## PARRAMATTA NATIONAL PARK

Mr FIFE [10.21]: I move:

That this House do now adjourn.

Mr GRIFFITH (Cronulla) [10.22]: I wish to raise a matter of grave importance to me that was again raised in the House today. It concerns the proposed extension of the Parramatta golf course in Parramatta National Park. I want to refer to an article that appeared in the *Sunday Mirror* under the heading of "Parkland filched in ballroom" and goes on to say:

A Labor MLA said this week that his local golf club did a deal on the dance floor to get part of historic Parramatta Park from the people.

The deal was made with the Government Whip, Mr Ian Griffith, Mr Dan Mahoney, member for Parramatta, claims.

The grab was clinched during a ball staged by the Parramatta Golf Club, he said.

The honourable member for Parramatta went on to say, if he is correctly reported, and I presume that he is:

A special invitation was sent to Mr Griffith who promised club officials that a large section of the park would be handed over to them.

The club wants the land to enlarge its present course to 18 holes.

According to Mr Mahoney, the club invited Mr Griffith to the ball to woo him while the band played on.

After the ball was over, Mr Griffith was fully convinced that the club needed the land to extend its nine-hole course and during the following week he made representations to the Minister for Lands, Mr Lewis.

Mr Lewis took swift action and told the golf club to go ahead with its plans.

This is the statement that appeared in the press, attributed to the honourable member for Parramatta. I want to tell the House that the ball referred to took place on 24th July, 1963, almost two years before the State elections—twenty-two months to be exact. I was not at the ball as Government Whip. The elections had not been held and we had had no change of government. The Minister for Lands at the time was the Hon. K. Compton. To supply this sort of rot to the paper shows that the honourable member for Parramatta is deliberately misleading the people or de-

liberately telling plain, downright untruths and lies. He may have based these assertions upon a statement that I gave to the House when I said that the only association that I had had with the golf club was when I attended a ball, when nothing was said about extensions—this is two years before the State general elections. I want to clear this up. The article continues by saying that the honourable member accused me, golf-club officials and the Minister, of gross discourtesy in failing to inform him of what was going on with respect to this golf club. He said this last week in the House and repeated it two or three times today. I want to read an extract from a letter that I have received from the secretary of the Parramatta golf club.

Mr LEWIS: Who is the patron?

Mr GRIFFITH: The patron is the honourable member for Parramatta. This is the letter written by the secretary of the Parramatta golf club, who says:

A number of blatant lies are being told. For example Dan Mahoney states that he was never informed of this move. The truth is that I rang Mr Mahoney in 1965, before sending a formal request through you. I informed him that the Committee intended no discourtesy to him, but in view of his active opposition to our previous application, it was felt that he would be placed in an embarrassing position if he were asked to sponsor a further application for land for golf course extensions. This matter was reported to my committee in October, 1965.

Mr WADDY: He said he knew nothing about it.

Mr GRIFFITH: That is so, the honourable member for Parramatta has said that. The secretary of the club goes on to say:

Incidentally, prior to our 1962 application for golf course extensions, Mr Mahoney was taken on a tour of the area by the then Chairman of the Parramatta National Park Trust, Mr Ralph Coleman.

Mr Mahoney expressed himself as being happy with the idea of allowing golf course extensions on the Northern side of the railway as well as in the area adjacent to Parramatta High School.

At a later stage, when Mr T. Uren, M.P., took up the fight against the extensions, Mr Mahoney did an "about face" and joined Uren, Flaherty, Ferguson and Quinn in a deputation to Mr Compton.

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*Budget*: Scope of debate; statement of principles, 1115, 1117. The speech of the hon. member for Bligh is an example of a true budget speech, 1205.

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*Chair*: A member must address the Chair, 1114, 1146, 1147, 1303, 1305, 1448, 1825, 1829, 2113, 2149, 4254, 4264, 4276.

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*Procedure*: The Chairman cannot rule on a hypothetical question; he will rule when he sees a proposed amendment, 1593; neither can he rule that an amendment will be in order or out of order by anticipating a decision of the Committee and that something might happen, 1596.

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*Quorum*: It is extremely disorderly to draw attention to the state of the House when a quorum is present, 1108. Standing Order 42 relates to the meeting of the House; it does not relate to the resumption after a luncheon break, 4108, 4109, 4110.

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*Relevance:* In debating the Financial Statement a member may make only passing reference to projected legislation; the opportunity to debate that legislation will be given at a later date, 1118.

Distinction between Budget debate and Estimates debate, 1769. Debate on the Estimates should be confined to administration of the department under review: discussion of policy will not be allowed, 1832, 1833, 1834.

The allocation and expenditure of capital funds is properly dealt with in the Loan Estimates debate but the administration of the department is a matter for discussion on that department's budget estimate, 2082.

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*Repetition:* The Standing Orders prohibit tedious repetition, 1332, and a member indulging in tedious repetition will either introduce fresh material or resume his seat, 3168.

*Sub Judice:* The Chairman cannot uphold a point of order by anticipating a member's remarks, 4253. A member may not discuss a prospectus that is the subject of a prosecution, 4907.

*Time for Speeches:* No motion for extension of time can be accepted in Committee, 1327. A member may speak for only thirty minutes when there is but one resolution before the Committee of Supply, 2070.

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*Address in Reply:* Lieutenant-Governor's opening speech to be recorded in *Votes and Proceedings*, 45. Presentation to Lieutenant-Governor of Address in Reply, 563, 579.

*Adjournment:* Exposition of scope of debate on adjournment motion, 813; and example of a matter within that ruling, 1120. Discussion will not be allowed to proceed to the stage of subverting the true nature of debate on the adjournment, 1680, 3960. Mr Speaker determines the scope of the debate, 2143.

Primarily a member is allowed to raise matters of an urgent nature relating to his constituency: if he carries such a matter so far that it appears to Mr Speaker to be likely to give rise to general debate he will be ruled out of order, 189. A member's remarks must be brief, 617, 2257, and confined to the salient points of the matter with which he is dealing, 689, 1453, 2257. A member concerned with safety in the coal-mines may state briefly the salient points he wishes to make but may not go on at length debating the matter, 1907, 1908.

A Minister contributing to the debate is in the same position as the Premier, 613. The time for which a Minister spoke accorded with sessional orders, 687, and a

member who debated the Minister's speech would have been ruled out of order had the point been taken, 688. A member may not debate the adjournment speech of another, 1006. The Leader of the Opposition is always granted the privilege in the adjournment debate of raising a matter of State-wide importance, 2171, 2173.

A member is entitled to raise a matter on behalf of a constituent who was to some extent criticized by another member but not to carry the matter too far, 1453. A member is not restricted to matters affecting his own electorate, 1679, and whether a member may deal with more than one subject will be considered, 3726.

Principles applicable to determination of whether a matter that is the subject of an adjournment motion under Standing Order 49 is definite, urgent, of public importance and recent occurrence, 3755. A member speaking in reply to the adjournment debate under Standing Order 49 must confine himself to the contributions that were made to the debate, 4030. The subject of the notice of a member's desire to move the adjournment of the House did not fulfil the requirements of Standing Order 49 and the motion was ruled out of order, 4516. A point of order that a matter to be discussed under Standing Order 49 was not of recent occurrence was not upheld, 2328.

*Amendments:* An amendment may not be withdrawn without the unanimous approval of the House, 3271. Amendment of a motion containing argument in violation of Standing Order 106 was permitted, this having been allowed in the past, but it will not be permitted in the future unless there are exceptional circumstances, 3305. Amendment of a motion was permitted, and the Chair treated the consent of the House to the amendment as having been given, in the absence of complaint or objection from the House, 4933.

*Anticipation of Debate:* A point of order on a question about the Loan Estimates, which were being debated at the time, was well taken, though the matter of anticipation of debate is a difficult one on which some observations might be made for the guidance of members, 733. The rule on anticipation of debate is generally accepted and understood to have no application to a ministerial statement, 1694.

*Chair:* A member must not criticize the Chair by complaining that he is tired of jumping up and down on the back benches seeking the call, 137. Allocation of the call,

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A member must address the Chair, 2220, 2739, 3791, 4150. When a member uses the second person pronoun in appalling expressions that he should not have used, he is not necessarily addressing the Chair, 3794. The Chair expressed its concurrence in and commendation of a question, 212.

The suggestion that the Government suspended sessional orders to proceed with a measure surreptitiously is a reflection on the Chair: the question was put openly and slowly from the Chair, without objection from the Opposition, 610, 611, 613. Use of the word "sham" when a matter had been openly and freely debated and every member who wanted the call had been given the opportunity to take it, is a reflection on the conduct of the proceedings and the Chair, and should be withdrawn, 611. A member may not reflect upon the ruling of the Chair made in accordance with the usages and practice of Parliament, 1748, or canvass a ruling, 569, 3595; and a member will not be offensive to the Chair, 2563.

The Chair cannot correct a member on facts of which the House is aware, 2710. The Chair's indulgence to a member, 3101. The practice is to rule that it is disorderly to pass between the member speaking and the Chair but there is nothing to say that it is disorderly to pass between the member speaking and the Minister to whom he is addressing a question through the Chair, 3828.

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*Division:* It is most disorderly for a member to change his place during a division, 4868.

*Explanation:* A member is entitled under Standing Order 139 to explain himself on some material part of an earlier statement in the House, 1619, 1620, 3806, 3808. An explanation under Standing Order 139 is distinct from a personal explanation: a member using the standing order is not entitled to debate the matter or to introduce new matter and he must confine himself to a brief explanation of the material

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*Hansard*: Standing Order 144 prohibits allusion to or quotation from debates of the same session, unless that allusion or quotation is brief and relevant, 759, 912. Incorporation of summary of estimates concerning the Sydney Opera House, 1708, 1718. Accuracy of proofs, 3596.

*Interjections and Interruptions*: A member must be heard in silence, 516, 2648, 3097; too much noise in the House is disorderly, 615, 871; Standing Order 166 prohibits loud conversation, noise and disturbance while a member is debating, 617, 912. Audible conversation in the Chamber is disorderly, 1552, 2054, 2648, 2738.

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A motion for the discharge of an order of the day for the second reading of a bill, and for the withdrawal of the measure, may not be debated, 1978.

Mr. Speaker is not called upon to answer a hypothetical question on what will happen when a motion has been dealt with by the House, 3283.

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*Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions:* Practice concerning unparliamentary words and expressions making improper accusations or imputations, or abusive or offensive in their nature, 3321.

"Trying to gain cheap political capital" has been applied to members over and over again without exception being taken to it, and withdrawal was not required, 636. It is not possible to rule on a point of order taken in anticipation of something that one member thinks another might say, 1678, 1679. The member to whom "irresponsible" was applied took no exception and it was not required to be withdrawn, 1909. A member whose request for the withdrawal of words to which he objected was refused, was informed that he could make a personal explanation, if he believed that appropriate, at the right time, 2323. When Mr Speaker has not heard an expression which a member complained was offensive, if the member complaining or some other member will bring it to his attention, he will deal with it, but it will be too late to bring it to Mr Speaker's attention on the next day, 3792.

A point of order that it was unparliamentary for a member to say "They bought an independent (local government) candidate" was not upheld: a member may make such a remark; he is not suggesting that another member was bought, 1292. A member may not cast reflections on private citizens unless he is satisfied that it is in the public interest that he should do so, 1295, 2257.

Any imputation of improper motives must be withdrawn, 2220. A member must not impute motives to another, 2549.

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*Personal Explanation:* A personal explanation may not be made when the motion for the third reading of a bill is before the House, 610; and may be made only at the appropriate time, 697, 4928. Personal explanation is not the form by which to

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seek a withdrawal by another member; a point of order should be taken at the time, 913.

A member will not be excluded from making a personal explanation if he can show clearly that his honour or integrity have been reflected upon in a real way, 1732; he is permitted to say how his political conduct has been impugned and then to explain his conduct, 2064, 2065, 2145, 2146; but if he persists in debating at length he will be ordered to discontinue his remarks, 2066, 2414, 2415. When a member has denied an assertion that impugns his character he has gone as far as he can in a personal explanation, 4102. (See also *Explanation.*)

*Petitions:* Form and content required under the standing orders, 2052.

Copy of election petition against the return of members for Nepean, Collaroy and Castlereagh, 562; copy of the order of the Court of Disputed Returns, 1404.

*Points of Order:* A member should state his point of order, 2172, 2328, and a point of order will not be permitted to become a personal explanation, 3230.

Points of order were not valid, 134, 408, 1967, 2064; without substance, 410, 1562, 1749, 4236, 4927; not upheld, 489, 618, 620, 735, 763, 946, 1058, 1125, 1359, 1505, 1620, 2323, 2328, 2698, 3025, 3283; and dismissed, 3229, 3232. No point of order was involved, 619, 1543, 1587, 1588, 1909, 1914, 2144, 2172, 2201, 2553, 2671, 2710, 3806, 4200, 4713, 4863; and no ruling was required, 3293.

*Press:* The practice of the House does not permit the reading of newspaper articles; references should be brief, 2254.

*Privilege:* Leave granted to move a motion, 406. Practice of the House, 570. A member is allowed five minutes to satisfy Mr Speaker that a question of privilege has suddenly arisen, 3225; the matter should be raised at the time the purported breach occurred, though it is open to any member to give notice of motion at any time relating to a matter of privilege, 3226. No point of privilege involved, 3252.

Standing Order 158 expressly imposes upon Mr Speaker the duty, when privilege arises suddenly in the House, to decide in the first instance whether a prima facie case of privilege has been made out, before he allows the House to proceed to discussion of any substantive motion. The position is the same when it is sought to raise privilege

by motion on notice. Test applied by Mr Speaker in making his decision to rule a motion out of order, 3310.

*Procedure:* A member who has already spoken to a motion may not speak to it a second time, 1120; when he has spoken to a motion, has moved an amendment and has sat down, he cannot speak again on the motion after he has obtained leave to withdraw his amendment, 3271.

When the Minister has spoken in reply, the debate is closed, 2115, 2414. Fresh matter a long way removed from the terms of the original motion may not be introduced in reply, 1375, 1376, 2219.

A member may not refer to another by name, 2219.

*Public Accounts Committee:* Election of members, 563.

*Public Documents:* Standing Order 57 and accessibility of papers tabled in the House, 83. Report of inspectors appointed to investigate the Latec group of companies; motion for printing subsequent to tabling and application of S.O. 57 prohibiting inspection by persons other than members of the Legislative Assembly, 1976.

Mr Speaker cannot order a member to table a document from which he quotes an extract, 1619.

*Questions Without Notice:* A member must ask his question and may not make a statement, 28, 630, 812; he must express himself in the form of a question, 3503. A question must not merely give information, 3441, and must not be hypothetical, 3443. It is out of order to repeat in substance a question to which an answer has already been given or declined, 3595.

Part of a question seeking an opinion from the Minister will be ignored, 1623. A question asking the Minister for his comments on an editorial in a newspaper was out of order on a number of grounds, 2409. It is in order for a member to ask a question and it is for the Minister whether he will answer it, 2638, 2779. The Premier is entitled to say what he believes the facts to be on a matter that comes within his portfolio and to indicate, if he so desires, what action he proposes to take, 4236, 4237.

Mr Speaker asks Ministers when deferring replies to questions to say that they will inform the honourable member "and the House" later, 290, 296.

Practice and principles to be applied to questions without notice introducing the names and actions of persons outside Parliament, 2780, 2944, 3308, 3319.

Both questions and answers should be shorter, 213, 489, 570, 1016, 1021, 1586, 3383. Mr Speaker is obliged to direct that long or complicated questions be placed on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 557, 808, 1630, 2060, 2199, 2515. If Opposition members are not willing to hear replies to questions, Ministers will be directed to have questions put on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 4511. When a question sought considerable detail the Minister was invited to answer briefly, or by way of a ministerial statement, or to have the question put on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 4925.

Principles and procedure that will apply to lengthy and involved questions, 3826; and an example, 3832. Ruling on long questions and answers will be strictly applied in the next sittings of Parliament, 4927. Mr. Speaker has had reservations about some questions allowed to be asked of Ministers and he proposes to review questions generally and tighten up on them, 3228.

A Minister's reply had almost reached the point of a ministerial statement and he was asked to bring his reply to an end quickly, 1190. When a question of some length has been allowed, a Minister must be granted the same concession in his reply, though he should be as brief as possible, 1587. A question being no longer than many that have been allowed, it was proper that a member should be allowed to conclude it, 1912. Once a question has been allowed and the Minister has begun his reply, he is allowed to complete the reply, 3507, 4927. A Minister replying to a question is not permitted to debate the matter though he was indulging in a little preamble, 3678. A member may not move that a Minister's answer be incorporated in *Hansard*, 4851.

**Quorum:** It is not disorderly for a member to leave the Chamber while the quorum bells are ringing unless he is the member who called the quorum, 4062.

**Reading of Speeches:** A member may refer to copious notes, 791, 1543; quotations should be brief, 926, 1028.

**Relevance:** A member must keep within the confines of the debate, 617, 987, 1531, 1694, 1721, 1729, 2222, 2249, 2546, 2551, 2552, 2697, 2806, 2968, 3101, 3136, 3137, 3138, 3273, 3310, 3516, 3723, 3724, 4101.

The debate on the third reading of a bill is not as wide as the debate on the second reading and must be confined to the contents of the measure, 611, and its principles, 613; the lines are quite clear, 612. A member speaking to a motion for the suspension of standing orders following a motion of urgency may not canvass the substantive motion, 3265, 3266.

A member may refer briefly to other forms of gambling in order to illustrate his attitude to poker machines, 4426. A dissent motion specifies the ruling that is questioned; a member may not go into the merits of a ruling on another matter, 4944, 4945, 4946. (See also *Urgency*.)

**Repetition:** The Standing Orders prohibit tedious repetition, 1729, 1908; repetition alone does not make a member out of order, 2698.

**Senate Vacancy:** Joint sitting of Assembly and Council, 74. Election of Mr Speaker to preside at joint sitting in the absence of the President, 350, and tabling of minutes of proceedings of joint sitting, 404.

**Sub Judice:** Principles governing determination of the matter that is in fact *sub judice*, and observations on the application of the rule for the guidance of members, 26, 28, 75, 76, 83. Statement of principles governing the application of the rule, 404; recapitulation, 2203, 3144; relating to a question without notice, 3442, 3505. A point of order dismissed, 290.

When a question of law has been decided in the High Court and a prosecution referred back to the court of petty sessions for imposition of a penalty, the *sub judice* rule would be infringed if the Minister were to make any comments on the case that could be said to influence or embarrass the court in fixing a penalty, 3831.

A member should refrain from close reference to a prospectus that is the subject of a prosecution, 4196, 4197, 4198, 4199, 4200, 4201.
