Bills

- Members were reminded of the importance of a second reading speech, 14671 (06.05.09). 14672 (06.05.09). 16098 (17.06.09)
- Speeches are constrained by the long title of the bill and should not be tedious or repetitious. The member with the call had not contravened the traditions of the House and was allowed to proceed, 16134 (17.06.09)
- A member who had intended to speak to a bill was locked out of the Chamber at a time when, if present, he would have sought the call. Because no member sought the call, the Chair gave the call to the Parliamentary Secretary to reply to the second reading debate. That members are not present to participate in debate when the bells have been rung and the House begins to sit is neither here nor there: it is a matter for them. If members wish to contribute to a particular debate, they should be present when the debate is called on. However, if a

member intends to speak but is physically unable to enter the Chamber, a matter of privilege arises. The Chair called off the division and gave the call as a matter of privilege to the member who was unable to enter the Chamber, 16468 (23.06.09)

- By definition, and in accordance with tradition, in a House of review the second reading debate may be wide ranging. During the debate members had referred extensively to the bill, to previous governments and even to members in the other place. Equally, any reply to the debate may be wide ranging, 16691 (24.06.09)
- A member may, subject to the standing orders, make a statement during debate on the third reading of a bill, 16709 (24.06.09)
- The Chair reminded members that the purpose of the third reading of a bill is to ensure a last opportunity to oppose the legislation. Debate on the third reading should be confined to that question, 16710 (24.06.09). a member was asked to address the third reading of the bill, 16710 (24.06.09)

Debate

- Members should not read their speeches. They should not read lengthy extracts from books, documents or other articles. Extracts should be read in as precise a manner as possible. However, it is the convention that members may refer to copious notes, 14370 (02.04.09). 14371 (02.04.09)
- The Chair reminded members that President Johnson had said on a number of occasions that Presidents are given a lot of gifts but clairvoyance was not amongst them. Members who wish to seek the call should rise in their places and use words to the effect, "Mr President", 16615 (24.06.09)

Divisions

The Chair called off the division and gave the call as a matter of privilege to the member who was unable to enter the Chamber, 16468 (23.06.09)

Documents

- A member claimed that another member came close to violating privilege by referring to certain documents. The Chair had not seen the material, but asked members to bear in mind that the material was confidential, 12886 (04.03.09)
- A member had sought leave to incorporate two reports in *Hansard*. However, as the member was consulting with other members on the matter, the Chair would not put the question to the House until and unless the member renewed her request to have the documents incorporated, 13838 (26.03.09)

Interjections, interruptions and disorder

Conversation

- Members who wish to conduct private conversations should do so outside the Chamber, 13659 (25.03.09). 13666 (25.03.09). 14349 (02.04.09)
- There was too much audible conversation in the Chamber and the President's Gallery. People who wished to remain in the gallery were asked to cease conversing, 14572 (05.05.09)
- The Chair had difficulty hearing the member with the call. Members were asked to have regard to the efforts of Hansard in trying to report the eloquent words of members, 15599 (03.06.09)
- Members were asked to desist from having loud conversations, 16659 (24.06.09)

Interjections

- Members should not respond to interjections, 13359 (12.03.09). 14349 (02.04.09). 14361 (02.04.09). 13827 (26.03.09). 14324 (02.04.09). 16295 (18.06.09).
- Interjections are disorderly at all times, 13570 (24.03.09). 14175 (01.04.09). 14375 (02.04.09). 16135 (17.06.09). 16629 (24.06.09). and the most basic right of the member with the call is to be heard. The Chair would take appropriate action if members failed to give that respect, 14175 (01.04.09)
- The Chair does not stop interjections when they are part of the flow of debate, except when they become disorderly. However, if a member

baits another member it is difficult for the Chair to maintain order. Members will adhere to the standing orders, 14326 (02.04.09)

- The Chair reminded members that the rules of the House do not provide for members to have afternoon sleeps. The Chair asked members who had the grizzles to leave the Chamber. The Chair asked members who remained to allow the member with the call to speak free of interjections, 14841 (07.05.09)
- A member who was in fine voice was asked to tone down his interjections, 14972 (12.05.09)
- Hansard had difficulty reporting the proceedings because members kept interjecting on the member with the call, 16444 (23.06.09)
- A practice had developed in the House where members acknowledged interjections, which are disorderly at all times. In accordance with tradition. the Chair tolerates interjections that facilitate debate and However, the fundamental argument. privilege of the member with the call to speak freely and be heard is breached when other members continually interject. The Chair will not interfere to require members not to interject so long as the interjections facilitate debate and do not cause disruption and infringe on a member's fundamental privilege to be heard, 16631 (24.06.09)
- Given members had agreed to a matter being debated, the Chair presumed that they were of the view that it was important. Therefore, the member with the call was entitled to contribute to the debate without interruption, 16657 (24.06.09)
- The Chair thanked members for respecting the right of members to speak freely and be heard. The Chair invited a member to speak in reply and asked that she be accorded the same respect, 16659 (24.06.09)

Interruptions

The Chamber was a place for debate and members were required to observe its forms. While people in the public gallery may be concerned about a number of issues, they too must observe the forms of the House, 15737 (04.06.09)

Order and decorum

- Members should direct their comments through the Chair, 13563 (24.03.09). 14353 (02.04.09). 14361 (02.04.09). 15611 (03.06.09). 15779 (04.06.09). 16467 (23.06.09)
- There was excessive jocularity in the Chamber, 14168 (01.04.09)
- Members should refer to other members by their correct titles, 14844 (07.05.09)
- Members were asked to allow the debate to continue with some decorum, 16147 (17.06.09)
- Although debate is robust, members should treat the question before the House with the decorum it deserves, 16298 (18.06.09)

Points of order

- A member was asked to make her point, 13355 (12.03.09)
- A member was asked to state his point of order, 13535 (24.03.09). 13676 (25.03.09). repeat his point of order, 13559 (24.03.09)
- The Chair was pleased that a member was not making debating points, 13692 (25.03.09)
- The Chair had heard enough on a point of order, 15122 (13.05.09).
- The Chair could not hear the point of order, 16425 (23.06.09)
- A member took a point of order and made a statement as part of that point of order. The Chair ruled that there was no point of order. Accordingly, the Chair did not regard the statement made by the member to be a statement to the House. The member took a point of order and the Chair ruled it out of order, 16710 (24.06.09)

Questions without notice

- The Leader of the Opposition will allow the Minister to answer the question, 14320 (02.04.09).
- A member had asked an important question, which the Minister had been seeking to answer. Because

of constant interjections the Chair had not heard most of the answer. Members were asked to allow the Minister to continue to be generally relevant, 15101 (13.05.09)

- A member was skating on thin ice. If a question was worth asking, it was reasonable that the Minister be allowed to answer it, 15101 (13.05.09)
- Hansard must be having difficulty reporting the proceedings. Members should allow the Minister to respond to the important question, 16085 (17.06.09)
- A member was asked to cease interjecting and to allow the Minister to answer the question, 16635 (24.06.09)

Long bell

In accordance with precedent, as there was no Minister or Parliamentary Secretary in the House the Chair left the chair until the ringing of one long bell, 16728 (24.06.09)

Ministerial statements

The Chair reminded members of Standing Order 48 (2), which states that the Leader of the Opposition or a member nominated by the Leader of the Opposition may speak to a ministerial statement. Therefore, the Chair assumed that the member with the call was the person nominated by the Leader of the Opposition. It was in order for her to respond to the ministerial statement, 12758 (03.03.09)

Notices of motions

A member had given notice of a motion under Standing Order 52 calling for documents concerning the removal from office and withdrawal of commissions of Mr Tony Stewart, MP. The motion also called for documents relating to subsequent legal action. As documents related to the subsequent legal action fall within the administration of justice, under Standing Order 53 they may only be requested in the form of an address to the Governor. This part of the motion was therefore out of order. The Chair directed the Clerk to amend the notice accordingly, 16638 (24.06.09)

Offensive and objectionable remarks, imputations and aspersions

- Members cannot reflect on other members except by way of substantive motion. Imputations of improper motives to, or personal reflections on, members are deemed to be disorderly at all times, 12989 (05.03.09). 14672 (06.05.09). 15795 (04.06.09). 15796 (04.06.09). 16298 (18.06.09). 16524 (23.06.09). 16632 (24.06.09). 16633 (24.06.09)
- Members simply citing the fact that something is in a newspaper is not adequate in this House. If a member wishes to cite a matter as having been in the media as a basis for an allegation, then the member should be able and willing to say that he or she authorises and believes that to be the case, 12989 (05.03.09)
- The Chair reminded a member of a ruling of President Chadwick on 17 November 1998 in relation to improper reflections on the motives of members, 12989 (05.03.09)
- If a member wished to withdraw the words referred to, the Chair would not need to rule on the matter, 13866 (26.03.09)
- A member was reminded of the standing orders relating to accusations against other members, 14085 (31.03.09)
- The Chair reminded members of a 1987 ruling by President Johnson, which stated:

... when a person is in public life and a Member of Parliament, the risk of being criticised in a political way must be taken. Politics is not an area for sensitive persons. In the course of debate when members canvass the opinions and conduct of their opponents, they must expect criticism. 14180 (01.04.09)

- While the language of the member was unparliamentary, previous Presidents had ruled that objection must be taken by the member at whom the remark was directed, 15779 (04.06.09)
- A member was asked to consider withdrawing the imputation, 16135 (17.06.09)
- A member was sailing close to the wind with regard to using arguments, inferences and imputations. However, Standing Order 65 (1) had not been transgressed, 16636 (24.06.09)

Expressions withdrawn or required to be withdrawn

Points of order

Not involved, 12768 (03.03.09), 12859 (04.03.09), 12861 (04.03.09), 13000 (05.03.09), 13351 (12.03.09), 13559 (24.03.09), 13676 (25.03.09), 13678 (25.03.09), 14085 (31.03.09), 14360 (02.04.09), 14361 (02.04.09), 14569 (05.05.09), 14679 (06.05.09), 15307 (14.05.09), 15779 (04.06.09), 16709 (24.06.09)

Upheld

- Members cannot reflect on other members except by way of substantive motion, 12989 (05.03.09)
- A supplementary question was ruled out of order because it repeated the original question, 13002 (05.03.09)
- A procedural motion was before the House and that the only comments that were in order were those that related to why the matter should proceed, 15121 (13.05.09)
- Interjections are disorderly at all times, 14375 (02.04.09)
- The Chair allowed the section of the question that, correctly, asked the Minister to elucidate his answer. How the Minister chose to elucidate was obviously a matter for the Minister, 15292 (14.05.09)
- Ministers are required to give a generally relevant answer to the question asked, 16447 (23.06.09)

Privilege

A member claimed that another member came close to violating privilege by referring to certain documents. The Chair had not seen the material, but asked members to bear in mind that the material was confidential, 12886 (04.03.09)

Procedure

When debating a procedural motion members should restrict their comments to the motion and not the substantive motion, 12885 (04.03.09). 13008 (05.03.09). 13690 (25.03.09). 13691 (25.03.09). 15087 (13.05.09). 16426 (23.06.09). and the

Procedure (continued)

only comments that are in order relate to why the item of business should proceed and other items should be delayed, 16649 (24.06.09). 16651 (24.06.09). 16652 (24.06.09). The Chair would not take up the time of members to again explain why the point of order was upheld, 15121 (13.05.09)

- A member was asked to confine her remarks as to whether standing and sessional orders should be suspended, 12886 (04.03.09)
- A member had sought leave to suspend standing and sessional orders to allow her to move a motion to seek precedence to introduce a bill. The standing orders do not provide that members be consulted in relation to bills. Members may consult with whomever they wish in relation to their bills. Bills are presented to the House when they are introduced, 12986 (05.03.09)
- Arguing the importance of a matter is not the same as arguing its urgency relative to that of other items of business on the *Notice Paper*. A member was asked to bear that in mind as she proceeded, 13691 (25.03.09), 16651 (24.06.09)
- A member arguing why a matter is urgent is not the same as a member making a case to establish its importance. The Chair presumed that members would not place items on the *Notice Paper* they did not believe were important, 15121 (13.05.09)
- The Chair again presumed that members would not place items on the *Notice Paper* they did not believe were important. Arguing whether something is important was not the issue before the House. A procedural motion was before the House and, consequently, the only comments that were in order were those that relate to why one item of business should proceed and the other items of business should be delayed. Members must confine their remarks to that, rather than address the substantive motion, 15122 (13.05.09)
- The Chair referred members to Standing Order 200, which states that members are required to establish a degree of urgency sufficient for the House to agree to the motion. Often in matters of this nature it is necessary to give some indication of the substance of the debate

to follow in order to establish the degree of urgency necessary. In putting their case members should make statements that bear on the question of urgency rather than the substantive issue, 13692 (25.03.09).

- Although a member had not given contingent notice to suspend standing orders to allow an item of business to proceed, as no point of order was taken and as the House agreed to the matter being called on, it proceeded, 15458 (02.06.09)
- In accordance with precedent, as there was no Minister or Parliamentary Secretary in the House the Chair left the chair until the ringing of one long bell, 16728 (24.06.09)

Questions without notice

- A question did not contain any more argument than would normally be found in a question asked in the House. Therefore, the question was not ruled out of order, 13137 (10.03.09)
- Standing Order 95 requires the Chair to enforce the standing orders and rules of the House. The Chair had observed that thus far during question time a number of questions had contained argument, inferences. imputations. ironical expressions, hypothetical matters, and requests for expressions of opinion and statements of Government policy. The Chair urged members to refer to Standing Order 65 and, if further assistance was required, to consult the Clerks before drafting their questions, 13224 (11.03.09)
- Earlier in question time a point of order had been taken in relation to a question seeking an announcement of Government policy. The Chair was guided by *Odgers' Australian Senate Practice* and ruled the question in order. The Chair asked the member to restate her question, 13358 (12.03.09).
- The Chair advised a member that questions without notice is not a debate, 13355 (12.03.09). that members cannot debate questions, 13847 (26.03.09). 16637 (24.06.09). but they can debate the issue to which it refers, 16637 (24.06.09)
- A Minister must not debate the question, but may debate the substance of the question, 15750

Questions without notice (continued)

(04.06.09). Ministers must not debate questions asked of them other than to refer to the actual issues raised in them, 16075 (17.06.09)

- The Treasurer was not debating the question; he was debating the policies of another party, 13841 (26.03.09)
- Question ruled out of order, 15749 (04.06.09). because it made inferences and contained argument, 13355 (12.03.09). 14177 (01.04.09). 14327 (02.04.09). because it did not relate to public affairs with which the Minister was connected, 14025 (31.03.09). 14177 (01.04.09).
- Questions and answers to questions should not contain inferences or imputations against another member, 13355 (12.03.09)
- The Government Whip argued that the question sought an announcement of Government policy. The Chair's understanding was that the question sought a statement on existing policy. The Chair would seek guidance and rule on the question before the conclusion of questions without notice, 13357 (12.03.09)
- A member was asked to rephrase his question, 14024 (31.03.09)
- While the Chair understood the concerns raised by the Government Whip, the question did not breach the standing orders and was therefore in order. The Chair asked the Minister to respond, 14174 (01.04.09)
- The Chair understood the member's concerns about terms such as "will the Minister announce". However, having reviewed the question in its entirety, the Chair ruled it in order, 14673 (06.05.09)
- The Chair asked members to bear in mind Standing Order 65 (1) and (2) before framing their questions. It is out of order for members to ask for expressions of opinions. However, the part of the question that asked the Minister to explain the rationale behind the decision was in order and the Chair invited the Minister to answer that part of the question if he wished to do so, 16279 (18.06.09)

Supplementary questions

- A supplementary question was ruled out of order because it repeated the original question, 13002 (05.03.09). because it was a separate question, 16276 (18.06.09)
- Supplementary questions may be asked at the discretion of the President. The Chair allowed the section of the question that, correctly, asked the Minister to elucidate his answer. How the Minister chose to elucidate was obviously a matter for the Minister, 15292 (14.05.09)
- The Chair allowed the supplementary question, 15563 (03.06.09). 16276 (18.06.09). but the member could not take a point of clarification, 16276 (18.06.09)
- A member had not asked a supplementary question, 16445 (23.06.09)

Minister's latitude

- Ministers are required to give a generally relevant answer to the question asked, 12765 (03.03.09), 13004 (05.03.09), 13005 (05.03.09), 13224 (11.03.09), 13227 (11.03.09), 13353 (12.03.09), 13535 (24.03.09), 13841 (26.03.09), 13847 (26.03.09), 14174 (01.04.09), 14319 (02.04.09), 14324 (02.04.09), 14567, (05.05.09), 14569, (05.05.09), 14829 (07.05.09), 14598 (12.05.09), 15001 (12.05.09), 16075 (17.06.09), 16281 (18.06.09), 16632 (24.06.09), rulings of former Presidents clearly defined what was meant by "generally relevant", 13200 (11.03.09), 15101 (13.05.09), 15285 (14.05.09), 15291 (14.05.09), members were asked to allow the Minister to continue to be generally relevant, 15101 (13.05.09)
- The Chair had asked the Minister to be generally relevant. A member claimed that the Minister was flouting the ruling. The Chair took the point of order under consideration, 13227 (11.03.09)
- The Chair cannot direct Ministers how to answer questions, 13229 (11.03.09), compel Ministers to answer questions in a manner different from that which they choose, 14829 (07.05.09), 15104 (13.05.09)
- It is not for the Chair to direct a Minister how to answer a question. Standing orders require an answer that is relevant to the question,

and members must not debate the question. Again, the Chair asked the Minister to be generally relevant, 14175 (01.04.09)

Relevance

- Members will address the bill, 14168 (01.04.09). 16624 (24.06.09). confine their remarks to the long title of the bill, 14672 (06.05.09). speeches are constrained by the long title of the bill and should not be tedious or repetitious. The member with the call had not contravened the traditions of the House and was allowed to proceed, 16134 (17.06.09)
- While debate on the second reading of a bill may be wide ranging, members will address the substance of the bill, 14361 (02.04.09)
- The Chair extends considerable latitude to members during debate on private members' motions. The use of epithets, while contrary to the standing orders when asking questions, is not contrary to the standing orders when debating motions such as that before the House. However, it is contrary to the practice of the House for members to refer to other members by anything other than their correct title. The Chair urged all members to extend that customary respect to one another during the debate, 14844 (07.05.09)
- A member was asked to address the question of urgency, 15086 (13.05.09)

Use of electronic devices

The Chair acknowledged that the use of electronic devices in the Chamber needed to be addressed. The Chair undertook to take up the matter and report back to the House. The Chair made it clear that it was not the intention to suppress the use of electronic devices but rather to have a general policy on the issue, 12763 (03.03.09)

The Chair advised members that they would be called when their amendments were due to be moved, 13232 (n.03.09)

- The Chair ruled in favour of the member speaking to the motion that the clause be agreed to, 13232 (11.03.09)
- The Chair explained to the member that her amendment was consequential on the omission of part 5. As it was not omitted, Greens amendment No. 2 could not be moved, 13238 (no.09)
- The Chair allowed a member to move her amendment, but pointed out that if it were agreed to the bill would look unusual, 13239 (11.03.09)
- The amendment dealt with the Barangaroo Delivery Authority Bill 2009. Therefore, it was not appropriate for members to refer at length to another development that is not associated with Barangaroo headland park. The member's comments may have been relevant during the second reading debate, but they were not appropriate in the consideration of the amendment, 13704 (25.03.09)
- A member was reminded of Standing Order 92 (1) and asked to confine her remarks to the amendment before the Committee. The member's comments in relation to extraneous matters were bordering on repetitious, 13705 (25.03.09)
- It was not appropriate for a member to speak further at that time. The member could seek the call after the Parliamentary Secretary moved the Government's amendment, 16141 (17.06.09)
- An amendment had not been moved. The Committee was dealing with part 1 of the bill, and members were speaking against the adoption of it, 16480 (23.06.09)

Announcements

Behaviour of members in the public gallery, 15752 (04.06.09) [*See also*, Interruptions]

In Committee

The motion moved by a member was in order. In accordance with Standing Order 173 (6), the motion must be moved without debate and immediately put and determined, and it could not be repeated within 15 minutes, 16151 (70609)

- An amendment had not been moved. The Committee was dealing with part 1 of the bill, and members were speaking against the adoption of it, 16480 (23.06.09)
- It was not in order for a member to move that a clause be deleted. However, a member could argue that members should not vote to adopt the clause, 16726 (24.06.09)

Interjections, interruptions and disorder

Conversation

- Members were asked to cease chatting or leave the Chamber. Members who were trying to follow the debate were having difficulty hearing the member with the call, 14378 (02.04.09)
- Members will not engage in conversation in the Chamber, 16483 (23.06.09)

Interjections

- Interjections are disorderly at all times, 13584 (24.03.09). 16477 (23.06.09)
- Members who wished to participate in a discussion with the member with the call should do so after his speech and not interject during his speech, 14042 (31.03.09)
- Members should not interject and the member with the call should not respond to interjections, 16712 (24.06.09). 16715 (24.06.09)

Interruptions

Members of the public are welcome in the public gallery of the Chamber. However, it is expected that they will observe the normal courtesies that the House demands and not attempt to participate in or disrupt proceedings. The Chair outlined the behaviour expected of visitors. People in the public gallery who did not abide by the standards of behaviour expected of them would be asked to leave, 15752 (04.06.09), the Chair reminded people in the public gallery of her earlier ruling, 15755 (04.06.09), 15758 (04.06.09), the Chair directed the attendants to remove the person who was interjecting from the public gallery, 15758 (04.06.09). 15764 (04.06.09)

If members continued to flout the rulings of the Chair on this issue, the Chair would have no choice but to direct members to sit down, 18349 (21.10.09), if the House wished to change the standing orders, it was free to do so, otherwise the Chair was obliged to enforce them, 18349 (21.10.09), the Chair reminded members of the earlier ruling, 18350 (21.10.09)
- Members were again reminded to address the question before the Chair, 18352 (21.10.09), The member with the call was reminded that she may reply to debate on the substantive matter at the appropriate time. However, this was a procedural matter and the member was asked to confine her comments to debating whether this matter should or should not be adjourned, 18352 (21.10.09)
- Clearly it was impossible for members, when debating a motion to adjourn debate on a

The member with the call was asked to bear in mind the ruling as she continued her contribution, 18353 (21.10.09)

- Members were referred to the earlier rulings of the Chair. Those who read the debate in *Hansard* would make up their own minds about the intention of the motion of the member. However, the House would ultimately decide whether to support the motion, 18354 (21.10.09)
- Although the Chair is obliged to enforce the standing orders, ultimately the decisions of the House are made by the majority of members. The question before the Chair was whether debate should be adjourned, and ultimately a decision would be made by the House. Members were asked to confine their remarks to that question. Members who continued to address the substantive issue would be directed to resume their seats, 18354 (21.10.09)
- The Chair had ruled on the point of order. The member would address whether the House should adjourn the debate, 18354 (21.10.09)
- The Chair gave a final warning to members. It was not the wish of the Chair to direct members to resume their seats, but the Chair has an obligation to enforce the standing orders that the House has imposed on itself. - The debate was somewhat complex. The Chair had ruled that it was appropriate in the debate for a ember to allude to the substantive matter. However, the member with the call was asked to address the procedural matter that was before the House, 18355 (21.10.09)

The issue is why this item of business is urgent and should be debated before any other item on the *Notice Paper*, 18821 (28.10.09), The member was asked to bear in mind the earlier ruling relating to relativity. The only specific restriction on answers is that they must be generally relevant to the question asked and that Ministers must not debate the question. However, Ministers may address the actual issue to which the question refers. If the Minister is seeking to address the actual issue to which the question refers, he is in order.
