# Victims Rights and Victims of Crime Commissioner Bill 2025

## Explanatory note

This explanatory note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament.

## Overview of Bill

The objects of this Bill are—

- (a) to recognise and promote the rights of victims of crime under the Charter of Victims Rights, and
- (b) to establish a Victims of Crime Commissioner (the *Commissioner*).

## Outline of provisions

### Part 1 Preliminary

**Clause 1** sets out the name, also called the short title, of the proposed Act.

**Clause 2** provides for the commencement of the proposed Act.

**Clause 3** sets out the objects of the proposed Act.

**Clause 4** empowers proposed Schedule 2 to define certain words and expressions used in the proposed Act.

**Clause 5** defines *victim of crime* for the proposed Act.

### Part 2 Charter of Victims Rights

**Clause 6** sets out the Charter of rights of victims of crime and **Clause 7** sets out the Charter of rights of victims of crime who are victims of forensic patients. The Charters comprise the Charter

of Victims Rights (the *Charter*). The Charter is essentially the same as the Charter of Victims Rights currently set out in the *Victims Rights and Support Act 2013*.

**Clause 8** provides for the implementation of the Charter in the administration of the affairs of the State.

### **Part 3 Complaints about contraventions of Charter**

**Clause 9** provides for complaints to be made to the Commissioner about alleged contraventions of the Charter.

**Clause 10** sets out who may make a complaint.

**Clause 11** sets out how a complaint must be made.

**Clause 12** requires the Commissioner to decide to either investigate or decline to investigate a complaint. If the Commissioner declines to investigate a complaint, the Commissioner must give written notice of the decision, and the reasons for the decision, to the complainant.

**Clause 13** sets out the circumstances in which the Commissioner may decline to investigate a complaint.

**Clause 14** sets out the decisions the Commissioner may make after investigating a complaint. The Commissioner must notify the complainant, and the government sector agency subject to the complaint, of the decision and the reasons for the decision.

### **Part 4 Appointment of Commissioner**

**Clause 15** provides for the appointment of the Commissioner by the Governor.

**Clause 16** provides for the employment and remuneration of the Commissioner.

**Clause 17** sets out the circumstances in which the office of Commissioner becomes vacant.

**Clause 18** enables the Governor to remove the Commissioner from office for incompetence, incapacity or misbehaviour.

**Clause 19** provides for the appointment of an acting Commissioner in certain circumstances.

**Clause 20** provides for staff to be employed in the Public Service to enable the Commissioner to exercise the Commissioner's functions.

**Clause 21** enables the Commissioner to delegate the Commissioner's functions.

### **Part 5 Functions of Commissioner**

**Clause 22** sets out the functions of the Commissioner, which include advocating for the rights of victims of crime at a systemic level, reviewing systemic issues relating to victims of crime and overseeing the implementation of the Charter.

**Clause 23** sets out limitations on the Commissioner's functions and requires the Commissioner to liaise with certain persons and bodies to avoid duplicating the functions of the persons and bodies.

**Clause 24** provides that the Commissioner is not subject to the control and direction of the Minister in exercising the Commissioner's functions.

**Clause 25** enables the Commissioner to establish the Victims Advisory Committee to advise the Commissioner about the exercise of the Commissioner's advocacy functions. The clause also provides for the membership of the Committee.

### **Part 6 Powers of Commissioner**

**Clause 26** defines *information* for the proposed part.

**Clause 27** enables the Commissioner, when investigating an alleged contravention of the Charter, to compel an agency or person to give information to the Commissioner. The clause also makes it an offence to give the Commissioner false or misleading information.

**Clause 28** sets out exemptions from the requirement to provide information to the Commissioner.

**Clause 29** provides for the Commissioner and government sector agencies or other prescribed entities to share information about complaints about contraventions of the Charter, matters relating to systemic issues relating to victims of crimes and other prescribed matters.

## **Part 7 Reporting**

**Clause 30** requires the Commissioner to prepare annual reports on the Commissioner's activities for the Minister to give to Parliament.

**Clause 31** enables the Commissioner to prepare, on the Commissioner's own initiative or at the Minister's request, special reports for the Minister to give to Parliament.

## **Part 8 Miscellaneous**

**Clause 32** makes it an offence for a person to disclose information obtained in connection with the administration of the proposed Act except in specified circumstances.

**Clause 33** protects the Commissioner, members of staff of the Commissioner and members of an advisory committee from personal liability if acting in good faith.

**Clause 34** provides for the review of the proposed Act.

**Clause 35** enables the Governor to make regulations for the purposes of the proposed Act.

## **Schedule 1 Savings, transitional and other provisions**

**Schedule 1** contains savings, transitional and other provisions consequent on the enactment of the proposed Act.

## **Schedule 2 Dictionary**

**Schedule 2** defines certain words and expressions for the proposed Act.

## **Schedule 3 Amendment of Victims Rights and Support Act 2013 No 37**

**Schedule 3[1]–[22] and [24]** make consequential amendments to the *Victims Rights and Support Act 2013*, including—

- (a) renaming that Act the “*Victims Support Act 2013*” (the *Victims Support Act*), and
- (b) establishing a Scheme Executive to exercise functions under the *Victims Support Act*, and
- (c) amending the Scheme Executive's functions, and dissolving the *Victims Advisory Board*, to avoid duplication of the Commissioner's functions.

**Schedule 3[23]** enables regulations under the *Victims Support Act* to provide for the provision of approved counselling services, and authorisation of payments for the services, to certain relatives of persons killed in road crimes.

## **Schedule 4 Amendment of other legislation**

**Schedule 4.1–4.23[1]–[4]** make consequential amendments to other legislation.

**Schedule 4.23[5]** amends the *Victims Support Regulation 2019*, as renamed by Schedule 4.23[1], to allow the Scheme Executive to authorise payments for approved counselling services for certain relatives of persons killed in road crimes.

## Part 1 Preliminary 2

### 1 Name of Act 3

This Act is the *Victims Rights and Victims of Crime Commissioner Act 2025*. 4

### 2 Commencement 5

This Act commences on a day or days to be appointed by proclamation. 6

### 3 Objects of Act 7

The objects of this Act are— 8

- (a) to recognise and promote the rights of victims of crime under the Charter of Victims Rights, and 9
- (b) to establish a Victims of Crime Commissioner. 11

### 4 Definitions 12

The dictionary in Schedule 2 defines words used in this Act. 13

**Note—** The *Interpretation Act 1987* contains definitions and other provisions that affect the interpretation and application of this Act. 14

### 5 Meaning of “victim of crime” 16

- (1) For this Act, a *victim of crime* is a person who suffers harm as a direct result of an act committed, or apparently committed, by another person in the course of— 17
  - (a) a criminal offence, including a criminal offence involving a motor vehicle, or 18
  - (b) conduct of a kind referred to in the *Modern Slavery Act 2018*, section 5(1), definition of *modern slavery*, paragraph (b). 21
- (2) A person suffers harm if, as a result of an act mentioned in subsection (1)— 22
  - (a) the person suffers actual physical bodily harm or psychological or psychiatric harm, or 23
  - (b) the person’s property is deliberately taken, destroyed or damaged. 25
- (3) If the person dies as a result of the act, a member of the person’s immediate family is also a victim of crime for this Act. 26
- (4) If a person dies as a result of the act and there is more than one member of the person’s immediate family, the members of the immediate family may nominate a representative for the Charter. 28

## Part 5 Functions of Commissioner

### 22 Commissioner's functions

- (1) The Commissioner's functions are as follows—
  - (a) to advocate for the rights of victims of crime at a systemic level,
  - (b) to identify and review systemic issues relating to victims of crime,
  - (c) to conduct and promote research into systemic issues relating to victims of crime,
  - (d) to consult victims of crime, community victims support groups and government sector agencies on systemic matters relating to victims of crime,
  - (e) to make recommendations to the Minister about systemic issues relating to victims of crime,
  - (f) other functions conferred or imposed on the Commissioner by this Act or another Act.
- (2) The Commissioner has the following functions in relation to the Charter—
  - (a) to promote and oversee the implementation of the Charter, including by publishing codes, guidelines and other practical guidance on the implementation of the Charter,
  - (b) to make recommendations to assist agencies to improve their compliance with the Charter, including conducting training and recommending changes to policies and procedures,
  - (c) to—
    - (i) receive complaints from persons who, under section 10, may make complaints about alleged contraventions of the Charter, and
    - (ii) use the Commissioner's best endeavours to resolve the complaints,
  - (d) to provide information and education to victims of crime about their rights under the Charter.
- (3) In exercising the Commissioner's functions, the Commissioner must act in the public interest.

### 23 Limitation on Commissioner's functions

- (1) The Commissioner's functions do not include—
  - (a) advocating for individual victims of crime, or
