This includes an Easy Read summary of EDDI. This is supported by content on partner agency websites (DCJ, Health and St Vincent's) and electronic e-news to targeted stakeholder groups. Fine recipients will receive information on the fine notice, including options for resolving the fine, with a QR code for further information. DCJ is also supporting the commencement of EDDI through posts on social media. In border areas, this is being boosted with messaging that similar diversion programs operate in other Australian states and territories, and that different rules apply, linking to <u>www.nsw.gov.au/EDDI</u> for more information on rules that apply in NSW. I am advised: Every court location in NSW has either a safe room or a safe waiting arrangement for people who have experienced domestic violence. Other vulnerable persons attending court may also access these facilities. Due to the history of the NSW court network, safe rooms and safe waiting areas are not and cannot be consistent across the network. Approximately 75% of court houses are heritage listed and 60% are over 100 years old. In some instances, the safe waiting area may be off site at the police station. Safe waiting arrangements are determined by considering factors such as: - The size of the waiting area - Accessibility to sheriffs or security arrangements at that location - Use of security cameras monitored by sheriffs at a location - Use of and monitoring of duress alarm systems at a location - Unobstructed view of the waiting area of court participants

I am advised: The stakeholder submissions on the Background Paper for the Statutory Review of the Victims Rights and Support Act 2013 are under consideration by Government. Stakeholders will be updated in due course.
44	Ms Abigail Boyd MLC	The Domestic Violence Death Review Team is vital to moving towards a future free from domestic and family violence, however the Review Team has been chronically underfunded and overworked for many years. What is the NSW Government doing to ensure the team is funded appropriately so they can continue to perform this critical work, ensuring no woman or child dies in vain?	I am advised: The Domestic Violence Death Review Team (DVDRT) Report for 2021-2023 is expected to be tabled in the NSW Parliament in April 2024. The report will include detailed quantitative analyses of all domestic violence homicides in NSW between 1 July 2000 and 30 June 2022 as well as recommendations regarding the future work agenda of the DVDRT. The NSW Government will respond to any recommendations made by the DVDRT in its 2021-2023 Report, when the Report is received. This includes consideration of the resources required for the DVDRT to undertake its future work agenda.
