It is the province of knowledge to speak, and of wisdom to listen, 264. An hon. member should not base his speech upon another's interjection, 1981. An hon. member is entitled to be heard in silence, 2131, 2136, 2146, 2148, 2163, 2392, 3368, 3409, 3421.
An hon. member, when speaking, must refrain from answering interjections and must address his remarks to the Chair, 361.
If an hon. member desires the protection of the Chair against interjections, he must be careful in his choice of words, 1110.
Leave to Introduce, Motion: On a motion for leave to introduce a bill, hon. members may not discuss matters that were not referred to by the Minister in moving for leave to introduce, 356, 358, 359, 363, 365, 366, 368; but must confine their remarks to the motion, 532.
Ministerial Statements: If, in replying to a question, a Minister dealt with a matter of Government policy, his utterances would become a ministerial statement, 1433.

The leader of the Opposition is customarily, but not always, allowed to reply briefly to a ministerial statement: the privilege is, at times, extended to the leader of the Country party, but cannot be extended to other hon. members, 711.

New South Wales Parliament: Air-conditioning: Legislative Assembly Chamber, *obs.*, 2824.

Parliamentary Refreshment Room meal charges, *obs.*, 2519.

Sound reinforcement system in Legislative Assembly Chamber, 3185, 3195.

Notice of Motion: Standing Orders 49 and 110A. When notice of a motion is given it is theoretically on the business paper, though the latter may not have been printed. Mr. Speaker had no reason for believing that a motion of censure would not be dealt with by the House within a reasonable time. 2125. The period between 10th March and 6th April was not "a reasonable time" in the purposes of the Standing Order. 2126.

Personal Explanation: An hon. member is not entitled to canvass a Minister's reply, or to debate it, by means of a personal explanation, 341. A personal explanation would allude to a misstatement made by the hon. member, to an omission, or to something else hinging on his original statement, 2114.

An hon. member may not supplement his speech or introduce entirely new matter by means of a personal explanation, 2390.

A personal explanation may not be made by an hon. member in respect of a discussion in the Chamber in the course of which his name was not mentioned, 440.

A personal explanation may be made to assist the interpretation of a question without notice, but not as a request for a ruling, 2578.

In a personal explanation an hon. member may not reflect upon the character of another hon. member, 2580.

An hon. member may not reply to a personal explanation except by a personal explanation; in so doing, his remarks must be confined to the statements made insofar as they are deemed to be a misrepresentation of facts, 2897, 3137.

Personal explanation allowed, 3419.

Point of Order: "No point of order", 1432, 1922, 2827, 3339.

Point of order taken facetiously, 1378.

It is not out of order for an hon. member to say that another hon. member "came into this House accidentally," 1670.

Premier: Under the established practice of the House, the leader of the Opposition, in common with the Premier or a Minister in charge of a bill, may base his speech upon copious notes, 942.

When sessional orders provide that general business shall take precedence, no order of the day is read. The Speaker is entitled to call the Premier at any time that he deems fit, 806.

The Premier is entitled to make passing reference to imputations made by an hon. member, 818.

The Premier is entitled to answer any matter in his own way provided he observes the ordinary rules of debate, 2342, 2343.

An hon. member must accept an assurance given by the Premier that he would agree to a motion, 3677, though he may debate the motion, 3678.

Questions: The decorum of the House, and courtesy, require that hon. members should observe silence during question time, 254, 766, 1108, 1290.

A supplementary question must be on the same subject as the original question, 258. Question disallowed because it was similar to a number of previous questions, 1946.

In reply to a question about a circular, a Minister is in order in referring to matters contained in it, 305.

Unless an hon. member accepts responsibility for the authenticity of a statement in the press he may not ask a question based upon it, 2245.

The purpose of a question without notice is to elicit information—not to give it, 2246, 2303.

Hon. members should not ask lengthy questions without notice and Ministers should not make lengthy replies. Questions and answers should both be as direct and epigrammatic as possible, 439, 440, 763. Questions should not be facetious, 1895; they should be couched in moderate language and not unduly expanded, 2195.

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ASSEMBLY (continued):

SPEAKER, MR. (THE HON. W. H. LAMB), RULINGS, OBSERVATIONS AND OPINIONS (*continued*):

In asking a question without notice, an hon. member may not make a statement to the House, 895, 1006.

A Minister's refusal to answer a question without notice is not a matter that concerns the Chair, 895.

A question may not contain an imputation such as that the Premier was prepared to allow men who are well-known to be associated with the Communist party to leave Australia as an authorised representative, 798.

In a question without notice, an hon. member may not ask a Minister to express an opinion, 522, 1464, 2672, 2891, 2971, 3135.

The word "squandered" should not be used in asking a question, 1806.

Time allowed for questions without notice, *obs.*, 2581.

Question in regard to hon. member for South Coast and the Liberal Party, 3139.

A Minister may answer a question in any way he pleases, 1427, 2249, 3709.

If a Minister continued at length his reply to a question without notice Mr. Speaker would be compelled to rule that he was making a ministerial statement, 3189, 3190.

Questions are not in order that cast reflections upon or impute improper motives to any hon. member and thereby detract from the dignity and decency of the Chamber, 3194.

Relevancy of Debate: Debate must be relevant to the motion before the House, 1683, 1922, 1923, 2144, 2154, 2155, 2172, 2219, 2497, 2498, 2500, 2834, 3264, 3265, 3266, 3267.

An hon. member making the statement that the Commissioner of Police "was horribly shocked" should be in a position to tell the House that he had been informed by the Commissioner of Police that this was a fact, 3676.

Second-Reading Debate: In a second-reading speech the Minister may not take occasion to reply to a question without notice, but must confine his remarks to the bill itself, 444.

Details of a measure may not be discussed in a second-reading debate; hon. members may discuss them in Committee, 459, 1057, 1109.

Matters referred to in debate on the second-reading of a bill must be relevant to the bill or to the Minister's second-

An hon. member was out of order in referring to the Minister for Conservation as "Mr. Hamlet" or by any other title, 3291.

An hon. member should not take umbrage at facetious remarks, 3410.

The term "snide lawyer" applied to an hon. member would be unparliamentary, 3419.

Special Adjournment: On a motion for special adjournment of the House debate must be confined to the matter of the adjournment to a specific date: it is out of order, for instance, to discuss controls, 3157, 3158.

Unparliamentary Behaviour: An hon. member may not refer to any Government in the Commonwealth of Australia as a socialist government, *obs.*, 1013.

The words "alleged outburst" in reference to a statement by the Premier, should not be used, 1005.

An hon. member may not be referred to by name, 1922.

A reference to "certain tactics that have been adopted by the Opposition" was not an imputation of improper motives, 807.

Hon. members' expulsion, 2240, 2581. Conduct of hon. member for Wollondilly, 2242, 2244.

Imputation of improper motives prohibited by Standing Order 152, *obs.*, 1947.

Urgency, Motion: A point of order having been taken that the matter referred to in a motion of urgency was *sub judice*, Mr. Speaker, having no assurance from the Premier or the Attorney-General that it was not *sub judice*, allowed the House to determine the question of urgency; the

An hon. member is entitled to bring before the House for discussion any matter which is submitted in accordance with the practice of the House. It is the responsibility of the House to decide whether he shall be permitted to do so as a matter of urgency, 2966.

The fact that parts of the substantive motion involved are not in order, does not necessarily require the Speaker to rule out of order a related motion of urgency, 942.
