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SPEAKER, MR. (THE HON. W. H. LAMB), RULINGS, OBSERVATIONS AND OPINIONS:

*Adjournment:* An hon. member speaking to the motion for the adjournment of the House is restricted to matters affecting his own electorate, 465.

No matter that gives rise to general debate may be raised on the motion for the adjournment of the House, 779.

*Amendments:* An hon. member who wishes to move a further amendment should wait until a prior amendment is dealt with, 108.

An amendment designed to refer a bill to a select committee may be moved on the motion for its second reading (S.O. 253), 664.

*Chair:* Hon. members should listen when Mr. Speaker is speaking, 646; and be prompt to call for a division if one is sought, 646.

An hon. member may not defy or argue with the Chair, 1547, 2412, 2541, 2546; he may be named if he disobeys the Chair, 2105.

It is grossly disorderly for an hon. member to address the Chair when he has been directed to resume his seat, 2546.

Rulings of the Chair may not be canvassed, 735, 1717, 2541, 2546; but the forms of the House provide a remedy for any hon. member who is dissatisfied with a ruling, 1276, 2546.

By practice and procedure, Mr. Speaker directs, never requests, 1547.

*Debate:* Mr. Speaker is bound by standing orders to put the question when the gag is moved by the Government Whip, 843.

An hon. member may, with the unanimous consent of the House, withdraw his motion; or the question that the motion be withdrawn may be put, 1114.

Tedious repetition is not permitted, 1898.

Debate on a bill at the second-reading stage is restricted to principles; an hon. member who attempts to concern himself with all its details may be guilty of tedious repetition, 2179.

In debate on a motion for the disallowance of regulations, the mover, though he has had an extension of ten minutes, may, in accordance with precedent, be heard again in reply, 609.

*Dissent:* A motion of dissent may be moved from a ruling given on a matter that is entirely within the discretion of the Chair, 1368.

When debate on a motion of dissent has exceeded thirty minutes the Speaker may put the question (S.O. 161); or, at his discretion, he may allow the mover to reply, 1374.

*Imputations, Aspersions and Offensive Remarks:* No hon. member may cast aspersions on another, 189, 1128; or impute dishonesty or improper motives to him, 236, 780, 1022; or indulge in personalities, 1724.

A direct statement is no imputation, 780.

An hon. member is entitled to express his opinion, though he may not make a direct imputation, 1023.

A withdrawal directed by the Chair must be unqualified, 780.

It is offensive to suggest that a Minister's speech was wholly prepared by departmental officers or that he is not competent to present a bill; and an hon. member must not persist in remarks offensive to the Minister about his handling of the bill, 1717.

An Opposition member may not, under the cloak of asking that a remark be withdrawn, offend every member on the Government side by saying that he has grown up mentally and has left the Labor Party, 1724.

*Interjections and Interruptions:* All hon. members are entitled to be heard in silence, 62, 735, 736, 1662, 1668, 1857, 1863, 1896; especially an hon. member who has almost exhausted his time, 260.

Interjections are disorderly and a transgression of standing orders, 1899, 2031, 2417, 2428; when several hon. members are shouting at the same time it is almost impossible for the Chair to follow the proceedings, 2505; every hon. member would be able to hear if the House remained reasonably quiet, 2144.

Interjections are not permitted while a Minister is answering a question, 308, 338, 514, 599, 600, 602, 634, 1022; though reasonable and sensible interjections are unobjectionable, 1495; a Minister is most orderly in totally disregarding all interjections, 1562.

Hon. members should not indulge in conversation and crossfire while a Minister is addressing the House, 1076; or indicate their attitude by interruptions when he is delivering his second-reading speech on an important bill, 2339.

Hon. members may not jump to their feet and object to interjections, 372.

An hon. member may answer the remarks of another, not by interjections and uproar while that hon. member is speaking, but when he himself gets the call, 1662.

Interjections are most unusual when an hon. member is ventilating a grievance affecting his electorate on a motion for the adjournment of the House, 1857.

Interruptions when Mr. Speaker is on his feet are grossly insulting, 34.

*Ministerial Statements:* The Leader of the Opposition, in replying to a ministerial statement, must confine his remarks to the matter dealt with by the Minister, 735, 736.

Mr. Speaker may rule whether a Minister is making a ministerial statement, 1276.

A Minister's remarks when tabling a report, making reference to a previous ministerial statement, are not necessarily a ministerial statement, 1370.

*Parliament House:* Public inspection on Open Day and film survey of Parliament, 978.

*Personal Explanation:* A Minister may make a personal explanation in the same way as any other hon. member; in doing so he should not cast aspersions upon an hon. member, 1128.

An hon. member must confine his remarks to his personal explanation, 1128; and he may not introduce matter that can be debated, 1815.

A personal explanation is made by the indulgence of the House, 1129; and may relate to a misrepresentation on the floor of the House by a Minister or another hon. member, 1022; but not to misrepresentation by someone outside Parliament, 1815.

*Press:* It is not in order to ask merely whether a newspaper statement is true, though attention may be drawn to it provided the hon. member accepts responsibility for its accuracy, 1676, 1735.

Reference may be made to the title of a newspaper report though its contents may not be quoted, 1864.

The press has no representation on the floor of the House and cannot be allowed to run Parliament, 1866.

No question seeking confirmation of rumours or press reports is permitted; and no hon. member may quote from newspaper articles when the challenge is to their accuracy, 1866; though a Minister is entitled to quote from any newspaper when delivering a second-reading speech, 2031, 2033.

An hon. member who had not made a statement appearing in the press could reasonably be expected to deny it when challenged in the House, 1021.

*Questions without Notice*: A supplementary question must relate to the previous question, 1221, 1738, 1809, 1860; may be placed on the *Questions and Answers* paper if the Minister has asked that the previous question be so placed, 1675; and does not call for a further reply if already answered in the Minister's reply to the preceding question, 818.

A second supplementary question may not be asked on the one subject, 104.

Questions without notice are asked to seek information, 1364; they should not themselves contain personal or other information, 157, 1366, 1440, 2146; or comment or explanation, 631, 1024, 1361, 1364, 1366, 1928, 2145, 2223, 2226 2502, 2504; or seek an opinion, 2504.

All questions without notice are addressed through the Chair, 1020.

Questions should begin with the phrase "Is it a fact?", 2147, 2226, 2383; to ask a Minister whether he is aware of a thing is giving, not seeking, information, 1268.

Questions without notice may not be asked on a matter upon which a debate has been initiated by the moving of a motion, 1079.

Questions without notice must relate to the administration of the Minister to whom they are addressed, 2507; and the Minister may answer in his own way, 514, 602, 2319; hon. members have no right to interject in an attempt to answer the question themselves, 514, 599, 1490, 1740.

At question time persistent interjections give rise to debate, 602, 2223, 2227; and repeated stupid interjections are not fair to other hon. members who want to ask questions before question time has expired, 1551.

Questions without notice should be straightforward and as brief as possible, 2140; very wide questions or those containing many statistics should be put on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 981, 1545, 1547.

Point of order, alleging that a question contravened Standing Order 148 relating to the use in debate of the name of Her Majesty, dismissed, 2507.

*Read Speeches*: By longstanding practice Ministers and leaders of parties may read their speeches, 1562, 1893.

*Relevance*: An hon. member must confine his remarks to matters relevant to the motion before the House, 583, 584, 1368, 1369, 1370, 2023, 2541, 2545, 2546; or to the bill under consideration, 1717, 1896, 1902, 2038, 2239, 2412; though slight departures from relevancy may be allowed when an hon. member wants to make a point, 1897.

An hon. member may not refer in the same debate to what another hon. member was prevented from discussing on the ground of irrelevancy, 584.

In debate on a motion for the acquisition of estates for closer settlement certain scope is allowed by standing orders, 2547; and the Minister in reply may briefly refer to the criticism levelled during the debate against him and the Government, 2548.

Point of order, on relevancy, dismissed, 2542.

*Statements and Documents*: An hon. member may not read from a letter unless he names the writer, 464; or quote from somebody's pay envelope unless he names the person and gives the origin of the document to establish its authenticity; if he wishes to quote a specific instance he must give his authority, 2411; an hon. member in giving an assurance on the authenticity of a document from which he is quoting must observe the relevant practices and procedures, 2412.

*Tabling of Papers*: Hon. members should remain quiet while Ministers are tabling papers, 346.

A Minister's remarks when tabling a report are not necessarily a ministerial statement, 1370.

*Words and Expressions required to be Withdrawn*: "The hon. member is calling the Governor a liar." 60.

"The same phoney figures as last year," 189.
