WHEREAS the Parliament of New South Wales now stands prorogued to Monday, the thirty-first day of May instant : Now I, Sir GERALD STRICKLAND, Count della Catena in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested as Governor of the said State, do hereby further prorogue the said Parliament to Tuesday, the fifteenth day of June next : And I do hereby further announce and proclaim that the said Parliament shall assemble for the despatch of business on the aforesaid fifteenth day of June next at twelve o'clock at noon, in the buildings known as the Legislative Council Chambers, situate in Macquarie-street, in the city of Sydney : And the members of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, respectively, are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my hand and seal, at Sydney, this twenty-sixth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and in the sixth year of his Majesty's reign.

PUBLIC STATUTES OF THE SESSION.

TWENTY-THIRD PARLIAMENT—FOURTH SESSION.

APIARIES ACT (GEO. V No. 24, 1910)—

An Act to regulate the bee industry; to prevent the spread of disease in bees; and for purposes incidental thereto or consequent thereon. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Ashford, 27 October, 1915. Assented to, 19 April, 1916.]

APPRENTICES (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 58, 1915)—

An Act to protect the interests of apprentices enlisting for active service; to amend the Apprentices Act, 1901, and the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Estell, 10 November, 1915. Assented to, 21st December, 1915.]

APPROPRIATION ACT (GEO. V No. 39, 1915)—

An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain Sums to make good the Supplies granted for the Service of the year from the 1st day of July, 1915, to the 30th day of June, 1916 (inclusive of both dates); to adjust the vote "Advance to Treasurer," 1914-15, Consolidated Revenue Fund, for supplementary charges during the period from the 1st day of July, 1914, to the 30th day of June, 1915 (inclusive of both dates); to cover payments "Unauthorised in Suspense," Consolidated Revenue Fund, for urgent claims on account of Services of the year 1914-15; to provide for Public Works and other Services out of the Public Works Fund; and to provide for Services out of the Closer Settlement Fund; and for purposes connected with and incidental to the above objects. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 2 November, 1915. Assented to, 3 December, 1915.]

AUCTIONEERS LICENSING (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 41, 1915)—

An Act to enable auctioneers to sell wool after sunset in the area of the municipality of Albury; to amend the Auctioneers' Licensing Act, 1898, and the Acts relating to early closing. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. D. R. Hall, 14 October, 1915. Assented to, 13 December, 1915.]

BARMEDMAN TO RANKIN'S SPRINGS RAILWAY ACT (GEO. V No. 46, 1915)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a line of railway from Barmedman to Rankin's Springs; to provide for the use of the line by the Constructing Authority, or by persons authorised by him; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for other purposes consequent thereon and incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 10 December, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

BOWENFELS TO DIWANA RAILWAY DEVIATION ACT (GEO. V No. 19, 1915)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a deviation line of the Main Western Railway line between Bowenfels and Diwana; to provide for the use of the said line by the Chief Commissioner for Railways, or by persons authorised by him; and for purposes consequent thereon and incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 7 July, 1915. Assented to, 27 July, 1915.]

BROKEN HILL TRADES HALL SITE EXTENSION ACT (GEO. V No. 42, 1915)—

An Act to vest certain lands at Broken Hill in trustees on trust for the purposes of and in connection with a trades hall; to amend the Broken Hill Trades Hall Site Act of 1898; and for purposes incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 30 September, 1915. Assented to, 14 December, 1915.]

BROKEN HILL WATER SUPPLY ADMINISTRATION ACT (GEO. V No. 43, 1915)—

An Act to provide for the supply of water to and the administration of certain works of water supply for the city and district of Broken Hill, and certain mining and tramway companies; to provide for the levying of rates and charges in respect of such supply, and for contributions by such companies; to repeal the Broken Hill

and Umberumberka Water Supply Act, 1906; to apply and amend certain Acts; to prohibit the use of firearms within a certain area; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 2 September, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

CANOWINDRA TO EUGOWRA RAILWAY ACT (GEO. V No. 48, 1915)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a line of railway from Canowindra to Eugowra; to provide for the use of the line by the Construction Authority, or by persons authorised by him; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for other purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 10 December, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

CITY AND SUBURBAN ELECTRIC RAILWAYS ACT (GEO. V No. 29, 1915)—

An Act to sanction and provide for the construction of electric railways in the City of Sydney, and certain suburbs thereof; to provide for the use of such works by the Constructing Authority and other persons; to validate certain purchases; for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto; and for such purposes to amend the Public Works Act, 1912, and certain other Acts. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 8 July, 1916. Assented to, 13 October, 1915.]

CLERICAL WORKERS (REPEAL) ACT (GEO. V No. 67, 1915)—

An Act to repeal the Clerical Workers Act, 1910. [Initiated in the Council by Hon. J. D. FitzGerald, 11 November, 1915. Assented to, 29 December, 1915.]

COMMONWEALTH LOANS (INVESTMENT ENABLING) ACT (GEO. V No. 63, 1915)—

An Act to authorise trustees and other persons to invest in Stock, Treasury Bills, and Bonds of the Commonwealth. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Holman, 16 December, 1915. Assented to, 22 December, 1915.]

COMMONWEALTH POWERS (WAR) ACT (GEO. V No. 65, 1915)—

An Act to refer certain matters to the Parliament of the Commonwealth for the duration of the present war, and for a period of twelve months after the conclusion of peace. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Holman, 11 November, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

COMMONWEALTH WAR LOAN (INVESTMENT ENABLING) ACT (GEO. V No. 22, 1915)—

An Act to authorise trustees and other persons to invest in Stock and Treasury Bills or Bonds issued under the War Loan Act (No. 1), 1915, of the Commonwealth. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Holman, 18 August, 1915. Assented to, 27 August, 1915.]

CRABOON TO COOLAH RAILWAY ACT (GEO. V No. 50, 1915)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a line of railway from Craboon to Coolah; to provide for the use of the said line by the Constructing Authority, or by persons authorised by him; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon and incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 10 December, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

CROWN LANDS AMENDMENT (No. 2) ACT (GEO. V No. 29, 1916)—

An Act to amend the Crown Lands Consolidation Act, 1913, and to amend the law with respect to the alienation, occupation, and management of Crown Lands; to provide for the granting of week-end leases, and of leases of town lands; for the resumption of private land for certain purposes; for the protection of survey marks; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Ashford, 23 November, 1915. Assented to, 26 April, 1916.]

DAIRY INDUSTRY ACT (GEO. V No. 45, 1915)—

An Act to regulate the manufacture, sale, storage, transit, and export of dairy produce, including margarine, and for prescribing standards for the same; to provide for the testing, blending, mixing, and grading of cream, and the basis of payment for cream; for the grading and branding of butter; for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto; to amend the Dairies Supervision Act, 1901, and certain other Acts. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Ashford, 21 July, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

DARVALL-STREET BRIDGE REMOVAL ACT (GEO. V No. 4, 1916)—

An Act to extinguish any right-of-way over the Darvall-street Bridge at Newcastle and its approaches; to provide for the removal of the said bridge and approaches; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 21 October, 1915. Assented to, 23 March, 1916.]

DENTISTS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 15, 1916)—

An Act to further regulate practice in dentistry and to amend the Dentists Act, 1912. [Initiated in the Council by Hon. J. D. FitzGerald. Assented to, 19 April, 1916.]

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE BUILDING ACT (GEO. V No. 7, 1916)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a building to accommodate the Department of Agriculture; and for purposes consequent thereon and incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. J. H. Cann, 11 December, 1915. Assented to, 6 April, 1916.]

EARLY CLOSING (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V No. 64, 1915)—

An Act to provide opening and closing hours for butchers' shops; to amend the Early Closing Acts and the Saturday Half Holiday Act, 1910; and for purposes incidental thereto or consequent thereon. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Estell, 14 December, 1915. Assented to, 22 December, 1915.]

EIGHT HOURS ACT (GEO. V No. 11, 1916)—

An Act to regulate the hours of work in certain industries and the payment of overtime; to further regulate the making, varying, and amending of awards and industrial agreements; to amend the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912, and certain other Acts; and for other purposes. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Estell, 12 August, 1915. Assented to, 12 April, 1916.]

ENEMY CONTRACTS ANNULMENT ACT (GEO. V No. 24, 1915)—

An Act to amend the law with respect to certain contracts, and to provide for their annulment or termination. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. D. R. Hall, 16 July, 1915. Assented to, 14 September, 1915.]

FAIR RENTS ACT (GEO. V No. 66, 1915)—

An Act to provide for the determination of fair rents for certain dwelling-houses; to enforce such determination; to amend certain Acts; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Arthur Griffith, 19 August, 1916. Assented to, 29 December, 1915.]

FINANCE (TAXATION) ACT (GEO. V No. 57, 1915)—

An Act to increase the amount of the income-tax on income received during 1915, and to reimpose a tax on motor vehicles; to amend the law with regard to the said taxes, and to amend the Finance (Taxation) Act, 1914; to impose taxes on racing clubs and racing associations, and on bookmakers, and to impose a stamp duty on betting tickets; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Holman, 9 December, 1915. Assented to, 21 December, 1915.]

FINANCE TAXATION MANAGEMENT ACT (GEO. V No. 60, 1915)—

An Act to provide for the collection of taxes under the Finance (Taxation) Act, 1915; to amend the Motor Tax Management Act, 1914; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in Assembly by Mr. Holman, 15 December, 1915. Assented to, 22 December, 1915.]

Commonwealth War Loan (Investment Enabling) Bill: It was not permissible to discuss the details of a proposed bill on the expediency motion, 1158.

Eight Hours Bill: An amendment that would provide for an arbitrary eight-hours day irrespective of appeal to the court would alter the whole meaning of the clause, and could not be permitted, 3231; it was not usual to debate the principles of the bill on the motion that the Chairman do now leave the chair, 3248.

Loan Estimates: All the statutory obligations in regard to reference to the Public Works Committee had been fulfilled in regard to the item for Depart-

ment of Agriculture buildings; the item "Cave houses and Tourist Bureau generally, £25,000." did not relate to a "public work" within the meaning of the Public Works Act, 4677; the item "Newcastle harbour improvements and wharfage" had been reported upon by the Public Works Committee, and was in order, 4678.

Meat Industry Bill: There was no right of reply in Committee, 4345.

Medical Practitioners Amendment Bill:

It was not for this Parliament to sit in judgment on any other Parliament; it was purely a matter of taste on the part of members as to how they expressed themselves regarding other Parliaments, 3214.

Rural Tenants' Improvements Bill: An amendment to bring share-farmers within the scope of the bill was outside the order of leave, 2810.

Order No. 49: A motion of adjournment to permit of the discussion of a proposal that the Government should take action to guarantee to the public that the money subscribed to relief funds would be properly applied was not anticipatory of the discussion on a motion for a royal commission to report on two specific funds, 3134; a motion to discuss the breakdown of the water supply to the northern suburbs would anticipate discussion that could take place on the estimates, and was therefore out of order, 3212; a motion to discuss the proposal of the State and Federal Governments to control the export of wheat could not be regarded as having any relevancy to a notice of motion for the abolition of the Necessary Commodities Commission, 3351; the administration of the Red Cross Society was a matter of public importance within the meaning of the standing order, 3399; it was the practice to give precedence to a Minister who rose in his place; the fact that the lady concerned in a motion before the House resided in a certain electorate did not confer on the representative of the electorate any special rights in regard to the debate, 3406; a motion to discuss the charge to be debited against wheat-growers under the Government export scheme would anticipate discussion that might take place on the estimates, and was therefore out of order, 3873; a member might have facts to put before the House which were not known when the estimates were under consideration, and should not be debarred from referring to a railway work on a motion for adjournment after the question of urgency had been decided by the House, 6213.

Meat Industry Bill: The question of permitting a motion, "That the question be now put," was within the discretion of the Chair whose duty it was to prevent the standing order from being used for vexatious purposes, 4441.

Member for Castlereagh: The Speaker could not personally do anything to expunge any matter from the records; that could only be done by motion; such a motion could only be taken with concurrence unless notice was given, 1476.

Military and Naval Hospital Home Bill: The bill, which had by amendment of the motion for the second reading been referred to a select committee, and which after rescission of the resolution had been restored to the business-paper, would go back *in statu quo*, and would stand exactly as before the resolution was carried. Personal Explanation: In making a personal explanation a member was restricted to correcting a misapprehension; he could not justify his vote, 1199; it was a primary parliamentary rule that no reflection could be made on the rectitude or integrity of the judiciary except on specific motion, 6075

Petitions: If a member had a doubt as to the genuineness of a petition he could move that it be referred to the Standing Orders Committee for investigation; there was nothing to prevent a member from presenting a petition from any part of the state, 1198; a member was not in order in reading a petition; he should merely state the subject and then, if he desired that it should be read, move a motion to that effect, 4627.

Police Guard in Hunter-street: A member was responsible for the veracity of statements in his notice of motion, and the consequences of any want of veracity would recoil on his own head, 3870.

Privilege: A member, who after having been suspended for contempt came within the precincts of the Chamber, was guilty of gross contempt of which he must purge himself, 6473.

Public Accountants Bill: The bill did not in any way affect trade, and therefore did not come under the operation of standing order No. 246, which required that bills relating to trade should be introduced in Committee of the Whole, 3529.

Public Instruction Amendment Bill: To say that members had made attacks upon public officers that they were too cowardly to make outside the House was to impute improper motives, and the expression, which was distinctly offensive, must be withdrawn, 3320.

Questions: More than one question would not be allowed before a Minister was called on to reply; a series of categorical questions with the object of eliciting one reply would not be allowed; if a member desired to put a question to elicit further information he would be permitted to do so,

but it would be within the discretion of the Minister to say whether it was urgent, and should be answered without notice; a question which practically traversed an answer previously given would not be allowed; it was a well recognised rule that no question of an offensive character could be asked, 123; questions without notice should be confined within the ambit of matters of urgency, 124; a member was not permitted to ask questions of a farcical character, 354; a member was not justified in reading from a newspaper a report reflecting on another member, 912; although many questions relating to Federal matters might more appropriately be asked in the Federal Parliament, having in view the composite character of our national life, Mr. Speaker did not feel disposed to draw any fine distinctions. It rested with Ministers to say whether they would answer such questions, 2325; a question without notice relating to the Liverpool camp water supply and the position of a certain member in relation thereto did not come within the ambit of standing order 76, 2446. If the objection to the bill based on standing order 113 was to hold good, the former bill must have been definitely and decisively passed and accorded the sanction of law, 5814.

Naturalised Subjects Franchise Bill: Once a bill was recommitted as a whole, it was competent to alter, amend, or negative the whole or any of the clauses, 5586: if a bill were recommitted without limitation the entire bill was at the disposal of the Committee, which could come to a decision in direct contradiction to the decision of the previous Committee. This being so a member was entitled to move an amendment which had previously been ruled out of order, but it would be within the function of the Chairman to decide the question of relevancy, or to rule the amendment out of order on any other good ground, 5684; the Committee had by introducing new clause 2 gone beyond the scope of the bill as originally introduced, which was restricted to a political or municipal franchise, and in view of this fact an amendment to preclude naturalised subjects of enemy origin from obtaining liquor licenses or renewals of existing licenses was in order, 5690.

Sunday Trading (Refreshment-rooms) Bill: A member having left his seat on the right of the Chair after the question had been put in division and tellers had been appointed should have his vote recorded with the ayes. Any member might, provided the question had not been put or tellers appointed,

Sydney Harbour Bridge Bill: A motion to adjourn the debate on the second reading to a date on which the House would probably not be sitting, that question must be settled before the Vice-President of the Executive Council could exercise his right of reply on the main question, 6353; a motion that it was a matter of urgent necessity that the House should forthwith consider motions for the recession of a resolution for the adjournment of the debate on the second reading for a fortnight, and for restoring the order of the day for the second reading to the notice-paper involved a larger question than that of urgency, and it was competent for the mover to advance reasons in support of the proposed motions. It was not open to members, however, to go into the main question, which was the second reading of the bill, 6426-8. The course adopted by the Vice-President of the Executive Council was quite in accordance with the practice adopted on many occasions upon which it had not been considered necessary to move for the suspension of the standing orders. When the standing orders were suspended the question of urgency must be decided without debate, beyond the statement of the mover, who was limited to ten minutes, 6340; according to a ruling of the President on 21st July, 1915, the debate on the third reading of a bill dealing with the expenditure of public money on public works should not be unduly restricted, 6517.
