Motions: It is competent for the House to consider a motion that seeks to direct attention to particular matters that are within the sphere of the federal Government and for the House to make recommendations in connection therewith. A point of order asserting that such a motion was out of order was over-ruled, 2219.*Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions*: When a denial is made it is usual to accept the word of the member making it. A member was asked to withdraw the statement that another member had named as communists dozens of persons who were not communists, but no apology was warranted, 894. A member's statement that he did not use words complained of, must be accepted, 2519. "You have been won over already" was not heard by the member at whom it was directed and no request was made by him for its withdrawal; an objection by a third member did not found a point of order, 1253, 2400. A member's remarks on how a case was conducted before a judge was not an attack on the judge, 2042.

Mr. Deputy Speaker would like withdrawn the expression, "You may as well give up", which insinuates that he is not doing his duties correctly, 2964.

The following expressions were withdrawn: "If the hon. member can spare time from the communist-run show with which he is associated", 225. "Cowardly curs", 1253.

Personal Explanation: A member making a personal explanation must speak for himself alone, 1549. A personal explanation may be made only at the appropriate stage, 2238, 2402, 2403 and is confined to explanation of a misrepresentation; it may not be made purely for the purpose of contradicting another member, 2403. When a member withdraws and apologises for his

words, that is the end of a personal explanation based upon them, 2404. A point of order challenging a member's personal explanation was not upheld, 1548, 1549.

Points of Order: A member may not base a point of order upon his disagreement with the views of the member addressing the House, 230, 2207; or upon his questioning of Mr. Chairman's control of the Committee, 1682. A point of order contesting a member's right to express his opinion is not tenable, 1256. When Mr. Deputy Speaker has ruled that only a personal explanation will be heard, a point of order or request for withdrawal of words will not be heard, 551. No point of order involved, 463, 2219, 2235, 2403, 2797.

Press: When a member cannot vouch for the fact that information he saw in the press is correct, he will not be allowed to put it before the Committee, 1690, 1691; he will be allowed to make brief reference only to articles in the newspapers, 1691.

Privilege: Debate on a question of privilege is a matter for the House, not for the Committee of the Whole House, 690.

Procedure: By amendment of the standing orders, amendments must be in writing and when consideration of a bill has been completed the Chairman shall leave the Chair to report without any motion being proposed, 780. A point of order challenging procedure was unfounded, 1389. Mr. Deputy Speaker called on the Clerk to read the next order of the day and the Premier moved the adjournment of the House, 1835. Forty-one clauses of a bill were taken *in globo*, 2949, 2950.

Quorum: A member's mode of calling attention to the state of the House is questioned, 892, 1441.

Relevance: When members have been given latitude and no point has been taken to restrict debate, a member who continues the debate along the lines it has followed for days is in order, 566. When considerable latitude has been given in a debate it would be wrong to restrict a member who wants to touch briefly on some matter which could perhaps be linked with the Loan Estimates before the Committee, 1922, but he should link his remarks as quickly as he can, 1920, 1923, 2068.

A member may not go over the ground of a debate already completed, 687, 688, 690. The Chairman may call the attention of the Committee to continued irrelevance

A member having the floor has the right to make his speech as he wishes, 2237, and will not be asked to name anyone, 2238. In the budget debate a member should not make a speech suitable for the Estimates debate, 1257. In the Loan Estimates debate he may deviate from the absolute wording of the estimate so long as he does not overdo it, 1920, and a point of order contesting relevancy is not upheld, 1921, 1930.

Mr. Chairman is not responsible for rulings given when he was not in the Chair and a point of order based on such rulings is not upheld, 1920. A point of order contesting the relevance of responses to continual interjections aimed at diverting the debate is not upheld, 1372, 1376.

Address in Reply: Lieutenant-Governor's Speech, 65; Presentation, 648, 672.

Adjournment: A member would not be ruled out of order simply because he raised on the adjournment motion a matter that is controversial. However, if he raises the type of thing that could lead to general debate, it must be ruled out of order. Compulsory unionism is such a matter, 879. A member may discuss a matter that has nothing to do with his electorate, but matters such as racial discrimination and apartheid could lead to general debate, 2089, 2090. A member sought to discuss a bill that had passed all stages in the Assembly and been returned from the Council without amendment, 1408. A member may speak on any matter that does not give rise to general debate, 3030, but he will not be permitted simply to endorse comments eloquently and properly put by another member; he must deal with something specific, 3031.

In the absence of a member who has given notice under Standing Order 49, the motion lapses, 1133. Understandable bewilderment of some members in the debate under Standing Order 49, 1711. A motion under Standing Order 49 to debate a matter that is the subject of a question on the *Questions and Answers* paper does not, of course, anticipate debate and nothing in the standing orders precludes a member from answering the question in full, 2037. Previous rulings, logic and common sense dictate that when there has been no debate on a motion under Standing Order 49 in consequence of the application of the closure, there is nothing to reply to, 2575.

Administration of the Government: Assumption by the Lieutenant-Governor, 25.

Amendments: An amendment which merely substitutes words of the same purport as the words left out is out of order; also, it is not in order to omit a substantial part of a question and re-insert most of that by way of amendment, 773.

Anticipation of Debate: The rule against anticipation of debate applies to debates on ordinary bills that come before the House but not to debate on the Budget, 994.

Auditor-General's Report: Tabled, 1000.

Chair: Mr. Speaker defers to a member who took the point of order that the Speaker as custodian of the dignity of Parliament should refer to him as the hon. member for the electorate he represents, not merely point a pencil and say, "Maitland again". If the member showed as much courtesy to the House as does Mr. Speaker, he would not be called to order three times, 637, 654. Mr. Speaker is not the type to be intimidated, 710. No member will be permitted to defy the Chair, 1043; or leave the Chamber while the Speaker is on his feet, 1045.

After a member's remarks on the adjournment motion have been ruled out of order under the *sub judice* rule, he still has the call to raise other points, 1632.

Divisions: No standing order requires a member to stand when he is calling for a division, 1797.

Hansard: Under the standing orders it is permissible for a member to quote from *Hansard* on the debate under discussion, 620.

Answers to questions about complete daily proof of proceedings for all members, 1539, and about allowing members to have a *Hansard* mailing list, 1702.

Interjections and Interruptions: A Minister should be heard in silence, 643. Opposition members should co-operate with Ministers answering questions without notice by refraining from interjecting, 412. When a member accused of telling a deliberate lie takes a point of order, it is unfair for someone else to interject that the member cannot take it, 572.

Too much conversation in the Chamber is disorderly, 629, 2891.

Ministerial Statements: Mr. Speaker refuses request that he rule that an answer to a question is a ministerial statement, 1123.

Motions: Standing Order 104 provides that a notice of motion may not be set down for discussion for a date later than the fourth next sitting day on which similar notices have precedence, 535. It is in order to discuss something that has been called for by consent, 1266. A motion may not be moved by consent if a member wishes to object, 2952. When a member submitted notice of a motion that was really two motions, he was advised to discuss the matter with one of the Clerks of the House, 1544.

Time for giving notice of motions, 1001, 1034, 1038. Dissent from ruling concerning time for giving notice of motions, ruled out of order, 1135.

(See also *Urgency*.)

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: The significance of the remark, "Your behaviour was not the best in the Ku-ring-gai Council Chambers", escaped Mr. Speaker, but if it contained some sinister reference to another member, it should be withdrawn. The member making the remark withdrew and apologised for making reflections on the character of the member, 574. If a member felt that the remark that he had been through the elementary classes of the Left Book Club was offensive to him—that he was an official member of the Left Book Club—it was withdrawn, 1042, 1043, 1044.

It is not offensive to refer to the fact that members are entitled, if they wish, to march on a particular day to celebrate something important to their own party, 1044. Withdrawal was sought of an insinuation and implication that because people march in the street with communists, they have affiliations with them. The member making the remark was named, 1045, 1046, 1047, 1049. He declared that he made a brief statement of fact which contained no implication whatever; if any was inferred by members, he withdrew it, 1048, 1049.

A member said, "We did not do so for the reason that the Premier wanted to quaff the amber liquid and eat some sandwiches with his millionaire friend", and intimated that he was referring to a social function and made no reflection on the Premier. When ordered to withdraw the member did so, and gave notice of dissent, 1267; and apologised, 1271.

After a member has withdrawn and apologised it is improper to refer again to the incident, 1715, 1716. A point of order objecting to the words, "The hon. member tried to mislead hon. members" was not upheld and members were asked not to become supersensitive about ordinary, everyday idiom, 1718. A member may not take a point of order on the ground that a remark is offensive to someone else outside the Parliament, 2481.

Though no objection was raised to the use of the word "liar", Mr. Speaker deplores the practice, which he regards as unparliamentary, and the fact that no member objected does not mean that the word can

be used with impunity, 153. "Lying" and "liar" have always been regarded as unparliamentary and should be withdrawn, 572. "Lie" was withdrawn, 1646.

"You are now seeking from your position as Speaker to reach some stage where you can find an offensive inference and then deal with the Deputy Leader of the Opposition" was a disgraceful and disgusting remark and required to be withdrawn, 1047.

"Bloody" is a word that must not be used, 2953. The following expressions were withdrawn: "mongrel", 573. "The Minister instructed Mr. Slattery what to say at the inquiry"; also, "I withdraw any personal imputation against the Minister and transfer it instead to the Government collectively", 634. "This jungle juice outburst", 1271. "You put him out of business", 1320. "He is building up a case on behalf of the shares he himself holds", 1715. "He knows that is deliberately untrue", 1717. "The fanatical ravings of this idiot", 1720. "You are one of them", 2481.

"Hell of a shock", could have been better expressed, 154. "Humbug" is not offensive, 1041.

It is correct that members must not impute motives to other members of Parliament but the whole principle of freedom of speech and parliamentary privilege would go by the board if it were insisted that motives may not be imputed to strangers. At the same time, members should be particularly careful in what they say about persons who have no right to defend themselves in the same way, 1301.

A point of order based on remarks described as filthy insinuations was not upheld; anybody who regarded the comments as filthy was particularly sensitive, 1637. An objection to a question on the ground that it was scurrilous and imputed improper motives to a member and made personal reflections on him, was not upheld; the question was facetious, perhaps, 3003.

Parliament: Report of select committee upon the coal industry, appointed in 1847 by the Legislative Council, 479. Extension to galleries of sound amplification in Chamber, 579.

It is extremely disorderly for a member in the House to accept a document passed over from Mr. Speaker's gallery; the member is asked to refrain from any contact with the public gallery, 646. When it was stated that a message was handed over from the public

gallery to a member in the Chamber, Mr. Speaker stated that he saw a piece of paper but did not know what it was. Mr. Speaker deplored the communication between members and people in the public gallery and reprimanded both parties, 648. Personal explanation by the member concerned, 660, 661, 662. Motion of privilege, 662, 663.

Personal Explanation: If a member claims he has been misrepresented, he may make brief reference to statements made by him but advantage must not be taken of the standing order to debate the matter, 645. A member is confined to an explanation of how he has been misrepresented, 659, and he may explain matters of a personal nature, 660, 661, 662. A certain amount of latitude is always extended to a member making a personal explanation. Sometimes personal explanations are a little outside the standing orders; usually they are within them. A member should be heard in silence, 1648.

A personal explanation may not be the subject of debate, 1646, 1648. Mr. Speaker is concerned that members do not use the form to enter into debate and reply to something said by another member, 2717. He will not accept a statement as a personal explanation if the member's point of explanation is that something was said in a nasty way; this is an abuse, 2718.

A personal explanation is not permitted when there has been no misrepresentation, 2899, 2900. A point of order contesting a members right to make a personal explanation was not upheld, 1545.

Petitions: A petition must be in writing or typewritten; no printed or lithographed petition shall be received, 54.

Points of Order: A member will not be permitted, under the guise of raising a point of order, to direct another member on how to make his speech, 638. When a member, in response to a point of order, gives his word on a matter, his word must be accepted, 660. Points of order should be stated with reasonable brevity, 708, and are determined by Mr. Speaker, 1037.

Mr. Speaker is reluctant to attribute motives to anyone but points of order can prevent a member from making his speech before the time allowed for debate on the adjournment has expired, 1633. Many points of order are frivolous and a vexatious waste of time, 1650. Disagreement with the remarks of a member is not a basis for a point of order, 1721. It is not a point of order to ask a member to name a person, 2481.

No point of order is involved in addressing a question to Mr. Speaker on a hypothetical basis about what might be his attitude if something should crop up, 3008.

Not the slightest scintilla of a point of order, 645; no valid point of order, 646, 2953. A point of order taken on a point of order will not be heard, 709. When a member has exhausted his time there is no need to rule on a point of order contesting the relevancy of his remarks, 1041. If no standing order is involved, there is no point of order, 2109.

Press: Further confirmation of ruling that it is not necessary for a member to vouch for the accuracy of a press report; to rule otherwise would place the press in a position equal to or better than that of a member of Parliament in so far as it could make at will statements to which Ministers and members could not reply, 368.

A member reading a newspaper or book in the Chamber is asked to put it away, 646.

Privilege: In response to a question about a suggested bill of rights, Mr. Speaker outlined the privileges of a member concerning statements made in the House, 406.

A motion of privilege must be moved immediately upon a matter suddenly arising in the House; also, a member may, if he wishes, give notice of a motion of privilege and it is debated and dealt with at the appropriate time, 663, 664. A matter was properly raised as a point of order and disposed of; the test of whether privilege is involved is whether the conduct of the party was likely to interfere with the normal discharge of the duties of a member of Parliament

as a member of Parliament. A motion of privilege was ruled out of order because Mr. Speaker considered the matter involved was inappropriate to be raised as one of privilege, 712.

A member spoke for about seven minutes and Mr. Speaker had not the faintest idea of what he was trying to establish; in those circumstances no point of privilege was involved, 3029.

(See also *Parliament* and *Offensive Words*.)

Procedure: After the House has given leave to introduce a bill, it is a matter for the Minister to produce it, 2574. A member complained that the question for the third reading of a bill was put when he was on his feet. Mr. Speaker intimated that he was not expecting anyone to seek the call and did not see the member rise before the question was passed, but would keep his eye out for the member on future occasions, 2617. The motion that a member be now heard was put and decided without debate, 2901.

(See also *Chair*.)

Questions Without Notice: Should be interrogatory, 61. The sponsorship of a radio programme does not come within the ambit of the Premier's responsibility and a question on this basis is disallowed, 135. The Premier, the head of the Government of N.S.W., is the appropriate Minister to make representations on a matter that is a function of the federal Government; he will ignore any part of a question asking him to express an opinion, 405. A question seeking an expression of opinion is disallowed, 654. A point of order asserting that a question sought an opinion was rejected, 881. A question relating to facts in the possession of the Minister is in order, 1576.

Nothing prevents a member from asking a question relating to a current debate, 412; a question that anticipates debate is out of order, 923.

It is the practice for Ministers, when tabling papers, to ask the leave of the House to have incorporated in *Hansard* the lengthy deferred answers to questions, but if a Minister prefers to give the answer orally, there is no reason why he should not do so, 543.

Though a question is unduly long, the Minister may answer it if he wishes, 577. The Minister is right in providing a detailed answer to a question, 310. In view of the inordinate length of a question without notice, the member was asked to place it on

the *Questions and Answers* paper or to reduce it considerably for re-presentation to the House at a later stage, 2028. A member will be permitted to finish his question despite a point of order that the question is too long, involves considerable detailed information that the Minister could not be expected to give without notice, is reviving a matter already concluded and does not seek information, 2473.

A Minister replying to a question must not digress. For example, he may answer as he sees fit a question about one bridge but he digresses if he deals with another bridge, 753. A Minister may reply to a question in his own fashion so long as he does not touch on matters ruled out of order under the *sub judice* rule in the adjournment debate on the preceding day, 1635.

The Minister would oblige by raising his voice slightly when answering a question but equally members could pay the Minister the courtesy of listening carefully, 1781. If the Minister has not answered a question, it is because he has not been given the opportunity, 2264.

A question without notice directed to a member other than a Minister will be heard, 2189, and when it is a question related to a public matter concerned with the business of the House in which the member asked the question is concerned—a question on the *Questions and Answers* paper—any member has the right to ask it, but it is correct to ask only something in relation to its mechanics, not its details. A question as brief as asking for the name of the member's informant is permissible, though it is hoped that the ruling will not open up more worries on Standing Order 76, 2190. On a point of order that as the question was long and involved it must be put on the *Questions and Answers* paper, it was ruled that the question was in order, 2191.

The fact that a question deals with the same subject as one on the previous day does not make it a supplementary question in contravention of the standing orders, 2270.

No standing order prevents the names of persons being mentioned in answer to a question, 2272. A member is not allowed to waste the time of the House, 1034, and he will not be allowed to ask a second question straight after the Minister has finished answering his first one, 1482. A member may not seek to provide the answer to his own question, 2342.

Reading of Speeches: A point of order asserting that a member was reading his speech was not upheld. Occasional reference to notes is acceptable, 2394.

Relevance: A member's general comments must be related in some way to the Address in Reply; other forms are available to comment on the actions of a member of the House, 544. If a member feels that his gallantry has been reflected upon, he should be permitted to refer to his war service, 573.

When a point of order contested the relevancy of a Minister's reply to a question, it was pointed out that he was obviously replying to interjections, 3000. A point of order challenging relevancy when a member is replying to an interjection from the same side of the House as the point of order comes from, will not be upheld, 1419.

A member who went beyond a personal explanation was called to order, 575. Points of order contesting relevancy of a member's remarks were not upheld, 574, 1286. A member must keep to the point, 922, 2426, 2481, 2482, 2722.

Sub Judice: It would be extremely difficult for the layman to know when a particular point that has been or is about to come before the court was being discussed and when it was not being discussed. On an assurance by the Minister that a matter is at present before the court, it must be ruled *sub judice*. If it is found that this is not the position, the motion (S.O. 49) may be proposed at a later date, 65. Application of the rule, 510. Portion of a question relating to an action before the High Court is *sub judice*, 1576.

In determining to what extent the *sub judice* rule applies, one test is, "Will these words uttered in this Legislative Assembly be likely to affect the judge or judges of any tribunal which is arbitrating in this matter?" By application of this test, debate on the adjournment motion was ruled out of order, 1631, 1632. Points of order seeking the application of the *sub judice* rule were not upheld, 1634, 1635, 1641, 1642, 1643, 1644.

Answer to question on interpretation of *sub judice* rule, 1700.

The airline dispute that is the subject of a question may be before the court but a question that does not impinge on the constitutional issues before the Court is in order

and the Premier in his reply will avoid reference to the particular issues that would be *sub judice*, 2342.

Temporary Chairman of Committees: Nomination by Mr. Speaker, 54.

Urgency: Time for moving motions of urgency, 1000, 1001, 1034, 1038, 1135.

When an urgency motion has been accepted concerning a notice of motion on the business paper, if there is doubt about whether the subject of the motion is within the orbit of the Parliament, Mr. Speaker is inclined to lean in favour of hearing the debate on the urgency motion, 1040. Though Standing Order 187 provides that no question shall be proposed which is the same in substance as any question which, during the same session, has been resolved in the affirmative or negative, urgency motions are virtually excluded, 1541.

When moving urgency a member must keep his remarks strictly to the arguments for granting urgency, 996, 1040, 1042, 1418, 1420, 1638, 2389, 2390, 2391. A point of order contending that an argument against urgency is an argument against the substantive motion must fail when the argument in fact is a direct reply to an assertion made in favour of urgency, 2897.
