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AUBURN STUDENTS' IMMERSIVE EXPERIENCE AT NSW PARLIAMENT

Students from Auburn Public School ventured into Sydney's CBD to explore a cornerstone of Australia's democracy: the Parliament of NSW.

The Year 5/6 students role-played in the chambers as the Speaker, Serjeant-At-Arms, Minister for Education and the Shadow Minister for Education during their visit to the Parliament of NSW as part of their Stage 3 curriculum.

They sat in the very seats where Members of Parliament debate and make critical decisions about their community. Students asked questions and learned about their role as a citizen and the role of their elected representative.

The students were joined by their local representative, Ms Lynda Voltz, Member for Auburn.
