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ACTING-SPEAKER, MR (K. O'CONNELL, EsQ.):

Interjections, *Interruptions* and Disorder: Members should not interject, 4572.

A member should not be upset by interjections, 4571; and should not reply to them, but confine his remarks to the question before the House, 4572.

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, *Imputations* and Aspersions: Words used about a member of the Legislative Council that were offensive to the presiding officer in the Legislative Assembly must be withdrawn, 4570.

The following expressions were required to be withdrawn:

"... when his voice breaks, he will be able to speak like a man . . .", 4569; "... (revenue) will be (used) to finance the ratbag activities of the Minister . . .", 4571; "That immediately makes h i suspect because he (a Minister in the Legislative Council) only took the job because he wanted to get an expressway moved so that he could increase the value of his house", 4570.

Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of Chair (continued):

CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEES (T. J. CAHILL, EsQ.):

Divisions: **Standing Orders** apply during divisions, 2031.

Documents: When a Budget is presented a second time, members should refer to the new Budget Papers, 176, 190.

Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder: Members should ignore interjections and direct themselves to the question before the Committee, 4581.

The Chair will deal with interjectors, 4581.

Members who wish to conduct private conversations should leave the Chamber, 4584.

Members must resume their seats quickly after a division or leave the Chamber, 4298.

Members Warned: Mr J. H. Brown, 4580; Mr Cameron, 4729; Mr Egan, 4298; Mr Mulock, 4729; Mr Ramsay, 4585.

Procedure: The principles of a bill are dealt with by the House, and in Committee members are restricted to discussing how the bill might be implemented, 4023, 4024, 4315, 4587. They may not discuss the second-reading debate contributions of other members, 4023, 4027; or raise a broad matter that should have been raised in the second-reading debate, 4581.

Amendments must be in writing, 2365.

Even though an amendment might appear to be within the order of leave of a bill, it could not be entertained unless it sought to amend a section of the Act proposed to be amended, 3926.

When overlapping amendments are moved, that part of the first amendment that does not overlap the second amendment is put and, if adopted, the whole of the first amendment is considered as having been agreed to, 1737.

An amendment is out of order if it would have the effect of increasing the burden on the Consolidated Revenue Fund above that envisaged in the message from the Governor, 2364; for if the message from the Governor is to have any value, it must imply that those responsible for including a provision in legislation intend that there be a limit to the expenditure incurred in implementing it, 2365.

Since the practice was adopted of presenting the detailed provisions of a bill in the form of a schedule it has been usual for

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debate on the clauses to be limited to a general discussion, and to require specific debate on matters raised in the schedule to be reserved until that schedule is reached, **4023, 4025**.

A member is confined to speaking on the clause before the Committee, **400, 2474**.

A member is out of order in raising in Committee a matter that he raised recently on a motion for the adjournment of the House, **1573**.

A matter raised in a Budget debate was more appropriate to a consideration of the Loan Estimates, **183, 185**.

DEPUTY-SPEAKER (T. J. CAHILL, ESQ.):

Nomination, **13**; Acceptance, **14**; Election, **14**.

Documents: A member was asked to identify a document, **1877**.

Grievance Debate: A member may raise matters of public importance, **809**.

A Minister may reply to all matters raised during a grievance debate, **804**.

Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder: Members will ignore interjections and address the Chair, **4951**.

Members were required to cease interjecting, **90, 810, 3622**.

As the mover of a motion has the right of reply, he should not interject, but should reserve his comments, **3119**.

Members who have spoken in a debate are not entitled to make further contributions by way of interjection; a member who wishes to contribute but has not yet done so, should cease interjecting and seek the call, **3622**.

Members Warned: Mr Egan, **3127**; Mr Punch, **810**.

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: A member will be required to withdraw a remark only if the member affected by it takes objection, **3118**.

A member must accept responsibility for remarks he makes about persons outside the House, **3118**; for he can not be required to withdraw such remarks, **3118**.

Procedure: Only one amendment to a motion may be moved at a time, **447**.

Sub Judice Rule: A matter that is before a court may not be discussed, **818**.

Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of Chair (continued):**DEPUTY-SPEAKER (T. J. CAHILL, ESQ.) (continued):**

Relevance: Remarks must be relevant to the bill, **1476**, or to the issue before the Chair, **3616**.

A member may make passing reference to matters outside the legislation being debated, **724**; including the policy of a political party, **1687**.

Although a member assures the Chair that his remarks are relevant to the objects of a bill, he may continue only if their relevance is apparent, **3709**.

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY):

Nomination, **7**; Acceptance, **9**; Election, **10**; Presentation to Governor, **10**.

Auditor-General's Report, 27.

Chair: The Speaker is bound to protect the right of free speech, **2718**.

It is disorderly to address the Speaker when he is standing, **1418, 2786**; or to reflect on the Chair, whose decisions may be debated only by way of substantive motion, **5116**. A member who does not take cognizance of the Chair will be named, **2786, 5112**.

The Speaker remained seated when going through the business paper so that members would not be prevented from leaving the Chamber because the Speaker was standing; they should leave quietly, **2461, 4009**.

A member may not canvass a ruling of the Chair, **270, 2225**; nor use his position to attack the Chair, **2717**.

Adjournment: On a motion for the adjournment of the House a member may raise any matter of interest to his electorate in particular or to the State in general, and in any way he chooses, **269**; but he should first seek the agreement of the Whips, **2047**. It is not necessary that such matters require urgent attention, **5132**.

Adjournment (S.O. 49): A matter proposed under Standing Order **49** must be within the Government's administration, of public importance, and one unable to be brought before the House in reasonable time by other means, **4275**.

An opinion expressed by the Speaker in chambers about his likely attitude to a motion does not bind him to that view after hearing points of order on the question, **4276**.

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SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY) (*continued*):

A member may not dictate the course of business of the House by raising a matter under Standing Order 49 because he believes he will not be able to have it debated as a matter of urgency, 4275.

A member who is denied the opportunity of moving a motion under Standing Order 49 may not move for the suspension of standing orders to debate an associated matter that might have been dealt with by way of urgency, 4276.

A motion based on an allegation, and to that extent being hypothetical, could not be discussed, 4271; though a motion dealing with a fact might be in order, 4276.

A matter sought to be raised under Standing Order 49 was specific and of recent occurrence but not of sufficient public importance to warrant urgent consideration, 1422. An alleged pending strike is not a specific matter, 1378.

Debate: No member may allude to or quote from any debate or proceedings of the same session unless such allusion or quotation be brief and relevant to the matter under discussion, 5113, 5115.

A member is entitled to reply to remarks made in a debate, 5123, 5125; but must seek the call, 5125.

It would be an interference with a member's right of free speech if the Chair were to interrupt him in presenting his argument; the public would decide whether what he was saying was honourable, 270. A member who abused the right of free speech reflected upon himself. He should exercise the right with restraint, particularly in respect of persons who had no right of audience in Parliament and could not defend themselves, 2718, 5118.

A member does not reflect on a vote of the House in saying that adequate opportunity was given to debate a matter, 5121.

Divisions: Allocation of seating for divisions, 13, 194.

A member, preferably the Leader of the Opposition, should say clearly whether a division is called for, 458.

Standing orders apply during divisions, 1062, 3132, 4578, 5062, 5127.

During a division members must adopt the prescribed method of addressing the Chair; and may not seek the call after the Chair has ordered a division, 4885.

Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of Chair (*continued*):

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY) (*continued*):

Documents: Members may read notes of their own composition, but should not read large portions of documents, 1345; and should make only passing reference to them, or incorporate them in their own composition, 3815.

Members must express their own arguments, though they may refer to the opinions of persons outside Parliament, 2225. It is repugnant to the spirit of debate to take up time reading letters. Merely to read lengthy letters on the many subjects debated renders pointless the election of parliamentary representatives, 2225. In any event, if members must refer to letters or documents, they should give the names and addresses of the authors, 1345; or otherwise identify them, 2390; and vouch for their authenticity, 4674.

Having stated the source of documents, the member takes full responsibility for his statements, 271.

A Minister did not give the date of a document, but he was entitled to table documents, which any member could peruse, 1418.

Documents may not be tabled or exchanged during a personal explanation, 4673.

Grievance Debate: Members should restrict themselves to matters of concern to themselves, their electorates, or the community generally; and should not ventilate inappropriate matters, 2717. It is an abuse of the debate to attack citizens outside Parliament or another member. The correct procedure for dealing with the actions of another member is to move a substantive motion so that the member accused may have the right of reply, 2718.

In a grievance debate a member may defend himself against an earlier attack by a Minister in replying to a question, 2718; but if a member in defending himself makes an attack on a Minister, he invites a reply, and the Minister is not required to move a substantive motion in making such a reply, 2719. However, he is limited to matters raised by the member, 2707, 2720; and should not open the whole matter again and so reflect on the grievance procedure, 2719.

Hansard: Documents may be incorporated only if they are of a statistical nature, 3814; otherwise a member could have lengthy documents incorporated, 3815. The limitation applies particularly when a member says that the material he wishes to have incorporated has been widely publicized, 3815.

Mr Speaker had been shown material that a member sought to have incorporated, and was satisfied that it was statistical, 3088.

Interjections. Interruptions and Disorder: Members were directed to cease interjecting and interrupting, 29, 85, 137, 142, 247, 248, 333, 445, 770, 780, 1731, 1733, 2089, 2677, 2786, 2938, 2939, 3300, 3301, 3307, 3565, 3625, 3645, 3647, 4073, 4589, 4684, 5113, 5124; to cease conversing or to reduce the level of audible conversation, 153, 334, 437, 542, 779, 1154, 1412, 1673, 2002, 2444; 2940, 2949, 3417, 3684, 3689, 3789, 4000, 4075, 4971, 5129; and told to hold private discussions outside the Chamber, 153, 2007, 3417; to enable the Chair to hear, 1417, 3733, 4673.

A member should be heard in silence, 29, 1032, 1509, 2218, 2793, 4045.

Interjections can prevent the Speaker from hearing, 1417, 3733.

A member should address the Chair, 2784, 4886; ignore interjections, 540, 2500, 4052, 4119, 4893, 5083; and direct himself to the question he seeks to ask, 540; or to the motion, 3817.

A member should not interject but should seek the call, 465, 566, 1272, 2786, 2788, 3104, 3603, 4073, 4077, 5125; and should desist from laughing loudly, 1272.

The Minister should not interject as he has the right of reply in a debate, 265, 3342, 3624, 3906, 4679; and when the Minister is replying, members should not interject, 1693, 5122.

It is not incumbent on the Chair to call a member to order by name. Whenever the Speaker calls for order, he addresses the exhortation to all members who at that time are transgressing the rules and practice of the House. If a member persists in interjecting or engaging in disorderly conduct, he may be removed without being named specifically, 4008, 4666, 5060, 5117.

A member will be deemed guilty of disorderly conduct if, after the Chair has called the House to order, he persists in conversing aloud or making any other noise or disturbance while another member is speaking, 2950, 4577.

The application of Standing Order 392 shortly before the adjournment is little penalty for disorderly conduct, and in those circumstances the application of Standing Order 387 is appropriate, 4073, 5113.

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It is disorderly to address the Speaker when he is standing, 1418.

A member will be named if he does not take cognizance of the Chair, particularly when the Chair rises to speak, 2786.

Owing to the lateness of the hour, the Chair and members were becoming testy, and the Chair would not tolerate further interjections, 1916.

Interjectors were removed from the public gallery, 1671.

Legislative Assembly: Public Accounts Committee, Election of Members: J. C. Boyd, R. J. Brown, V. P. Durick, B. J. McDonald, P. A. Rogan, 80.

Legislative Council: A member was not speaking derogatorily of the Legislative Council in commenting on the proceedings of a select committee of that House and the outcome of them, 2551.

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Member Removed: Mr Wotton, 5125.

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Message from the Commissioners, 12.

Ministerial Statements: It is the prerogative of the Speaker to determine whether a Minister is making a ministerial statement, and the Leader of the Opposition may submit arguments why the Speaker should do so, 2551.

Ministerial statements may be made during the tabling of papers; but as the standing orders made no provision for a ministerial statement at that stage, the Speaker sought confirmation that a Minister was making such a statement, 36.

The Leader of the Opposition, when replying to a ministerial statement, may put alternative suggestions or give reasons why the ministerial proposal should not be adopted; but may not introduce new matter, or argue the statement at length, 1270.

A Minister does not make a ministerial statement by responding, in part, to an argumentative part of a question, 3414.

In replying to a ministerial statement, the Leader of the Opposition may answer assertions of fact by the Minister, dispute his conclusions, criticize his policies and suggest alternatives, but may not debate the policy or membership of political parties, 150; and may not attack another member, 4889.

Motions: Motions should not contain argument or intimidatory expressions; and at the request of the Chair a member revised a motion that was too long and contained much argument, 3559.

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: Temperate language is desirable and members should observe decorum, 1272.

Remarks that are made often should not offend, 1272.

If a member denies making a remark, his word must be accepted, 1272.

A member must accept forthright criticism, 4590; including criticism of his business activities, 5126; but a member may not make imputations of improper motives against other members, 5116; attack their personal conduct, 2720; or reflect on them personally, 5116.

Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of Chair (continued):

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY) (continued):

No member shall use offensive words against either House of Parliament, nor against any statute unless for the purpose of moving for its repeal, 5113; but a member does not speak derogatorily of the Legislative Council in commenting on the proceedings of a select committee of that House or the outcome of them, 2551.

Though a member says he does not wish to embarrass another member, he does so by dwelling on a particular subject, 3922.

Accepted practice is to regard as unparliamentary such expressions as "That is a lie" or "You are a liar", and to require them to be withdrawn. Attention may be drawn in debate to statements alleged to be untrue or taken out of context, 3922.

Use of the expression "mongrel dog" is unparliamentary in speaking of a Minister's character, but it may be acceptable in reference to a Minister's portfolio and the way in which he carries out his responsibilities, 5121.

A member withdrew the expression "turkey-eater" when asked to explain the sense in which he used it, 4590.

Expressions required to be withdrawn: "You are a liar", 455, 1271, 3906, 3922; "That is a complete and absolute lie", 4725; "The (member) showed . . . what a liar he is", 4887; ". . . that make(s) the honourable member . . . a liar, which he is", 2809; "(The Minister) was visibly upset at missing my question, which he expected to be directed to him. Sensing defeat for his ruse, he conferred with the Premier, who conferred with his deputy, then the Leader of the House and then the Whip—;all while (another Minister) was answering. Mr Speaker, you yourself were seen to be a party to this, and your next move confirmed it", 2717.

Obituary: Gamak, R. B., Esq., 2752.

Personal Explanations: Must be brief, 573, 1416, 4891, 4893; to the point, 1416, 2460, 4893; show the need to make a personal explanation, 1415; explain how a member's character has been reflected upon or impugned, 573, 1416, 2460, 4891, 4893; or how his position as a member of Parliament has been obstructed, 4891; deal with those points alone, 2460; and not contain debate, 573, 1284, 4893.

Before the Speaker asks whether a member has the indulgence of the House to make a personal explanation, he will require the

member to explain briefly the manner in which he believes his character has been impugned or how his position as a member of Parliament has been obstructed, 4674, 4891, 5129; and to come to the point quickly, 4891.

The making of a personal explanation does not give opportunity to deal with the substance of a document that gave rise to the personal explanation, or to table the document, 4672; or to exchange it with a member opposite for another document, 4673.

Although a member did not state the subject-matter of his personal explanation, as the Speaker had allowed him to proceed, and in the absence of dissent, he was permitted to conclude his remarks, 1418.

Points of Order: No point of order was involved, 205, 206, 269, 337, 386, 402, 453, 454, 455, 820, 903, 1282, 1284, 1408, 1410, 1417, 2346, 2458, 2719, 2793, 2803, 3085, 3417, 3596, 4120, 4258, 4509, 4574.

A member wishing to take a point of order should rise, 1417; should be heard, 4673; and should come to his point of order, 2552, 5061.

As a member had given an explanation when taking a point of order, the matter was concluded, 675.

In taking a point of order, a member may not trifle with the House, 4589, 4866.

A member is required to prove, not merely assert, his argument in support of a point of order, 5062.

The Chair would not hear a point of order after he had put the question for the closure of a debate, 4884.

Privilege: A member who exercises his right of free speech under privilege does so at the risk of censure by the House or of incurring the displeasure of the public, 2718, 2719; and he must accept responsibility for what he says. Therefore, the Chair is reluctant to interrupt a member in the exercise of that right, 2719.

The Speaker's duty is to determine whether a matter brought before the House is, *prima facie*, one involving breach of privilege, 2759; but it is for the House to decide whether there has been a breach of privilege, 2759, 2771.

Press reports cannot be used to establish a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege, 2759, 2772; nor to support a substantive

motion on breach of privilege; but in speaking to such a motion a member may say where the statement constituting the alleged breach was made, 2772; and may refer to minutes, 2765.

A member was asked to show how a union black ban on him constituted a breach of privilege, 2763.

A member established a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege by stating that in a discussion in public, namely on a television programme, an officer of a union said that a union ban had been placed on the member because of statements he had made in Parliament, 2759.

A resolution of the House that privilege had been breached implied more than deprecation of the action constituting the breach, 2761; and a member was asked to withdraw part of his motion deprecating the decision of a union to place a black ban on him, 2761.

In speaking to a motion of privilege, a member could not deal with matters that were the subject of investigation by an inquiry, as witnesses were being called and charges could arise from that inquiry; though it was not clear whether the inquiry was judicial or one being conducted under the Public Service Act, 2763; however, some discussions, because of their importance, must be allowed in Parliament and, to an extent, overrode the sub *judice* rule, 2766.

A member replying to debate on a substantive breach of privilege motion should confine himself to comments by other members on his arguments, 2772.

Unavailability of authenticated copies of a bill being debated does not constitute breach of privilege, 4684.

Procedure: A member who wishes to take a point of order should rise, 1417; and come to his point of order, 2552.

A member who wishes to ask a question or participate in a debate must seek the call, 2786; address the Chair, 2784; ignore interjections, 540, 2500; and direct himself to the question he seeks to ask, 540; or to the motion, 3817.

It is not in order for a member, when contributing to a debate, to direct a question to a Minister, 2947.

In a second reading debate members may address themselves only to the objects of

the bill and to the Minister's second reading speech, 2804, 2823. They may not go through the clauses *seriatim*, 2804, 3731; which is a procedure appropriate to the Committee stage, 3731.

Questions about a bill are more appropriately asked at the second reading stage, 1043; and it is for the Minister to decide whether he will respond to requests made by members in that debate, 2803.

It is in order for a member of the Opposition to give reasons why standing orders should not be suspended to allow legislation to be brought in and passed through all stages in one day; but he must show that the House should proceed with more pressing business or with other business, 2946.

A member may not attack another member about his personal conduct, 2720. Should a member wish to attack the conduct of another member, he must do so by way of substantive motion, 2718, 2720; so that the member attacked will have the right of reply, 2718.

A member should not pass between the Chair and a member addressing the Chair, 4122.

Even if a notice of closure given under Standing Order 175B does not include the third reading stage, the practice is to put that question immediately after the motion for the adoption of the report, 5103.

Questions and Answers Paper: Owing to the increase in the number of written questions, difficulty was being experienced in having the *Questions and Answers* paper printed by the time the House sat each day. To alleviate the problem and reduce costs, on the first sitting day of each week the *Questions and Answers* paper would contain all questions not answered. Should answers have been received since the previous sitting day, the relevant question and answer would also appear on that day. On subsequent sitting days of that week the paper would contain only new questions, together with any question previously asked, the answer to which had been received the previous day, 2080.

Questions Without Notice: A question should be brief and concise, 70, 77; and seek information or press for action, 70. It must not offer or seek an opinion, 70, 671, 2558; nor contain more facts than are neces-

sary to make it clear, 77, 199, 2556; nor information, 70, 77. Use of the preface "Is it a fact" is tantamount to giving information, 3554.

A question must deal with a matter within the portfolio to the Minister to whom it is addressed, 4114. It must not be similar to a question on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 2450, 2936.

A question may not be based on a newspaper report, 2559; nor include extensive quotations from a newspaper, 2675; but it may contain a reference to a statement in the press, 2675.

A question that verged on the prolix was allowed, 2346, but a question that was too long should be placed on the *Questions and Answers* paper, 157.

A question by a member noted for his command of English and for the number of words he used was not politically colourful and argumentative, 2678.

A member had not asked four questions but, in broad context, only one question, 430.

A question may not relate to the General Loan Account Appropriation Bill if the Minister to whom it is directed has not yet spoken in debate on the bill, 204.

A question is out of order if it is framed by a Government supporter merely to elicit from the Minister a denial of a remark by a member of the Opposition; but a subsequent question on the same subject by another member that has a different basis is allowable, 205.

A member may seek information by a question upon notice for use in a later debate, 3085.

A member had erred in some respects in giving information when asking a question, but in the concluding part of it had asked the Minister whether he would institute inquiries, and the question was allowed, 3554.

Question time is severely eroded when supplementary questions are asked, 3420; especially when they contain considerable argument, 3421; and so the practice of asking supplementary questions had been discontinued, 3421; although a member recently elected might not have known that when he asked what amounted to a supplementary question, 3421; but the Speaker would apply the standing orders as former Speakers had

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SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY) (continued):

done and, if he considered questions were out of order on that ground, would rule accordingly, 3421; he would not allow a member to pursue the matter, and reminded the House that a procedure was available under Standing Order 161 if it wished to disagree with his rulings on such questions, 3421.

A Minister may reply to a question in his own way, 1413, but should keep his reply concise, 334; and relevant, 79, 334, 2455, 2681, 4269.

The Speaker has no control over the length of answers, 79; and prolixity in answering did not make a Minister out of order, 2455; for, even though the length of an answer might be disturbing, a Minister had never been ruled out of order on that basis, 2457; however, the Speaker may suggest that an answer is a ministerial statement, 79; though lengthy replies by Ministers are not necessarily ministerial statements, 2458.

A member who has asked a question should not interrupt the Minister's reply, 1027; Ministers will complete their replies more quickly if they are uninterrupted, 333.

A Minister is in order in replying to a question in a particular manner, which might have been induced by argumentative elements of the question, 3414.

A Minister may read a **deferred** answer and seek leave to have it incorporated in *Hansard*, 2552; it rests with the Chair whether a Minister in doing so is **making** a ministerial statement, 2553.

It had long been the **custom** and practice for a Minister to give a deferred answer when the time for questions had expired and after the time for tabling of papers, 3312.

Relevance: Passing reference only may be made to the Act when debating a motion for leave to introduce an amending bill, 250, 3316.

A member must address himself to the motion, 565, 3792; and the amendment, 2789; and refrain from attacking other members, 565.

Reference to a Minister's conduct or activities is irrelevant to a **motion** for leave

to introduce a bill, 903; at the introductory stage, debate is **confined** to the Minister's speech in support of the motion for leave to introduce, 250, 905, 1573, 3316.

A Minister, in reply to a debate on a motion for leave to introduce a bill, may deal with matters raised by other speakers in the debate, even though **some** of those matters were not based on the Minister's introductory speech but on the Act proposed to be amended, 4682.

In debating a bill, a member must be relevant, 250, 1692, 1731, 2823, 2983, 3002; keep within the order of leave, 2804, 2999, 3000, 3002, 3004; and not dwell on one particular incident, 2804; nor on a matter that the Minister says is **specifically** excluded from the bill, 3907; nor on aspects of affairs in his electorate, 2823. The fact that a statutory authority is named in the title of a bill does not entitle a member to traverse the organization's operations, 2999.

Debate on a motion for the second reading of a bill should be **confined** primarily to the Minister's second reading speech, 2804 2823, 2977, 3003, 4073; and to the objects of the bill, 2804.

When the order of leave of a bill is fairly specific, a member should keep his remarks within it, though he may make passing reference to associated problems, 3003.

In discussing a bill dealing with organizations of a particular type, a member is entitled to make passing reference to one such organization with which he is associated, and to the effect that the **legislation** will have on it and others of the same kind; but he is not **in** order in taking up the time of the House in detailing the history and operation of that organization, 3817.

On a motion for the second reading of a State oversea loan bill, a member is in order in, touching on the Act being amended and in making passing reference to purposes for which the money **raised** will be used; but he is outside the order of leave in discussing the ramifications of specific public works, 2978.

In the cut and thrust of debate, members should be allowed to reply to statements, 3610; but a member is expected to link his **remarks** with the bill, 3610.

In debating a motion, a member must make **his** remarks relevant, 5111; and may not canvass **legislation** already passed, 5112.

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Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of Chair (continued):

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY) (continued):

In opposing a motion critical of the federal Government's policies, a member leading for the Opposition is entitled, to some extent, to deal with the record of a former federal Government, but he departs from the spirit of the motion in devoting too much time to that matter, 2789.

The precise relevance of an argument is not always immediately perceptible, 2989, 2999, 3001; and a member was in order in referring to a matter, 454, 4913.

When debating a motion seeking precedence for Government business, a member may make passing reference only to matters over which Government business would take precedence, 1558. Such a motion does not give opportunity for raising issues that would be appropriate to a grievance debate, 3792.

In replying to a ministerial statement, the Leader of the Opposition may answer assertions of fact by the Minister, dispute his conclusions, criticize his policies and suggest alternatives but may not debate the policy of membership of political parties, 150; or attack another member, 4889.

A member who persisted in speaking on irrelevant matters and indulging in tedious repetition, would be directed to discontinue his speech, 3004.

Even though a point made by a member could be relevant to the debate, he should not labour it for so long that he became tediously repetitive, 3004.

A member was directed to return to his personal explanation, 1416.

Special Adjournment: A motion for a special adjournment does not afford an opportunity to raise a matter that might be dealt with in an adjournment debate; and the member wishing to raise such a matter in an adjournment debate should seek the agreement of the Whips, 2047.

Debate on a motion for a special adjournment does not entitle a member to open matters that are not before the House, 5111; debate is limited to whether the House should adjourn or continue to sit to deal with important items on the business paper or with matter affecting a member's constituency that should not be allowed to rest for the period proposed, 5112, 5114; or with matters that require attention, 5114, 5116, 5120.

In speaking to a special adjournment motion a member may specify issues that require examination, but not debate them,

5120; he may not deal with legislation or with other matters already debated, 5112, 5114, 5115, 5118; nor with matters that he will be denied an opportunity of debating if the House adjourns, 5120; though he may make passing reference to them, 5115, 5117, 5119. He may not use the occasion to indulge in attacks on other members, 5120.

Sub judice Rule: The *sub judice* rule applies when persons have been charged and are before a court, 5116; and a member does not contravene that rule if the matter to which he refers is not before a court. A current departmental investigation of a company does not come within the rule, 269.

A member who asserts that a matter should not be discussed in Parliament because it is *sub judice* bears the onus of proving to the Chair that it is being dealt with by a court, 2803; and of showing that substantial damage will flow or that the court proceedings will be prejudiced if such discussions are allowed, 2802; but a matter raised must be precisely the matter before a court if the *sub judice* rule is to apply, 2802.

A member who undertook not to debate issues that were the subject of litigation was allowed to proceed, but was asked to observe the proprieties in this respect, 2801.

Parliament must retain its standing as the highest tribunal in the land, and not allow itself to be muzzled on important issues being discussed by subordinate tribunals and attracting wide discussion in the news media, 2802.

Matters that were the subject of litigation were often discussed in the press when it was desirable that they should not be discussed in Parliament. The discussion of a matter in the press has no bearing on Parliament, but there is considerable support for an argument that members should be able to raise in Parliament matters of public interest, 2801.

Because of the importance of some matters, discussion of them must be allowed in Parliament even though, to an extent, that discussion overrides the *sub judice* rule, 2766; members are aware of their responsibilities in this respect, and the Chair would be impeding free speech in asking a member not to raise a matter that he believed strongly should be raised, 2801.

Members should observe the rights of litigants and not prejudice them in the exercise of free speech, 2801.

In speaking to a motion of privilege, a member may **not** deal with matters that are

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the subject of investigation by an inquiry at which witnesses are being called and from which charges could arise, even though it is unclear whether the inquiry is judicial or is one being conducted under the provisions of the Public Service Act, 2763.

Seasonal Felicitations, 2047.

Tabling of Papers: It is the custom during the tabling of papers for Ministers to give written replies to questions asked at a previous sitting, 2552; and the Minister has a discretion whether he reads the reply or seeks leave to have it incorporated in *Hansard*, 2552; but the Chair determines whether a Minister is making a ministerial statement in giving such a reply, 2553.

Tedious Repetition: A member can be tediously repetitive even when the point he is making is relevant to the debate, 3005; or in repeating a word, 4909.

A member who, after being warned, persists in irrelevancies and tedious repetition, will be directed to discontinue his speech, 3004.

Urgency: In speaking to an urgency motion, a member who advanced argument that was appropriate to the substantive motion was permitted to continue as he appeared to be attempting to link that argument with his reasons for asserting that urgency should be granted, 4005.

Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder: A member should not interject but should seek the call, 4213.

Point of Order: No point of order was involved, 3518.

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Procedure: A bill was put to the Committee in parts, with the clauses in each part being cited to enable members to debate them, 1658, 2908, 3245, 3668, 4408, 4645, 4782; and the schedules were put separately, 3245, 4645, 4782; but once a part had been agreed to, a member could not return to a clause in it, 3253.

Bills cognate with a bill put to the Committee in parts were proposed separately, with each being put as one question, namely that the clauses, schedule and title be agreed to, 4782.

The Committee must deal with one amendment at a time, 3250.

As section 5 of the Constitution Act provides that all bills for appropriating any part of the public revenue, or for imposing any new rate, tax or impost, shall originate in the Legislative Assembly, an amendment that would have the effect of imposing a new rate of tax is out of order, 1774.

Privilege: The parliamentary premises are under the joint control of the President of the Legislative Council and the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly. If those premises were used without permission for recording a television interview in a manner that could have constituted a breach of privilege, the organization making the recording might have to be reminded of its position, 3409.

Relevance: A member should relate his remarks to the bill, 4761.

A member was given latitude to refer to a clause that was not contained in the part of a bill before the Committee, but as his

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remarks were leading to a general debate on that clause, members were required to return to the relevant part, 2910.

A member would have an opportunity to deal with matters that were contained, not in the part before the Committee, but in a subsequent schedule, 3256.

An amendment proposed to a clause is out of order if it is not relevant to the subject-matter of the clause, 874.

PRESIDENT (THE HON. J. JOHNSON):

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Adjournment: A member may support a motion for the adjournment of the House, but may not debate issues, 2436.

Adjournment (S.O. 13): Determination of urgency, 2425.

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Chair: Despite the President's recent experience, the usual courtesies will continue to be extended to presiding officers of other parliaments visiting New South Wales. It was inappropriate to advise them of that intention, for they are aware of the normal practice, 4094.

Hansard: A member may not read from a report of a debate in the Legislative Assembly on a current matter, 4419, 4803; but may refer to remarks made in the Legislative Assembly during a previous Parliament, 1242.

Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder: A member is entitled to be heard in silence, 3476, 3537, 4992; and if members are not interrupted, debates will finish earlier, 3532. Members should not interject, 4426, 4478, 5049; but should seek the call, 5050. If members do interject, the member speaking should ignore the interjections, 5000.

Interruptions from the public gallery will not be tolerated, 4999.

Legislative Council: Gift by the Hon. Eileen Furley, O.B.E., of a grandfather clock, 2545.

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Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: When a member objected to remarks on the ground that they reflected on an attempt by him to protect parliamentary privilege, the Chair directed that they be withdrawn, 4990.

To suggest that a member seeks cheap publicity does not impute an improper motive under Standing Order 81, 1541.

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After a suspension of the sitting to enable reference to be made to the *Hansard* report of what had been said, the following remark was withdrawn voluntarily, "I respectfully suggest that you will be in grave danger of committing the error of gagging this House", 2656.

Exception was taken to the words ". . . the Hon. Ted Nit-Pickering . . .", and the word "Pickering" was withdrawn, 3545.

Upon objection being taken, a member voluntarily withdrew the remark "There is a well-known American comedian called Flip Wilson. Now we are getting a Flip Landa", 2667.

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Procedure: Members must observe Standing Order 68 and Standing Order 83 and seek to address the Chair when they rise, 2875.

Standing Order 57 requires the mover of a motion to comply with the procedures of the House, 2525; and objection must be taken if it is not intended that an item of business be dealt with as formal, 2525.

Privilege: Filming and interviewing a member at Parliament House may proceed only with the permission of the member concerned; and the filming and interviewing of other persons, not including the reporters of the organization concerned, may be carried out only with the prior approval of the President and the Speaker. Following an incident, the management of one television station had been so informed in writing by the President, and sent a copy of Legislative Assembly Standing Order 62A, 3763.
