

Conference Location

The South Australian Parliament is located on North Terrace in the Adelaide CBD. Public transport, restaurants, bars and the main shopping mall are a short walk away.



Airport Transport

Adelaide's domestic airport is about 8kms from the CBD. The airport is serviced by public transport, taxis and rideshare services. A taxi to the CBD will cost you about \$30 and will take around 15 minutes travel time depending on traffic conditions. At the front of the Adelaide Airport terminal, bus stop 10 offers a city - airport public bus service. Either catch the J1 or J2 service which departs approximately every 20 mins, taking about 25 mins travel time to the CBD.



Accommodation

Adelaide offers a range of accommodation options that are a short walk from the Parliament House. Please see accommodation suggestions on page 3.

Getting Around Adelaide

Adelaide Metro offers free city loop bus and tram services. There are several bus and tram stops situated in close proximity to Parliament House. The train station is directly next to Parliament House. If you wish to travel outside the CBD on public transport it will cost about \$5 for a single trip. Tap and pay is available on all buses and trams which allows you to use your Visa or Mastercard to purchase fares. If catching a train you will need to purchase a ticket either on the train or at ticket kiosk located at the train station.



Adelaide Weather

Adelaide's weather in early October is generally mild with maximums in the low 20s and cool nights, however this can vary. It's recommended that you bring something warm to wear for cooler weather and sun protection for the hotter days.
