Proclamation by His Excellency the Right Honorable VICTOR ALBERT GEORGE, EARL OF JERSEY, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies.

IN pursuance of the power and authority vested in me as such Governor as aforesaid, by virtue of the act intituled "*An Act to confer a Constitution on New South Wales and to grant a Civil List to Her Majesty,*" as assented to by her Majesty under the authority of the act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the session of the 18th and 19th years of the reign of her said Majesty, intituled "*An Act to enable Her Majesty to assent to a Bill as amended of the Legislature of New South Wales to confer a Constitution on New South Wales and to grant a Civil List to Her Majesty,*"—I do hereby proclaim that a session of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly for the colony of New South Wales, for the despatch of business, shall commence and be holden on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of July instant, at twelve o'clock at noon, in the buildings known as the Legislative Council Chambers, in Macquarie-street, in the city of Sydney ; and the members of the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly respectively are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my hand and seal, at Government House, Sydney, this third day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and in the fifty-fifth year of her Majesty's reign.

# PUBLIC STATUTES OF THE SESSION.

FIFTEENTH PARLIAMENT.—FIRST SESSION.

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**APPROPRIATION ACT (55 VIC. No. 36)—**

An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain sums to make good the supplies granted for the service of the year 1892, and for the year 1891 and previous years. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. See, 25 March, 1892. Assented to 1 April, 1892.]

**ARBITRATION ACT (55 VIC. No. 32)—**

An Act to amend and consolidate the law relating to arbitration. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Reid, 29 July, 1891. Assented to, 31 March, 1892.]

**BANKERS BOOKS EVIDENCE ACT (55 VIC. No. 4)—**

An Act to amend the law of evidence with respect to Bankers' Books. [Initiated in the Council by Mr. Simpson, 13 August, 1891. Assented to, 24 November, 1891.]

**CHILDREN'S PROTECTION ACT (55 VIC. No. 30)—**

An Act to provide for the protection of children. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Neild, 26 July, 1891. Assented to, 31 March, 1892.]

**CITY OF SYDNEY PAVING ACT (55 VIC. No. 22)—**

An Act to amend the Sydney Corporation Act of 1879, and to authorise and empower the Municipal Council of Sydney to pave, amend, and repair all footways, including gateways, crossings, or other entrances from the street to any premises in the City of Sydney, and to defray the cost and the expense thereof out of the city fund. [Initiated in the Council by Mr. R. E. O'Connor, 18 February, 1892. Assented to, 24 March, 1892.]

**CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND ACT (55 VIC. No. 2)—**

An Act to apply certain sums out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales towards the services of the year 1891, and for a service to be hereafter provided for by loan. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. See, 17 November, 1891. Assented to, 21 November, 1891.]

**CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND ACT, No. 2 (55 VIC. No. 10)—**

An Act to apply certain sums out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales towards the services of the year 1892, and for a service to be hereafter provided for by loan. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. See, 2 February, 1892. Assented to, 6 February, 1892.]

**CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND ACT, No. 3 (55 VIC. No. 14)—**

An Act to apply certain sums out of Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales, towards the services of the year 1892, and for a service to be hereafter provided for by loan. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. See, 24 February, 1892. Assented to, 29 February, 1892.]

**CRIMINAL LAW AND EVIDENCE AMENDMENT ACT (55 VIC. No. 5)—**

An Act to amend the criminal law and certain laws for the administration of justice. [Initiated in the Council by Mr. Simpson, 29 July, 1891. Assented to, 14 December, 1891.]

**CROWN LANDS ACT AMENDMENT ACT (55 VIC. No. 1)—**

An Act to validate certain forfeitures, and certain reversals of forfeitures, of lands sold or leased by the Crown, and to declare the effect of such reversals; to enable the Minister for Lands to reverse forfeitures; and to amend the law in respect of forfeitures and the reversal thereof; to permit further inquiries to be held in connection with forfeitures and to facilitate the effectual waiver thereof; to prevent collusion at ballots upon conflicting applications; and for the purposes aforesaid to amend the Crown Lands Act of 1884, and the acts amending the same. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Bruncker, 5 August, 1891. Assented to, 14 October, 1891.]

**CUSTOMS DUTIES ACT (55 VIC. No. 16)—**

An Act for the establishment of a new tariff of Customs duties, and for purposes connected with, consequent upon, and incidental to the purposes aforesaid. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr See, 22 December, 1891. Assented to, 2 March, 1892.]

**DISEASED ANIMALS AND MEAT ACT (55 VIC. No. 17).—**
