Bill the changes agreed upon. Another way would be by Act of Parliament, specifying the changes agreed upon and putting the Convention Bill in schedule. The place of meeting would be immaterial to me."

From The Premier of Victoria to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 5th June, 1898.

"WHILE I am anxious to do anything which will enable federation to take place on reasonable terms, I much doubt if your suggestion will find favour in Victoria, but if you will submit the proposed amendments I will carefully consider them and confidentially consult my colleagues and leading federationists. Confidential."

From The Premier of Western Australia to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 6th June, 1898.

"VERY confidential.—I thank you for your telegram, but do not agree with your proposed procedure. There is a strong feeling here amongst producers and manufacturers against the Bill as it is, and any modification of it in favour of any other Colony would be disastrous here, and even as the Bill is it is questionable whether Parliament will approve of it. By our Enabling Act New South Wales has to be one of the federating Colonies, and as legally she cannot now join, it is a question whether we should now go on with the Bill and court defeat, as, with the knowledge that New South Wales has not passed the Bill, there would be no enthusiasm about it, and people would not take the trouble to vote."

From The Premier of South Australia to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 7th June, 1898.

"CONFIDENTIAL.—As a large majority of all Australia represented at the Convention, and large majorities of all the States so represented have decided to accept the Commonwealth Bill, we are not disposed to favour proposals for the alteration of their decision. We think that any attempt at alteration of the direct popular decision, whether made by Governments or Parliaments, might very properly be resented by the people. Further, no Conference for considering the work of the Convention could recommend itself to us in the absence of any colony represented at the Convention, or if any colony were admitted which had not been so represented, and which had not given any Parliamentary assurance of some desire for federation."

From The Premier of Tasmania to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 7th June, 1898.

I CONCUR in view expressed by Kingston, except that I think no Conference whatever should consider the work of Convention.

From The Premier of Queensland to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 7th June, 1898.

I RECEIVED your telegram, but shall not be able to give it the attention it deserves until I reach Brisbane on Saturday next. In the meantime I should be glad to receive a more definite statement of what you propose.

From The Premier of New South Wales to The Premiers of Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania, dated 7th June, 1898.

AT a meeting of the Cabinet held this morning the position of the federal movement was considered, and I have to inform you that the views expressed in my confidential telegram of Saturday met with the approval of the members of the Government present. Whilst we see no prospect of the acceptance in New South Wales at any subsequent stage of the Convention Bill, the events and results of the recent campaign show that our people as a whole are sincere well-wishers to the cause of Australian Union, and that, with alterations, the Bill would be accepted by a large majority of the electors. Under these circumstances my colleagues cordially concur in my request to you that the Premiers of the Colonies represented on the Convention should meet as soon as possible to confer and exchange views as to an improvement in those provisions of the Bill which affected most seriously its success on Friday last in this Colony. If the Conference be agreed upon we will undertake to prepare and send to you, before its meeting, particulars of the subjects we desire to invite you to reconsider, and our views respecting them. We strongly suggest that the Premier of Queensland should be invited to the Conference proposed.

From The Premier of Tasmania to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 8th June, 1898.

CONFIDENTIAL.—Can only reiterate previous reply.

From The Premier of South Australia to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 8th June, 1898.

WE have yours of yesterday evening *re* Federation, and in reply, after Cabinet consultation, we confirm our confidential wire of yesterday morning. We note that you were unable to cordially support the Bill for which you voted, and no doubt the withholding of your powerful influence considerably reduced the majority by which it was carried. Hitherto we have most loyally co-operated with you—this too despite discouraging alterations of the Hobart agreement and of the Federal Enabling Act, to which alterations we were no parties—but we must now definitely decline to participate in any attempt to reject a Constitution which has been accepted by the direct votes of majorities of the people of all the federating States and to substitute another more favourable to one State, and in respect of which it is not even suggested that the people should be afforded an opportunity of voting. Had our loyalty to the cause of Federation been less than it is, we might have reduced the majority in favour of the Bill in South Australia, but this, in our opinion, would not have justified us at the instance of a South Australian minority in seeking to set aside the popular verdict of all Australia with a view of securing better terms for our colony.

From The Premier of Victoria to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 9th June, 1898.

THE Government consider that, with a view to affording every possible opportunity for the consideration of the federal issue, your proposal for a meeting of Premiers should be accepted. If you will again communicate with the other Premiers, I will join you in urging them to agree to the proposed meeting,—the question as to whether any amendments can be made in the Bill, or, if made, how they could be submitted to the people presents some difficulties. Certainly they would require to be submitted first in New South Wales, and afterwards, if accepted there, submitted to the people of the other colonies.

From The Premier of New South Wales to The Premier of Victoria, dated 10th June, 1898.

From The Premier of Victoria to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 11th June, 1898.

IN view of your last telegram, and the doubts which exist in the various Colonies as to whether a meeting of Premiers should take place to discuss federation matters, would it not be well for you to at once intimate what amendments you desire, so that every one may know exactly what it is proposed to deal with? If this be done it may have the effect of inducing the other Premiers to meet. I strongly advise you, in the interests of the movement, to carry out this suggestion.

From The Premier of Tasmania to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 11th June, 1898.

HOLDING that Premiers have neither right nor power to amend the Constitution passed by people on referendum in any way, I necessarily resent more strongly proposal to alter the Bill in matters of substance.

From The Premier of Western Australia to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 11th June, 1898.

CONFIDENTIAL.—Having given due consideration to your suggestion that the Premiers should meet, with a view of discussing amendments to the Federation Bill, so as to make substantial concessions in favour of New South Wales, I regret to inform you that I am not in favour of the course you propose, and would not, therefore, be able to attend the proposed meeting.

From The Premier of Queensland to The Premier of New South Wales, dated 11th June, 1898.

I AM willing to attend the Conference you propose. I should like the date to be fixed to suit my engagements. I have been absent from Brisbane for six weeks, and our Parliament meets on the 26th July. I should suggest the end of this month. I have sent copy of this telegram to other Premiers.

From The Premier of New South Wales to The Premier of Queensland, dated 13th June, 1898.

RECEIVED your message with much pleasure. Desire especially to move in federal matters in unison with Queensland, believing interests of our two great Colonies to be inseparably connected.

IN view of certain statements made in Melbourne by Sir George Turner, I have informed him that it would be a sheer waste of time to meet if the necessity of making alterations in substance in the Bill is not admitted by him and by the other Premiers who attended the Convention.

To the Premier of Tasmania, dated 11th June, 1898.

I ACCEPT your strongly-worded message, just received, as a final refusal to join in the proposed Conference of Premiers, and will make no further communication to you on the subject.

PUBLIC SERVICE ACT.

(MEMORANDUM RESPECTING THE INCREMENT REGULATIONS UNDER.)

*Printed under No. 11 Report from Printing Committee, 10 November, 1898.***Memorandum respecting the Increment Regulations.**

THE following is a resumé of the Regulations regarding increments to salaries of officers published in the *Government Gazette* of the 8th July last:—

The most important, perhaps, are those which relate to the officers of the Clerical Division in receipt of salaries under £300 per annum. These officers are divided into four grades, viz., A, B, C, and D.

Grade A includes officers in receipt of salary and allowances other than equipment, forage, and district allowances ranging from £251 to £299 a year inclusive; grade B, officers in receipt of salaries and allowances as from £200 to £250 a year inclusive; grade C, officers receiving from £151 to £200 per annum; and grade D, those whose salaries and allowances do not exceed £150 per annum.

These grades are further subdivided into sections, and it is provided that the officers whose salaries come within those sections on 1st July of this year shall, provided their salary has not been increased during the preceding twelve months, receive an increment from the 1st July and each succeeding year thereafter until they reach the maximum of their grade. The amount of this increment is in the case of grade D (salaries under £150) a sum not exceeding £15 per annum; in the other grades it is £10 per annum. The effect during the first year of this subdivision into sections will be as follows:—As the salaries at present vary somewhat, the amount of increment granted to each officer will be that which will bring him up to the maximum of his section, and, therefore, the increment will not in every case be the same. Next year, and in succeeding years, as the salaries are regulated into the sections, each officer will be entitled to the full increment until the maximum of his grade is reached. To take, for instance, the officers in section 6 of grade D, which includes those receiving salaries of £65 per annum and less than £80, the regulations provide that they shall be entitled to receive £80 a year. Thus, an officer in receipt of the minimum salary of £65 will receive the full increment of £15; but if he is in receipt of £70 per annum he will be only entitled to £10 to bring him up to the maximum of his section, £80, but next year he will be entitled to £15, making his salary £95, and so on, until he reaches the maximum of the grade, viz., £150.

There is, however, provision in the regulations that if an officer receives through the working of this scale during the first year half, or less than half, the increment of his section, he may, if an officer of meritorious service, be allowed a further increment, but by the operation of this proviso he must not pass out of his grade.

Officers in grade C are allowed in like manner increments of £10 until their salaries reach the maximum of £200; those in grade B, £10 per annum until they reach the maximum of £250; and those in grade A, £10 per annum up to the maximum of £299.

The granting of all increments is, however, subject to a certificate being given by the permanent head of the Department regarding the attention and aptitude for work displayed by the officers concerned, and to the necessary provision being made by Parliament.

With regard to the officers who on the 1st July are in receipt of the maximum salary of their grade, or who afterwards reach such maximum salary, the regulations provide that they shall remain at such salary until they pass the test prescribed by the Board for promotion to the next higher grade. When an officer passes such test he is considered eligible for promotion, but such promotion, it is provided, shall only be made from one grade to another when a vacancy occurs in the next higher grade. As it is possible that this might, under certain circumstances, result for a time in stagnation of promotion, the regulations provide that if the exigencies of the Service so demand the Board may at any time declare that the number of officers in any grade requires to be increased; whereupon the number of officers in the grade specified shall be increased accordingly, and promotion from the lower grade shall be made to the officers entitled thereto. When the number of officers who have passed the test for promotion

exceeds the number of vacancies, then the selection of the officer for promotion is decided by seniority, such seniority to be determined by time the officer has been in receipt of the maximum salary of his grade. It is, however, provided that when the Board declare vacancies to exist in any particular grade beyond those occurring in the ordinary way by deaths or retirements, any officer may be appointed who is not the senior if he possesses qualifications superior to those ranking above him by length of service, and when the circumstances, in the opinion of the Board, warrant such action being taken.

In order to meet exceptional cases, it is provided that an increase of salary may be granted beyond that which an officer would receive under the increment scale of his grade, if at the time of the passing of the regulations he has been in receipt of a uniform salary for a lengthened period, and where the officer is of more than ordinary merit.

Should any officer on being tested for promotion display marked attainments or capacity for special work, the regulations provide that he may be awarded a salary commensurate with his worth, quite irrespective of that which he would receive under the regulations; but all cases so specially dealt with must be reported to the Governor and referred to in the Board's annual report.

A supplementary regulation published on the 7th October provides that junior officers appointed to the Service, after passing a competitive examination held under the Public Service Act, shall be entitled, on reaching the age of 21 years, to a salary of £100 per annum, provided he has served for a period of twelve months, and shows by passing a test that he is capable of doing work to which a salary of £100 per annum is appropriate.

Postal and Electric Telegraph Service.

Special regulations apply to post and telegraph masters, postal assistants, and telegraph operators. These officials are divided into four grades, the first grade, including those in receipt of salaries and allowances other than forage, district, and equipment allowances, ranging from £226 to £280, or in the case of post and telegraph masters, £299; the second grade includes those in receipt of salaries and allowances ranging from £176 to £225; the third grade, officers in receipt of salaries and allowances, &c., ranging from £126 to £175; and the fourth grade, those in receipt of salaries and allowances ranging from £65 to £125. The officers in each of these grades are entitled to receive an increment of £10 per annum until they reach the maximum salary of their grade. When they reach such maximum salary they shall be tested as to their fitness for promotion to the next higher grade, and, if found qualified for such promotion, they shall, on a vacancy occurring, receive the salary and increments of that grade.

The regulations give particulars of the tests required to be passed by officers for admission to the various grades, and it is provided that officers who, at the passing of the regulations, are in receipt of less than £80 per annum, and who have not already passed a departmental examination equivalent to the test for admission to the fourth grade, must do so before they become entitled to any increment of salary. Those in receipt of less than £100 shall be tested before admission to the third grade, but those receiving more than £100 may be admitted to the third grade without test, provided the permanent head certifies that they are fit for work which should be paid at a higher rate than £120 per annum, but no officer not receiving more than £200 a year should be allowed to obtain more than that sum until he has proved that he can pass the test for admission to the second grade.

Messengers.

The regulations which apply to messengers provide that they shall be divided into two grades, the junior grade to include those receiving salaries up to £52 per annum; and the senior grade, those receiving salaries above that amount. Boy messengers, on being appointed, receive £26 per annum; at the expiration of the first year of service, £39; and at the expiration of twelve months thereafter, £52. They are not entitled to any further increments until they are appointed to a vacancy in the second grade, when they receive a salary of £60 per annum, and a yearly increment thereafter of £7 10s., until they reach the maximum of £120. They cannot receive more than this sum unless appointed to a special position on the staff of senior messengers, whose salaries are graded at over that amount. The messengers in receipt of £60 per annum and over, at the date of the publication of the regulations, are entitled to receive an increment of £7 10s. per annum until their salary reaches the maximum before mentioned, but no messenger whose salary may have been increased during the year preceding 1st July, 1898, is entitled to receive the increment until the 1st January or the 1st July, as the case may be, following the expiration of twelve months from the date his salary was increased. It is provided that the senior grade shall, until otherwise determined, consist of 100 messengers, but this may be increased in a certain proportion as additions are made to the numbers of the grade of junior messengers. These regulations do not apply to telegraph messengers for whom special regulations are in force.

A special regulation provides that other officers or classes of officers of the General Division may be brought under the Messengers' Increment Regulations as may be from time to time determined.

(PROCEEDINGS OF A DEPUTATION REPRESENTING THE EMPLOYEES IN THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE RESPECTING LEAVE OF ABSENCE, SICK LEAVE, AND OVERTIME.)

Printed under No. 13 Report from Printing Committee, 24 November, 1898.

Deputation representing the employees in the Government Printing Office respecting leave of absence, sick leave, and overtime.

ON the 23rd December, 1897, Messrs. More, Hollingworth, Campbell, Kelly, Fox, and Sibthorpe waited on the Board, at their invitation, as a deputation from the employees of the Government Printing Office, to discuss the questions of leave of absence for recreation, sick leave, overtime, &c.

Present:—Mr. J. Barling (Chairman), Mr. G. A. Wilson, and Mr. J. Powell.

Mr. Gullick, Government Printer, also attended.

The Chairman, opening, said the Board had sent for them to talk over the disputed question of leave of absence. He hoped they would talk in the freest possible manner to the Board, who would be only too glad to hear their unbiassed opinions, whether in accordance with the views of the Board or not. The Board quite sympathised with the view put forward by Messrs. Kelly, Fox, Stafford, and Campbell, that it was all very well for their 300 fellow-officers to say they were prepared to give up their overtime, but those officers never worked overtime, whereas it was a very different thing for those who were always working overtime to give up payment for it.

The Board had been talking over the matter with Mr. Gullick, and had a proposition to make which they thought would meet the case. There was a difficulty in making a distinction between the two classes, those who worked overtime and those who did not, and this was put before them in a tentative way for the purpose of discussion. The Board found on inquiring that men in outside establishments worked forty-eight hours a week, whereas the officers of the Government Printing Office worked only forty-six. The Board thought it would be well to have a general rule to apply to all, so as to have no anomalies. Were they all of them willing, if the Board were willing, to work forty-eight hours per week? They had asked for, practically, six days more a year.

Deputation: Yes.

Chairman: If they worked this two hours per week extra it would mean their giving the Government twelve days a year, roughly speaking, so that the advantage would appear to be all on the side of the Government; but there was the sick leave to consider. What advantage the men would get from sick leave it was hard to assess, but the Board were of opinion that the sick leave would quite make up for the six days extra which they would give. Then, of course, they would all be placed on the same footing—they would all get paid for the overtime they worked without any distinction.

Mr. Sibthorpe said that, speaking roughly, about 20 per cent. of the men in his department worked overtime. They had first asked to have the privilege restored which they had previously enjoyed, but the Board had said that could not be allowed. Then they were given the option of working overtime without pay, when necessary, in order to receive the privileges which had been granted before. The men said they were not prepared to forego payment or some other equivalent for overtime. Well then, the other 80 per cent., were they to forego any privileges that might be allowed just for the sake of this 20 per cent.? Were the majority to suffer for the minority? He would admit it was very hard on those who were compelled to work overtime that they should lose payment for it for the sake of the others. That was where the difficulty was. Regarding the proposal to work two hours a week extra, he did not think the men would care about that. He did not think that suggestion would be received very favourably by the men.

Mr. More said he was, perhaps, more concerned in the working of the overtime than any man in the Government Printing Office, as he was looking after the engines. During this year he had worked 769 hours' overtime. He could scarcely see his way clear to give over £83 or £84 for the sake of getting one week's pay extra. It came very hard on the men that worked overtime perhaps all the hours that God Almighty gave them. He could never make up his mind to go anywhere, and was tied to the place. No man liked to work eternally. He never saw his family. It was undermining his health. Those fourteen years' overtime in the Government Printing Office had taken ten years off his life. He would

like to see overtime done away with altogether. It was hard for him to have to give up his overtime pay for the sake of a week's holiday and a fortnight's sick pay. The £80 he earned in the way of overtime would keep him three months idle and pay doctors' fees as well.

Mr. Sibthorpe suggested that *Mr. More* should be relieved, and the work split up among some of the other men.

Mr. Gullick said it could not be done. *Mr. More* had to see that the machinery was in order, and he must be there in advance of the general staff, or the staff as a whole might be delayed.

Mr. More said that at the time of the Federal Convention he could not stand it, and another man had to be got. It was every night, and the electric light was going until, sometimes, 1 o'clock in the morning, and this man relieved him to make his burden a little lighter for some time. He might tell them that this man did not care about the overtime, being a man getting up in years, and the foreman did not care about trusting any other man with the responsibility of looking after the engines. He would say this, that he sympathised with the men who did not work overtime, and who had to lose their two months' sick pay, for it was very hard on a man in shortened circumstances to have to keep his wife and family and pay the doctor when he was laid up in bed, and the two months' sick pay was a great privilege, and he would not stand in those men's way; but he thought the man that worked overtime had a right to be paid for it.

Mr. Gullick said he saw one way out of this difficulty. Very soon they would have fresh engine-power for the electric light, and this would necessitate the appointment of another driver, who could be utilised to prevent so much overtime.

Mr. Kelly said he would support the men who worked excessive overtime. It would be no great sacrifice to him to forego the payment for overtime, but he sympathised with the men who were indeed in the minority. Could not some special arrangement be made for the men on the *Hansard* staff and *Mr. More*? He would be prepared to forego his overtime, but would like to see some provision made for those who worked hundreds of hours' overtime.

Mr. Fox coincided with the view that special arrangements might be made to meet the few special cases.

Mr. Campbell said that on the *Hansard* staff the overtime was of a regular nature, whereas in the other departments that was not so. During the last two years he had worked, on an average, about 300 hours a year, and that would mean giving the Government twelve months' work for nothing every seven years.

Mr. Hollingworth endorsed what *Mr. Campbell* said. The overtime was about 300 hours a year, and regular. This year it had been very heavy and over that. Of course they could not forego 300 or 400 hours' overtime a year without some consideration. It was not right that because 80 per cent. of the staff were willing to forego overtime because they did not work it, the other 20 per cent. should be deprived of payment for what they worked.

Mr. Gullick said he had another proposition: Supposing that a definite amount of overtime, equivalent to the increased leave asked for, was named, to be worked by each individual hand without pay, and then, beyond that, the overtime was paid for, leaving out the question of increased hours? Say there were six days' extra leave to be secured, then forty-six hours' overtime would be worked annually without pay, and, beyond that, overtime would be paid for.

Mr. More said that he would certainly agree to that, and he thought that would meet the views of the men in the office.

Mr. Fox pointed out that forty-six hours of daywork was not equal to forty-six hours of night-work.

Mr. Sibthorpe inquired if men who now worked no overtime would be compelled to work the forty-six hours' overtime, in the event of their getting the extra week's leave, to make up for the week.

The Chairman said that if this were not so the others who did work the overtime would certainly object.

Mr. More said that matter could be arranged by the foremen, and these men could be made to do their share.

The Chairman said the fact could not be disguised that they were simply to pay for the six days' leave in overtime, but the Board were throwing the sick leave in, which, he understood, was the most important consideration of the lot. They would all of them feel that if sickness came they were to a certain extent safe. No one knew when sickness was going to strike down, but anyhow they would feel safe.

Mr. More thought it was the very thing to meet the case. He thought every man would hold up his hand and say, "Yes, we will take that." The loss of sick pay had been the greatest hardship. Every man would accept that.

Mr. Sibthorpe thought it was very doubtful.

Mr. Campbell said that unless there was a change of staffs every month or two months there were many men there who never did any overtime from year end to year end.

The Chairman said they would have to work then forty-six hours' overtime.

Mr. Gullick: And relieve the overtime staffs to that extent.

The Chairman said that they would then all be on exactly the same footing.

Mr. Wilson said an account would be kept against each officer.

Mr. Sibthorpe said they still thought, as they had asked at first, that they should be placed on the same footing as before.

The Chairman said the general public must be thought of, who had to find the money. Why they had been asked to come here to-day was in the hope that a conclusion might be come to, and the regulation be amended in time to be incorporated in the revised regulation to be issued on the 18th January. If consent could be given now they could put it in the regulations, but they do not think it fair to push *Mr. Sibthorpe*, who should have an opportunity of talking it over with those he represented.

Mr. Sibthorpe said he had taken great interest in the matter ever since the regulations came into existence. He was President of the Relief Fund, and that officer was always supposed to be the medium between the men and the Head of the Department, and he had put the question to the men—would they accept these conditions or not? Well, they had accepted them, and now he had to go back and ask them to consider the whole matter over again.

The Chairman : We have to consider the minority.

Mr. More said that at the meeting the other night it was decided by the majority that the minority's case should be taken into consideration. What the Government Printer had offered was a very fair solution of the question.

The Chairman said they must understand that it was the Board who had to decide the question, and they had gone out of their way to consult the men in the matter, and he thought the least they could do was to go back and put the matter before the men as the Board had put it before them.

Mr. Sibthorpe asked what position the men would be in if they refused to accept the offer made.

The Chairman said it would be for the Board to decide the matter.

Mr. Sibthorpe asked if the Government Printer would allow them to have a meeting in the office that evening.

After conferring with Mr. Gullick, the Chairman said he had arranged with him to allow the men to hold a meeting in the office at 5 o'clock, and the deputation would be adjourned until 10 a.m. next day.

The deputation from the Government Printing Office respecting sick leave, &c., again met the Board on Friday, 24th December, 1897, at 10 a.m.

Messrs. Fox, Kelly, Campbell, More, and Sibthorpe attended ; and also Mr. Gullick, the Government Printer.

Present :—Mr. J. Barling (Chairman), Mr. G. A. Wilson, Mr. J. Powell.

Mr. Sibthorpe said : At a largely-attended meeting of the permanent employees in the Government Printing Office, held on December 23rd, the following resolution was carried with but four dissentients :—
"That this meeting of the officers employed in the Government Printing Office accept the terms offered by the Public Service Board, in order to obtain the privileges under Rules 18 to 22 of the General Regulations dated 10th March, 1896."

The Chairman said he would be glad if Mr. Sibthorpe would now put in his own words what he understood the concession to be, so that there might be no misunderstanding afterwards.

Mr. Sibthorpe : Our interpretation is that we will receive a fortnight's leave of absence. We have got to work forty-six hours extra overtime throughout the year without payment. After we have made the forty-six hours good any overtime will be paid for at the same rate that we get now.

The Chairman : That is it.

Mr. Sibthorpe : That is thoroughly understood.

Mr. Kelly asked would the Board object to anyone forfeiting a week's salary in lieu of the working of this forty-six hours' overtime ?

Mr. Wilson said that would be perfectly fair.

The Chairman : Yes.

Mr. Kelly said that the reason he asked this was that they worked on an average three hours a night, and it would take sixteen nights to make up the six days. As most of them lived in the suburbs they would have to go to the expense of tea, which would be 1s., so that they would be put to the expense of 16s. Some of them would be willing to forfeit a week's pay instead of working the overtime.

Mr. Wilson said it could be put this way—that an officer could forfeit a week's pay or forty-six hours' overtime at his option.

The Chairman : Yes. I think we have done good by meeting you in conference, and I hope you are all satisfied. We shall agree to these terms, and we are very pleased to have met you, and hope there will always be the same good feeling. I wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Mr. Sibthorpe : I thank you very much, on behalf of the employees, for your kindness.

The deputation then retired.

(RETURN RESPECTING THE NUMBER OF HOURS OF OVERTIME WORKED AND PAID FOR, ALSO THE NUMBER OF HOURS WORKED AND NOT PAID FOR, IN THE CLERICAL AND GENERAL DIVISIONS OF THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE, FROM 1ST JULY TO 18TH OCTOBER, 1898.)

Printed under No. 13 Report from Printing Committee, 24 November, 1898.

Replies to Questions asked by Mr. Copeland, M.P., on the 27th October.

1. It is a fact that the employees in the General Division of the Government Printing Office work from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. on five days of the week, and from 8:30 a.m. to noon on Saturdays. It is also a fact that the officers of the Clerical Division, in common with those in other Departments, work from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. It is also correct that the employees of the General Division only receive overtime for work after the regular official hours; clerks, however, only receive payment for overtime after 6 o'clock p.m., and then only under special circumstances which are laid down in the Regulations on the subject.

The Regulations are as follows:—

Duty after usual hours.

14. Officers will be required to perform public duty beyond the usual hours whenever it may be necessary to bring up arrears of work. When a portion of the work of any office has fallen into arrear, the staff dealing with such work, or, at the discretion of the head of the Department, the whole staff, shall be retained after the ordinary office hours until such arrears are brought up. Every officer shall, when ordered by an officer in charge of his branch or subdivision, remain after the usual office hours to complete work which the officer in charge considers necessary to be done on the same day.

Overtime.

15. Overtime may be paid to officers entitled to claim two weeks' leave of absence, if such overtime be worked after 6 p.m. Provided that where overtime for which extra payment may be made amounts during any financial year to twelve hours, the head of the Department or sub-Department to which the officer belongs shall forthwith report the fact to the Board; and no payment for overtime beyond the said twelve hours shall be made unless the approval of the Board has been given, and unless the officer has worked from 4:30 to 6 p.m. before commencing to charge overtime. Only work which, from its character, or from special circumstances, cannot be performed during the prescribed office hours shall be regarded as overtime work, for which extra payment may be made. The right to such extra payment shall be determined by the Board, on the recommendation of the permanent head, after such work has been completed to the satisfaction of such head; but, before any such payment is sanctioned, the permanent head shall supply the Board with such information as will satisfy it that such payment is fairly due; and, in every case where overtime is worked, a full record shall be kept thereof. No permanent head shall recommend any payment for overtime to officers employed in bringing up arrears of work which properly comes within the scope of their ordinary duties.

The following return, which has been prepared by the Government Printer, shows the amount of extra work performed by the officers of the two divisions, for which they have not received pay, during the period from 1st July to 18th October, 1898. From this it will be seen that, while the average extra time worked by each officer of the Clerical Division amounts to forty-six and a half hours, the average for the employees of the General Division is only twenty-two hours, this being a portion of the forty-six hours per annum the employees of this Division are required by the Regulations to work in order that they may receive the full benefit of the two weeks' recreation leave per annum.

2. The Return above given shows that the Clerical Staff often have to work long hours overtime without receiving pay therefor; whereas the officers in the General Division are always paid for any time they work after the usual hours, exclusive, of course, of the forty-six hours per annum which, as already stated, they are required under the Regulations to work without pay in order to obtain the full fortnight's recreation leave per year. The circumstances which led to the establishment of this deduction of forty-six hours per annum will be found in the record of a deputation which waited upon the Public Service Board in December last, of which a copy is attached hereto.

3. It is a well-known fact that the hours which regulate the employment of clerks are different from those which appertain to mechanical trades, and the Board, in regulating the hours of the Government Printing Office employees, are simply following the general practice. Notwithstanding this, the General Division employees in the Government Printing Office have considerable advantages over their fellow-tradesmen in private employ, as will be seen by the answers given by Mr. Penfold, the Honorary Secretary of the Master Printers' Association of Sydney, in reply to certain questions which were put to him. The questions and answers were as follows:—

Questions put to Mr. Penfold.

1. Are you aware of any recognised annual leave being granted to such employees (compositors, machinists, bookbinders, and lithographers) as a trade usage?
2. If so, what is the extent of such leave, and are the employees paid during the period of absence?
3. What is the general custom with regard to absence through sickness?
4. Is time so lost generally paid for?

Mr. Penfold's replies.

Questions 1 and 2.—There is no annual leave granted to employees in the trades mentioned in your letter.

Questions 3 and 4.—It is not the custom to pay for time lost through sickness.

4. As in all similar cases, the Regulations, before being passed by the Executive Council, were approved by the Attorney-General.

The Petition of Thomas Buckley, of Sydney, in the Colony of New South Wales,—

HUMBLY SHOWETH:—

1. That, on the thirty-first day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, your Honorable House appointed a Select Committee to inquire into and report upon the dismissal of Thomas Buckley, of Leichhardt, from the Roads Branch of the Works Department.

2. That your Petitioner humbly prays that he may be represented by counsel or attorney, or in person, before the Select Committee appointed to inquire into and report upon the matter, with the right to call witnesses and adduce evidence, and to examine and cross-examine such witnesses as may give evidence before the Select Committee.

And your Petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Question.

2. Mr. Arthur Griffith asked the Minister of Justice,—
- (1.) Is he aware that there are some peculiar and unexplained circumstances connected with the death of the late Registrar-General, Mr. A. Parry Long?
 - (2.) Is he aware that certain material evidence given by a responsible officer in the Registrar-General's Department, at the magisterial inquiry, was, immediately after publication, discredited by a dictated paragraph which appeared in a metropolitan journal at the request of the Acting Registrar-General, and, as is alleged, after consultation with the Chairman of the Public Service Board?
 - (3.) Is he aware that the statements so given to the Press were absolutely untrue, and that the officer whose evidence was discredited thereby applied for and was refused Ministerial authority to commence a libel action against the journal in which the above notice appeared?
 - (4.) Is he aware that during the regime of the late Mr. Parry Long, a clerk in the Department named Henry John Noble was placed (with the title of Chief Clerk) in a position to practically administer the Department in opposition to the views of Mr. Long?
 - (5.) Is he aware that an important recommendation affecting the salaries of some of the highest officials in the Registrar-General's Department was refused by the Public Service Board in writing when made by the late Mr. Long, and almost immediately afterwards granted upon the personal application of Mr. Noble, and that this and other similar official snubs at the hands of the Public Service Board seriously affected the mind of the late Mr. Long?
 - (6.) Is he aware that this Mr. Noble systematically misled the late Mr. Long by suppressing reports and making false representations with regard to the working of the office; that without any authority he removed officers to unsuitable positions, in many cases placing juniors without qualifications over the heads of experienced officers; and that he so completely alienated the late Registrar-General from his senior officers that it ultimately became impossible for him to effectively work his Department?
 - (7.) Is he aware that, owing to a series of changes made by Mr. Noble, the staff of the Account Branch was rendered so inefficient that recently a sum of money was twice procured from the Treasury on one service, and that the mistake was only discovered after the two cheques had been drawn, and that after the discovery of this mistake the late Registrar-General so completely lost confidence in the Account Branch of his Department that he kept a private duplicate set of accounts for his own protection?
 - (8.) Is he aware that a certain officer of the Registrar-General's Department, who filled the position of Assistant Search Clerk with great satisfaction to the Examiners of Titles, was removed therefrom, on the recommendation of Mr. Noble, in favour of a transferred telegraph operator, whose defective searches afterwards exposed the Department to serious risk of enormous financial liability, and brought upon the late Registrar-General the open ridicule of a number of the legal profession?
 - (9.) Is he aware that a number of gentlemen recently went through the Registrar-General's Department, claiming to be a professional sub-Board, authorised by the Public Service Board, and forecasted certain proposals with regard to some of the senior officers which were diametrically opposed to the late Registrar-General's written recommendations, and that this and similar actions greatly intensified his official worries?

- (10.) Under what authority has the Public Service Board power to delegate its functions (in the metropolitan area) to any sub-Board?
- (11.) Is he aware that, notwithstanding the statement made by the Public Service Board in their first annual report that "in all cases salaries were fixed for the office and not for the man," there are a number of officers in the Registrar-General's Department holding responsible positions who are not receiving the salaries fixed by the Public Service Board as remuneration for these positions?
- (12.) Is he aware that an officer of this Department, convicted three years ago of being implicated in the Campbell frauds, and recommended by Mr. Justice Fitzhardinge, sitting as a Royal Commission, to be disgraced for trafficking in Departmental information with land-jobbers and others, has been promoted by the Board, on the recommendation of Mr. Noble, over the heads of a number of his senior officers with clean records, to the position next to the Deputy Registrar-General, giving him access to the records of the Department, and confidential information of enormous value?
- (13.) In order that the newly-appointed Registrar-General may not be saddled with the responsibility for the state of things now existing, and in view of the fact that the circumstances would render an inquiry by the Public Service Board worse than useless, will he ask the Honorable the Premier to appoint a Royal Commission to inquire into the working of this branch of the Public Service?

Answer.

I will presently lay the desired information upon the Table of the House in the shape of a Return.

- (1.) No.
- (2.) No.
- (3.) I am not aware of the truth, or otherwise, of the statements alleged to have been given to the Press. An officer of the Registrar-General's Department (Mr. Inch) applied to me for authority to take proceedings against a certain newspaper, and he was informed that it is open to him to take such action as he might deem advisable, but that I was not prepared to grant such authority as he desired, it being left to him to exercise his own discretion in the matter.
- (4.) No.
- (5.) The Public Service Board have furnished me with the following information:—This question contains the insinuation that the relationship existing between the Board and Mr. Long was anything but cordial. The Board give this the most unqualified denial. They say it was impossible for any officer of the Government to be on more friendly terms with them than was the case with Mr. Long. No unpleasant word had ever passed between any member of the Board and Mr. Long, and in fact their relations were cordial in the extreme. The Board point out that when they entered upon their examination of the Registrar-General's Office they found Mr. Long in the position of Senior Examiner, at a salary of £794. On their recommendation he was appointed Registrar-General, at a salary of £900, which was subsequently increased by them to £1,000 per annum. This shows conclusively the high appreciation they had of the value of Mr. Long's services. The Board frequently saw both Mr. Long and Mr. Noble, and they sometimes consulted Mr. Noble, as they do the Chief Clerks of other Departments, on minor matters, with the object of saving Mr. Long's time. Mr. Noble was always regarded by the Board as being completely in Mr. Long's confidence, and they formed the impression that he was a most loyal officer to his chief. The following report, made in June last year by Mr. Long, shows the estimation in which Mr. Noble was held by him:—A most excellent officer, in every way capable and energetic, possessing exceptional judgment and tact. Is very successful in the supervision, under me, of the general conduct of the business of the Department, and the control, discipline, and subordination of the staff. Has rendered very great service in connection with the reorganisation and rearrangement of the Department and the work and staff thereof. Is most certainly deserving of special recognition. At the time the above report was made the Board had under consideration the salaries of Mr. Long and Mr. Noble, and they came to the conclusion that it was not wise to raise them; but subsequent representations having been made, which the papers fully show, the Board, after consultation with the Minister of the Department, decided that they would be justified in raising Mr. Long's salary to £1,000, and Mr. Noble's to £600 per annum. With regard to Mr. Noble, the increase was given on the distinct recommendation of Mr. Long."
- (6.) I am not aware. The statements herein, I am informed, are not correct. Mr. Long was well acquainted with his senior officers before Mr. Noble became associated with him, having been Examiner of Titles for ten years.
- (7.) In May, 1897, two vouchers were submitted for the sum of £1 2s. for the same service, and a cheque was drawn for each through the error of one of the clerks in the Account Branch, but was discovered immediately afterwards by the sub-accountant in checking before the payment of cheque. The second cheque was cancelled by the Registrar-General, and never left the office. I am informed that there is no truth in the statement as to the duplicate set of accounts. Mr. Long had every confidence in the accountant and his staff, and did business with the Account Branch direct.
- (8.) The officer referred to was moved at his own request on the grounds of close confinement and ill-health. He coached his successor, and continued to check the work for a time. Mistakes were afterwards found, and the new searcher was put back on indexing, other arrangements being made for the work of searching. The errors were corrected, and no harm resulted. This matter was directly in Mr. Long's hands, who made all arrangements himself.
- (9, 10, and 11.) The Public Service Board have furnished me with the following information:—
(9 and 10.) "It does not seem to be realised that the Public Service Board have to deal with something like 15,000 officers, and that it is beyond human possibility for three gentlemen to regulate what is little short of an army in numbers without availing themselves of the best assistance obtainable for this purpose. By doing this the Board do not delegate their functions or relieve themselves of any part of their responsibility. They simply obtain the aid of those best able to give it, with a view to their having before them the facts, without which no proper decision could be arrived at. In this particular case the Board have called together a number of capable professional officers to go through the Departments and collect such information for them as will assist them in coming to a proper determination in the matter

matter of adjusting the salaries of the professional staff to a uniform basis. There are some draftsmen employed in the Registrar-General's Office, and Mr. Long was asked and promised to help the committee to the best of his ability, a promise which he fully redeemed. The information gathered by the committee has not yet been placed before the Board, and therefore no decision whatever has been come to regarding the matter. The committee and Mr. Long held different views on one point, and the Chairman of the Public Service Board had a conversation with Mr. Long on the subject, and the fullest consideration would be given to his views."

(11.) "The quotation from the report of the Public Service Board is correct, and the Board, as far as possible, are guided by the principle laid down therein. It is true that in the appointment of a new officer to a higher position the salary sometimes given is less than that at which the position was originally graded, the object being that when the officer has been fully tried in his new place, if no alteration in the character of the work renders it necessary to permanently lower the salary, he may be awarded the salary as originally graded. It is, however, requisite sometimes to completely regrade the position. In the cases which are probably referred to, Mr. Long made recommendations for the increase of certain salaries, but after consultation with him the Board came to the determination not to deal with any salaries under £300 per annum, but to leave them to the operation of the Regulations as to increments. The Board, however, have not lost sight of the provision in their Regulations that special cases may be dealt with by special treatment."

(12.) The case in connection with the officer referred to was dealt with about two years before the Public Service Act came into existence, the Commissioner's Report being dated 1st December, 1893. The Board found the officer, on grading the Department, in receipt of a salary of £267 10s. per annum, and, as his work warranted it, his salary was fixed at £275 per annum, which was subsequently increased to £300, on the recommendation of Mr. Long. A change was recently made in his position by the Public Service Board, on Mr. Long's personal recommendation, with which he was not satisfied, and he therefore appealed, when he was assured by the Board that the new position was of equal importance and status to the old. He does not rank next even to the Junior Deputy Registrar-General, and has not access to the records referred to, which are under strict supervision.

(13.) As the newly-appointed Registrar-General, in entering upon his duties, is inquiring into the working of the whole of the Department, it is considered that no useful purpose will be served by appointing such a Commission.

UNDER the head of "Loan Cash Balances and Warrants," and in paragraph 60 of my Report upon the Treasurer's Accounts for the year ended 30th June, 1897, it was stated that it had become necessary for me to refer to the Attorney-General on the whole subject of my responsibility under clauses 10 to 13 of the "Audit Act of 1870," but, at the date of my Report, no reply had been received to my application for his opinion.

After some further delay and much correspondence on the subject a joint opinion of Sir Julian Salomons and Dr. R. M. Sly was at length forwarded to me on 3rd September last. In the ordinary course it would become my duty to attach a copy of the case or statement of facts laid by me before the Law Officers of the Crown, and a copy of the opinion given thereon with my Report on the Accounts of 1897-8. As it now seems unlikely that the Report can be ready for submission to Parliament before the close of the Session, I have taken the liberty of anticipating that event, and have now the honor to submit to the Legislative Assembly the case and opinion referred to for their information in continuance of paragraph 60 of last year's Report. It will be seen that the matters thus brought under notice are of considerable importance, and point to the necessity for a re-arrangement of the legislative provisions for the raising of Loans and of their Appropriation and Expenditure, including the disposal of excess Balances of Appropriations and of Balances of Loans raised over requirements.

In my Report on the Accounts of 1895-6, paragraphs 53 to 59, occasion was taken to bring under the notice of Parliament "The mode of raising Loans and of applying the same," and attention is again very respectfully invited to the suggestions therein made.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 5th instant, informing me that the Advances to the Loan Account cannot be repaid at present, but must stand over for a time, and to request that you will have the goodness to invite the attention of the Acting Colonial Treasurer to the fact that the advances referred to of £1,500,000 have not yet been provided for by the issue of securities on the faith of which they were made, and the amount certified for as available for issue for Loan Service Expenditure, and that as the nominal balance at the credit of the General Loan Account is rapidly diminishing, it is becoming imperative that the Account be replenished at a very early date.

Strictly speaking, there is no balance properly available for issue now, inasmuch as the nominal balance apparently at the credit of the General Loan Account is really due in repayment of the irregular advances of £1,500,000, being, in fact, a part of the same, and is, besides, very nearly exhausted by outstanding warrants.

I take this opportunity of pointing out also, for the immediate consideration of the Acting Colonial Treasurer, that at the 31st July last the "Public Account," as per bank sheet of that day, was overdrawn to the extent of £477,126 19s. 1d., as follows:—

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 28th instant, enclosing a Statement of Balances claimed to be at the credit of the Banking Accounts of the Government as a whole, and as a reply to my letter of 13th, showing that the Public Account, as constituted by the Audit Act of 1870, was overdrawn to the extent of £34,643 12s. 9d. plus £33,348 14s. 10d., as due to the Bank of New South Wales at 31st July, 1897, after allowing for the return to the Working Account of £450,000 then at fixed deposit.

The Statement of Balances enclosed in your letter shows an apparent net credit of £990,578 19s. 9d., but, in the first place, the sums set forth as credits on account of Supreme Court moneys, do not belong to the Government as part of the Public Account, but are private trust moneys, for the use of which for Government purposes there is no legal sanction, and which cannot be drawn upon by Warrant of the Governor for such purposes. The amount of the balances of those private trust moneys, as per enclosed statement, is £199,510 1s. 11d.

In the second place, the Loans Redemption Sinking Funds amount to £103,021 6s. 8d., and are inapplicable to any general purposes of the Government, but should be held sacred to the purposes for which those funds were established, and cannot be drawn upon by the Governor's Warrants, except for such purposes.

In the third place, as formerly stated in my letter of the 13th instant, the sum claimed as at the credit of the General Loan Account, £615,808 17s. 6d., cannot form part of a credit net balance, inasmuch as practically it is nearly covered by outstanding warrants, and, moreover, is due towards the overdraft of £1,500,000 on the same account.

There are thus three amounts, viz., £199,510 1s. 11d., £103,021 6s. 8d., and £615,808 17s. 6d., making in all £918,340 6s. 1d., which cannot be described as, or dealt with as, net credit balances, available for general purposes, and which reduce the amount claimed as £990,578 19s. 9d. to £72,238 13s. 8d.

In this state of the accounts, perhaps you will have the goodness to inform me whence the amount of £500,000 placed to the credit of the General Loan Account on the 20th instant was drawn.

The Bank Account of that date makes a debit of that amount against the "Public Account," but as that account was, on the face of it, overdrawn, some explanation in regard to it is requested. It cannot be claimed as cash (available for investment in the purchase of Funded Stock) at the credit of the Government Savings Bank, because, on the face of the accounts the Saving Bank moneys have, with other balances, nominally at the credit of Trust Funds, under the head of "Ledger Balances," been expended in covering overdrafts on the Consolidated Revenue Fund and General Loan Account. The only correct entry of the transaction appears to me to be a rectification so far of the overdraft of £1,500,000, and I fear I shall have to treat it so.

May I request that you will have the goodness to furnish me with a reply at your very earliest convenience.

It is desired that the 12th section of the Audit Act, 53 Vic. No. 18, should be submitted for my opinion, as a doubt has arisen as to its exact meaning; the words in doubt being:—"Before countersigning any such instrument as aforesaid, such Auditor-General shall ascertain that the sums therein mentioned are then legally available for and applicable to the service or purpose mentioned in such instrument."

I am clearly of opinion that these words impose on the Auditor-General the duty of seeing that all sums mentioned in the "instrument" submitted to him under the terms of the 12th section are sums which may be paid according to law, sums which are required for "services or purposes," which have either received parliamentary sanction, or for which by law payment could be enforced.

When the Auditor-General has satisfied himself that these sums of money are legally payable, his duty under the section ceases. It is no part of his province to decide in what manner, or out of what funds the payments may eventually be made. This is a matter for the Treasurer. The Auditor-General has no responsibility cast upon him in this behalf under the provisions of the section in question.

MEMORANDUM.

Subject:—Recommending submission for legal opinion of reading of clause 12 of the Audit Act of 1870

The Treasury, Account Branch, Sydney, 17 September, 1897.

THE inconvenience now being experienced in obtaining warrants will not be finally disposed of until the question is definitely settled, once and for all, as to the duty imposed upon the Auditor-General in reference to these documents. By the Audit Act of 1870, under which clause 11 provides that the Treasurer shall prepare a warrant and forward same to the Auditor, while clause 12 provides that, "Before countersigning any such instrument as aforesaid, such Auditor-General shall ascertain that the sums therein mentioned are then legally available for and applicable to the service or purpose mentioned in such instrument."

The Auditor-General interprets the direction in this clause to mean that he shall not only examine the instrument with the view of finding that each sum asked for is covered by Parliamentary appropriation, but also see that the cash held to the credit of any or all accounts in the Bank shall be also ample to cover the warrants or instruments to their full extent.

On the other hand it is contended that the words "then legally available and applicable" apply only to the Parliamentary appropriation, and that the Auditor would be and is justified in signing warrants as required up to the full extent of the appropriation, quite irrespective of the Bank balances; that it is the Treasurer's duty to provide moneys to meet requirements, and not the Auditor's; that the warrants are made out for monthly requirements; and that the mere existence of a cash credit on any particular day does not in any way affect the question of monthly payments; that the side-note to clause 12 in Audit Act of 1870 shows the intention of the clause when passed by Parliament to have been that appropriations were to guide the Auditor.

It is submitted for consideration that the matter is one to be finally determined by legal opinion as to the meaning of clause 12 above referred to.

Quite apart from any expression of opinion in the matter, the following facts may be mentioned, namely:—

It was for many years, I am informed, the practice of the Auditor-General to treat the direction of the 12th clause above-mentioned as referring to appropriation only.

It is still the practice, so far as yearly revenue votes are concerned. All warrants are in terms of the Act for monthly requirements, while the Bank balances vary day by day.

In

In close connection with this subject comes the question of the Auditor's disallowance of the transfer of £500,000 to General Loan Account, after having certified to warrant in terms of clause 12 quoted above, avowedly on the ground that the balance at the credit of the General Banking Account was not increased by the transfer. While this is no doubt true, the balance at the General Loan Account was increased by the amount alluded to, and the overdraft on the Public Account increased by the same sum. This is shown by the daily revenue slips and Bank sheets as sent to the Auditor-General.

The reason that the general balance on the Banking Accounts was not increased, being the fact that both accounts dealt with were included within the total.

The Auditor-General further states that the £500,000 alluded to must be taken to form a repayment on account of the advance of £1,500,000 from Revenue to Loans.

The reason given for the objection to the transfer to Loans would appear to be equally valid in the case of the entry proposed by the Auditor-General.

So far, however, as can be seen from the Account point of view, there is absolutely nothing in the contention raised; the entry of £500,000 to the credit of the General Loan Account was made by cheque, and is as true and valid a transaction as if made with the outside public, and should so stand and be available for use. The definite settlement of the question raised in the former portion of this memorandum is imperative, as any compliance with the Auditor-General's view would necessitate steps being taken to procure or retain a large sum, and keep the same idle at credit in the Banks—that is to say, sufficient to cover all liabilities to ordinary trust funds, which would probably absorb about £2,250,000, and this independent of the amount required for current operations on Loans and Revenue, in all a needless credit of about £4,000,000, thus destroying any possibility of successful finance, and entailing a heavy and unnecessary charge for interest.

It is therefore submitted for favourable consideration that the question as to the reading of the clause 12 of the Audit Act of 1870 be forwarded for legal definition to the Law Officers of the Crown, and that they be requested to treat the matter as an urgent one.

AUDITOR-GENERAL'S MINUTE.

Department of Audit, New South Wales, Sydney, 8 November, 1897.

Instruments Nos. 95 and 96.

Subject:—Opinion of the Attorney-General as to the Auditor-General's duty and responsibility in regard to certifying instruments for the Governor's signature under the 12th clause of the "Audit Act of 1870."

THE Auditor-General considers that he is entitled, as asked for, to a copy of the case on which the opinion of the Attorney-General was founded, and also to replies to his letters of the 31st August and the 10th September on the subject of the available funds for certificates of issue.

Under 60 Victoria No. 32, or any other Loan Act, no issue is legal except out of money borrowed, inasmuch as that is the condition of the appropriation. A payment under 60 Victoria No. 32, *e.g.*, is not lawful out of Consolidated Revenue Fund or out of Trust Funds. Hence the opinion of the Attorney-General is not applicable to such a case.

If the Treasurer had taken action on section 2 of the 7th clause of the 60 Victoria No. 32, and obtained sums of cash from any quarter, and placed them to the credit of the General Loan Account, the difficulty would not exist. In any case, the Auditor-General is perfectly clear that no payment can be legal without a cash basis for it in regard to Loan Service claims, and he must decline, therefore, to certify any Loan Service instrument that is not based on such a condition.

It may be remarked that as regards the Acts 59 Victoria No. 6 and 60 Victoria No. 32, no mention is made in them of the Warrant of the Governor for payments claimed under them, and so far, although it is considered to be a serious omission from the provisions of those Acts, the Treasurer and the Auditor-General are relieved from the necessity of obtaining the Governor's sanction to such payments.

So far as instrument No. 96 is concerned, it is found that it can be certified on the ground of there being sufficient cash at the credit of the General Loan Account, but not otherwise.

I am quite prepared to pay all due respect to any opinion which the Honorable the Attorney-General may give, but on the definition which he has himself given I do not see that the payments proposed to be made can be held to come under that definition.

There is a corresponding responsibility on the part of the Treasurer to see that the provisions of the law needful to obviate hardship on one or any number of Government creditors are carried out, one of which provisions is that in respect of Loan Services the Treasurer must provide Loan money before he can ask from the Auditor-General a certificate to the Governor of legal availability for issue.

But as already pointed out in reference to the Acts 59 Victoria No. 6, and 60 Victoria No. 32, no conditions are contained in them for obtaining the Governor's Warrant at all.

Case for the opinion of The Honorable the Attorney-General.

Subject :—The Auditor-General's responsibility under the Audit Act of 1870, more particularly under clauses 10 to 13 thereof.

PRELIMINARY.

23 November, 1897.

In the free exercise of his judgment as to the discharge of a specific duty required of him under the Audit Act, and more particularly the 12th clause thereof, the Auditor-General has felt it to be his duty on many occasions during the last twenty-seven years, to challenge the instruments forwarded to him by the Treasurer for his certificate of availability for, and applicability to, services and purposes of sums set forth therein, to justify the Governor in approving and signing such instruments, and thus converting them into Warrants for the issue of moneys from the Public Account.

That liberty of judgment has doubtless modified to some extent the Treasurer's operations—as it was intended to do in the public interest—and it is now after twenty-seven years of exercise sought to be taken away, and thus remove one of the most important of the safeguards against improper dealing with public moneys—a safeguard especially provided at the time against the Governor being made a partaker in the expenditure of the revenue without, or in anticipation of, the sanction of Parliament. The maintenance of that safeguard with its correlative duties, constitutes one of the most important functions with which the Department under the control of the Auditor-General is invested by the Audit Act of 1870, and which he considers requires the utmost of his official strength and resources to fulfil and retain.

The Auditor-General considers that the words of the 12th clause of the Audit Act, which are made the basis of the new action of the Treasury, viz. :—"Before countersigning any such instrument as aforesaid, such Auditor-General shall ascertain that the sums therein mentioned are then legally available for, and applicable to the services or purposes mentioned in such instrument," ought not properly to be isolated, and to be detached from the other words contained in the four clauses 10 to 13, which explain the evident scope and intention of the 12th clause, but should be carefully construed with them as a whole.

SIGNIFICANCE

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE GOVERNOR'S WARRANT.

The significance of the Governor's Warrant is that, once the Treasurer pays over to the Public Account all moneys received into the Treasury, as directed by clause 10, those moneys are beyond his control, until he receives the Governor's Warrant to draw out any portion of those moneys. The Governor's Warrant is, therefore, the legal expression of authority to the Treasurer to issue and pay moneys for services rendered, and to make such Warrant legal, it must be based upon Statutes appropriating the public revenues or moneys to such services.

It is directed therefore that, before asking the Governor to complete the necessary legal sanction for the issue of moneys from the Public Account, the Treasurer shall support his application to the Governor by the certificate of the Auditor-General—as an independent officer—to the effect that the Governor can legally do so. The responsibility of such certificate rests, therefore, entirely with the Auditor-General. For if such responsibility were to be shared, or modified by the expressed opinion of any other officer, the value of such certificate must necessarily be minimised. No such limitation of responsibility is anywhere indicated in the Audit Act.

CONSTITUTION OF THE PUBLIC ACCOUNT.

When the Audit Act was passed in 1870, the "Public Account" was constituted by only two distinct funds—the "Consolidated Revenue Fund" and the "Trust Fund." See Second Schedule.

THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND.

In regard to the Consolidated Revenue Fund, certificates of availability have always been and still are limited to the total of the Ways and Means granted by Parliament, as set forth in the Appropriation Acts, special and annual. But in case the Revenue shall exceed the Ways and Means so provided, no Warrant can issue, for the application of such excess to pay for any service rendered to an amount beyond the sanction of Parliament, although the claim for such service may be recovered, or recoverable from the Government in a Court of Law. On the other hand, if the Revenue fails to produce the anticipated Ways and Means, the Treasurer must either postpone payments, or arrange for an overdraft, to the extent of such short income from the sources of revenue sanctioned by Parliament, to meet the requirements of the Appropriation Acts. This latter contingency has never been considered, as a reason for not certifying to legal availability up to the amount of Ways and Means Votes, because, until the close of a financial year, it cannot be known whether the Revenue is sufficient, or not, to meet Parliamentary Appropriations thereof.

THE TRUST FUND.

With respect to the Trust Fund, or rather Trust Funds, the case is quite different, inasmuch as there is a direct relationship between the sums lodged on their behalf respectively in the "Public Account" and the liability on the part of the Treasurer to issue same; no difficulty exists therefore, in the case of the Trust Funds in certifying to availability, but the certificate is always dependent, among other things, upon the fact that actual cash, to the amount asked for, has been received by the Treasurer, and lodged in the "Public Account" before the issue of such certificate.

There is this further consideration, that the Trust Fund is not one Fund, that can be drawn upon indiscriminately, but is an aggregate of a number of distinct Trusts, to each of which is attached certain conditions, without compliance with which no operation can legally take place. When, therefore, the Treasurer asks for a certificate of availability, the Auditor-General is bound to inquire into the conditions of issue, and not to certify to an amount within the limits of a cash balance, simply because the Treasurer asks for it.

THE LOAN FUND.

The Loan Fund, or, as it is now described in the Loan Service Acts, "The General Loan Account," is constituted on a different footing from either the Consolidated Revenue Fund, or the Trust Funds, and it is out of the administration of that Fund that the present question has chiefly arisen.

No mention is made of a separate Loan Fund in the Audit Act of 1870, because all Loan Acts up to the date of it, including one passed immediately after it, directed all proceeds of Loans to be carried to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and to be accounted for as part of it.

In the following year, however—1871—a Loan Act, 35 Vic. No. 5, was passed, separating the proceeds of the Loan authorised by it from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and placing them to a separate account, called "The Loan Fund," and each subsequent Loan Act up to the Act 41 Vic. No. 7 created for itself a separate "Loan Fund"; under the Act 42 Vic. No. 16, however, all those separate Funds were amalgamated into one, thenceforward termed "The General Loan Account," and to which the proceeds of all subsequent Loans were directed to be credited.

Although

Although the Loan moneys were thus separated from the Consolidated Revenue Fund Account, the issue of those moneys, by the Treasurer, was always guarded by the provisions contained in previous Loan Acts, that the Warrant of the Governor must be obtained to enable the Treasurer to get credit for his payments for Loan Services. But along with that provision there is a limitation of the payments, for which the Governor's Warrant was to be obtained, to the actual credit to the General Loan Account of the proceeds of Loans, such proceeds being applicable to the payment of any accounts, claimable under any separate Loan Acts, but the condition of payment is always that it be made out of Loan money. In other words, there is no legal sanction for the appropriation of moneys to Loan Services, without Loan moneys being previously provided, to the extent to which actual payments are required to be made. Hence the question of "Appropriation," which is claimed to be the Auditor-General's only guide in issuing certificates of availability in regard to Loan Services, is actually settled by the answer to the simple question: Is there a cash balance of proceeds of Loans, over and above the amount of Warrants previously issued, to cover the certificate asked for?

In the last two Loan Acts, 59 Vic. No. 6, and 60 Vic. No. 32, there is the remarkable absence of the provision, contained in all previous Loan Acts, for the obtaining the Governor's Warrant for payments under those Acts. It is even doubtful whether the Treasurer has any power to make such payments without the Governor's Warrant, unless it was intended that under clause 5—of each Act quoted—the Treasurer should be free to "appropriate" and "apply" any of the sums "borrowed" and carried to the "General Loan Account" without reference to the Governor or the Auditor-General, or, in other words, that transactions under the Acts quoted are intended to be removed from the operation of the Audit Act of 1870.

There is also the remarkable implication by the provision of section 2 of clause 7 of the Act 60 Vic. No. 32, that without money actually borrowed and placed to credit, or moneys otherwise temporarily obtained and carried to the credit of the General Loan Account, no payments could be made for Loan Services.

GENERALLY.

In reference to the three distinct Funds already explained, there is the general provision in clause 11 that the amount for which the Governor's Warrant may be desired is limited to such sum, or sums, as may be calculated by the Treasurer "as likely to become due and payable out of the Public Account during a period not exceeding one month after such calculation." The Auditor-General's experience has all along been that the calculations of requirements have often been very wide of the mark—absurdly so—on a number of occasions. Applications have frequently been made for a certificate of availability to the full amount of a Vote or for the whole amount of a contract when there was ample evidence that it could not possibly be wanted within one month or within several months. As a notable example, among many other minor ones which could be adduced, a certificate was asked for the issue of £30,000—or thereabouts—which represented the amount of a contract on which the instalments payable extended over some fifteen or eighteen months. Exercising his right of challenge, the instrument was reduced by the Treasury, on the remonstrance of the Auditor-General. According to the new views, the Auditor-General would be bound to certify in the circumstances, on the ground that the amount was within an Appropriation.

Another element has to be taken into consideration, and that is that the Auditor-General's power and right of challenge extend to all items of "Credit," to "Funds," or to an "Account," and of disallowance, where such credits are found to be outside of the legitimate operations in the Public Account, as prescribed by clauses 10 to 13 of the Audit Act. If certificates of issue asked for cover or include credits which are found to be wrong, the Auditor-General is clearly justified in declining to certify, notwithstanding the alleged rule of guidance by Appropriation.

SUMMARY OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL'S CONTENTIONS.

(1.) In view of the foregoing statements and explanations, the Auditor-General contends that in no case can the Governor legally approve of a Warrant for issue of money from the Public Account, or from any other Account that may require such Warrant, except on the ground that money had been previously provided to the credit of such Account of a sufficient amount to meet it.

(2.) In the case of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, the provision of the "Ways and Means" is assumed to be sufficient, in the growing realisation of them, to meet the supplies for which they are granted, and consequently to meet any Warrant for actual drafts. At any rate, the Crown, as represented by the Governor, has a right to assume that the Ways and Means for meeting the supplies granted are provided as required upon the issue of a Warrant. In this case the Auditor-General is justified in certifying that, up to the amount of Parliamentary appropriations by "Ways and Means," or otherwise, money has been provided, although in the course of a financial year there may be occasionally a debit instead of a credit cash balance.

(3.) In the case of the Trust Fund, there must, from its nature, be a clear basis of cash prior to operations, and, consequently, that the Auditor-General has a right to withhold his certificate in the absence of a cash or an investment balance to the amount demanded.

(4.) In regard to the General Loan Account, that account can obviously have no existence until Loan moneys are obtained to form it, and consequently that no Warrant can issue, except on a basis of actual cash, without which, in fact, there is no authority to appropriate to specific Loan Services. The Auditor-General has a right, therefore, to insist on a Cash Loan Balance as a preliminary to the issue of his certificate of legal availability or applicability.

(5.) In respect to the Loan Acts 59 Vic. No. 6 and 60 Vic. No. 32, there being no provision for the issue of a Governor's Warrant, the Auditor-General is not bound to give a certificate of availability at all—although such certificates have been given at the Treasurer's request—but only on there being a credit cash balance of Loan Money available for Loan Services, under the authority of the Loan Funds Amalgamation Act 42 Vic. No. 16.

(6.) The Auditor-General contends further that the clauses 10 to 13 of the Audit Act should be read together, and that his responsibility for the certificate required of him demands on his part a satisfactory assurance that all the conditions which are attached to the several portions of the Public Funds, and not the appropriating authority only, are fulfilled before countersigning a document to be submitted for the Governor's signature as an authority to draw upon the Public Account in payment for Public Services.

(7.) Lastly, the Auditor-General contends that whether the Treasurer uses his Warrants in full or in part, or whether the Treasurer reserves cash sufficient to meet all the cheques which he may draw pursuant to a Warrant of the Governor, the Auditor-General must treat every certificated Warrant as a cheque drawn against the cash balance legitimately at the credit of the fund to which the Warrant refers; and that consequently the Auditor-General is not at liberty to certify to the issue of any sum from any fund beyond any cash balance that may remain after debiting that fund with the full amount of certificated Warrants, irrespective of any financial operations, which the Treasurer may deem necessary, or which he may lawfully arrange for in the interest of the public.

The Auditor-General respectfully solicits the opinion of the Attorney-General on the points above submitted, Nos. 1-7.

Clauses of the Audit Act referred to.

THE CLAUSES OF THE AUDIT ACT OF 1890 REFERRED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:—

" 10. The Treasurer or his Deputy shall from day to day pay into the Bank keeping the Government Account all moneys received into the Treasury to an account in such Bank to be called "The Public Account" and such moneys shall be disposed of as hereinafter mentioned and not otherwise.

" 11. All moneys paid into such Bank to the Public Account as hereinbefore directed shall be deemed and taken to be money lent by Her Majesty to the person or persons to whom such Bank may belong and such moneys shall be drawn from the said account in the following manner only (that is to say) the Treasurer shall as often as occasion may require calculate the amount of moneys likely to become due and payable out of the said account during a period not exceeding one month next after such calculation and shall thereupon prepare an instrument in the form contained in the Second Schedule to this Act and shall set forth therein the said amount classifying and arranging it (if for the Public Service) under the same divisions and heads that shall have been employed in the appropriation thereof or stating (if not for the Public Service) the purpose for which it is payable and after having signed such instrument shall transmit the same to the said Auditor-General and such instrument when countersigned by him in the form contained in the same Schedule and approved by the Governor as hereinafter directed but not otherwise shall be the warrant for the making of the order next hereinafter mentioned.

" 12. Before countersigning any such instrument as aforesaid such Auditor-General shall ascertain that the sums therein mentioned are then legally available for and applicable to the Service or purpose mentioned in such instrument and after countersigning such instrument shall return the same to the Treasurer who shall thereupon submit it to the Governor for his approval and signature. Provided that in case the said Auditor-General shall find that the sums therein mentioned or any of them are not then legally available or applicable to the Services or purposes therein set forth he shall return the said instrument to the Treasurer for correction attaching thereto a paper setting forth in writing the sum or sums not found by him to be legally available or applicable as aforesaid.

" 13. When the said warrant shall have been signed by the Governor the Treasurer or such officer or officers as he may authorise may from time to time issue drafts or cheques upon the said Public Account in such form as shall be directed by the Treasurer and such drafts or cheques shall be sufficient authority to the Bank in which the said Public Account is kept to debit the said Public Account with the amounts mentioned therein and no moneys shall be drawn or paid out of the said account in any other manner. Provided always that the amounts mentioned in such drafts or cheques shall in no case exceed collectively the amount of the items set forth in the said warrant."

(The corresponding clauses of the Audit Act, 1898, are Nos. 15 to 18.)

THE Auditor-General will no doubt remember that in November last his certificate to application for Governor's Warrants was refused, and that although repeated efforts were made to obtain the necessary instruments, they were either withheld by the Auditor-General, or returned uncertified.

Under these circumstances it became necessary that steps should be taken to meet the current liabilities to the public, and the only alternative, owing to the action taken by the Auditor-General, was to pay without Warrant.

It may be here pointed out that on the 1st December last, at the time objection was taken by the Auditor-General to the Treasurer's request for Warrants, the sum at credit of the General Loan Account was £849,156 0s. 8d., and that, on the 1st March, after the payment of the amount mentioned in the Auditor-General's minute, there still was at the credit of the same account £377,491 16s. 2d., and that at no time since that date was the account overdrawn.

The payments alluded to were made out of the General Loan Account balance, as above mentioned, by authority of the Treasurer.

Referring to my letter of the 5th instant, on the subject of the further issue of Warrants for Loan Services, and in reply to your semi-official note of the 6th instant, I have now the honor to state, for the information of the Colonial Treasurer, that a careful examination has been made of the state of the General Loan Account in connection with the Warrants which I have certified for the issue of the proceeds of Loans negotiated since the 8th January, 1895, for application to Loan Services, the result being that a proper Statement of the Balance on the General Loan Account at 25th March, 1898, shows that it was considerably overdrawn.

I have already stated that the terms on which the three credits of £500,000 each, on the 9th January, 10th April, and 8th September, 1895, were authorised by the Governor and Executive Council having been as follows, viz.:—"Pending the realisation of further Loan Securities," certificates of availability were given by me on the faith that steps would be taken at an early date to carry out the terms of those authorities.

But as the obligations incurred in the issue of those authorities have not been fulfilled, so far as appears in the Treasurer's accounts, I am quite entitled to treat those transfers as of no account in a Statement of Warrants properly chargeable against legitimate Loan credits.

Taking, therefore, the balance nominally at the credit of the General Loan Account, that is, irrespective of outstanding and unused Warrants on the 8th January, 1895, prior to the first of the transfers for £500,000, being placed to credit, the following figures show the operation of the Warrant Account up to the 25th March, 1898, inclusive:—

Inasmuch, however, as payments have been made and charged to the General Loan Account without the Warrant of the Governor to the amount up to 25th March, 1898, of £518,436 18s. 7d., the overdraft is increased to £1,927,725 14s. 4d.

It will be observed that in the above Statement no credit is allowed for the entry on 20th August, 1897, of £500,000, transferred in the Bank Account from the Public Account to the General Loan Account, as for reasons already given in my letters of 31st August and 10th September last, to which no reply has been received, the operation was altogether an irregular one, and added nothing to either account, nor altered the then state of the Warrant Account.

The

The recent transfer from the London Account of £665,000 to the credit of the General Loan Account can only be dealt with by this office as a set-off against the debit balance on the Warrant Account above stated.

I regret, therefore, that until the balance on the General Loan Account be rectified, and placed in its true position, I cannot see my way to continue to certify warrants for the issue of moneys not legally available and applicable to Loan Services.

The Colonial Treasurer directs me to state that he has had, during his recent rest from work, your letter of the 5th instant, relating to Warrants for Loan Services, under serious consideration.

The resignation of the late Attorney-General before an opinion was given by him on the case submitted, and the fact that Mr. Reid now occupies the position of Attorney-General as well as that of Colonial Treasurer, makes it impossible to ask the present Attorney-General for an opinion, as it would be manifestly unfair to you that the present holder of the office should give an opinion as Crown Law Officer in a matter at issue between the Treasury and the Audit Office.

The Colonial Treasurer has carefully considered the position advanced in the able case submitted by you for the late Attorney-General's opinion, in the light of the various provisions of the Loan Acts of the Colony, and of the Audit Act of 1870, and, if he had come to the conclusion that your contention was the correct one, he would have directed the preparation of a measure for Parliament to deal with the difficulty.

But Mr. Reid, believing the Treasury is in the right, is unable to take that course.

Recognizing the urgency and importance of the question, it is his intention to submit the whole matter for the opinion of Sir Julian Salomons, Q.C., and Dr. R. M. Sly, in the form of the case submitted by you, and a case submitted by the Treasury. If you wish to add to the case drawn up for Mr. Want, or to amend it in any way, kindly do so, and the Treasurer will submit your case as amended.

The Treasurer desires me to state further that, in the event of the opinion of Counsel being in your favour, he will raise no further contention on the subject,—but if so advised may propose legislation on the subject.

Referring to your letter of the 19th instant, which reached the Treasurer on Saturday night at National Park, I have to add that, as the course taken by the Treasury in transferring advances of £1,500,000 to the Loan Account, was, even in your own view, not an improper one, "pending the realization of further Loan Securities," and on that ground, you gave certificates of availability, the Treasurer desires me; in the interest of the public creditor, to ask you not to summarily stop payment of claims due to the business community until the opinion referred to has been obtained, which will certainly be within the next three weeks. To attempt to force the Government to impose on the public a charge of £45,000 or £60,000 a year, in order to pay claims which it can pay without such a liability, is, the Treasurer thinks, a step you will hesitate to take when it may turn out that your view of the law is wrong, and your demands upon the Treasury illegal, and that the public sacrifice referred to was unnecessary.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 25th ultimo, and to request that you will have the goodness to state, for the information of the Colonial Treasurer, that I have carefully read and reconsidered the case submitted by me in November last for the opinion of the Attorney-General, and do not see that it requires alteration in any respect. The views set forth in it are, I conceive, fully in accord with the spirit and intention of the "Audit Act of 1870," so far as the duties of this Department are defined. Those duties have been carried out by my predecessor and myself with the most liberal interpretation which we could venture to apply to the precise instructions given in the Act to the Treasurer and to the Auditor-General.

The operations of audit are necessarily moulded on the operations of the Treasury, and both have to be conducted in the interests of the public. Those interests have hitherto been largely conserved by the restrictions of the Audit Act, which have been imposed equally upon the Treasurer and the Auditor-General, and if anything the restrictions should be made more effective for the end designed rather than be diminished by any contemplated legislation on the subject.

With regard to the second part of your letter, I need only refer to correspondence embodied in my Annual Reports of 1895 and 1895-6, paragraphs 23 and 24, and 33 to 36 (with Appendix E) respectively, to show that I regarded the advance as purely a temporary expedient with which to provide a *modus vivendi* for a dying balance, and I was induced to grant certificates of availability on the understanding that the excess on the Loan Account would be made good without unnecessary delay, and the General Trust Fund balance recouped to the extent of the £1,500,000. The advances were made during 1895, and to the present date no attempt has been made to fulfil the conditions under which I was induced to concur in the arrangement.

I observe also that no explanation is offered as to the lapse of nearly three years without fulfilling the terms of the arrangement referred to, during which there is good reason to believe that the necessary loan could have been obtained on very favourable terms.

In asking me not to summarily stop payments due to public creditors, I think the Treasurer must have forgotten that since December last payments to the extent of £560,000 have been made in satisfaction of the public claims without the Governor's warrant. If payments are now to be stopped at the Treasury it can only be that the conditions prerequisite to the issue of a Governor's warrant (as described in my

case

case submitted for the opinion of the Attorney-General) are now regarded as essential before any further operations can legally take place. As I have fulfilled my duty in the case, the responsibility of stopping payments does not rest with me.

The strained condition of the General Loan Account is largely due to the appropriations to expend increasing in a much larger ratio than the additions to the Loan Cash Balance. As the Treasurer is well aware, under the "Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879," payments may be made out of the General Loan Cash Balance directly a Loan Bill is assented to, and, as a matter of fact, large payments do take place as indicated. When it is considered that the last three Loan Acts authorised in the aggregate liabilities to the extent of £5,851,328, and that the additions to the Loan Cash Balance were not commensurate therewith to a very large extent, it is obvious that a rapid exhaustion of the Loan Cash Balance is a necessary consequence.

The subjoined statement shows how the above amount was made up, and to this sum has been added the £1,500,000 as a part of the outstanding liability:—

Moreover, as these Acts authorised a concomitant annual interest liability to the extent of upwards of £175,000, I cannot but regard it as strange that I should be accused of endeavouring to saddle the Colony with an unnecessary annual interest expenditure of some £45,000 or £60,000. There is another and very important side to this question, viz, the solvency of the General Trust Funds. These Funds (which exceed £8,000,000), so far as the balances existed in the local Banks, have been *wholly used* for general purposes—with a view, as alleged by the Treasury, to economy in payment of interest on loan obligations—without any regard to daily liabilities of the Government in connection with those Funds. In view of a hardening market through international complications, the London market may be all but closed against us, and the Colony will perforce have to seek local help to meet loan expenditure, and pay dearly for the accommodation, and all because the savings of some few thousands of pounds of interest have been regarded as a primary essential in our financial economy. But whether the important considerations adduced are lost sight of or not, it is plain from the subjoined statement that the Colony cannot meet the growing liabilities under Loan Appropriations without additional loans being raised:—

The Bank balances at the 1st April, 1898, after the payment of the monthly draft for the salaries of the Service, and allowing for the payments made by the Bank of New South Wales, not transferred, show a debit balance on the Public Account of	£ s. d. Dr. 257,225 10 9
Which means that not only the whole of the Consolidated Revenue Fund and of the General Trust Funds locally had been expended, but that the Bank had advanced to the Government £257,225 10s. 9d.	
At the same date the General Loan Account showed a credit balance of ...	Cr. 903,660 3 2
But the underlying fact is not shown that this latter account has also against it a debit of £1,500,000, nor that the Public Account has also a credit in its favour of £1,500,000, the amount of the sums advanced at 28th September, 1895.	
There was, therefore, only a net credit cash balance on the 1st April of ...	Cr. 646,434 12 5
But at the same date (independently of a considerable amount of revenue warrants which cannot be immediately ascertained) there were outstanding warrants, equivalent to unrepresented cheques, for—

Thus showing that the net Bank balances, without taking into consideration the outstanding revenue warrants, was more than pledged to meet the outstanding warrants for Loan and Trust Fund Services alone.

In conclusion, I have the honor to request that this letter be forwarded, along with my case for opinion, to the counsel named by Mr. Reid, as strengthening my contentions and answering at the same time the two divisions of your letter, a copy of which, it is presumed, will accompany the other papers.

TREASURY

TREASURY REMARKS upon the case submitted by the Auditor-General, dated 23rd November, 1897, on the subject of his responsibility under the "Audit Act of 1870," more particularly under clauses 10 to 13 thereof.

1. With great respect to the Auditor-General, it is submitted that the case with which he supports his construction of clauses 10 to 13 of the Audit Act, contains a large quantity of irrelevant matter, much of which is historically inaccurate, and therefore calls for correction.

2. In the first place, however,—What is the point at issue, upon which legal interpretation is necessary? It is this: Have the following words in section 12 one meaning, as the Treasury alleges, or two meanings, as the Auditor-General maintains? The words are those copied from the said section into every warrant for the payment of public moneys (specimen Appendices B, C, and D) above the place where the Auditor-General by his signature certifies as follows:—

"I certify that the sums above-mentioned are now legally available for and applicable to the services and purposes respectively above set forth."

According to the Treasury, from the year the Audit Act was passed (1870), the one thing, and the only thing, the Auditor-General had to look to, as a matter of law, was this—

3. Did the respective sums in the warrant fall within the limit of amounts voted and enacted as open to expenditure in connection with the respective services set opposite those amounts?

According to the Auditor-General the words in the warrant (and twelfth section before cited) required him (1) to be satisfied as above, and (2) to be satisfied, further—

4. (a) *As to the Consolidated Revenue Fund—*

That, not only money has been appropriated for the warrant items, but also that money, and money derived from the public revenues only, is lying in the bank to meet the drafts.

5. (b) *As to the General Loan Account—*

That, not only money has been voted in a Loan Act to cover the amounts and services mentioned in the warrant; but also that sufficient money is, at the date of the warrant, at the credit of the Loan Account in the bank to meet the drafts, and that such money must be the proceeds of securities actually sold.

6. It might be well now to give a few illustrations.

First Example.

Vote in Appropriation Act.—Supply of saddles to Mounted Police	£500
Warrant.—Supply of saddles to Permanent Artillery	750

7. Here the sum of £750 would not be "legally available" for the service, for the vote is £500 only. Again, the sum would not be legally "applicable to the service or purpose mentioned in such instrument," because the service in the instrument is "Permanent Artillery," while the appropriation is for the "Mounted Police." The Auditor-General would therefore be justified in refusing to sign.

Take a case of the opposite kind.

Second Example.

Vote in Appropriation Act.—Permanent Military Force, Magazine Rifles...	£10,000
Warrant.—Permanent Military Force, Magazine Rifles	5,000

Here the sum of £5,000 would be "legally available for" this service, and would be "applicable to the service or purpose mentioned," and according to the Treasury the Auditor-General should sign.

Third Example.

Appropriation Act.—Permanent Military Force, Magazine Rifles	£10,000
Warrant.—Permanent Military Force, Magazine Rifles	5,000

8. Here the Auditor-General says:—True there is an appropriation for the above, and the sum is legally available for and applicable to the service, as a matter of lawful expenditure; but, before I authorise the payment of this lawful charge, the Treasurer must satisfy me that the Consolidated Revenue Fund has revenue moneys sufficient to pay the amount, and no other moneys, not even an advance from other public funds, or from the bank, or power to overdraw given by a bank, will do.

Fourth Example.

Loan Act.—Railway construction, Berrigan to Finley	£100,000
Warrant.—Railway construction, Berrigan to Finley	10,000
Funds at credit of General Loan Fund	1,000,000

But the Auditor-General finds these funds a transfer pending sale of debentures.

Result.—Refuses to sign Warrant, and loan must be raised or contractor remain unpaid.

9. The point of law to be decided is, therefore, as follows:—

Is the language of the 12th section of the Audit Act intended to cover the meaning attached to it by the Treasury—namely, that the proposed expenditure, both as to service and amount, has been duly authorised by law, and that meaning only? or

Does that language intend, not only to safeguard against illegal payments of public moneys—upon which point both Departments agree—but also, as the Auditor-General insists against us, is there the further meaning that it is his statutory duty, before countersigning the Warrant, to feel satisfied as to the Treasurer's ability to pay the public creditor out of "legal cash" then lying at the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund or the General Loan Fund?

10. We use the term "legal cash" as a short one. The Auditor-General, in the case of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, would put it thus—

In the case of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, the provision of the "Ways and Means" is assumed to be sufficient, in the growing realisation of them, to meet the supplies for which they are granted, and consequently to meet any Warrant for actual drafts. At any rate, the Crown, as represented by the Governor, has a right to assume that the Ways and Means for meeting the supplies granted are provided as required upon the issue of a Warrant. In this case the Auditor-General is justified in certifying that, up to the amount of Parliamentary Appropriations by Ways and Means or otherwise, money has been provided, although, in the course of a financial year, there may be occasionally a debit instead of a credit cash balance.

11. In the case of the General Loans Account, the Auditor-General's definition of "legal cash" is-- Is there a cash balance of *proceeds of loans* over and above the amounts of Warrants previously issued to cover the certificate asked for"? (pp. 6 and 7 of case).

Again (at page 6 of case)--

In other words, there is no legal sanction for the appropriation of moneys to loan services *without loan moneys* being previously provided to *the extent to which actual payments are required to be made.*

12. It is fair to point out that as to loans the Auditor-General does not rest his case on the Audit Act alone, but also upon words in the Loan Acts.

13. The following are the words in Loan Acts from the time the Loan Fund was established (1871) down to 1894 (58 Vic. No. 14) :--

5. The said Treasurer shall issue and pay the said several sums for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, in such manner and in such proportions as the Governor, by any warrant or order in writing under his hand, and directed to the said Treasurer, may from time to time order and direct. And the payments so made shall be charged upon and payable out of the sums so borrowed or applied as aforesaid.

14. The last sentence is not, the Treasury contends, a *condition precedent* to the issue of a warrant to pay, and therefore cannot be a *condition precedent* to anything done prior to such issue. It is nowhere provided that no work shall be commenced until a loan is floated, therefore the payment for work done cannot be made an illegal act if before the loan is raised. Again, whether a loan has been raised or not, the manner of charging expenditure will be exactly the same. On the first credit of money, or the first payment of money for a loan service, an account would be opened. To that open account all expenditure for the service would be charged in precisely the same way, whether there were moneys on the credit side, in the shape of proceeds of loans, or in the shape of an advance pending a loan, or in the shape of an authority to overdraw, and the outlay would be "charged upon and payable out of the sums so borrowed," if the proceeds of the loan came to the credit side of the account after a temporary advance, just as much as if there had been no advance at all.

15. Let us go back to the Consolidated Revenue Fund. The Auditor-General must surely be aware that he has always, from 1870 down to the present moment, certified to warrants on that fund, quite irrespective of what he now lays down, as to his statutory duty of seeing to the presence of revenue moneys sufficient to meet them. He explains away what, according to his own contention, amounts to a violation of his part of that duty upon the following ground :--

This latter contingency (deficiency of revenue moneys and consequent failure of funds for warrants) has never been considered as a reason for not certifying to legal availability up to the amounts of Ways and Means Votes, because, *until the close of a Financial Year, it cannot be known whether the revenue is sufficient or not to meet Parliamentary Appropriations thereof.*

16. This is strangely insufficient to cover the whole ground. If the law is what the Auditor-General contends it to be, he cannot dispense with its provisions in that way. If the law is as he contends, the Treasurer ought to have *revenue moneys* at the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund on the first day of a month sufficient to cover a month's expenditure, because section 11 of the Act, and the form of the warrant, contemplate a warrant on the first day of a month for expenditure which may not take place until the 31st. If the law is as Mr. Rennie contends, before he signs such a warrant, the money should all be lying waiting in the Bank, otherwise his whole position falls to the ground.

17. Again, the plea for not too strictly scrutinising warrants for the Consolidated Revenue Fund will not bear close investigation. While it is quite true that the revenue of the year cannot be known until it is over, it is known then. Yet, during the course of deficiency years (*see Appendix E*), the Auditor-General signed hundreds of warrants for services of a year, after the year was over, and when it was a notorious fact that the warrants he had signed and was signing for the services of that year were more, by extremely large sums, than the revenue for the year, or any moneys belonging to it; and that this state of things was equally true, in some cases, for periods prior and subsequent. Appendix E shows deficiencies in the Consolidated Revenue Fund owing to payments under warrants signed by the Auditor-General in excess of revenue moneys at credit of the account, ranging over the years 1886, 1887, and 1888, to cover which a deficiency loan of £2,600,000 was authorised in 1889, and over the years 1892, 1893, and 1894, to cover which a deficiency loan of £1,174,000 was passed in 1895.

18. As to loans and warrants upon the General Loan Fund, history is also against the Auditor-General, for the accounts show deficiencies in the Loan Fund from 30th June, 1891, to 31st December, 1894, ranging from £128,000 to £2,254,000. These deficiencies represent warrants signed by the Auditor-General when he must have known there were no proceeds of loans to meet them.

19. It is quite admitted that all these facts, and all the contrary facts the Auditor-General can adduce, will not decide a point of law.

20. Now let the case of the General Loan Fund be dealt with. Although the point covers both funds, the difficulty raised concerns the Loan Fund only.

21. If counsel will look at the first two pages of the last Monthly Statement of the Treasury, they will see that the Finance Minister of New South Wales is the custodian of large sums of money entirely apart from the Consolidated Revenue Fund and the Loan Fund. These large sums come under the head of Trust Accounts, and approach a total of £9,000,000 sterling. Upon nearly the whole of these moneys interest must be paid by the Treasury. It may easily happen therefore, and does happen constantly, that we are paying interest on money lying idle and of no service to the public, but rather a source of loss. When I came into office I looked into this matter, and soon saw that as a financial operation, I could not justify raising loans for public works, thus exposing the public to largely increased expenditure for interest, when I had large sums of money, practically forced upon me, lying idle, yet drawing interest from the Treasury. I therefore, at various times, submitted to the Governor-in-Council minutes authorising advances to the Loan Fund of sums of money, amounting to £1,500,000, from the Public Account in which these large idle sums are. This is no unusual course, for there are two Suspense Accounts which have existed under other Treasurers, as well as in my own term of office, which are in debt £693,523 10s. 11d. to these Trust Funds, pending the sale of assets in the shape of land. In form the advances were made from the Consolidated Revenue Fund; but the transaction was in effect as stated.

22. The Auditor-General says he was "induced" to recognise the three transfers of £500,000 each in 1895, on the faith of an assurance that they were made "pending the realisation of further Loan securities." Still, according to his view of the law as pressed upon us now, he broke the law, just as much in signing the warrant, if the advance had been for a month, as if it were for a year, because he now insists upon "actual cash proceeds of the sale of Loan securities" being in the Fund before he can sign at all.

23. If he is right, the Treasurer's best efforts of financial prudence and discretion may be so many breaches of the law. If he is right, with idle moneys on my hands on which the public are paying interest, I must raise at once several millions more, on which to pay more interest, or else I break the law, and the Auditor-General is bound to step in, and by refusing to sign a warrant compel me either to stop payment of the public creditor, or break the law by paying him without a warrant. So if funds ran out, at a time of financial panic, the Treasurer must raise "legal" funds, at an enormous sacrifice perhaps, when Banks are willing to advance money, or he has idle money himself—or, again, become a breaker of the law, or dishonour the public obligations. Surely such foolish fetters upon the discretion and powers of the Finance Minister of New South Wales require very express words. Surely the Audit Act does not make the Auditor-General a sort of duplicate Finance Minister, with arbitrary power such as that he claims, which he must exercise as a matter of law, without any discretion at all? No such creation is to be seen in any Statute.

24. The 36th and 39th sections provide full authority to the Auditor-General to bring under the notice of Parliament anything the Treasurer does which is contrary to law in his opinion. The 37th section enables him also to get the opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown, and by such the Treasury would feel bound. Twice the Auditor-General has taken the opinion of the Crown Law Officers,—once that of Attorney-General Barton in 1893 (page 236 of Public Accounts for 1893) on the terms of a Loan Act, and a question of "legal" funds; later on, the opinion of Attorney-General Want in 1896 (page 197 of Public Accounts for 1896) upon a similar question. In both cases the opinion was against him.

25. Upon the question now submitted the Treasury sought the advice of the Attorney-General a few months ago, and obtained it, but the Treasury got Mr. Want to withdraw his opinion, in order that the Auditor-General might have a chance of submitting his views, arranging that Mr. Rennie should submit a case. This was done, but, before an opinion could be got, Mr. Want retired, and, of course, the present Treasurer, being Acting Attorney-General, could not fairly advise.

26. There are also attached to this statement copies of Parliamentary Papers of 1869 and 1870, out of which the Audit Act originated. It will be seen that the questions then in controversy were entirely limited to questions of expenditure without legal appropriation, and questions such as those now raised by the Auditor-General were never dreamt of then, nor were they ever pressed on the Treasury until of late years. Had they been, a cure must have been found long ago for the intense inconvenience to the Public Service and to the public interest which the Auditor-General's view would have created if any Colonial Treasurer had ever been compelled to act upon it.

27. So that the matter can go before counsel in a manner perfectly fair, the Treasurer has sent a copy of this minute to the Auditor-General, to enable him to furnish any remarks he thinks necessary, in further support of the case originally drawn up by him.

28. In conclusion, the question to be decided is one of broad construction of the words of enactments, and much of the matter contained in this minute is only put forward in correction of statements made in the case set up by the Auditor-General.

29. P.S.—Of course there is a middle view possible, which discriminates between the Treasury view that Parliamentary Appropriation is the one and only thing the certificate of the Auditor-General depends upon, and the Auditor-General's view that there is more necessary, namely, the existence of moneys, in the case of Loan Services, which are the actual proceeds of sales of debentures or funded stock. The middle view first alluded to, being that there should be at credit moneys at the time of asking for signature, but that the nature of those moneys is immaterial.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 31st ultimo, covering copy of "Treasury remarks upon the case submitted by the Auditor-General, dated 23rd November, 1897, on the subject of his responsibility under the Audit Act of 1870, more particularly under clauses 10 to 13 thereof," and asking me, if I so desired it, to add to the case so submitted by me.

In reply, I have the honor to state, for the information of Mr. Reid, that in answer to a similar request, under date 25th April last, I addressed to you a letter on the 2nd ultimo, which then conveyed all that occurred to me to be of advantage by way of emphasising and illustrating the position taken up in the case.

With regard to the paper of "Remarks" enclosed in your letter, it does not appear to me that those remarks necessitate in any way an addition to, or modification of, the statement of case of 23rd November, 1897, beyond what in my letter of 2nd ultimo may be so considered.

It is all the less needful to enter into a renewed, and, in my judgment, a profitless discussion of matter which "is only put forward in (supposed) correction of statements made in the case set up by the Auditor-General," said statements having been declared at the outset to "contain a large quantity of irrelevant matter, much of which is (alleged to be) historically inaccurate."

I feel bound, nevertheless, to notice in the paper of remarks several statements which are utterly wrong.

It is entirely wrong to say that the Auditor-General demands, or has ever demanded, a cash balance as a preliminary to certifying a warrant for the issue of money for Revenue Services. No warrant has ever, to my knowledge, been refused certificate on such a ground.

It

It is entirely wrong to say that "deficiencies" (balances quoted) in the Consolidated Revenue Fund were owing to payments under warrants, signed by the Auditor-General, in excess of revenue moneys at credit of the account, ranging over years 1886 to 1888, and 1892 to 1894, for it cannot be shown that any of the warrants certified during those years were in excess of Ways and Means Grants, or Statutory Primary Charges on the Revenue Account. The deficiencies in the revenue are well known to have arisen in other ways; but the question of revenue deficiencies is quite irrelevant to the matter in hand.

I do not think for present purposes that I need discuss other matters, which, in my judgment, have been unnecessarily imported into this case by the Treasury remarks, but I shall be glad to give, and I think it is desirable that I should personally give, such explanation upon any of the points mentioned, which may not already appear to be sufficiently explicit as to the reasons why they have been taken, to the distinguished counsel to whom Mr. Reid proposes to submit my case, which I maintain is strictly accurate in all its statements.

It may be proper to add that in connection with the opinion given by Mr. Barton there should be read paragraphs 62 to 67 of my report on the accounts of 1893, and in connection with the opinion given by Mr. Want, there should be read paragraphs 35 and 36 of my report on the accounts of 1895-6.

Also, that the Appendix J to the Treasury remarks is incomplete, as it omits the important minute of Lord Belmore, dated 28th March, 1870, on the subject of his responsibility and relationship to the expenditure of the Colony—a copy of which is appended to this letter.

M. Sly, I am directed to acquaint you that the joint opinion of the counsel named has now been received, and to enclose copy thereof for your information.

OPINION.

There are seven contentions of the Auditor-General on which our opinion is desired. We will deal with such contentions in the order as given in the case.

1. The Audit Act, 1870, taken literally, does not seem framed to apply to any moneys other than revenue, but we think that the safer course in the public interest is to give to section 10 of that Act a liberal interpretation, and to construe it as including under "all moneys received into the Treasury" public moneys from all sources whatsoever. It seems to us also that the Audit Act does not contemplate the use of any moneys except such as already have been paid into the Bank to the credit of the Public Account, *e.g.* Section 10 says, "The Treasurer shall pay into the Bank all moneys received into the Treasury, and such moneys shall be disposed of as hereinafter mentioned." Section 11 speaks of "all moneys paid into the Bank, and such moneys shall be drawn from the Bank in the following manner." Though the Audit Act only professes to deal with moneys actually in the Bank, it does not follow that the Auditor-General has any duty cast on him to find out whether the moneys are there or not. It is clearly the duty of the Auditor-General before he countersigns the "instrument" mentioned in section 11 of the Audit Act, to ascertain in accordance with section 12 that the sums mentioned in such instrument are "legally available for, and applicable to the service or purpose mentioned in such instrument," but the difficulty arises as to what is the meaning of the words "legally available." It is to be noted that the words are not legally, and in fact available, for the amount to the credit of the "Public Account" may vary from day to day. We are of opinion that, so far as the "Public Account" consists

of

of moneys from the Consolidated Revenue Fund or the Trust Fund, there is nothing in section 12 of the Audit Act requiring that the account should be in credit to the amount of the warrants before the Auditor-General countersigns under the said section the "instrument" referred to. It seems to us that all the Auditor-General has to ascertain is that the sums mentioned in the "instrument" are legally available—that is, that the particular expenditure has been duly authorised by the Appropriation Act, or by some special Act, and that such sums are properly applicable to the particular purpose or source mentioned in the instrument. Whether the account is in credit or not at the time the "instrument" is countersigned by the Auditor-General is, in our opinion, immaterial as regards the Auditor-General's duty. In other words, we think that as to this matter the contention of the Treasury is in law substantially the correct one.

2. As to this we concur in [the view of the Auditor-General; but there is really no difference of opinion between the Treasurer and the Auditor-General.

3. Our answer as to 1 answers this.

4. As to the difference between the Auditor-General and the Treasury with regard to the General Loan Account, the matter depends upon the proper construction of the language of the Loan Acts. By section 3 of the Loan Funds Amalgamation Act of 1879, "All sums of money *borrowed* under the authority of any of the Acts specified in the Schedule hereto, and not already applied for or towards the purposes to which such sums were directed to be respectively applied by such Act, may be applied for or towards the purpose of any Loan service, whether specified in any of the said Acts, or in any special Acts hereafter to be passed, in such manner and in such proportions as the Governor, may by Warrant under his hand addressed to the Colonial Treasurer from time to time order and direct." In order that the Act shall apply at all, there must be sums of money *borrowed*, &c., and it only applies to sums of money borrowed. The Act cannot therefore apply to any sums which have not been borrowed in fact; and unless the moneys have been borrowed in fact under some or one of the Acts specified, then, in our opinion, the money is not legally available. In other words, the only moneys legally available are the moneys to the credit of the General Loan Account. We are therefore of opinion that the contention of the Auditor-General is correct, and there must be a credit balance of moneys borrowed under the authority of the Acts mentioned before the money is legally available, and before the Governor is justified in issuing his warrant; and we think it is the duty of the Auditor-General to withhold his certificate that the moneys are legally available unless there are borrowed moneys in hand to the credit of such Loan Account.

5. We are of opinion that the Loan Acts, 59 Victoria No. 6 and 60 Victoria No. 32, incorporate the provisions of the Loan Funds Amalgamation Act of 1879, and that under section 3 of the last-mentioned Act, provision is made for the issue of a Governor's Warrant. It is true that the provisions of the various Loan Acts make no reference in any way to the Audit Act of 1870; but as the moneys borrowed under the various Loan Acts would be "moneys received into the Treasury," we think, in the public interest, that these words in section 10 of the Audit Act should be construed to include these loan moneys; and thus the provisions of the Audit Act are applicable to these loan moneys; and we think the Auditor-General is bound to give a certificate of availability, but only under the same conditions as in No. 4 alone—that is to say, when there is a credit cash balance of loan money available for loan services.

6 and 7. We have already dealt with these with reference to the various funds.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR AND EXECUTIVE COUNCIL,—

The Trustees of the Australian Museum have the honour to submit to Your Excellency their Forty-fourth Annual Report.

1. There have not been any changes in the membership of the Board during the year.

2. The Museum continued open to visitors during the usual hours, viz., from 2 to 5 p.m. on Sundays and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on all week-days, except Mondays, which were reserved for cleaning purposes. On Monday afternoons the collections have, as usual, been accessible to students and schools for teaching purposes, on application being made to the Curator. The total number of visitors recorded is shown in Appendix VI, and shows an increase of 5,049 over the year 1896. The average was 341 on week-days (316 the previous year) and 634 on Sundays (663 the previous year).

3. Although the funds available for the purpose are very limited the Trustees have made some useful and interesting acquisitions by purchase. The most noticeable are:—The “Mt. Stirling Meteorite,” a mass of meteoric iron weighing over 200 lb., found in Western Australia. A very valuable collection of Opalised Reptilian remains from White Cliffs. The Minister for Public Instruction shared in this purchase, and, after the Reptilian remains had been selected out, a proportion of the collection was handed to the Technological Museum as specimens of Opal. A description of the remains, by the Curator, has been published in Australian Museum Records, Vol. III, No. 2, page 19. A specimen of the very rare Golden-winged Parakeet (*Psephotus chrysopterygius*) and some eggs of the Jabiru (*Xenoryhynchus asiaticus*).

4. No fully organised collecting expeditions have been despatched, as the Trustees had not sufficient available funds for this purpose, but a few short trips were made by members of the staff, partly at their own expense. The most important of these was made possible through the kindness of Mr. Septimus Robinson, who invited the Trustees to send a collector to Buckingham Station, for a fortnight, and gave him every assistance and generous hospitality, the only expense to the Trustees being the railway fares and the preserving material. A number of much needed specimens was obtained in this way, and the thanks of the Trustees are due to Mr. Robinson for his assistance. A very great need on the Museum staff is that of a trained collector. The stock of duplicate specimens is very low, and it is difficult to replenish the exhibited collections as required, and impossible to deal fully with other Museums in the way of exchange. At present the funds at the disposal of the Trustees will not permit of such an appointment being made, and this is the more to be regretted when it is seen that Museums and Institutions in other countries are sending their collectors to Australia and taking the best specimens out of the country, so that Australian types are largely located in London Norway, &c.

5. A selection of the New South Wales Marbles, prepared by Mr. W. Roberts, of Bathurst, and lent by the Government Architect, has now been presented by the Hon. the Secretary for Public Works, and placed permanently in the Museum. Other interesting presentations were:—A Zebu, from the New South Wales Zoological Society; Queensland Gold Ores, from Mr. R. L. Jack, Government Geologist, Brisbane; British New Guinea Ethnological specimens, from His Excellency Sir Wm. MacGregor; Coins and Medals, from the Governments of Great Britain, India, Ceylon, and Belgium; Books, from the British Government, through the kind intervention of the Agent-General.

6. In 1895 a sum of £6,000 was voted by Parliament for an extension of the Museum buildings in the form of a new stone-built Spirit-House, and a range of workshops for the Taxidermist, Articulator, &c. Work was commenced in 1896, and completed during the year 1897. A full description of the new buildings will be found in the Curator's Report (*Appendix No. I*). These buildings have been carried out in accordance with the original design of the Museum, and will fall into place in the completed structure. They do not, however, give any additional space for exhibit of specimens to the public, and there is urgent want of more accommodation of this nature. Almost every available foot of space in the existing buildings is now occupied with cases or specimens. A sum of £1,500 has been voted by Parliament on the Loan Estimates, 1897-98, for certain much needed repairs, and a proposal for the extension of the Museum proper is now under consideration.

7. There has been no change in the personnel of the scientific staff. It is with much regret that the Trustees have to announce the retirement, owing to ill-health, of Mr. H. Barnes, Articulator, Modeller, and Photographer, who has been in the employment of the Museum since 1860. Mr. Barnes was an excellent workman, and most of the specimens of skeletons, at present on exhibit, stand as a lasting monument to his skill. His place has been filled by the promotion of his son, who was trained under him.* The dimensions of the Museum and the amount of work carried on for the public benefit are fast outgrowing the ability of the present staff to cope with, and there is urgent need for means to appoint more attendants and assistants. Compared with other Institutions and Museums in this and in the neighbouring Colonies, the salaries paid to the officers and assistants in the Australian Museum are much below the average.

8. For some time past Mr. J. D. Ogilby has been engaged in writing, for the Government of New South Wales, a Descriptive Catalogue of the Fishes of Australia, which is a work involving a considerable amount of original research, and will, when complete, be most valuable. In the beginning of 1897 the Government requested the Trustees to undertake the supervision of the work. This was acceded to, and the work has steadily progressed.

9. The publications which have been issued during the year 1897 are:—Records of the Australian Museum, Vol. III, Nos. 1 and 2. Memoirs, Vol. III (On Funafuti Atoll), Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5. A second edition of Catalogue IV (Australian Birds, by E. P. Ramsay) parts 1 and 2, revised by A. J. North, is in the press.

APPENDIX I.

CURATOR'S REPORT FOR 1897.

[“The Public Museum is a necessity in every highly-civilized Community.”—G. BROWN GOODE, LL.D.]

To the Trustees of the Australian Museum,—
Gentlemen,

Sydney, January, 1898.

I have the honour to hand you the following Report dealing with the work of the Australian Museum during the past year, and on the condition of the Collections in your charge:—

1. *General Condition.*—This continues to be satisfactory on the whole, but might be made still more so, were it not for causes to be explained hereafter. If the general acquisition of material be accepted as a sign of progress, then the year 1897 may be regarded as a most successful one, for it has been prolific in acquisitions, particularly in the form of presentations. I am happy to be able to state that no further ravages by Termites were discovered.

2. *Fire Appliances.*—During last year the charge of these appliances was again resumed by the Metropolitan Fire Brigade. A new hydrant with gear was fixed contiguous to the new Workshops, tested by the Brigade and found to be efficient. You were pleased to adopt a suggestion of mine that a fire-alarm bell should be erected; this will be carried out during the current year.

3. *Staff Duties, &c.*—It is almost needless to say that the general attention of the whole Staff to their duties was most satisfactory.

After several serious attacks of illness, Attendant F. Kippax, who acted as Printer, died on 23rd September.

Mr. John Jennings having completed his engagement retired in June.

It is with feelings of the greatest regret that I have to announce the retirement, from failing health, of Mr. Henry Barnes, who, for the past thirty-eight years, had acted as Articulator, Photographer, and Formator to this Museum. His retirement practically took place in October, and, in consequence, a rearrangement of duties in the Articulator's shop became necessary. I accordingly recommended to you that Mr. Henry Barnes, Junr., who had been trained under his father, be promoted to succeed him, and that Mr. A. R. Taylor be taken on as a probationer, in place of the former, and to acquire a knowledge of the work. He has since been appointed. It will be long ere Henry Barnes' loss to the Museum is repaired, his acknowledged mechanical skill being in no way inferior to his acquirements as an Osteologist. The many excellent preparations by him, displayed in our cases, will always stand as a monument to his memory.

Early in the year Mr. Robert Long was transferred from the position of Senior Night-watchman to that of Junior Attendant; J. W. Pidgeon was promoted to the vacated position, and Edward Francis was transferred from a temporary attendantship to take the place vacated by J. W. Pidgeon. As time went on, however, circumstances occurred that rendered it necessary to make a radical alteration in our system of night-watching, and in consequence Messrs. Pidgeon and Francis retired, and late-Constable J. T. Knopp was appointed to perform the whole duty, with some assistance from other members of the Staff.

In September, Mr. J. W. Woodhead was appointed as Printer, and we thus gained a trained compositor for this work.

For a long time a labourer for general work, particularly outside the building, had been a great desideratum, and with the extension of the premises became even more so of late. By a partial rearrangement of funds this became possible towards the close of the year, and Mr. A. Barnes was so appointed.

The necessary funds having been voted by Parliament, an additional Attendant will be appointed to take the place of Attendant Robert Grant, whose transfer to the Taxidermist's shop you have already sanctioned; for such duties he is eminently fitted.

Notwithstanding these additions to the Staff, I can do no less than reiterate my remarks of last year's Report, in which I refer to the under-manned condition of the Museum generally, and the inadequate remuneration of many members of the Staff. It requires no demonstration to prove that as the collection increases at the rate, that under your control it has been doing for the last few years, a proportionate increase is needed amongst those who are charged with its care, for I may at once state that during 1897 no less than 11,099 specimens were added.

The transfer of the mechanics from the old to the new workshops, together with plant, naturally interfered for a time with the work carried on by them, but all have now settled down in the new rooms, and work is progressing as satisfactorily as usual. I have every reason to believe that the change is much appreciated.

4. *Care of the Collections.*—I am again in a position to report that the Collection, both exhibited and in store, is in an excellent condition, although I was obliged to place the care of the whole of the Ethnology in the already over-taxed hands of the Taxidermist and Attendant Grant. In this section alone there is room for the undivided attention of two pair of hands, for it is the most difficult portion of the Museum's contents to keep in a clean and healthy state.

5. *Space.*—The central portion of the Upper Main Hall is cased to its utmost capacity. As foreshadowed in the Report for 1896, an appropriation was obtained for the casing of the uppermost narrow gallery. A portion of this sum only can be so applied, and the work thus far will be completed this year. Other than this no space exists, as matters are now arranged throughout the Museum, with the exception of three small rooms on the ground floor, contiguous to the Ethnological Hall, and previously used as workrooms. After slight alteration these will be fitted up, two for Numismatics, and the third for that portion of the Ethnological Collection of an erotic nature, to be kept under lock and key, for the use of Students only.

6. *Structural Matters.*—The new Workshops and Spirit-house, for which a vote of £6,000 was taken on the 1895-6 Loan Estimates, were commenced at the close of 1896, and completed in December of last year. They are a source of the greatest possible comfort to the mechanics, and, through the consequent removal of the old wooden sheds, of safety to the Museum generally; they form a part of the
basement

basement of the contemplated new south wing. These shops, six in number, are comprised in a stone building 102 feet long by 51½ feet deep, with an internal height between floor and ceiling of 15½ feet. The Carpenter's, Taxidermist's, and Articulator's shops are each 45 ft. x 18 ft.; the Formator's, 18½ feet square; the Printer's, 17 ft. x 10 ft.; whilst a fine large room for skinning and fleshing purposes measures 37 ft. x 30 ft. The various rooms open into one another by doors of communication as well as possess external approaches. Two, the Fleshing and Formator's rooms, are provided with granolithic floors, with appliances for flushing out. Each shop is fitted with fixed presses, cupboards, drawers, shelving, and bins, and the sinks are of slate. The girders are so arranged as to carry travelling gear for the suspension of heavy work. The ceiling in the case of the shops, and the roof in that of the Spirit-house, are composed of "Traegerioellbleck," a German patent, surmounted by from eighteen inches to two feet of coke-concrete, the shops having one general temporary roof of galvanised iron and wood. At the west end of the building is a small lean-to shed containing two coppers for heating water, &c., and a small crematorium for the destruction of offal. Contiguous is also erected a new and improved macerating tank under cover, 15 ft. x 4 ft., that, by an ingenious mechanical contrivance, can either be used as a whole, or as two, three, or four tanks, independently of one another; the waste-plugs are protected by wire netting, and the lids are self-acting.

The new Spirit-house is a one-storied stone building, 49½ ft. x 30 ft., and is surrounded by an open area, cutting it off from communication with the main building. It stands in what will be, at some future date, a portion of the Museum quadrangle. The floor is of granolithic, with exceptionally good drainage. It is ventilated by two fanlights and two ventilators in the roof. The interior is occupied by glazed cases between the windows and open shelving over the floor. Attached are two small rooms, one a workroom with slate sink, the other for the reception of spirit in bulk. The Contractor was Mr. Robert Wall, of Newtown.

The Chemical Laboratory, &c., with new fittings, is temporarily accommodated in the half of a galvanised and wood-lined shed that was formerly used as a workshop; the other half has been fitted up as a workroom for myself.

On the Loan Estimates for 1897-8 the sum of £1,500 was placed, to be expended chiefly in repairs to the existing building, some of which are referred to in my last year's Report. At my suggestion you sanctioned an application being made to the Department for Public Works for the erection of a Flagstaff on the roof of the main building, but an opportunity has not yet arisen to have this carried out.

7. *New Cases.*—It was decided early in the year to devote the larger portion of the case money to the erection of wall-cases around the centre of the Upper Main Hall for the reception of the Reptilia. These were accordingly made and fixed by Messrs. T. Jones & Co.

The following separate cases and cabinets were also provided:—(1) new Ornithological cabinet; (2) cabinet for the reference cards of the Zurich Bibliographical Council; (3) separate floor-case for a bower of Newton's Bower-bird (*Prionodura newtoniana*); (4) frame for a large silicious breccia slab placed on the staircase at the entrance to the Mineral Gallery; (5) frames for the collection of New South Wales marbles; and (6) three stands for small table-cases in stock.

The whole of the Osteological and Ethnological wall-cases were internally painted and renovated by our Carpenters.

The balustrade cases in the Invertebrate Gallery still remain without new locks, as reported last year.

8. *Collecting and Field Work.*—During the earlier summer months Messrs. North and Thorpe, during their vacations, visited the neighbourhood of Narrabri and Moree for Ornithological purposes, and made a good collection. Mr. Charles Hedley also passed his vacation in New Caledonia, where he procured a fine set of Mollusca and Ethnological objects that he generously presented to the Museum.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Septimus Robinson, I was able to send Attendant R. Grant to Buckinguy Station, Narra Creek, in June last to collect Emus, our stock of skins having run out. He was also successful in obtaining a number of other specimens.

In July I visited Brisbane to attend the Queensland International Exhibition, and succeeded in obtaining a fine set of Queensland gold ores from the Mineral Court, through the kindness of Mr. R. L. Jack, the Government Geologist. I also took the opportunity of visiting the Ipswich Coal-field, and, with the assistance of Messrs. Shirley and Simmonds, collected a good series of the plants of those measures.

During October I passed a fortnight at Port Stephens, and took some trouble to ascertain its zoological capabilities. The casual collecting I was able to accomplish led me to form a highly favourable opinion of this inlet as a dredging-ground.

I feel it my duty to again call your attention to the disadvantage the Museum labours under through the want of a permanent trained Collector, and a sufficient allowance to enable such an officer to investigate many of the interesting problems still awaiting solution. This is the more to be regretted when we find a sister institution, not directly concerned in systematic science, the Technological Museum, in a position to do so, and Museums in other lands engaging Australian collectors.

9. *Exchanges.*—The principal Exchanges effected during the year were:—West Australian Birds and Mammals from the Perth Museum, and to that institution a copy of the Nocolche Meteorite; Minerals to and from the Musée Colonial at Noumea; co-types of some of the Crustacea collected by the Challenger Expedition from the British Museum; Gobioid and Blennoid Fish from the U.S. National Museum; Volcanic rocks from, and birds to the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Honolulu; Reptiles to, and from (particularly Chelonians) Mr. Julius Hurter, of St. Louis, U.S.A.; a specimen of *Pseudocarcinus gigas* from the Tasmanian Museum; bones of *Genyornis newtoni* from the South Australian Museum; Tahitian Insects from Mr. E. Thouveny; an example of *Pseudochirus dahli* from Professor R. Collett, and *Myrmecobius*, &c., in return; and European Mammals from the Royal Museum of Vertebrate Zoology in Florence.

A number of old exchanges were found to be unadjusted in favour of the Australian Museum—for instance, with the Tasmanian and British Museums and the Zoological Society of London. By your authority I took steps to reduce these, and am glad to say that the last-named body has responded with the most satisfactory results to us.

10. *Presentations.*—As already pointed out, 1897 was most prolific in presents, amongst the more important being:—Current Coinage of Belgium, Ceylon, and India, by the respective Governments of those countries; Gold ores, &c., from Mount Morgan, by the Mount Morgan Gold-mining Company (Limited);

(Limited); New South Wales marbles, by the Hon. the Secretary for Public Works; Ceremonial Drum from Efate, New Hebrides, by Mr. P. G. Black; Smothering-cap, made of spider silk from the New Hebrides, by Dr. J. C. Cox; Zebu (*Bos indicus*) in the flesh from the New South Wales Zoological Society; Funafuti Pigeon (*Globicera pacifica*), by Messrs. Poole and Woolnough; New Caledonian Ethnology, by Mr. C. Hedley; Type nest of the Queen Victoria Rifle-bird's (*Ptilorhis victoria*) nest, by Mr. D. Le Souef; Queensland Gold-ores, by Mr. R. L. Jack; and Ethnology from British New Guinea, by His Excellency Sir William Macgregor, M.D., &c.

11. *Purchases*.—Although few purchases were made during 1897, the specimens so obtained were highly important, the principal being:—Mount Stirling Meteorite, a mass of iron weighing over 200 lb.; a rare Parrakeet (*Psephotus chrysopterygius*); Eggs of the Jabiru (*Xenorhynchus asiaticus*); Skin and Eggs of a Mound Builder (*Megapodius pritchardi*) from Niuafoou; examples of Newton's Bower-bird (*Prionodura newtoniana*); and the opalised remains of a Mesozoic Reptile (*Cimoliosaurus leucoscopelus*).

12. *Publications*.—A very important work was issued under your auspices, the Zoology of Funafuti Atoll, based on collections made by Mr. C. Hedley in 1896, being Memoir No. III of the Museum Series. Part 1 was published on 21st December, 1896, Part 2 on 25th February, 1897, Part 3 on 12th July, Part 4 on 27th September, Part 5 on 17th November, whilst Part 6 is now in the press, and the concluding portion, Part 7, is in hand.

Two parts of the Museum Records were published, being Parts 2 and 3 of Vol. III.

In May, Mr. North completed the MS. of the new edition of Parts 1 and 2 (Accipitres and Striges) of Dr. E. P. Ramsay's "Catalogue of Birds in the Australian Museum."

The second part of Mr. North's "Insectivorous Birds," prepared by desire of the Honorable the Secretary for Mines and Agriculture, appeared in the *Agricultural Gazette* (January, 1897), and reflected great credit on the writer. It is to be deplored that the remaining parts should be so long delayed, the M.S. having been in the hands of the Department of Agriculture for three years.

13. *Information Disseminated*.—Numbers of visitors interested in Zoology were afforded access to the Collections, particularly the Insects; additional Birds in captivity at the Botanical Gardens were identified by Mr. North; a collection of Shells was named by Mr. Hedley for the Technological Museum; a collection of Minerals and Fossils was sent to the Presbyterian Ladies' College at Croydon (New South Wales) for educational purposes; and a series of Rocks and Minerals was transferred to the Technical College for the use of students.

The Scientific Staff generally also revised the article on New South Wales Zoology for the new edition of Coghlan's "Wealth and Progress," at the desire of the Government Statistician.

A full return under this head will be found in Appendix X.

14. *Spirit Collection*.—The new detached house for the reception of the collections in spirit was handed over by the contractor (Mr. R. Wall) at the close of the year, and the transfer of specimens will form one of the conspicuous features of the work in 1898.

15. *Taxidermist* (Mr. J. A. Thorpe).—The Taxidermist was employed on and off for four months assisting me to replace the Ethnological Collection, thus naturally interfering with his more appropriate duties. Notwithstanding this, twelve Mammals were mounted, thirty-two skins made up, and two groups prepared; twenty Birds were mounted, three hundred and seven skins made up, and eight groups prepared; eighty-one Reptiles mounted and twenty groups prepared; and two Fish were mounted. The whole of the skin collections were in charge of the Taxidermist, assisted by Attendant Grant, throughout the year, and for a large portion of it the Ethnology also.

16. *Articulators* (Messrs. H. Barnes and H. Barnes, Junr.).—Work was to some extent interfered with through the failing health of Mr. H. Barnes, but, notwithstanding this, several valuable preparations were added, the principal being the skeleton of a Galapagos Tortoise (*Testudo nigrita*). The skeletons of twelve Mammals were mounted, and seven prepared; fourteen Birds mounted, and thirteen prepared; and three Reptiles mounted.

17. *Formatori* (Messrs. H. Barnes and H. Barnes, Junr.).—A decided advance on the work of last year was made, twenty-three moulds having been made, and sixty-seven casts or reproductions taken, many of them subsequently coloured. The more important were the Mount Stirling Meteorite from West Australia; the two Mungindie Meteorites (for the Department of Mines and Agriculture); the carapace and plastron of *Testudo nigrita*; and several Ichthyopterygian remains from the Queensland Cretaceous.

18. *Photographers* (Messrs. H. Barnes and H. Barnes, Junr.).—Photographic work was suspended for some considerable time last year through the demolition of the Studio, and in consequence the results do not compare favourably with those of the year previous. Forty-one negatives were taken, and one hundred and fifteen prints prepared.

19. *Carpenters* (Messrs. R. Barnes and B. Lucas).—The Carpenters were again kept fully employed, chiefly in the preparation of stands, tablets, &c., for the display of specimens, 1,321 stands and 189 tablets having been made, many of the former of large size. This is the largest number ever prepared here in one year. Special cases for the Nocoleche Meteorite and for a group of Bandicoots were made, and the usual amount of odd repairs effected, particularly the painting of the whole of the Osteological and Ethnological wall-cases. Amongst other duties the Carpenters had the entire supervision of the fire appliances for a portion of the year, and still have depending on them the keeping in order of all locks, and the examination of the whole of the roofs and other structures for the detection of Termites.

20. *Smiths* (Messrs. B. Lucas and R. Barnes).—This branch of work, inaugurated in 1896, was steadily continued when required.

21. *Printer* (Attendant F. Kippax and Mr. J. W. Woodhead).—Our label printing was much interfered with through the death of F. Kippax. The labels printed were distributed as follows:—Mammalia, 320; Reptilia, 149; Osteology, 200; Aves, 105; Insecta, &c., 581; Ethnology, 332; Mineralogy, 262; Palæontology, 262; Library, 170; and general purposes, 416. Total, 2,797 labels.

22. *Mammalia*.—The entire space that can be devoted to this class being now occupied no additions to speak of were made, but the permanent labelling has progressed, leaving only the Rodents and Marsupials for it to be complete. I never contemplate the portion of the Main Hall at present set apart for the reception of the Mammalia without bitterly regretting the inadequate space allowed to this important class, particularly when the large number of valuable skins we hold in store is borne in mind.

A case was set apart and filled with specimens representing the means of attack and defence in vogue throughout the Animal Kingdom, and explanatory labels provided.

Contiguous

Contiguous to the wall-case containing the Macropodidæ was placed a fine slab of limestone from Jenolan, exhibiting a highly-polished surface arising from friction caused by the passing and repassing of Rock Wallabies. For this slab the Museum is indebted to the Hon. the Secretary for Mines and Agriculture.

With the kind assistance of the Hon. the Secretary for Lands, I obtained examples of the acclimatised Rabbit from five of the chief infested areas as a means of reference in the future.

A small group, consisting of a female Long-nosed Bandicoot (*Perameles nasuta*) and young was added, and the collection has otherwise been enriched by further examples of *Myrmecobius* from West Australia; additional specimens of *Dendrolagus benettianus* and *Hyppiprimnodon moschatus* from Queensland; *Pseudochirus dahlui* from North Australia; and sundry other Mammals received in exchange from Prof. H. H. Giglioli, Royal Zoological Museum of Florence.

23. *Aves*.—A large amount of Mr. North's time was devoted, in the first instance, to completing the second edition of Ramsay's Catalogue of Australian Birds, parts 1 and 2, as already mentioned, and to the registration of large acquisitions in Ethnology. The latter occupation has very much interfered with the more legitimate work of revising the nomenclature of the exhibited Birds, which has for some time engaged his attention. I have already expressed the opinion that Mr. North should be relieved of Ethnological duties.

The cabinet collection of Australian Birds' Eggs was arranged as far as time would permit, but I regret to say that our possessions in this line are far from what they should be; in fact, there is ample scope for the energies of a good collector in this one branch alone.

By an exchange with the Perth Museum, we obtained an example of the West Australian Emu (*Dromaius irroratus*) that our collection lacked. It also enabled Mr. North to satisfy himself that the specific differences between it and the ordinary *D. novæ-hollandiæ* are valid.

Until recently, the eggs of the Jabiru (*Xenorhynchus asiaticus*) were unrepresented in our cabinet; a clutch was obtained by purchase. Another purchase of an important nature was a specimen of the rare Mound-builder (*Megapodius pritchardi*) and its eggs, from Niuafoou Island. Equally interesting was a living example of the Golden-winged Parrakeet (*Psephotus chrysopterygius*) from Port Darwin, only three other examples of which are believed to be known.

Messrs. Poole and Woolnough presented a specimen of the Pigeon (*Globicera pacifica*) frequenting Funafuti Atoll. The acquisition of this bird again settles a debatable point.

Eight nest-groups were mounted and placed in the cases.

24. *Reptilia and Batrachia*.—These sections show the greatest advance of any, for, in fact, they were reduced from a state of chaos to one of comparative order, still a large amount of work remains to be done. A new departure was inaugurated by the setting up of a series of groups of Lizards, with natural surroundings, to correspond with those of the Birds and their nests. The Taxidermist so prepared twenty groups, which will be further augmented during the current year. Small maps of the world, illustrative of the distribution of Reptilian families, were also added to the cases.

The skin of the Galapagos Tortoise (*Testudo nigrita*), by the aid of a plaster shell, was successfully mounted. This tortoise came to Sydney in the American whaler "Winslow," in 1853, and then weighed 56 lb., it had increased to 368 lb. just previous to its death, which took place at Gladesville Hospital at the end of 1896.

An important exchange was effected with Mr. Julius Hurter, of St. Louis, U.S.A., by which we were advantageously able to increase our Chelonians in particular.

25. *Pisces*.—Beyond the ordinary routine work of identification and registration, little was accomplished in this section, nor is it my intention to do so until the Reptilia and Batrachia have been pushed forward as far as possible. When that portion of the new cases now in course of erection in the uppermost gallery is completed, space will be available for the systematic arrangement of the Fish.

A collection of Gobioid and Blennoid fishes was received from the United States National Museum through Mr. J. Douglas Ogilby.

26. *Osteology*.—The rearrangement of the Skeletons was continued during 1897, and the Marsupialia and Monotremata completed. The final disposition of the Bird, Reptile, and Fish osteological preparations is held over for the present. The remainder of the M.S. labels were removed, and the whole series of skeletons now has well printed labels attached.

The skeleton of the Galapagos Tortoise (*Testudo nigrita*) was added, complete with both carapace and plastron, the former opened to show the anchylosis of the vertebral column.

Attention was also given to finally classifying the Osteological stores, and the nucleus of a comparative series of disarticulated bones commenced.

27. *Insecta, Myriapoda, and Arachnida*.—The large amount of work accomplished during 1897 in these sections is very gratifying, and amply justifies the favourable impression I had formed of Mr. Rainbow's capabilities to bring our Entomology into something like the order it was left in some years ago by Mr. George Masters, now Curator of the Macleay Museum. The renovation of the exhibited Coleoptera was fully carried out, and these are now in course of being supplied with printed labels; the whole of the exotic Lepidoptera was similarly treated, and many new specimens added.

The additions to the Insecta, &c., generally, were again large last year, 1,533 specimens, although not nearly so large as in 1896.

I have increased Mr. Rainbow's working space by handing over to him, as a cabinet-room, that next to his study, which will facilitate his work.

During the present year the transfer of the specimens in spirit to the new Spirit House will enable Mr. Rainbow to familiarise himself with the large stores of this description possessed by the Museum, and will further set our duplicates for exchange on a much better footing.

28. *Mollusca*.—In consequence of work in connection with the Funafuti Memoir, Mr. Hedley gave comparatively little attention to Conchological matters, but his notes on the Mollusca, now in hand, will terminate his work in connection with that interesting Atoll. Very much yet remains to be done before our Shells can be said to be in as satisfactory state as some other sections. This is due, in the first place, to the neglected state of the collection during former years, previous to its coming into Mr. Hedley's hands, and now to the limited space available for display, and particularly the want of additional storage cabinets in which supplementary specimens can be systematically arranged.

Some highly important additions were made during 1897 in the form of shells from New Caledonia, presented by Messrs. Rossiter and Hedley, and from the Loyalty Islands by the Rev. J. Hadfield. The named Chitonidæ, obtained from Mr. W. T. Bednall, will prove of great service in the determination of those of our own coast.

29. *Invertebrata (exclusive of Insecta, &c., and Mollusca)*.—Mr. Whitelegge's duties, from a Curatorial point of view, were much restricted by the large share he took in the working out of the Funafuti material. As will be seen from his Report, this comprised five extensive papers on the Sponges, Alcyonaria, Madreporaria, Echinodermata, and Crustacea.

Mr. Whitelegge's study was always found to be inconveniently small, so with the view of affording him greater space, I had the partition between his and the next room removed, and the two thrown into one, with manifest advantage.

A large example of *Pseudocarcinus gigas* was received from the Tasmanian Museum, but we have a larger. A series of Challenger Expedition co-types of common Invertebrata was received from the British Museum.

30. *Ethnology and Anthropology*.—More extensive additions were made to this section during 1897 than to any other.

The Ethnological Hall was reopened on 23rd February, and the galleries attached on 16th March, after being closed for six months, but the arrangement of the collection was not finally completed until May, having taken a specially engaged Assistant, two other hands, and myself, six months close application to accomplish it. Every specimen was removed, thoroughly cleaned, and either mounted on a stand, or so hung in the cases as to be capable of rapid removal, and clearly visible to the public.

A very important subject occupied much of my attention last year. It is well known that nearly all, if not all of the Aboriginal Tribes scar or scarify themselves over some portion or other of the body, such as the chest, arms, back, or abdomen, as the case may be. It is most essential from an Anthropological point of view that what can be accomplished at this late date should be done to obtain some record of this tribal scarification by means of plaster reproductions. It is hopeless to think of this either in New South Wales or Victoria; on the other hand, a good deal might be accomplished in Queensland, Central and North Australia, and West Australia, but, as usual, the ever-recurring question of cost presents itself as a stumbling block. So far as Queensland was concerned, I sought to bring about a satisfactory result commercially, but unfortunately those engaged in Formatori work were debarred from taking the matter up through lack of funds. The only chance I saw was through the Queensland Government, and, therefore, suggested that you should lay the importance of this work before that body by the favour of our own authorities. Although you offered a contribution from your own funds, I regret to say it was not met in an equally liberal manner in Brisbane, and the project for the time being fell through.

It is my intention to distribute throughout the various sections of the Museum, labels giving a brief explanation of the branch of science therein represented. So far, I have only yet been able to prepare one—that descriptive of Anthropology, which has been placed at the entrance of the Ethnological Hall.

The acquisitions during last year are almost too numerous to mention, but the following are some of the more important:—Sir William MacGregor's contribution from his official New Guinea Collection, numbered 949 specimens; a large ceremonial or sacred "drum," from Efate or Sandwich Island, New Hebrides, presented by Mr. P. G. Black, measuring 8 feet high, and 4 feet in circumference: these so-called drums are implanted in the ground, hidden more or less in groves of trees, but little seems to be known as to their precise meaning and use. Similar drums are used in New Britain, where they are called *garamoot*, and are hollowed from the trunk of a tree, it is said, by continually dropping red-hot stones into the interior through a slit on the side. The drum is struck with a stick below the long aperture, producing a deep note that can be heard for a long distance; a remarkably fine Fishing (?) Spear, from Santa Cruz, New Hebrides, obtained by exchange, 11 feet long, and headed with four prongs, each 4 feet 6 inches in addition; a curious "idol," from New Caledonia, presented by Captain Offret, cut from a tree-fern stem, and of large proportions; a cooking pot in red clay from North Santo, New Hebrides, presented by Mr. N. Hardy; a so-called "smothering cap" made of the glutenous threads of an Orb-weaving Spider, presented by Dr. J. C. Cox: these threads are matted together by passing a framework under and over the webs as the latter are extended *in situ* in the bush, the cap so formed being then peeled off, it is asserted that these are used for smothering adulterous women; a large series of articles from New Caledonia, presented by and through Mr. Hedley: particularly noticeable amongst these were earthenware cooking-pots, and delicate strings of coloured shell money, the latter presented by the Messrs. A. O. and J. Henry.

Additions still continue to be made from time to time to the combined Ethno-Botanical, Mineralogical, and Zoological Collection.

31. *Historical*.—Five additional and interesting old documents were framed and suspended in the Ethnological Hall, viz.—Two reprints of the "Times," one of 7th November, 1805, giving an account of Nelson's victory at Trafalgar, the other of 22nd June, 1815, containing the announcement of the Duke of Wellington's success at Waterloo. The others are, the first Bulletin issued after the attempted assassination of the Duke of Edinburgh, signed by James Young, M.D., R.N., 12th March, 1868; a copy of the Western Australian Gazette of 1st June, 1830, in M.S., published by J. A. Gardner, Fremantle; and a Supplementary Sydney Gazette of 19th April, 1822.

From the Technological College we received a copy of the Cook Tablet, let into the cliff face at Botany, South Head, the original landing-place of the great circumnavigator and his companion Banks, to commemorate the event. This tablet bears the following inscription:—

"A.D. MDCCLXX.—Under the auspices of British Science, these shores were discovered by James Cook, and Joseph Banks, the Columbus and Mæcenas of their time. This spot once saw them ardent in the pursuit of science, now, to their memory this Tablet is inscribed in the first year of the Philosophical Society of Australasia, Sir Thomas Brisbane, K.C.B., F.R.S., L. and E., Corresponding Member of the Institute of France, President—A.D. MDCCCXXI."

This Tablet is accompanied with an enlarged photograph of the spot in question.

32. *Numismatical*.—This section was greatly increased by the addition of certain current coinages; viz., Indian, Belgian, and Ceylon; British War medals; British-Indian Military stars; and medals from the Public Schools Athletic Association of New South Wales, struck to commemorate Her Majesty's Jubilee of 1897.

I hope this year to set apart two suitable rooms for this important branch of Ethnology.

33. *Mineralogy and Chemistry*.—The Nocolche Meteorite, entrusted to Prof. Henry A. Ward, of Rochester, New York State, to be cut and etched, was returned in March last, the work having been performed in a highly satisfactory manner. The meteorite has since been made the subject of an interesting paper by Dr. Cooksey, who supplemented his remarks, at my suggestion, by a Catalogue of the known Australian

Australian Meteorites, and a Bibliography of the literature relating to the same. The Mount Stirling Meteorite is now in Professor Ward's hands to undergo similar treatment, and on its return will be described by Dr. Cooksey.

The principal additions made during the year comprised Queensland Gold-ores to the number of one hundred and twenty-nine specimens; polished slabs of New South Wales marbles (referred to in the 1896 Report), all of Palæozoic age, and prepared by Mr. W. Roberts, District Inspector of Works at Bathurst, to the number of one hundred and forty-nine. Until Mr. Roberts commenced his experiments, it was but little known that New South Wales could produce such a remarkably fine series of economic and ornamental stones, a display that is well worth the attention of all architects and builders; a large polished table-top made of a silicious breccia was placed on the wall of the passage leading to the Mineral Gallery, whilst contiguous to it is a geological model of New Zealand prepared by Sir James Hector, M.D., F.R.S., that gives a very fair idea of the surface geology of that Colony.

It is to be regretted that additions to our fine and valuable systematic collection of minerals do not flow in more rapidly; I again call the attention of our mineralogical friends to this want.

34. *Palæontology*.—The large specimens exhibited in the wall cases were increased by seventy-six, and the printed labels of the whole completed. No tabletted specimens were added in consequence of the want of a mechanical assistant. It is a matter of great personal regret that I am so hampered for space in connection with our collection of fossils; were it not for these two causes the collection as a general one could be made exceedingly fine.

A special case was set apart for the reception of skulls and mandibles of *Thylacoleo*.

When in Brisbane I made arrangements with Mr. C. W. de Vis, M.A., Curator of the Queensland Museum, which you were afterwards pleased to approve, that he should have placed in his hands the whole of our extinct Marsupial and Monotreme remains, for examination and description. The Diprotodontidæ and Nototheriidæ were accordingly forwarded, and have since been returned. He now has the Peramelidæ. I need hardly remark that I have derived very material assistance from Mr. de Vis' voluntary work.

The Dugong remains from the Post-Tertiary beds of Shea's Creek were articulated as far as they would go.

The most important acquisition by exchange was with the South Australian Museum—certain bones of the extinct Struthious bird, *Genyornis newtoni*, from Lake Calabonna; and by purchase, the remains of the extinct and opalised *Cimoliosaurus leucoscopelus*.

35. *Library*.—The Library has received careful attention, and acquisitions have been duly placed on the shelves. There are, however, many valuable books which it is important we should have for pressing needs as soon as funds are available for purchasing them.

I have the honour of tendering you my Annual Report for the past year.

Mammals.

The labelling of exhibited specimens has received considerable attention, with the result that the Orders Primates, Carnivora, Insectivora, and Chiroptera have been completed. All the printing has been done upon the Museum premises, and I may perhaps be permitted to mention the advantage personally derived from the appointment of an experienced compositor. The number of labels required is great (the existing ones being hand-written), and as all the officers require the printer's services, progress is necessarily slow; still I hope that the remaining Mammalian Orders will be labelled before the close of the year. Apart from the labelling and the addition of new specimens, the collection has required no attention beyond the routine work performed by the attendants. The Taxidermist has prepared 44 mammals, of which number 12 have been mounted for the collection and placed in the gallery.

Perhaps the most interesting addition is a block of limestone from the Jenolan caves, polished by Rock Wallabies, the constant friction of whose feet and hair produces the effect shown in the specimen exhibited.

In addition to my ordinary duties, devoted mainly to the Reptilian and Osteological Galleries, and to the completion of the Funafuti Report, I performed the following services:—

1. The furnishing (on strictly educational lines) of a large case, rendered vacant by the withdrawal of specimens required elsewhere, to illustrate methods of Attack and Defence practised by animals. This was conducted on similar but more extended lines to what I produced when in charge of the Leeds Museum. This effort has been greatly appreciated by the public, and the case, teeming with descriptive labels, illustrated by well selected specimens, proves to be as interesting as anything in, at any rate, the galleries under my care. I have to thank my Colleagues for supplying me with many timely suggestions.
2. Producing eight plates in illustration of Mr. Whitelegge's papers on the Crustacea, Alcyonaria, and Sponges of Funafuti.
3. Drawing plans of new buildings, and for sundry alterations and fittings.
4. Assisting in the composing-room during the illness of our late printer.
5. Assisting yourself in determining vertebrate remains from the Wellington Caves.
6. Writing an article for the "Wealth and Progress of New South Wales," published by the Government Statistician.

Reptiles

Reptiles and Batrachians.

A comparison of the collections at the end and at the commencement of the year, only can give an idea of the progress made and the time devoted to its accomplishment. A fine suite of cases was built, and already the main portions have been furnished with a representative series of Lizards and Batrachians in spirits, all specially remounted for the purpose. Two detached wall-cases were supplied with Crocodiles and Chelonians respectively, while the Taxidermist has been actively engaged in mounting Lizards to form groups illustrative of life histories. Thirty groups, embracing eighty-one specimens, have been, so far, prepared, and form a new and most attractive feature in the gallery.

The gigantic tortoise, mentioned in my last report, I found to be *Testudo nigrita*. A rather notable feat was together performed by our Taxidermist and Articulator, the carapace, plastron, and portion of the head being cast and so arranged that while the complete skeleton is exhibited in the Osteological Gallery the mounted reptile appears in the Upper Main Hall.

The collection of Cast Snakes was further enriched, and continues to be an attractive feature. In this gallery I also inaugurated a feature new to the Museum, namely, maps illustrative of distribution, an idea borrowed from the museums in Europe, where they form useful and instructive adjuncts. Several exchanges were negotiated, and much information was supplied to callers who required special details.

Fishes.

The time devoted to other subjects precluded the possibility of doing more in this branch than the routine of determining and registering acquisitions; nor is it proposed to in any way reorganise the exhibited collection until the upper gallery is cased, a matter which is even now receiving some consideration.

The new Spirit-house is completed and will shortly be handed over. The handling of the immense mass of material is not a work to which one can look forward with any degree of pleasure, but the very congested condition of the existing shed renders the work a necessary evil. If, as is projected, it is commenced early this year, it may be confidently predicted that none of the galleries under my charge will, at its termination, be much advanced from their present stage.

Exchanges were negotiated with the United States National Museum, and sundry specimens were identified, and information given to the public and to the Fisheries Department and the Technological College.

Skeletons.

A work of no small magnitude was the completion of the Mammalian portion of the Osteological Gallery, in which I was assisted by one of the Articulators. Not only were the specimens absolutely rearranged, but all were supplied with labels printed on the premises. The skeletons of reptiles and of birds were also arranged and labelled, but, as their present position is not regarded as the place they are to finally occupy, the case has not received the structural fitting necessary for their proper display.

During the rearrangement of the gallery, an effort was made to reduce the number of specimens exhibited, in order to relieve the congestion. To this end, all duplicates were removed to the store-rooms, and still I regret to have to report that the space provided is miserably inadequate. Room has been left for unrepresented Marsupialia, but in other orders many valuable types have to be omitted. This condition cannot be remedied until additional exhibition space has been erected.

The new cabinet, mentioned by you in your last report as having been provided for the Osteologist, has been brought into use. The Osteological store-room was, as opportunity arose, thoroughly overhauled, and the contents classified and docketed. All authentic imperfect material was disarticulated, and the bones distributed in the new cabinet to form the nucleus of a much-needed comparative series.

The whole of our collection of exhibited human crania was gradually removed, and replaced, for the benefit of Prof. J. T. Wilson, who has subjected them to examination for Anthropometric purposes.

Of the fifty-one skeletons below mentioned, forty-nine were prepared by our Articulators. Of this number, twenty-nine were mounted and placed in the galleries.

As you are aware, Sir, with so many Sections under my care, the want of a personal assistant renders it impossible for me to do full justice either to the institution or to yourself.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit herewith the Annual Reports for 1897 of the Sections under my charge.

Birds.

Since the discontinuance of collecting expeditions in 1892, about the average number of specimens was registered last year.

Of the few acquisitions by purchase some are most important, notably a living specimen of *Psephotus chrysopterygius* from Port Darwin, of which only three specimens, obtained by Elsey in 1856, and now in the British Museum, have been previously recorded, and a specimen of *Megapodius pritchardi* and its eggs, which it deposits in the friable soil at the top of an extinct crater on Niuafoou or Hope Island.

By presentation the collection has been enriched by a specimen of *Globicera pacifica*, obtained on Funafuti by Mr. W. G. Woolnough, B.Sc., who accompanied Prof. T. W. E. David to that atoll of the Ellice Group; a number of birds in spirits received from the Rev. H. A. Robertson, of Erromango; a beautiful xanthic variety of *Calyptorhynchus funereus*, presented by Mr. G. W. Pitt, and a nest and set of eggs of *Pezoporus formosus*, obtained by Mr. T. W. Whitelegge at Maroubra. Not without interest is a specimen of *Graculus nova-hollandia*, received from Dr. Louis C. Gabriel, which was caught in the Murrumbidgee River, owing to its unsuccessful attempt to swallow a Murray Cod (*Oligorus macquariensis*) measuring 13 inches in length and weighing over a pound. It has been mounted by the Taxidermist as received, the throat and gape widely distended by the fish, the tail alone of which is visible. Worthy of

notice, too, are a number of shells (*Donax deltoides*, Lamareck) from Port Stephens, presented by yourself, showing that in the mode of abstracting the mollusc by the Sooty Oyster-catchers (*Hæmatopus unicolor*) 95 per cent. of the shells are all broken at the anterior end of the left valve.

A small collection of birds was sent to the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Honolulu, and spirit specimens of *Scythrops novæ-hollandiæ* to the Zoological Society of London.

In August Attendant R. Grant was collecting for a short time at Buckiinguy Station, and succeeded in obtaining a number of skins of *Dromæus novæ-hollandiæ* and other species, also a very good bower or "playing ground" of the Spotted Bower-bird (*Ohlamydodera maculata*). Under the care of Attendant Grant, the Ornithological collections are in a good state of preservation.

During the year the Taxidermist prepared the following groups for the collection:—*Hirundo frontalis*, *Artamus superciliosus*, *Myzomela sanguinolenta*, *Plectorhyncha lanceolata*, *Artamus personatus*, *Rhipidura rufifrons*, *Sericulus melinus*, and *Megaloprepia magnifica*. Owing to most of the Taxidermist's time being devoted to other work specifically, no addition was made to the mounted collection of Australian birds during the year. Many birds and their nests, at present unrepresented in the cases, await an opportunity of his being able to give them his attention.

A further addition was made to the Reference Collection of Australian Birds by a number of specimens obtained by the Taxidermist and myself between the Mehi and Gwydir Rivers during our annual leave in November.

In the early part of the year my time was chiefly taken up with the preparation of second editions of the catalogue of Australian *Accipitres* and *Striges*. The specimens in the larger cases of birds were determined, and labels were struck off by the printer, also for the Australian birds' nests. Preparations were also made for the reception of the collection of Australian birds' eggs in the new cabinet. Numerous inquiries respecting the collections were answered either personally or by letter.

Nearly one-half of the year was occupied by the registration of the ever-increasing Ethnological and Numismatical Collections. A few years ago the time required to register the additions to these sections was comparatively nominal; but by leaps and bounds the presentations have increased to such an extent as to greatly encroach on the time permitted for my work in the Section *Aves*.

Of the MS. prepared four years ago at the request of the Under Secretary for Mines and Agriculture on "The Insectivorous birds of New South Wales," for the use of students in the Hawkesbury Agricultural College, only one small part (being the second of the series), containing four plates, has been published during the year. Practically the work is at a standstill, as no plates have been prepared for it since December, 1896.

The following papers were prepared and published during the year:—

- (1) On a new sub-species of *Psophodes crepitans*, "Records, Australian Museum," vol. iii, No. 1; (2) On the extension of the range of *Calamanthus fuliginosus*, and *Emblema picta* to New South Wales, "Records, Australian Museum," vol. iii, No. 1; (3) On a Curious Nesting-site of *Anthus australis*, "Records, Australian Museum," vol. iii, No. 1; (4) On the Nidification of *Megaloprepia magnifica*, "Records, Australian Museum," vol. iii, No. 1; (5) Description of a new species of *Collyriocincla* from Queensland, "Records, Australian Museum," vol. iii, No. 2.

Ethnological.

As pointed out in the foregoing Report, unusually large additions were made to the collection during the year. Considerably over the average number of specimens was registered in 1896, and last year nearly three times as many accessions were made to the Ethnological collection as in 1896.

The largest donation was received from His Excellency Sir William Macgregor, K.C.M.G., Lieutenant-Governor of British New Guinea. It consists of a number of articles collected by Sir William during his official visits to different parts of the island under British control. Another important presentation was made by Mr. C. Hedley, the result of a six weeks' holiday spent in New Caledonia; each specimen is localised, the native name and the use to which it is put given. The information supplied with this donation would form a small but exceedingly interesting catalogue. From Madame Dubois, of the Touho District, New Caledonia, various specimens were also received, and from Messrs. A. O. and J. Henry, of Oubatche, some valuable strings of native shell money. Kava bowls and cups were received from Madame Kolbe; a gigantic wooden fish-hook and a cooking pot from Mr. Norman Hardy; a large war-drum from Mr. P. G. Black; and miscellaneous articles from the Rev. H. A. Robertson, of Erromango.

By exchange, the collection was enriched by Palæolithic implements from Somaliland, Africa, and a number of specimens from the Musée Colonial, Noumea. The acquisitions by purchase consist chiefly of glass and quartzite knives, bull-roarers, &c., from Northern and Central Australia.

The Ethno-Botanical Collection was considerably added to during the year, principally by donation from Mr. F. W. Bailey, F.L.S., the Government Botanist of Queensland.

Under your supervision the whole of the Ethnological collection, which it was found necessary to shift during the repairs made to the building the previous year, was rearranged and relabelled, the old tickets being replaced by printed ones as opportunity occurred. The completion of the arrangement of specimens was finished early in the year, and the gallery reopened to the public.

Numismatical and Historical.

The principal acquisitions by presentation consist of newly-minted gold, silver, and copper coins of British India, presented by the Master of Her Majesty's Mint, Calcutta; the silver and copper coinage of Belgium, presented by the Belgian Government; a similar donation from the Government of Ceylon; silver and bronze Diamond Jubilee medals, presented by the Public Schools Athletic Association of New South Wales; and three commemoration stars from the Secretary of State for India. By purchase, a set of all the British war medals, also those for meritorious service, conspicuous gallantry, and distinguished conduct in the field.

Eighteen Historical specimens were registered in 1897, of which six are from the old collection.

I have the honour to hand you herewith the Annual Report of the Entomological Section for 1897.

Insecta and Arachnida.

The donations amount to 1,533 specimens, and include many valuable additions to our cabinet and duplicate collections. The most important and extensive donations have been received from Dr. J. C. Cox, Mr. G. Lyell, Junr., of Gisborne, Victoria, the Rev. Dr. George Brown, and yourself. Mr. Charles Hedley also presented a small collection of *Insecta* and *Arachnida*, collected during his recent visit to New Caledonia. In addition to the foregoing, I have also contributed type specimens of Australian Arachnida.

During the year 1,179 specimens were added to our cabinets from collections mainly by yourself and Dr. Ramsay. These have all been mounted and determined, and were of great assistance to me when selecting specimens for the exchange due to M. Guérin, of Maçon, France.

The total number of specimens received in exchange was seven hundred and forty-six, and these were obtained chiefly from Mr. G. A. Waterhouse, of Waverley; Mr. G. Lyell, Junr., of Gisborne, Victoria; Mr. C. French, of Melbourne; Mr. Frank Bartholomew, of Sydney; M. E. Guérin, of Maçon, France; and M. C. F. Ancey, of Dra-el-Mizon, Algiers. In respect of these, the specimens obtained from Messrs. Waterhouse and Lyell were exceedingly valuable, because, in some instances, they filled up blanks in our collection of Australian Butterflies, as well as in some cases supplying us with duplicates. One specimen only was obtained by purchase.

In my last Annual Report I referred to the work of revising, remounting, and registering specimens, a task which had been interrupted by other official duties. It is with pleasure, therefore, that I now report that substantial progress in this direction has been made. The whole of the Exotic Coleoptera and Lepidoptera displayed in the gallery has been carefully revised, re-labelled, and registered, and not only that, but by systematic arrangement, and the addition of a commodious exhibition cabinet, a large number of additional exhibits of Exotic Lepidoptera have been placed on view. The number of registrations in this respect is 2,182.

Some of the manuscript labels have been replaced by printed ones, and where this has been done a gratifying improvement, both in neatness and general appearance, has been the result. Other labels are in the hands of the printer, and these will be substituted for those at present in use as the work of printing progresses.

The collection of Australian Insects displayed in the gallery has been of great service to those pursuing the study of Entomology, many of whom have fully availed themselves of the opportunity afforded of naming their private collections. At the same time, however, there are specimens in our cabinets which it would not be wise to display in the gallery, but these have always been accessible to those desirous of comparing them. During the year a considerable amount of time was employed in imparting information, naming specimens, and displaying cabinet collections to visitors.

In order to keep the collection clean and free from insect pests, I have systematically and periodically examined and disinfected both exhibition cases, cabinets, and stock boxes, and everything is, therefore, in thoroughly good order.

I have the honour to hand you herewith my Annual Report on the Conchological Section for the year 1897.

Mollusca.

As in the preceeding year, and for the same reason, but little progress was made in the Conchological Section. Almost two-thirds of the year were consumed by the preparation of a Report on the Ethnology of Funafuti, which was published in the Memoir devoted to that Atoll.

On the completion of this study the Mollusca of Funafuti were taken in hand. Most of the species have been determined, and I am hopeful of submitting to you a report upon them at an early date.

Advantage was taken of accumulated annual leave to visit and study the interesting island of New Caledonia. Among other collections I was able to gather, directly and indirectly, several hundreds of Mollusca, many of which were hitherto unrepresented in our collections, and some, indeed, appear new to science. The determination and registration of these engaged my attention till the end of the year.

Numerous and valuable donations have been received from a small circle of generous friends of the Museum. Madame Kolbe, of Bismarck Archipelago, responded to our request by furnishing rare terrestrial Mollusca from that region. Mr. F. H. Moore has again contributed marine shells from Western Australia. To Mr. P. G. Black we are once more indebted for extensive series illustrative of the fauna of Queensland and the New Hebrides. Newly described and other species from Ceylon were forwarded by Mr. H. B. Preston. Mr. R. C. Rossiter, of Noumea, supplied many of our deficiencies by a gift of New Caledonian varieties, as did the Rev. J. Hadfield, of Lifu. A collection of marine shells from Port Stephens was bestowed by yourself.

An important series of named Polyplacophora, representing an almost complete set of South Australian forms, was acquired by exchange from Mr. W. T. Bednell.

With reluctance I draw your attention to the fact that the work of this Section has now outgrown the ability of a single worker to overtake it. Employment sufficient for several months is frequently laid before

before me, and, while current duty thus falls in arrears, no hope remains of dealing with the stores accumulated during past years. New and little known species are showered upon your officer, who, for want of time, has reluctantly to put them aside unstudied. So far I have been entirely without aid. If in the future even mechanical assistance might be afforded me, I then could better cope with increasing work.

The space at your disposal for the exhibition of shells becomes more and more insufficient for the growing needs of the collection.

A paper by myself was published in the "Records of the Australian Museum,"—Descriptions of New Land Shells—vol. iii, No. 2.

I have the honour of submitting my Annual Report for the year 1897.

The acquisitions received during the past year include a large number of valuable specimens, the most important donation being a series of Planarian worms, from Mr. Thomas Steel, of Sydney, the collection containing eighty-two well preserved specimens, twelve of which are the types of the new species recently described by him in the Proceedings of the Linnean Society of New South Wales, vol. xxii., pt. 1, No. 85, 1897, p. 104 and p. 120. Among other donations may be mentioned a collection of Sponges from South Australia, presented by Mr. Thomas Worsnop, of Adelaide, and the valuable material collected by yourself at Port Stephens, consisting of three hundred and twenty-eight specimens.

By exchange with the British, Indian, and Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museums we have obtained a large series of specimens hitherto unrepresented in the Museum collection.

Comparatively little attention has been devoted to increasing the exhibit collection, and apart from the usual routine work the greater part of my time was occupied with the material collected at Funafuti by Mr. C. Hedley, in 1896. In working out the collection, frequent comparisons with the specimens on exhibit were necessary, and as a result many exhibits previously unnamed or incorrectly determined were identified and duly labelled.

Sir,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Annual Report for the year 1897.

Many mineralogical and geological specimens were added to the collection on exhibition, almost all of which were obtained from Australian localities. No further progress, however, was made with the printing of labels, the smaller individual specimens still having to be provided with written ones.

A portion of the fine series of New South Wales marbles, which at the beginning of the year was here on loan, has now been presented to the Trustees by the Hon. the Secretary for Works, through Mr. H. L. Vernon, the Government Architect, and a selected number of them was mounted on the north wall of the gallery, uniformly with the foreign specimens already there. They form, altogether, a very fine collection of 100 specimens, sixty of which are marbles from localities in New South Wales.

A very choice collection of Queensland ores, consisting of one hundred and twenty-nine large specimens, was presented by Mr. R. L. Jack, Government Geologist of Queensland. The specimens formed a portion of those obtained originally for the Queensland International Exhibition, 1897, and at its close were sent on to Sydney.

The Mount Morgan Gold-mining Co. was good enough to donate a representative collection of minerals from their important mining property.

The Mount Stirling Meteorite from West Australia, and a few rare minerals from Mr. J. R. Gregory, of London, were the only purchases of note.

The former meteorite is now on its way to Prof. H. A. Ward, of Rochester, New York State, to be cut. On its return, I hope to make an examination and analyses, with a view to publishing an account of it in the Museum "Records." It is an iron weighing just over 200 lb. An attempt was made to get the cutting done here in Sydney, but, although several firms were asked to tender, no replies were obtained.

By exchange, some very good mineral specimens and rocks were added to the collection. The most valuable was a selection of eleven meteorites, new to the collection, from various foreign localities, obtained from Prof. H. A. Ward. Other exchanges were carried out with the late Prof. Parker, of Dunedin, the Musée Colonial, Noumea, and the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum at Honolulu.

The Nocoleche Meteorite was carefully examined and a series of analyses carried out in connection with it. The results obtained were published in the Museum Records.

Towards the end of October a removal was made to the new rooms, built for mineralogical purposes. They have been found very much more convenient, although at times during summer somewhat too warm for comfort, but almost everything has now been done to keep the temperature as low as possible.

It is gratifying to note that for the first time since 1891 (when there was a small surplus in the Post Office accounts), the operations of the combined Departments left a balance of revenue over expenditure, *i.e.*, on the expenditure votes under my control. There is still an estimated loss of £70,368 4s. 8d. on the working of these departments, taking into consideration the expenditure from votes under control of other Ministers, alluded to below, and the interest on the cost of construction of buildings and telegraph lines. The chief contributions to this improved financial condition are the increases of £8,855 12s. 4d. and £1,253 2s. 4d., respectively, in the value of postage stamps, and poundage on postal notes sold; the additional sum of £7,657 12s. 7d. received for telephones, due to the rapid extension of the system, not only in the chief centres of population, but also in remote country districts, and the increase of £9,917 8s. 6d. in the interest received on the largely augmented funds of the Government Savings Bank; and on the other hand, the reductions of £21,107 16s. 2d. and £11,906 4s. 6d., respectively, in salaries and working expenses, largely owing to the re-organization effected by the Public Service Board in 1896, and which did not take full effect until after the middle of that year, and the reduction of £5,092 6s. 7d. in the interest allowed to depositors in the Government Savings Bank—the result of a full year's operation of the reduced rate of interest (3 per cent.), which came into force on the 1st July, 1896. Briefly, the effect of the year's transactions is the conversion of the deficiency of £38,530 15s. 11d. in 1896 into a surplus of £25,379 3s. 1d. in 1897—an improvement of £63,909 19s.

The interest on the cost of construction of Electric Telegraph Lines is estimated at £37,296, and the interest on the cost of buildings owned by the Government, and used as Post and Telegraph Offices in various parts of the Colony, is estimated at £32,649.

Adding the expenditure on account of the services of the Postmaster-General from the Votes of other Departments, and the interest on the cost of buildings and construction of telegraph lines, the expenditure properly chargeable to the Department under my control for the year 1897 was £932,299 12s. 6d., or £70,368 4s. 8d. in excess of the revenue for the same period.

As explained in my report for 1896, the Post Office performs a number of services for the public and for other Government Departments, for which no monetary credit is taken, in the foregoing statement. These services include the conveyance by post of petitions to the Governor, the Executive Council, and Members of either House of Parliament; newspapers under seven days old; returns under the "Land and Income Tax Assessment Act of 1895," letters and packets for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the "Census and Industrial Returns Act," and returns of births, deaths, and marriages, all of which are by law exempt from postage; also all mail matter on Her Majesty's Service, the postage properly chargeable on which is thought to be not fully covered by the annual vote of £31,000 for this purpose; the supply of shipping and weather intelligence by telegraph; the performance by Postmasters and other officers in various districts of the Colony of the duties of Electoral Registrar, Deputy Electoral Registrar, Registrar of births, deaths, and marriages, Meteorological Observer, &c.; and the maintenance of the electric light at Parliament House, Circular Quay, Cowper's Wharf, and the Jenolan Caves.

It is impossible to accurately appraise the value of these services, but it will be understood from the nature of them that they entail a considerable amount of expenditure on the Department, probably not less in the aggregate than £50,000 per annum.

UNIVERSAL POSTAL UNION CONGRESS, 1897.

In accordance with the resolution of the Melbourne Conference (March, 1897), the Australasian Colonies were represented at the Postal Union Congress, which met at Washington in May, 1897, by the Hon. J. Gavan Duffy, Postmaster-General of Victoria, accompanied by Mr. James Smibert, late Deputy Postmaster-General of that Colony, as Postal Official.

Particulars of the amendments agreed to at Washington, both in the Principal Convention and in the Detailed Regulations for its execution, will be found in the report of the proceedings of the Postal and Telegraphic Conference held in Hobart in March and April, 1898, which has already been laid before Parliament, and a translation in English of the Washington revision of the Convention and regulations is printed as an appendix to this report.

Appendix A.*

Your Excellency having approved of the ratification of the Convention on behalf of this Colony, the necessary steps have been taken to intimate the fact to the Government of the United States.

INTERCOLONIAL POSTAL AND TELEGRAPH CONFERENCES.

Mention was made in my Report for 1896 of the Conference of Ministers held at the General Post Office, Melbourne, on 1st March, 1897; but as the matter is properly a record of the latter year, I deem it advisable to give a synopsis of the proceedings of the Conference in this Report.

The Colonies were represented as follows:—

New Zealand—By the Hon. R. J. Seddon, M.P., Premier and Postmaster-General.

New South Wales—By the Hon. J. Cook, M.P., Postmaster-General.

Queensland—By the Hon. A. J. Thynne, M.L.C., Postmaster-General

Victoria, Tasmania, and Western Australia—By the Hon. J. Gavan Duffy, M.P., Postmaster-General, Victoria.

The Hon. R. J. Seddon was elected as President, and the following business was transacted, viz.:—The Hon. J. Gavan Duffy was chosen as the Delegate and Ministerial Representative of the colonies at the Washington Postal Union Congress, I, as Postmaster-General of New South Wales, having previously declined to be nominated for the position. The President undertook to inform the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in terms of memorandum of the 11th December, 1896, that the Hon. J. Gavan Duffy, Postmaster-General of Victoria, had been appointed. It was also resolved that the Premiers of the respective colonies should furnish the Hon. J. Gavan Duffy with the necessary credentials, and that Mr. James Smibert, late Deputy Postmaster-General of Victoria, should accompany the Hon. J. Gavan Duffy as Postal Official. It was further resolved that five hundred pounds (£500) should be the sum fixed to defray the expenses of the Ministerial Representative, and that the sum of three hundred pounds (£300) be approved to defray the expenses of Mr. James Smibert, Postal Official, accompanying the Hon. J. Gavan Duffy. The whole amount to be found, in the first instance, by the Colony of Victoria, and afterwards the other colonies to pay their share on the basis of population. The Conference also expressed its great satisfaction that the Pacific Cable Commission, which met in London, had decided to recommend the adoption of the proposals formulated at the Sydney Conference, and, in view of the great importance to the Empire of the construction of the cable, expressed the hope that means may, at an early date, be found for its speedy realisation.

A Conference was held in Hobart in March and April, 1898, at which the Colonies of New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, and Tasmania were represented.

A full report of the proceedings of this Conference has recently been laid before Parliament; but although the matter is one that affects the year 1898, and will properly receive notice in the Report for that year, some of the principal matters dealt with at the Conference are alluded to elsewhere in this Report.

Appendix B contains a return of the Government Buildings for the transaction of the Postal, Money Order, Savings Bank, and Telegraph business, and particulars of the premises rented or otherwise provided for the purpose. Government Buildings at the following places were completed and occupied during the year 1897, viz. :—Byron Bay, Delegate, Denman, Eugowra, Grong Grong, Moree, Mount Victoria, Narramine, New Angledool, Petersham, Tabulam, Taralga, and Wiseman's Ferry.

During the year 1897, 5 pillar letter-receivers were erected, 4 removed to different sites, and 15 withdrawn; 62 small iron letter-receivers were placed, 4 removed to different sites, and 5 withdrawn.

On the 31st December the number of letter-receivers erected in the Colony (both large and small) was 1,279, and the number of newspaper-receivers, 28.

The number of licenses for the sale of postage stamps issued in 1897 to persons other than postmasters or receiving-office-keepers was 122, the number transferred, 54, and the number cancelled, 22.

On the 31st December, 1897, the number of locked private letter-boxes let at the General Post Office was 1,222. In addition to these 72 were allotted to Public Departments. Five private posting-boxes have been constructed on private premises for the use and at the expense of the occupants, under the system introduced in August, 1886. The fee charged for the clearance of these boxes varies from £3 to £5 per annum, according to the number of clearances effected daily.

The removals from the Service numbered nineteen. Of these a post and telegraph master received a sentence of five years' imprisonment for misappropriating Government money; a junior postal assistant was sentenced to two years' imprisonment for stealing a letter; and for similar offences a postal assistant and a junior letter-carrier each received a sentence of twelve months' imprisonment. Another junior assistant was sentenced to six months' imprisonment for forging a signature to a postal note and uttering the same; and a telegraph messenger was imprisoned for one month for stealing money. The remainder were dismissed for the following offences:—Two post and telegraph masters for deficiencies in their accounts; a junior assistant for insubordination; a mail guard for unsatisfactory conduct in connection with the robbery of a registered mail; a sorter for discreditable circumstances attending his bankruptcy; a mail-boy for fraudulently removing unobliterated stamps from letters; a telegraph messenger for misappropriating money; another telegraph messenger for neglect of duty; a letter-carrier for drunkenness; and a junior assistant, a mail-boy, and two telegraph messengers for other misconduct.

Eleven deaths occurred, namely:—D. R. Kenane, post and telegraph master, Cobar; R. T. Muir, post and telegraph master, Marsden's; M. Ryan, operator, Nowra; A. G. Morris, junior operator; F. Donelan, sorter; T. Parkinson, letter-carrier, Inverell; F. Veness, letter-carrier, Randwick; J. Stewart, line repairer, Newcastle; J. J. Smith, mail-boy; and E. Wilkins and A. M. Forder, telegraph messengers.

Ninety-five resignations took place.

Ten officers retired from the Service, namely:—A. Tucker, inspector; C. J. Booty, dead-letter clerk; C. Cooper, post and telegraph master, Orange; T. G. Croft, telegraph master, Newcastle; and J. J. B. Wakely, operator, North Sydney, who were allowed pensions under the Civil Service Act, 1884; A. G. Turner, clerk; G. J. Dennis, post and telegraph master, Howlong; J. E. Cooper, operator, Head Office; and C. Mooney, construction overseer, who received gratuities under the Public Service Act of 1895; and H. J. Kirwan, temporary letter-carrier, Windsor.

The Postal Inspectors in 1897 travelled a distance of 58,620 miles, and inspected the postal route appertaining thereto; visiting 739 offices, 118 of which were visited more than once during the year.

The rate of postage on letters transmitted to and from Post and Receiving Offices within the respective districts mentioned hereunder was reduced to 1d. per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., or fraction thereof, from the dates named.

From the 15th August, Tarana was included in the Bathurst Penny Postage area; and from the 1st November, Lowther was added to the list of offices within the Katoomba area.

Correspondence posted by commercial travellers in mail vans was exempted from payment of the "late fee" of 2d.; and a reduction in the postage chargeable on commercial travellers' orders, containing epistolary matter forming part of and inseparable from the orders themselves, was made from the 1st December.

The exemption from payment of the "late fee" on letters posted on Sundays in the box at the Railway Station, Sydney (No. 6 Platform, next Inquiry Office), was, in April, extended to correspondence posted on Public Holidays.

The rate of postage on wholly printed matter, posted in New South Wales for delivery therein, was, in January, reduced from $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for the first 2 oz., and 1d. for every additional 2 oz., or fraction thereof, to $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per 2 oz. up to 4 oz., and 1d. for every additional 4 oz., or fraction thereof.

In accordance with an amended regulation introduced in February, articles entitled to pass at "book" rate of postage within New South Wales, and to the other Australasian Colonies, are allowed to bear printed matter on the covers, provided a clear and conspicuous space is left for the address.

In accordance with the decision of the Queensland Government the "Packet" post of that Colony has, since 1st January, 1897, been restricted to *bonâ fide* patterns and samples; merchandise, and other articles, having a value of their own, being forwarded by "Parcel" post.

FOREIGN SERVICE.

Full details were given in my report for the year 1896 of the negotiations which resulted in the conclusion of contracts with the Peninsular and Oriental and Orient Steam Navigation Companies, for the conveyance of Australian mails to and from the United Kingdom from the 1st February, 1898, when the previous contracts terminated. The principal features of the new contracts, which have already been laid before Parliament and printed are :—The total subsidy under the Peninsular and Oriental contract is £330,000 per annum, the proportion payable in respect of the Australian mails being assessed at £85,000 per annum, and the subsidy payable to the Orient Company is also £85,000, making a total of £170,000 per annum, of which it is proposed that the Imperial Government shall pay £98,000 and the Australian Governments £72,000 per annum, apportioned amongst the latter on the basis of population, the Imperial and Colonial Governments retaining their own collections, but sharing any fines that may be inflicted.

The contracts provide for a fortnightly service by the Peninsular and Oriental Company's vessels between Brindisi and Adelaide, 686 hours being allowed for the voyage in either direction, and for an alternate fortnightly (together making a weekly) service by the Orient Company's vessels between Naples and Adelaide, for which 696 hours are to be allowed; allowance of extra time being made in each case during period of monsoon.

Power is reserved to Her Majesty's Postmaster-General to require the vessels employed in the service to call at Fremantle, instead of Albany, Western Australia, also to substitute for Brindisi or Naples another Continental port, or a port in the United Kingdom, and (in the case of the Peninsular and Oriental Company's contract) to modify the service by increasing or decreasing the frequency of the communication, or extending or curtailing the route, in any of which cases the period of transit, and the subsidy may be increased or diminished, as may be determined.

The Companies are responsible for the loss or damage of any parcel or any registered postal packet, to the extent of £1 and £2 respectively.

The contracts, although determinable on the 31st January, 1905, by either party giving two years' previous notice to the other, may be continued after that date until the expiration of a notice of like duration given by either party at any time.

The arrangement made with the New Zealand Government in 1892 for the conveyance of mails, once every four weeks, to and from Sydney and San Francisco, *via* Auckland, by contract packets of the Union Steamship Company of New Zealand, for the sum of £4,000 per annum, has been renewed for a further period, expiring on 31st March, 1899.

Arrangements were made for an exchange of parcels with Labuan, British North Borneo, and Sarawak (Borneo), through the intermediary of the Singapore Office, at the rate of 1s. per lb., from the 1st January.

The postage on parcels for the following places was reduced to the rates mentioned:—

From the date mentioned, the New South Wales share was fixed at 7d. for the first lb., and 3d. for each additional lb. up to 11 lb.

An amended agreement (the text of which will be found in the Appendix) Appendix D. was concluded in July, 1897, in connection with the exchange of parcels between New South Wales and India.

The new agreement, in addition to several minor changes, provides for a weekly exchange, per the steamers to the Peninsular and Oriental, and Orient Companies' vessels, between Sydney and Tuticorin, *via* Colombo, instead of a fortnightly one by the steamers of the former Company only, between Sydney and Bombay; and for a reapportionment of the postage owing to the discontinuance of the charge of 1d. per lb. for the sea-transit of parcels to and from India and Ceylon, the Indian and New South Wales respective shares of postage for inland transit being increased by $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.

In connection with the direct exchange of parcels with Hawaii, inaugurated Appendix E. in June, 1896, an agreement has been concluded, the terms of which are given in the Appendix.

Included in the above return are 2,476 registered letters, which were posted originally within the Colony. A considerable number of these bore the names and addresses of the senders on the envelopes, and were therefore returned intact. The others were opened to obtain the required information. They were found to contain, besides correspondence and valuable articles of jewellery, such as watches, rings, &c., the sum of £1,197 10s. 0 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. in coin, notes (bank and postal), cheques, money orders, and stamps. In 1,268 unregistered letters were found enclosures representing £4,330 19s. 1d.

514 registered letters, originating in places beyond the Colony, were returned unopened, as follows :—210 to the other Australasian colonies, 123 to London, and 181 to other countries.

Of 732 packets, containing merchandise, jewellery, &c., which were received, through the addressees having declined to pay the surcharges, or as a result of the directions having become detached or irreparably mutilated in transit, or from other causes, 259 were applied for and delivered. The articles not otherwise disposed of are sold by public auction, in conformity with the Postage Act, and the proceeds paid into the Consolidated Revenue.

976 letters were posted unaddressed, 780 of which (including 19 covering valuable enclosures representing a sum of £53 12s. 9d.) were returned to the writers. The remainder afforded no adequate indication as to the whereabouts of the senders.

13,860

13,860 letters and packets were passed on to the Dead Letter Office during the course of the year, with insufficient directions. The addresses of a large proportion of these were corrected and the articles forwarded accordingly. The others were returned to the senders or were otherwise dealt with, as required by law. 6,984 letters were refused by the addressees, chiefly on account of surcharges.

1,279 Chinese letters imperfectly addressed were despatched to their intended destinations through the assistance of the Chinese interpreter, by whose instrumentality 867 letters were returned as unclaimed.

A sum of £297 0s. 2d., contained in registered letters, which had remained unclaimed for the prescribed period, was paid away to the proper authorities.

It is estimated that more than 300,000 newspapers found their way as unclaimed to the Branch during the year. These were disposed of as provided by law.

About 414 per cent. of the total number of letters posted in the Colony during 1897 were unclaimed.

In commemoration of the sixtieth anniversary of Her Majesty's reign, it was decided to issue new postage stamps of the 1d., 2d., and 2½d. values. The preparation of designs was submitted to public competition, a premium of £10 10s. being offered for the best, and £3 3s. for the second best productions. Three hundred and sixty designs were received from 140 competitors, and the designs submitted by the firm of John Sands were selected for the 2d. and 2½d. stamps, a design by the Government Printing Office being accepted for the 1d. stamp. The three new stamps, of which descriptions are given below, were issued on the 22nd June :—

Description of One Penny Stamp.

The central device is a shield bearing a cross charged with four stars, one on each arm, and a lion passant regardant in the centre. A Royal Crown is placed above the shield, and the name of the Colony and "Postage" below. A figure denoting the value, enclosed in an oval, is in each angle formed by the base of the shield and the inscription. Ornamental scroll work completes the design. Colour, carmine.

Description of Two-penny Stamp.

A profile portrait of Her Majesty the Queen is enclosed in a rectangular frame, resting upon a waratah flower, and sprays of native rose spring up at each side. The name of the Colony and "Postage" are placed above the portrait, and a figure representing the value is placed upon the waratah flower. These details are enclosed in an ornamental frame superimposed upon a cross, the end of each arm, charged with a star, projecting beyond the frame. The whole is enclosed in a triple-lined rectangular frame. Colour, blue.

Description of Two Pence Half-penny Stamp.

Upon a transverse oblong, enclosed in a double-lined frame, is a large profile portrait of Her Majesty the Queen in outline, occupying the right-hand half of the stamp. On the left is placed the name of the Colony and "Postage," in four lines in white on a background of solid colour, and the value in figures is beneath the inscription. The stars of the Southern Cross are disposed about the profile. Colour, royal purple.

The new stamps were also substituted for those previously current of the 1d. (single) and 1d. + 1d. (reply) post-cards, the 1d. stamped envelope, the 1d. wrapper and 2d. stamped envelope. To further mark the occasion, the 5s. stamp of 1861 was re-issued in lieu of the one of the same value previously in use.

With

With the view of assisting the fund established for the erection of a Hospital for Consumptives, in commemoration of Her Majesty's Record Reign, two stamps of special designs, of the respective values of 1d. and 2½d., and bearing, in addition to the inscription denoting the postal value, the values of one shilling and two shillings and sixpence respectively, were issued in June. These stamps were sold at the higher rates, and the amount realised in excess of the denoted postal values was devoted to the fund. The period of sale was limited to two months, and the number issued was fixed at 40,000 of the 1s. and 10,000 of the 2s. 6d. value.

The amount handed over to the hospital authorities from sale of the stamps, a detailed description of which is given hereunder, was £2,928 16s. 6d. :—

Description of the One Penny Stamp.

The design has for a central vignette an angelic figure, supporting in her arms an exhausted being, helpless and in need of sympathy. The vignette is surrounded by an ornamental frame, from the left upper corner of which springs the initial letter "C" of the title "Consumptives Home," which occupies the top of the frame; and in the right upper corner is shown a portrait of Her Majesty the Queen. At the sides the figures "1837-1897" are enclosed in diamond outlines. In the two lower corners the value 1s. is shown, while the space between is occupied by the inscription "N.S.W., Postage, One Penny." The frame is in dark-green, and the central vignette in sepia.

Description of the Two Pence Half-penny Stamp.

The motive of "restoration" or "rebuilding" is typified by two figures draped in white, the strong gently leading the weak, while she points to the motto "Redifico." This vignette is placed in a diamond frame, above which are the words "Consumptives Home," inscribed on a ribbon. A circle of gold forms the background, upon which the flannel-flower and waratah are displayed. In the left lower corner is a medallion bearing the figures 2/6, while the base of the design is inscribed, "N.S.W., Postage, 2½d." This stamp is printed in gold, blue, rose, and carmine.

The sale of "O.S." postage stamps, which were obtainable at the General Post Office at face value by stamp collectors and others, on the understanding that they were not to be used for postage purposes, was discontinued from the 1st September.

INLAND MAIL CONVEYANCE.

In the year 1897 the average cost per mile of the Inland Mail Conveyance was about 3⁷/₈d., against 3²/₅d., the price per mile paid during the previous year.

The number of contracts in existence on the 31st December, 1897, for the conveyance of inland mails was 967, and the number of mail services in respect of which no formal contracts were executed, 297.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Order Offices were established during the year 1897 at the following places, viz. :—Carinda, Chatswood, Colo Vale, Daysdale, Dudley, Finley, Galley Swamp, Jerseyville, Laggan, Moatefield, North Broken Hill, Perth, and Thornleigh.

The offices at Allandale, Garangula, Laggan, and Myrtle Creek were abolished, and the name of the office at Daviesville was changed to Bodangora.

The number of Money Order Offices in the Colony on 31st December, 1897, was 636.

The number of money orders issued was 393,299 (exclusive of 5,139 certificates of transfer amounting to £29,585 used by Postmasters in connection with transmitting fees for private letter-boxes, &c., &c.), and the value £1,311,850, against 402,677 of the value of £1,313,594, the difference showing a decrease of 9,378 in the number, and £1,744 in the amount, as compared with 1896.

The number of money orders paid (exclusive of 5,139 certificates of transfer amounting to £29,585) was 403,779, and the value £1,421,524 against 407,716 of the value of £1,427,520 in 1896, being a decrease of 3,937 in the number and £5,996 in the amount.

The amount of revenue received as commission on money orders issued was £15,063 8s. 8d., being £225 6s. 7d. less than the amount collected in 1896.

A comparative return showing the various countries where the money orders issued in New South Wales were made payable, and also the money order issues of other countries payable in New South Wales, will be found in the Appendix.

In the information contained in Appendix B will be found a detailed statement of the business transacted and revenue collected at each office in the Colony.

From

From the 1st January, 1897, the rate of commission allowed in settlement of accounts by the issuing to the paying country in connection with the exchange of money orders between New South Wales and the Colony of Straits Settlements was reduced from 1 to $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

From the 1st June, the rate of commission on money orders up to £10, issued on the United Kingdom and Cape Colony, was reduced to 6d. per £1 or fraction thereof, and from the 1st of the following month the same rate was made applicable to orders on other countries outside the Australasian Colonies to which money orders may be sent.

On the 1st July, the telegraph money order system was introduced between New South Wales and New Zealand, subject, so far as this Colony is concerned, to the terms and conditions applying to intercolonial telegraph money orders generally.

From the 1st November the hours for the transaction of money order business at the General Post Office were extended from between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. to between 9.30 a.m. and 3.30 p.m., from Monday to Friday inclusive, and from between 10 a.m. and noon to between 9.30 a.m. and noon on Saturday.

POSTAL NOTES.

During the year 1897, 1,040,750 postal notes, of the value of £374,606 1s. 6d., were supplied to Postmasters for sale to the public; of these, 976,528 were issued and paid in New South Wales, having a value (with stamps affixed) of £354,260 0s. 4d.; 43,567 notes, value £17,525 14s. 1d., of other colonies were also paid, making a grand total of 1,020,095, of the value of £371,785 14s. 5d., paid in New South Wales.

The number of notes issued in this Colony and paid in other Colonies was 58,415, of the value of £23,021 18s. 4d. (including postage stamps to the value of £202 4s. 10d. affixed thereto).

The amount of revenue collected as poundage was £9,091 19s. 8d., an increase of £1,253 2s. 4d. as compared with 1896.

Telegraph Offices were opened at Chatswood, Cockle Creek (Railway Station), Dapto, Daysdale, Finley, and Walla Walla (Railway Station) (in lieu of the Telephone Offices previously existing at those places), and at North Broken Hill.

The Offices at Bell, Blackville, Medlow, Myrtle Creek, Obley, Terara, Tintenbar, and Willoughby were converted into Telephone Offices, and the Office at Abattoirs was closed.

The name of the Office at Grong Grong Railway Station was changed to Grong Grong.

The names of the public Telephone Offices opened and closed are given under the heading of Telephone Branch.

In April, Cal Lal was included amongst the Border Stations in New South Wales between which and all Stations in South Australia (except those on the line to Port Darwin) telegrams may be transmitted at the rate of 1s. for the first ten words, and 2d. for each additional word. In October, Mingoola Telephone Station (Q.), and South Murwillumbah (N.S.W.) were added to the Border Stations between which and all Stations in the other Colony telegrams are transmitted at the rate of 1s. for the first ten words, and 1d. for each additional word.

In November, arrangements were made for the transmission of telephone messages between Murwillumbah and South Murwillumbah, and between Gunnedah Post Office and Railway Station, at the rate of 6d. for the first ten words and 1d. for each additional word; also for telephone communication between the two latter offices at bureau rates, viz. :—

For any period not exceeding three minutes, 6d.

Every additional three minutes or portion thereof, 6d.

An extension of the system under which code addresses for foreign telegrams are registered at the Chief Telegraph Office, on payment of a fee of 10s. per annum, was sanctioned in February, when arrangements were made for recording these addresses for the period of one month for a fee of 2s. 6d.

The rate for ordinary telegrams to New Caledonia was reduced to 10d. per word from the 1st January, and from the 1st July reduced rates were introduced for cablegrams to Hong Kong, China, Macao, Formosa, Japan, Corea, *via* Japan, Persia, including Bushire, Persian Gulf Stations, Sandakan, Siam, *via* Moulmein.

The number and value of telegrams despatched from each office in the Colony will be found in Appendix B. CABLE SUBSIDIES AND GUARANTEES.

Before particularising the payments by the several Australasian Colonies, during the past year, towards cable subsidies and guarantees, I propose to give a brief history of the establishment of cable communication between Europe and Australia, its subsequent extension to New Zealand and New Caledonia, and the changes from time to time made in the tariffs.

Port Darwin-Banjoewangie Cable.

The laying of the first submarine cable between Port Darwin and Banjoewangie (Java), by the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Co., Limited, was completed in June, 1872, but the construction of the line through the South Australian territory not being finished by that time, a portion of the distance was performed by horse express.

On the 21st October of the same year complete communication by wire was established between Australia and the outside world.

Between that date and 31st December following, it is recorded that 243 messages were sent from this Colony.

No subsidy was paid in connection with this first cable, and the tariff to London was £9 11s. 6d. for a message of 20 words or less (address and signature included), the tariff to other places varying from £4 to £13 7s.

Under an agreement made between the Colonies of New South Wales and Victoria, and the Eastern Extension Company, dated the 6th May, 1879, a subsidy of £32,400 a year became payable by the Colonies to the Company from the date of the establishment of communication by a duplicate cable between Port Darwin and Banjoewangie (1st November, 1879), for a period of 20 years. The rates chargeable under this agreement were 9s. 4d. a word between Europe and South Australia, made up as follows:—

At a Conference held in Sydney in March, 1891, these resolutions were confirmed in an agreement, dated 31st March, 1891, clause 3 of which provided that "If in any year while the reduced rates shall continue in force by virtue of these presents the total receipts of the Extension Company and the Cis-Indian Administrations in respect of the Australasian traffic, after deducting all out-payments to other telegraphic administrations, shall be less than the sum of £237,736, Her Majesty will cause to be paid to the Extension Company out of the Consolidated Revenue Funds of the contracting Colonies a sum equal to half the amount by which such receipts shall be less than the said sum of £237,736."

By a further agreement, dated 1st November, 1892, it was stipulated (*inter alia*), "That each of the contracting Colonies shall contribute towards such sum (if any) as shall in each year be required to bring the revenue derived by the Province of

of South Australia on international telegrams up to the sum of £37,552 in the event of the revenue of the said Province derived from such international telegrams in any year not reaching that amount," and that the whole of such colonies should, from the 1st May, 1891, become joint contributors to the annual subsidies of £32,400, payable to the Company under the agreement of the 6th May, 1879, before alluded to, and £4,200 payable under an agreement, dated 14th March, 1889, between the Company and the Government of Tasmania.

The reduced rates thus agreed to came into operation on the 1st May, 1891, the following colonies joining therein:—New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania, and Western Australia.

The actual net receipts for the first complete year (ending 30th April, 1892), were £182,696, showing a deficiency of £55,040, one half of which had to be made good to the Company by the contracting colonies, who had also to make up to South Australia the sum of £10,415 under the guarantee to that Colony, of which amount the South Australian Government bore £1,196. The New South Wales share of the combined guarantees for the twelve months was £15,397.

In the following year, *i.e.*, from 1st May, 1892, to 30th April, 1893, the amounts payable under the guarantees were still heavy. The New South Wales share was at the rate of £11,559 per annum, in addition of course to its share of the subsidy, about £13,150.

In view of the large losses resulting from the reduction to 4s. a word, a Conference was held in Melbourne in August, 1892, when it was agreed to increase the rates to 4s. 9d. per word, made up as follows:—

An agreement in connection with this increase, which took effect from the 1st January, 1893, was executed on 13th December, 1892.

As pointed out, the agreement of March, 1891, provided for the Company sharing with the Colonies the difference between the actual receipts and £237,736; but in accordance with a resolution of the Hobart Conference, 1895, an amended agreement was executed on 30th April of that year, providing: "That the several colonies (including New Zealand, which joined in the guarantee from 1st January, 1893, on the terms mentioned under the heading of New Zealand Cable on page 29) agree to guarantee International Revenue to the Eastern Extension Telegraph Company of £227,000 per year, and to make up any loss below that amount, provided the total payment in any one year shall not exceed £10,000, and to guarantee a revenue of £20,000 on the New Zealand Cable, and to make up any loss below that sum, provided the payment in any one year shall not exceed £9,000; provided always that rates not higher than those now ruling be charged by the Eastern Extension Telegraph Company during currency of such guarantee—such arrangement to be for a fixed period of five years."

On

On the 7th July, 1897, Queensland also became a party to the guarantees to the Cable Company (in connection with both the International and New Zealand business) and the South Australian Government, but not to the subsidies payable to the Company in respect of the Port Darwin-Banjoewangie and Tasmanian Cables.

In March, 1897, the Eastern Extension Company stating that "with a view to meeting the demand, which is believed to exist, for additional telegraphic communication between Great Britain and the Australasian Colonies, quite independent of the Mediterranean route," placed before the British Government proposals of which the following is the substance :—

An alternative line of cables between England, the Cape and Australia, touching only at Gibraltar, Sierra Leone, Ascension, St. Helena, Durban, Mauritius, Rodrigues, and Cocos.

They pointed out that this scheme would cost at least £2,000,000, and, in return, asked to be granted the following privileges, namely :—

1. An annual subsidy from the Imperial Government of £25,000, payable for twenty years, for connecting St. Helena, Ascension, Rodrigues, and Cocos.
2. An extension by the Australian Governments for a period of at least ten years of the subsidy of £32,400 per annum now paid to the Company for duplicating the Port Darwin cable.
3. An undertaking by the Governments concerned that for a fixed period they will not subsidise any opposition line connecting any of the places served at present by the Associated Companies.
4. That the Governments of Cape Colony and Natal place at their disposal, free of cost, two wires between Cape Town and Durban.
5. An improved land service (underground throughout, if practicable) to be given to the Companies between London and Porthcurnow for the transmission of their "through" traffic; the communication at present being dependent on aerial lines, which are liable to interruption whenever exceptionally severe weather prevails along the Channel.

In formulating the above proposal, they stated that they had endeavoured to make the route to the Cape and Australia as direct as possible, but that, should a direct connection with Ceylon be particularly desired, the Company would be prepared to provide it by laying a separate cable from Seychelles to Point de Galle, touching at Diego Garcia.

These proposals were supplemented in February last by a further one from the Company to extend the proposed Cape cable to Albany, and thence lay, work, and maintain a cable to Glenelg, or thereabouts, provided the Australian Governments would continue the existing subsidy of £32,400 per annum for 20 years. They pointed out that this would increase the length of the Cape cable by nearly 1,500 knots, and involve the Company in an additional outlay of at least £200,000.

The first proposal has been relegated to a Committee in England, the Agents-General for New South Wales and South Australia representing Australian interests.

The following statement shows, as accurately as possible (all the accounts in connection with the international cable service being kept in Adelaide), the business transacted, and the total receipts by the Company in respect of the Australasian traffic, from 1889 to 1897, inclusive :—

There was no interruption to cable communication between Port Darwin and Banjoewangie during the year 1897, but the following interruptions occurred on the land line to Port Darwin, namely:—

- 7th January, 6:30 a.m., to 8th January, 10 a.m.
- 17th July, 4 p.m., to 19th July, 4 p.m.
- 18th September, 8 a.m., to 5:15 p.m.
- 9th December, 4:10 p.m., to 12th December, 1:45 p.m.

New Zealand Cable.

On the 15th April, 1873, Mr. Saul Samuel, then Postmaster-General of New South Wales, submitted for the approval of the Governor-in-Council an Agreement to be entered into between the Governments of New South Wales and New Zealand, and Messrs. Siemens Bros., showing the conditions for the construction of a telegraph cable between New Zealand and New South Wales, and one between Normanton, in Queensland, and Singapore. The terms of the agreement were (*inter alia*):—

1. The arrangement to be for a guarantee of 5 per cent. for a term not exceeding thirty-five years, upon a sum not exceeding £1,000,000 for the cost of the two lines.
2. £12,000 per annum to be allowed, to cover in full all expenses. All receipts above £12,000 to pass in reduction of the guarantee. The contractors to retain receipts in excess of the guarantee, but if the profits are more than 10 per cent., the Governments may require that the rates shall be lowered to amounts calculated to reduce the profits to 10 per cent.
3. Guarantee to be paid only whilst lines are in working order. If New Zealand line only in order, one-third of guarantee to be paid; if Singapore line only in order, two-thirds of guarantee to be paid.
4. The cost per message of twenty words from New Zealand to New South Wales not to exceed 15s.; each word above twenty, 9d.
5. The three Governments (New South Wales, New Zealand, and Queensland) to act in unison and jointly to arrange the details.

The conditions of agreement were approved by the Governor-in-Council on the 17th April, 1873; by the Legislative Assembly of Queensland on the 18th June, 1893, and by the Governor-in-Council, New Zealand, on the 4th June, 1873. In the latter colony, "The Telegraph Cables Subsidy Agreement Ratification Act, 1873," was passed (29th September) under which the expenditure from the revenue of New Zealand for the purposes of the said Agreement was limited to £17,000 per annum for not more than thirty-five years.

The Conditions of Agreement were considered in Committee of the Whole of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales on the 27th May, 1874; approved, and transmitted to the Legislative Council, and agreed to by the Council on the 2nd June.

Negotiations with Messrs. Siemens Brothers having fallen through in April, 1875, an offer was received from the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Company, Limited, to carry out the work, and arrangements were settled by the Agents-General in London in May following.

On the 10th June, 1875, Mr. J. F. Burns, then Postmaster-General of New South Wales, moved the consideration of a resolution in the Legislative Assembly, "That this House approves of the Government uniting with the Government of New Zealand in accepting a contract for the construction of an electric cable between New Zealand and New South Wales on the following terms and conditions:—

1. That the contracting Governments may guarantee a subsidy of £7,500 per annum for ten years, for the construction and maintenance of the cable; two-thirds of such subsidy to be payable by the Colony of New Zealand, and one-third by the Colony of New South Wales.
2. That the cost per message of ten words by the cable shall not exceed 7s. 6d., and 9d. for every additional word.

The Resolution was agreed to.

On

On the 24th June, 1875, an agreement relating to a submarine cable between New Zealand and Australia was entered into between the Governors of New Zealand and New South Wales, and the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Company, whereby it was provided, *inter alia*, that the Company should, on or before the 30th April, 1876, lay a cable between the coast of Blind Bay, or Golden Bay, New Zealand, and Sydney; keep the same in good repair, and provide a vessel for such purpose. That the said Governors should give the Company the use of a room in the Government offices at the terminal points. That Government messages should have priority. That the tariff should not exceed 7s. 6d. for a ten-word message, and 9d. for each additional word (names and addresses of sender and addressee being counted as part of the message), with a proviso for reduction to 5s. and 6d. respectively in case the average number of messages amounted to 200 per day during any period of six months, such reduction to take effect from the expiration of the said period; that the said Governors should not make any terminal charge beyond ordinary rates; that New Zealand should pay a subsidy of £5,000 and New South Wales £2,500 per annum for ten years from the opening of the cable, with a proviso for reduction of subsidy if line not working for an aggregate period of ninety days in any one year.

In January, 1876, it was decided to alter the New South Wales terminal point of the cable from Sydney to Botany. This change necessitated the construction of a land line from Botany to Sydney, and as the Telegraph Act would not permit of such line being in the hands of a company, it was decided, by conference held by telegraph, to make a terminal charge of 6d. per telegram of ten words and $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each additional word, for delivery in Sydney.

The cable was opened for communication on the 20th February, 1878.

In July, 1878, Mr. J. F. Burns made an agreement in New Zealand with the Postmaster-General of that colony and the Managing Director of the Company that, in consideration of the two Governments releasing the company from the necessity of keeping a repairing steamer, as required by the agreement of 1875, the charge for cablegrams between the two colonies should be reduced to 6s. for ten words, and 7d. for each additional word; and each of the colonies undertook to charge only 6d. land carriage for a ten-word message, with 1d. for each additional word. The New Zealand Government also undertook to pay a portion of the subsidy for the duplication of the Port Darwin cable. This payment was made up to 1880, when the New Zealand House of Representatives negatived a resolution approving of the agreement made for payment of such subsidy, and no further contribution has been paid by New Zealand.

In September, 1880, the Postmaster-General of New Zealand telegraphed to the Postmaster-General of New South Wales that it was proposed to give effect to the reduced rate in the former colony from the 1st October then next, and it appears that such reduced rate duly came into force in New Zealand in October or November, 1880. New South Wales, however, continued to charge the higher rate until 1st June, 1882, when Executive authority was obtained to reduce the payments to the company to 6s. for the first ten words and 7d. for each additional word; New South Wales and New Zealand, for land rates, to receive respectively 6d. for the first ten words and 1d. for each additional word. The charges to the public were then reduced to 7s. for the first ten words and 9d. for each additional word.

From the 1st September, 1887, the New South Wales proportion, namely, 8s. per 100 words, of the rate charged for the transmission of press telegrams to and from New Zealand, was reduced to 3s. for the first 100 words and 1s. 6d. for each additional 50 words or fraction thereof.

During the year 1889 a proposal was made by the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Company to lay a duplicate cable between New South Wales and New Zealand, conditionally upon receiving a guarantee from the colonies concerned that they would protect the Company from competition in regard to cablegrams between Australia and New Zealand. This condition being considered prejudicial to the several colonies, the proposal was declined. The Company then, in its own interest, decided to lay the second cable without the stipulated guarantee, and the work was completed on the 6th May, 1890.

In

In August, 1892, a conference of delegates from New South Wales, South Australia, and Victoria met at Melbourne. At this conference the following proposal, submitted by New Zealand, was agreed to:—That, in consideration of the Company reducing the rates between Australia and New Zealand to 3d. per word for international, and 2s. for the first ten words, and 3d. for each additional word for intercolonial messages, and sharing with New Zealand one-half of the loss based on the average traffic of the previous three years (£26,258), and of the other Colonies sharing with New Zealand the remaining half of such loss, New Zealand would become a contributor on the same terms as the other Colonies towards the guarantees to the Company and South Australia in connection with the reduction in the International rates.

An agreement was executed between the Governments of the Colonies concerned and the Company on the 13th December, 1892, and in accordance therewith the following reduced rates for the transmission of cablegrams to New Zealand were brought into operation on the 1st January, 1893:—

In pursuance of a resolution of the Hobart Conference (1895), an agreement, dated 30th April, 1895, was made between Her Majesty the Queen, by the authority of the respective Governments of New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand, and the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Company, providing that on and after the 1st May, 1895, the amount of guarantee should be reduced to £20,000, with a limit of loss of £9,000 per annum, the arrangement to continue for a fixed period of five years.

Under this agreement the amount guaranteed by the contributing Colonies is two-thirds of the loss; New Zealand paying the remaining one-third, in addition to sharing, on a population basis, with the contributing Colonies in the payment of the two-thirds. The Company bears no share of the loss.

The gross deficiency for the year ended 30th April, 1897, was £3,856. Of this amount New Zealand paid one-third, amounting to £1,285, and a portion of the remaining two-thirds, amounting to £467 10s. 9d., or £1,752 10s. 9d. in all. The balance paid by the other contributing Colonies, therefore, amounted to £2,103 9s. 3d. Queensland became a party to this guarantee from 7th July, 1897.

New Caledonia Cable.

An agreement was entered into in April, 1892, between this Colony and the Société Française des Télégraphes Sous-marins (the name of which has since been changed to the "Compagnie Française des Câbles Télégraphiques,") under which the latter undertook to lay a submarine cable for the purpose of establishing telegraphic communication between Queensland and New Caledonia, in consideration of the payment by New South Wales (Queensland having agreed to contribute a like amount) of an annual sum for a period of thirty years, at the rate of £2,000 a year, or such smaller sum as shall, together with one-sixth of the net sum received by the Company for messages passing over the cable during the year, after deducting working expenses, which are not to exceed £2,400 a year, amount to £2,000. It was provided that the Government should have the free use of the cable for Government messages up to a maximum value of £2,000 in each year.

Communication

Communication with New Caledonia was established on the 18th October, 1893, the following being the rates charged, viz. :—

Of these charges the Company received 6s. for the first ten words and 6d. for each additional word in respect of ordinary, and half these rates in respect of Press messages, the balance (except in the case of messages for Noumea, the extra charge of 2d. per word for which was credited to New Caledonia) being divided equally between New South Wales and Queensland.

The New Caledonian Telegraph authorities having reduced, from the 18th April, 1894, the rate for the transmission of Press messages over the lines of that Colony from 2d. to 1d. per word, a corresponding reduction was made in the charges for Press messages transmitted from this Colony to New Caledonia, from the same date.

From the 1st January, 1897, the rate for ordinary messages to New Caledonia was reduced to 10d. per word, which was apportioned as follows :—

and from the 1st June, 1898, the charge for Press messages was reduced to 5d. per word, of which 3½d. is credited to the Company, and the balance divided equally between New South Wales, Queensland, and New Caledonia.

One of the clauses of the agreement provides that if the cable shall become silent or unable to be used, and remain so for 30 days, the guarantee shall cease from the expiration of such 30 days, until the cable is restored and is again in good working order. This provision was enforced in connection with the break in the cable which occurred on the 30th October, 1897, and which was not repaired until the 20th January, 1898.

Tasmania Cable.

Under an agreement dated 24th January, 1868, and made between the Tasmanian Government and the Telegraph Construction and Maintenance Company, Limited (the rights of which Company have since been acquired by the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Co., Limited), an electric telegraph cable was laid between Victoria and Tasmania, the subsidy payable in respect thereof being a sum of £4,200 per annum for a period of twenty years.

A supplemental agreement was executed on the 14th March, 1889, extending the term for the payment of the subsidy for a further period of twenty years from the 1st May, 1889.

Tasmania having agreed to become a contributor, jointly with the other Australasian Colonies (Queensland and New Zealand excepted), to the subsidy of £32,400 per annum, payable to the Company in respect of the duplicate cable between Port Darwin and Banjoewangie, and the guarantee to the Company and the South Australian Government in connection with the reduction in the international rates, the Colonies referred to agreed to share with Tasmania, on the basis of population, the payment of the subsidy of £4,200 in respect of the Tasmanian cable from the 1st May, 1891, the formal agreement being executed on the 1st November, 1892.

At the Hobart Conference (February, 1895) the representatives of the several Colonies (Queensland excepted) "agreed to share with Victoria, as regards the

Tasmania

Tasmania cable, the guarantee of that Colony in the usual proportion (population basis) to pay the first £1,000 of the loss in any one year, and half of any additional loss beyond the £1,000, this guarantee being in addition to the subsidy of £4,200 a year."

Proposed Pacific Cable.

A brief statement of the various proceedings which have taken place in connection with the proposed establishment of cable communication between Canada and the Australasian Colonies will, no doubt, prove interesting, and be hereafter found useful as a record. I therefore give below a sketch of the movement up to the present date.

At a Colonial Conference held in London in 1887, the following resolution, moved at the instance of Canada, was carried:—"That the connection of Canada with Australasia by direct submarine telegraph across the Pacific is a project of high importance to the Empire, and every doubt as to its practicability should, without delay, be set at rest by a thorough and exhaustive survey."

On 7th March, 1888, a resolution passed at a Postal Conference held in Sydney, all the Australian Colonies being represented, was telegraphed to Lord Knutsford. The telegram asked that the Admiralty might be moved to make an early survey of a suitable route "for ocean cable telegraph by way of Pacific Ocean, *via* Vancouver Island, the cost to be defrayed by Her Majesty's Government, the Government of Canada, and the Australasian Colonies." The Colonial Office immediately communicated with the Admiralty, and asked for an approximate estimate of the probable cost of a survey. The Admiralty replied on 4th April, 1888. Their letter stated that H.M.S. "Egeria" was on the point of sailing from Sydney to clear up the dangers, and fix the positions of, and survey the islands on, the route from New Zealand to Vancouver, and that the vessel had orders to obtain, in the course of this work, deep soundings, which would, in two or three years, furnish more detailed information than now existed as to the varieties of depths to be expected on the general line of cable. To survey a route for a cable to any purpose would, it was pointed out, entail long searching for the best line, examination of contours of coral islands, and continuous close soundings; and three years' steady work at that and nothing else would probably not complete the survey. The operations of the "Egeria" would furnish gradually, at a minimum cost, the preliminary information required, and a great part of that directly bearing on the laying of a cable. It was, therefore, not considered advisable to make any alterations in the orders under which the "Egeria" was about to act; and, the letter proceeded, "as no vessel can be spared from her hydrographic work in any other part of the world, the question of hastening the survey by providing another vessel must, in their Lordship's opinion, remain open, until Lord Knutsford is able to inform this Department that there is a reasonable prospect that the funds for the construction of the submarine cable across the Pacific will be found, and that time is of importance in Imperial interests." As to the probable cost of the survey, it was stated that the annual cost of H.M.S. "Egeria" was about £12,000, and that if a similar vessel were provided especially for the purpose of making a complete survey of the best ocean route and landing-places, the cost would be about £36,000. This estimate was irrespective of the value of the vessel and the cost of fitting her out.

In the opinion expressed in the letter from the Admiralty, that the question of accelerating the survey must remain open until there was a prospect that the funds for the construction of the cable would be found, the Imperial Government concurred. There the matter rested. The "Egeria" commenced her work in the Pacific, but being shortly afterwards withdrawn, her surveying operations were stopped.

At an Intercolonial Conference held at Wellington in March, 1894, the following resolution was passed:—"That, considering the important interests involved, both of a national and commercial character, in the establishment of a Pacific cable, the representatives of the respective Colonies assembled at this Conference recommend their Governments to consider the desirability of entering into a guarantee with the other countries interested, for a period not exceeding fourteen years, and to guarantee interest at 4 per cent. on a capital of not more than £1,800,000 to any company undertaking the laying of a Pacific cable; the tariff not to exceed 3s. per word for ordinary telegrams, 2s. per word for Government telegrams,

telegrams, and 1s. 6d. per word for Press telegrams, to and from Great Britain and the Colonies; and that the United Kingdom be asked to join in the guarantee; the routes to be either of the following:—Brisbane to Ahipara Bay (New Zealand), Ahipara Bay to Suva, Suva to Apia, Apia to Fanning Island, Fanning Island to Sandwich Islands, Sandwich Islands to Vancouver; or, from New Zealand to Suva, Suva to Apia, Apia to Fanning Island, Fanning Island to Sandwich Islands, Sandwich Islands to Vancouver.”

The question was next considered at the Colonial Conference held at Ottawa, Canada, in June, 1894, at which New South Wales was represented by the Honorable F. B. Suttor, M.P.

(2) At this Conference the following resolutions were agreed to:—

“That, in the opinion of this Conference, immediate steps should be taken to provide telegraphic communication by cable, free from foreign control, between the Dominion of Canada and Australasia.”

“That the Imperial Government be respectfully requested to undertake at the earliest possible moment, and to prosecute with all possible speed, a thorough survey of the proposed cable route between Canada and Australia; the expense to be borne in equal proportions by Great Britain, Canada, and the Australasian Colonies.”

“That it is for the interest of the Empire that, in case of the construction of a cable between Canada and Australasia, such cable should be extended from Australasia to the Cape of Good Hope; and that for that purpose arrangements should be made between the Imperial and South African Governments for a survey of the latter route.”

“That, in view of the desirability of having a choice of routes for a cable connection between Canada and Australasia, the Home Government be requested to take immediate steps to secure neutral landing ground on some one of the Hawaiian Islands, in order that the cable may remain permanently under British control.”

“That the Canadian Government be requested, after the rising of this Conference, to make all necessary inquiries, and, generally, to take such steps as may be expedient, in order to ascertain the cost of the proposed Pacific cable, and promote the establishment of the undertaking in accordance with the views expressed in this Conference.”

The Canadian Government, in furtherance of the last resolution, obtained tenders for cables by various routes, and submitted them to Mr. Sandford Fleming, C.M.G., for report.

His report, dated 1st December, 1894, giving full particulars of the tenders, and going into the scheme generally, was sent by the Canadian Minister for Trade and Commerce (the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell) to the Premier of New South Wales in a despatch dated 8th December.

It should be here stated that the Canadian Government in asking for these tenders, intimated that offers would be received in three different forms, *i.e.*:—

Form A.—Cable to be owned and controlled by Government, to be worked under Government authority, and to be kept in repair by the Contractor for three years.

Form B.—Cable to be owned, maintained, and worked by the Company under a fixed subsidy for a term of years.

Form C.—Cable to be owned, maintained, and worked by the Company under a Government guarantee of traffic for a term of years.

A number of tenders came in, but the one which received most favour was that from the India-rubber, Gutta-percha, and Telegraph Works Company at £1,517,000 (the route to be from Vancouver, with mid-stations at Fanning Island, Fiji, and Norfolk Island, and with branches from Norfolk Island to New Zealand and New South Wales) complete, including maintenance for three years in each case.

At an Intercolonial Conference held at Hobart in February, 1895, which had before it the report of Lord Jersey, the British delegate to Ottawa, and that of Mr. Sandford Fleming, the Honorable Mr. Thynne, representative of Queensland, moved the following resolution:—“That, in the opinion of this Conference, it is desirable that (a) the construction, working, and maintenance of a submarine cable through British territory, or under British control, from Vancouver Island to

Australasia

Australasia be undertaken by the Governments of Great Britain, the Dominion of Canada, and the Australasian Colonies as a joint national and public work; (b) the cost of its construction, working, and maintenance be borne in the following proportions:—Great Britain, one-third; the Dominion of Canada, one-third; and the Australasian Colonies, one-third.

In the debate which followed, it was pointed out that there was no evidence as to what Canada and England were prepared to do, beyond the mere fact of their communicating the particulars of the tenders received; and I expressed the opinion that before any steps were taken in the matter, further than a very general resolution, the various Governments should enter into negotiations and determine the lines upon which the cable should be proceeded with, and moved the following amendment:—“That this Conference reaffirms the desirableness of the construction of the Pacific cable to connect the Australian Colonies and Canada; and in view of the ascertained practicability of the scheme, respectfully urges upon the various Colonial Governments that steps be taken for the furtherance of the project at the earliest opportunity.”

Mr. Thynne, before the closing of the debate, read the following cable message from Sir Mackenzie Bowell, relating to some papers already on their way to Sydney:—“Papers sustain Fleming’s memorandum of 1st December, urging State ownership, and appointment joint Commission to arrange details subject to approval of Governments.” Mr. Thynne’s motion was then withdrawn, and my amendment carried.

Subsequent to the Ottawa Conference, a suggestion was made by Mr. Sandford Fleming, in a letter dated 8th January, 1895, that a joint Commission be appointed for the purposes of considering and reporting upon the whole subject, the Commission to consist of three members, representing (1) the Imperial Government, (2) the Australasian Colonies, and (3) the Dominion of Canada; and on the 13th February the Canadian Government cabled to the Premier of this Colony as follows:—

“Inform Colonial Governments circumstances have arisen absolutely necessary that immediate action submarine cable joint Commission suggested by last mail strongly recommended.”

The Premier accordingly communicated the substance of the foregoing to the various Australasian Governments, and on the 16th April replied to Sir Mackenzie Bowell in the following terms:—

“The only reply that may be said to be favourable to your suggested action came from the Premier of Queensland. I am to add that the Government of New South Wales, on a full review of the whole of the circumstances, see no prospect of united action on the lines suggested in your letter; and, further, we are of opinion that it is not advisable. This decision must not be construed as one unfriendly to the project, which is now under the best consideration of the Government.”

While this correspondence was proceeding, the project was being strongly supported by Mr. J. S. Larke, the Canadian Commissioner in this Colony, and on the 13th June, 1895, a deputation waited on the Premier urging the necessity of carrying into effect as early as possible the resolution of the Hobart Conference. The deputation submitted figures in support of their statement that the proposed line, while providing for a cable tariff at the low rate of 2s. a word, would in a very short time yield a surplus of revenue over expenditure of about £150,000 a year, and that this surplus would go on increasing. The Premier in reply pointed out that their calculations differed very materially from the official estimates. He admitted that the enterprise was a good one, especially in view of the fact that the line would traverse British possessions in its entire route, and be under British control; and he promised to place the matter before the Government, and added that the Agent-General had already been instructed to give it his attention.

The question next received consideration at a Conference held in Sydney, in January, 1896, when the following report was adopted:—

1. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the Pacific Cable should be constructed and owned jointly by the various Governments interested.
2. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the landing-places of such cable should be only upon territory belonging to or under the control of the British Empire.
3. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the cost of its construction, working, and maintenance be borne in the following proportions, namely:—Great Britain, one-third; the Dominion of Canada, one-third; and the contributing Australasian Colonies, one-third.

4. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the route from Fiji to Australia be *via* Norfolk Island, thence bifurcating to the nearest convenient landing-places in the north of New Zealand and Moreton Bay respectively.
5. That, in the opinion of this Conference, it is highly desirable that South Australia join the other Colonies in the Pacific cable project, and having regard to their vested interests in the transcontinental line, Dr. Cockburn be invited to make a proposition, embodying the terms on which the South Australian Government would be prepared to join the other Colonies in the said project.

The Hon. Dr. Cockburn intimated the following as the proposal of the South Australian Government, viz. :—South Australia is willing to join in the project provided that a guarantee, either from the contributing Colonies alone, or jointly with the Imperial Government, be given, that the financial position of South Australia, as regards the Port Darwin line, be maintained on the basis of the average of the last five years.

The Hon. Mr. Reeves, representing New Zealand, stated that he had received a cable from the Hon. Mr. Ward, Postmaster-General of that Colony, with regard to the terms on which New Zealand would come in as a contributing Colony, to the effect that, of course, it would be very disadvantageous to New Zealand to come in on an equally responsible footing with the other three Colonies ; at the same time, Mr. Ward would be prepared to give way and do so, annexing, however, the stipulation that Victoria and New South Wales should join with New Zealand in facing any possible loss on the present cable.

6. That, in the opinion of this Conference, the Colonies joining contribute equally to the undertaking.
(The Hon. Dr. Cockburn and the Hon. Mr. Reeves refrained from voting on the above.)
7. That, in the opinion of this Conference, in consideration of South Australia joining with the other contributing Colonies in the Pacific cable project, they would be willing, jointly with Great Britain, to guarantee that Colony against further loss in connection with their transcontinental line in consequence of the construction of the new cable.
8. That, in the opinion of this Conference, Sir Saul Samuel, K.C.M.G., C.B., and the Hon. Duncan Gillies be nominated as representatives of the Australasian Colonies on the Commission in connection with the Pacific cable, and that they be requested to consult on all important points the Agents-General for the Australasian Colonies.
9. That, in the opinion of this Conference, it be a recommendation to the Governments represented at this Conference to forward the foregoing resolutions to the Australasian Commissioners.

The Commission met in London in June, 1896, but their work was not finished until 5th January, 1897, and the report, when issued, was confidential, the despatch from the Agent-General, which accompanied it, stating that its contents should not in any way be made public until it had been laid before the Imperial Parliament.

Deputations have since waited on me, urging that the Pacific cable be no longer delayed, pointing out its superiority in time of war; that the land lines connecting it would entirely pass through English-speaking territory; that it would ensure a cheaper tariff and would pay from the start.

At a conference of Premiers in Melbourne, on the 11th March last, a resolution endorsing the recommendation of the Sydney Conference (January, 1896) previously alluded to, was carried, and at the Postal and Telegraphic Conference which met in Hobart at the end of the same month, the following resolution was passed :—“That this Conference re-affirms the opinion that in the interests of Australasia the Pacific Cable project should be consummated as speedily as practicable, and that the Governments of the various Australasian colonies be requested to represent to the Imperial and Dominion Governments the foregoing opinion, together with the proposal of the Premiers as agreed to at their recent Conference held in Melbourne, viz. :—That if Great Britain and Canada would each contribute one-third of the cost, the Colonies would be prepared to contribute the remaining one-third.”

The

The following return shows the amounts paid by each of the Colonies in connection with cable subsidies and guarantees during the twelve months ended on the date mentioned in each case :—

INTERNATIONAL TELEGRAPH CONFERENCE.

In June, 1896, the eighth International Telegraph Conference assembled at Buda-Pesth, this Colony being represented by the Agent-General, Sir Saul Samuel, K.C.M.G., C.B.

The following summary of the most important proceedings of this Conference is extracted from the Report of the Postmaster-General of the United Kingdom for the year ended 31st March, 1897 :—

The Convention, embodying the modifications agreed upon by the Conference, was signed on the 22nd July, 1896, and the new regulations and tariffs took effect on the 1st July, 1897.

One of the principal subjects discussed at the Conference was the official vocabulary for code telegrams. This is a question which has excited much attention in commercial circles in the United Kingdom, and a summary of the leading points at issue is given in the Appendix.

Appendix H.

Another important subject dealt with at the Conference was the equivalent of the franc in local currency. In countries where the cable companies had a free hand, and also in British India, the equivalent of the charges as fixed in francs had from time to time been raised in proportion to each fall in the currency. But in certain other countries the depreciated currency had been taken as a standard both for the collection of the charges and for the settlement of the accounts. This pressed heavily on the companies whose cables afforded communication with the countries in question. The administration over whose line a message is first despatched, receives, of course, from the sender the whole charge for the telegram, retains its own share, and credits the balance to the administration to whose lines it transfers the message. The second administration acts in the same way towards a third administration, and so on. Thus the companies in question had in certain cases to credit to other administrations on a gold basis large sums for which they had themselves only received credit in depreciated silver. In this way, in the case of certain high-priced traffic, they were called upon not only to transmit a telegram for nothing, but also to incur an actual loss by paying over to another administration more money than they had received. The acceptance of the depreciated currency also involved the collection in many cases of a lower charge in one direction than in the other. It was recognised by the Conference that this anomaly ought to be removed, and it was decided to adopt new regulations imposing on every State an obligation to fix in its currency an equivalent approaching as nearly as possible the actual value of the franc in gold; to declare this equivalent at the present time; and, in the event of an important fluctuation, to declare from time to time a new equivalent based on the mean course of exchanging during the preceding three months. In pursuance of this resolution, several States at once made declarations, raising the equivalent of the franc in their currency from the 1st July, 1897, the date from which the new regulations took effect.

The regulations were improved and simplified in many points of detail. Of these modifications the most important was the adoption, in the case of telegrams for extra-European countries, of the more liberal method of counting in force in the case of European telegrams. In virtue of this decision the number of letters allowed to a word in plain language in extra-European telegrams was increased, from the 1st July, 1897, from 10 to 15, and the number of figures from three to five.

The loss of revenue through this alteration falls mainly on the cable companies who provide communication with distant parts of the world. Throughout the Conference the representatives of those companies showed a disposition to make such concessions as were practicable in favour of the public, and they agreed to several substantial reductions of tariff.

The following is a list of the principal reductions which have been arranged in connection with the negotiations carried on at Buda-Pesth. Some of these regulations

regulations took effect from the 1st January, 1897, and the remainder came into operation from the 1st July, 1897:—

The length of lines opened during the year was 240 miles and 48 chains, and additional wires erected 1,841 miles and 67 chains, the cost of construction, including expenditure on tunnels, being £36,361 14s. 8d.

In addition to the Central Exchange at the General Post Office, Exchanges are now open in the following Suburbs:—Ashfield, Balmain, Burwood, Chatswood, Edgecliff, Hunter's Hill, Kogarah, Manly, Newtown, North Sydney, Parramatta, Petersham, Randwick, Rookwood, Wahroonga, and Waverley; and at Bathurst, Broken Hill, Cobar, Dubbo, Goulburn, Lithgow, Newcastle, Wagga Wagga, and West Maitland in the country. Telephone Bureaux for the use of the Public, on payment of a small fee, are now open at the General Post Office, Sydney, Ashfield, Balmain, Burwood, Chatswood, Cobar, Edgecliff, Hunter's Hill, Kogarah, Manly, Newtown, North Sydney, Parramatta, Petersham, Randwick, Redfern Railway Station, Rookwood, Rozelle, Wahroonga, and Waverley.

Public telephone offices were opened during the year at Bell (railway station), Blackville, Medlow, Myrtle Creek, Obley, Terara, Tintenbar, and Willoughby (in lieu of the telegraph offices previously existing at these places) and at Central Tilba, Cookardina, Coramba, Corrimal, Greenhill, Gunnedah (railway station), Karangi, Kellyville, Moongulla, Narrabeen, Rouse Hill, South Murwillumbah (railway station), Upper Bucca Bucca, Whittingham, and William Town.

The telephone offices at Chatswood, Cockle Creek, Dapto, Daysdale, Finley, and Walla Walla, were converted into telegraph offices.

The name of the office at Daviesville was changed to Bodangora.

Construction of Tunnels in the City of Sydney.

The construction of the main subway from the General Post Office along Pitt-street to the Railway Station, which was commenced in 1896, was proceeded with and completed.

Electric Light.

The electric light installations undertaken by the Department have, during the year, worked satisfactorily.

This light has been further extended to a number of the offices throughout the General Post Office.

In Martin-place six "Jandus enclosed arc lamps" (latest pattern of arc lamp) have been erected in lieu of the old incandescent lamps. The change has effected a marked improvement, inasmuch as, with the Jandus lamps, about three times more light is now obtained at one-third less power than was the case with the incandescent lights.

Six additional arc lamps have been erected at the "P. and O.," "Orient," and "M.M." Companies wharfs, Circular Quay.

The electric lighting in connection with the "Record Reign Celebrations," at the Government buildings was carried out successfully, and although the electric light plants at the respective stations were severely taxed, it is reported that everything worked smoothly and without any hitch.

Additions to the General Post Office.

About fifteen years since land on the south side of the General Post Office, having a frontage of about 32 feet to George-street, was resumed. The premises on the land were at the time of resumption being used as a cafe and a tobacconist's shop. Shortly after resumption by the Government they were utilised for various purposes, namely, letter-carriers' sorting-room, telegraph messengers' waiting-room, telephone-workshop, electric light machinery, railway parcels office, &c.

In September, 1895, these premises, which were very old, were reported as unsafe, and it was, therefore, necessary to devise some means of providing temporarily for the staff in occupation of them, with a view to pulling down the old premises and erecting others in lieu thereof. The question also arose as to whether the new premises should be of a temporary or permanent character, and after due consideration it was decided—especially as more space was wanted in the Department generally—to erect and finish them in such a way as to harmonise with the present George-street front; temporary premises being erected on the opposite side of Martin-place to provide for the railway parcels office and telephone workshop; the letter-carriers being provided for by means of a temporary structure over a portion of the yard of the present building. Plans were accordingly prepared by the Government Architect, and ultimately approved, providing for the projecting bay

at

at present on the south corner being pulled down and re-erected on the southern boundary of the resumed land, filling up the space between, so as to harmonise with the remaining intermediate portion. The clock overlooking George-street, which has been removed, will again be erected in the centre of the building. The work is being proceeded with by day labour as expeditiously as possible, and it is hoped will be completed in the course of some few months.

Additions are also in progress in Pitt-street, where another storey is being erected to accommodate the daily increasing business of the telephone exchange.

APPENDIX D.

ARRANGEMENT FOR AN EXCHANGE OF PARCELS BETWEEN THE POST OFFICE OF INDIA AND THE POST OFFICE OF NEW SOUTH WALES.

In order to establish an exchange of parcels between India and New South Wales, the undersigned, duly authorised for that purpose, have agreed upon the following articles:—

Article 1.

There shall be a regular exchange of parcels between the Post Office of India and the Post Office of New South Wales, by means of the steamers of the Peninsular and Oriental and Orient Steam Navigation Companies.

Article 2.

The exchange of parcels between the two countries shall be performed exclusively through offices of exchange. The offices of exchange shall be on the side of India, Tuticorin, and on the side of New South Wales, Sydney.

Article 3.

Prepayment of parcel postage shall be compulsory, at the rate of 1s., or the equivalent thereof, per pound. The postage rate shall be apportioned as follows:—

Indian share for inland transit	5d.
Colonial " 	5d.
Sea transit	2d.
	1s.

Article 4.

Parcels shall be despatched in mail-bags, or boxes, with the ordinary mails. If boxes be used the cost thereof shall be shared equally by the two countries.

Article 5.

The maximum limit of weight for a parcel shall be 11 lb. No such parcel shall exceed 3 ft. 6 in. in length, or 6 feet in length and girth combined.

Article 6.

Parcels exchanged between the two countries may not contain substances of a dangerous, damaging, or offensive nature, or contraband articles, or substances, or liquids (unless securely packed in proper cases), nor may they contain a letter.

Article 7.

Every parcel shall bear the name and address of the person for whom it is intended, given with such completeness as will enable delivery to be effected.

Article 8.

The sender of a parcel shall be responsible that it is securely packed in such a manner as to protect the contents from damage.

Article 9.

Every parcel shall be accompanied by a declaration of its contents, and value, signed by the sender. The declaration shall also contain the address of the parcel.

Article 10.

The conditions as to the posting, transmission, delivery of parcels (including the levy of customs duty, and other charges), and re-direction within the limits of the country of destination, shall be governed by the regulations of the country concerned.

Article

Article 11.

Parcels exchanged between the two countries shall be entered in invoices in the annexed form "A," or "AA," prepared by the despatching office of exchange. The invoices, accompanied by the declarations of contents and value mentioned in Article 9, relating to the parcels entered therein, shall be forwarded with the parcels to the office of exchange of the country of destination.

Article 12.

The invoices despatched by each office of exchange shall be numbered in a consecutive series, commencing with No. 1 for the first invoice of each calendar year, and these numbers shall be termed the invoice numbers. The entries in each invoice shall also be numbered consecutively, commencing with No. 1 for each invoice, and these numbers shall be termed the entry numbers.

Article 13.

A label in the annexed Form "B," or "BB," shall be affixed to each parcel despatched. The label shall contain the particulars for which provision is made on the form. The invoice number and entry number entered in the label shall also be noted on the declaration of contents and value of the parcel to which it refers. The labels "B" or "BB" shall not, however, be required if the declarations of contents and value are affixed to the parcels to which they relate.

Article 14.

Every discrepancy between an invoice and the parcels entered therein, or other error in an invoice observed by the receiving office of exchange, shall be recorded in a verification certificate in the annexed Form "C," which shall be forwarded by return mail to the despatching office of exchange.

Article 15.

Missent parcels are forwarded to their destination by the most direct route at the disposal of the office re-transmitting them. When this re-transmission involves the return of parcels to the office of origin, the amounts credited in the invoice of that office are cancelled, and the re-transmitting office of exchange delivers these articles to the corresponding office, simply recording them on the invoice, after having called attention to the error by means of a verification certificate. In other cases, and if the amount credited to the re-transmitting office is insufficient to cover the expenses of re-transmission, which it has to defray, it recovers the difference by raising the amount entered to its credit in the invoice of the despatching office of exchange. The reason for this rectification is notified to the said office by means of a verification certificate.

Postal parcels re-directed in consequence of the removal of the addressee from one country to the other, or to another country to which postal parcels can be sent from India or New South Wales, as the case may be, are subjected by the delivering office to a charge, to be paid by the addressees, representing the quota due to this latter office, to the re-directing office, and to each intermediary office, if there be any. The re-directing office credits itself with its quota by charging it to the intermediary office, or to the office of the new destination. But if the amount chargeable for the further conveyance of a re-directed parcel is paid at the time of its re-direction, the parcel is dealt with as if it had been addressed direct from the re-transmitting country to the country of destination, and delivered without any postal charge to the addressee.

The senders of parcels which cannot be delivered shall be consulted as to the manner in which they wish to dispose of them. Communications on the subject shall be exchanged direct between the two offices of exchange. If within six months after the despatch of a letter of inquiry the office of destination has not received adequate instructions, the parcel will be returned to the office of origin. The parcel should also be returned if its delivery at a new address cannot be effected.

Articles liable to deterioration or corruption may, however, be sold immediately, without previous notice or judicial formality, for the benefit of the right party. An account of the sale is drawn up.

Parcels which have to be returned to the sender are entered in the invoice with the addition of the word "undeliverable" in the column for remarks. They are dealt with and taxed like articles re-directed in consequence of the removal of the addressees.

Parcels which cannot be delivered, returned to the sender, or otherwise disposed of, are sent back to the country of origin for disposal. Such parcels are entered in the invoice with the addition of the word "returned" in the column for observations, and the re-directing country takes credit for the amount due to it as in the case of parcels re-directed in consequence of the removal of the addressees.

Any parcel the addressee of which has left for a country to which postal parcels cannot be forwarded from India, or New South Wales, as the case may be, is dealt with as undeliverable.

If one of the prohibitions, provided for in Article 6, is brought to light in the course of post, the parcel is, without other formality, returned to the despatching office in the manner provided for in the first paragraph of the present Article.

Article 16.

A half-yearly account in the annexed Form "F" shall be prepared by the Indian Post Office at Madras. This account shall be based on the invoices in Form "A" and "AA" for the half-year corrected by the verification certificates in Form "C," received up to the date of preparation of the half-yearly account.

Article 17.

A copy of the account, mentioned in Article 16, shall be furnished by the Indian Post Office at Madras to the New South Wales Post Office at Sydney, and the balance due in settlement of the account shall be included in the Money Order account of the past quarter, by entry below the head "Special Items detailed in Annexure." No money order commission shall be payable on the balances thus included in the money order account.

Article 18.

In ordinary matters relating to the preparation, transmission, or correction of invoices, accounts, &c., or to the disposal of parcels, the offices of exchange shall be the offices of correspondence; but matters involving questions other than those of detail, shall be settled in communication between the Director-General of the Post Office of India, and the Postmaster-General of New South Wales.

Article 19.

The Indian and New South Wales Post Offices shall each have power to arrange for the transmission of parcels through the other to any country with which the other has parcel post relations on terms to be settled beforehand, by common consent, between the two Post Offices aforesaid.

Article 20.

The present arrangement shall take effect on the 1st July, 1897. It shall then continue in force until it shall be modified or determined by mutual consent of the contracting parties, or until one year after the date on which one of the contracting parties shall have notified the other of its intention to terminate it.

APPENDIX E.

AGREEMENT FOR AN EXCHANGE OF PARCELS BETWEEN THE POST OFFICE OF HAWAII AND THE POST OFFICE OF NEW SOUTH WALES.

In order to provide for the exchange of parcels between Hawaii and New South Wales, the undersigned, duly authorised for that purpose, have agreed upon the following articles :—

Article 1.

There shall be a regular exchange of parcels between the Post Office of Hawaii and the Post Office of New South Wales, by means of the Sydney-Vancouver Mail Service packets, the office of exchange on the side of Hawaii being Honolulu, and on the side of New South Wales, Sydney. This service may also include the conveyance of parcels received from Hawaii, addressed to the other Australian Colonies, and *vice versa*.

Article 2.

The rate of postage shall be one shilling, or the equivalent thereof, per lb. The postage shall be apportioned as follows :—

To the credit of Hawaii, for territorial service	5d. per lb.
To the credit of New South Wales, for territorial service	5d. per lb.
Sea rate (to be credited to New South Wales)	2d. per lb.

Prepayment of postage shall be compulsory.

Article 3.

Parcels shall be despatched in boxes or baskets, each office providing its own receptacles, and having the right to use those of the other.

Article 4.

The maximum limit of weight for a parcel shall be 11 lb., and no parcel shall exceed 3 feet 6 inches in length, or 6 feet in length and girth combined.

Article 5.

The sender shall be responsible that the parcel is addressed with sufficient completeness to enable delivery to be effected, and is packed in such a manner as to protect the contents from damage.

Article 6.

Substances of a dangerous, damaging, or offensive nature, or contraband articles, or liquids (unless securely packed in proper cases), or a letter, current coin, or bullion, shall not be enclosed in a parcel.

Article 7.

The sender of a parcel shall be required to make a declaration as to its contents and value, on a form similar to annexure "A," which shall be affixed to the parcel and shall contain the number as shown on the parcel bill. The parcel bills shall be similar to annexure "B"; shall be prepared by the despatching office of exchange, and be numbered in a consecutive series, commencing with "1" for the first bill in each calendar year; and the entries in each bill shall likewise be numbered consecutively, commencing with "1" for each bill.

Article 8.

The conditions as to posting, transmission, delivery of a parcel (including the levy of Customs duty, and other charges), and redirection within the limits of the country of destination, shall be governed by the regulations of the country concerned.

Article 9.

The following shall be the procedure to be adopted in regard to a parcel missent, redirected, or that cannot be delivered at the place of original address :—

A missent parcel will be forwarded to its destination by the most direct route at the disposal of the office re-transmitting it. When this re-transmission involves the return of the parcel to the office of origin, the amount credited in the parcel bill of that office will be cancelled, and the re-transmitting office of exchange will deliver the parcel to the corresponding office, simply recording it on the parcel bill, after having called attention to the error by means of a verification certificate, in accordance with form "C" attached. In other cases, and if the amount credited to the retransmitting office is insufficient to cover the expenses of retransmission which it has to defray, it will recover the difference by raising the amount entered to its credit in the parcel bill of the despatching office of exchange. The reason for this rectification will be notified to the said office by means of a verification certificate.

A parcel redirected in consequence of the removal of the addressee from one country to the other, or to another country between which and the office of redirection the parcel post is in operation, will be subjected by the delivering office to a charge to be paid by the addressee, representing the quota due to this latter office, to the redirecting office, and to each intermediary office, if there be any. The redirecting office will credit itself with its quota by charging it to the intermediary office, or to the office of the new destination. But if the amount chargeable for the further conveyance of a redirected parcel be paid at the time of its redirection, the parcel will be dealt with as if it had been addressed direct from the retransmitting country to the country of destination, and delivered without any postal charge to the addressee.

The sender of a parcel which cannot be delivered will be consulted as to the manner in which it is desired to dispose of it, communications on the subject being exchanged direct between the two offices of exchange. If within six months after the despatch of a letter of inquiry the office of destination has not received adequate instructions, the parcel will be returned to the office of origin. The parcel should also be returned if its delivery at a new address cannot be effected. Articles liable to deterioration or corruption may, however, be sold immediately, without previous notice or judicial formality, for the benefit of the right party, an account of the sale being duly drawn up. A parcel which has to be returned to the sender will be entered in the parcel bill with the addition of the word "undeliverable" in the column for remarks. It will be dealt with and taxed as in the case of redirection through the removal of the addressee.

A parcel which cannot be delivered, returned to the sender, or otherwise disposed of will be sent back to the country of origin for disposal. It will be entered in the parcel bill, with the addition of the word "returned" in the column for remarks, the redirecting country taking credit for the amount due to it as in the case of redirection in consequence of the removal of the addressee. Any parcel, the addressee of which has left for a country between which and the office of address no parcels post exists, will be dealt with as "undeliverable."

If any of the prohibitions provided for in Article 6 be brought to light in the course of post, the parcel will be, without other formality, returned to the despatching office in the manner indicated in the first paragraph of this Article.

Article 10.

An account of parcels exchanged between the two countries, based on the entries contained in the parcel bills in form "B," shall be prepared annually, and rendered by the Post Office of New South Wales to the Post Office of Hawaii.

Article 11.

Every discrepancy between a parcel bill and the parcels entered thereon, or other error in a parcel bill observed by the receiving office of exchange, shall be recorded in a verification certificate, which shall be forwarded by return mail to the despatching office of exchange.

This agreement shall take effect on and from the 1st June, 1896, and shall continue in force until six months after the date on which one of the contracting parties shall have notified the other of its intention to terminate it.

APPENDIX H.

OFFICIAL VOCABULARY FOR CODE TELEGRAMS.

(Extracted from the Report of the Postmaster-General of the United Kingdom for the year ended 31 March, 1897.)

THERE has always been a tendency on the part of code-makers (owing to the desire (1) to obtain as many code expressions as possible, and (2) to adapt codes to a definite system) to make use of manufactured expressions instead of real words; and, if unchecked, this tendency would end in a large use of mere arbitrary combinations of letters (*i.e.*, letter-cypher) a result which is most undesirable, in view of the fact that such combinations are difficult to transmit.

The administrations have thus been obliged to adopt restrictive regulations. At one time words in a large number of languages were admitted, and code-makers who had coined words having the appearance of (say) Italian or German would threaten, when their attention was called to the regulations, to use Illyrian, Croatian, or Turkish. Proper names were also admitted as code words, and these were still more difficult to check. A certain firm tendered to one of the cable companies a code which they said consisted entirely of names of Polish villages not to be found in any gazetteer, and they challenged the company to disprove their assertion. This state of things could not possibly be maintained, and in 1879 the languages for code words were, by common consent, reduced to eight, viz., English, French, German, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, and Latin. At the same time, the use of proper names as code words was prohibited.

These measures palliated, but did not remove the evil. Elaborate codes were prepared purporting to be in Latin, which in reality consisted of Latin roots with terminations unknown to any Latin grammar, and often, in reality, taken from Italian or Spanish. The difficulty of applying an effective check in eight languages even led to the manufacture of codes consisting of groups of consonants arranged in a preconcerted order, and connected by vowels so as to have the appearance of actual words. The prevalence of such abuses led to disputes, resulting in delay and trouble both to the administrations and to the public.

These circumstances gave rise to the proposal to compile an official vocabulary, to contain a standard list from which there need be no appeal. The idea of an official vocabulary commended itself to many of the Continental Administrations. The cable companies also were strongly in favour of the idea, and it was welcomed by many representatives of commerce, including some of the principal Chambers of the United Kingdom. This feeling found expression in a proposal at the International Telegraph Conference, at Berlin, in 1885. The proposal was not adopted. But in the interval before the Conference of Paris, in 1890, the difficulties arising from the absence of a recognised standard became increasingly manifest, and it was decided that an official vocabulary should be compiled by the International Telegraph Bureau. From the point of view of the Administrations, the vocabulary would obviously be most advantageous. But it was felt that the restriction of code to a limited selection of words might encounter opposition on the part of the public. It was accordingly resolved to proceed tentatively. The vocabulary was in the first instance only to become obligatory in the "European" system, in which little code is used. Moreover, it was only to become compulsory for that system after three years from the date of publication. The date for compulsory use being thus postponed till the 1st January, 1898, there was an opportunity of reconsidering the question at the Conference of Budapest, in 1896.

The publication of the vocabulary in October, 1894, aroused, especially in this country, considerable criticism, which, if somewhat exaggerated, was by no means groundless. The vocabulary professed not merely to form a standard list of code words, but to maintain a sufficient degree of dissimilarity to admit of any word in the collection being used without any risk of confusion with any other word. Unfortunately, the requisite dissimilarity was not observed. Many of the words were dangerously alike, so that while the vocabulary greatly restricted the former freedom of selection, it offered no guarantee of accuracy. It was incomplete without being correct.

The British delegates urged these views at the Conference of Budapest, and ultimately, after great difficulty, an arrangement was arrived at on the following basis:—

1. The decision of the Paris Conference, under which the vocabulary would have become compulsory for European telegrams from the 1st January, 1898, to be rescinded.
2. An enlarged vocabulary to be prepared by the International Bureau.
3. The new vocabulary to become compulsory, for Extra-European as well as for European telegrams, but not until a date to be fixed by a future Conference. The next Conference will not take place before 1901. The new vocabulary will be entirely different from the existing one. It will not profess to have any regard to dissimilarity between the words. The selection, for the code-using public, of words sufficiently dissimilar will now be left to professional experts. The new official vocabulary will only serve the primary purpose of a standard collection or dictionary of legitimate code words. With the view of making the collection as complete as possible, the International Bureau has offered to include in it all legitimate words in existing codes which are submitted for insertion. By this means the public are enabled to provide against the necessity for any alteration of their codes, so far as they contain legitimate words, in the event of a future Conference confirming the decision to make the use of the new vocabulary compulsory.

Compared with the preceding year the foregoing figures show a decrease of £69,984 12s. 9d. under the head of Expenditure from Revenue, but an increase of £189,588 13s. 9d. in Loan expenditure, the net result being an increase of £119,604 1s. over last year's outgoings.

The number of persons or firms, exclusive of officers and wages men, with whom the Department had financial transactions, was 5,465, while the pay vouchers dealt with totalled 42,957.

At the close of the year (30 June, 1898), the number of contracts in progress was 840, carrying liabilities to the amount of £577,191 18s. 11d.

The reports furnished by the heads of branches relating to the year's operations in their respective spheres are appended hereto; and as each has been prepared with the greatest care and fulness of knowledge, they, together, provide an accurate and interesting record of the multifarious undertakings that have been carried on during the past year under your administration. It is, therefore, unnecessary for me, in this statement, to do more than mention a few of the more notable transactions. In connection therewith, I desire to bring specially under your notice the very fine photographic illustrations which accompany the reports, and which present in clear and attractive form some of the more important works completed or in progress during the year under review.

RAILWAY

RAILWAY AND TRAMWAY CONSTRUCTION.

Railways.

The Engineer-in-Chief for Railway Construction (Mr. Deane) reports the completion and opening for traffic during the year of the following Extension Lines :—

These extensions add 51 miles 56 chains to existing lines, thus increasing the total mileage open for traffic at 30 June, 1898, to 2,691 $\frac{1}{4}$.

The opening of the Bogan Gate to Condobolin section completes the Parkes to Condobolin extension, the total length being 62 miles 60 $\frac{1}{2}$ chains, and the total cost £117,000, or equal to about £1,865 per mile. This amount of expenditure is well within the estimated cost, and the line is a good example of cheap, but at the same time efficient, railway construction. Taken in conjunction with the lines of the same "Pioneer" class previously constructed, which have proved eminently satisfactory both as regards traffic and expenses of maintenance, this additional extension demonstrates that the railway development of the interior parts of the Colony can be now carried out at one-third the cost per mile incurred a few years back. This question of cheapness of construction is one of vital importance in the work of opening up the Colony, and it is gratifying thus to record the satisfactory results that have attended the adoption of the new policy.

The following further extension lines of the Pioneer class were under construction at 30 June, 1898 :—

The first-named extension was carried out by day-labour and opened for traffic 30 September, 1898. The Tamworth to Manilla line is being constructed under contract, and the Moree to Inverell by day-labour.

Besides the actual construction operations above referred to, a large amount of survey and drafting work in connection with projected railway lines has been accomplished by the branch during the year; while the preparation of information of every kind respecting the proposed railways submitted to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works has further engaged much of the time and attention of Mr. Deane and his staff.

Of the ten proposed lines brought before the Public Works Committee, three only have been recommended by the Committee for construction, viz. :—

Tramways.

The Electric Extension Line from Willoughby Road, North Sydney, to Victoria Avenue, Willoughby, a distance of 2 miles 45 chains, was completed and opened for traffic on 25 April, 1898, bringing the total length of tramway lines in use at 30 June, 1898, up to 65 miles.

The lines in process of construction at that date were:—

George-street and Harris-street Electric Tramway—length 3 miles 20 chains, double track.

Rose Bay Electric Extension—length 2 miles 45 chains, single track.

The last named line has been completed and opened for traffic since the date of Mr. Deane's report, and is proving one of the most popular and remunerative lines in the Metropolitan District.

The energies of the Tramway Construction Staff are now being concentrated upon the George-street to Harris-street Electric Line, a description of which was given in my last report. Owing to the extensive proportions of the buildings and their accessories forming the power-house, and the exceptional character of the work connected with them and with the laying down of the track, the utmost care and deliberation require to be exercised in the matter of construction. All sections of the work are, however, being pushed on as rapidly as possible, and it is expected that this important line will be completed and open for traffic before the close of the current financial year. The boilers, steam-engines, and generators have been delivered by the Contractors, and are of such capacity as will provide for the future conversion to electric traction of all the existing tramways.

IMPROVEMENT, MAINTENANCE, AND CONVENIENCE OF NAVIGATION.

A large amount of work has been done during the year at the entrances to the northern rivers, in the construction of breakwaters and training-walls, the removal of sunken rocks, and in dredging. The part of the Colony drained by the northern rivers must always, owing to its abundant annual rainfall, be the mainstay of the country in times of drought; and it is therefore a matter of great importance that these natural highways should be kept open for the ready passage of all kinds of produce and merchandise.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief for Public Works (Mr. Darley) shows that schemes for the improvement of the entrances have been prepared, and are now being carried into effect at the following rivers, viz. :—Tweed, Richmond, Clarence, Bellinger, Nambucca, Macleay, Hastings, Camden Haven, and Manning; also at Trial Bay and Newcastle.

The main principle adopted in all our harbour-works—namely, that of induced and concentrated tidal scour by means of guiding walls and breakwaters—has been eminently successful in every instance, and must eventually lead to a large reduction in the cost of dredging in the lower and unstable portions of the rivers, and thus permit of the plant being utilised in deepening the upper portions, and consequently greatly extending the limits of navigation.

Notwithstanding the extensiveness of the work already accomplished, the river entrances are yet in a transition state, none of the schemes being sufficiently advanced to ensure the permanency of deep water on the bars, which are still seriously

seriously affected by weather conditions. At all the river entrances, however, considerable improvement has taken place; in some cases it is very marked, especially inside the bars. For instance, the lower channel of the Tweed which, before the works were commenced, was tortuous and carried from 2 to 6 feet of water only, has now from 10 to 20 feet at low water. This increase of depth has been effected partly by dredging, and partly by the scour induced by the construction of the training-walls. The dredged material in this case, as in others, was deposited at the back of the walls, the channel thus being deepened and land reclaimed by the one operation.

The beneficial results of the works already carried out are also clearly evident in the case of the Clarence, where the construction of a low-level training-wall, extending in a long sweep from Freeburn Island towards the entrance, has so confined and directed the current that a channel has been scoured out to a depth varying from 17 feet to 50 feet. A further improvement is anticipated as the Goodwood Island wall, now in course of construction, is advanced down stream. The total length of walling constructed at the Clarence is about $3\frac{1}{3}$ miles.

Mention may also be made of the Bellinger River, where, once the bar is crossed inwards, there is now a good navigable channel, having from 7 feet to 20 feet of water; also of the Macleay new entrance, where the combined effect of dredging and scour has produced a channel carrying from 18 feet to 20 feet of water at low tide.

At the Richmond River, extensive works have been carried out on the lines laid down by Sir John Coode, with the addition of an inner low-level training-wall, which was found necessary in order to give the current a more direct course towards the entrance. This wall has now been completed, and when the extension of the southern breakwater, which is being rapidly pushed on, and the removal of the sunken patch of indurated sand opposite Ballina, have been completed, a safe entrance to this important river should be permanently assured. The total length of wall and breakwater is $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

At the Macleay River advantage was taken, some two and a half years ago, of the existence of a large opening made by the flood-waters breaking through the narrow strip of land lying between the river and the ocean near South-west Rocks, to fix the entrance to the river at this spot instead of at Grassy Head as originally proposed. Work was begun in April, 1896, and up to June, 1898, some three-quarters of a mile of walling had been constructed, with a good navigable channel alongside, which is now availed of by practically the whole of the shipping frequenting the river.

The Trial Bay Breakwater, which is intended to enclose a portion of the bay so as to form a Harbour of Refuge, progresses but slowly, owing partly to the great depth of water in which it is being constructed, and partly to the employment of unskilled prison labour.

The increasing trade of the port of Newcastle, and the greater size of the vessels visiting the harbour, rendered it necessary to provide a greater depth of water at the entrance, and effect other improvements. A scheme for breakwater extensions, etc., estimated to cost £140,000, was prepared and sanctioned by Parliament in November, 1895. A commencement was made with the authorised works, by extending the South Breakwater and building portions of the guide-wall
and

and North Breakwater. These works will probably take some eight or ten years to execute, and the anticipated increase in the depth of water at the entrance can only be brought about gradually. Extensive improvements have been made in the harbour by increasing the wharfage accommodation, reclaiming low-lying land, crushing and removing sunken rocks, dredging, and by other works. A commencement was also made with the ballast-wall, which is to enclose an area of 569 acres, including Pig, Goat, and Spectacle Islands, in the upper part of the Harbour. This area will provide a site whereat to deposit the spoil dredged from the harbour, instead of taking it out to sea as has been done with the greater portion of it heretofore. Some eleven to twelve million tons of spoil can be so used, thus effecting a considerable saving in the cost of dredging, besides reclaiming a large area of valuable land.

Good progress has been made with the works at the entrances to the other rivers on the North Coast, the lengths of walls constructed being as follows:—Bellinger, 10,600 feet; Nambucca, 1,711 feet; Hastings, 836 feet; Camden Haven, 1,920 feet; and Manning, 3,600 feet.

In the Sydney District the principal operations of the year have been the commencement of the stone causeway at Glebe Island, which is to replace the existing timber bridge, the construction of a concrete wharf wall at Darling Island, and the extension of the wharfage and shed accommodation at Circular Quay and Woolloomooloo Bay. The wharf wall at Darling Island is being built of concrete blocks, weighing from 12 to 30 tons each, laid on a concrete bed and backed with ballast, &c. Although the first cost of this wall is considerably more than that of a timber wharf, the saving which will be effected hereafter in maintenance and renewals fully justifies its construction in the more durable material. At Cook's River Dam a new bridge, 40 feet wide and 350 feet long, has been erected and fitted with sluices; a dam with sluices has also been built across the Marrickville flat. Both works are for the purpose of preventing the flooding of the low-lying lands in their vicinity.

A training wall was commenced in the Moruya River, which, when it has been completed and the channel deepened by dredging, should enable the small trading steamers to discharge at the town wharf.

At almost all the harbours and rivers along the coast, dredging operations have been found necessary. During the year a total of about $6\frac{2}{3}$ millions tons of material of all kinds has been raised at the low rate of 3·18d. per ton.

METROPOLITAN WATER SUPPLY.

The new covered reservoir at Centennial Park has been completed, and is now about to be transferred to the control of the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board. This reservoir is by far the largest of the kind in the Southern Hemisphere, and almost the largest covered reservoir in existence. It covers an area of $3\frac{1}{3}$ acres, and contains, when full, 18,000,000 gallons. The walls are of brickwork, and the floor and partition wall of sandstone concrete.

A special feature of this reservoir is the roof, which is constructed of groined arches of coke-cinder and cement concrete, supported by brick pillars 23 inches square and 20 feet apart each way. This form of construction was decided upon as the most economical and suitable, after many designs of various kinds of arched coverings had been prepared, and much consideration given to the matter. As the roof had to be designed not only to carry the protective covering of sand and turf,

turf, but also a possible dense crowd of people, it was necessary to make it unusually strong. The groined arches are, therefore, 6 inches thick at the crown, and 24 inches at the springing; to provide against unequal loading, they are connected throughout with wrought-iron ties. A weighty reason for adopting the groined system was that free and thorough ventilation is secured in every direction, the hollow columns of the surrounding railing forming inlets, and the central towers exits, for the air.

The interior of the reservoir is sufficiently lighted for cleansing purposes by sixty-four roof lights; and both ventilation and lighting are so carried out as to exclude dust and other atmospheric impurities. The ornamental railing, pavilion, footpaths, &c., were introduced with the view of the roof being utilized as a recreation ground, and no injury done to the general appearance of the Park, which was one of the conditions under which the site was granted.

The total cost of the reservoir, including 36-inch steel rising main from the pumping station at Crown-street, and about 2 miles of service main, has been £70,000.

COUNTRY TOWNS WATER SUPPLY.

The works in connection with the water supply for the town of Tamworth have been completed. This new and important scheme, which comprises a storage reservoir of a capacity of 50,000,000 gallons, a steel supply main of $7\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter and about 12 miles in length, a concrete service reservoir holding 500,000 gallons, and about 20 miles of reticulation pipes, was carried out by day labour at the special request of the Municipal Council. The works are now in full operation.

The additions which it was found necessary to make to the Cootamundra Waterworks, owing to the partial failure of the supply pumped from the drift-beds, comprised a storage reservoir capable of conserving 136,000,000 gallons, and a steel supply main $7\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter, and about 3 miles long. These additional works were also carried out by day labour.

The works in hand at 30 June, 1898, were Mudgee and Condobolin, while schemes were prepared and ready to begin for the towns of Picton, Forbes (extension), and Wellington.

WATER CONSERVATION AND IRRIGATION.

The principal work of this branch during the year has been the administration of the Water Rights Act. Whilst Colonel Home, R. E., was conducting his inquiries into the general question of water conservation and irrigation, the consideration of the applications for licenses under this Act was unavoidably delayed. After the submission of his report, however, which left Mr. McKinney, the Principal Assistant Engineer, free to attend to the ordinary work of the branch, the applications were dealt with as quickly as arrangements could be made for the necessary investigations, and it is expected that all arrears will be cleared off within the next few months.

The works for which licenses have been sought comprise a wide variety, ranging from ordinary earthen dams for conserving water up to irrigation schemes involving, in a number of cases, an outlay of several thousands of pounds. One scheme alone, for which a license has been granted, provides for the construction of over 50 miles of channels. The extent to which the Act is being availed of is indicated by the fact that, in addition to the large number of applications for licenses in respect of works which were in existence prior to the passing of the Act, more than 100 applications have been received regarding proposed works.

Under

Under section 4 of the Water Rights Act, the Government is empowered to construct works when the landowners benefited thereby agree to pay such water and drainage charges as will provide for payment of interest on the cost of the works and of the expenses of maintenance. In several instances arrangements are being made to construct works upon these terms and conditions.

Owing in a great measure to defects in the Drainage Promotion Act, the members of drainage unions desire to have their works brought under the provisions of the before-mentioned section, and there is every reason to anticipate that the powers conferred by it will be of material value to the public, and will be largely availed of.

It is proposed to refer the important question of locking the river Darling from Bourke to Wilcannia to the Public Works Committee, and the necessary steps are being taken to have all useful information relating thereto ready for the inquiry.

The proposal to construct a canal on the south side of the Murrumbidgee has been further investigated, and the preparation of plans and estimates of cost is well advanced. The district through which the water can be conducted is exceptionally favourable for the class of work proposed; and as the estimates of cost, so far, tend to show that the water can be supplied in the back country at a lower charge than it would cost on the river frontage if pumped up, there is a good prospect of the scheme proving remunerative.

GOVERNMENT ARCHITECT.

The Government Architect reports a total expenditure during the twelve-month of £245,700 10s. 1d. This amount is a fair average, as compared with the expenditure of the last few years.

Mr. Vernon's very complete and exhaustive report furnishes much interesting information respecting the year's building operations. The principal structures that have been dealt with by him are particularised in his statement, and a detailed return is furnished of the whole of the expenditure under all headings.

The total number of buildings dealt with was 571. Of the new buildings completed during the year, the most important were as follows:—

Mr. Vernon again draws attention to the urgent necessity of a more liberal provision for the repairs of existing buildings. The number of Government buildings is now so large, and the attempts to overtake necessary repairing so inadequate, that considerable deterioration has set in, especially in some of the country districts. In many country towns the difference between the appearance of buildings, the property of the several banking institutions, and those the property of the Government, is most marked, much to the detriment of the latter. In a previous report the Government Architect suggested that an annual appropriation of at least £50,000 for four successive years was required, in order that a systematic periodical repairing of all Government buildings might be undertaken, and each separate structure overhauled at least once in every few years. Mr. Vernon now points out that the unsatisfied requisitions for repairs have assumed such large proportions that those outstanding at the close of the year were in excess of the vote which will be available for the succeeding year's own requirements. Such a state of affairs cannot be regarded as satisfactory, and Mr. Vernon's application for additional funds under this heading is entitled to special consideration.

Attention is also drawn in the report to the adoption, to a certain extent, of the day-labour system. It may be pointed out that in this branch this system has been applied in those cases where it was clearly to the interests of the Government to do so. In effecting alterations, or making additions to existing buildings, the convenience of the inmates and the exigencies of business could only be safeguarded by the adoption of the day-labour system; this method, at the same time, obviates all risk of claims by contractors which so frequently crop up in cases where contracts cannot be carried out in an undeviating course.

Amongst the works carried out by day labour is that of the erection of suitable hotel accommodation at Jenolan Caves, and now leased by the Government to a responsible well-known lessee. The buildings there erected, together with the improvements of roads and approaches, have converted what was at one time an accommodation house, open to much adverse criticism, into a Tourist Hotel of the latest and most comfortable type. The caves and their picturesque surroundings can now be visited in the utmost comfort, and it is predicted that the expenditure entailed on these works will prove to be a very remunerative investment on the part of the Government.

A second report by Mr. Vernon gives notes of his recent visit to Europe, and supplies a large amount of useful information respecting many of the public buildings

buildings both in England and on the Continent. The knowledge and insight thus acquired by the Government Architect respecting the newest and most approved designs for public buildings cannot fail, as occasion arises, to be of signal service to the Department.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The Principal Assistant Engineer for Roads and Bridges (Mr. Hanna) summarises in his report the operations of this Branch, and furnishes the usual statistical information respecting the works under his charge, and the expenditure for the year. The following table shows the total roads mileage and the aggregate length of bridges and culverts at 30 June, 1896, 1897, and 1898, respectively, and the total expenditure thereon for each of these years:—

It will be seen from the foregoing table that, while the length of roads and bridges is ever increasing, the expenditure thereon has decreased year by year. I am pleased, however, to be able to report that, notwithstanding the decreased expenditure, the roads have been maintained in fairly good trafficable order. While this result is largely due to the favourable climatic conditions prevailing during the past year, considerable credit is due to the local Roads Officers for the intelligent expenditure of the funds placed at their disposal.

During the year 1,604 miles of new roads were cleared or wholly or partially formed, about $4\frac{3}{4}$ miles of culverts and 3 miles of causeways were constructed, and 4,718 rods of fencing were erected. Three new punts and 18 boats were added to the working plant of the Branch.

The monthly average number of men employed on roads under contractors exceeded that of the previous year by 1,343, while 320 additional men have been regularly employed directly by the Department.

One of the most important new works carried out during the year was the construction of a road through Macquarie Pass, thus affording a connecting link between the Illawarra District on the South Coast railway line and the rich and extensive table-lands lying to the east of the Southern Railway system. The length of road required to complete the connection between the two railway systems was under 5 miles, but the rugged character of the route made it a work of great difficulty.

The commercial advantages of the new road are considerable, but as a tourist route it is of the first importance. By means of it, tourists are now enabled to visit in comfort and with expedition some of the finest mountain scenery in the Colony, including the Macquarie, Carrington, Belmore, and Fitzroy Waterfalls. The

Railway Commissioners have already instituted a system of through excursions, covering the round trip *via* Albion Park on the South Coast railway line, through the Macquarie Pass to Moss Vale on the Southern railway line, and when the route with its many and varied attractions becomes better known, the tourist traffic is certain to develop into large proportions.

Another new work of considerable magnitude and importance undertaken during the year is the construction of a road from Bowral to Wombeyan Caves. These Caves, although rivalling the Jenolan Caves in interest and beauty, are little known to the public, owing to the difficulty in reaching them. This difficulty of access is now being overcome, and it will soon be practicable to drive to the Caves over a road having easy gradients, and passing through magnificent scenery. Taken in connection with the improvements now being carried out on the road from Mount Victoria to Jenolan, this road is the first step towards opening up what may be regarded as the Wonderland of the Colony. The final step will be the construction of a road to connect the Jenolan with the Wombeyan Caves. It will then be possible for the tourist to travel by rail and vehicle through grand scenery for a distance of over 300 miles, viewing on his way the Blue Mountains, the Caves, the Waterfalls, and some of the most attractive portions of the Southern and South Coast districts, without having once to retrace his steps.

With regard to the notable improvements already effected in the matter of access to, and accommodation at, the Jenolan Caves, I have already commented thereon under the heading of Government Architect.

In his report, the Principal Assistant Engineer for Roads and Bridges once more draws attention to the serious damage done to the roads of the Colony by heavy loads being drawn on narrow tires. For successive years the necessity for legislation has been urged by me in each annual report, and I again reiterate the need for action in this matter. Unlike the railways, the roads return no direct revenue in repayment of the cost of maintenance, and it is unfair that one numerically small class of traffic should be permitted to ruin them, to the detriment and expense of the Colony generally. The light farm traffic, which on many roads is of large dimensions, is seriously inconvenienced, and the cost to the Department for maintenance and repairs is enormously increased, by the absence of the required legislation. Owing to the prejudices of wagon-owners, there is no hope that broad tires will be voluntarily introduced, although experiments have proved that they would be an undoubted advantage. The only remedy, therefore, is that wagon-owners be compelled by law to use broad tires.

It will be seen from the report of the Assistant Engineer for Bridges that out of a total length of 8,267 feet of new bridge-work erected during the year, 3,235 feet was erected to replace previously existing structures which were beyond repair, and the remaining 5,032 feet on sites where no bridges had hitherto stood. This increase of 5,032 feet of new bridge-work brings the total length of bridges (exclusive of culverts) under the charge of the Department up to 272,996 lineal feet.

It will be readily understood that the maintenance of this enormous length of bridge-work, about 52 miles, is a matter of great and yearly increasing importance. In the past it was the practice to repair bridges out of the Roads Votes, or to set aside sums, as occasion arose, for that purpose, but no special funds were allotted for their systematic up-keep. During the last few years, however, all bridges have been
carefully

carefully inspected, and their condition, age, &c., recorded, while a special sum has been set apart each year for necessary repairs, or for reconstruction where repairs would be ineffective.

The sums expended under these headings during the past year were, for repairs, £24,164 10s., and for reconstructions, £33,809 6s. 10d., making a total of £57,973 16s. 10d. It is gratifying to note that the Department was able to keep 2,881 bridges in trafficable order at such a comparatively small outlay. This satisfactory result could not, however, have been obtained, were it not for the excellent quality of the native timbers used in the work.

In the matter of repairs to Bridges, the heaviest work carried out was in connection with the Nimboy Bridge, on the Grafton-Glen Innes Road. The Bridge consisted of three iron spans of 150 feet each, with timber deck and cross-girders, four 60 feet, one 40 feet, and one 30 feet, timber spans, making a total length of 760 feet, with a roadway of 21 feet 6 inches wide. The whole of the timber in the structure was decayed, and it accordingly became necessary to replace the cross-girders and deck of the iron spans, and to substitute truss spans on new piers for the old beam spans.

The road is an important one, carrying the heavy traffic between the New England Table-land and the Coast, while the nature of the bridge site made it impracticable to provide a convenient temporary crossing. In view, therefore, of the character of the work, and realizing that it was advisable that the control of the traffic during the work of repairing should be wholly in the hands of the Department, it was decided that the repairs should be carried out by day-labour, only the timber being supplied under contract. The work, I am pleased to report, was accordingly begun and finished by day-labour within the estimated cost, and without a single instance of interruption to traffic.

The adoption of the day-labour system in this case gave rise to some criticism, owing to a comparison having been instituted between the contract price tendered for a bridge at Goulburn, and a press report of what was done by day-work at Nimboy. It was assumed, erroneously, that the work to be done in the two bridges was the same, and a comparison unfavourable to the day-labour system was based on the cost of the two works. Actually, the amount of work done at Nimboy was double that contracted for at Goulburn, and a proper examination shows that it was accomplished by day-labour at rates which compare favourably with any contract work of a similar class carried out under the Department.

The most important of the new bridges completed during the year were the following :—

The Bridge over the Kangaroo River on the Moss Vale-Nowra Road is worthy of notice as being the first Suspension Bridge of any magnitude constructed by the Department.

Department. In most cases where large bridges are required in New South Wales, the natural features of the site do not lend themselves to this type of bridge; but, at the point where the Moss Vale-Nowra Road crosses the Kangaroo River, the precipitous banks rising to a height of 70 feet from the river-bed, the difficulty of obtaining a foundation in the river, and the presence at the site of excellent building stone, led to the adoption of the suspension type as the most suitable.

The bridge consists of a single span of 252 ft. 9 in. in length, with a roadway 18 ft. wide, supported by 28 steel wire ropes, formed into four groups of seven each, two groups, or cables, being on each side of the bridge.

The towers which carry the cables are built of sandstone, are 55 feet in height, and very massive in appearance, while a masonry arch connecting the pair of towers at each end over the roadway forms an effective entrance to the bridge. The anchorage chambers in which the cables are secured have been sunk in the solid rock, and are so arranged that the cables can be inspected at any time, or renewed, should that become necessary.

The ropes which constitute the cables were specially manufactured for the bridge, being of plough-steel, galvanised, and containing 42 wires each. The specifications provided that each rope should be capable of sustaining, without fracture, a load of 78 tons; when tested, they sustained from 84 to 90 tons without a break. The roadway of the bridge is of tallow-wood, and the stiffening trusses of local iron-bark, and while these timber portions will, in the course of years, need renewal, the remainder of the structure is practically permanent. Apart from its utility, the bridge adds a pleasing feature to what is now becoming a popular tourist route.

Bridge over Hunter River at Morpeth.—The question of affording access to the town of Morpeth from the low-lying lands of Phoenix Park had been long under consideration, and the bridge now erected will not only serve that purpose, but will also, in conjunction with the Hinton Bridge over the Paterson River to be erected shortly, admit of the traffic from Morpeth proceeding to Hinton and thence northwards without having to use the Hinton Ferry, as at present. The bridge consists of three timber truss spans, of 110 ft. 3 in. each, resting on iron cylinder river piers and timber land piers, with fourteen timber beam spans of 35 feet each, extending on a grade of 1 in 30 to the low-lying lands of Phoenix Park. The roadway is 18 feet in width, and in order to clear the tramway on the Morpeth side it was necessary to keep the bridge 16 feet above flood-level.

Bridge over Turon River at Wallaby Rocks.—This bridge carries the Bathurst, Sofala, and Hill End Road over Turon River near its junction with Crudine Creek, where a most dangerous crossing existed previously. It consists of three timber truss-spans of 90 feet each, and two timber beam-spans of 25 feet each, with a 15-foot roadway, the total length being 320 feet. On account of the treacherous nature of the shingle river-bed, it was found necessary to use iron cylinder piers sunk to rock. The bridge has proved of great benefit to the local and through traffic.

Bridge over Stone-quarry Creek at Picton (Victoria Bridge).—This bridge, taken in conjunction with that built by the Railway Commissioners over the Southern Railway, enables traffic from the Main Southern Road, Bargo, &c., to reach the railway station at Picton by a much shorter route than heretofore, and has also greatly reduced the amount of traffic passing over the dangerous level
railway

railway crossing. The bridge consists of three truss spans of 90 feet each, of the same type as those erected over Turon River at Wallaby Rocks. A remarkable feature in this bridge is the great height of the timber piers, the deck of the bridge being 92 feet above the creek.

SEWERAGE CONSTRUCTION.

The report of Mr. Davis, Engineer for Sewerage Construction, shows that the operations for the year have been of an extensive nature, and have fully come up to the expectations expressed in my last annual statement.

The expenditure during the year amounted to £203,126, and 44 contracts were let, of an aggregate value of £213,716.

Marked progress has been made in the extension of the Western Suburbs sewerage. The main western outfall has been completed, thus allowing the branch sewers previously finished to be brought into operation. With the exception of the upper portion of the main western branch from Cheltenham-street, Burwood, to Albert-street, Strathfield, all the main branches will be practically completed by the end of the current financial year.

The extension of the northern system into Balmain has been pushed on, and the sewer draining the south-eastern slopes will be completed at an early date. The sewer draining the north-western slopes is well under way.

In the Eastern Suburbs, an intercepting sewer has been constructed to serve the eastern slopes of Waverley and Bondi. The drainage of Randwick and Kensington has been extended from the present Coogee outfall to the junction of Avoca and Howard streets.

The sewerage of North Sydney, including the outfall works, has been completed, and premises are being rapidly connected to the system. The sewerage of Neutral Bay and Mosman is being actively proceeded with.

The Double Bay low-level system is nearing completion. The sewage is lifted from the low-level area into the gravitation sewers by the Shone system, the compressed air for working the ejectors being supplied from a central station. The air compressors are driven by electric motors, the electrical energy being obtained from Rushcutters' Bay Tramway Power-house.

The sewerage works now under construction for draining the rest of the low-level areas around Sydney are of an interesting and intricate nature, the difficulties of construction being much increased owing to a great number of existing sewers, which at present discharge into the harbour considerably below high water, having to be intercepted.

A scheme, which has been approved by the Municipal Council, has been designed for the sewerage of Willoughby and Chatswood. The sewage, before being discharged into Middle Harbour, will be treated on the *Septic System*, of which an explanation was given in my last Annual Report. In order, however, to gain a practical test of its working, plans have been prepared for the drainage of the Rookwood Asylum buildings by this system, and a contract will shortly be let for the construction of the necessary works. From the experience to be so gained at Rookwood, any modification in design that may be found necessary will be introduced into the more extensive works at Chatswood. In the meantime contracts will be let for the construction of the sewers.

A scheme for the sewerage of Newcastle has been prepared. Under it, the whole of the sewerage will be collected at a point near the junction of Darby and Junction streets, and here works will be erected for the extraction of the solids, the effluent discharging into the sea.

The sewerage of East and West Maitland has also been under consideration, but no definite scheme has so far been decided on.

LAND VALUATION.

The report of the Government Land Valuer shows that a large amount of work in connection with completed and proposed land resumptions has been accomplished by his Branch during the past year. Mr. Sievers is still closely engaged upon the work of adjusting the assessments made by the Land Tax Department, and this heavy task will occupy his attention for some months further.

GENERAL.

It may be justly claimed for the Department that the moneys entrusted to it by Parliament have been faithfully and to the best possible advantage expended in undertakings that form valuable additions to the public assets of the Colony.

In concluding, I have to report, with much regret the loss by death, on 13 January, 1898, of Mr. Edward B. Price, M.Inst.C.E., Assistant Engineer for Public Works, who had spent twelve years in the service of the Department, and had proved himself an officer of marked ability and promise.

I have the honor to report upon the work carried out in the Railway Construction Branch during the year ended 30 June, 1898 :—

RAILWAY SURVEYS.

The following work was carried out by the Railway Survey Staff, between 1 July, 1897, and 30 June, 1898.

Explorations have been made, and reports, accompanied by diagram plans furnished, in connection with the following projected railways and tramway :—

The necessary drawings, viz., working plans, working sections, proclaimed and police district plans, books of reference, land resumption notice tracings and heliographic copies thereof, have been prepared for the first part of the Moree to Inverell line, from the junction at Moree to Gravesend station. The lithographic copies, in book form, of the working plans and sections have also been completed.

The

The drawings relating to the authorised railway, Tamworth to Manilla, which were in a forward state at the end of June, 1897, have been finished, and the usual lithographic and heliographic copies have been prepared.

A considerable quantity of mathematical work has been done in calculating the bearings and distances of the boundaries of land resumptions and connections to same for descriptive purposes, many of the boundaries being very irregular.

The Railway Commissioners have been supplied with plans and compilations of county and parish maps for the use of their officers whilst inspecting and reporting on projected railways, proposed station sites, &c.

Information has been furnished for the use of the Minister in replying to deputations and Parliamentary questions, and also for the use of the various branches of this and other departments of the Public Service.

The drafting staff, assisted by the surveyors, when the latter have not been engaged on field duties, has, during the period under review, been barely sufficient to cope with the current office work, and, consequently, the arrears of necessary, but less urgent, drafting have not been overtaken.

The staff of the Railway Survey Office consisted, on an average, of 28 officers, divided as follows:—Principal Assistant Engineer, Supervising Engineer, 11 surveyors, and 15 draftsmen. It will be observed, if a comparison be made in respect to the staff between this and the previous report, that there is a decrease of 3 officers, 2 of whom have been removed by death, and one by transfer on construction duties.

RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION.

The following works have been in progress during the year ended 30 June, 1898:—

Parkes to Condobolin Railway.

The first section from Parkes to Bogan Gate, a length of 23 miles 38 chains, was opened for traffic on 15 December, 1896.

The second section from Bogan Gate to Condobolin was opened for traffic on 1 March, 1898. This section commences at 290 miles 40 chains, and terminates at 329 miles 62½ chains from Sydney, having a length of 39 miles 22½ chains. The contract was let to Mr. John Falkingham on 20 July, 1896, for completion within fourteen months, or by 20 September, 1897.

The permanent-way has been laid with 60-lb. flat-bottomed steel rails spiked to ironbark sleepers. In the sidings old iron rails have been used.

Fencing has been erected only in the immediate neighbourhood of stations. Cattle-stops have been placed at the intersections of roads and boundary fences to prevent cattle straying and trespass by stock. The road crossings have no gates, but are provided with warning-boards.

Stations and sidings have been provided at Burrawang, Dérriwong, and Condobolin. Trucking-yards for stock have been built at Burrawang and Condobolin.

Water supply is provided for from the town reservoir at Condobolin, a brick tower and a wrought-iron tank having been built in the railway station premises.

The total expenditure on the whole extension between Parkes and Condobolin to date has been £116,982. The total length is 62 miles 60½ chains.

Nevertire to Warren.

This branch leaves the Great Western Railway at 341 miles 20 chains, and terminates at 353 miles 54 chains, from Sydney, a length of 12 miles 34 chains. The amount voted for construction was £32,730. The works have been carried out by day-labour under the supervision of Mr. F. H. Small. The sleepers were provided partly by contract and partly by purchase from the Railway Commissioners. The permanent-way has been laid with 60-lb. steel rails, flat-bottomed, spiked to ironbark sleepers. Old iron rails were used in the sidings.

Fencing has been used only in the immediate neighbourhood of stations. Cattle-stops have been provided at the intersection of fences.

One station only has been provided, viz., at Warren.

At Warren the water supply is obtained by pumping from the Gunningbar Creek into a wrought-iron tank built on a brick tower, in the station yard, half a mile from the creek.

The total cost of the extension, not including permanent-way materials, has been £24,564.

The line was opened for public traffic on 24 January, 1898.

Berrigan to Finley Railway.

This is an extension in a westerly direction of the Jerilderie-Berrigan railway. A sum of £27,250 has been voted for its construction. The length of the extension is 13 miles 72 chains. The terminal point at Finley will be 447 miles 69½ chains from Sydney.

The works are being carried out by day-labour under supervision of Mr. F. H. Small, and were commenced in the month of May last.

Stations and sidings are being provided at Wait-a-While, Leniston, and Finley.

Water supply is being provided for by an excavated tank at Finley, from which the water will be pumped into a wrought-iron tank on a brick tower at the railway station.

Tamworth to Manilla Railway.

This branch line leaves the Great Northern Railway at West Tamworth at 182 miles $4\frac{1}{2}$ chains from Newcastle. Its length will be 29 miles 42 chains, and its terminal point will be 211 miles 46 chains from Newcastle. A sum of £73,170 has been voted for its construction.

A contract was let for the general construction of the line, including earthworks, bridge over the Peel River, and culverts, and laying permanent-way, to Mr. Thomas Williams on 29 November, 1897, for completion in seventy-eight weeks, for the sum of £26,130 17s. 8d.

The Peel River is crossed at Attunga by means of a steel bridge of three spans of 66 feet each, resting on concrete piers, with a number of timber openings in both approaches.

Sleepers to the number of 70,000 have been provided.

Stations and sidings will be provided at Attunga, Klovi, Somerton Road, and Manilla.

The line will be laid with flat-bottomed steel rails, 60-lb. to the yard, spiked to ironbark sleepers.

The expenditure to date has been £32,910.

Moree to Inverell Railway.

This line is designed to connect Inverell with the railway system of the Colony, and will be worked as an extension of the North-Western Railway from Moree. The length to Inverell will be about 95 miles 58 chains.

The first section, which is to be commenced at once, will be about 35 miles in length, and will be constructed by day-labour.

The amount voted for the line is £279,500. The expenditure to date has been £3,268

The works will include a bridge over the Gwydir River of two spans of steel girders of 180 feet each, one over the Warialda Creek, and a road bridge over the MacIntyre River at Inverell to give access to the station, the designs of which have not yet been completed.

Contracts for the supply of sleepers and bridge timbers have already been let.

Extension of Railway to Darling Island.

A contract was let on 29 May, 1897, to Messrs. Bromley and Holloway, amounting to £4,348 5s., for construction of the first portion of this extension, a length of 21 chains. During the year under review the works have been enlarged, which entailed an extension of the contract by £1,035 5s. 6d. The total expenditure by the contractors to date has been £4,472 10s. 5d.

As the construction of the road bridge over Darling Harbour, to replace the present Pymont Bridge, has been authorised, the design of the Union-street bridge has been altered, and a double bridge is now being built to carry traffic both from Union-street to the wharves and over the harbour.

A double line is being formed as far as Edward-street, with a steel bridge on concrete jack arches to carry Union-street, and a timber bridge to carry Murray-street.

Permanent-way Materials.

With a view to testing the high carbon steel so largely used in America, 2,000 tons of 60-lb. steel rails were ordered of Messrs. Peabody & Co., of New York, on 25 August, 1897.

An order for 15,000 fish-plates and 45,000 fish-bolts and nuts with the Harvey patent grip-nut was also placed with Messrs. Peabody & Co. These have all been delivered.

15,000 tons of 60-lb. Steel Rails and Fastenings.

On 11 October, 1897, tenders were invited for the supply of 15,000 tons of 60-lb. steel rails and fastenings from English, and also from American manufacturers.

The Ebbwvale Company's tender for rails and fish-plates was accepted on 28 December, 1897; the order for fish-bolts and nuts was allowed to stand over until 4 May, 1898, when the Nettlefold Company's tender was accepted.

Staff.

The field-staff employed in the supervision of the above works during the year under review, has consisted of the following:—Three supervising engineers, four field assistants, two cadets.

One engineer has been employed during the whole of the year on the case of *McSharry v. the Railway Commissioners*, now under arbitration.

Inspectors and sub-inspectors for the various classes of work carried out have been employed as required during the progress of the work.

The office-staff has consisted of one supervising engineer, one chief draftsman, and ten draftsmen.

Willoughby

Willoughby Electric Tramway.

The construction of this tramway, which was authorised in December, 1896, was completed and opened for traffic on the 25 April, 1898.

The starting-point is from the end of the existing tramway in Falcon-street, thence along the North Sydney-road, Mowbray-road, and Penhurst-street, to the intersection of Victoria-avenue, Chatswood, a distance of 2 miles 45 chains from the point of commencement. The estimated cost of this tramway was £16,978, and the expenditure to date is £16,000.

Seven contracts were let in connection with the construction of this tramway, as follows :—

- No. 1. Plastic bond.—Noyes Bros.
- No. 2. Poles and brackets.—Eaton Bros.
- No. 3. Generators and driving gear.—H. H. Kingsbury & Co.
- No. 4. Accumulators.—Gibson Battle & Co.
- No. 5. Overhead wiring material.—Edge and Edge.
- No. 6. Permanent-way, &c.—A. Johnston.
- No. 7. Motor-booster and switchboard.—Edge and Edge.

The alterations and additions to the car-house at Ridge-street, rendered necessary for the additional rolling-stock required for this tramway, were carried out by day-labour, the switches and crossings for the turnouts from main line having been made at Cockatoo Dock.

The whole of the electrical bonding of the rails in connection with this tramway, and the existing tramway to the power-house, Ridge-street, was carried out by day-labour, the men employed being afterwards engaged in the erection of the overhead wiring. Owing to the failure of Messrs. Eaton Bros. to complete their contract for the supply and erection of poles and brackets, an arrangement was made for the work to be completed by the contractor for the permanent-way.

An additional generator of the General Electric type was supplied by Messrs. H. H. Kingsbury & Co., together with the necessary driving-gear, and is driven by belts off the main cable engines. The accumulator house which is situated at Park-street, Willoughby, contains 215 cells of the chloride type, together with a motor-booster and switchboard.

The overhead wiring material was supplied by Messrs. Edge and Edge, and was erected by day-labour.

In addition to the wiring of the Willoughby electric tramway, that portion of the cable tramway in Falcon-street to the intersection of Ridge-street was also wired.

The contract for the permanent-way was let to Mr. A. Johnston, and consists of a 60-lb. rail laid on sleepers, with a 42-lb. guard rail on all curves. The ballast is of sandstone to top of sleepers, and is topped up with a layer of tarred blue-metal, and tarred blue-metal screenings. The double track in Falcon-street is carried on as far as Ernest-street in the North Sydney-road; a crossing-loop is provided at the Flat Rock Bridge, and a loop at the terminus in Penhurst-street.

Rose Bay Electric Tramway.

The construction of this tramway was authorised in January, 1897, the point of commencement being the terminus of the King-street and Ocean-street cable tramway at Ocean-street, thence along the New South Head-road to Rose Bay, a distance of 1 mile 23 chains, single track.

The following list gives the particulars of contract, all of which have been let, in connection with the construction of this tramway; the whole of the work is well advanced, and the tramway should be ready for traffic by the end of September :—

The driving gear for the generators, which are to be driven by belting off the main cable engines, is well advanced, and should be ready to supply power to the Sewerage Pumping Station at Double Bay on the 1st August.

The estimated cost of this Tramway is £16,189; the expenditure to date is £10,625.

George-street and Harris-street Electric Tramway.

The construction of this tramway was sanctioned by Act of Parliament, assented to 14 September, 1896.

The tramway commences at the eastern side of Circular Quay, and, following the curvature of the Quay, passes the wharfs of the various Ferry Companies; thence by way of Queen's Wharf to George-street and along that street to its junction with the existing Tramway opposite the Benevolent Asylum, running parallel with the existing steam lines to a point opposite Terminus-street. Following the existing steam lines for a few chains, it branches off at Harris-street, along which the line will run until John-street is reached, where it terminates. A junction is provided for with the existing steam tramways running to the Redfern Railway Station. The distance from Circular Quay to John-street is 3 miles 20 chains, and is double track all the way, the length of single track, including cross-over roads and junctions, to be constructed being about 7 miles. Estimated cost, £130,500.

Permanent-way.

The work of constructing the permanent-way and erecting the Mannesmann poles has been let in two contracts—the George-street division to Messrs. Willmot and Morgan, and the Harris-street portion to Mr. Justin McSweeney.

The Harris-street section is nearly completed, and that along George-street, which can only be done in short sections owing to the impediment to traffic, is being pushed on with speed.

Wood-blocking of George-street, in front of the new Queen Victoria Markets, is being carried out by the City Council, in conjunction with the tramway work.

The switches and crossings for the junctions to and from the existing tramway, opposite the Railway Station, are being manufactured at the Redfern Interlocking shops. The switches in connection with these junctions will be interlocked and worked from a signal cabin which has been erected opposite the Benevolent Asylum.

The switches for the cross-over roads have been made by Fried Krupp, and are of cast steel, of a type which it is hoped will prove to be a great improvement on those now in use on the steam tramways. The crossings for the cross-over roads have been manufactured at Cockatoo Dock, also the turnout from Harris-street to the car-house. The cable crossing at King-street has been made by Wharton & Co., of Philadelphia, H. W. Peabody & Co., contractors.

Electrical Work.

The whole of the Edison-Brown plastic bonding material has been delivered by the contractors, Messrs. Noyes Bros. The Mannesmann poles have all been delivered by the Foreign Agency Co., contractors, and the wrought and cast-iron work is well advanced, the fittings being fixed as the poles are erected. The Callender-Webber casing is being laid as the construction of the permanent-way progresses, and the cables will be drawn in and the junction boxes fixed in position as soon as the whole of the casing has been laid. Messrs. Noyes Bros. are the contractors for this work. The laying of the return feeder cable and the cross-bonding of the rails is being carried on simultaneously with the construction of the permanent-way. The contract for the supply and delivery of the trolley-wire has been let; the switchboard drawings are almost complete, and the tenders for this will shortly be invited. The overhead material has still to be ordered; this is now under consideration.

Power Plant.

The whole of the steam-engines and generators have now been delivered in Sydney by the contractors, Messrs. H. H. Kingsbury & Co.

Messrs. G. and C. Hoskins have nine boilers out of the fourteen ready for testing, and work on the five remaining is well advanced. The contract for the boiler settings and mountings has not been let, but the drawings are well advanced and should be completed at an early date.

A contract has been let to Messrs. W. Adams & Co. for the accumulators, which are to be of the E.P.S. type.

Tenders are now invited for the supply and delivery of feed and circulating pumps.

The drawings for the arrangement of the whole of the steam piping in connection with the power plant are finished, and the specification is being prepared. The electric 30-ton travelling cranes have been delivered by the contractors, Messrs. H. W. Peabody & Co. The contract for the manufacture of the steel columns and crane-girders for the power-house has been let to Messrs. Scrutton & Co., who have commenced work.

It was intended originally to install three combined units, each of 200 k.w., or 300 h.p., together with two additional boilers at the Rushcutter's Bay power-house. This would have provided sufficient power for the George and Harris streets Electric Tramway, viz., 600 h.p., and leave one unit as a stand-by.

The plant now being installed at Ultimo consists of four combined units each of 850 k.w. or 1,250 h.p. together with fourteen boilers. This will provide 3,750 h.p. for constant use, and one unit for a stand-by; so that after providing the 600 h.p. necessary for working the George-street and Harris-street electric tramway, 3,150 h.p. will be available for the conversion scheme.

Car-house.

The contract for the car-house has been let to Messrs. Stewart & Co., and the work is well advanced; the main walls are completed, also the offices. The ironwork for the roof and columns is well advanced, and the erection will be gone on with almost immediately. The track lay-out for the entrance to the car-house has been obtained from Messrs. Wharton & Co., Philadelphia; Messrs. H. W. Peabody & Co., contractors. The whole of the material has been delivered to the Stores Department. Arrangements have been made for the erection of a store and repairing shop in connection with the car-house at an estimated cost of about £3,000. Plans for this are now being prepared.

The car-house at Ultimo was originally estimated to hold forty cars, the number required for the George-street and Harris-street electric tramway; provision is now being made to accommodate 108 cars, sixty-eight of which will be available for traffic on the existing tramways when converted.

The power-house site will enable the building to be extended to accommodate an additional 15,000 h.p., and the car-house site provides for an extension of the building to contain an additional seventy-two cars.

Power-house.

A tender has been accepted for the erection of power-house and offices, Messrs. Stewart & Co. being the contractors. The contract for the excavation to the site was let to Mr. C. McClure, and has been completed.

The contract for the chimney, which is of a capacity sufficient for 5,000 h.p., and will be 200 feet high from flue level, has been let to Messrs. Phippard Bros., and has made good progress.

The conduit from the boiler-house to Darling Harbour for the supply of sea-water for condensing purposes has been let to Mr. Justin McSweeney who has made good progress with the sinking of the shafts.

The contracts let for boilers, steam engines, and generators, include provision for future conversion to electric traction of existing tramways, both in the city and at North Sydney. In connection with the contract for the steam engines and generators, it may be mentioned that Mr. G. Fischer, the Assistant Engineer for Tramway Construction, visited America in August last and returned to the Colony at the beginning of the present year. Although his time in America was limited, Mr. Fischer was able to settle details as to the construction of the generators with the General Electric Company, and as to the steam engines which are being built by the Allis Engineering Company.

Much information has been obtained as to the management and working of other large power plants similar to that now being erected, which should result in a considerable saving in the working of such a large power station as that now in course of erection.

Tramway Office Staff.

The Staff employed during the year under review on Tramway Construction, inclusive of the office work, comprised:—

- 1 assistant engineer.
- 2 resident engineers.
- 1 engineering assistant.
- 7 draftsmen.
- 12 inspectors.

The staff of draftsmen has been slightly increased during the past twelve months in order to cope with the work of preparation of plans and specifications required in connection with tramways under construction, and the whole of the officers have been kept going at high pressure owing to the large amount of work to be done in proportion to the number employed.

Report of the Engineer-in-Chief for Public Works.

Sir,

Department of Public Works, Sydney, 2 December, 1898.

I have the honor to forward herewith an outline statement of progress made on the various works under my control during the year ended the 30 June, 1898.

The report deals with the various works and services under the following heads:—

1. Works for the Improvement, Maintenance, and Convenience of Navigation, including the Dredge Service.
2. Water Supply—(a) Metropolitan and (b) Country Towns.
3. Water Conservation, Irrigation, and Drainage.
4. Works not comprised under the above heads.

(1.) WORKS FOR THE IMPROVEMENT, MAINTENANCE, AND CONVENIENCE OF NAVIGATION.

For convenience and system in describing the works along the coast included under this head they are here taken in their order, commencing at the northern extremity of the coast line:—

North Coast District.

Tweed River.

The construction of the training-walls on the Tweed River was suspended on the 16 July, heavier stone being required for the further extension of the work than the existing plant was suited for.

The total length of walls completed amounts to 5.39 miles, containing 242,242 tons of stone, costing £28,792 15s. 6d., or 28.53d. per ton.

The question of the extension of these works was submitted to the Public Works Committee, and reported on by them on the 26 April, 1898. In this report the Committee state that "the effect of the works already carried out upon the navigation of the river appears to have been very beneficial," and they "consider it advisable in order that the works already constructed shall be duly effective that the extensions referred to them for inquiry should be carried out."

Sundry small repairs to light-house, wharfs, fence, &c., were carried out, and some snags removed from the North Arm and Dunbible Creek, the total cost of these works amounting to £85 6s. 3d.

Byron Bay.

Extensive repairs have been made to the jetty at Byron Bay, with a view to providing for railway traffic, the work under the contract having been satisfactorily completed on the 20 May. The superstructure has been practically removed, and for two-thirds of the length of the jetty two additional piles have been driven in each pier.

During the year £5,630 0s. 6d. has been expended on this contract.

Minor repairs were also effected to the approach, crane, moorings, and wharfinger's cottage, at a cost of £130 0s. 10d.

Richmond River.

North Breakwater.—24,670 tons of stone have been tipped in the north breakwater, at a cost of £5,389 5s. 4d., or 52.42d. per ton, extending it 88 feet, the tip on the 30th June being 2,678 feet from high-water mark.

South Breakwater.—26,249 tons of stone have been put in the south breakwater at a cost of £5,151 17s. 11d., or 47.10 pence per ton. The breakwater has been extended 220 feet, being now 6,146 feet from high water-mark.

South Training-wall.—The south training-wall was commenced on the 19 October and completed on 30 April, with the exception of a gap 250 feet wide, where the present channel crosses. The quantity of stone used in the construction of this wall was 50,557 tons, costing £9,461 12s. 6d., or 44.92 pence per ton.

Riley's Hill Quarry.—101,476 tons of stone have been quarried, &c., and loaded into punts at Riley's Hill for the above harbour works, at a cost of £11,870 6s. 5d., or 28.07 pence per ton.

Removing Indurated Sand, Ballina.—Operations were commenced on 5 April for the removal of the indurated sand-bar in the new channel along the south training-wall, at Ballina. Holes were drilled 10 to 12 feet deep, and the blasting was done by dynamite. The expenditure to date amounts to £139 19s. 2d.

An average number of 112 men have been employed on the above works during the year.

Improvements to South Arm and Snagging Richmond River and Tributaries.—The tea-tree banks for training the current have been extended on the South Arm below Irvington. Piles have been obtained and machinery provided for sinking them in line by the water-jet process. The river has been almost constantly in fresh since December, which has retarded operations.

Repairs to Wharfs.—During the year £271 6s. 9d. has been expended on repairs to the various wharfs on the river.

New Wharfs.—Two new wharfs have been erected, one at East Wardell costing £197 12s. 10d., and one at Greenridge costing £87 12s. 6d.

Clarence River.

Goodwood Island Training-wall.—The Goodwood Island Training-wall was begun in September, 1897, and at the end of June, 1898, 38,747 tons of stone had been put into the wall at a cost of 52·58 pence per ton.

A length of 2,825 feet has been built, beginning on the shore of Goodwood Island and extending down stream.

Maintenance of Southern Breakwater.—2,417 tons of stone, at a cost of 45·68 pence per ton, have been used in the maintenance of the southern breakwater.

Maintenance of South Training-wall.—463 tons of stone have been used in the maintenance of the south training-wall, the cost being 51·09 pence per ton.

Court-house Rocks.—The reef opposite the Court-house, Maclean, has now been removed to a depth of 13 feet at low water. A total of 13,830 tons of rock has been excavated, the work being completed on 30th December.

South Arm Rocks.—The cut through this reef on the South Arm has been taken out for a width of 60 feet and 8 feet deep at low water, a total quantity of 4,775 tons of stone being removed.

Repairs to Wharfs.—Repairs have been effected to the various wharfs on the river at a cost of £467 9s. 1d.

Woolgoolga Jetty.

The outer end of the Woolgoolga Jetty was damaged during a heavy sea, which necessitates eleven new piles being put in. This work is now in progress.

Coff's Harbour Jetty.

A new 3-ton hand-power crane has been erected on the shore-end of the Coff's Harbour Jetty to facilitate the loading and unloading of drays, etc.

The works in the Clarence River district are being carried out by day-labour, an average number of 135 men being employed, exclusive of those on the dredges.

Bellinger River Improvements.

Steady progress has been made by the contractors for the Bellinger Harbour works during the year.

No. 1 wall was extended 46 feet, making the total length 3,260 feet, the stone used being 10,419 tons.

No. 2 wall was extended 1,800 feet making its total length 3,184 feet; 10,894 tons of stone being used.

No. 3a wall was commenced, and 2,559 feet constructed containing 16,747 tons of stone.

No. 5 wall remains as on the 30 June, 1897, the length being 1,600 feet, containing 2,957 tons.

The total length of these walls is now 10,603 feet, and the stone used 147,062 tons the cost being 3s. 9d. per ton not including supervision.

A small amount of day-labour work has been carried out at a cost of £29 16s.

The question of the construction of these harbour works was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works, who recommended that they be carried out as proposed.

Nambucca River Improvements.

The contractors for the Nambucca Harbour works have maintained the usual rate of output of stone during the year. The north training-wall was carried out 1,711 feet, but on the 6 May, a very heavy sea and big tide took about 2 feet off the top of the wall for a length of 1,000 feet. The training-wall is now being raised on a grade of 1 in 150, which will add greatly to its safety; 1,304 feet of wall is now completed to this grade.

The amount of stone put in the work during the year was 20,577 tons, making the total to date 45,602 tons; 15,574 tons of which is small stone at 1s. 6d. per ton, and 30,028 tons large stone at 3s. 8d. per ton.

The Public Works Committee, to whom the question of the construction of these works had been submitted, recommended that they be carried out with certain alterations which are suggested in their Report.

The alterations consist in the omission of the Stewart's Island training-bank and the reduction of the cost of the north-western training-wall.

The bar is straight out from the end of the wall, and carries about 7 feet at low water.

A new wharf was erected, at the Heads, at a cost of £270 6s. 10d., and some small repairs, &c., were carried out at a cost of £15 0s. 10d.

Macleay

Macleay River (New Entrance).

The work at the entrance to the Macleay River is being carried out by day-labour, an average number of 60 men being employed.

The output of stone has been 51,765 tons of which 2,410 tons was used in making roads, and the balance 49,355 tons was put in the training-walls. The total quantity of stone in the walls to date is 106,567½ tons, and 11,313½ tons have been used in making roads. The total cost has been £19,766 5s. 11d. or 44·5 pence per ton of stone in the work.

The length of the south sea-wall from commencement is 1,019 feet; length of canal lined, 1,980 feet; wall across Spencer's Creek completed, 800 feet; wall across Spencer's Creek (still to raise 2 feet), 1,180 feet.

The new channel was cut 250 feet wide and opened for traffic on 10 September. There is a depth of 23 to 30 feet of water in it now, and the whole of the river-traffic passes through it.

There is now 6 feet of water on the bar at low water, and the bar crossing is straight out from the end of the wall.

A wharf was erected at the new entrance at a cost of £277 16s. 10d.

The question of the construction of these works was submitted to the Public Works Committee, and they arrived at the conclusion that the scheme as proposed should be carried out.

Trial Bay Harbour Works.

The quantity of stone delivered at the Trial Bay Breakwater for the year was 25,545 tons, costing £3,630 8s. 9d., but the tip was advanced only 10 feet, the heavy seas having washed back 216 feet of completed work. The total length of the breakwater at the end of the year was 610 feet containing 216,848 tons of stone costing £53,240 10s. 9d., or 58·92 pence per ton. This price includes over 40,000 tons of stone run to spoil, and nearly 125,000 cubic yards of stripping.

The sea-wall from under the Harbour and River Office round under Superintendent's quarters has been carried on during the year, and is now progressing, as also the fencing round prison boundary.

The average number of prisoners employed was 115, and 7 free men.

A wharf was constructed during the year at a cost of £273 16s. 8d.

Preparations are being made for handing over the works to the Prisons Department. Transfer was actually made on 11 July, 1898.

Hastings River Improvements.

A contract was let on the 20 September, 1897, for the construction of a training-wall at the entrance to the Hastings River.

A length of 836 feet of wall has been constructed containing 20,113 tons of stone, the contract price being 3s. 8d. per ton. The bar at last report had a depth of about 8 feet at high water.

A weigh-bridge was erected and some small wharf repairs carried out at a cost of £57 14s. 5d.

The Public Works Committee, in their report on the proposed harbour works at the Hastings River, recommend that the southern training-wall now in course of construction be completed.

Camden Haven Improvements.

The works at Camden Haven are being carried out by day-labour, an average number of 43 men being employed.

The first stone was put out in March, 1898, the total to date being 14,221 tons. The length of the inner south wall constructed is 1,520 feet with a gap of 360 feet. The outer wall has been constructed for a length of 400 feet.

Sundry snagging work, &c., has been carried out at a cost of £32 5s. 5d.

Newcastle District.

Manning River.

The north training-wall was extended 1,295 feet, and the quantity of stone tipped was 32,729 tons, costing £5,935 17s. 10d.

The river training-wall was extended 359 feet, and the quantity of stone tipped was 31,987 tons, expenditure, £3,924 19s. 1d.

A wharf was constructed at Taree Estate at a cost of £265 4s. 10d., and one at Harrington at a cost of £247 10s. The wharf at Cundletown Dock was enlarged at a cost of £64 5s. 6d.

The wrecks of the s.s. "Murray" and the s.s. "Brunswick" on the Manning bar were blown up to clear the channel, the work costing £76 13s. 7d.

The Public Works Committee, who considered the question of the construction of these harbour works, passed the following resolution:—"That in the opinion of the Committee it is expedient the proposed harbour works at Manning River, as referred to the Committee by the Legislative Assembly, be carried out with such modifications as are suggested in their Report."

The modifications referred to consist in the reduction of the height of the northern wall above Harrington, and the curtailment of its length up stream as much as possible. It is also suggested that the rubble-stone facing, shown on the plan, at the beginning of the south sand-pit, should be carried on to meet the barrier bank, making one continuous wall along the river side of the spit.

Cape Hawke.

A number of rocks at the entrance to Cape Hawke Harbour were removed at a cost of £64 18s.

Port Stephens.

The Myall River was snagged and the channels marked at a cost of £97 6s.

A wharf was constructed at Bungwall, costing £310 16s. 5d., and the wharf at Bullahdelia was repaired at a cost of £40 1s. 6d. Repairs costing £5 5s. 11d. were effected to Nelson's Bay Jetty.

Newcastle

Newcastle Harbour.

Rock Excavation.—The “Lobnitz” rock crusher “Poseidon” completed the removal of the 13-foot patch off Stony Point, the quantity excavated from 1 July to the end of November being 3,200 tons; expenditure, £786 0s. 9d. From December, 1897, to June, 1898, the “Poseidon” was employed crushing the rock at the approach to the new basin, the area crushed being 24,506 square feet to a depth of 5 feet. This rock is not yet lifted. Expenditure, £776 16s. 5d.

The rock excavator “Cliona” was engaged excavating rock at the entrance to the new basin. An area of 35,200 square feet was blasted to a depth of 6 feet, the material being removed by the dredge “Nu.” Expenditure, exclusive of dredging, £1,741 8s. 5d.

Breakwaters and Training-walls.—A line was laid from the gantry wharf across Stockton to the site of the new northern breakwater, which was extended as far as high water, 4,925 tons of ship's ballast being used in this work. The laying of sidings and other preliminary works was also carried out.

The old line on the southern breakwater was taken up and relaid, and the tipping of stone commenced on 2 September, 1897. Since that date 8,932 tons of stone have been placed in the southern breakwater and 9,844 tons in the southern guide-wall. The breakwater was extended 54 feet and the guide-wall 474 feet. The heavy gale in May did considerable damage to the breakwater, washing the tip-head back 32 feet.

The expenditure in connection with the breakwater works has been £12,815 18s. 11d.

5,550 tons of ballast was obtained from lighters and placed in line of the Stockton Training-wall, chiefly below low water.

1,780 feet of training-wall round the southern end of the proposed new island in the north harbour was partly constructed. The quantity of stone brought in from the Waratah quarry for this work was 4,863½ tons, the expenditure being £850.

General.—A large amount of work in connection with repairs to dredges, tugs, launches, punts, &c., and the construction of trucks, pontoons, &c., was carried out in the workshops at Bullock Island.

Arrangements were made for the despatch of 9,580 tons of coal in 180 cargoes for the use of dredges and various works on the northern rivers.

An average number of about 151 men have been employed on the various works in the Newcastle district during the year.

Hunter River.

Swan Reach wharf was repaired at a cost of £8 8s. 10d.

Two new pile-light beacons were constructed on the lower flats, and a pile-beacon was driven on the Raymond Terrace flats at a cost of £85 12s. 6d.

A channel 25 feet wide was excavated through the rock bar in Ironbark Creek, rendering it navigable for rowing boats as far as Plattsburg. The cost of this work was £50 8s. 9d.

The wharf at Clarencetown, on the Williams River, was re-decked and otherwise repaired at a cost of £67 17s. 10d.

Lake Macquarie.

A jetty was constructed at Belmont at a cost of £506 8s. 3d.

Sydney and South Coast District.*Hawkesbury River.*

Repairs have been effected to the wharfs at Wiseman's Ferry and St. Albans.

The channel at Woy Woy, Brisbane Water, has been deepened 2 feet at low water, and is now open for boat traffic, the expenditure being £30 3s. 3d.

A boat channel has been constructed at Brooklynn, on the west side of the railway embankment, at a cost of £52 14s. 6d.

Port Jackson.

Circular Quay (west side).—The following improvements and repairs have been carried out at the Circular Quay wharfs during the year:—

Berth No. 1.—The contractor completed the iron railing at Berth No. 1, west side, in August, the cost being £204 3s. 10d.

Berth No. 2.—A latrine has been erected on No. 2 Berth, and repairs effected to Custom-house office, the expenditure being £33 6s. 6d.

Berth No. 3.—The contract for alterations to Berth No. 3 and construction of No. 1 Jetty was completed in October, the cost being £7,655 2s. 8d. The contract for erection of cargo shed was completed in November at a cost of £1,984 15s.

The

The following work was carried out by day-labour:—The old shed was removed and about 83 cubic yards of masonry built for foundations of new cargo sheds. 173 cubic yards of hand-packed ballast was placed in the sea-wall, and 163 lin. feet of drain-pipe laid. The roadway on the western side was also excavated, ballasted, and metalled. This Berth has been deepened by diving operations, 1,460 tons of material having been removed.

Berth No. 4.—The contract for the erection of a cargo shed at Berth No. 4 was completed in October at a cost of £1,054.

A considerable amount of work has also been done by day-labour, 1,522 cubic yards of masonry having been put in the retaining-wall at the back of the wharf, 45 piles driven for foundations of cargo sheds, and wool-pressers placed in position, &c.

Work is now proceeding on the contract for extension of wharf No. 5 and erection of jetty No. 2, the expenditure to date being £1,333 12s. 4d.

Berth No. 5.—The foundations for cargo sheds at Berth No. 5 are being put in; the caps have been placed in position, portion of the joists and flooring laid, and a commencement made with the gutter round shed.

The expenditure in connection with day-labour work on Berths Nos. 3, 4, and 5 was £702 5s. 11d.

On 27 May, a contract was let for the erection of two cargo sheds, one on wharf, No. 5 Berth, and one on No. 2 jetty; contract amount, £3,299. The work is now being carried out.

Two contracts for the erection of offices on the Orient and the Messageries Maritimes Companies' wharfs were carried out during the year, the expenditure being £454 7s. 2d.

The contractor has made good progress with the gates and fencing on the western side of the Quay. Among the minor works which have been carried out at the Circular Quay the following may be specified:—

Repairs have been effected to the wharfs on the eastern side, Prince's Stairs, Floating Jetty, &c., &c. Alterations and additions have been made to railings and gates, Messageries Maritimes wharf, P. and O. Company's offices, Horse Ferry landing, &c. Footpaths have been repaired and tarred and wood-blocking repaired.

The expenditure on the above and sundry maintenance works has amounted to £2,704 1s. 3d.

An average number of 41 men have been employed.

Woolloomooloo Bay.

Contracts.—The cargo shed at No. 2 Berth was completed in August, the cost being £1,588 12s. 6d., and the one at No. 1 Berth was completed in October, at a cost, including engine-house, of £1,750 15s. 7d.

An office was erected at No. 2 Berth at a cost of £177 8s. 8d., and a block of latrines at the same place for £52 10s.

In May a contract was let for the erection of a cargo shed with engine-house, on land at the rear of Berths Nos. 1 and 2, for the sum of £5,199. The work is now proceeding.

Day-labour.—The work of levelling off the resumed land, and using the material for reclaiming the area between the proposed new wharfs on the eastern side of the bay, has been continued. The general excavations above formation level, equal to 4,564 cubic yards, were used for this purpose.

955 cubic yards of masonry and 284 cubic yards of hand-packed ballast were used in the construction of the sea-wall.

A rubble-stone wall, containing 152 cubic yards, has been erected at the back of the resumed area, and a roadway, in the construction of which 2,700 cubic yards of ballast and metal were used.

The roadway at the back of Nos. 1 and 2 Berths has been formed, and 3,360 cubic yards of ballast and metal used in its construction. A dish gutter, with gully-traps, pipes, &c., has also been built, containing 117 cubic yards of masonry.

Forty-two cubic yards of masonry were put in the retaining-wall at the foot of the Victoria-street steps, and an iron fence erected along the top. Forty cubic yards of sandstone ballast have been put in the approach.

863 lineal feet of kerb-stone have been worked. Piles have been driven for land ties, and sundry minor works, including tar-paving, fencing, &c., carried out.

The average number of men employed has been 39, and the expenditure for the year has been £7,166 5s. 10d.

Fort Macquarie.

In March a contract was let for the erection of a receiving-room for explosives on the wharf at the eastern side of the fort. The work was completed at a cost of £134 16s. 3d.

The contractor for the construction of a horse ferry dock, wharf, etc., is making good progress.

Darling Island.

The principal work at Darling Island is the construction of a concrete wharf wall (the depth of water being about 28 feet at low water), composed of large concrete blocks, which are lowered into position by a 30-ton steam-crane, the bottom being levelled and made up with concrete, where required, by divers. The first block was placed in position on the 9 February, and by 30 June 382 blocks, containing 4,859 cubic yards of concrete, were fixed in place, and 59 blocks moulded. 833 cubic yards of concrete were used for levelling the bottom, and about 60 cubic yards were placed in the main work on top of wall.

52,677 tons of ballast, about 1,000 tons of large stone, and 2,450 tons of sand have been used in connection with the above work, including hand-packed ballast, filling behind wall, &c.

128 cubic yards of stone have been put in the retaining-wall behind ferry wharf.

Among the smaller works carried out here may be mentioned the following:—The erection of steam-crane and tramline, to be used in connection with the construction of the concrete blocks; the construction of roadway; excavation of drain; laying of drain-pipes; extension of sewer, &c., &c.

The average number of men employed on these works has been 47, and the expenditure £11,689 14s. 11d.

Glebe Island Bridge Causeways.

A commencement was made with the causeway approaches to the Bridge, which require some 183,000 cubic yards of rock filling, by opening a quarry on Glebe Island. Up to the end of June about 17,000 cubic yards had been quarried and deposited in place. A contract has been let for piling under the abutments for the fixed spans on either side of the opening spans.

Glebe Island Quarry, &c.

Exclusive of material put into the causeway, 1,178 cubic feet of large stone and 12,313 tons of ballast have been obtained at this quarry and sent to the various works in the harbour.

Amongst the minor works carried out have been the following:—A culvert has been taken up and a gutter on roadway lifted and reset and new concrete gutter put down; also 516 feet of railway, with two sets of points and crossings, have been laid.

The average number of men employed has been 56, the expenditure being £2,117 2s. 7d.

Pymont Wharfs.

The Berths in front of the wharfs on the north and south of Pymont Bridge have been deepened by diving operations during the year, 9,250 tons of rock and clay having been removed.

Wharf Repairs, &c.

Repairs have been effected to wharfs at the following places:—Pymont, Blackwattle Bay, Newington, Callan Park, Erskine-street, Clarke Island, Ermington, Mortlake and Ryde. The "Sobraon" moorings have also been attended to.

Shea's Creek Canal.

The sides of the canal at Shea's Creek have been pitched with stone for a distance of 2,169 feet 1,934 square yards of pitching have been repaired, and 878 feet of coping reset. The amount of excavation from the drains, dam, and banks, deposited to formation level has been 32,493 cubic yards. Two grab dredges employed deepening the cutting lifted 37,486 tons of material.

On the 26 October the tidal water was allowed to flow into the upper portion of the channel.

Munnie-street sewer continuation was completed and the water turned into the canal, a bridge of old rails and concrete being constructed over the sewer.

Three small wharfs have been constructed, and a concrete culvert built.

A considerable amount of work has been done in the way of constructing and repairing plant, maintaining drains, fencing, &c.

An average number of 76 men have been employed, and the expenditure has been £9,413 17s. 8d.

Cook's River.

The suction dredge "Neptune" was engaged until March deepening Cook's River from the lower end upwards, 185,726 cubic yards of silt having been raised and deposited on the resumed area. A grab dredge was employed above the Cook's River Dam, and has removed 7,166 tons of material during the year.

The banks of the river below the dam have been repaired and faced up with fascines for a length of 40,279 feet, backed up with clay where found necessary. The bank at Bonnie Doon has been raised, 6,606 cubic yards of silt being deposited in it.

The bridge at Bestic-street has been put in thorough repair, and the abutments protected with piling and ballast.

Extensive repairs have been effected to Botany Pier and Lord's Wharf and their approaches.

The average number of men employed on the above works was 166, the expenditure being £7,235 7s. 6d.

Fair progress has been made with the contract for construction of bridge with sluices over Cook's River at Tempe. The contract amount is £10,057 11s. 9d.

Work was begun on the contract for the construction of embankment, sluices, &c, and across Marrickville Flat, the contract amount being £2,711 17s.

Wollongong Harbour.

Repairs have been effected to the breakwater and the I.S.N. Co.'s Jetty. The maintenance men have kept the cranes in repair. The expenditure here has been £977 8s. 3d.

Moruya River Improvements.

The construction of the training-wall on the southern side of the Moruya River was commenced in August last, and the quantity of stone put in the work since then amounted to 21,758 tons. The total length of the southern wall is now 3,738 feet.

The northern bank has been protected for a length of 1,694 feet.

A suction dredge has been employed filling in at back of dyke and deepening the channel at the mouth of the river.

The average number of men employed has been 45, and the expenditure was £5,888 18s. 6d.

Eden.

A large portion of Eden Jetty has been renewed, tramline relaid, sidings rearranged, and a wall constructed. An average number of 8 men have been employed, and the expenditure has been £1,525 18s. 11d.

Miscellaneous Works on South Coast.

Repairs, &c., have also been effected to the following:—I.S.N. Co.'s Wharf, Kiama; Narooma Wharf; Bermagui Wharf; Nelligen Jetty; Ulladulla Wharf and Tramline; Bateman's Bay Tramline; and Shoalhaven Dock.

The contract for the construction of wharf and approach at Jervis Bay has been completed.

Darling

Darling and Murrumbidgee Rivers.

The contractor is making slow progress with the wharf at Bourke.

The snagging of the Darling was started in September and had to be suspended in March on account of the flooded state of the river. During that time 691 snags were removed, clearing the river for a distance of 40 miles down stream from Brewarrina, the expenditure being £2,199 13s. 4d.

The snagging of the Murrumbidgee was carried on from the 4 of April to the end of the year, 1,300 snags being removed, and 25 miles of river below Hay being cleared. The expenditure was £488 17s. 7d.

Dredging Operations.

During the year dredging operations have been carried on with very satisfactory results by 11 ladder, 15 suction, and 12 grab dredges, the total cost of raising and depositing 6,612,178 tons of material being £87,780, or an average of 3·18 pence per ton.

In the statements annexed detailed information is supplied respecting the localities where dredging has been performed, together with quantities and cost, &c., of each vessel's operations.

Mention should be made of the deepening of the Eastern Channel, Sydney Harbour, by the self-loading sand-pump dredge "Jupiter," for which funds were specially voted. The sand raised is carried in the dredge's own hopper to sea, or to the various reclamations, and dumped. Weather conditions not being wholly favourable owing to the exposed site of operations, the cost is necessarily higher than for work carried out in smooth water. The channel, when completed, will carry a depth of 35 feet at low water, and judging from past experience no further dredging should be necessary there for the next twenty years.

An attempt was made to deepen the bar at the new entrance, Macleay River, but the heavy draught of the "Jupiter" and unfavourable weather which prevailed led to the experiment being abandoned, after the loss of the tender "Mikado." For this work the new bar suction dredge "Antleon" is specially adapted.

In May last an attempt was made with the "Neptune" to again deepen the bar at Bateman's Bay, which, owing to the wide entrance, shoals very rapidly. After lifting 56,800 tons the dredge, while at work, was unfortunately sunk on the bar, the accident being attributable to the breaking of a chain whilst strained by a heavy roll suddenly setting in. The vessel was quickly raised, and brought to Sydney for repairs in order to resume operations at the Cook's River Reclamation. As in the case of the Macleay, this is work which could be better done by the "Antleon."

The "Groper" has filled in an area at Middle Harbour with sand for the filter-beds of the North Shore Sewerage Works, and has also filled in reclamation areas at Tarban Creek and Rushcutter's Bay. The work at Rozelle Bay was then resumed, but the distance to which material is pumped ($\frac{3}{4}$ mile) impedes the rapid progress of the work as compared with short distance work.

The absence of floods during the past year has admitted of very satisfactory progress being made with the harbour deepening at Newcastle, without the necessity of working extra shifts. Large portions of reclaimed land have been made by sand-pumping at Stockton and Carrington. At the latter place the work, like that at Rozelle, has been slow and costly owing to the distance ($\frac{1}{2}$ mile) pumped.

The most important dredging work on the northern rivers has been the formation of the new entrance at the Macleay, through which almost the whole of the traffic now passes.

Sand-pumps are also employed at Tweed, Richmond, Bellinger, Nambucca, Hastings, Myall, and Moruya Rivers, and Camden Haven, Cape Hawke, and Lake Macquarie; details of cost, &c., of work at these places and elsewhere appear in the tabulated statement accompanying this Report.

Floating Plant.

Tweed River Harbour Works.—Two hardwood punts, each to carry 100 tons, have been constructed at Ballina for the Tweed River works, at a cost of £1,283 7s. 1d.

Richmond River Harbour Works.—Two wooden punts, having a capacity of 200 tons each, were constructed at Woodburn, at a cost of £1,552 14s.

Clarence River Harbour Works.—For the Clarence River Harbour Works two wooden punts, of 100 tons capacity each, were constructed, and two old iron reclamation punts were decked over, the cost being £1,100.

Trial Bay Improvements.—Two wooden punts, of about 150 tons capacity each, were constructed at Trial Bay, the cost being about £700.

Newcastle Harbour Improvements.—For use in connection with the Newcastle Harbour improvements two pontoons, each 80 feet by 20 feet by 5 feet, were constructed at Bullock Island at a cost of £850. Two wooden punts, each 100½ feet by 24 feet by 6 feet, were built at the cost of £1,520. A wooden screw-steamer (the "Powerful"), 90 feet by 22 feet by 6½ feet, is being built at Fitzroy Dock by day labour; the estimated cost is £2,500.

Sydney Harbour.—Two wooden pontoons were constructed at Fitzroy Dock, one 80 feet by 42 feet by 7 feet, with a 30-ton crane erected on it for use in raising and placing in position the large concrete blocks for the wall now being constructed at Darling Island, and the other 54 feet by 26 feet by 4½ feet to supplement the plant at the dock; total cost about £3,000. A wooden punt, 54 feet by 35 feet by 4½ feet, to carry a 6-ton steel crane, was built at Berry's Bay for general use in Sydney Harbour.

Two wooden ash punts, each 38 feet by 12 feet by 3 feet, are being constructed for the Naval Station, Garden Island, the estimated cost being £300.

Permanent moorings were laid down for the Nautical School Ship "Sobraon" at a cost of £550.

Dredge Service.—Tenders have been invited for the construction of a wooden screw-steamer, to be named the "Phoenix." This vessel is to receive the engines, screw-shaft, stern tube boiler, &c., and some deck fittings of the "Mikado," recently wrecked on the coast. Estimated cost about £1,500.

A steel screw-steamer, 85 feet by 20 feet by 8 feet, is being constructed at Fitzroy Dock by day labour. This vessel is to receive the engines, boiler, &c., at present in the tug "Little Nell." Cost, about £3,000.

A suction dredge, named the "Antleon," 165 feet by 35 feet by 8½ feet, has been built on the Clyde, and is expected to leave on her voyage out here shortly. She is intended for use on shallow river bars.

General.—The s.s. "Ajax" was converted into a pilot steamer for service at Newcastle, and handed over to the Marine Board after satisfactory ocean trials. The cost of alterations and additions was about £9,400.

The s.s. "Thetis" was temporarily fitted with an extra steam-winch, fair leads, rollers, blocks, ice-chest, &c., for experimental deep sea fishing, at a cost of about £250. When the vessel was last in dock a thorough examination of her hull was made, and it was found that the shell was very much decayed, and that the framing, floors, &c., amidship were defective. A recommendation has been made to place a sum of £10,000 on the estimates for a new hull.

A wooden screw-steam-launch, 50 feet x 10 feet by 5 feet, to be called the "Sol," is now being constructed at Fitzroy Dock. The machinery is to be similar to that in the "Swift."

Light-houses.

Port Stephens.—In August, plans were prepared and materials supplied for the erection of three new wash-houses for the Port Stephens light-house, the work to be carried out by the light-keepers. Cost of material, £64.

Hornby.—In January, repairs were effected to the electric bells at Hornby Light-house by day-labour, at a cost of £3.

Macquarie, South Head.—In April, repairs were effected to the fences, roofs of quarters, etc., at Macquarie Light-house, South Head, the work being carried out by day labour, at a cost of £17.

Jervis Bay.—During the year, work has been proceeding in the erection of new lighthouse buildings at Point Perpendicular. A wharf having been first erected, work commenced on the buildings in October, and is still going on. The contract amount is £10,719 16s. 10d.

(2.) WATER SUPPLY.

Metropolitan.

Centennial Park Reservoir.—The new covered reservoir at the Centennial Park was completed.

This reservoir, plans of which are given in the Appendix, is by far the largest of the kind in the southern hemisphere, and almost the largest single covered-in reservoir in existence. It occupies an area of 3½ acres, and contains, when full, 18,000,000 gallons. The depth of water above draw-off level is 20 feet, and the top water surface is 245 feet above sea level. The walls are of brickwork, the floor and partition walls of sandstone concrete, and the roof—which is formed in groined arches—of coke concrete supported by brick pillars.

Thorough ventilation is effected by means of the surrounding columns and central towers.

The ornamental railing, pavilion, footpaths, &c., were introduced with the view of the roof being used as a recreation ground, one of the conditions under which the site was granted being that no injury should be done to the general appearance of the park.

This reservoir will serve about half the city area, nearly the whole of Paddington, a portion of Woollahra, Redfern, Darlington, Newtown, a portion of the Glebe, Balmain, and Petersham.

It is supplied, at present, by pumping from Crown-street reservoir at the rate of 400,000 gallons per hour through a 36 inch steel main. The reservoir can thus be filled in forty-five hours, but larger pumps will shortly be provided for this service.

The Paddington reservoir, 31 feet lower, with a capacity of 2,000,000 gallons, will not now be required. The old Woollahra reservoir, 37 feet higher, with a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons, will, however, continue in use until the storage at Waverley can be increased.

The total cost of the Centennial Park reservoir, including 36 inch steel rising main from Crown-street and about 2 miles of service main, was £70,000.

Duplication of 6-foot pipe line.—The construction of $4\frac{3}{4}$ miles of steel pipes, 6 feet in diameter, to duplicate the existing main from Pipe Head to Potts Hill has been commenced.

When this work is completed, and the canal from Prospect Reservoir slightly raised, 47,000,000 gallons of water per day can be delivered to a sufficient elevation at Potts Hill. Improved arrangements for screening the water at pipe-head will also be provided.

Country Towns.

Tamworth.

The construction by day-labour of the whole of the works in connection with water supply of the town of Tamworth has been carried on throughout the year. The storage dam and service reservoir have been completed, the supply main and reticulation are nearing completion, and the whole of the works should be in operation during the ensuing summer.

Mudgee.

At the request of the Mudgee Council the whole of the works in connection with the Mudgee water supply are to be carried out by day-labour. The construction of the storage dam is well forward; laying of main and reticulation will be put in hand so as to be completed simultaneously with the storage reservoir. A new feature is being introduced into this work, namely, the use of lapwelded steel pipes for service main. For small sizes of pipes it is considered these will be more efficient than the riveted steel pipes heretofore used.

Cootamundra.

The construction of the storage dam, and laying of supply main in connection with the extension of the Cootamundra water supply, have all been carried out by day-labour. The main and pipe-heads have been completed, and the storage dam will be completed by the beginning of the ensuing summer.

Condobolin.

The supply for the town of Condobolin is obtained by the pumping from the Goobang Creek into a steel reservoir on the high ground above the town.

This part of the Goobang Creek is an ana branch of the Lachlan River, the flow in it being coincident with that in the river itself. A low dam only was required for storage purposes. The construction of the dam and laying of the reticulation have been carried out by day-labour, and the erection of pumps, engine-house, and service tank by contract. The whole work is nearing completion, and the supply will be available for the ensuing summer.

Water Supplies under Investigation.

Wollongong.

Additional surveys are being made, and further information obtained, before finally taking out the estimate for the proposed scheme to supply Wollongong from the Cordeaux River.

Gundagai.

Surveys are in hand for the proposed gravitation scheme to supply water to the town of Gundagai from Ned's Gully, situated about 1 mile from the town.

Bathurst.

Surveys have been made of three separate proposed gravitation schemes for the supply of the town of Bathurst from Davis Creek, Winburndale Creek, and the Gulf. The extent of the drift at the pumping station will be further tested by boring before any decisive steps are taken.

Warren.

A scheme for the supply of the town of Warren from an artesian bore sunk by the Department of Mines has been submitted to the Council and accepted. The construction will shortly be put in hand.

Cobar.

A preliminary investigation has been made and scheme submitted to the Cobar Council for a pumping supply for that town from a storage reservoir proposed to be constructed about 3 miles away. The conformation of the country and small available rainfall render any scheme for this town a comparatively expensive matter.

(3.) WATER CONSERVATION, IRRIGATION, AND DRAINAGE.

The Water Rights Act.

During the official year 1897-98 the most important duty of the Water Conservation Branch was the dealing with applications under the Water Rights Act. Up till October, 1897, Colonel Home's inquiry demanded the first attention of this Branch, but after his report was presented the inquiries regarding applications for licenses under the Water Rights Act were proceeded with as quickly as possible. Up till the end of the year under review—that is, till 30 June, 1898—particulars of applications received under section 12 and under section 7 were as follows:—

The great majority of the applications for licenses relate to dams for storing water for stock, but in a considerable number of cases the work for which licenses have been sought are for irrigation. It is necessary to mention that the value and importance of the works for water conservation which have been constructed by private enterprise, and which till lately existed on sufferance only, are generally out of all proportion to the first cost of the works, particularly in the Central and Western Divisions of the Colony. Bearing this in mind, the immense importance of such works may be imagined from the fact that, according to the estimate of the Stock Department, the outlay on the construction of dams and tanks has been over ten and a quarter millions sterling. Of this amount, £7,644,641 is for work classed as "tanks"; but I am well aware that dams constructed across creeks from earth obtained from the beds of the creeks are frequently classed as "tanks," and I have therefore no doubt that the proportion of the outlay on dams is greater than that stated. However, assuming the accuracy of the figures as given—that is, taking the outlay on private dams as £2,644,637—the importance of the functions of the Water Rights Act in regulating the works which this represents, providing security for their maintenance, and affording facilities and security for the construction of new works of a better class, is at once apparent.

Another direction in which the Water Rights Act is becoming valuable is in the means which it affords under Section 4 for the construction of works where the landowners interested are willing to pay interest on the outlay. The unsatisfactory working of the Drainage Promotion Act has added considerably to the importance of the Water Rights Act, and in evidence of this several petitions for the construction of drainage works under Section 4 of this Act have been received. These are referred to under a separate heading.

The works and projects dealt with by this Branch during the year under review can most conveniently be referred to as affecting the river basins to which they belong. The following brief summary indicates in this manner the nature of the duties and work in hand, and the stages which the principal questions have reached.

River Darling.

The question of locking the river Darling from Bourke to Wilcannia having been referred to the Public Works Committee during the last Parliamentary Session, the final surveys of sites for locks and weirs were put in hand, as was also the preparation of plans and estimates. The preliminary estimate of the cost of the works required was £310,000, which included the cost of dredging shallows between the sites selected.

The Bourke lock and weir has been working satisfactorily during the year, the weir shutters having been raised and lowered several times to suit the changes in the river. The question of utilising the lock as a dock was raised during the year, and the necessary works for the adaptation were carried out at a comparatively trifling cost. The result of this work will be that steamers and barges trading on the river Darling will be repaired at Bourke, instead of being taken for this purpose to South Australia.

River Murray.

As Colonel Home in his report endorsed the practicability of constructing a canal from the River Murray, with its headworks at Bungowannah, about 6 miles from Albury, the ultimate interests of the district between the River Murray and the Billabong Creek in regard to this have to be kept in view.

At Colonel Home's instance an examination of the upper part of the catchment area of the River Murray was made with a view to determining whether there was any good site for a storage-reservoir. A fairly good site was obtained at a place known as "The Murray Gates."

On representation from residents of Mathoura, the question of increasing the flow in Culpa Creek—an affluent of the Murray—was investigated. The result was to show that it would be a comparatively easy matter to largely increase the flow into Edward River. The requirements of Mathoura are not of sufficient importance to warrant action of such far-reaching nature.

The Wentworth Irrigation Works are complete, and only await the formal sanction of Regulations.

River Murrumbidgee.

In his report on the "Prospects of Irrigation and Water Conservation in New South Wales," Colonel Home endorsed the practicability of the scheme previously proposed for a canal from the south side of the Murrumbidgee, near Narrandera. In the scheme, as first proposed, it was intended to construct only the canal and main branches in the first instance, and to take up the question of constructing a storage reservoir in the mountains when the development of irrigation appeared to warrant it. A preliminary survey of a site for a large storage reservoir at Tantangara had been carried out. At Colonel Home's request a complete inspection of the upper part of the catchment area was made, and two other favourable sites were discovered. Complete surveys of all three sites have been made, and the surveys required in connection with the altered site of the headworks of the proposed canal as recommended by Colonel Home have been carried out. A preliminary estimate has been prepared which tends to show that after allowing for loss of water by absorption, &c., a rate of about £40 per annum for every cubic foot per second of flow will return interest on the outlay, in addition to paying working expenses. This rate would be equivalent to 246,000 gallons for one shilling, and the estimate on which it is based concludes the cost of a storage reservoir at the junction of the Murrumbidgee and Goodradigbee Rivers. The final plans and estimates are now in hand.

It has been decided that the Balranald Irrigation area should be dealt with in a similar manner to that at Wentworth. The surveys required for the subdivision of the land and for the construction of channels for irrigation have been completed.

River Lachlan.

The period extending from 1894 up till the present time is stated by residents in the Lachlan River District to be unprecedented in its lack of anything approaching a flood. Owing partly to this, the application for licenses under the Water Rights Act have been large, and the number of the applications which were objected to was also exceptionally large.

The dam across the Lachlan River at the Middle Billabong weir was left unfinished pending arrangements for bringing this work under the provisions of the Water Rights Act. It proved impracticable to make such arrangements, and as the Department of Lands has certified that the indirect benefit which the works, if brought into operation, would confer, would be sufficient to justify the completion of the works by the Government, it has been decided to proceed with the construction of the dam.

The upper part of the catchment area of the River Lachlan has been inspected with a view to ascertaining whether there is any good site for storing water on a large scale, so as to maintain a good flow in the river. Only one moderately favourable site was discovered. The survey of this has been sanctioned.

River Macquarie.

The question of further utilising the water diverted by the Warren weir was brought before the parties concerned in a proposal to construct a cutting about $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles in length. At an inquiry held in Warren, by the Land Board, this work was agreed to by all parties, on the condition that regulators should be constructed to control the supply, and subdivided between Gunningbar, Crooked, and Duck Creeks. The amended project is now ready.

The plans for a regulator to control the outflow at Warren weir are now in hand.

A careful examination of the upper part of the catchment area was made with a view to determining whether there is any favourable site for a large storage reservoir. The investigation proved fruitless.

River Namoi.

The site proposed some years ago for a large storage reservoir on the River Namoi was inspected by Colonel Home, and borings were made to determine the character of the foundation which could be obtained for a dam. While the possibility of storing water on a large scale was beyond question, it was considered that the outlay which would be necessitated would be considerably greater than present circumstances warrant.

River Gwydir.

The question of the drainage of the Gwydir district has been investigated in detail, and plans and estimates for the necessary works have been prepared. The area of land which these works will benefit is about half a million acres. The estimated outlay required is under £19,000 and the lowest estimate of the increased value of the land affected is £125,000. The proposal to carry out the works under section 4 of the Water Rights Act is under consideration.

While the question of drainage is a most important one to a large portion of the basin of the Gwydir, the want of water is frequently the cause of losses along the Mallowa, Moomin, and Thalaba Creeks. Surveys have been made to determine how these creeks can be supplied from the surplus waters of the Gwydir, and the plans and sections have been partly prepared.

River Macleay.

As the Drainage Unions on the lower part of the Macleay have not worked satisfactorily, the question of dealing with the drainage on a more comprehensive system has been raised. The result of the inquiry has been that steps are now being taken to have one comprehensive drainage scheme on the south-eastern bank of the river, and to have a similar arrangement on the north-western side. It is proposed that the works in each case should be dealt with under section 4 of the Water Rights Act.

Shoalhaven River.

The Numba Drainage Union on the lower part of the Shoalhaven River has been constituted during the year.

Manning River.

A project for the drainage of "The Big Swamp" at Cooperbrook has been prepared.

Miscellaneous.

The maintenance of heights of the rivers throughout the Colony has been attended to as usual, and the gauging of discharges has been carried on as opportunity offered.

(4.) GENERAL WORKS.

Fitzroy Dock.

The workshops at Fitzroy Dock have been kept busily employed during the year. Some extensions to the workshops have been completed, including a brass and iron foundry, new machine shop, and several new tools have been procured to meet the growing demands of the shop. A large amount of work has been performed in making all the points and crossings required by the Railway Construction Branch for the Rose Bay and George-street tramways.

Reclamation Works.

Newcastle District.

Stockton.—32,006 tons of clay were discharged from vessels at the Stockton Jetties during the year, and used for covering over the sand, pumped ashore by the "Juno."

Carrington.—86,526 tons of ballast were discharged from 163 vessels at the Bullock Island Ballast Jetties, and used to reclaim Crown lands at the north end of Carrington, the expenditure being £598 8s.

The suction dredge "Juno" was employed pumping from the new basin on to land north of Cowper-street, where a valuable area is being reclaimed.

Sydney and South Coast District.

Rushcutter's Bay.—A length of 1,063 feet of stone parapet has been put on the sea wall round Rushcutter's Bay, 296 feet of drain pipes laid, and ashes laid down for footpaths. 71,445 tons of silt have been deposited at the back of the wall and levelled off. This work is now practically completed. An average number of thirteen men have been employed, the expenditure being £682 12s. 6d.

Rozelle Bay.—Only one man was employed at maintenance work, Rozelle Bay, until March, when the suction dredge commenced work. Since then twelve men have been employed diverting the flow of water, &c. The expenditure has been £466 10s. 7d.

Tarban Creek.—A suction dredge was at work at Tarban Creek for some time, and an average number of ten men were employed levelling the material lifted.

A grab dredge was also engaged for a short time deepening the entrance channel. This necessitated the removal of a set of baths, and their re-erection on completion of the dredging. The expenditure was £324 8s. 7d.

Long

Long Cove.—The principal work in connection with Long Cove has been the levelling off of the ground to formation level. This was completed by the end of August. A small amount of dredging was done at the top end of the canal. Expenditure, £93 15s. 5d.

The contractor for the extension of the Park Road Branch Stormwater Drain has completed his contract.

White Creek.—In July a washaway occurred at Gordon-street outlet, White Creek. This has been repaired. Expenditure, £13 15s. 5d.

Other Works.

Garden Island.—On 16 June a contract was let for the erection of a shed capable of storing 2,000 tons of coal in connection with the Naval Station, Garden Island, the contract sum being £858. This work is now proceeding.

Sundry repairs and alterations were made to the dynamo room at a cost of £120, and also to the various buildings at a cost of £84 17s. 2d.

Eight electric light meters were provided and fixed at a cost of £91 5s.

Spectacle Island.—At Spectacle Island the ballast dyke was completed in March. It is 605 feet long, containing 2,446 cubic yards of hand-packed ballast and 4,280 tons of filling.

Three thousand five hundred and forty square yards of paving have been top-dressed, and 106 square yards of new paving laid. Several small repairs have been carried out.

An average number of 11 men have been employed, and the expenditure has been £1,221 10s. 2d.

Manly.—The sea-wall between the two jetties at Manly is being taken down and rebuilt, a length of 33 feet having been completed to date. Seven men are employed here, the expenditure being £90 10s. 2d.

Parramatta Dam.—At Parramatta, some necessary repairs have been effected to the dam. A rubble wall has been erected to protect a piece of Crown land between the dam and the Borough Council's property. About 70 cubic yards of masonry have been put in this work. Excavation to the amount of 91 cubic yards has been done and 113 cubic yards of filling placed behind the wall. A new fence has been erected, and some minor repairs have been carried out.

Surveys.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Conference to determine on a standard datum for New South Wales, all levels are now referred to mean sea-level, and the saving in time and gain in accuracy is already apparent.

Permanent bench marks in connection with the tidal gradient investigation and the determination of mean high-water have been fixed at several places between Parramatta and Watson's Bay, and this work is being carried out as opportunity offers.

A register of all permanent bench marks made by this department is being compiled, and the constant reference to it proves the necessity of the undertaking.

During the year the following surveys have been carried out:—

Harbours and Rivers.

Camden Haven entrance; Port Jackson from entrance to Bradley's Head; Fitzroy Dock entrance; Cabbage-tree Bay; Moruya River (Pompey's Point to Bridge); Hunter River (Dam site at Woodlands); Soundings at Ballina; Soundings at Long Cove.

Water Supply.

Tumut, Gundagai, Kiama, Wollongong (amended scheme), Sydney (duplication of 6 feet main), Nowra (extension), Bowral (new dam site), Wellington, Inverell, Temora, Bathurst, Picton, Richmond (new filter beds).

Water Conservation.

Cutting Gunningbar Creek to Cookamurra Creek; cutting Gunningbar Creek to Crooked Creek; cutting Boothaguy Creek to Gum Cowl Creek; cutting Marthaguy Creek to Back Creek; Proposed dam Keepit.

Bridges.

Glebe Island, Darling Harbour, Nepean River at Camden, Queanbeyan River at Queanbeyan, Moruya River at Moruya, Kendall on Camden Haven River, Killawarra on Manning River, Bungay on Manning River.

Wharfs.

Dungarubba, Allen-street, Long Cove, Darling Harbour.

Drainage Scheme.

Tuckian Swamp.

Miscellaneous.

Lismore flood landing; Richmond River flood gradient; horse-ferry Dawe's Point; subdivision Long Cove reclaimed land; Como reclamation limit line; Shea's Creek subdivision; extension of Victoria-street; Woolloomooloo; Tempe (proposed pumping station); Woolloomooloo Bay (resumed land east side); White Bay wharf reserve, Jenolan Caves (detailed survey of lease of land).

Plans have been compiled showing oyster leases at the Tweed, Richmond, Clarence, Hastings, Manning Rivers, Camden Haven, Terranora Creek, Shoalhaven, and Crookhaven Rivers; and 117 cases of private reclamations and special leases, and 291 oyster leases have been examined and reported upon.

The foregoing report shows that a large amount of work has been in hand and completed during the past year by this Branch, and but for the ready co-operation and zealous assistance rendered by all the officers concerned, of which I cannot speak too highly, it would have been impossible to have shown such a result.

Report of the Government Architect.

Sydney, 10 October, 1898.

I HAVE the honor to submit the following report upon the building operations and services rendered by this branch during the twelve months ended 30 June, 1898.

The sum voted from revenue for expenditure in connection with repairing, furnishing, and improving existing buildings, and fulfilling the many services rendered by this branch, amounted to £60,544.

The erection of the statue of Governor Phillip at a cost of about £13,000, on a commanding site in the Palace Garden, commemorates the appointment of the first Governor of this Colony. The design is colossal in character, the central figure being upwards of 16 feet in height, and, with the allegorical figures supporting and surrounding it, cast in bronze from the models of Signor Simonetti. The base work and fountains are of marble, and the whole forms the most important and largest memorial group of statuary in the Australian colonies.

The Health Board offices erected in Macquarie-street have been specially designed to meet the important and increasing requirements of this branch of the Government Service. Besides providing accommodation for the Medical Officers of the Government, and for inspection of patients, the building is fitted with complete laboratory arrangements for the Government Analyst and his staff. It is in appearance of a somewhat different type to Government offices of the city generally, being a Gothic structure of combined brick and stone work.

The workshops added to the Australian Museum form an extensive range of buildings in the rear of the older portions of the buildings of the institutions, and are designed as the basement of future extensions of the Museum proper. Extensive

Extensive works, including the erection of infectious diseases ward, have been carried out, and others are commenced, at the Coast Hospital, Little Bay, and although it has been a difficult matter to determine what the future of this institution will be, particularly on account of its distance from Sydney, and of the larger portion of it being of wooden construction, the Government requirements have made it absolutely necessary to incur the expenditure referred to.

During the year the Mines Department entrusted this branch with the remodelling and completion of the experimental Metallurgical Works recently commenced at Clyde, and, owing to the urgent demands, the work (costing over £3,000) was carried out with extreme rapidity.

The Department of Education also entrusted this branch with the erection of the Technical College at Bathurst, the plans, specification, and contract having been previously prepared and executed in that Department.

The buildings erected at the Experimental Farm, Wagga Wagga, for the Department of Mines and Agriculture, consist of a specially-constructed and substantial granary (several floors in height, designed to carry heavy weights of wheat), a laboratory, and additions to the farm buildings generally. These were all designed to closely follow the views of the Department interested, and of its adviser, Dr. Cobb.

The Lands Office at Forbes, erected during this year, is one of a series of new Lands offices required by the Lands Department in the principal centres of its administration throughout the Colony. It is designed in timber and iron construction, specially adapted for the hot climate of Forbes, and is understood to fully meet the requirements of the Department.

The most important Court-house erected during the year is that at Redfern, which, besides the accommodation necessary for the Department of Justice, provides also an extensive station and lock-up for Police purposes.

Expenditure in improvements and additions to a number of other public buildings was commenced during the year, and more or less progress made. The Art Gallery was enlarged by the addition of two main salons, which, together with those recently erected, form the southern central portion of the building, and include the stone facades on the eastern and western sides.

The principal goals of the Colony have, during this period, been under the close revision of the Comptroller-General of Prisons, who has taken steps to initiate some radical changes in the treatment of prisoners and in prison discipline. Amongst other necessary alterations to the buildings to permit of these changes being carried out, were the providing of separate cells for prisoners, the multiplication of single exercise yards, and the lighting of every individual cell by means of electric light. Much attention, therefore, has been paid to these buildings, and the necessary works to accomplish the designs have made favourable progress.

The external stonework of Government House has received careful attention, and considerable portions of the western front and roof have been renewed. This historical building requires continued care until the whole of the stonework (which in the first instance was badly executed) is more or less replaced. It is, perhaps, hardly necessary to add that its architectural details are being faithfully restored.

The extensive building operations at the Government Printing Office are nearly completed, and have involved the expenditure of a large sum of money. This building is now, although on a confined site, of sufficiently ample dimensions to enable the Government Printer to conduct the large business incidental to his establishment. In this case, as it was absolutely necessary that no interference should take place with the printing operations, the works were carried out on the day-labour system, and in such a way as to carefully study the convenience of the Government Printer.

Amongst other expenditures on works carried on during the year, is that involved in remodelling the accommodation for visitors to the Jenolan Caves.

For some years the caretaker of the caves had been permitted, under lease, to provide accommodation for visitors; but partly owing to a fire, and partly to an indifferent knowledge of the requirements, this accommodation had become inadequate and in every sense insufficient. It was determined by the Minister for Mines that this state of things should be continued no longer. The lease was, therefore, terminated, and the value of improvements paid to the lessee, whilst operations were at once commenced for the erection of the first portion of what will be, when completed, a large comfortable hotel of the type best known in the tourists districts of England, Scotland, and Ireland.

Great difficulties had to be faced in accomplishing this object. All the materials had to be drawn from Sydney, principally by long and difficult country roads to the site, and all workmen had to be specially brought up. In order to meet the difficulty in supplying bricks, and for other important reasons, the local mountain limestone has been utilised for the construction of the walls.

It is needless to say that every improvement in the way of cooking and sanitary appliances has been introduced, the Minister having determined that nothing should be left undone to provide suitable accommodation.

This work has been carried out necessarily by day labor.

Great improvements have been made, and, I understand, are in contemplation, relative to the road approaches to the Caves House, and the engineer for sewerage construction has supplied the hotel with a bountiful supply of pure water. He has also carried out a complete system of sewage, discharging into the creek quite half-a-mile below the hotel.

During the year preliminary steps were taken to provide in the building of the General Post Office for the large increase of the business, particularly with reference to the Electric Telegraph Department and Telephone Exchange. Upon first advising on this matter, I strongly urged that, if possible, the existing building with its well-known architectural lines should not be disturbed, and I pointed out that, in order to accomplish this, it was possible to resume additional land on the southern side in George-street, and also to erect new buildings in Martin-place, on the vacant site facing the General Post Office, to which might be removed the Government banking and postal note businesses, and by these two measures a rearrangement of the accommodation of the main building could be effected that would obviate the necessity of altering its appearance. After close consideration of the question by the postal authorities, it was, however, determined that the accommodation required must be found in the building itself, and no alternative offered but to erect additional stories on the present roof. Designs were submitted and approved, and as it was found desirable to conduct the building operations in such a way as not to interfere with the services of the Department, as in the case of the Government Printing Office, the Minister approved of the adoption of the day-labour system.

The

The increase of the George-street frontage by 33 feet, over a plot of land which had been resumed some years since for the purpose of extension, necessitated the taking down of a considerable portion of the facade to that street. This proved a source of great anxiety and constant care; but with the use of first-rate plant and reliable workmen, the most dangerous and difficult portions of this work have been accomplished without accident.

During the year a scheme for providing office accommodation for the Mines Department, the Education Department, and for a number of sub-departments and branches now occupying rented or condemned buildings, was initiated, and a representative Board appointed to prepare such scheme upon a suitable site at the corner of Bridge, Phillip, and Young streets. This action entailed a considerable amount of careful investigation, which was still proceeding at the close of the year. Designs were also in course of preparation for a new building to be erected at the corner of Hunter and Phillip streets for the accommodation of the Inspector-General of Police and the Comptroller-General of Prisons, the accommodation for the former being based to a great extent upon that of the New Scotland Yard, Whitehall, London.

The extensive works at Kenmore Hospital for the Insane have also been carried on without intermission, the expenditure for the year having amounted to £23,804 4s. 10d. As the various wards and administrative buildings are erected, they are handed over to the asylum authorities, and at once put into full occupation. It is anticipated that the final results as regards cost and general design will prove to be very satisfactory.

The expenditure of the year, involving something like a quarter of a million of money, has necessarily required a large number of contracts, and I am happy to state that, without a single exception, no dispute or contractor's claim remains unsettled, or has had to be dealt with out of the ordinary way. I attribute this in a great measure to the care of my officers, and to my insistence that under no circumstances shall deviations from contracts be entered into until authority has been obtained, and the cost of such deviation settled upon the basis of the contract, and with the contractor beforehand. This system has been rigidly adhered to in the office for some years. It is advantageous to the Government, and, I believe, appreciated by the contractors.

It may be worth noting that out of a total expenditure for the year of £245,700, the disbursements under the day-labour system upon important buildings (but exclusive of the necessary jobbing work at the Government Architect's yard, comprising a small number of small items) amount to £31,383 7s. 10d., expended as follows:—

In each of these cases special difficulties presented themselves that rendered their being carried out in the way reported as very desirable.

The system of employment of workmen at these buildings by priority of application has been rigidly adhered to, and no hesitation has been allowed in discharging the few men so engaged who were found not equal to requirements. Considerable numbers of the applicants have presented strong recommendations from Members of Parliament and others, but the test of a man's capabilities has always been judged by the work he has performed when his turn came for employment.

Some progress has been made with repairs to country buildings, but I have again to report that, under present circumstances, it is hopeless to expect to overtake the ever increasing requirements in this particular, and it may be noted that the unsatisfied requisitions have now assumed such large proportions that at the end of the financial year those outstanding for the past year are in excess of the amount which it is anticipated will be available for the coming year. Thus all subsequent requisitions for the latter must be deferred until the succeeding year. My great desire, therefore, to treat the dilapidations of Government buildings by periodical attention appears as far off accomplishment as ever.

During the year I was applied to on several occasions, without notice, to furnish valuations of buildings which might be affected by the federation of the Colonies, and in order to supply the information I had to depend upon a return I prepared in the year 1892, which period, it may be remembered, was prior to the great fall in value of real properties. I am, therefore, desirous of making a re-valuation as early as possible, but until the present pressure of work in the office is somewhat relieved, I do not see my way to enter into this tedious and extensive undertaking.

Shortly before the commencement of the year, I felt, after seven years of uninterrupted work, the need of some change and rest, together with a desire to inspect Government buildings in Europe erected since my last visit ten years previously, in order that I might make comparisons with those erected by the Government of this Colony. I, therefore, with the Minister's approval, took advantage of one of the concessions made to me upon entering the Public Service, and left for Europe early in May. By a generous arrangement made for me by the Minister, I was enabled to devote a considerable portion of my time to the comparison before alluded to, the result of which is referred to in my special report attached hereto. I returned to Sydney and resumed duties early in October, having much benefited by the change, and obtained a large amount of information, which, I trust, will, from time to time, be found of service to the Department.

On my departure, the control of the office was placed in the hands of Mr. Louis Robertson (Principal Assistant Architect), in conjunction with Mr. Joseph Davis, Engineer for Sewerage Construction and a member of the Board of Reference. Shortly afterwards, Mr. Davis was appointed "Acting Government Architect," and Mr. Louis Robertson, after thirty-seven years of faithful and single-minded service, retired upon his pension. The opportunity was thereupon taken to revise the internal working of the branch, and to bring it, so far as professionally practicable in its details, into closer line with the Engineering branches of the Public Works Department, official forms and returns in common being introduced much more largely than heretofore.

The

The composition of the head office also underwent some considerable change. The Metropolitan District, instead of being as heretofore conducted immediately under the control of the several Assistant Architects, was modified to the extent of placing the preparation of plans and of specifications into one drafting office under the supervision of Mr. Oakeshott as Chief Draftsman. The District Officers were increased in number from six to twelve, and the area of the districts being necessarily decreased.

Shortly after my return, Mr. George McRae was appointed Principal Assistant Architect, he at the same time relinquishing the position of Architect to the City of Sydney, for which authority he had just completed the erection of the Queen Victoria Markets.

I have to record with regret the death of Mr. Alfred Cook, retired on pension, and formerly for many years Chief Draftsman in this branch.

The retirement, at his own request, of Mr. A. E. Telfer, Senior Clerk of Works, also occurred after an honorable service of many years, during which his notable knowledge of men and of building matters was of great value to the branch.

The result as regards the re-arrangement of the office cannot be fully ascertained within the period covered by this report, but it is anticipated that such may be referred to in the report of next year.

APPENDIX B.

REPORT submitted by Mr. W. L. Vernon, F.R.I.B.A., Government Architect, in connection with his recent visit to the United Kingdom and Continent of Europe.

The Government Architect to the Under Secretary for Public Works.

Department of Public Works, Government Architect's Branch,

Sydney, 12 November, 1897.

I HAVE the honor to report that during my recent visit to Europe, and owing to the consideration of the Minister, I was able to devote the months of July and August to inspecting various buildings both in England and on the Continent, and generally to make myself acquainted with the progress in architecture during the last ten years, particularly with reference to technical details and improved methods of building.

Having this object in view, I visited a large number of Gaols, Police Buildings, Hospitals, Asylums for the Insane, Post Offices, Parliament Houses, Exhibition buildings, also the Royal Mint, Law Courts, Electric-light Plants, and numerous factories and works in connection with the production of Sanitary appliances.

I have to gratefully acknowledge the cordial assistance rendered me by the Agent-General and his Secretary (Mr. Yardley) in obtaining the best facilities for visiting all these buildings, and, so far as the Continent was concerned, in obtaining the necessary letters of introduction from Lord Salisbury to the several Ambassadors and Ministers.

As regards the Government buildings visited, the general impressions I have gained are that in asylum and post-office work quite the most modern improvements and systems have been adopted, and in that relating to prisons and police stations the work is of a more stereotyped character; but while there are many items of interest in the latter, I am of the opinion that the Government buildings of this Colony do not suffer by comparison.

It is in works of private enterprise that one sees the immense progress in all matters relating to the building art, and in all classes of buildings it is everywhere apparent that in sanitary matters and fittings the arrangements are hardly possible of improvement; while the use of English fittings and appliances appears to be universally adopted on the Continent, both in hotels, steam-boats, railways, and public buildings. Hitherto the best of these fittings have not been used, except to a limited extent, in Australia, possibly owing to their cost, but doubtless suitable opportunities for so doing will arise.

I also visited several of the most important factories for sanitary ware, and Messrs. Bradford's laundry works, and Messrs. Chubbs' safe-works.

One of the most marked improvements in London and the large provincial towns consists in the construction of public underground lavatories, fitted up by the best makers in a most complete manner, and producing in many instances, I understand, a handsome return upon their cost.

On visiting the Royal Mint, I made a close inspection of the whole of the extensive premises. The coinage of silver, just then in full operation, was produced from the same plant as that used for the gold coinage, and I was somewhat surprised to find that in so large an establishment no separate plant exists, while I was informed that nearly the whole of the gold coinage of the British Empire is now produced by the Australian mints. The buildings are old, and consequently not well arranged. Extensive rebuilding of some portions is now proceeding, and the engineer-in-charge informed me that (upon precisely similar grounds to those existing in Sydney) the works were being carried out on the day-work basis as distinct from contract, and by men specially engaged.

As regards theatres and public places of amusement, the regulations laid down for fire-proof construction, and sufficiency of exits, &c., are most rigidly enforced, and in cases of recent buildings of this class, sites bounded by at least two streets, and sometimes three, are invariably secured, to the great diminution of danger by fire to adjoining properties. This is in marked contrast to the conditions of the sites of some of the theatres recently erected in Sydney.

I made particular inquiries as to the policy of the Works Committee of the London County Council with reference to open competition amongst contractors, to the introduction of day-work, and to the use of the minimum-wage clause. I could, however, gain very little reliable information upon these points, as they are all passing through an experimental and critical stage, and are the subject of great controversy, due probably to the action of the responsible officers of the Works Committee in so dealing with day-work building accounts, as that factitious total costs have been arrived at, possibly in order to obtain results in accordance with the principles (for or against day-work) in vogue with the majority of the Committee for the time being. The administration was so much under a cloud, and party feeling was so high, that, as before stated, nothing of any value could be obtained.

As regards open competition for contract works, from what I heard, a system of selection has grown up. I have further on reported in connection with Metropolitan police stations, that about thirty contractors are on an improved list, and are invited to tender for works to be put out. In post-offices an unrecorded selection at the discretion of the Architect's Branch has become adopted, while in the asylums, which are erected by private architects in private practice under direct commission, those architects take care that none but tried contractors, mostly personally known to themselves, have an opportunity of tendering.

I found in the specifications also no hesitation in mentioning makers' names of special fittings required, to the great advantage of the buildings. This is the universal practice of the profession in England, and has encouraged certain manufacturers to produce special articles of the highest excellence, and of the latest invention, the large amount of business that comes to them through this channel producing the capital necessary for these very extensive undertakings. The absence of this custom in the work here has in some instances placed the Department at a disadvantage, and it has been found impossible to refuse to accept articles and fittings up to a certain standard submitted by the contractors and of unknown make, while those of a special maker would have been preferable.

With regard to the carrying on of works on a day-work basis, my observation went to show that there is a tendency both in London and in the Municipalities to adopt the system in such cases where works are of a highly technical character, and where perfection of execution is of more importance than either time or money. I did not find any decided movement towards the minimum-wage rate, excepting, as I before mentioned, in connection with the London County Council. Generally

Generally speaking, the rule in building matters is to determine by public competition, and in the higher class of work to restrict tendering to approved contractors.

I feel that the advantage of having seen so much modern work will prove to be of great assistance to me in the duties of my office, and I trust of equal value to the Government. I have been able to compare both our classes of buildings and the mode of construction with those adopted in England and on the Continent, and the result has convinced me, after an absence of ten years (that being the period that has elapsed since my last opportunity of seeing modern work), of the great value of a revisit, from a professional point of view.

I was everywhere struck with the importance given to the sites for public buildings. London was, up till recently, an example of the neglect of this important feature, most of the public buildings and the sites being anything but roomy and dignified; of late years, however, the authorities have fully awakened to the importance of this, and enormous sums of money have been spent in redeeming the mistakes of the past—wide, well-formed streets have been cut through the denser portions of the city—the surroundings of public buildings have been enlarged by demolition and otherwise—and the now completed series of public and palatial private buildings overlooking the Thames Embankment present an appearance, owing to the beauty and openness of the sites, unequalled in the world.

In the Continental cities I visited the importance of open sites has always been held in view, the consequence being that, with hardly an exception, the notable buildings are well placed. Unfortunately, this cannot be said of Sydney, except in a few instances; and in the event of the erection of new Parliament Houses and Law Courts, I would urge that the greatest possible attention be given to, and the broadest views taken, of this important matter.

The following special reports upon the classes of buildings are necessarily very much condensed, and contain but few details, but it may be understood that a great deal has been impressed upon my mind which it is not possible to state fully. I also have the advantage of having obtained plans and sketches, and promises of more should they be at any time required:—

Prisons.

The prison I particularly wished to see, and about which the Comptroller-General of Prisons had specially desired me to make inquiries, is that recently established for female prisoners exclusively, at Aylesbury. I accordingly made the necessary arrangements, and paid this institution a visit.

Prisoners under sentences of nine months and upwards are drafted here from all parts of the country, although, at the same time, those on shorter sentences, I understand, under certain circumstances, are also confined. On my visit the total number of inmates was about 230.

The prison is under the charge of a governor, who is also medical superintendent—an arrangement which, I believe, is working well. He has the necessary warders and male attendants for heavy and guard duties, and a matron and female warders for dealing directly with the prisoners.

Having heard a great deal as to this modern institution, I anticipated finding a model structure, embracing all the latest improvements applicable to prison construction and administration; but I regret I was doomed to disappointment. The buildings are really an old county gaol, converted and added to for the purpose of its present use, while the additions have been made in the most economical way possible. The governor, I understand, is much hampered in consequence of the defective planning, and finds it difficult to carry out his duties efficiently.

After a very close investigation, and obtaining all the information that I possibly could upon the special subject of exclusive female prisons, and having the first experiment of Aylesbury fully in view, I formed the opinion that should such an institution be contemplated in this Colony, it would tend more to economy and efficiency to erect a building specially for the purpose, rather than convert existing premises, even if the first cost appeared smaller.

The original wings at Aylesbury are occupied by the prisoners in separate cells, and as these are not of modern construction, they call for no special comment.

The kitchen, bathrooms, storerooms, and offices generally are very inferior, and the cooking is done with a plant that in this Colony would be unhesitatingly condemned.

All prisoners, being lodged in separate cells and confined there, except when in the exercise grounds or in the associated workrooms, have no communication with each other, and they are practically treated on what is known as the "solitary system," the conversation when associated at work, I understand, being extremely limited.

The laundry is used only for the washing in connection with the inmates themselves, and consists of a central room containing a small plant, and that of a simple description, and a series of compartments ranging round the room, about thirty in number, as illustrated in the accompanying sketch. These compartments are entered from the central room and lighted from the outside wall, and are fitted internally with the necessary washing-troughs, batten dressers, and water supply. The object of this arrangement is for one prisoner to be located in each compartment, with a fixed amount of work given her when she is locked-in in solitary confinement during the hours of labour. The Governor, however, informed me that this mode of treatment is considered too severe, and his practice was to use the system in special cases only, and generally have all the laundry work done in association.

The endeavour to make this prison an industrial institution may, I understand, be considered as successful. Every able-bodied prisoner is at work. Some are engaged in making and repairing under-clothing for the inmates of prisons generally; others again are engaged in making up the lighter class of mail-bags for the postal authorities, while others are employed in making twine, also for post-office use. This latter occupation is done in a long shed in which a rope-walk has been set up, and here the inmates prepare the material, make the twine, and with the aid of simple machinery, wind it into balls of given length, and finally form it into packages. I understand that the demand is so constant that full occupation is found for a considerable number of women in this industry. It is well adapted for female labour, being of a light and healthy character, and its adoption is well worthy of the consideration of the prison authorities of this Colony.

All the prison cleaning, except of the heaviest character, and all the cooking, is done by prison labour.

The open areas within the prison walls lack the careful and, to an extent, attractive garden appearances of some of the best prisons in this Colony, but the ablest-bodied of the inmates are engaged in the cultivation

cultivation of vegetables for prison use, and I was shown a vegetable garden patch the whole length of one side of the prison premises, about 100 yards by a width of about 20 yards, which was cultivated, and was then bearing heavy good-looking crops, chiefly potatoes, cabbage, onions, carrots, &c.

There is a commodious chapel attached to the prison. Like all English prisons where the prisoners are lodged in their cells, except when specially employed, there is no attempt at relieving the gloomy appearance of the yards generally by cultivating shrubs, flowers, and grass.

Owing to these buildings having been erected at various periods, it was not possible to obtain any idea of the cost, and I could well see that had that information been procurable it would have been of no practical use.

Aylesbury is a country town, situated about 35 miles from London, and the prison is about 1 mile distant from the town boundary.

No provisions are made for executions in this prison.

With regard to prison industries, the only actual and thoroughly industrial prison in England is that at Wakefield, in Yorkshire, and prisoners only are here confined who are able-bodied and are conversant with some operative trade. It is the centre of the commercial dealing with prison products, and every opportunity is taken to produce articles which can be done with a minimum plant, and, at the same time, without injury to outside trades, and that are likely to produce some financial result.

As circumstances so vary in this Colony with those governing the Home prisons, I do not suppose it is possible to institute a similar prison; indeed, the present system seems more preferable, namely, that in which the inmates in every first-class prison in the Colony, so far as is possible, are given occupation.

The two large convict establishments in which hard out-door labour is carried on are those of Dartmoor and Portland, the systems of which are somewhat similar to those at Trial Bay.

With a view of inspecting the miscellaneous industries carried on in a partial manner at other well-known prisons, I visited those at Wormwood Scrubs and Wandsworth.

The former was erected recently, partly to take the place of the old penitentiary at Millbank, which has now been demolished, while the latter was erected to provide for the increase of prisoners, consequent on the increase of the population of London generally.

The general appearance of these prisons during the daytime differs considerably from that of the first-class prisons of this Colony, inasmuch as with the exception of the prisoners visible in the workshops and on the exercise rings none are either seen or heard, although it may be that the accommodation of the prison is fully taxed. The prisoners are lodged in separate cells, and there they remain day and night, except for the purpose of exercise, and in some cases occupation. There is a large number of prisoners, however, whose occupation is carried on in their respective cells in a manner similar to that adopted at Berrima. Amongst other occupations progressing in the cells, I noticed that of weaving a very creditable class of Axminster rug on simple looms fitted into spare cells, in which prisoners do not sleep; also the preparing for and making of every description of fibre mats, and the coarser and heavier work in connection with the postal mail-bags, this latter being carried on in a very systematic and regular manner, the demand of the Postal Department being very constant and considerable.

The special labour workshops in both these prisons are constructed in some cases with a view to the isolation of the individual, and in others to the isolation and grouping of trades—the whole being under the direct oversight of the warders. In one case, namely, that of the shoemakers' and tailors' shops, each prisoner is confined in a compartment (*see* plan attached), with side partitions shutting off communication from those adjoining, open in the front towards the raised warders' platform, and also opened to a gangway in the rear, backed on to the outside walls, against which stands a range of benches and tool-racks for the larger class of work, and each compartment is furnished with a suitable bench and stool.

This arrangement for separating prisoners, however, I was given to understand, is somewhat objectionable, as the warder, in his frequent beat up and down the whole length of the platform, becomes obscured by the partitions from all but those prisoners immediately to his right and left, and the supervision, therefore, is not perfect. To obviate this, other workshops have been planned, notably those for carpenters, smiths, fitters, painters, &c., with compartments formed by dwarf walls about 4 ft. 6 in. high (*see* also accompanying plan), down the centre of which, also, is constructed the warders' platform. The supervision here is uninterrupted, and in all cases very favourably commented upon by the officials with whom I came in contact.

In no case did I find that the warders' gangway was closed in by wire-netting as a protection against attack, while, on the contrary, the flights of steps leading to the gangways opened into some of the compartments. This latter arrangement appears objectionable, and in the accompanying sketch I have shown them as outside the building, so that no facility should be given to a prisoner to mount the gangway.

For hard-labour and punishment drill, there is a building at Wandsworth (*see* accompanying plan) containing twelve separated cells, six on either side of the usual raised platform, but opened to the platform, and approached from the rear. Through each set of six cells, is fitted a crank shaft for pumping purposes, and so regulated as to require the united efforts of all six or twelve prisoners, as the case may be, to work the gear. This appliance takes the place of the older treadmill, and I am rather of the opinion will, before long, also follow it into the past.

In neither of these prisons did I see any other than the ordinary industries carried on, excepting those for the post-office authorities beforementioned; and, as is the case in this Colony, the same difficulty presents itself in finding occupation.

I inspected the punishment cells generally, and found that, intentionally, they are not so severe as those in this Colony; in no case, I was informed, throughout the whole country was there such a thing as a "dark cell" in use; and, while the punishment cells were as much as possible isolated, and in some cases, in a separate basement, the punishment consisted more in the severe regimen and incarceration, than in the physical and mental pain of absolute darkness.

Wandsworth Prison contains a very useful set of cells for the first accommodation of incoming prisoners previous to their classification, and also for the final dealing with time-expired prisoners. In large prisons of this character, containing upwards of 1,500 to 2,000 inmates, such arrangements are extremely useful and necessary.

These prisons have special buildings erected as bathrooms, that in Wormwood Scrubs containing fifty-four baths, each in its own partial enclosure, and partly open to the broad gangway patrolled by the warders. This arrangement I consider superior to the arrangements for bathing in the prisons of this Colony, and the plan has been noted for future use.

The

The kitchen and offices, though on a larger scale than those here, are in no way better fitted up—cooking by steam, as also in this Colony, has been found the best and generally adopted.

Special cell fittings and conveniences, such as doors, locks, provision for inspection, cell windows, &c., are not, as I also noticed to be the case in police buildings in London, nearly so perfect as in this Colony; apparently older types have in a conservative spirit been still adhered to.

There is no electric light in any prison in England, and I understand that the authorities do not expect its introduction. The lighting is chiefly by gas, each cell being lighted, but in many cases, I found, in a manner that we here consider as very undesirable.

Every cell, also, has its bell communication, and many have wood floors and ceilings, with the corresponding difficulty of keeping clear of vermin. They are, however, warmed by hot water in the winter, and appear to be well ventilated.

Each prisoner is provided with a wooden plank bed and limited bedding, and a small table and stool, besides one or two shelves in which to keep his regulation articles and books, no doubt the long incarceration making it absolutely necessary that some such personal comforts should be allowed.

On inquiry I ascertained that in no cases are night-tubs used in the cells, but the prisons are provided with water-closets and lavatories, a suite of such being generally placed on either side of the wings about half-way in the length of cells, and, of course, on each floor. The closets are fitted with half-doors, and the lavatories are quite open, so that supervision is always possible.

Owing to the cell treatment of prisoners, and to the fact that they are never allowed in the yards excepting when exercising in the rings, which latter are of greater length and more extent than those in vogue in this Colony; there is no need, therefore, for watch-tower and platform provision, and consequently these adjuncts are not to be found. For the same reason, I presume, the yards present a most gloomy and heavy appearance. No trees or shrubs have been planted, and no flowers cultivated, and the whole has a most depressing effect. I am certainly of opinion that the practice in this Colony of employing prisoners on flower and vegetable cultivation is the better of the two.

I was not able to obtain any definite information with regard to penitentiaries for short-sentence prisoners, vagrants, and petty offenders; indeed, the matter is still under consideration, and no establishments have as yet been erected for this object. The same also applies to establishments for inebriates, and, so far as I could form an opinion, I should say that the authorities in this Colony are quite as well able to initiate this system successfully as those at Home.

I should have liked to have paid a visit to the Broadmoor Criminal Lunatic Establishment, although I was quite certain, from all the information I obtained, that so far as the arrangements of the buildings were concerned, they were not of the latest description, and there would not, consequently, be much fresh light to be gained. I was disappointed, however, by finding that it was neither under the control of the Lunacy Commissioners nor under that of the Comptroller of Prisons, but directly under the Home Office. This being the case, I further found difficulties in the way of obtaining an *entree*, which time alone could have got over, and this I could not afford.

The large class prisons contain a few observation cells for suspected lunatics, but the provision of padded cells is very rare.

Police Buildings.

For years the construction of metropolitan and country districts police buildings has had the closest attention of the Inspector-General of Police of this Colony and of this branch of the Public Works Department, resulting in the impression that this class of building here, is at least equal in most respects to that erected under the London County Council.

In order to be able to be in a position to form an exact opinion on this point, and also to obtain all information possible, I put myself in communication with the police authorities, and, as a result, had all the information I required placed at my disposal.

I closely examined the whole of the plans of such metropolitan and suburban police stations as had undergone alterations or had been erected during the last few years, or are now being erected. Many of the older buildings, although much improved, are out of date; others have undergone a modern rearrangement and enlargement; while others again have been altogether erected on the most modern of plans, though, in some cases, on very confined sites.

I was informed that, should I at any time desire tracings of any of these plans or particulars, and information was so sent through the Agent-General, no difficulty would be placed in the way of their being forwarded to Sydney.

In connection with the erection of new buildings, the designs disclosed the general tendency to give the exterior of the buildings a less forbidding look and cold classical appearance than formerly, and in the case of several of the suburban ones, they presented very similar appearances to many of the more recent ones erected in the country districts of this Colony.

It is gratifying to be able to report that, as a whole, the New South Wales modern police buildings compare most favourably with those in England, and, in some respects, I am of the opinion, are superior.

For the sake of comparison, and for general information, I was advised to inspect buildings of three distinct types, namely, the rearranged existing central police station at Chelsea, a new metropolitan station at King's Cross, and a small suburban one at Willesden.

I found the arrangements of the metropolitan stations, so far as the police themselves are concerned, who do all their parading and mustering on the premises, perhaps more complete and comfortable than those adopted here. Besides containing comfortable messroom and kitchen, each constable has a portion of the general dormitory partitioned off into a cubicle for his own separate use, and this, while containing a sufficiency of cubic air-space, is also fitted up with little conveniences, and specially-designed, self-contained furniture. The accommodation for washing is by one general lavatory per floor, with bathrooms, &c., attached. A specially-constructed room for drying both police and prisoners' clothing is provided, generally in the basement, and this convenience is found to be of considerable use.

The quarters also contain well-equipped billiard, reading, and smoking rooms, and a special effort appears to be made to complete these as comfortably and as attractively as possible. The inspectors informed me that it is found a great convenience to attract and retain the single constables within the building when not on duty.

The furniture for these rooms, I understand, is all found by the Department, the men having their library and newspaper funds amongst themselves.

Of

Of course, such accommodation as the foregoing is necessarily applicable only to large centres, and it is well worthy of consideration whether as opportunity occurs such provision could not be made in the establishments at the Central Police Station and Belmore Barracks, Sydney, and possibly at Newcastle and Broken Hill.

Making all due allowance for the differences of administration between that of the metropolitan area and of this Colony, the arrangement here for the retention of prisoners compares more than favourably with that in the metropolitan district. I found white glazed lining bricks, from economic motives, too sparingly used, consequently the walls in many cases looked very grimy and lacked a sense of cleanliness inseparable from white glazed bricks. The lighting of the cells in many cases was indifferent, and sufficient care had not been exercised to isolate it from the adjoining properties. The admirable provision in the Sydney lock-ups for the continuous observation of drunken and sick prisoners by means of large grilled openings does not exist, while the distinctiveness of arrangement as between male and female prisoners does not appear to have been considered. I noticed cases in which female prisoners would be confined in cells immediately adjoining those in which male prisoners were confined, and although detention is of a much shorter period than with us, it appeared to me to be objectionable.

Some of the women's cells were lined with a new material called "Opalesque," which answers apparently the same purpose as glazed bricks; but as it is only placed on the walls in very thin layers, and that, I understand, only experimentally at present, I am quite prepared to find that in course of time it will be much damaged and rendered useless.

The lavatory and washing accommodation generally is provided for with better fittings and in a more complete manner than in Sydney; and until a complete system of sewerage is available for all police stations in the metropolitan area it will not be possible to come quite up to the standard of the London ones.

Padded cells are the exception, and very rarely fitted up or required; the only one I saw was inferior in material and construction, for instead of being spring-fitted and faced with hides, it was coarsely stuffed and faced with painted canvas.

The heating of cells had received much attention, as also the ventilation, and, while the former is not required in Sydney, the latter offers several points for careful consideration.

The artificial lighting is, of course, by gas, and in no instance did I find that the electric light had been introduced. The gas fittings in all cases were within the cells.

I generally noticed that the cell-doors, locks, hinges, flaps, &c., are constructed of composite material, wood, and iron, and of a type, I am of the opinion, less efficient and suitable, and not so modern as those adopted in New South Wales.

The inspectors' offices, charge-room, &c., are very similar to those in use here, special provision, of course, being made to meet any special circumstances.

The small suburban station at Willesden, already referred to, contains very moderate quarters for a sergeant, with a couple of cells about which there is nothing specially to remark.

I took advantage of an opportunity also of inspecting a commodious new station just approaching completion under the city police, in a street near the Tower Bridge. It was apparent that a large sum of money had been expended upon this building, which externally presented considerable architectural effect, and internally was designed and fitted in a somewhat elaborate and complete manner; I noticed in the planning and conveniences very much the same characteristics as those under the London County Council, and already referred to. In this case an unlimited and very proper use of glazed white bricks had been adopted.

I also inspected more or less modern country and municipal lockups in Bucks, Monmouthshire, and Sussex. In some of these the type was quite obsolete, and in others no general and strikingly suitable plan seems to have been adopted, owing, no doubt, to the varied authorities under which they have been erected.

An opportunity was also given me of looking over the new and extensive range of buildings erected for metropolitan police purposes, on the Embankment at Whitehall, and called "New Scotland Yard," taking the place of the "Old Scotland Yard," about to be demolished as unsuited for modern purposes, and as necessitated by the recent improvements to the neighbourhood. The new building is a striking one, standing on its own land, with roads and outlooks on all four sides, and very convenient access both to Parliament-street on the one side and the Thames Embankment on the other. It is erected in stone, with striking circular turrets on the four corners, and internally it has an open court-yard. As a result the building is of very simple planning, and every room is well lighted, while access is rendered easy by the various lifts and staircases.

The building contains accommodation for the Chief Commissioners of Police, the Board of Administrative Officers, the Surveyor (Mr. Butler), who attends to all buildings and building properties in connection with the police district, and paymaster's branch. It also contains ample accommodation for the detective branch, with its strong rooms and museum, and is, I am informed, a thoroughly useful building and a success.

It was here that I inspected the large number of plans, and received the assurance as to the intention of giving any further information, already referred to, and received from Mr. Butler and his officers every assistance.

On making inquiries of Mr. Butler as to the practice adopted with regard to tendering for police buildings, he informed me that he was not required to run the risk inseparable from public tendering, but had been able to compile a list of about thirty respectable and experienced contractors, and these only received invitations to tender. His arrangements for clerks of works' supervision is similar to that in this branch, namely, all works of £2,000 and upwards have a clerk of works, if possible, separately appointed for them, whilst smaller undertakings are grouped and inspected from time to time.

Post Offices.

Owing to the courtesy of the Postmaster-General, I had a good opportunity of viewing the large buildings at St. Martin le Grand associated with the general postal business of the country.

The original building, which stands four-square, and covers a large area, now accommodates only the postal and parcels postal branches, the telegraph business, and the telephone exchange. I understand the constant increase in these, the most important branches, has gradually pushed out the Ministerial and administrative and the financial (including Savings Bank) branches into other quarters.

The

The Ministerial and Administrative branches are now located in their newly-erected large building adjoining, while some years since, and prior to my last visit to London (ten years ago), the Savings Bank and Postal order business had also been accommodated in a new building, and connected with the parent one by means of a subway.

A great feature of the building, devoted to postal, telegraph, and telephone business, appears to be the large, uninterrupted, open rooms in which the services were being performed. The postal business has been so often described that it is not necessary for me in this case to enter into technicalities, excepting to say that as little partition work as possible seems to have been adopted, and one subdivision of the service adjoins another without any structural hindrance.

In the telegraph department, particularly in the operators' floors, the whole of the four long wings are altogether open, making a continuous circuit round the central court-yard. On this floor are accommodated many hundreds of telegraph operators, their instruments and fittings being arranged in the most perfect precision. This is one of the sights of London, and the beholder is struck with the sense of order and ease of supervision which this arrangement provides.

The telephone work is not of so extensive a character as I anticipated. It was explained to me that this building contains (and that in a transitional state only) an exchange of exchanges and not one general exchange for London, the business being still to some extent in the hands of private companies.

It may be thought idle to compare the arrangements for the huge departmental business of London with the more moderate business of Sydney; but on inspecting these premises, my previous convictions that all additions or alterations to the latter buildings should have in view the removal of the financial and Administrative branches, was much strengthened; so much so, that in dealing practically with the question I propose making my recommendations quite in that direction.

I believe, from the experience gained by the London authorities, the truest economy is to face the inevitable increase of postal and all other business in good time, so that all expenditure may be in a right direction and with the least dislocation of the work of the Department.

I made inquiries as to the general policy of the Government with regard to suburban and local post offices in provincial towns. For many years the policy of the British authorities has been to subsidise, as much as possible, tradespeople in small country places having suitable premises and suitable trades to undertake postal business at a comparatively small annual remuneration. This is, to a large extent, still in vogue, and has no doubt saved the Government from a large capital expenditure, but I find that specially-designed post offices are now being erected in greater numbers than formerly in such districts and towns where increase of business warrants this step. As an instance of the large expenditure, I may state that at the present moment the post office in Liverpool is being enlarged at a cost of upwards of £100,000, and a new post office is being erected in the Bloomsbury district of London at a cost of £33,000.

Mr. Tanner, the architect to the Postal authorities, informs me that his present yearly expenditure in the erection and improvement of buildings is about £300,000.

I took advantage of Mr. Tanner's kindness, and examined, at his offices in Whitehall, a large number of plans for suburban and country town post offices, some already erected and others in course of erection, and I obtained from him a number of departmental drawings of the most recent details in fittings for offices, which I have placed in the departmental library.

I also inspected the large building in Bloomsbury before referred to, and I found that the authorities were modernising their post office arrangements, particularly with reference to the open counter accommodation for the public, on precisely similar lines to those which I have recommended and adopted during the last few years in this Colony, both to the advantage of the Department itself and the convenience of the public.

With regard to telephone arrangements in the public streets, I was very much struck with the system adopted in Stockholm, of conveying the innumerable wires to central skeleton tower erections in the immediate neighbourhood of the exchanges. Without going very fully into the principles of the system, it seemed to me that there is a good deal to command it, as the unsightliness of a great number of wires carried in all directions and at all angles is almost entirely avoided.

Hospitals for the Insane.

In order to compare the system adopted in the erection of these institutions in New South Wales with the best types in England, I made special and interesting visits to such as I was advised should be seen.

My first visit was to that at Morningside, Edinburgh. This institution, situated a few miles out of Edinburgh, consists of two groups of buildings. One, the earlier and most extensive, is used for pauper inmates of that part of Scotland, and although a fairly modern structure, presents no very special features for observation, except as a means of comparison with those here.

The second portion, called the "New West Branch," on the contrary, consists of a group of buildings recently erected on the grounds of an old mansion, "Craig-house" (much like that at Callan Park), the latter having been made an integral portion of the whole. The buildings have been erected for the accommodation of paying patients, and I was there informed that payments are made in accordance with the accommodation given, at rates varying from £100 to £500 per annum. It is built to accommodate 200 patients, and has cost, without the purchase of the estate, upwards of £170,000, or at the rate of £850 per bed.

Ascertaining these particulars, I was somewhat prepared for the extreme elaboration of the design, both as regards its architectural appearance externally and its arrangement and decoration internally. In every direction expense has been lavishly incurred, the fittings being of the very best class obtainable, and the furnishings on a scale equal to many high-class hotels. I could see at once that nothing of the kind is likely to be required in New South Wales, unless, perhaps, on a most limited scale, at some future day; but this establishment contained many points which were of great interest.

Owing to the nature of the site, and the adoption of the separate pavilion system, the institution has the appearance of an assemblage of fine houses scattered through well-timbered grounds. I found the whole were connected by an extensive series of underground corridors, well lighted and warmed, which also serve as special ways for all pipes, leads, and wired. This system I also found adopted elsewhere where it was necessary, owing to climatic and other reasons, to have such means of communication.

The sanitary arrangements are very complete and elaborate, and include generally the best class of fittings, excepting in the matter of baths, which are inferior to those used in this Colony. I did not find in this or any other institution I visited the adoption of the *Gegenstrom* as at Kenmore, although I found that sanitary ware and fittings manufacturers were alive to its advantages.

I was given to understand that no institution in the world approaches the "New West Branch" in completeness, down to the very smallest details, and although the cost appears enormous by comparison with that of some of the large hospitals in London, it is not excessive.

The cost of the new hospital at Kenmore, it is estimated, will not exceed from £150 to £200 per bed.

As the most modern and best of the metropolitan asylums, and more closely in comparison with those of this Colony, I was advised to visit Claybury (Dr. R. Jones, medical superintendent). This collection of buildings stands upon a fine elevated site near Woodford, in Essex, and is one of the five large asylums used for the metropolitan area. To give an idea of its extent I may state the medical superintendent informed me a perambulation of the whole of the buildings and connecting corridors involved a walk of about 10½ miles.

As the building has been recently erected the most careful consideration has been given to the details, and I was glad to make an exhaustive inspection of such parts as could be of interest and value, and, as in all other instances, every facility was given me for so doing. The pavilion system chiefly is adopted, but not being in echelon, as at Kenmore, and the several blocks being connected by intermediate buildings, there appears to me to be a sacrifice of the sunshine in some of the enclosures and court-yards, as well as a want of direct lighting to some of the rooms and wards.

The classification of patients is pretty much the same as that adopted by Dr. Manning in this Colony, though the wards are larger than Dr. Manning considers desirable.

The enclosed exercise yards, for the more refractory patients and those requiring closer supervision, are not so distinctive a feature at Claybury as here, and one misses the highly-cultivated gardening and shrubbing we are accustomed to. The "Ha Ha" fences to these enclosures, so universal and satisfactory in New South Wales, are very little used in English asylums, and at Claybury only a light iron fence, about 4 feet 6 inches high, is erected, and which appeared to me to be both insecure and dangerous to the patients. Several medical officers expressed to me the wish that "Ha Ha's" were more generally adopted.

I noted that all the sanitary arrangements were good, while the lavatories and bathrooms although in separate cubicles, were grouped into one central set for males and females respectively, instead of being distributed amongst the wards, as in our institutions.

Ample accommodation is given to the public to visit their patient friends, as also the general administrative and executive officers; and the kitchen is probably the most complete ever fitted up, the cooking being done by steam, fire, and gas, on the same principles generally as in vogue in this Colony, with more elaboration of plant, but not necessarily with more efficiency.

The padded cells are lined with vulcanite rubber facings to the cushions, in preference to hides, and I was given to understand that they are more cleanly and equally indestructible as leather.

The proportion of single rooms to day-rooms and dormitories, regarded in the classification of patients, has apparently been followed very closely on the lines adopted by Dr. Manning.

The chapel is a most beautiful and dignified building of pure ecclesiastical design, and is capable of seating a congregation of about 1,500. A recreation hall is also part of the establishment, with similar accommodation.

The extensive network of corridors, touching almost all portions of the institution, is lighted, warmed, and paved, and apparently of endless lengths, the long winter conditions of England no doubt rendering such adjuncts very necessary.

Included in the institution is a complete building for pathological research, and it contains mortuary, refrigerating chamber, dissecting rooms, laboratories, museum, &c.; the intention being at some future day to enlarge upon the work of investigation now performed there upon the dead from the institution, and to form a school for the study of diseases of the brain. The accommodation and plant provided in the refrigerating room is, I understand, in daily use, every corpse as it is removed from the institution being at once refrigerated before *post-mortem* takes place.

At Claybury, as also at Morningside, and every other institution of modern construction, electric lighting plants of a most extensive character are in use, and the machinery and the necessary buildings have been erected on a scale far in advance of anything contemplated or attempted in the Colonies. The guiding principles appear to be ample power, the best of machinery, plenty of space, light and ventilation. It is needless to say that under such conditions the electricians have brought the lighting, and in some cases the motive power, supplied to these institutions to a state of great efficiency.

In speaking of electric lighting plant generally, I might here remark that wherever I have seen its installation, both in England and on the Continent, I have been struck with the great prominence and importance given to it, and found it contrasts only too favourably with the somewhat makeshift and experimental in which, perhaps, we have been accustomed to treat it in New South Wales.

Altogether, Claybury impressed me as an excellent model in many respects for future guidance.

I also visited asylums of not so recent a date, including Hanwell and one county asylum, and although recent additions and improvements have been made to these somewhat obsolete buildings, they offered no notification that will be of much service.

The Lunacy Commissioners control a very large number of asylums, there being no less than fifty-five in the counties, and fifteen in the boroughs of England and Wales, exclusive of Scotland, while the lunatic hospitals under their control number fourteen; the idiot asylums, five; Naval and Military hospitals, two; and, to a limited extent, the one criminal lunatic asylum at Broadmoor.

In erecting new buildings spread over so large and densely populated a country, it has been found to be convenient for the several county councils and boroughs to commission architects of repute to erect these buildings, the plans having been first submitted to, and approved of, by the Commissioners. In no case could I find that public competition had of recent times been instituted, no doubt experience of former times having been sufficient in that direction.

During

During last year the Commissioners examined and approved of the erection of the following new asylums, some of which have already been commenced, namely :—

The officials in London have supplied me with lithographic plans of the above-mentioned asylums, and, making allowances for the difference in climatic circumstances, a comparison with the institutions of New South Wales is not at all unfavourable to the latter.

Consumptive Hospitals.

The only consumptive hospital within easy distance of London is at Brompton, and although there are others scattered along the south coast of England in sheltered situations, these are all of a smaller character, and not so well and favourably known as the former.

I made it my business to obtain *entree* into the consumptive hospital at Brompton, particularly into that of the newer portion, a distinct range of buildings on the opposite side of the Brompton-road, but connected by subway. My inspection was a complete one. The hospital embraces an extensive range of buildings erected some years since, and the second range, already referred to, erected within the last two or three years, in which latter, improvements, gained by experience in the administration of the former, have been adopted.

The newer building at the time of my visit was temporarily vacated for the purpose of painting and cleansing.

I found the wards to be of all sizes, up to and not exceeding accommodation for eight patients. The air-space per bed was large, and great attention was paid to the lighting, warmth, and ventilation.

The corridors adjoining the wards are in each case of ample dimensions, with large deeply-recessed bays, and the whole is comfortably furnished, warmed, and lighted, so that patients can have both exercise in the corridors and the comfort of sitting-rooms in the recesses.

The building is of three floors in height, so far as the patients are concerned, and the wards are classified as much as possible, being based to a great extent upon the several stages of the disease.

Large lifts, constructed to carry couches and bath-chairs, and easy staircases give access to the upper floors.

The difficulty of obtaining anything like a pure atmosphere at Brompton, a circumstance not likely to occur in this country, is met as well as possible by the provision of a large shaft raised above the highest portion of the building, down which the upper stratum of air is drawn into the basement, and then distributed.

This hospital contains, I believe, the only example of an air-chamber specially constructed for treating patients with compressed air. It is circular in form, constructed of iron, with air-tight door and valves, and is capable of seating half a dozen patients. These patients, I understand, use it for from half an hour to two hours per diem, under air at various pressures, and being artificially lighted and warmed, it is made into a comfortable lounge. What the result upon the patients is I am not in a position to say.

After a careful examination of both buildings in every portion, I was forcibly struck with the more advantageous conditions under which a hospital of this character could be conducted in New South Wales than in the murky and surcharged atmosphere of Brompton, although the results that I ascertained on my visit showed me how even under these unfavourable conditions much good can be accomplished.

No very special features are required for hospitals for patients of this character; light, air, and warmth in the corridors and day-rooms, the minimising of numbers in the wards, and well arranged protection for outside exercise, together with good administration, appear to be the main points to be considered.

Infectious and Cancer Hospitals.

Wishing to see the latest type of this class of building, I was recommended to visit that recently erected at Newport, in Monmouthshire, and now in working order. I found it to be built on the isolated pavilion principle, with accommodation for about eighty patients, and extensive and complete administrative buildings. The buildings contain points of interest, which I have carefully noted, but about which it is perhaps hardly necessary to enter into the details of in this report.

Parliament Houses.

I took the opportunity of visiting the building at Westminster, although I was previously fairly well acquainted with it, in addition to which the office possesses plans of its several floors.

One of the points upon which I was recently examined before the Public Works Committee in reference to the proposed new Parliamentary buildings dealt with the question of the distribution of the *Hansard* and public Press representatives in the two Chambers, and I therefore made particular inquiries as to what the arrangements were. I found that in the Commons neither the *Hansard* nor public Press are accommodated on the floor of the House, but in their own special galleries behind the Speaker's Chair. As regards the Lords, I found that although the same general arrangement exists as in the Commons, yet upon occasions the *Hansard* staff has been accommodated on the floor of the House, owing to the inaudibility of several of the Peers, but I could not ascertain that any of the Press had been granted the same privilege, all my information pointing to the contrary.

The

The lighting of the Lords is entirely through traceried and stained-glass horizontal windows on either side, and the artificial lighting is by means of pendants, &c. The Commons is lighted in the day-time by similar windows, and at night-time by artificial light behind a glazed ceiling. In all cases the lights are filled with stained glass of rich hues, depicting historical subjects. In neither House is ventilation in any shape or form introduced through the windows; but is all controlled by the plant erected in the clock tower and the connecting shafting. In summer cool and cleansed air is introduced in the basement chambers through coarse canvass soaked with iced water, the effect being to extract the dust and dirt inseparable from London atmosphere, and to reduce it some degrees in temperature. It has, however, been found that the air so dealt with is too highly charged with moisture. In the winter the air is passed through similar screens, only dry, and then warmed before being passed into the Chamber.

At Copenhagen I was disappointed to find that the Legislative Chambers, which formed part of the Royal Palace, had been destroyed by fire, and accommodation of a temporary character was being used, pending dealing with a scheme for the erection of new buildings. In these buildings provision will have to be made for sixty-six Members of the Upper House and 114 of the Lower House.

Again, at Stockholm the two Chambers meet in their old and featureless Government buildings, from which I could gain no suggestions. The Diet consists of two Chambers, the Upper one numbering 150 Members and the Lower one 230.

The Swedish and Norwegian Government, however, has commenced the erection of new Parliamentary buildings in conjunction with the Royal Bank of Sweden, the site being the whole extent of an island lying midway between the Old and the New City, and connected with each by a continuous bridge over one of the numerous waterways of Stockholm. The plans of this building, as about to be erected, have already been placed before the Public Works Committee for their information.

The site is a magnificent one, although it is too curtailed to carry anything more than the present scheme of building, the rapid tide of the river washing the foot of the retaining-walls on all sides. A curious sentimental controversy has arisen between the two Parliamentary parties with regard to this site; one ("Right") objecting to the effect the new pile will have in somewhat obscuring the view of the Royal Palace on the adjoining shore from the main portion of the city, as emblematic of overshadowing Royalty; and the other party ("Left") approving of the site for precisely the same reasons.

At Brussels, the Chambers, which are also founded on a similar plan to those of the Deputies ("Corps Legislatif") in Paris, may be considered as in many respects agreeing in principle with the design for Sydney. Both the Upper and Lower Chambers are similar in all particulars, excepting that the Upper (Senate) provides for sixty-nine Senators and the Lower (Chamber of Representatives) for 138.

The accompanying sketch shows the general disposition in each case. The Chambers are semi-circular in plan, the main walls being carried up solid behind the President and colonnaded round the Members' portion, supporting a frieze, cornice, and ceiling with top lighting. Behind the columns is carried the gallery, the whole circuit of the circular wall, to accommodate the public, one extreme end to the right of the President being partitioned off for Ambassadors and distinguished visitors, and the corresponding one on the left for the Press. These three portions of the gallery all have their separate exits distinct from the precincts of the House proper.

The President is placed on a raised dais similar to the Speaker; the House officials are ranged immediately below him, and in the lowest portion of the floor of the House the official stenographers (*Hansard*) have their accommodation. The Members are provided for on an ascending floor with circular planned separate tables and benches for each Member; the doors of entrance and exit being on the right and left of the President.

The Chambers are entirely lighted from the top, and the ventilation is conducted towards the same direction. The walls, where not broken by features, are panelled and hung with valuable historic paintings, representing scenes in the Parliamentary history of the country.

I understand that the acoustic principles of the rooms are good, and the Members here speak from their own seats, and not from the "tribune," as in Paris.

I may say here that in all the Continental Chambers of which I have cognizance, the stenographers (*Hansard*) are accommodated on the floor of the House, but not the public Press.

The Chambers in Brussels have the appearance of great dignity, with their quiet architectural treatment. The accommodation for Members is provided to the right and left of the Chambers in a series of well-furnished and commodious salons. I endeavoured to obtain a photograph of the interior of these Chambers, but I regret to say without success.

The site of the buildings faces one of the principal avenues in the park, being *vis-a-vis* with the Royal Palace, while it is recessed in front in a very similar manner as that recommended for Sydney, but on a more dignified scale. The flanks are continuous, Government offices occupying the street on either side. Access is also obtained to the rear of the building, and, in fact, there are two distinct fronts.

In all the Parliamentary buildings that I have visited, both on this occasion as well as previously, I observed the greatest possible stress has been laid upon the necessity of giving large open spaces around the same, and in the majority of cases with great success.

Picture Galleries.

I lost no opportunity of critically inspecting as many of these as time would permit, and amongst others I visited the Melbourne Gallery, National Gallery, New Portrait Gallery, Tait's Gallery, The New Gallery, Galleries at Earl's Court Exhibition, South Kensington, and also several private ones in London. I visited, as well, the National Gallery in Edinburgh, the newly-elected one at Antwerp, the Exhibition Galleries at Brussels and Stockholm, and also the permanent National Gallery at the latter city.

I took rough sketches of the lighting of those most to be remarked, as well as notes regarding other features.

In respect of planning, I found a great deal worth noting in connection with the New Gallery in Regent-street, London, particularly with reference to the entrance and central courts, they presenting a somewhat new departure, being treated with more architectural detail than usually. The central court contains a handsome fountain, admirably-placed statuary, and narrow galleries for the display of water-colours and miniatures, together with access to the refreshment-room, cloak-rooms, &c.

I was gratified to find that, generally, the sectional dimensions of the new gallery in Sydney were in accordance with the best examples at home; about the details of which I had opportunities of discussion with some of the leading authorities. In no one place was it possible, owing to climatic difference, to compare the system of lighting closely with that adopted in Sydney. In some of the galleries the lighting was by ordinary single skylights, both horizontal and sloping, with all the attendant difficulties of adjustment of light by a system of blinds. In others more elaborate construction was adopted, including the use of horizontal lantern lights, with more or less success; and in only two cases that of the Sydney principle of vertical inner light, and horizontal outer lights combined, adopted, although with considerable difference of design and detail.

Though the New Gallery before referred to contains many good features, the lighting I consider not very successful, and here as in many others of the buildings, heavy intersecting ceiling beams prevented the equalisation of light on the exhibited pictures.

As regards the floors of galleries, polished wood, generally in parquet patterns, appears to be universal. It is true I came across exceptions, as in the case of the mosaic floors at South Kensington, and some temporary cemented floors in the Exhibition Galleries of Brussels and Stockholm. The reflection and glow obtained from polished floors as a subsidiary assistance to the lighting up of pictures is considered so valuable as to warrant its adoption.

I noticed all the galleries were furnished with comfortable lounges, an acknowledgment of the fatiguing nature of picture-seeing; and it is well worth the consideration of the Trustees in Sydney the placing of comfortable upholstered lounges or settees in preference to incurring expense in less comfortable furniture.

Most of the galleries have protecting handrails round the circuit of the courts, generally fixed to standards.

The permanent galleries in Antwerp and Stockholm, in each case in combination with the National Museums, are both buildings of extremely handsome and complete a character, and have been erected evidently at very considerable cost. The lower floors are used as museums, and generally the first floor, with horizontal lights, for prints and etchings, and the noble suites of rooms on the top floor, with ceiling lights, for pictures, in which both buildings, particularly that in Antwerp, are exceedingly rich. The stair-cases have been made notable features, decorated with statues and pictures, and a great display of marble.

The Tait Gallery, just recently erected on the site of the old Millbank Penitentiary in Westminster, and presented by Mr. Tait to the nation, is one of the most modern type in Europe, the architectural detail being very prominent.

The National Gallery in Edinburgh is in some respects the prototype of the design for the completed scheme for Sydney. It stands in an admirable position, overlooking the Princess-street Gardens, having four exposed façades, and is designed in symmetrical proportion in pure classic style, and being entirely lit from the top, there is no fenestration visible.

The National Portrait Gallery, in the rear of the National Gallery in Trafalgar Square, is a very notable building, both on account of the extremely handsome architectural detail, notwithstanding its irregular planning, and of the wealth of its contents, the portraits there hung giving a very vivid and interesting picture of English history. As only the upper floor can necessarily be lighted with a top light, the lower ones have been content with horizontal ones, and consequently the lighting of these latter is not in all cases good.

Exhibition Buildings.

During the latter end of 1896 I was instructed by the Minister to submit a scheme for the consideration of the Honorable the Premier for the erection of a series of buildings to be devoted to the use of an Exhibition projected for 1899. I therefore prepared and submitted one applicable to the Outer Domain as a site, and embracing the present Art Gallery, on the extreme east, and the shell of the proposed Parliamentary buildings on the west. Owing, I understand, to representations from Paris, that an Exhibition held in Sydney in 1899 might clash with the great Exhibition to be held in Paris in 1900, the matter was subsequently left in abeyance.

Having thus far been engaged in the initiation of such an undertaking, I took the opportunity of seeing all the exhibitions within a reasonable distance that I found to be open during July and August, 1897. I therefore visited the following:—

Victorian Era Exhibition, Earl's Court, London.
Horticultural and Floricultural Exhibition, Hamburg.
Great Art and Industrial Exhibition, Stockholm.
International Exhibitions at Brussels and Tervueren.

The features of these Exhibitions may be classed as follows:—

- 1st. The commercial object, including display of machinery and productions, the result of the industry of the people, and of the natural resources of the countries interested.
- 2nd. Official display in all the branches of the Government.
- 3rd. The exhibition of objects in the Arts and Sciences for the instruction of the people.
- 4th. The amusement and refreshment of the people.

Two of these Exhibitions, namely, Stockholm and Brussels, being under Government control, fully exemplify these objects, while the Exhibition at Hamburg is confined to fewer objects, and is, I understand, under municipal control. The Earl's Court Exhibition to all intents is a private speculation, although managed by a very representative committee, and is confined to an exhibition of objects, both of manufacture and art, showing the general advance during the sixty years' reign of the Queen, with a very large proportionate amount of accommodation for amusement and refreshment.

The Earl's Court Exhibition covers an irregular site in the west end of London, upon which have been held Exhibitions of various characters yearly for some considerable period, and is as much a rendezvous for the people of London for evening entertainments as perhaps for exhibition purposes. Although it has been erected by private enterprise, it has received this particular year a certain amount of official recognition, and is managed by an Honorary Committee of Advice, embracing amongst its members the leaders in all branches of arts and sciences. With the objects as before stated, it may be understood that the Exhibition is a purely British one. The exhibition halls proper are ranged round two

very

very extensive and beautiful courts—one embracing an ornamental sheet of water in the centre, with bridges, fountains, promenades, deep verandahs, and the whole designed in Indian architecture, and brilliantly illuminated at night with many thousands of electric and gas lights, while a band-stand has been erected upon the small island in the centre of the sheet of water. The buildings immediately adjoining this court and overlooking its prospects are devoted to refreshment.

The other court is oval in shape, the centre laid out with rich-coloured flower-beds and gardening, and is skirted all round by attractive stalls.

Between these courts branch off in all directions annexes containing machinery, manufactures, amusements, picture-galleries, and all the exhibits connected with such objects.

The amusement portion of the Exhibition takes up the remaining area of the site, and includes, besides numerous refreshment places surrounded with ornamental gardens, numberless side-shows of all sorts, and a huge wheel, 300 high, which in its revolutions takes car-loads of passengers to the topmost height. Military band concerts and other entertainments that suggest themselves for amusing the public take place here daily. The Exhibition also includes a very fine reproduction of a small town of the last century, entitled "Picturesque England," and comprises a large number of shops, public buildings, and private houses, all faithfully reproduced in canvas, plaster, and decorations.

The Exhibition generally is notable for the advance made upon those of twenty years ago, and showed most clearly that in Exhibitions of the character not only legitimate Exhibitions, but public amusement must be catered for in every way to make them continually attractive and remunerative.

The Floricultural Exhibition in Hamburg occupies the whole extent of the ornamental gardens of the city, which had been laid out on the banks of a disused canal. The grounds are very extensive and beautiful, being planted out with the utmost taste, and the foliage is such as could not be expected in the uncertain climate of Sydney.

For exhibition purposes a gigantic floral hall has been constructed, probably 1,000 feet by 500 feet, oval in shape, and sunk in the centre, the whole designed with paterres and terraces filled with the choicest flowers and shrubs. A large number of other buildings of every description were also erected in the grounds, both for exhibition and refreshment purposes, the whole being brilliantly illuminated, and made bright and attractive by the presence of five or six military bands.

I understand that from 35,000 to 40,000 people visit the Exhibition nightly.

It was given to understand, also, that so far as matters can be dissociated in Germany from Imperial control, this Exhibition is under the auspices of the Municipality.

In Stockholm the Exhibition is of an unique character, and is generally confined to the products of the three Scandinavian nations—Norway-Sweden, Denmark, and Finland (Russia). No other countries have been allowed to exhibit, the only exception being with regard to a small number of paintings in the art section, to illustrate the progress of this art generally.

The city of Stockholm reminds one very much of Sydney. The physical features are not dissimilar. Each city is intersected by numerous broad and deep waterways, while the houses and shipping cluster in all directions and at unexpected points. The dissimilarity consists mostly in the broad comprehensive style in which the city and its quays have been laid out, and in the palatial buildings erected, facing large open sites, the opposite being the case in Sydney. Stockholm has rather more than half the population of Sydney, but the city gives the impression of being a much larger one.

The site determined upon for the Scandinavian Exhibition is a portion of an island laid out in its entirety as a public park, with one end lying so near one of the principal quays as to be approached therefrom by a bridge. The island being 2 miles in length, is also approached by ferry boats in all directions, reminding one very much of those in Sydney Harbour. The portion of the garden enclosed for exhibition purposes contains about 40 acres, is irregular in contour, and sparsely covered with trees, both these features having been made the most of. The site is also cut into two irregular portions by a public road from the quay before mentioned, so that additional access is gained to the exhibition by the admirable system of horse-tramways. The Exhibition was first projected in 1894, and since that time the three partners to the enterprise have devoted much energy and attention to produce the present successful results. I ascertained that the mode adopted for erecting the necessary buildings was to employ well-known and private architects of the three nationalities, commissioning them each to erect certain buildings, while the whole was under the control of the Chief Architect residing in Stockholm. As a result, Sweden commissioned eight architects, Norway one, Denmark one, while some of the Finnish buildings were put up by Russian architects. In no cases were competitions held.

The cost of the Exhibition was 4,275,000 kroners, equal to about £213,000 English money.

In conversation with the British Minister of Legation in Stockholm, I ascertained that owing to good management and the popularity of the scheme, the whole of this expense had already been met by the takings (about the middle of August last). Mr. Pakenham told me that at one time, soon after opening, it was feared there might be a deficit. Thereupon the Government determined to open a "Tombola," or public lottery, but the results on other, and more legitimate enterprises have been so assuring that the "Tombola" has fallen almost into disuse, and it is not looked upon as necessary.

It would take too long to describe minutely in this report the general arrangements of this wonderful Exhibition, and it may be sufficient, perhaps, to say that it consists of one large central industrial building devoted to the suitable exhibits of the three nations. It is built as the main architectural effort and the leading feature of the whole Exhibition, being surmounted with a lofty dome and four engaged minarets; it dominates the city, and emphasises the important scheme. Other national buildings, also for the joint exhibits, comprise a large machinery hall, consisting of a wide nave and two aisles, constructed of timber and glass, the main ribs of the roof being carried down to the floor, and supporting in an ingenious manner a series of galleries framed into the spreading timber-work of the principals.

The National Museum contained exhibits of domestic handiwork, a special characteristic of Scandinavian nations, and the results of the education in the sciences and other schools. There are separate buildings also for technical industries, the fishery halls, army and navy exhibits, horticultural exhibits, and a pavilion erected by the city of Stockholm, displaying every variety of sanitary and municipal objects, one annexe containing the entire section of a public street, in which the spectators can see in actual size the arrangements for subways, pipes, drainage, &c.

The official portion of the Exhibition also includes extensive administration buildings, royal pavilion, post, telegraph, and telephone station, press pavilion, and others erected by various small provinces.

The special exhibits include a pavilion of tourists' and sportsmen's exhibits; another, theatrical and musical exhibits; a further, for mining; another, for forestry; and also another, for the application of electricity.

Throughout the grounds are scattered a large number of strikingly-designed pavilions of all dimensions erected by manufacturing firms for the display of their own production.

Amusement and refreshments are extremely well looked after, and in all directions can be found refreshment pavilions with tariffs of every grade, the whole being very well conducted.

One very striking spectacle is the reproduction of the old town of Stockholm (in a similar way as at Earl's Court); encampments of Laplanders and Finns, who give national entertainments; also zoological exhibits, and a large number of amusements of every description, and facilities for the sale of small articles.

The gardens have been laid out with great taste, and must evidently have been allowed at least two or three years to attain their present maturity.

Altogether, the Exhibition is one that offers a most suitable example for guidance should another be undertaken in New South Wales.

I noticed that the authorities advertised the Exhibition in particularly well-executed posters spread over a wide area, and developed a system of private advertising without detriment to the general appearance of the Exhibition that must have added very materially to the returns.

The International Exhibition at Brussels, with its auxiliary at Tervueren, is of a somewhat different description to that at Stockholm, inasmuch as it is open to the exhibits of all nations, and is principally confined under one roof.

The building is of very large dimensions, being in reality an enlargement of the Palais du Cinquante-naire, and contains courts devoted to Belgium, France, United States, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Great Britain, Spain, the Ottoman Empire, China, Japan, Russia, Austria, and Hungary. These several nations have classified their exhibits, and in some cases the result is almost complete exhibitions in themselves.

The art section has been very specially provided for in a gallery of large dimensions, containing a number of courts. In these are assembled a collection of pictures of the world, and this alone is a source of very great attraction to the public.

The gardens in front of the building contain a large number of buildings, some of an official character, others of a private, while the restaurants and cafes are so numerous as to form themselves into long streets.

As in Stockholm and London, there is a reproduction on this occasion of old Brussels, providing a large number of amusements, as well as a curious representation of an old town of the middle ages.

The auxiliary Exhibition at Tervueren, a public park about 8 miles distant, and which, I am of the opinion, suffers as an auxiliary in consequence of its isolation, contains a very fine and complete exhibition of the products, manufactures, and inhabitants of the Congo States of West Africa; and this being the only colony possessed by Belgium, the very utmost has been made of it. I did not see much advantage in connecting the Tervueren Exhibition with the International Exhibition in Brussels, as the former appears to be devoted, with the exception of the Colonial Exhibition, to the pleasure of the people of Brussels.

I am not in a position to speak with any degree of authority as to the cost of the Exhibition or of the returns, but I am of opinion that the outlay has been in excess of that of Stockholm, and, to my mind, the result is not so good. The latter contains so much that is fresh, picturesque, and attractive, while that at Brussels is carried on the more stereotyped lines of exhibitions with which the public have to some extent been surfeited.

The access to the Exhibition at Brussels is easy and convenient; it is on the outskirts of the town, and approached from the principal centres by horse and electric trams, some of the latter having the motive power in accumulators carried in the cars, and others from overhead wires, and third, from underground wires, while I noticed in places that all three travel upon the same metals.

Summing up the impressions I gained from the inspection of these undertakings, I am of opinion that, so far as a Colonial Exhibition in New South Wales is concerned alone, there is a great deal that is suggestive at Earl's Court Exhibition in London, while for an Intercolonial Exhibition, I consider Stockholm the prototype, and in both cases much can be learned from the Horticultural Exhibition at Hamburg.

Roads and Bridges.

IX.

Report of the Principal Assistant Engineer for Roads and Bridges.

Sydney, 21 October, 1898.

I HAVE the honor to present, for the information of the Under Secretary and Commissioner for Roads, a report upon the work carried out by this branch during the year ended 30 June, 1898, together with tabulated statements of the expenditure for the year, the lengths of roads and bridges of various classes directly or indirectly under the charge of the branch, and other statistical information.

From these returns it will be seen that the expenditure for the year on roads and bridges was £616,097 15s. 3d. Of this sum, £555,529 17s. 7d. was derived from Revenue and £60,567 17s. 8d. from Loan Funds. A sum of £401,754 11s. remained unexpended from Loan Votes and was carried forward.

The year generally was favourable for road construction, and although a phenomenally heavy rainfall occurred in the South Coast districts in February last, no very serious flood damages have resulted.

Expenditure was, with a view to economy, restricted to the most urgent requirements, and the cost of maintenance reduced to the lowest limit compatible with efficiency.

Amongst the most expensive road works carried out during the year was that at the Macquarie Pass on the Moss Vale-Nowra road. For some years the importance of affording access from the Illawarra District to the rich table-lands lying east of the Southern railway line has been impressed upon the Department. The length of road required to join the valley with the mountain land was short, but the precipitous nature of the cliffs rendered the selection of route one of great difficulty. A line was, after exhaustive exploration, adopted and constructed at a cost of £4,845. The whole length is slightly under 5 miles, and the gradients range from 1 in 12 to 1 in 15. The most difficult part of the work was carried out by day labour, and the remainder under the butty-gang system.

In previous reports the necessity for introducing legislation to regulate the width of tires of vehicles using the public roads has been strongly urged. I desire to again emphasise the matter. Notwithstanding the enormous sums expended yearly in maintenance, it is quite impossible to keep roads, used by heavy traffic, in reasonably good condition during wet seasons. The heavy wool and freight teams are numerically small as compared with the local traffic, but the roads are made practically impassable for the latter, and the complaints are serious and justified. It has been conclusively proved by exhaustive trial that, on nearly every class of road, haulage is lighter with a broad than with a narrow tire, and seeing that by the use of the former the cost of road maintenance would be materially reduced and the general traffic greatly benefited, while at the same time the traction on the heavy waggons would be reduced as much as 20 per cent., there appears to be no reason why the reform should not be introduced.

During the year 23,548 papers were registered and dealt with; 21,557 vouchers received and examined; and 3,196 contracts let, amounting to £287,632.

Rents of district offices, ferrymen's quarters, &c., amounted to £1,171 13s. 11d., and cost of cleaning to £230 18s. 7d.

The ferries leased were 51 in number. 36 others were subsidised, and 9 worked, by the Department. The total revenue was £6,060, while the cost of working, &c., was £11,937.

Summarising the figures given in the tabulated statement attached, it will be seen that there are 28,279 miles 56 chains of roads on schedule, 1,113 miles 58 chains of municipal roads subsidised by the Department, and 11,646 miles 38 chains are unclassified, making a total of 41,039 miles 72 chains. Of this length 12,508 miles 36 chains are bush tracks on which minor improvements only have been effected, leaving 28,531 miles 36 chains of cleared, formed, or metalled roads.

There are 2,881 bridges in the colony, having 8,015 spans, with a total length of 272,996 feet, or 51 miles 56 chains. The culverts number 34,731, and have a total length of 511,393 feet, or 96 miles 68½ chains; and there are 16,106 causeways, measuring 393,878 feet, or 74 miles 48 chains. The erection, repairs, and renewals of bridges are referred to in the report of the Assistant Engineer appended.

There are 105 punts, 1 steam-launch, 4 horse-boats, 77 flood-boats, and 132 other boats in use; also 8 punt slips for the carrying out of all necessary repairs. Ferrymen's, bridge caretakers', and other houses and buildings, the property of the Department, number 58. 3 new punts and 18 boats were built during the year, and 48 punts and 70 boats overhauled and repaired.

During the year 994 miles of new roads were cleared and 610 miles wholly or partially constructed. 4 miles 51½ chains of culverts, and 3 miles 11½ chains of causeways, were constructed, and 4,718 rods of fencing erected.

The average number of men employed was 8,367 of whom 1,824 were employed directly by the Department, and 6,543 were contractors and their workmen.

The distance travelled by the district officers and their assistants, overseers, &c., in the execution of their duties was 520,225 miles, 413,124 miles being by road, and 107,101 by rail; the total cost under this head being £4,881 19s. 6d.

Report of the Assistant Engineer for Bridges.

I HAVE the honor to report that during the year ended 30 June, 1898, 67 new bridges were completed and opened for traffic. (For details see *Schedule A*.)

The total length of these bridges is 8,267 feet, consisting of 204 timber beam spans, 17 timber truss spans, and 1 suspension span, the total cost being £58,607 2s. 3d. Of these, 28 bridges, having a length of 3,235 feet and costing £24,164 10s., were constructed to replace previously existing structures which had become unfit for traffic.

The most important bridges completed were: The Kangaroo Valley suspension bridge, with a span of 252 feet 9 inches, costing £7,612 10s. 1d., which was opened by the Minister for Works on 19 May; the bridge over the Hunter River at Morpeth, with a length of 819 feet, costing £8,855 10s. 9d., also opened by the Minister for Works on 15 June; the bridge over the Turon River at Wallaby Rocks, a truss bridge on iron piers, with a length of 323 feet, costing £4,350 19s.; and the Stonequarry Creek, or Victoria, bridge, at Picton, 273 feet in length and costing £3,659 11s. 11d.

The year's work adds 39 bridges to those previously existing; and there were on 30 June, 1898, 2,881 bridges, with a total length of 272,996 feet, under the control of the Department.

Two new hand-gearied ferry punts were constructed, at a cost of £448 7s. 11d., and a new iron steam-punt, constructed at a cost of £2,604 13s. 1d., was placed at George's River Ferry. This punt is much longer than that previously in use, having a deck space of 64 feet by 20 feet available for vehicles.

WORKS IN PROGRESS.

In addition to the works referred to above as completed, contracts were in progress on 30 June, 1898, for the erection of 38 new bridges, estimated to cost £75,605 13s. 3d. The total length of these bridges will be, when completed, 8,217 feet, 22 of these being erected to replace previously existing structures.

The following are the more important of the works in progress:—

Bridge over Macleay River at Kempsey.—The contract for this work was let on 25 September, 1897, for £18,650. The bridge will consist of 4 timber truss spans of 154 feet each on iron cylinder piers, and 9 timber beam approach spans, making a total length of 922 feet between abutments, with a deck width of 22 feet 6 inches between curbs. The foundations of this bridge will, it is anticipated, have to be carried to a depth of 68 feet below high water.

Gundagai Bridge Approaches.—This has been a very considerable undertaking, no less than 21,690 lineal feet of piles and girders, 7,346 cubic feet of hewn timber, and 430,000 super. feet of sawn timber being used. The contract was let on 11 August, 1896, for £12,591 15s. 6d., the work consisting of the erection of 76 timber beam-spans of 35 feet each and 2 of 28 feet each, making a total length of 2,719 feet, with a deck width of 20 feet 6 inches; the timber deck of the iron portion of the bridge which spans the main river being renewed at the same time.

Bridge over Paterson River, at Dunmore.—The old bridge at this place consists of a number of timber beam-spans, with a draw-span of iron to permit the passage of vessels. Not only had the structure suffered from the attacks of the cobra, but recent floods had caused scour which seriously affected its stability. The contract for the new bridge was let on 13 November, 1897, for £12,433, and it will have a total length of 427 feet, made up of 3 timber truss-spans of 110 feet each, 1 lifting-span of steel to admit of passage of vessels, and 1 timber-span of 30 feet on cylinder piers and concrete abutments. A roadway of 17 feet 3 inches on the timber-spans and 14 feet on the lift span is provided.

Bridge over Murray River, at Albury.—This work is nearing completion, and is to replace the old Union Bridge, now decayed. The contract was let on 22 April, for £6,668 10s. 2d., and the bridge consists of 2 timber truss-spans of 110 feet each, and 3 timber approach-spans, making a total length of 323 feet. The truss-spans are supported on iron cylinder piers, and a roadway of 24 feet is provided.

REPAIRS TO BRIDGES.

Apart from the complete reconstruction of bridges referred to above, a sum of £33,809 6s. 10d. was expended on repairs to bridges during the year. The most important work undertaken under this head was the replacing of the timber work in the Nimboi Bridge, which carries the Glen Innes-Grafton Road over the Nimboi River. This work, which, owing to the natural features of the locality, had to be carried out without side-tracking the traffic, was completed at a cost of £4,747 6s. 8d., by day labour, a system which, though subjected to much criticism of late, is, I am satisfied, the most suitable for bridge repairs. In this case the whole of the timber beam-spans for a length of 300 feet were replaced by truss-work, new piers being also constructed, while the timber deck and cross girders of the iron spans, 450 feet in length, were also renewed.

Attention was drawn in my report of 1896-1897 to the success attending the conversion of the Belabula River Bridge at Carcoar from a truss to a beam bridge; during the year under notice a similar work was carried out at Polygonum Swamp Bridge, near Bourke, where four 80-foot truss-spans have been converted into twelve 27-foot beam-spans, at a cost of £2,216 8s. 9d. In this case the trusses had been constructed of red-gum, and had become so distorted as to be no longer efficient; and as the bridge carries all the traffic from North Bourke Bridge to Bourke Railway Station, the conversion to a beam bridge, which can be easily and cheaply repaired, while affording ample water-openings for the place, will doubtless affect economy in the future.

The machinery of the Balranald lifting-bridge was removed this year, and replaced by gear similar to that erected in the previous year at Bourke and Brewarrina, with satisfactory results.

When we consider the great length of the bridges under the charge of the Department, viz., 272,996 feet, or nearly 52 miles, and the fact that the greater number are of timber, it is satisfactory to note that they were kept in trafficable order for the comparatively small expenditure of £24,164 10s. for reconstruction, and £33,809 6s. 10d. for repairs, or £57,973 16s. 10d. in all for the year. This question of the keeping up of the bridges is a very important one, and, as settlement in the country districts extends, increases in magnitude.

Report of the Engineer for Sewerage Construction for the year ended 30 June, 1898.

Department of Public Works, Sewerage Construction Branch, Sydney, 19 September, 1898.

Sir,

I have the honor to submit the following report of the operations of this branch during the year ended 30 June, 1898. I have classified my report as follows:—

1. Transfer of works to the Water and Sewerage Board.
2. High-level Sewerage.
3. Low-level Sewerage.
4. Storm-water Channels.
5. Drainage of Country Towns.
6. Detail Survey of Cities, Towns, and Suburbs.
7. Summary of work executed in the Drawing Offices.

TRANSFER OF WORKS TO THE WATER AND SEWERAGE BOARD.

During the year the following works have been gazetted as completed and transferred to the Water and Sewerage Board, viz.:—

Western Suburbs Sewerage.

Portion of the irrigation beds recently prepared on the Sewage Farm; the Main Carrier on the Sewage Farm; the Main Outfall Sewer from the Farm to its junction with the three Main Branches at Premier-street; the Main Eastern Branch from Premier-street, following along the Illawarra Road, and crossing the suburban railway near Stanmore Station, and terminating in Collins-street, Annandale; Branches from this sewer draining portions of Marrickville and Annandale; a Branch Sewer, known as the Camden-street Branch, draining portions of Newtown and Macdonaldtown; the Third Division of the Northern Main Sewer, which discharges at the Bondi Outfall, extending from Piper-street, Leichhardt, to Foucart-street, Balmain; the Storm-water Channel along Homebush Creek and its branches draining the portions of Strathfield lying south of the railway line between Burwood and Homebush stations.

North Sydney Sewerage.

The Main Outfall Sewer from Willoughby Bay, Middle Harbour to Milson's Point, together with its Branches to Lavender Bay and Blue's Point and sub-branches.

Willoughby Creek Storm-water Channel, from Ernest-street to Miller's street, with Branches towards the North Sydney Recreation Reserve.

The Double Bay Creek Storm-water Channel, extending from the east side of Double Bay southward to the Bondi sewer, along the old course of the creek through the Municipality of Woollahra.

HIGH-LEVEL SEWERAGE.

Western Suburbs Sewerage, High-level Sewers, Outfall Sewer, and Sewage Farm.

The preparation of filtration areas at the sewage farm, which is being carried out by day-labour, is now almost sufficiently advanced for dealing with the sewage from the present population served by the sewers of the western system. Some of the recently-prepared sand-beds are now being used for the treatment of the sewage from the Main Eastern Branch, which sewer has been working since it was taken over by the Board.

To provide access to the Farm from Arncliffe, a road has been constructed alongside the outfall sewer from Marsh-street to Muddy Creek; and, crossing this creek on a timber bridge, is continued across the Farm along the Main Carrier, to join the road from the Cook's River Farm.

Owing to the shifting nature of the sand, it was found necessary to soil the banks of roadway and filter-beds, and to sow them with couch grass. Favoured by the recent rains, the grass has taken firm hold, and the stability of the banks is now assured.

Main Northern Branch.

The three divisions of this Branch through Marrickville, Petersham, and Leichhardt, respectively, varying in size from 5 ft. 6 in. x 4 ft. 6 in. to 3 ft. 3 in. x 2 ft. 2 in., will be ready for carrying sewage in about four months. A branch line to Dobroyd, size 4 ft. 6 in. x 3 ft. 6 in., and the branch up Long Cove Creek, may be expected to be completed about the same time, these last-mentioned sewers being already completed with the exception of the aqueduct over Long Cove Creek, the piers for which are erected and the plates on the ground.

Main Western Branch.

This sewer, from Premier-street, Marrickville, to Brand-street, Croydon, a distance of 5 miles 19 chains, may be expected to be in working order by the end of January, 1899. The sewer, where constructed in open trench, and the pipe branches are completed, and the tunnels pierced and partly lined. The plans and sections of the 4th and final division of this branch are almost ready for tenders to be

be invited. This extension will drain Strathfield, Homebush, and a part of Concord. From the end of the 3rd division, at Brand-street, the sewer extends westerly, running parallel to the railway as far as Burwood station, and then crosses the line, passing along Morwick-street, Redfern-street, and Homebush Road, terminating at the lowest part of Albert-street. This section varies in size from 4 ft. 9 in. x 3 ft. 9 in. to 3 ft. 3 in. x 2 ft. 2 in.

A Branch leaving the sewer near Burwood station runs northward through the Burwood Park to the Parramatta Road, whence it turns westerly along that road, and terminates at the creek emptying into Hen and Chicken Bay.

Northern Main Sewer (Bondi Outlet).

As will be seen in the paragraph under the transfer of work to the Water and Sewerage Board, the portion of the Main Northern Sewer from Starling-street, Leichhardt, to Cook-street, Balmain, has been completed during the past year. The sewer draining the south-eastern slopes of Balmain with its branches, a length of 2 miles.7 chains, terminating in Stephen-street, will be completed in three months. The sewer draining the north-western slopes of Balmain, a length of 2 miles, is well advanced. Its completion will be somewhat delayed by the heavy work in driving through the ridge between the Main Sewer and Callan Park.

Eastern Suburbs Sewerage (Waverley and Bondi).

A contract was let towards the end of 1897 for the construction of an intercepting sewer, 3 ft. 3 in. x 2 ft. 2 in., from the Bondi Sewer to Bronte, the sewer being located as near the coast as the intercepting creeks would allow. The work has been rapidly pushed on; the shafts, which are of unusual depths, have been sunk, and tunnelling is well advanced. The Bondi end of this contract will be ready for use in a few months, this section of the work having been completed in advance of the remainder of the sewer to allow of the reticulation of the area between the Old South Head Road and the Bondi-road being connected.

Randwick and Kensington.

The construction of this sewer from the present outfall at Coogee to the junction of Avoca and Howard Streets is now in progress, the shafts, which are of great depth, being all bottomed, and the driving operations being well advanced. The length of this division is 85 chains. The sewer will be built of concrete and brickwork, of oviform section, varying in size from 5 ft. 3 in. x 4 ft. 3 in. to 4 ft. 5 in. x 3 ft. 6 in.

A contract will shortly be prepared for the extension of the sewer westerly to the Bunnerong-road, and thence along that road to the Randwick-road north of the Race-course buildings.

North Sydney Sewerage.

The Outfall works at Willoughby Bay will be ready in the course of a few weeks for commencing operations; the only portion of the plant not in position being the sludge presses. With the exception of the Tangye engine, the remainder of the machinery, including the lime-mixing apparatus, sludge and compressed air receivers, air compressing engine, flow indicator, &c., has been constructed by the Mort's Dock Company to designs prepared in this office. The settling tanks are completed, with the exception of the stone coping, and the sludge chambers and destructors are also ready for use. The sand-filter beds have been under-drained with perforated pipes sealed with coke breeze, to prevent the sand from finding its way into the pipes. Manholes are built at the junction of all branch drains with the trunk drain, so that in case of any stoppage they can be readily cleared. The sand beds are levelled off ready for receiving the sewage, and wooden troughs with offset valves are placed in position to convey the sewage to the several beds.

These are the first works in the Australian Colonies where the separation of the solid matter from the liquid sewage has been provided for, the small filtration area available rendering this method necessary.

The sewage, after being mixed with a chemical precipitant, is passed through an agitator and over salmon ladders into settling tanks. The effluent is run off by a floating pipe, the mouth of which is kept a few inches below the surface of the tank. The sludge is drawn off from the tanks into the sludge chamber, and thence into a boiler-shaped receiver, from which it is forced by compressed air into the sludge presses. The cake produced will be burnt in destructors, the designs for which were prepared in this office. These destructors are provided with forced draught, and the heat from them will be used in raising steam in the boiler supplying the engine working the machinery.

Willoughby and Chatswood Sewerage.

Settlement in this district is increasing so rapidly that, acting on the request of the Chatswood Council, surveys were made, and a sewerage scheme prepared for draining Chatswood and a portion of Willoughby. Building has chiefly proceeded in the watershed of the creek falling into the north arm of Sugarloaf Bay, and the course of this creek has been approximately followed in setting out the Main sewer.

Immediately below the tanneries of Messrs. Forsyth, Bailey, and others, the land breaks away precipitously, and it is proposed to establish outfall works on the edge of this escarpment.

The distance from the tanneries to the salt water is considerable, and the proposal to establish Outfall Works at the bay, on somewhat similar lines to the North Sydney Outfall Works, but providing for taking the sludge to sea in punts, showed an increase upon the estimate of cost for works at the site near the tanneries.

Owing to the rapid fall along the course of the creek from Chatswood to the site of the proposed outfall works at the tanneries, pipe sewers will serve all requirements, and the trenches being in earth the scheme will be carried out at comparatively small cost.

If the site near the tanneries is adopted for outfall works, it is proposed to erect Septic Tanks and Diben Filters for the treatment of the sewage, provided that similar works now in course of construction at the Rookwood Asylum prove a success.

Neutral Bay and Mosman Sewer.

A contract will shortly be let for the First Division of this sewer. Leaving the North Sydney outfall sewer at M'Laren-street it follows down that street eastward, and, crossing the Neutral Bay Creek, strikes south-east under Karraba-road and Hayes-street, terminating at the end of Wycombe-road. The sewer is designed of brick and concrete, and is 3 ft. 3 in. by 2 ft. 2 in. in dimensions; it will intercept in its course all the sewage of settlement at the head of Neutral Bay.

The Second Division of the sewer, extending to the east side of Mosman Creek, has been set out, and drawings are being prepared. This sewer will provide an outlet for the watersheds drained by the Shell Cove Creek, Spofforth-street Creek, and Mosman Creek, as well as the high land of Cremorne Point, and the eastern side of Mosman Bay.

The Third Division of this sewer will extend to Little Sirius Cove Creek, and will serve the remaining portion of the southern slope of the township of Mosman.

South Willoughby Sewerage.

A sewer is being constructed to bring the sewage of South Willoughby to the North Sydney Outfall Works. This sewer taps the watershed of the southern area of the Long Bay Creek, draining the area as far north as the St. Leonards Railway Station; it passes, in tunnel, through the high ground near the Queen's Park Estate—the deepest shaft being 160 feet. Alternative tenders were called for this sewer, constructed of concrete in the usual manner, and oval pipes built on the "Monier" system, packed with sand. The cost of the latter showed a saving of about 30 per cent., and this form of construction was accordingly adopted.

Manly Sewerage.

The sewerage works of Manly, which were being carried out by a private firm of engineers, were, at the request of the Council, taken over by this Department. The work was so far advanced that any alteration to the general lines of the scheme, even if desirable, could not be entertained, but on going into the matter of reticulation it was found that the pipe sewers in the positions shown on the contract drawings would have necessitated long house connections,—putting the ratepayers to unnecessary expense, and an arrangement was entered into with the contractors for the substitution of sewers in more suitable positions.

The Outfall sewer, together with the sea-wall and esplanade in conjunction with it, are well advanced; the tunnels through the hills between Manly and Fairy Bower and Cabbage Tree Bay and the ocean are almost through, and the reticulation as amended is practically finished.

It is expected that the whole of the system will be in working order by the end of the year.

The rapid progress of Manly has now rendered further reticulation sewers necessary to serve houses erected since the original design, and, at the request of the Council, surveys and plans have been prepared for extensions to the scheme.

Quarantine Ground Sewerage.

The Health Board has for some time regarded with disfavour the draining of the Quarantine ground into the harbour, and has had under consideration a scheme for an ocean outfall. On the matter being referred to this Branch, a site for an outfall was fixed at the Inner North Head, and a survey made for a line of sewer to pierce the ridge, with branches to intercept the sewage from the buildings on the station. This work will be proceeded with when funds are available.

Pymont Sewerage.

A sewer has been constructed along Jones-street, from Quarry-street to the Parramatta Road, to intercept the sewage from the heights of Pymont, and provide an outlet for the low-lying areas of the Glebe, Pymont, and Wentworth Park, the sewage from which will be raised by pumping.

Rookwood Asylum Drainage.

The sanitary arrangements of the Rookwood Asylum proving unsatisfactory, designs have been prepared for sewage tanks and filters.

A sewage tank, known as the Septic Tank, has been successfully used at Exeter, England, in the treatment of sewage. The biological action of this tank is to break down the solid matter, and throw it into solution, so doing away with the deposit of sludge and the necessity of sludge presses and destructors, or other means of disposal, which form so costly an item in sewerage expenditure. The reports as to the successful working of this tank are sufficiently satisfactory to warrant the Department in constructing a tank on this system at the Asylum. Should it prove successful the Septic Tank will be adopted in larger works. The filters are three in number, and work automatically, the overflow from one tank stopping the supply and starting another into action. The designs for the automatic gearing were prepared in this office.

Illawarra Suburbs Scheme.

Preliminary levels have been taken for the preparation of a gravitation scheme for the Municipalities of Rockdale, Kogarah, and Hurstville. The neighbourhood of Arncliffe will be served by a sewer connecting with the Main Outfall sewer at Rocky Point Road and Marsh-street.

To drain the remainder of these suburbs a main sewer is proposed up the Muddy Creek Valley, discharging on to the Botany Sewage Farm, near the junction of Eve and Bertie Streets. Main branches will be laid up the numerous gullies, and an intercepting sewer will pass along Rocky Point and Kogarah Roads.

LOW LEVEL SEWERAGE.

A large portion of the work of the Branch during the year has been devoted to making provision for the sewerage of the Low Level areas, and the following localities have been dealt with:—

Marrickville.

The construction of the main sewers is being proceeded with, but the contractors have been much hindered by the heavy rainfall flooding their trenches; the work, however, where in tunnel, is being rapidly carried out.

The system will serve the low-lying areas of Marrickville, St. Peters, Newtown, Macdonaldtown, and a portion of Alexandria, and includes 2 miles 5 chains of oviform sewer, and 1 mile of pipe sewers. Tenders will shortly be called for the erection of the Pumping Station at the junction of Meeks Road and the Burwood railway. The building, the dimensions of which are 728 feet by 40 feet, will be of brick with stone facings and an iron truss roof; attached will be a chimney-shaft 108 feet in height. The tender of an English firm was accepted during the year for the machinery, consisting of two Davy compound horizontal pumping engines, and two Cornish boilers, economiser, travelling crane, feed-water heater, and accessories. Provision is made in the building for the duplication of the above plant, and also for centrifugal pumps for dealing with the stormwater in flood time.

Double Bay.

The Power-house is now completed, and the machinery is being placed in position; the latter consists of two 25-horse-power electro-motors, air-compressors, air-receivers, automatic controlling gear, storage battery (capable of supplying power sufficient for twelve hours running), electric lighting apparatus, and other fittings. With the exception of the motors and batteries, the whole of the machinery has been designed in this office. The power required is supplied from the Tramway Power-house at Rushcutters' Bay, and connected to the Sewerage Power-house by cable. It is expected that the plant will be running in twelve months' time. The above plant is provided for running the Shone's ejectors of the Double Bay Low Level sewers.

Glebe, Annandale, and Balmain.

Suitable points along the shore for collecting the sewage have been decided upon for pumping stations, and the surveys of intercepting sewers gravitating to them have been carried out, and contract drawings are in hand. When the site for the pumping-station is unavoidably in bad ground, the chamber containing the machinery will consist of an oval cast-iron casing divided into three compartments by bulk-heads, the central compartment containing the engines and pumps, and the end ones forming the collecting wells. In the case of a pumping-station in sound ground, a concrete chamber will be provided. Electric energy will be used in actuating the pumps, and arrangements have been made with the Railway Construction Branch for its supply from the Tramway Power-house now being erected near Darling Harbour. Estimates of the cost of lifting the sewage by other methods show the electric power to be the cheapest on the basis of the agreement entered into, and also, owing to the compact form of the engine, the best adapted for minor pumping-stations. Alternative tenders will be called for the supply of centrifugal and plunger pumps of suitable form. With the exception of the electric motors, designs for the machinery and electric fittings are being prepared in this office.

Every effort has been made to reduce the number of pumping-stations, and it has been found advantageous in some instances to design collecting sewers in tunnel rather than incur the expense of maintaining additional pumping-stations. In the case of Peacock's Point, Balmain, it was found that, by piercing the hill with a tunnel from the end of Darling-street to Stephen-street, and the ridge under the School of Arts with a connecting tunnel from Waterview Bay, all the sewage of the promontory could be collected at Stephen-street. In view of the length of time tunnelling would occupy, a contract was let 59 chains in length of 3 ft. 3 in. by 2 ft. 2 in. sewer, and the work is now well advanced.

Woolloomooloo and Botanical Gardens.

Tenders will shortly be called for the low-level sewerage of Woolloomooloo, the details of the pumping-plant being similar to those for Balmain, &c. The present system of sewers will be intercepted, and the sewage collected to a pumping-station in Forbes-street, where a large iron oval caisson will be sunk in the street, the automatically-started machinery being below ground, and the sewage lifted through a rising main into the Bondi sewer.

The sewerage of the Botanical Gardens has been pushed on, and is now almost completed, the work having been carried out without causing any great inconvenience to the public, or the Director of the Gardens, and without damage to the plants or trees. The sewer is connected by gravitation to the Woolloomooloo system by a tunnel through the ridge.

STORMWATER CHANNELS.

Homebush Creek.

A Branch of the Homebush Creek stormwater channel to Albyn-street, Burwood, some 62 chains in length, has been completed.

Necropolis.

The drainage of the new portion of the Necropolis at Rookwood, by means of an open channel, is under construction.

White's Creek.

The White's Creek stormwater channel, from Rozelle Bay to Piper-street, a length of 43 chains, is practically completed, and plans are being prepared for an extension of the channel to Booth-street, a further distance of 16 chains, which is a most necessary sanitary work, the creek being much polluted. The channel below Piper-street is constructed of concrete, 8 to 18 feet wide to 4 to 5 feet deep.

Long Cove Creek.

Concrete channels have been constructed through the Callan Park Reclamation from Long Cove Creek through the reclamation, to join the Park-road branch, Leichhardt. Another branch to Daniel-street, Leichhardt, is being designed. The outlet end of Johnston's Creek Stormwater Channel, through Rozelle Bay Reclamation, has been carried out. The concrete channel is 51 feet wide, and has a length of 16 chains. The upper portion of the creek, between Booth-street and the Parramatta-road, is being lined, the channel being 36 chains in length, and from 6 to 18 feet in width.

Euroka Creek.

Along the Euroka Creek, North Sydney, a closed stormwater channel was constructed from the railway to Riley-street, a distance of 20 chains, and Willoughby Creek from Ernest-street to West-street, a length of 35 chains, was treated in a similar manner. An extension of the Careening Cove Stormwater Channel, from Denison-street to Berry-street, is under construction.

Bay-street Overflow.

The neighbourhood of Wentworth Park and the populated area between the park and Parramatta-road have been liable to flood in time of heavy rain, the central stormwater channel and the Wattle-street sewer being inadequate to carry an exceptional rainfall. In view of the necessity of a stormwater overflow in connection with the George-street sewer, it was decided to construct a channel sufficiently large to intercept the stormwater falling on the west side of Bay-street, and so relieve the drains referred to. The designs for this channel have been carried out, the length through the park being covered with girders and jack arches. Plans are now ready. The length of the channel is $58\frac{1}{2}$ chains, and its size varies from 2 feet 6 inches circular to 10 feet 6 inches by 3 feet 9 inches.

DRAINAGE OF COUNTRY TOWNS.

Newcastle.

The Detail Survey of Newcastle being sufficiently advanced for the preparation of a map showing the levels of the district, the consideration of a sewerage scheme for the city and suburbs was entered on. The natural slope of the city area being towards the harbour, most of the sewage at present finds its way thither through imperfectly constructed sewers, laid down by the Corporation.

To prevent the contamination of the harbour, it is proposed to construct an intercepting sewer near the base of the hill, and terminating at the hospital. This sewer follows round the contour of the hills, and, crossing the A. A. Company's railway, near Laman-street, takes the course of Dawson-street to the junction of Darby and Junction Streets, near the sand-drift. To this point can be brought by gravitation the sewage of the higher portions of Merewether, Adamstown, Lambton, New Lambton, and Waratah. It is proposed to construct at the Sand-drift sewage tanks for the separation of the solid matter, together with sludge-presses, &c. The effluent will be discharged into the ocean through a sewer having its outlet below low water at the end of a reef extending a considerable distance outwards from the base of the cliff.

The low-lying area of the city, between the hill and the railway, will be served by sewers discharging at a pumping-station near Brown-street, where the sewage will be lifted through a short rising main into the gravitation sewer. The Municipality of Hamilton and a portion of the city will be drained by sewers running to a second pumping-station in Langford-street, near the gasworks. Automatically started machinery will be placed at these stations, but the form of power to be used has not yet been decided on.

Provision has been made in the scheme for the sewerage of all the suburbs as far west as Lambton, but the proposal for present construction will only embrace the City, Hamilton, and Merewether.

Pasturage Reserve.

The extensive drainage-works for the pasturage reserve are nearing completion, this work being done by day-labour. The pitched drops on the main channel and on the Adamstown and Lambton branches are being built, as well as the railway and traffic bridges over the channels. The steel girder bridge to carry the Great Northern Railway over the Adamstown Branch channel is also well in hand.

The earth sides of many of the channels being unable to resist the erosive action of the water, it was found necessary to protect them. The Ti-Tree scrub, which grows thickly on portions of the reserve offered good material for the construction of fascines, which were carried up the banks to above the level of ordinary floods, and the couch-grass which has been pricked in is now sending its roots through the fascine work and consolidating the banks in such a manner that no further trouble from erosion is anticipated.

Cottage Creek.

The Hannell-street branch drain, an open concrete channel some 8 chains long, has been completed, and an extension for a distance of 18 chains is being designed.

Maitland Sewerage.

Applications were made by the Municipal Councils of East and West Maitland for the preparation of sewerage schemes, and, as it is desirable on the grounds of economy in maintenance that, when these towns are sewered, they should form one scheme, the drainage of the two towns was considered with a view to the treatment of the sewage at the same disposal works. The surveys for the sewers are completed, but designs have been delayed pending the completion of urgent work in connection with the Sydney sewerage.

Dungog Drainage.

In response to an appeal from the Council an inspection was made of this town, which has recently suffered from several severe outbreaks of typhoid fever.

As the population of the town does not at present warrant the expenditure entailed by a system of sewerage, a proposal was made for the construction of a stormwater sewer, which it was considered would mitigate the evil of defective drainage.

Jenolan Caves.

Plans were made for the drainage of the Cave-house at Jenolan Caves, and satisfactory progress is being made with the pipe-sewer, which includes a length of steel tubing over the gully, for some 650 feet. The outlet has been placed at a considerable distance from the Caves, and distant from all points of interest.

Byron Bay.

An earth channel has been constructed to intercept the stormwater which periodically flooded the township of Byron Bay. The work has proved successful in its object, and has, in addition, proved an outlet for the stormwaters from the low-lying area passed through.

Hexham.

Attention has been given to the question of draining the Hexham swamp. Trial borings were made, and on the data collected a report, embodying the outlines of a scheme, will be submitted. Three outlet channels in earth cutting are proposed from 4 to 2½ miles in length, discharging into the Hunter River. An area of 28,000 acres would be benefited by these works, the execution of which would be facilitated by means of an earth excavator. A design for the latter has also been prepared.

Narandera.

The Council made application for information concerning the best method of dealing with the liquid sewage flowing into the river through the centre of the town, and also the stormwater. The matter was reported on and a plan forwarded.

DETAIL-SURVEY OF CITIES, TOWNS, AND SUBURBS.

The Detail Survey of Willoughby and the Illawarra Suburbs has been proceeded with. The standard Survey of the former was completed, and the Detail Survey of the municipality is well advanced. In view of the carrying out of the sewerage works at an early date, it is proposed to push on with this survey, as there is no plan of the district which would serve as a record of the work.

The survey of the Illawarra Suburbs will also be proceeded with rapidly, now that the more urgent of the Sydney Sewerage works are completed and surveyors are available. The scheme for the sewerage of the district is in progress, and the want of a reliable plan has seriously hindered the preparation of designs.

A surveyor has been employed during the year in taking levels for the preparation of contour maps of Willoughby, and the Municipalities of Kogarah, Rockdale, and Hurstville, and the portion of Canterbury, south of Cook's River.

The Detail Draftsmen were chiefly employed in the preparation of plans of Mosman, Rockdale, and West Maitland, and the compilation of a map of Newcastle and suburbs on a scale of 4 chains to an inch.

Owing to the small staff of Detail Draftsmen, the arrears of plan drawing have not been lessened during the year, but, as the appointment of extra draftsmen has been approved, it is anticipated that the arrears will be considerably reduced during the current year.

SUMMARY OF WORK EXECUTED IN THE DRAWING OFFICES.

During the year drawings were prepared for forty-four contracts, for which 249 drawings, and 1,487 heliographs were prepared. The value of the work designed amounts to £213,716. In addition, drawings for work valued at £103,163 are now in progress.

Forty-eight sheets of the Detail Survey of Sydney and suburbs, Newcastle and suburbs, and Maitland were drawn; 9 sheets revised, and 78 tracings prepared for heliography. Thirty-one sheets were published; this small number is due to the fact that the publication of the Detail sheets by lithography of all new surveys has ceased. Seven hundred and thirty-eight helios were issued to the Water Supply and Sewerage Board, other Government Departments, and for office use.

Forty-two resumption and easement plans were prepared, and 184 miscellaneous plans mounted.

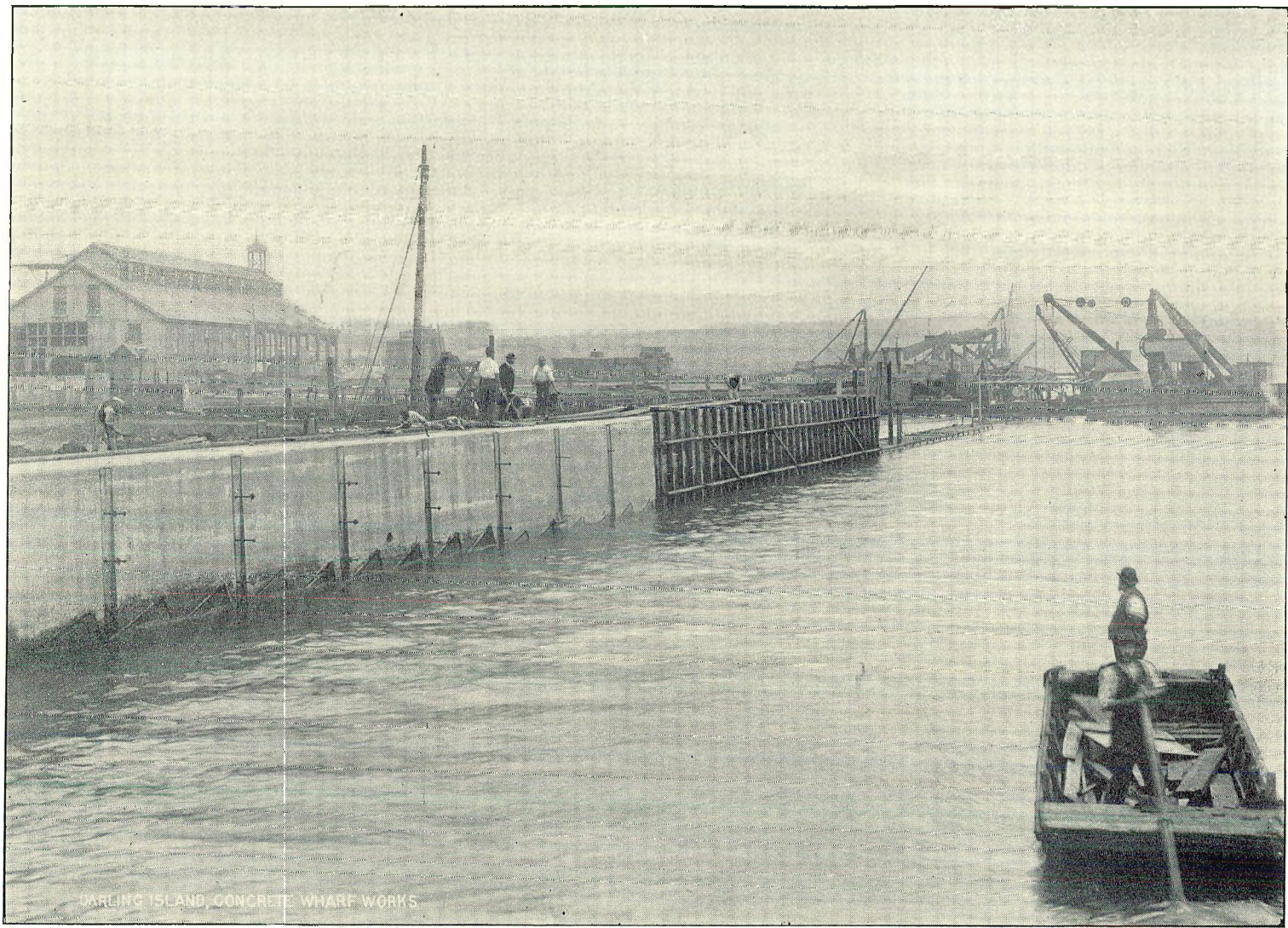

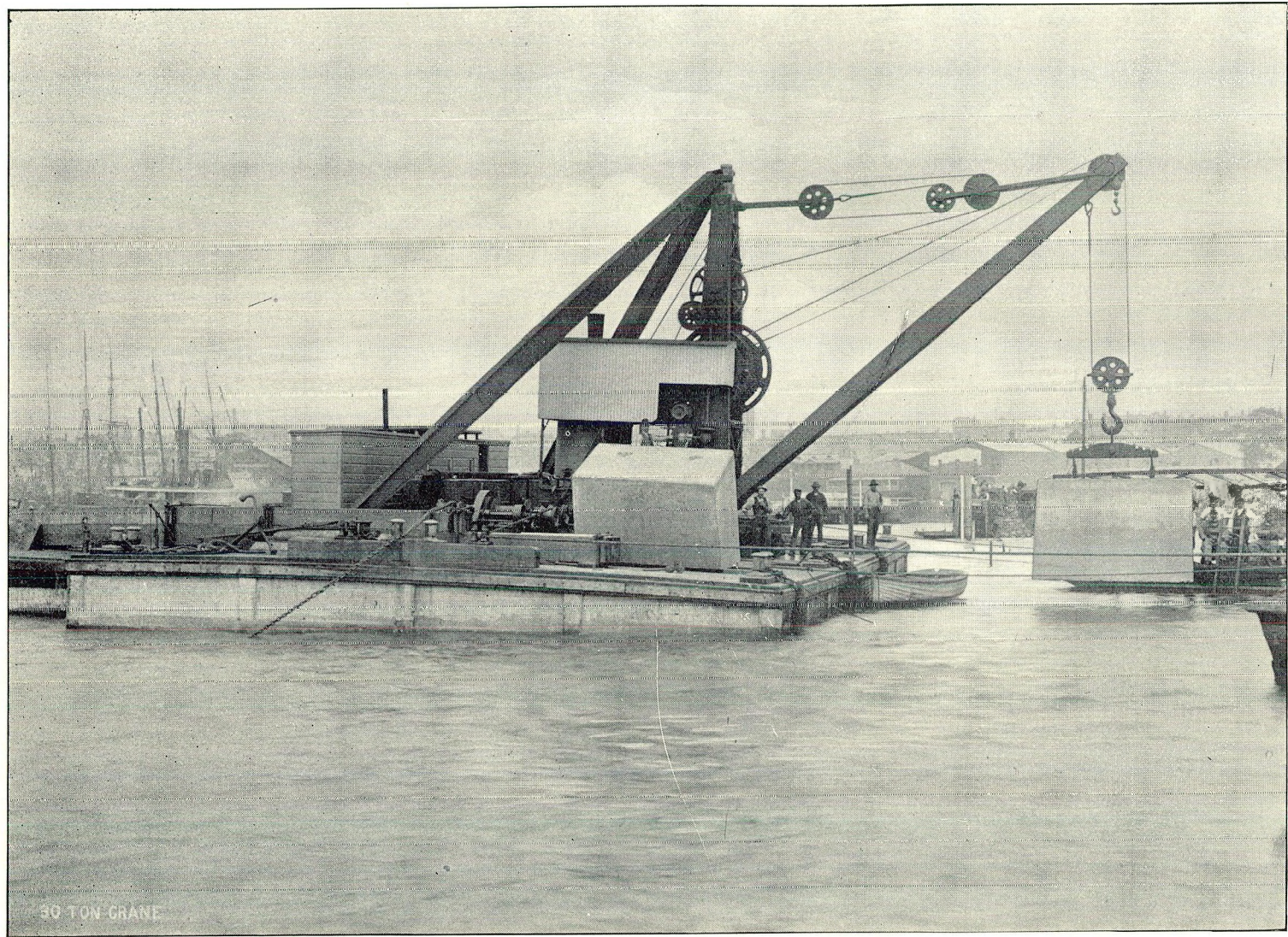

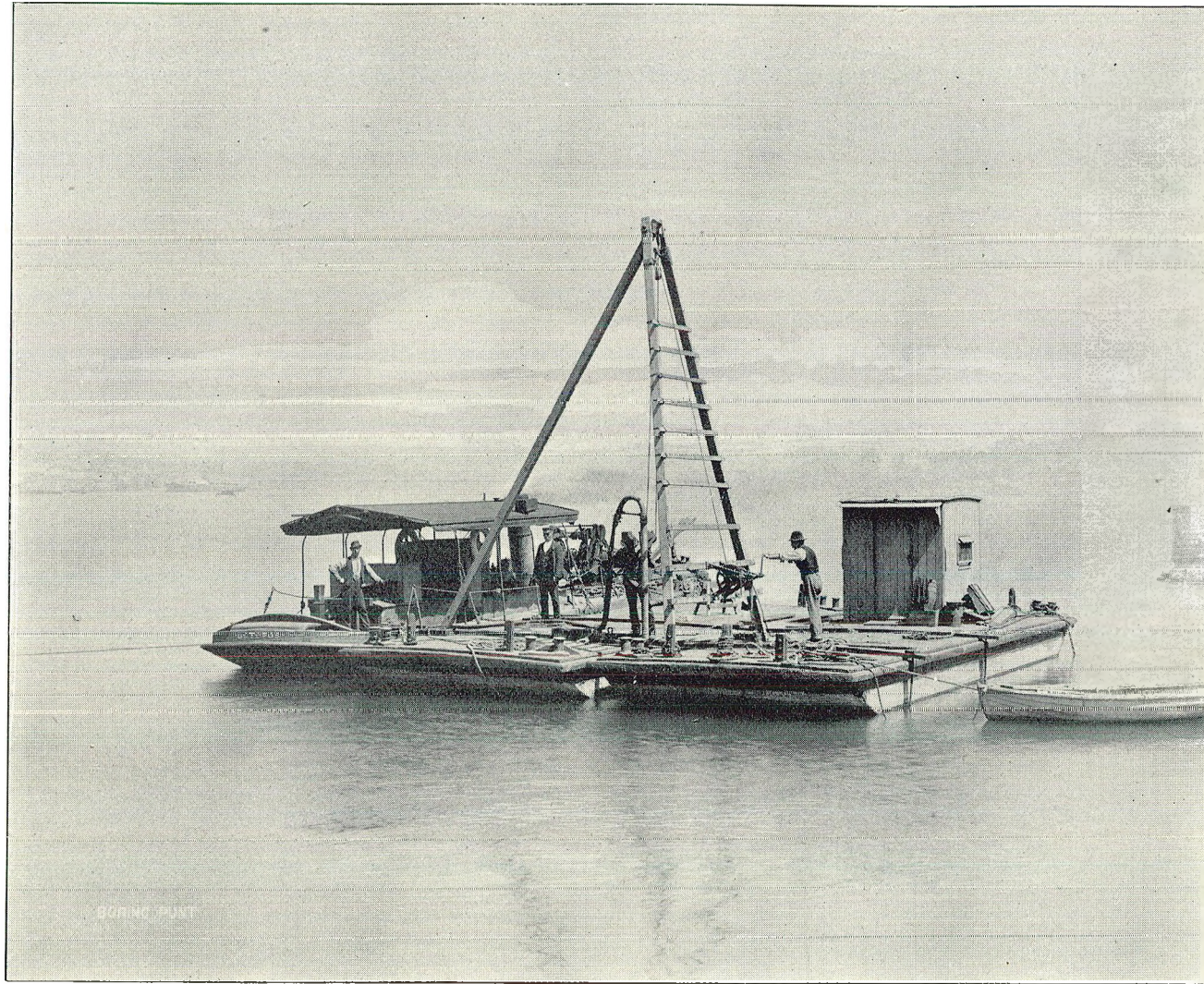

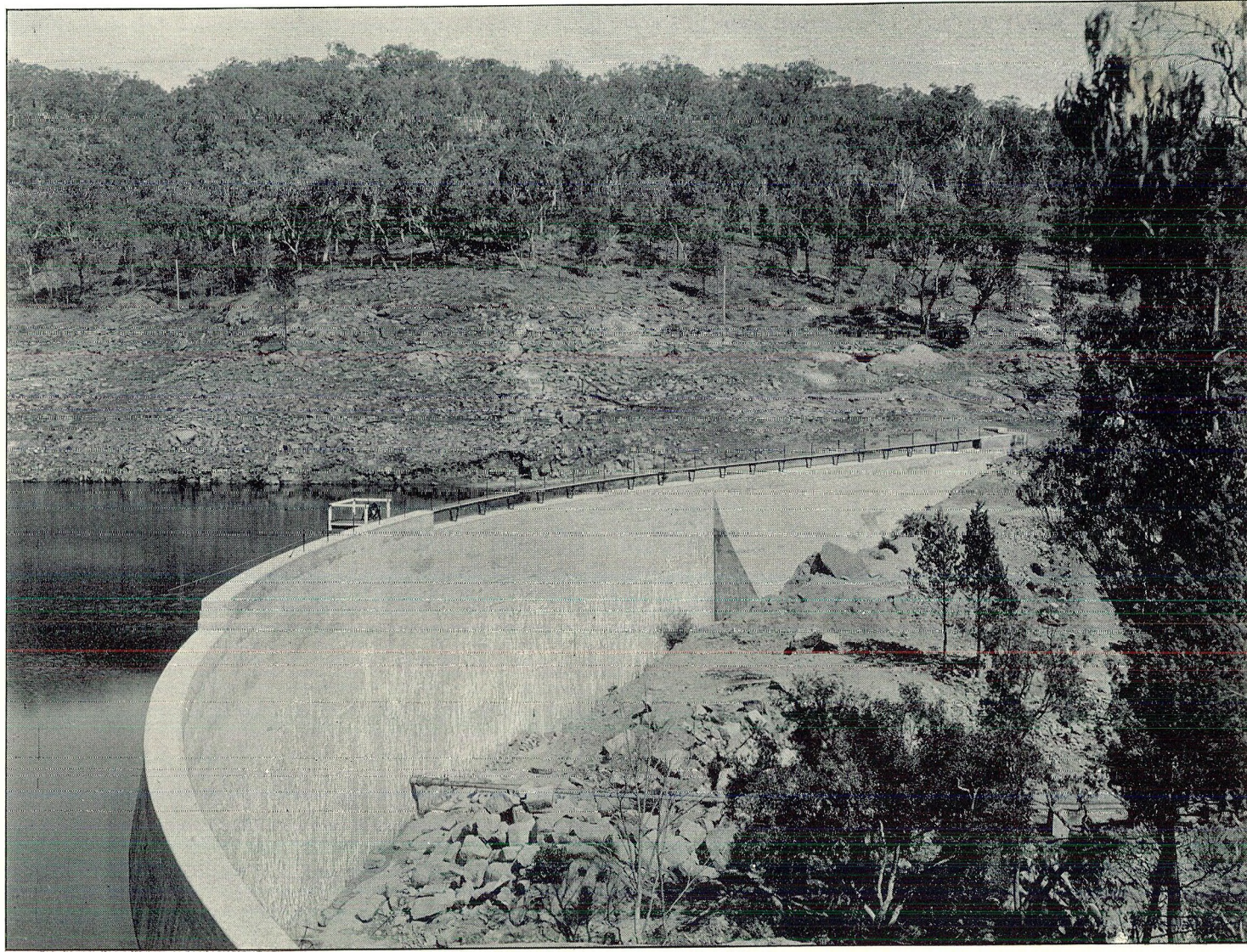

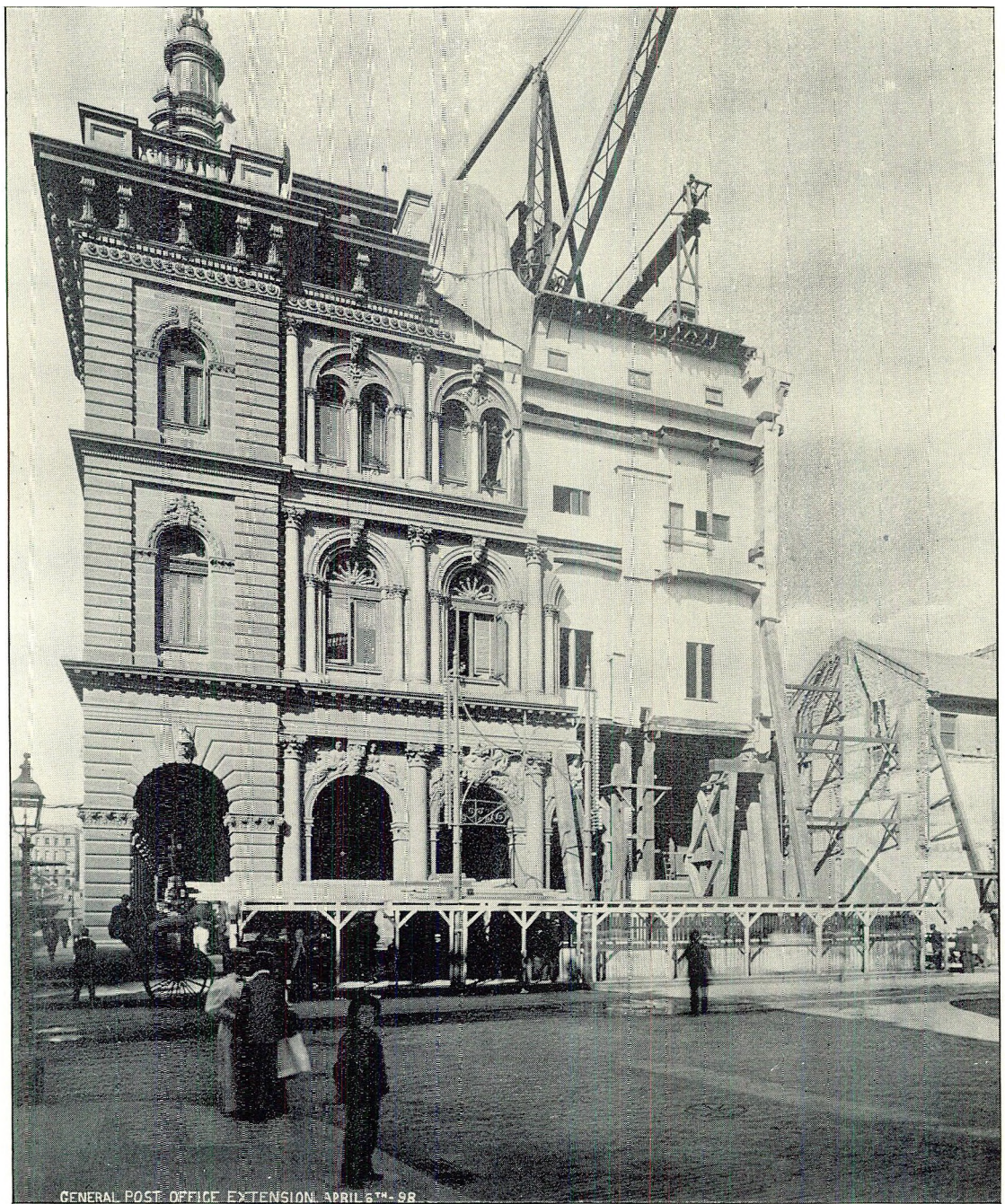

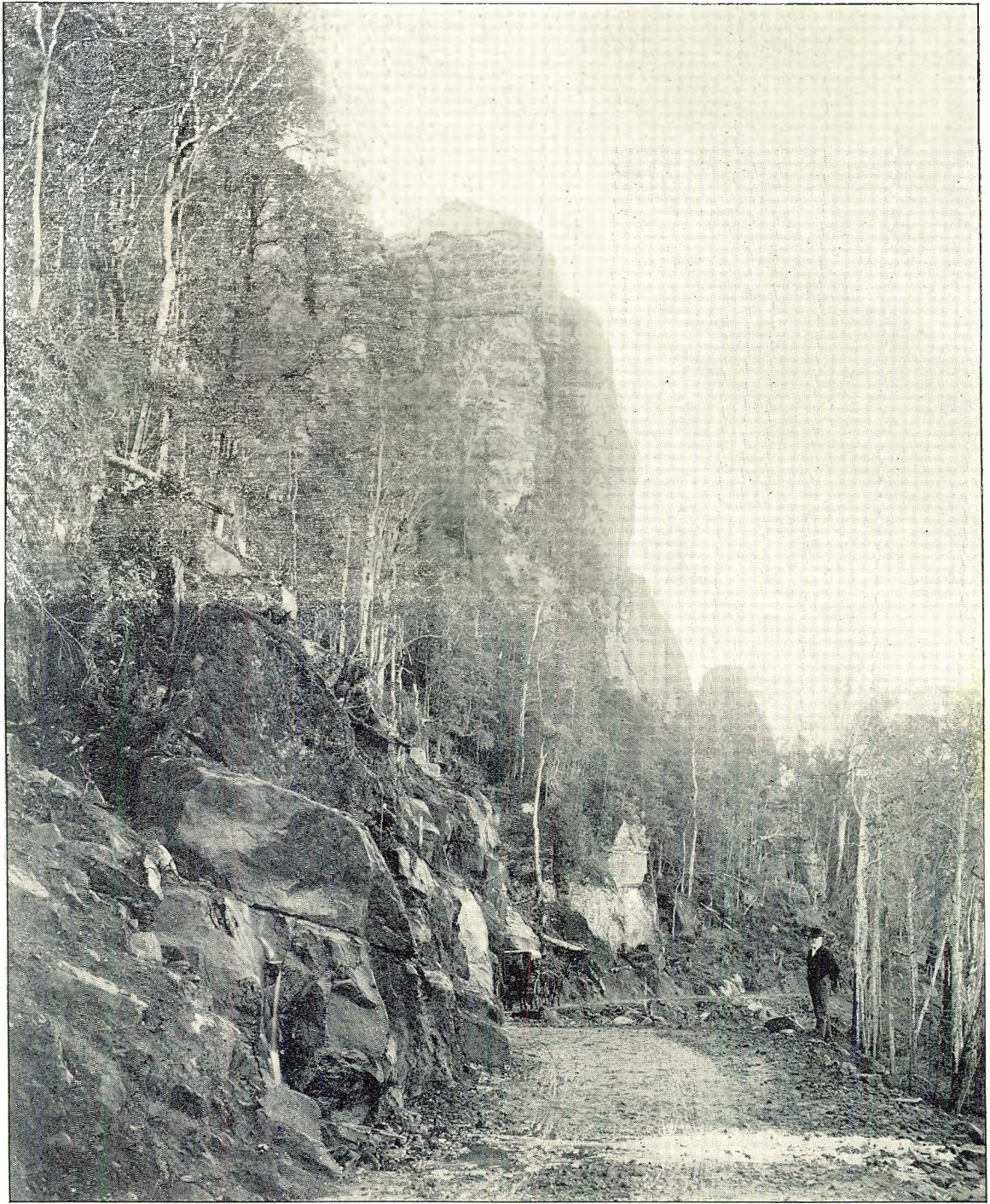

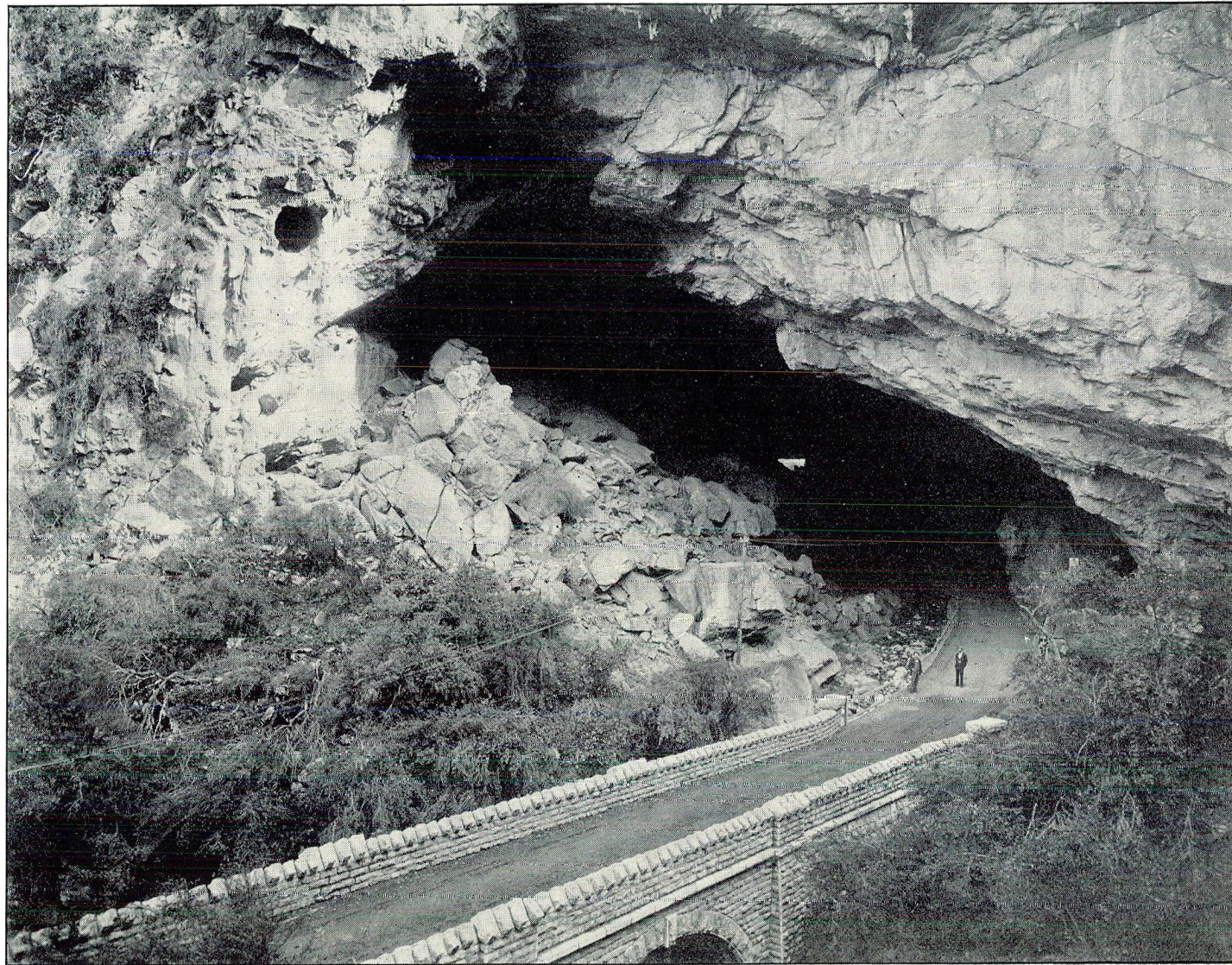

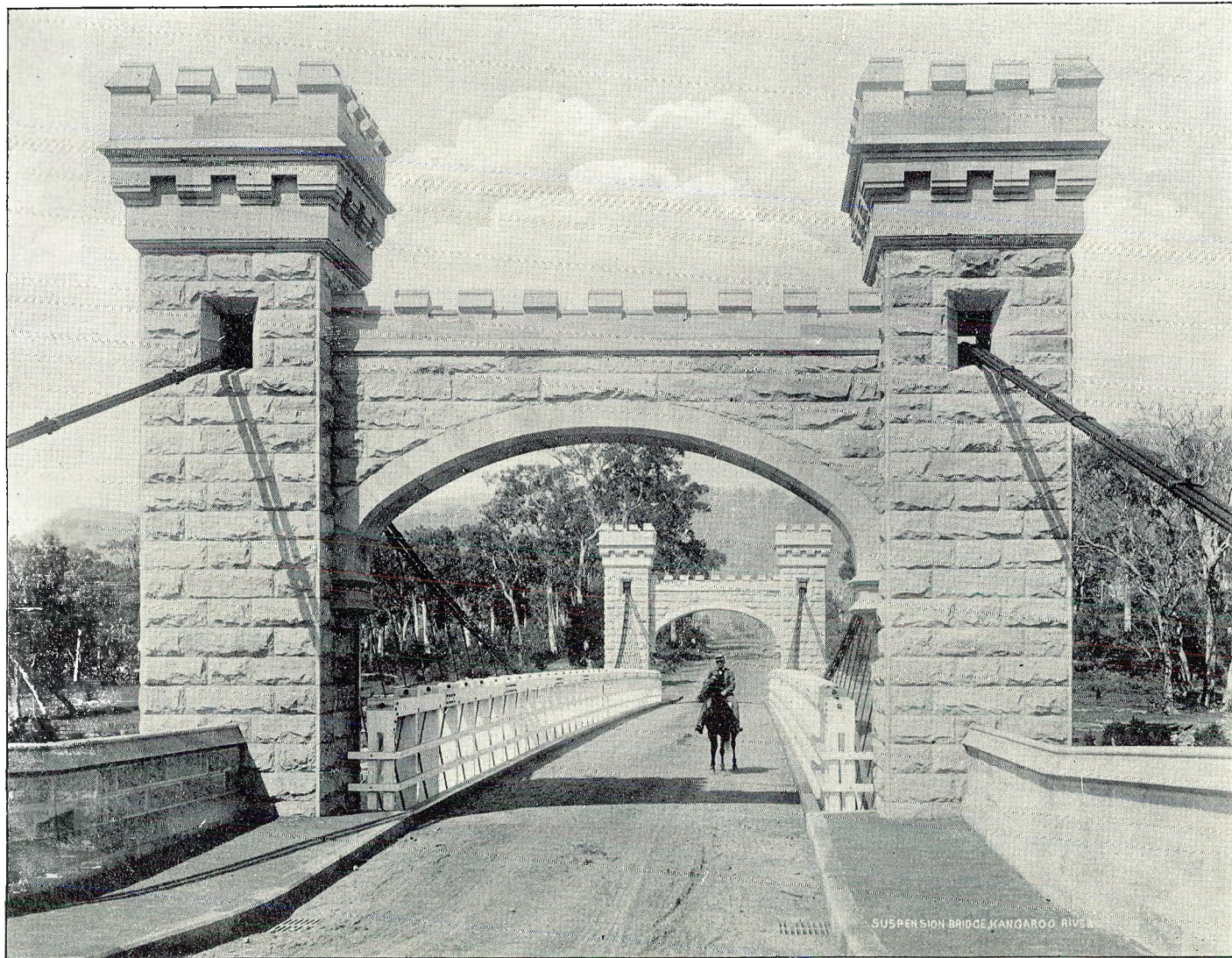

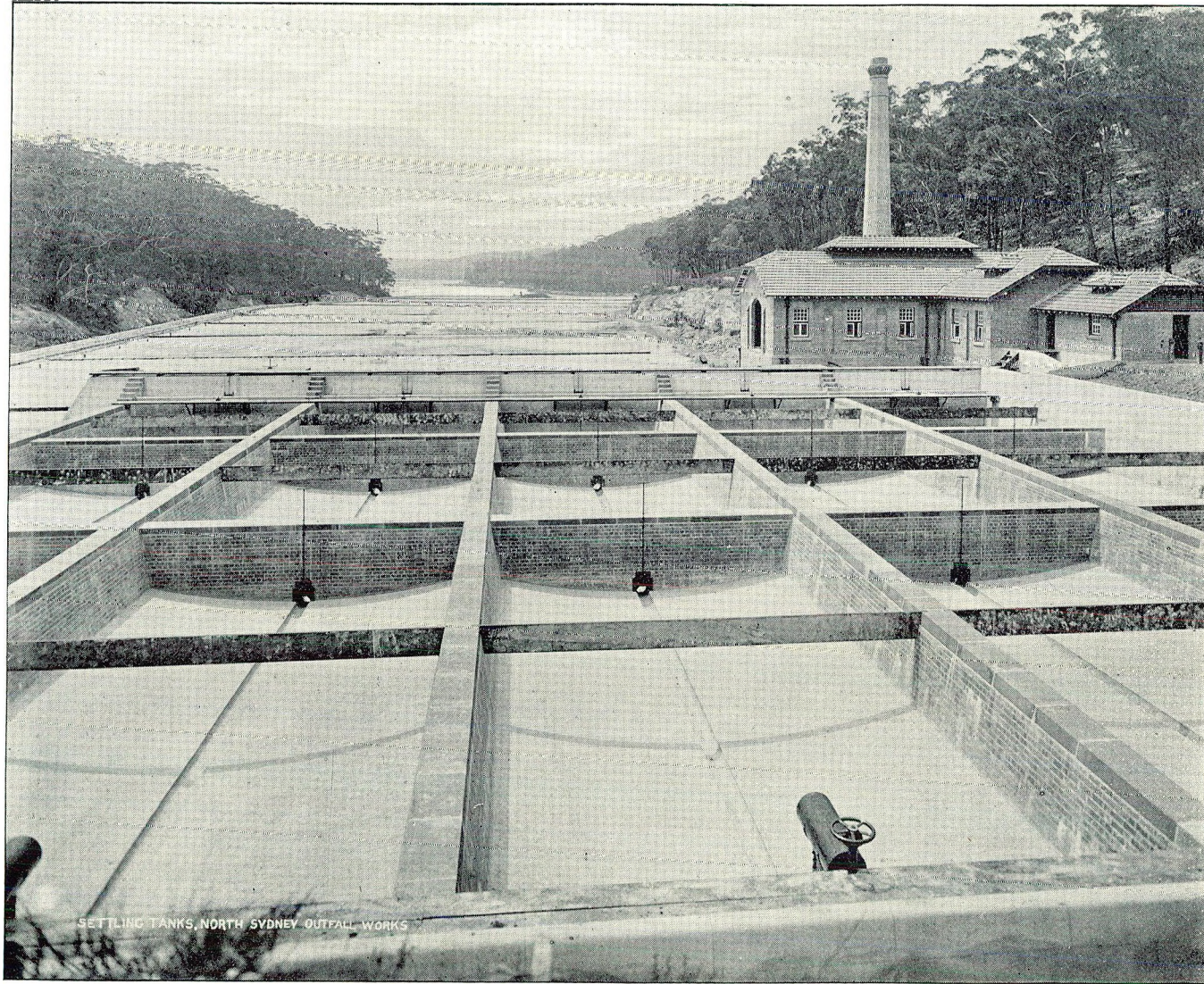

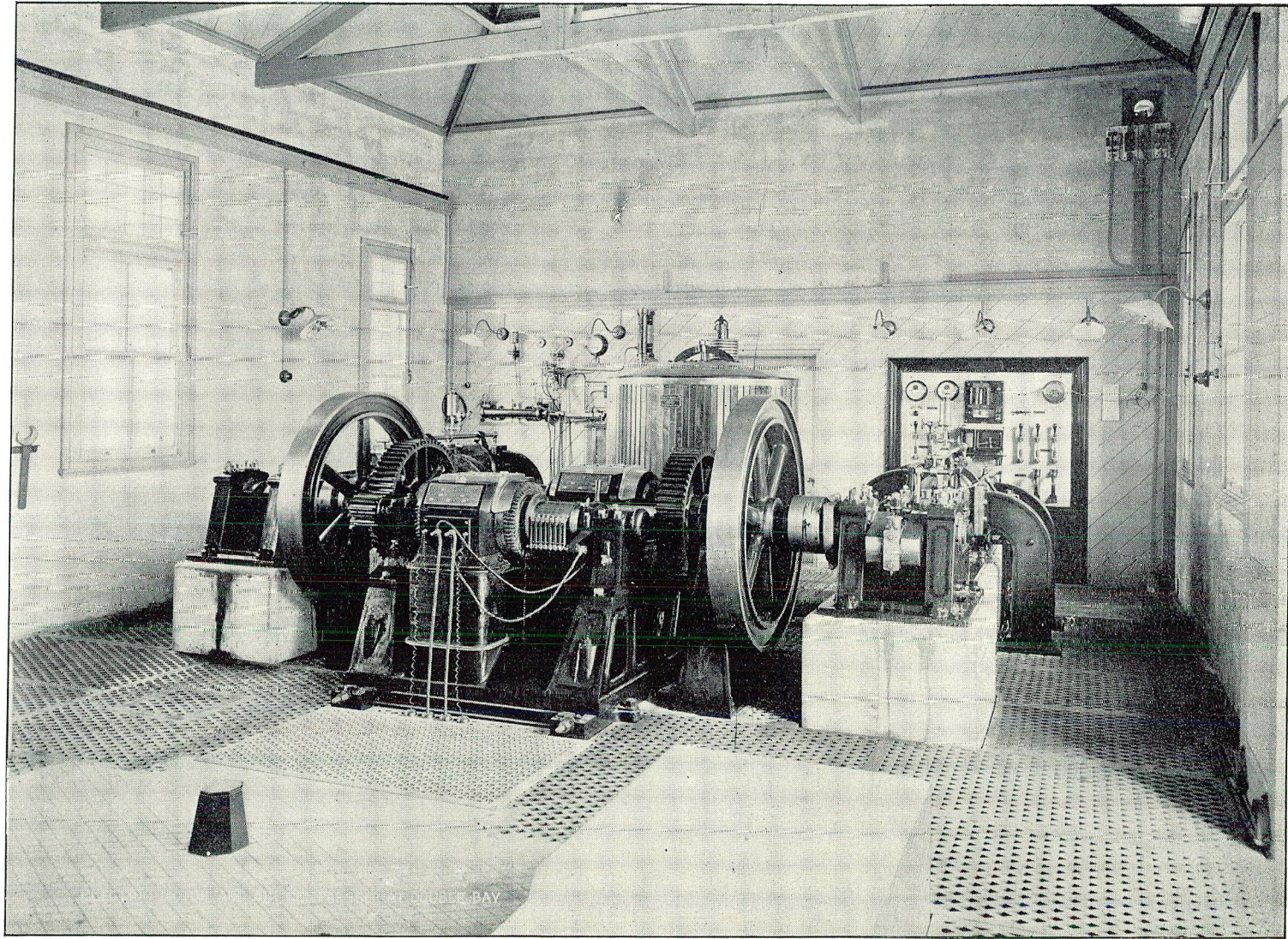

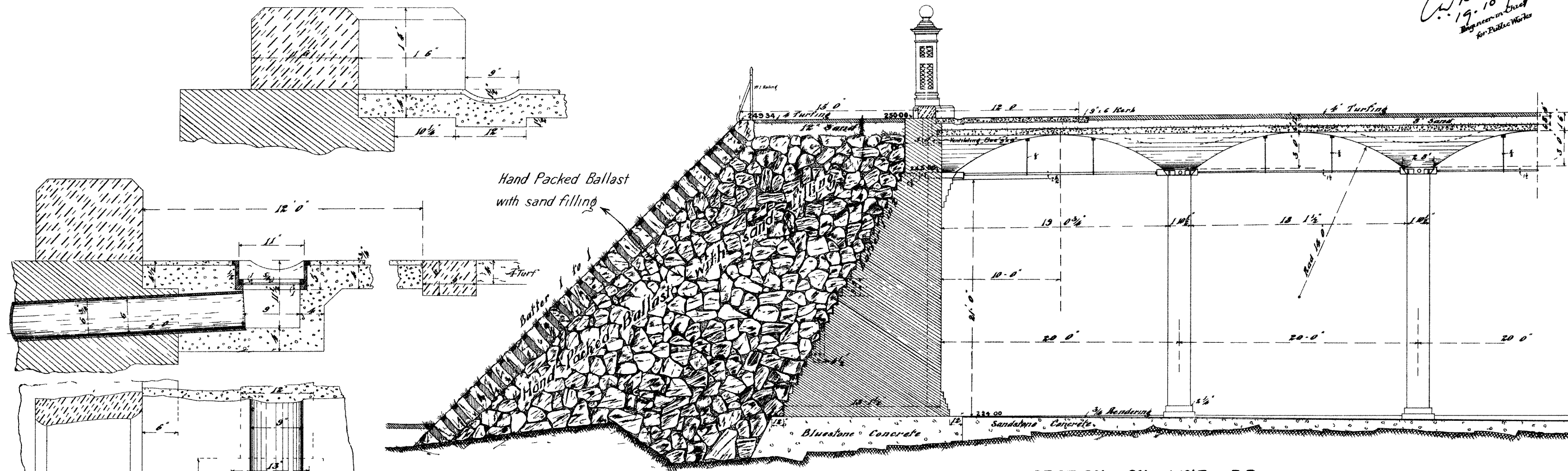

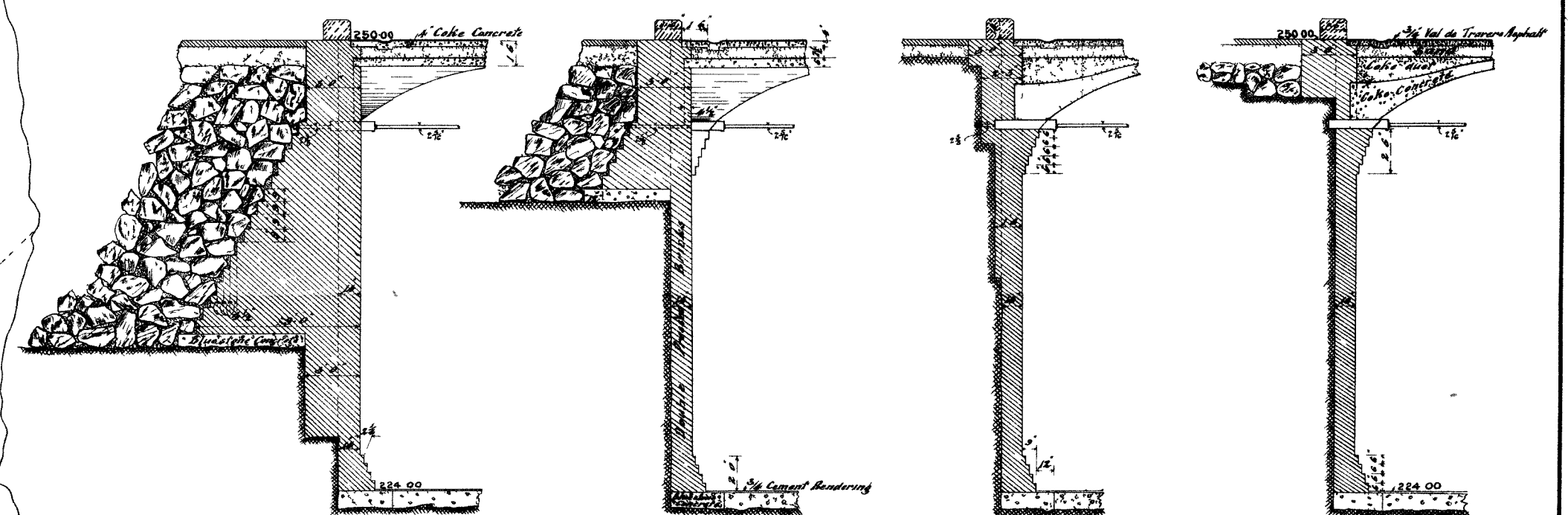

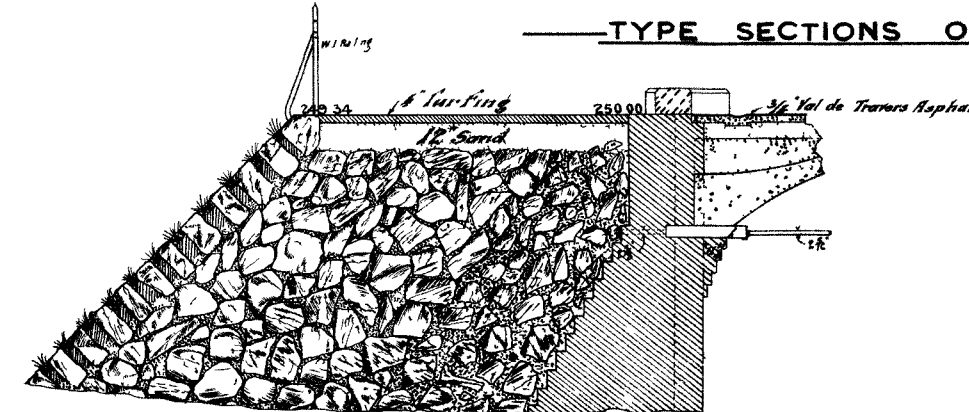

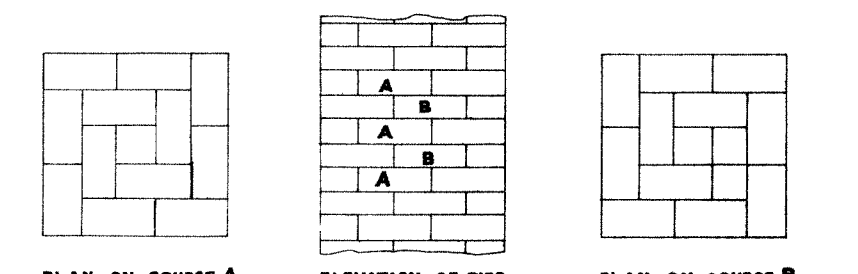

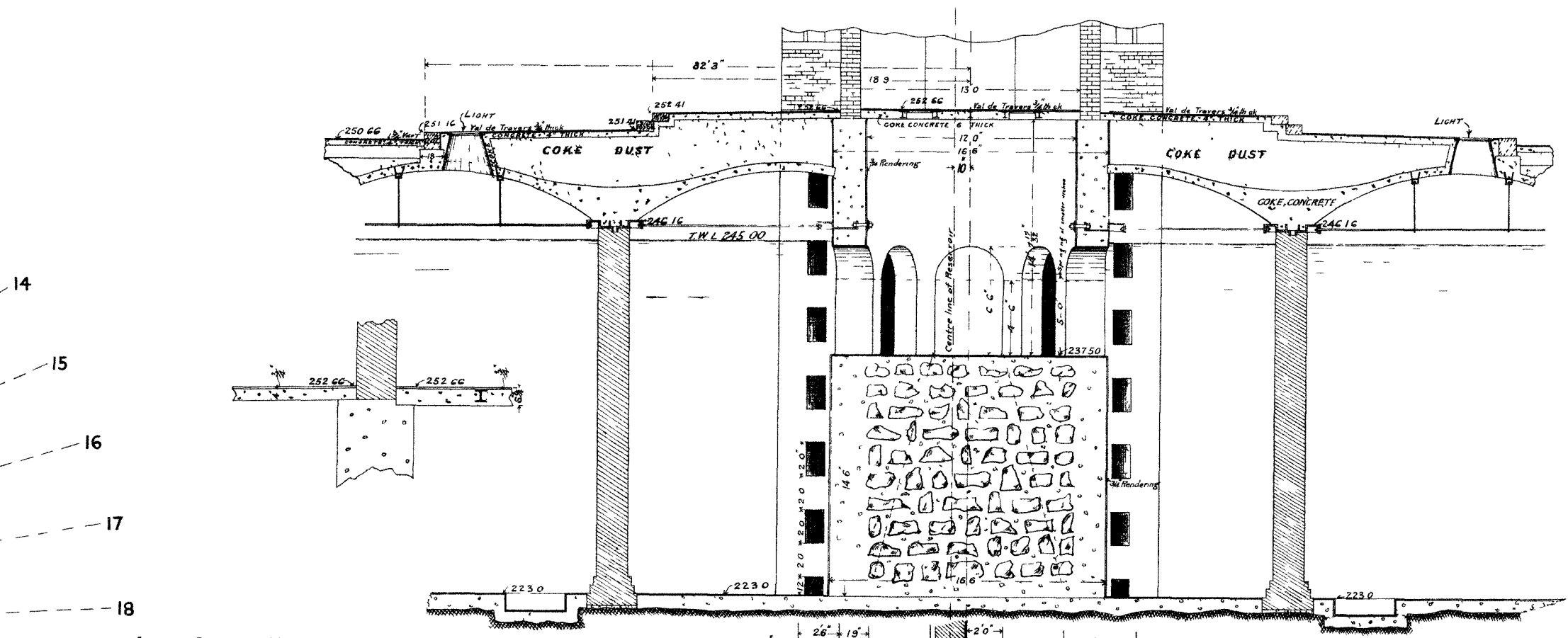
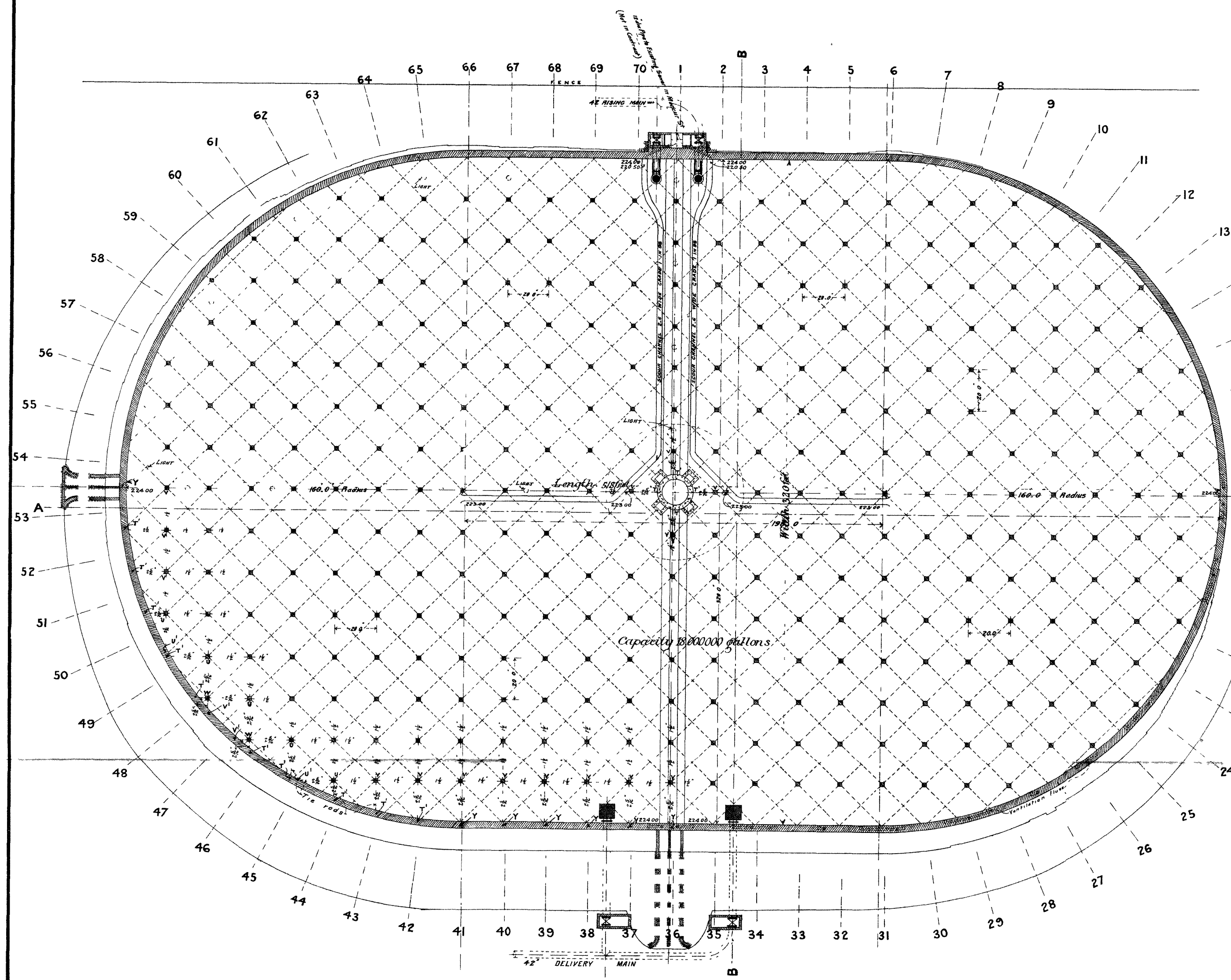
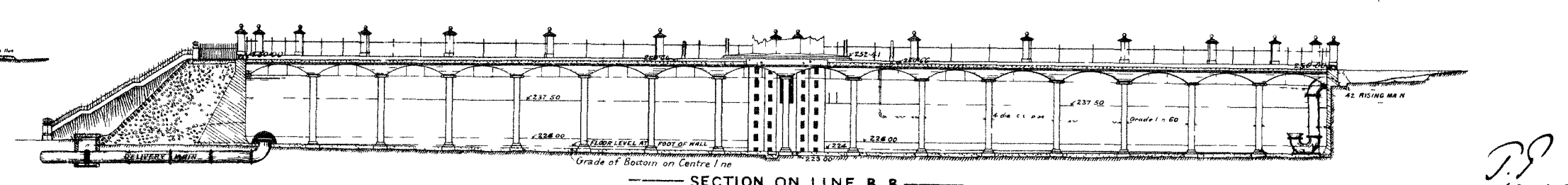
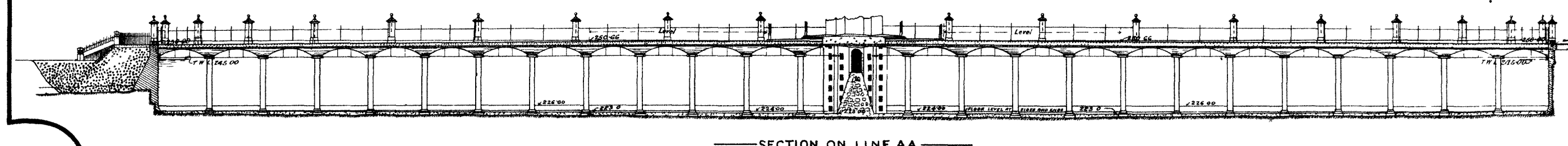
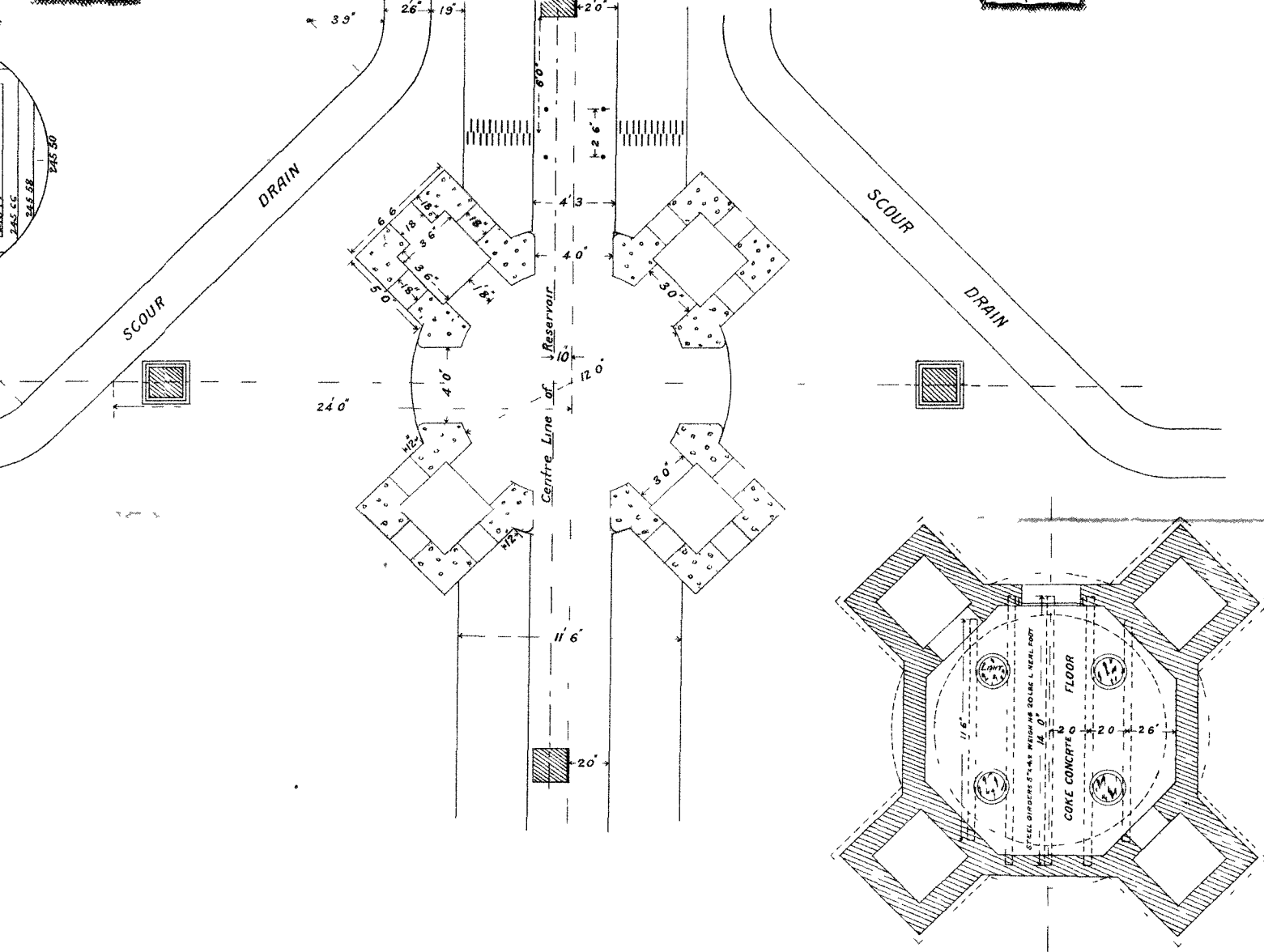
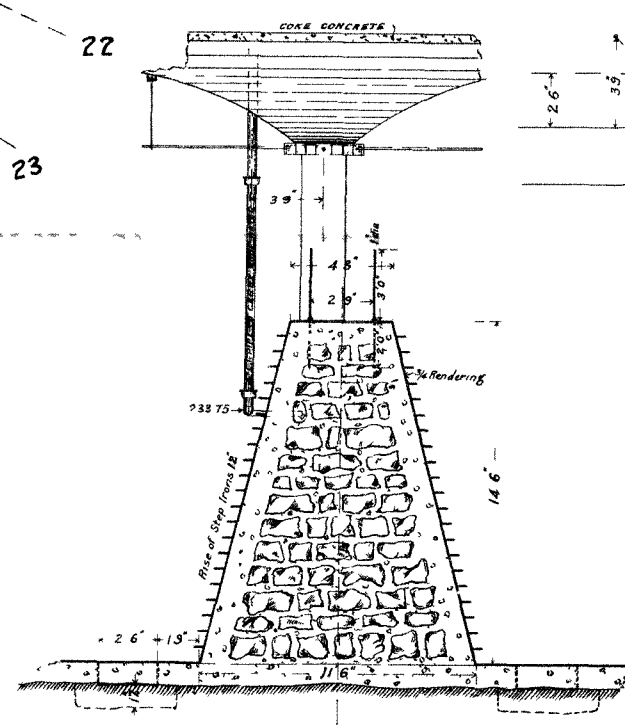
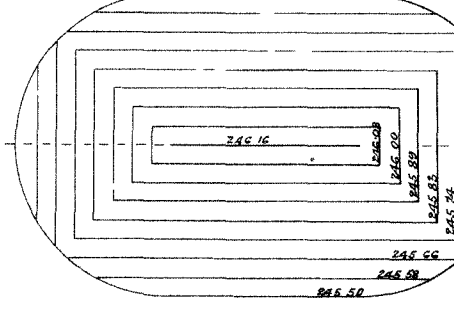


Diagram of Levels of top of Skewbacks

SUPPLEMENTARY THIRTEENTH GENERAL REPORT.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable HENRY ROBERT, VISCOUNT HAMPDEN, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

The Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works, appointed during the first session of the present Parliament, under the Public Works Act of 1888, 51 Vic. No. 37, the Public Works Act Amendment Act of 1889, 52 Vic. No. 26, and the Public Works (Committees' Remuneration) Act of 1889, 53 Vic. No. 11, have the honor to submit the following Supplementary General Report, containing a statement of their proceedings since the date of their last Report, 17th June, 1898 :—

At the period mentioned there were before the Committee the following proposed works respecting which they had not arrived at a decision :—

Of these the Committee have passed two as proposed :—

Harbour Works at Bellinger River	£36,000
Harbour Works at Macleay River	95,000

Four have been passed conditionally or with modifications, as follows :—

RAILWAY FROM BYROCK TO BREWARRINA, with reference to which the Committee recommended that it should be made legally binding upon the Crown lessees in the district served by the railway to pay, until the line should become self-supporting, one farthing per acre rent additional to their present or ordinary assessment, such additional rent to be credited to the Railway Commissioners.

HARBOUR WORKS AT HASTINGS RIVER, which the Committee modified to the extent of recommending for the present the construction of a southern training-wall only, at an estimated cost of £13,915.

HARBOUR WORKS AT MANNING RIVER, in connection with which the Committee were of opinion that the length and height of the northern training-wall could be somewhat reduced and the works on the southern side of the river otherwise improved.

HARBOUR WORKS AT NAMBUCCA RIVER,—this proposal was modified to the extent of recommending a saving of £23,107, which saving may be increased as the construction of the works is proceeded with.

Railway from Narrabri to Pilliga	£128,650
Railway from Woolabra to Collarendabri	207,798
Railway from Maitland to Taree	982,283

In the case of the Railways from Narrabri to Pillaga, and Woolabra to Collarendabri, the Committee suggested in preference to either of these two lines the survey of a route by which a railway would go from Narrabri towards Eurie Eurie, and, if necessary, thence on to Walgett, branching off in a north-westerly direction, at a point 315 miles from Newcastle, to serve Collarendabri.

The Railway from Maitland to Taree the Committee were of opinion should not be constructed.

The Committee have completed their inquiries, and reported to the Legislative Assembly on all the proposals referred to them, with the exception of that relating to the proposed Weirs on the River Darling, between Bourke and Wilcannia, respecting which they were informed by the Department of Public Works that owing to the necessity for making extensive surveys in order to fix suitable sites, prepare designs, and make up estimates, it would not be possible to place the proposal before the Committee for some time to come.

Appended to this Report are returns completed to the present date containing a record of the inquiries by the several Committees appointed under the "Public Works Act," and also a copy of the Committee's Minutes of Proceedings. From those returns it will be seen that the total number of proposals for public works inquired into involves an aggregate expenditure of £20,226,333, and the amount recommended by the Committees £10,960,873. Allowing for repeated references in some instances, the results from the inquiries, up to the present, show a reduction in proposed expenditure, consequent upon the Committees' recommendations, amounting to £6,975,178.

IMPROVEMENT LEASE, FOREST LANDS, PORT STEPHENS.

(PETITION FROM JUSTIN McSWEENEY, OF SYDNEY, TIMBER MERCHANT AND GENERAL CONTRACTOR,
AGAINST GRANTING.)

Received by the Legislative Assembly, 29 September, 1898.

To the Honorable Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales.

The humble Petition of Justin McSweeney, of George-street, Sydney, Timber Merchant and General Contractor,—

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:—

1. That your Petitioner is the owner of certain sawmills and landed property in the district of Port Stephens, in this Colony, upon which he has expended large sums of money, with a view to the carrying on his business of sawmill proprietor in the said district.

2. That there are also in the said district numerous settlers who obtain large quantities of timber therefrom on the payment of a royalty to the Crown on all timber cut by them.

3. That some time since a certain Mr. Withers obtained from the Lands Department of this Colony, in the form of an improvement lease, a concession of some 20,000 acres of land in the Jervis Bay district of this Colony, and placed the same under offer to the firm of Denny, Mott, and Dickinson, of London; that your said Petitioner is informed, and verily believes, that the said concession secured to the said Mr. Withers, and to those to whom he might assign it, the exclusive right to cut and remove all timber from the said area for a period of twenty-one years.

4. That the said firm despatched one Captain Perkes to report upon the said property, and upon his report they declined to accept the offer made to them by the said Mr. Withers.

5. That subsequently your Petitioner is informed, and verily, believes the said Captain Perkes was asked if he would recommend the said firm to accept a similar offer with reference to the forest lands in the Northern district of this Colony, and he replied that such an offer would be favourably considered, and that thereupon inquiries were made as to the various Northern forests, and as a result your Petitioner is informed, and verily believes, that an application has been made by Mr. Withers to obtain a similar concession to that hereinbefore mentioned, in respect to a very large area of land in the parish of Willabah, Port Stephens district, and that it is the intention of the Minister for Lands to grant such concession with respect to the land in the Port Stephens district.

6. That your Petitioner wrote and forwarded a letter to the Under Secretary for Lands, seeking information in respect of the said application, and protesting strongly against the proposed grant of the exclusive right to cut the timber on any large area of land in the said parish of Willabah, or in the Port Stephens district, but that no reply thereto was received. Your Petitioner subsequently, on the 26th September instant, wrote and forwarded a further letter to the said Under Secretary for Lands, on the same subject and to the same effect, and yesterday received a reply to both such letters acknowledging their receipt, and stating that the matter will have consideration.

7. That if the said concession be granted, your Petitioner will suffer very considerable loss in respect of the capital invested in sawmills, plant, and property in the said Port Stephens district, by being debarred from obtaining timber therefor from the forests in the area proposed to be granted, and the local settlers will also suffer severely by any such grant to any person, syndicate, or company of the exclusive right to cut and remove the timber.

8. That your Petitioner desires to bring under your notice the danger to the public interest in allowing any Minister for Lands to enter into arrangements with persons or syndicates which would give them the right to hawk blocks of forest lands of this Colony for sale in the markets of the world.

9. That your Petitioner fears that unless some step is taken by this House of Assembly to prevent the said concession, the same will be granted, and your Petitioner and the local settlers will suffer irreparable loss as aforesaid, and the public interests be endangered, and desires this House should insist that no such arrangement as is herein mentioned be entered into by the Minister for Lands with respect to Forest Lands in the Port Stephens or any other district in this Colony.

And your Petitioner would, therefore, humbly pray,—

1. That this House will ascertain definitely from the Minister for Lands whether it is his intention to grant any such concession as is herein mentioned.
2. That, in the event of such being his intention, this House will be pleased by its vote therein to express its strong disapproval of any such concession being granted, or in the alternative, that a Select Committee of this House be appointed to take evidence and inquire fully into and report upon the said application, the circumstances surrounding the same, the probable consequences that would follow if the concession be granted, and generally into the advisability of the grant; and that in the meantime, and until such report be presented, you will be pleased to take such steps as will prevent such concession being granted.

And your Petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

To the Honorable the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales.

The humble Petition of the undersigned, Selectors and Residents of Unkya and Allgomera, in the Land District of Kempsey,—

HUMBLY SHOWETH:—

Firstly,—That whereas the time allowed to homestead selectors for the erection of a dwelling-house of the value of twenty pounds (£20) is only eighteen months from the time of selection, we consider this time much too short, as the selector has to clear his land for a crop (the first year generally getting next to nothing), and erect necessary fencing, &c., &c. We therefore humbly pray that the time be extended from eighteen months to three years.

Secondly,—That whereas the area of cultivable land on one homestead selection is frequently too small to support a family, we therefore humbly pray that in the Eastern Division the homestead selector be allowed to take up an additional portion, the total area not to exceed (say) two hundred acres.

Thirdly,—That whereas the capital value in many instances has been fixed too high, we therefore humbly pray that the homestead selections in the Eastern Division be revalued.

APPLICATION OF WILLIAM HENRY MONAGHAN FOR
CONDITIONAL PURCHASE.

(PETITION RESPECTING.)

Received by the Legislative Assembly, 22 December, 1898.

To the Honorable the Speaker and the Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in
Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of William Henry Monaghan,—

MOST FAITHFULLY SHOWETH:—

That your Petitioner, now about nine years ago, did conditionally purchase three hundred acres of land on Flagstone Creek, in the Land District of Parkes, and paid as deposit thereon the sum of thirty pounds sterling, and pointed out to the Land Agent the land your Petitioner was desirous of purchasing, which the said Land Agent informed your Petitioner was open to conditional purchase, but that a form of application was necessary. Your Petitioner then paid the said Land Agent twelve shillings and sixpence for filling the said form, but which was filled by the said Land Agent's daughter, who was at the time in the office. But, then, on the following Thursday the lessee of the run on which the land is situate selected the same land as your Petitioner, and that when the applications came before the Local Land Board the name of the lessee was called before the name of your Petitioner, and your Petitioner's land allotted to him; and your Petitioner was then allotted different land, which your Petitioner would not take, it being very inferior, so your Petitioner's money was confiscated; so that from that day to this your Petitioner has no land and no home.

Your Petitioner, therefore, feels aggrieved, and most humbly supplicates your Honorable House to take those premises into your earliest consideration and grant relief.

APPLICATION OF MICHAEL MADDEN FOR CONDITIONAL
PURCHASE AND CONDITIONAL LEASE.

(PETITION RESPECTING.)

To the Honorable the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in
Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of Michael Madden,—

MOST FAITHFULLY SHOWETH:—

That your Petitioner, about nine years ago, conditionally purchased about five hundred acres of land, and paid as a deposit thereon fifty pounds sterling, and conditionally did lease seven hundred and fifty acres, and paid as rent six pounds five shillings sterling thereon, the said land being situate on Flagstone Creek, in the Land District of Parkes. Your Petitioner pointing out to the Land Agent on the plan the land your Petitioner wished to select, which the said Land Agent said was open to selection, but that a form of application was necessary. Your Petitioner then paid the said Land Agent twelve shillings and sixpence for filling up the requisite form, and which was filled up by the said Land Agent's daughter, who was then in the office; but on the following Thursday the lessee of the run on which the land was situated selected the land previously selected by your Petitioner.

That at the sitting of the Local Land Board the lessee's name was called before the name of your Petitioner, and your Petitioner's land allotted to him, and your Petitioner's money confiscated; so that from that to this your Petitioner has got no land, as your Petitioner has no money wherewith to purchase land.

Your Petitioner, therefore, feels aggrieved, and most humbly supplicates your Honorable House to take action in the matter and grant relief, and your Petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.
