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SPEAKER, MR. (THE HON. W. H. LAMB),
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Adjournment: When Estimates are under consideration, an hon. member speaking to the motion for adjournment of the House is restricted to urgent matters affecting his electorate, 1037.

No matter that gives rise to general debate may be raised on the motion for the adjournment of the House, 1821, 2268, 2367.

Alleged Infringement of Standing Orders: An hon. member claiming that there has been a violation of the standing orders must substantiate that claim, 2097.

Business of the House: Any item of business called by Mr. Speaker must be dealt with by the House without interruption.

Takes precedence over an hon. member's motion, 322.

When Mr. Speaker has asked for any petitions, until he makes a further announcement there is no business before the House, and a ministerial statement may be made or other business dealt with, provided that the hon. member concerned catches the Speaker's eye, 2382.

Chair: It is the duty of every hon. member to maintain the dignity and decorum of the House, and he is expected to assist Mr. Speaker to do so, 318; while Mr. Speaker is on his feet hon. members should restrain themselves, 318, 321, 1896; they should not walk across the chamber or rise to their feet, 2962.

No hon. member other than Mr. Speaker may say that he does not want to hear anyone, 1947.

A ruling of the Chair may not be canvassed, 2103; though dissent may be moved in accordance with the standing orders, 2103; hon. members may not argue with the Chair, 2497.

Mr. Speaker cannot be informed by newspaper reports, 2367; and is bound by the standing orders, 2970.

Mr. Speaker has no authority thereunder to direct an hon. member to move a substantive motion at the conclusion of a division, 2968.

Debate: No standing order obliges a Minister to accept an hon. member's word on any matter, 317.

An hon. member has the right of reply on his own motion, 2102.

An hon. member must address the Chair, 2459, 2969; and observe the rules of debate and the practice of the House, 2544.

Division: Chair may give a ruling while in division, 2961.

Cannot be called for unless voices have been given for both the Ayes and Noes (*S.O.* 201), 2104.

Hansard: An hon. member is not entitled to alter the text or verbiage of his galley proofs of *Hansard* beyond correcting obvious mistakes in English or spelling. He may draw attention to any misrepresentation, 289.

An hon. member may quote from *Hansard* for the current session, or an uncorrected pull thereof, provided that it covers the debate before the House, 288; may not discuss, quote or read from it a report of a debate that has been concluded, 290, 2101; this ruling accords with Standing Order 143, *May's Parliamentary Practice and Procedure*, and with the practice of the House of Commons, 310; but in the budget debate an hon. member may refer to the *Hansard* report of the Colonial Treasurer's financial statement, 310.

Hon. member named: Hon. member for Hurstville, 2964, 2968, 2970.

Hon. member removed from Chamber: Hon. member for Lane Cove, 318; hon. member for Hurstville, 2963.

Imputations, Aspersions and Reflections: No hon. member may impute improper motives to another, 320, 624; or to a member of another House of Parliament, 993.

An hon. member may not reflect upon a vote of the House, 2103.

Points of order dismissed, 372, 2371.

A statement that some estate agents are crooks is no allegation against members of the Real Estate Institute as a whole, 1785.

It is not offensive to say that an hon. member has been a member of the Labor or Liberal Party, 2481.

A statement that a Minister does not know the contents of a bill that he is introducing casts an aspersion upon him and should not be made, 2500.

No hon. member may make allegations, insinuations or aspersions against the character of outside persons, whether named or unnamed, unless he brings forward a substantive motion and gives other hon. members a chance to defend those persons: previous ruling confirmed, 2909, 2961, 2962: a Minister who attacks an outside person and quotes evidence in support is speaking under privilege and is not required to move a substantive motion, 2910.

Interjections and Interruptions: Disorderly, 217, 287, 542, 666, 1890, 1896, 2099, 2692, 2790; should not be provoked, 222, 1562, 2099, 2931.

Relevant and sensible or helpful interjections are unobjectionable, but not continuous interjections merely designed to interrupt the speaker, 293, 314.

Not permissible while Ministers are answering questions, 320, 521, 765, 1572, 2484; or replying in a second-reading debate, when time is limited, 2470, 2471, 2605; or when the Leader of the Opposition is replying in a debate on his own motion, 2961.

An hon. member is entitled to be heard in silence, 3142.

Ministerial Statements: The Leader of the Opposition, in replying to a ministerial statement, must confine his remarks to the specific matter dealt with by the Minister, 1531, 1571.

There is precedent for allowing another hon. member, as well as the Leader of the Opposition, to reply to a ministerial statement; Leader of Country Party allowed to address the House for a few minutes, 1709.

Deferred answer to question may be ruled to be a ministerial statement, 1571.

Parliament House: Public inspection on Open Day, 901; visits by schoolchildren, 1624, 1625; conduct of hon. members in precincts, 1948.

Personal Explanations: A personal explanation affords redress to an hon. member who has been misrepresented by a Minister, 250, 1512, 1594, 2481, 2544; but if an hon. member has not been misrepresented he has no reason to make one, 314.

Should not be a speech and is usually limited to two or three minutes, 322; is not an occasion for debate, 1595; can be made only when no business is before the House, 318.

An hon. member may not, under the guise of a personal explanation, rise to defend a colleague or to correct some statement concerning him, 321.

Press: An hon. member who wants to base a question on a press statement must accept responsibility for its authenticity, 850, 902, 940, 993, 1138, 1483, 1629; this curb on hon. members is designed to ensure that the press does not run Parliament, 1044.

Points of Order: Differences of opinion do not constitute a point of order, 291; an hon. member may not merely raise an objection under the guise of, 318.

It is unusual to take two points of order at once, 1624.

May not be taken when Mr. Speaker is on his feet, 318; should not be taken on a question until it has been completed, 2199.

Point of order that discussion of a matter anticipates a debate of which notice has been given, cannot be upheld unless it is clearly shown that the debate is likely to take place within a reasonable time, 2862.

Privilege: The standing order governing rising to privilege requires an hon. member, upon speaking to the matter, to inform the House whether he has a motion to move and, if he has, to outline it, 319; an hon. member's removal from the House without being three times warned in accordance with the standing orders and practice of the House is a matter, not of privilege, but of order, on which a motion of dissent may be moved, 319.

Point of order dismissed, 2784.

An hon. member may say what he likes under privilege, but the abuse of this right is a reflection upon him, 2910.

Questions without Notice: Supplementary questions must relate to the original question, 169, 367, 1043, 1187, 1362, 1624, 2643; and cannot be asked on a deferred reply, 2431.

Question time may not degenerate into a debate by constant interjections, 250; and may not be used, in abuse of the forms of the House, for political propaganda and debate, 250, 1139; but the stating of facts in reply to a question seeking information is not political propaganda, 253.

A Minister, when replying, may answer as he deems fit, 318, 1477, 2578; he should curtail his remarks as much as possible to give all hon. members a reasonable chance of asking pertinent questions during question time, 1702; he may not debate the matter, 1787; but may express his opinion on a matter on which he has personal knowledge, 1785.

An hon. member must not debate his question, 253; must not comment, 658; or give a great deal of information, 992, 1045, 1786; must not preface his question by the words "Is it not a fact that", 1480, 2519; and must not seek an expression of opinion, 2790.

Hon. members must be orderly and allow a Minister to complete his answer, 319, 1188; should not give instructions, by word or gesture, to a Minister who is on his feet, 320.

Questions without notice are not permitted on any matter already finally determined by the House, 446; or already before it, 1861; or likely to be debated within a reasonable time, 2862.

SPEAKER, MR. (THE HON. W. H. LAMB), RULINGS, OBSERVATIONS AND OPINIONS (*continued*):

Lengthy questions or questions containing many figures and miscellaneous data should be put on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 627, 2288.

Questions without notice must relate to the administration of the Minister to whom they are addressed, 901, 1629; and may not be addressed to a Minister without portfolio, 2093.

The sole purpose of a question is to elicit information. It should be couched as briefly as possible, retaining clarity, 1044; and should not be couched in offensive terms, 1787.

Points of order, in respect of a question seeking a Minister's opinion, dismissed, 1134, 1624, 2199.

Point of order, alleging that an hon. member's question was trifling with the House, dismissed, 1139.

Relevancy: An hon. member must confine his remarks to matters relevant to the motion before the House, 960, 1332, 1366, 1496, 1497, 1576, 1819, 1889, 1894, 2097, 2458, 2947, 3197.

An hon. member must restrict his reply on his own motion to matters brought forward in debate, 2102.

Repetition: Tedious repetition is not permitted, 3198.

Seasonal Felicitations: 2263.

Statements and Documents: An hon. member may not read from any document or quote any authority unless he names the author of the document or the source of his information, 2365, 2509, 2512, 2603, 2685, 2686, 2697, 2928.

It is the practice of the House for papers quoted by an hon. member to be tabled, when it is ruled that to do so is in the public interest, 2562.

Sub Judice: Questions ruled out of order on this ground, 2285, 2905.

A departmental inquiry being held into a matter, brings that matter under the *sub judice* rule, 2367.

Tabling of papers: Calling for tabling of papers brings business before the House, 321.

Hon. members should not noisily leave the Chamber while Ministers are tabling documents, 1046.

Urgency: In a debate on urgency there can be no discussion on the substantive motion, 2857; though on a motion of no confidence in Mr. Speaker, the Premier, in reply, may refer to similar motions to show a pattern of action, 370.

Point of order dismissed, 2857.
