

Explanatory note

This explanatory note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament.

Overview of Bill

The objects of this Bill are as follows:

- (a) to recognise formally the professional status of teachers,
- (b) to establish professional teaching standards,
- (c) to require teachers to comply with the professional teaching standards.
- (d) to establish a system of registration for teachers,
- (e) to provide that teachers employed in schools must be registered,
- (f) to provide for the deregistration of teachers who fail to comply with the professional teaching standards.

Outline of provisions

Part 1 Preliminary

Clause 1 sets out the name (also called the short title) of the proposed Act.

Clause 2 provides for the commencement of the proposed Act on a day or days to be appointed by proclamation.

Clause 3 specifies the objects of the proposed Acts (as outlined in the above overview).

Clause 4 defines words and expressions that are used in the proposed Act. In particular, a *school* means a government (ie State) school or a non-government school registered under the *Education Act 1990*. A *teacher* includes any person who is employed in a school to provide curriculum education.

Part 2 Teaching Standards Board

Clause 5 constitutes the Teaching Standards Board (the *Board*) as a statutory corporation representing the Crown.

Clause 6 describes the general functions of the Board. These functions include recommending professional teaching standards for approval by the Minister, and administering the system of teacher registration. The Board will be subject to Ministerial control in the exercise of its functions.

Clause 7 provides for the appointment by the Minister of directors of the Board.

Clause 8 describes the functions of the directors. Primarily, the directors are to determine the policies of the Board.

Clause 9 provides that the affairs of the Board will, subject to the policies and general directions of the directors of the Board, be managed by a chief executive officer (ie the General Manager).

Clause 10 provides for the employment of the staff of the Board.

Clause 11 enables the Board to establish committees to assist it in the exercise of its functions.

Part 3 Professional teaching standards

Clause 12 provides for the approval by the Minister, on the recommendation of the Board, of professional teaching standards.

Clause 13 provides for the subject-matter that the standards may deal with.

Clause 14 provides for the standards to include a Teachers' Code of Ethics relating to matters of professional conduct.

Clause 15 requires each teacher to comply with the professional teaching standards to the extent to which the standards relate to the teacher.

Clause 16 provides that it is the responsibility of the principal of each government school, or the proprietor of each non-government school, to ensure that the teachers at the school comply with the professional teaching standards.

Part 4 Registration of teachers

Clause 17 provides that a person must not be employed as a teacher in any school unless the person is a registered teacher.

Clause 18 authorises the Board to administer a system of teacher registration.

Clause 19 enables the Board to register a person as a teacher having regard to the professional teaching standards. A person becomes a registered teacher once the Board includes the person's name on the Register kept by the Board.

Clause 20 provides that the Board may refuse to register a person on certain grounds.

Clause 21 provides for the registration of persons who are presently employed as teachers.

Clause 22 provides for the provisional registration of persons who apply for teaching positions for the first time.

Clause 23 requires registered teachers to pay an annual registration fee, and requires the payment of an initial fee for entry on the Register.

Clause 24 requires the Board to maintain a Register of teachers.

Clause 25 confers jurisdiction on the Administrative Decisions Tribunal to review decisions by the Board to refuse the registration of a person as a teacher.

Part 5 Provisions relating to non-compliance with standards

Clause 26 provides for the determination by the Board of procedures to deal with teachers who fail to comply with the professional teaching standards.

Clause 27 enables the employer of a teacher to seek advice of an expert panel of teachers established by the Board as to whether the employer would be justified in reaching a finding that the teacher has failed to comply with the professional teaching standards.

Clause 28 requires the employer of a teacher to notify the Board if the teacher is dismissed for failing to comply with the professional teaching standards.

Clause 29 enables the Board to apply to the Administrative Decisions Tribunal for an order to suspend or cancel the registration of a teacher.

Clause 30 provides that the Tribunal may make an order to suspend or cancel the registration of a teacher.

Clause 31 provides for appeals against the Tribunal's decision.

Part 6 Miscellaneous

Clause 32 makes it an offence for a person to falsely represent that he or she is a registered teacher.

Clause 33 provides that the proposed Act prevails despite any stipulation to the contrary in any contract or agreement.

Clause 34 empowers the Board to delegate its functions.

Clause 35 exculpates certain persons from personal liability.

Clause 36 provides that an offence under the proposed Act is to be dealt with by a Local Court.

Clause 37 provides that the proposed Act will bind the Crown.

Clause 38 empowers the making of regulations for the purposes of the proposed Act.


Clause 39 gives effect to the Schedule of amendments to certain Acts.

Clause 40 provides for a review of the proposed Act after 5 years.

Schedules

Schedule 1 contains provisions relating to the directors of the Board and the procedure of meetings of the directors. A director is to be appointed for a term not exceeding 3 years.

Schedule 2 contains amendments to certain Acts that are largely consequential on the enactment of the proposed Act. The amendment to the *Education Act 1990* provides that the registration of a non-government school under that Act will be subject to certain requirements such as the requirement that only registered teachers are to be employed at the school.







A Bill for

An Act relating to standards for the teaching profession: to provide for the registration of teachers; to constitute the Teaching Standards Board and to provide for its functions; to amend the Education Act 1990 and certain other Acts; and for other purposes.

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Part 1

Preliminary

The Legislature of New South Wales enacts:

Part 1 Preliminary

1 Name of Act

This Act is the Teaching Standards Act 1998.

2 Commencement

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This Act commences on a day or days to be appointed by proclamation.

3 Objects of Act

The objects of this Act are as follows:

- (a) to recognise formally the professional status of teachers,
- (b) to establish professional teaching standards,
- (c) to require teachers to comply with the professional teaching standards.
- (d) to establish a system of registration for teachers,
- (e) to provide that teachers employed in schools must be registered.
- (f) to provide for the deregistration of teachers who fail to comply with the professional teaching standards.

4 Definitions

In this Act:

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Board means the Teaching Standards Board constituted by this Act.

director means a director of the Board.

employ includes engage under a contract for services.

employer of a teacher means:

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- (a) in the case of a teacher who is employed in a government school—the Director-General of the Department of Education and Training, or
- (b) in the case of a teacher who is employed in a non-government school—the proprietor of the school.

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exercise	a	function	includes	perform	a	duty
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function includes a power, authority or duty.

General Manager means the General Manager of the Board holding office as such under Part 2 of the Public Sector Management Act 1988.

government school has the same meaning as in the Education Act 1990.

non-government school has the same meaning as in the Education Act 1990.

professional teaching standards means the standards approved by the Minister from time to time under section 12.

proprietor of a non-government school has the same meaning as in the Education Act 1990.

Register means the Register referred to in section 24.

registered teacher means a teacher who is registered for the time being as a teacher under this Act.

school means a government school or a non-government school.

teacher means:

- (a) a person who is employed in a school, or who is eligible to be so employed having regard to the professional teaching standards, to provide curriculum education in accordance with the *Education Act 1990*, or
- (b) any other person who is of a class of persons prescribed by the regulations for the purposes of this definition.

Tribunal means the Administrative Decisions Tribunal.

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Part 2 Teaching Standards Board

5 Constitution of Teaching Standa	ıras	Boar	C
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- (1) There is constituted by this Act a body corporate with the corporate name of the Teaching Standards Board.
- (2) The Board is, for the purposes of any Act, a statutory body representing the Crown.

6 Functions of Board

- (1) The Board has the functions conferred or imposed on it by or under this or any other Act.
- (2) The Board's functions include the following:

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- (a) recommending professional teaching standards for approval by the Minister,
- (b) registering teachers in accordance with this Act.
- (c) engaging in activities with respect to improving the quality of teaching and with a view to raising the status of the teaching profession.

(3) The Board's functions do not extend to industrial matters such as the salaries of teachers or their conditions of employment, or to any other matter that is not related to the objects of this Act.

(4) The Board is, in the exercise of its functions, subject to the control and direction of the Minister.

7 Directors of Board

- (1) There are to be 12 directors of the Board. The directors are to be appointed by the Minister on a part-time basis.
- (2) Subject to this section, the persons to be appointed as directors are as follows:
 - (a) one nominee of the Director-General of the Department of Education and Training.
 - (b) one nominee of the Catholic Education Commission of New South Wales.

Schedule 1 has effect with respect to the directors of the Board.

8 Functions of directors

The directors of the Board have the following functions:

- (a) to determine policies relating to the functions of the Board,
- (b) to advise the Minister on any matter relating to the administration and execution of this Act (at the request of the Minister or on the initiative of the directors).

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(c) such other functions as may be conferred or imposed on the directors by or under this or any other Act.

9 General Manager to manage affairs of Board

- (1) The General Manager is responsible for the day to day management of the affairs of the Board subject to, and in accordance with, the policies and general directions of the directors.
- (2) Any act, matter or thing done in the name of, or on behalf of, the Board by the General Manager is taken to have been done by the Board.

10 Staff of Board

- (1) The staff of the Board is (subject to this section) to be employed under Part 2 of the *Public Sector Management Act 1988*.
- (2) The Board may, with the approval of the Minister, arrange for the use of the services of any staff (by secondment or otherwise) or facilities of a government department, a public authority, the Education Teaching Service, or any other relevant body.
- (3) Any such staff of whose services the Board makes use in accordance with subsection (2) are taken to be the staff of the Board for the purposes of this Act.
- (4) The Board may employ other staff for any special purpose approved by the Minister. Part 2 of the *Public Sector Management Act 1988* does not apply to the employment of any such staff.
- (5) The Board may engage persons having suitable qualifications and experience as consultants to the Board.

Teaching Standards Board

Part 2

11 Committees

- (1) The Board may establish committees to assist it in the exercise of its functions.
- (2) It does not matter that any or all of the members of a committee are not directors.

(3) The procedure for the calling of meetings of a committee of the Board and for the conduct of business at those meetings is to be determined by the Board or, subject to any determination by the Board, by the committee.

Part 3 Professional teaching standards

12	Minister	may	approve	professional	teaching	standards
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- (1) The Minister may, from time to time, approve of professional teaching standards that are recommended to the Minister by the Board.
- (2) The standards are to be in such form as the Minister determines on the advice of the Board.
- (3) The Board is to ensure that the professional teaching standards are made available to all teachers and to the general public.

13 Scope of standards

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- (1) The professional teaching standards may deal with such matters as the following:
 - (a) requirements for quality teaching,
 - (b) the skills, experience and knowledge required for teachers.
 - (c) conditions and criteria for continuing registration, including requirements for maintaining and updating professional teaching skills.
 - (d) accreditation of teacher training programs,
 - (e) induction guidelines for teachers entering the teaching profession for the first time,
 - (f) any other matter relating to teaching standards.
- (2) The professional teaching standards may include provisions that relate to teaching generally, and provisions that relate to specific areas of teaching.

14 Teachers' Code of Ethics

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- (1) The professional teaching standards are to include a Teachers' Code of Ethics.
- (2) Such a code may include any matter that relates to the professional conduct of teachers.

15 Requirement to comply with standards

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(1) A teacher must comply with the professional teaching standards to the extent that they relate to the teacher.

Such a requirement is taken to be a condition of the teacher's (2) employment.

Responsibility to ensure compliance with standards 16

- It is the responsibility of the principal of a government school to (1)ensure that each teacher at the school complies with the professional teaching standards to the extent that they relate to that teacher.
- (2) In the case of a non-government school, it is the responsibility of the proprietor of the school to ensure that each teacher at the school complies with the professional teaching standards to the extent that they relate to that teacher.

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Part 4 Registration of teachers

17 Requirement for teachers to be registered

- (1) A person must not be employed as a teacher in any school unless the person is a registered teacher.
- (2) In the case of a government school, if a person who is not a registered teacher is employed as a teacher at the school, the person's appointment to that teaching position is taken to be an invalid appointment for the purposes of any law.

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(3) In the case of a non-government school, if a person who is not a registered teacher is employed as a teacher at the school, the employment of that person is a contravention of the registration requirements for the school under the *Education Act 1990*.

18 System of teacher registration

- (1) The Board is to administer a system of registration of teachers.
- (2) The regulations may make provision for or with respect to any matter relating to the registration of teachers (including the procedure for making applications to the Board for registration as a teacher).

19 Board may register person

- (1) The Board may, having regard to the professional teaching 20 standards, register a person as a teacher.
- (2) Subject to this Act, a person is eligible, even though the person does not hold a particular qualification or class of qualification, to be registered as a teacher if the person satisfies the Board that the person is able to meet the requirements of the professional teaching standards.
- (3) The registration of a person as a teacher is subject to such conditions as the Board thinks fit to impose.
- (4) A person is registered as a teacher when the Board includes the name of the person in the Register.

(5) The registration of a person as a teacher does not cease merely because the person is no longer employed as a teacher in a school.

20 Board may refuse to register person

The Board may refuse to register a person as a registered teacher if the Board is satisfied that the person is not, having regard to the professional teaching standards, suitable to be registered as a teacher.

21 Registration of existing teachers

- 1) Any person who is an existing teacher is taken to be a registered teacher until such time as the person ceases to be registered in accordance with this Act.
- (2) Subsection (1) does not apply to any person who is an existing teacher if the person was, immediately before the commencement of this section, the subject of any disciplinary action that has been commenced for the purposes of dismissing the person from his or her employment as a teacher.
- (3) Subsection (1) does not apply to any person who is an existing teacher if the person was not, immediately before the commencement of this section, the holder of a degree or other equivalent tertiary qualification conferred by a recognised tertiary institution. However, such a person is taken to be provisionally registered in accordance with section 22.
- (4) In this section:

existing teacher means:

- (a) a person who was, immediately before the commencement of this section, employed as a teacher in a school, or
- (b) a person who was, at any time during the period of 12 months before the commencement of this section, employed as a teacher on a casual basis in any school.

and includes any person who is of a class of persons determined by the Board for the purposes of this section.

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Registration of teachers

recognised tertiary institution means:

- (a) any institution in New South Wales that confers degrees or equivalent qualifications, or
- (b) any other tertiary institution recognised by the Board.

22 Provisional registration

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- (1) The Board may provisionally register a person who is not a registered teacher but who has applied for a teaching position in a school or intends to be employed as a teacher.
- (2) The provisional registration of a person is subject to such conditions as may be determined by the Board.

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- (3) The general criteria for provisional registration are to be approved by the Minister on the recommendation of the Board.
- (4) Subject to subsection (5), a person who is provisionally registered is taken to be a registered teacher for the purposes of this Act.

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(5) Provisional registration is effective until such time as the person is registered by the Board, or the Board decides to refuse to register the person as a teacher.

23 Annual registration fee and fee for registration

(1) Each registered teacher is required, before the end of each year, to pay to the Board a registration fee of \$25 (or such other fee as may be prescribed by the regulations).

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(2) Except in the case of an existing teacher as referred to in section 21, an additional fee of \$20 (or such other fee as may be prescribed by the regulations) is payable to the Board by a person when the person's name is included in the Register.

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(3) A person is not entitled to be registered as a teacher unless any such fee is paid in respect of that person.

24 Register

(1) The Board is to maintain a Register consisting of the names of the persons who are for the time being registered as teachers under this Act.

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- (2) The Register of teachers is to be kept in such manner as is determined by the Board.
- (3) The inclusion of a person's name in the Register is conclusive evidence of that person's status as a registered teacher.
- (4) The regulations may make provision for the particulars that are to be included in the Register and for the inspection of the Register.
- (5) The Board may maintain a list of persons who are not, in the opinion of the Board having regard to the professional teaching standards, suitable to be registered as teachers.
- (6) The Board may also maintain a list that includes the name of any person who has resigned, retired or taken leave from his or her teaching position pending disciplinary action against the teacher for failing to comply with the professional teaching standards. The employer or former employer of any such person is required to notify the Board of any such action.

25 Review by Tribunal of refusal to register

A person may apply to the Tribunal for a review of the refusal by the Board to register the person as a registered teacher.

Provisions relating to non-compliance with standards

Part 5 Provisions relating to non-compliance with standards

26 Procedures for dealing with teachers not complying with professional teaching standards

- (1) The Board may determine procedures for dealing with teachers who do not comply with the professional teaching standards.
- (2) Such procedures are designed to improve the performance and efficiency of the teacher concerned and may involve the taking of remedial action in respect of the teacher.
- (3) A teacher may be dealt with in accordance with the procedures determined by the Board under this section regardless of whether the teacher's employer has commenced action to dismiss the teacher from a teaching position.

27 Independent advice as to compliance with standards

- (1) An employer of a teacher may, at any time, request the advice of an expert panel of teachers established by the Board as to whether a teacher has complied with the professional teaching standards relating to the teacher.
- (2) If any such request is made, the Board is to refer the matter to a member of the panel for review. The member may then advise the employer whether the employer would be justified in reaching a finding that the teacher has failed to comply with the professional teaching standards.
- (3) Any costs associated with any such request or advice is to be met by the employer.

28 Employer to notify Board of dismissal

If an employer dismisses a teacher from a teaching position on the grounds of the teacher's failure to comply with the professional teaching standards, the employer must notify the Board in writing of the dismissal.

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29 Board may apply to Tribunal for suspension or cancellation of teacher's registration

- (1) If a teacher is dismissed from a teaching position on the grounds of the teacher's failure to comply with the professional teaching standards, the Board may apply to the Tribunal for an order to suspend or cancel the teacher's registration.
- (2) The Board may only make an application for such an order if:
 - (a) in the case of a teacher who has appealed to GREAT or the Industrial Relations Commission against the dismissal, the appeal:
 - (i) has not been allowed by GREAT or the Commission.
 - (ii) has lapsed or been withdrawn, or
 - (b) any right to appeal against the dismissal is no longer available to the teacher.
- (3) In subsection (2), *GREAT* means the Government and Related Employees Appeal Tribunal.

30 Tribunal may order suspension or cancellation of teacher's registration

- (1) If the Board makes an application under section 29 and the Tribunal is satisfied that there are sufficient grounds to justify the suspension or cancellation of the registration of the teacher for failing to comply with the professional teaching standards, the Tribunal may make an order:
 - (a) suspending the registration of the teacher for such period as the Tribunal thinks fit, or
 - (b) cancelling the teacher's registration.
- (2) The Tribunal may dismiss the application if it is not satisfied that there are sufficient grounds to justify the suspension or cancellation of the teacher's registration.
- (3) If the Tribunal orders the cancellation of a teacher's registration, the Tribunal may also order that the teacher cannot re-apply for registration with the Board within such period (including the period of his or her lifetime) as may be specified by the Tribunal.

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Provisions relating to non-compliance with standards

(4) An order by the Tribunal to suspend or cancel a teacher's registration takes effect on the date specified in the order. The Board is authorised to amend the Register accordingly.

31 Appeals to Appeal Panel against decisions and orders of Tribunal

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An order or other decision made by the Tribunal under section 30 may be appealed to an Appeal Panel of the Tribunal under Part 1 of Chapter 7 of the *Administrative Decisions Tribunal Act 1997* by a party to the proceedings in which the order or decision is made.

Part 6 Miscellaneous

32 False representation

A person must not make any representation to the effect that the person is a registered teacher if that person is not a registered teacher.

Maximum penalty: 50 penalty units.

33 Contracting out void

- (1) The provisions of this Act and the regulations have effect despite any stipulation to the contrary.
- (2) No contract or agreement made or entered into before or after the commencement of this section operates to annul, vary or exclude any of the provisions of this Act or the regulations.

34 Delegation of functions

The Board may delegate to any person or body any of the functions of the Board (other than this power of delegation).

35 Personal liability

Any thing done or omitted to be done by:

- (a) the Board, or
- (b) a director, or
- (c) a member of a committee of the Board, or
- (d) the General Manager, or
- (e) a member of the staff of the Board, or
- (f) a member of a panel referred to in section 27 (2), or
- (g) any other person acting under the direction of the Board.

does not, if the thing was done or omitted to be done in good faith for the purposes of executing this or any other Act, subject the director, member of the committee. General Manager, staff member, member of the panel, or person so acting, personally to any action, liability, claim or demand.

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Miscellaneous

36 Proceedings for offences

Proceedings for an offence under this Act or the regulations are to be dealt with summarily before a Local Court constituted by a Magistrate sitting alone.

37 Act to bind Crown

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This Act binds the Crown in right of New South Wales and, in so far as the legislative power of the Parliament of New South Wales permits, the Crown in all its other capacities.

38 Regulations

- (1) The Governor may make regulations, not inconsistent with this Act, for or with respect to any matter that by this Act is required or permitted to be prescribed or that is necessary or convenient to be prescribed for carrying out or giving effect to this Act.
- (2) The regulations may create an offence punishable by a penalty not exceeding 50 penalty units.

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39 Amendment of Acts

Each Act specified in Schedule 2 is amended as set out in that Schedule.

40 Review of Act

- (1) The Minister is to review this Act to determine whether the policy objectives of the Act remain valid and whether the terms of the Act remain appropriate for securing those objectives.
- (2) The review is to be undertaken as soon as possible after the period of 5 years from the date of assent to this Act.
- (3) A report on the outcome of the review is to be tabled in each House of Parliament within 12 months after the end of the period of 5 years.

Schedule 1 Directors of Board

(Section 7 (6))

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1 Terms of office of directors

Subject to this Schedule, a director holds office for such period (not exceeding 3 years) as is specified in the instrument of appointment of the director, but is eligible (if otherwise qualified) for re-appointment.

2 Remuneration

A director is entitled to be paid such remuneration (including travelling and subsistence allowances) as the Minister may from time to time determine in respect of the director.

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3 Deputies

(1) The Minister may, from time to time, appoint a person to be the deputy of a director, and the Minister may revoke any such appointment.

(2) In the absence of a director, the director's deputy may, if available, act in the place of the member.

- (3) While acting in the place of a director, a person:
 - (a) has all the functions of the director and is taken to be a director, and

(b) is entitled to be paid such remuneration (including travelling and subsistence allowances) as the Minister may from time to time determine in respect of the person.

(4) For the purposes of this clause, a vacancy in the office of a director is taken to be an absence of the director.

4 Vacancy in office of director

- (1) The office of a director becomes vacant if the director:
 - (a) dies, or
 - (b) completes a term of office and is not re-appointed, or

If the office of any director becomes vacant, a person is, subject to this Act, to be appointed to fill the vacancy.

6 Acting Chairperson

- (1) In the absence of the Chairperson of the directors, the Minister is to appoint one of the other directors to act in the place of the Chairperson.
- (2) While acting in the place of the Chairperson, the director has all the functions of the Chairperson and is taken to be the Chairperson.

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7 Disclosure of pecuniary interests

- (1) If:
 - (a) a director has a direct or indirect pecuniary interest in a matter being considered or about to be considered at a meeting of the directors, and

(b) the interest appears to raise a conflict with the proper performance of the director's duties in relation to the consideration of the matter,

the director must, as soon as possible after the relevant facts have come to the director's knowledge, disclose the nature of the interest at a meeting of the directors.

- (2) A disclosure by a director at a meeting of the directors that the director:
 - (a) is a member, or is in the employment, of a specified company or other body, or
 - (b) is a partner, or is in the employment, of a specified person, or
 - (c) has some other specified interest relating to a specified company or other body or to a specified person,

is a sufficient disclosure of the nature of the interest in any matter relating to that company or other body or to that person which may arise after the date of the disclosure and which is required to be disclosed under subclause (1).

- (3) Particulars of any disclosure made under this clause must be recorded by the directors in a book kept for the purpose and that book must be open at all reasonable hours for inspection by any person on payment of the fee determined by the directors.
- (4) After a director has disclosed the nature of an interest in any matter, the director must not, unless the Minister or the directors otherwise determine:
 - (a) be present during any deliberation of the directors with respect to the matter, or
 - (b) take part in any decision of the directors with respect to the matter.
