Statute Law (Miscellaneous Provisions) Bill (No 2) 2000

Explanatory note

This explanatory note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament.

Overview of Bill

The objects of this Bill are:

- (a) to make minor amendments to various Acts (Schedule 1), and
- (b) to amend certain other Acts and instruments for the purpose of effecting law revision (Schedule 2), and
- (c) to repeal certain Acts (Schedule 3), and
- (d) to make other provisions of a savings, consequential or ancillary nature (Schedule 4).

Outline of provisions

Clause 1 sets out the name (also called the short title) of the proposed Act.

Clause 2 provides for the commencement of the proposed Act.

Clauses 3 and 5 are machinery provisions that give effect to the Schedules to the proposed Act that contain amendments and savings and transitional provisions.

Clauses 4 gives effect to the Schedule to the proposed Act that contains repeals. The clause also repeals a Regulation that is no longer required.

Clause 6 makes it clear that the explanatory notes contained in the Schedules do not form part of the proposed Act.

Schedule 2 Amendments by way of law revision

Schedule 2 amends certain Acts and instruments for the purpose of effecting law revision. For example, the amendments update references to Acts and make minor corrections and changes relating to consistency with modern style.

The amendments to each Act or instrument are explained in detail in the explanatory note relating to the Act or instrument concerned set out in Schedule 2.

Schedule 3 Repeals

Schedule 3 repeals a number of Acts. The Schedule repeals amending Acts enacted at least 2 years ago that contain no substantive provisions that need to be retained and more recent amending Acts where the relevant Principal Act has been reprinted.

The Acts that were amended by the Acts being repealed are up-to-date on the Legislation Database maintained by the Parliamentary Counsel's Office and are available electronically.

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Schedule 4 General savings, transitional and other provisions

Schedule 4 contains savings, transitional and other provisions of a more general effect than those set out in Schedule 1.

The purpose of each provision is explained in detail in the explanatory note relating to the provision concerned set out in Schedule 4.

The <i>Access to Neighbouring Land Act 2000</i> enables a Local Court to make orders permitting access to land by persons not otherwise entitled to that access for the purpose of carrying out work on land or carrying out work on utility services on land.	2 3 4
The proposed amendments make it clear that a person may apply for an access order despite the fact that access to the land may be granted by easement imposed under section 88K of the <i>Conveyancing Act 1919</i> .	5 6 7

Explanatory note	14
The proposed amendment to the <i>Child Protection (Offenders Registration) Act 2000</i> clarifies the operation of an obligation on certain offenders (described as “registrable persons”) to notify the Commissioner of Police of certain personal information. At present, section 10 requires those offenders to notify the Commissioner within 28 days after being found guilty of certain offences. However, it is not until after sentencing that offenders know whether they are “registrable persons” and therefore subject to the obligation. (The amendment brings section 10 into line with section 14 of the Act, which makes it clear that a registrable person’s reporting obligations in respect of a registrable offence begin when the registrable person is sentenced for the offence or when the registrable person ceases to be in government custody in relation to the offence.)	15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24
