

To the Honorable the Legislative Council
of New South Wales in Council assembled:

~~Dear Sirs~~ The Humble Petition of the undersigned Female Inhabitants
of the City of Sydney:
Respectfully Sheweth.

That your Petitioners, the wives and daughters of the Citizens of Sydney,
have watched with feelings of deep anxiety and alarm the long-suspended question of
the Revocation of Transportation, before your Honorable House.

That their apprehensions of the vast calamity which would be inflicted
on New South Wales, by its recurrence to the condition of a Penal Settlement, were
allayed into a satisfactory tranquillity by the vote of your Honorable House on the first
day of June 1814, and by the noble bearing and the unanimous decision of the Colonists
generally, at the same period, against the Transportation of British Criminals to those
shores, under any system, however much improved or modified.

That the feeling of security then partially established, has since been
greatly shaken by the intelligence that Her Majesty's Government refused to act upon
the solemn and unanimous resolve of the Legislative Council of the Colony, on this
momentous question, until it should be reconsidered and reiterated; and at the same
time declared that the opinions of the Colonists could only be received as expressed by
their constitutional representatives.

That your Petitioners have learnt that in consequence of this
disturbing question being referred back by the Imperial Government for your re-
consideration; a motion re-affirming your former resolution against Transportation
is now before your Honorable House.

That your Petitioners approach your Honorable House, having
manifold, most sacred, and responsible duties to discharge, in the infant training
and moral instruction of those on whose virtues Australia must depend for the
future; and therefore regarding the possible infliction of any portion of the criminals
of another community as an evil which would be fearfully perilous to the high interests
of humanity necessarily and irrevocably committed to their hands:—

That your Petitioners, on behalf of the rising generation especially,
do most earnestly pray that your Honorable House will put a final period to the
peace-destroying agitation of this question of Transportation, by ~~practically~~ and
unanimously reiterating your Petition to Her Most Gracious Majesty for the
revocation of the order in Council which continues New South Wales a Penal
Colony:
