INFANTS' PROTECTION BILL.

Clause 1. After the passing of this Act, no person shall, without a written order of a Justice of the Peace in each case, receive into his or her care, charge, or custody any child under the age of ten ~~three~~ years, to adopt, rear, nurse, or otherwise maintain apart from its parent or guardian the same in consideration of the payment to him or her of any sum or sums of money, or other valuable consideration, otherwise than by way of periodical instalments; and no such instalment shall be paid in advance, or exceed the sum of twenty shillings per week ~~except in the case of public hospitals or similar institutions;~~ and any person ~~paying or promising to pay, or~~ receiving or agreeing to receive payment for the adoption, rearing, nursing or maintenance of any child contrary to this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and on conviction thereof be subject to a fine not exceeding five one hundred pounds, with or without imprisonment with hard labour, for any term not exceeding "five years" one year. Provided that this section shall not apply to any person being the legal or natural guardian of such child, nor to the manager or officers of any institution supported wholly or in part by public subscription, or bona fide by private charity, or controlled by the State, or open to public inspection; nor to any person exempted for the time being from the operation of this section by the Minister administering this Act, or declared by the Minister to have offended innocently against this section. (*Read.*)

REPRESENTATION OF THE PEOPLE BILL (No. 2).

Clause 6. Subject to the provisions of this Act, every male person, being a natural born or naturalized subject, and not under any personal disability who shall have resided or had ^{Qualification of} ~~had~~ his principal place of abode in New South Wales for a continuous period of six months immediately prior to the ~~first day of January or the first day of July in any year~~ ^{Electors.} entering of his name on the List or Roll shall, if not disqualified or incapacitated under this Act, be qualified as an Elector under this Act; and as such may vote at all Elections of Members of the Assembly for the District in respect of which he is qualified. And every person so qualified, and not disqualified by this or any other Act, who at the time of application for an Elector's Right shall reside in any Division of a District, shall, subject as aforesaid, be entitled to have an Elector's Right issued to him for such Division, and to have his name ^{Elector's Right.} inserted and retained in a List and Roll for such Division as hereinafter provided. **Provided that, notwithstanding anything in this Part contained, the first Electoral Rolls—being those under and subject to which all persons shall vote at and for all elections to the Assembly held in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two but no longer—shall be collected and compiled pursuant to the provisions in that behalf hereafter contained. (Further considered.)**

Clause 19. If, in any case, the Registrar, after having compared the name appearing on the Elector's Right so delivered up with the name to be signed by such applicant as aforesaid in the said book, Elector's Right, or butt, shall be of opinion that that they are not in the same handwriting, in each case, he shall not issue the substituted Elector's Right applied for, unless a Stipendiary or Police Magistrate or Justice of the Peace upon complaint of the applicant, and proof by the applicant that he is entitled to the issue of such Right, shall, ~~after a like comparison of the respective handwritings,~~ direct the Registrar to issue such Right, which, upon such direction, shall be issued by him accordingly. (*Read.*)

Clause 26 Every such notice of objection shall be lawfully given if the same be sent by post (the sum chargeable as postage being first paid), directed to the person to whom the same shall be sent, at his place of abode, as described in the said List; and when any person shall desire to send any such notice by post, he shall deliver the same, duly directed, open, and in duplicate, to the postmaster of any post office, within such hours as shall have been previously notified at such post office, and under such regulations with respect to the registration of such letters, "and the" fee to be paid therefor [which fee shall in no case exceed *twopence* over and above the ordinary rate of postage] as shall from time to time be made by the Postmaster-General in that behalf; and in all cases in which such fee shall have been duly paid, the postmaster shall compare the said notice and duplicate, and, on being satisfied that they are alike in their address and their contents, shall seal or secure and forward one of them to its address by the post, and shall return the other to the party bringing the same, stamped with the stamp of the said post office; and the production by the party who posted such notice of such stamped duplicate shall be evidence of the notice having been given to the person at the place mentioned in such duplicate on the day which such notice would in the ordinary course of post have been delivered. (*Read.*)

Notice of objection may be sent through the post.

CROWN LANDS ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

(Consideration of the Legislative Council's amendments.)

Clause 3. Subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, the Governor or the Minister, as the case may be, shall be deemed to have had, and the Minister shall have, power to reverse, whether provisionally or otherwise, any forfeiture which has heretofore been, or may hereafter be, notified, declared, or otherwise asserted or enforced, under any repealed Act or under the Principal Act:—

Validity and effect of reversals of forfeiture.

- (i) A provisional reversal heretofore made of a forfeiture shall, unless the Governor or the Minister has subsequently done or performed, or shall hereafter do or perform, some act, matter, or thing in assertion and enforcement of such forfeiture, be deemed to have been an absolute reversal thereof, relating back to the date when such forfeiture was notified, declared, or otherwise asserted or enforced, and shall have the same effect as if the forfeiture so reversed had never been notified, declared, or otherwise asserted or enforced.
- (ii) A provisional reversal of a forfeiture hereafter to be made of a forfeiture shall be deemed to have suspended, or shall suspend, as the case may be, the operation of the forfeiture, as from the date, when such forfeiture has been or shall be notified, declared, or otherwise asserted or enforced; in any case where such provisional reversal shall afterwards be revoked, such revocation shall have the same effect as if the provisional reversal so revoked had never been made.
- (iii) Any absolute reversal of a forfeiture shall be deemed to have related back or shall relate back, as the case may be, to the date when such forfeiture has been or shall be notified, declared, or otherwise asserted or enforced, and shall be deemed to have had or shall have the same effect as if the forfeiture so reversed had never been notified, declared, or otherwise asserted or enforced.
- (iv) Any reversal heretofore made of any forfeiture whatsoever shall not be deemed to have been or to be ineffectual by reason only that the same was not published in the *Gazette*, or that the same was not made by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council.
- (v) In any case where a forfeiture has been or may hereafter be duly notified or declared for any cause other than the non-payment of money the Minister shall, before absolutely reversing such forfeiture, refer to the Local Land Board for inquiry and report as to any fact or circumstance in virtue of which he proposes to make such absolute reversal as aforesaid. And such Board or the Land Court upon an appeal or reference shall inquire into such fact or circumstance, and make a report and recommendation thereon to the Minister. ~~And in any such case no absolute reversal of such forfeiture shall take place except on the recommendation of such Board or Court.~~
- (vi) Any reversal of a forfeiture hereafter to be made shall as soon as practicable be notified in the *Gazette*, but the date of such reversal shall be the date of the Minister's approval thereof. *(Considered.)*

The Returning Officer or Deputy may, if he think fit, and shall, if required so to do by any Scrutineer or by any two persons entitled to vote at the polling-place at which he presides, require any person tendering a vote, before such person shall receive a ballot-paper, to sign his name in a book to be kept for that purpose; and the Returning Officer shall compare such signature with the signature purporting to be that of the holder of such Elector's Right and appearing thereon as hereinbefore provided.

(iv.) The Returning Officer or Deputy may, if he think fit, and shall, if called upon so to do by any Scrutineer require of any person tendering a vote before such person shall receive a ballot-paper to make a solemn declaration against bribery in the manner and form following (that is to say):—

I [A.B.] do solemnly declare that I have not received or had by myself or any person whosoever in trust for me or for my use or benefit, or for the use or benefit of any member of my family or kindred, or any friend, or dependent, directly or indirectly, any sum of money, office, place of emolument, gift or reward or any promise or security for, nor do I expect to receive, any money, office, place of emolument, gift or reward, by way of consideration, either expressed, implied, or understood, for giving my vote at this Election. (i) When any person shall have tendered a vote as hereinbefore provided, and the name in which such person shall demand to vote shall appear as well in a Roll in force for the Division of the District as in the Elector's Right produced by such person, the Returning Officer or Deputy shall, unless such person be prohibited from voting for some of the causes hereinbefore mentioned, forthwith write upon the back of one of the ballot-papers so signed or initialled as aforesaid, and as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number corresponding to the number set opposite such person's name in such Roll, together with the figures and initial letters of the title of such Roll, and so that in folding up such ballot-paper as hereinafter mentioned, the voter may easily conceal from view the said writing.

Duty of Returning Officer when voter's name appears in Roll and Elector's Right.

(ii) The Returning Officer or Deputy shall also, by an instrument to be provided for the purpose by the Colonial Secretary, perforate or puncture the lower corner of such ballot-paper with a letter or mark to be prescribed by the Colonial Secretary for use within each district, and shall do so in such a manner that when the ballot-paper is folded up, and before the same is deposited in the ballot-box, the punctured or perforated letter or mark shall be visible to the Returning Officer or Deputy, who shall in every case require the voter to exhibit to him the ballot-paper so punctured or perforated before depositing the same in the ballot-box.

(iii) Such Returning Officer or Deputy shall also deliver to such person such ballot-paper, and shall forthwith mark upon a certified copy of such Roll against the name of such person the fact of his having received such ballot-paper, and initial such Elector's Right, and mark the date in the following manner (that is to say): the number of the day in the month, the number of the month in the year, and the number of the year, and return the same to such person.

(iv) Any ballot-paper from which any number, figures, or initial letters so required to be written or perforated thereon by the Returning Officer or Deputy shall have been erased, obliterated, or torn, shall be rejected at the close of the poll. (*Read.*)

(iii) Who shall, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, make any such gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement, or agreement as aforesaid to

or

or for any person in order to induce such person to procure or endeavour to procure the return of any person to serve as a member of the Assembly or the vote of any elector at any election.

(iv) Who shall, upon or in consequence of any such gift, loan, offer, promise procurement, or agreement procure or engage, promise, or endeavour to procure the return of any person to serve as a member of the Assembly or the vote of any elector at any election.

(v) Who shall advance or pay or cause to be advanced or paid any money to or for the use of any other person with the intent that such money or any part thereof shall be expended in bribery at any election, or who shall knowingly pay or cause to be paid any money to any person in discharge or repayment of any money wholly or in part expended in bribery at an Election.

(vi) Every person who shall before, during, or after any election directly or indirectly by himself or by any other person on his behalf receive any money or valuable consideration on account of any person having voted or refrained from voting, or having induced any other person to vote or to refrain from voting at any Election.

(vii) Every elector who shall before or during any election directly or indirectly by himself or by any other person on his behalf receive, agree, or contract for any money or valuable consideration, office, place, or employment for himself or for any other person for voting or agreeing to vote, or for refraining or agreeing to refrain from voting, or for inducing any other person to vote or to refrain from voting at any Election.

And any person or elector so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and be liable to be fined any sum not exceeding **one hundred pounds**, or to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding **six months**, or to be both fined and imprisoned; and shall also be incapable of voting at "such Election"; and such person's or elector's vote if given shall be utterly void and of no effect. ~~Provided that nothing in any of the first five subsections of this section shall extend to any money paid for, or on account of, any law expenses bona fide incurred at or concerning any Election.~~ (*Read.*)

REPRESENTATION OF THE PEOPLE BILL (No. 2).

(Postponed Clauses.)

Clause 4. In this Act, unless inconsistent with the context,—

- “Assembly” means the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales;
- “Authorised Agent” includes any person holding the written authority of any candidate to act on his behalf for the Election then pending;
- “Check-Roll” means a Roll containing, together with all other matters required to be contained on an Electoral Roll under this Act, the numbers of all Electors’ Rights for the District, and such other entries as may be prescribed;
- “Constitution Act” means the Act contained in Schedule 1 to the Imperial Act eighteenth and nineteenth Victoria, cap. fifty-four;
- “Court of Summary Jurisdiction” means a Stipendiary or Police Magistrate, or any two Justices of the Peace sitting in Petty Sessions having jurisdiction within the District within, or in respect of, which the offence was committed, or the matter occurred, in connection with which the expression is used in this Act;
- “Electoral District” or “District” means Electoral District as constituted by the “Seats Redistribution Act” or any Act constituting any Electoral District for the purpose of Election to the Legislative Assembly;
- “Division” means a Division of an Electoral District;
- “Election” means the election of any Member or Members of the Assembly;
- “Governor” means the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council;
- “Jurisdiction” means the Division or Divisions for which any Registrar or Deputy Registrar is appointed or entitled to act as such under and for the purposes of this Act, or any Act amending the same;
- “Liquor” means and includes the same fluids which, for the purposes of the Licensing Act of 1882, and any Act amending the same, the expression “Liquor” is therein interpreted to mean and include;
- “List” means a List of Electors compiled but not revised or perfected;
- “Markman” means a person unable to write his name from whatever cause the inability arises.

Interpretation.

- "Member" means Member of the Assembly;
- "Natural-born subject" means every person born in Her Majesty's Dominions, as well as the son of a father or mother so born;
- "Naturalized subject" means every person made or hereafter to be made a denizen, or who has been, or shall hereafter be, naturalized in New South Wales, in accordance with the Denization or Naturalization Laws in force for the time being; but subject to the provisions of the "Chinese Restriction and Regulation Act of 1888," or any Act amending the same;

- "Returning Officer" means the Returning Officer appointed under the authority of this Act, and includes any person authorised to act for him or in his place in respect of the matters which such person is by or under this Act authorised to perform;
- "Roll" means a Roll of Electors entitled to vote at Elections held under the provisions of this Act, and for all purposes connected with such voting includes any Supplementary Roll.

CROWN LANDS ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

(Consideration of the Legislative Council's Message of 10 September, 1891.)

MR. SPEAKER,—

The Legislative Council having taken into consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message, dated 3rd September, 1891, in reference to the "Crown Lands Act Amendment Bill,"—

Insists upon its amendment in clause 3, which inserts subsection (v), and disagrees from the Assembly's amendment therein,—

- (1.) Because that portion of subsection (v) of clause 3 which the Legislative Assembly wishes to omit embodies one of the main principles of the Land Acts of 1884 and 1889, namely, the limitation of the judicial functions of the Minister.
- (2.) Because the said portion accords with section 20 of the Land Act of 1884, which makes the decision of the Land Board on any question of forfeiture (subject to appeal) final.
- (3.) Because, under the provisions of the said subsection (v), the Minister, before absolutely reversing a forfeiture, must refer to the Local Land Board for inquiry and report as to any fact or circumstance in virtue of which he proposes to make any reversal; and that such inquiry must essentially be a local one, and depend chiefly on local evidence of fact; therefore it is all-important and in strict conformity with the principles contained in the before-mentioned Acts that the report and recommendation of the Local Land Board, based on local inspection and evidence, should not be liable to be ignored by the Minister.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 4,—Because it is inconsistent to declare forfeited land legally open to selection, and then to dispossess a second applicant who has acted within the law, and for whom no compensation is provided.

(II) Every such Elector's Right shall be printed, numbered, and stamped in accordance with, and in all other respects shall follow, the requirements of section thirteen, except in the following particulars:—

(a) No questions or answers shall be printed or written on the butt.

(b) It shall be stated on every such Elector's Right that the same is good only up
“to the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-
“three.”

(III) To every such Elector's Right there shall also be attached a numbered Receipt Slip in the prescribed form, which shall be signed by the person entitled to the same, or be marked with his distinguishing mark if he be a marksman, such mark being afterwards authenticated in the prescribed manner by the Postmaster or other person authorised to deliver the said Right.

(iv) The Postmaster or other authorised person shall detach all such Receipt Slips from the Electors' Rights when such Slips have been signed or filled up as hereinbefore mentioned, and shall transmit the same to the Registrar of the District to which they relate, who shall retain the same in his custody for the prescribed time. (*Read.*)

COAL MINES REGULATION BILL:—

Clause 21. The following general rules shall be observed in every mine:—

(i) Within six months after commencing the working of any bords, stalls, double stalls, or longwall workings in any mine there shall be made and completed at least two separate and distinct openings to the day or surface from such mine, either by adits or shafts connected with each other by one or more headings, levels, drifts, or other excavations, so that by means of either of such openings all persons employed in the colliery may at all times whatsoever pass in or out, and when the second opening has not been commenced prior to the passing of this Act such shafts shall not at any point be nearer to one another than thirty yards. Where the mine is wrought by shafts all necessary steam appliances shall be erected at both shafts, and in such shaft a cage or cages working in guides shall be provided for the purpose of raising the persons from the mine, and such appliances and cages shall be constantly available for use; and until an intercommunication is completed between the first and second shaft there shall not be more than twenty persons employed below ground at any one time in the workings connected with either shaft. Provided that if in any mine, bords, stalls, or longwall workings shall have been commenced before the passing of this Act, and without a second such opening as aforesaid, the second opening shall be completed by or before the termination of the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two. And the owner of every mine wherein such two openings shall not be completed as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds for every month during which the same shall remain incomplete.

General rules.

Two openings to the surface, and facilities for raising and lowering persons.

(ii) Wherever by reason of the extent of the workings or otherwise, it shall appear to the Minister upon the report of the Inspector necessary to the safety of the men employed in the mine, he may require the owner or manager, within a period to be named in a written notice, to provide another or other openings to the day or surface with all necessary steam appliances, cages, and guides for raising and lowering men with safety, in addition to the downcast and upcast shafts. If the owner or manager object to comply with such notice, he shall within seven days from the receipt thereof notify his objection, and thereupon the matter shall be referred to arbitration, and dealt with in the manner hereinafter prescribed.

More than two openings in certain cases.

(iii) An adequate amount of ventilation shall be constantly produced in every mine to dilute and render harmless noxious gases to such an extent that the working places of the shafts, levels, stables, and workings of such mine, and the travelling roads to and from such working places, shall be in a fit state for working and passing therein, and return air-ways shall not be used as travelling roads, but in no case shall less than one hundred and fifty cubic feet of pure air per minute for each man and boy and two hundred cubic feet for each horse employed in the mine be constantly produced which shall sweep undiminished along the air-ways and into each working place.

Ventilation of mines.

(iv)

Division of mine into districts or splits.

(IV) Within six months after the commencement of this Act, every mine unless worked on the longwall system shall be divided into districts or splits of not more than sixty men, exclusive of wheelers and horses, and each district shall be supplied with a separate current of fresh air. And in every mine when it is necessary to use safety-lamps in working the coal in any part thereof or any such district or split it shall not be allowable for any naked light to be used in any part of the same mine, district, or split situated between the place where such lamps are being used and the return airway. All intake air shall travel free from all stagnant water, stables, and old workings, and no place except a single heading as hereinafter provided shall be driven more than thirty yards (exclusive of the cut through) away from the current of air without a cut through put through, and shall where gas exists be bratticed up within three yards of the face of such working place. Provided that a single heading may be driven any distance if bratticed up to within three yards of the face.

(V) A competent person or persons of not less than five years mining experience appointed by the owner or manager for that purpose, shall within such time immediately before the commencement of the first shift as shall be fixed by special rules, inspect every working part of the mine, shall mark each working-place visited, and shall ascertain the condition thereof so far as the presence of gas, ventilation, roof, sides, and general safety are concerned. No workman shall enter any part of such mine until it has been so inspected and stated by such competent person to be safe. If gas exists or is supposed to exist such inspection shall be made with a locked safety-lamp, and the result of such inspection shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose at the mine.

(VI) If at any time it is found by the person in charge of a mine, or any part thereof, that by reason of noxious gases prevailing in such mine or such part thereof, or of any cause whatever the mine or the said part is dangerous, every person shall be withdrawn therefrom, and a competent person shall inspect the same (and if the danger arises from inflammable gas shall make such inspection with a locked safety-lamp), and in every case the person in charge of the mine shall make a true report of the condition of such mine or part thereof, and no person shall, except in so far as is necessary for inquiry into the cause of danger, or for the removal thereof, or for exploration, be readmitted into the mine or such part thereof as was so found dangerous until the same is stated by such person in a written report to be safe. Every such report shall be recorded in a book which shall be kept by the owner or manager at the mine for the purpose, and shall be signed by the person reporting, and a copy of such report shall be sent to the Chief Inspector or the Inspector.

(VII) If at any time the Chief Inspector or an Inspector find that, by reason of inflammable gases prevailing in any mine or any part thereof, or of any cause whatever, the mine or the said part is dangerous, he may require the manager to withdraw the men therefrom; and no person shall, except so far as is necessary for exploration or inquiry into the cause of danger or the removal thereof, be readmitted into the mine or such part thereof as was found dangerous, until the same is stated by the Chief Inspector or Inspector to be safe. The finding of such danger and the removal thereof shall be recorded by the Chief Inspector or Inspector in a book to be kept by the owner or manager at the mine.

(VIII) All entrances to any place not in actual course of working and extension, and suspected to contain or be liable to engender dangerous gas of any kind, shall be properly walled or fenced off so as to prevent access thereto, and so as to prevent persons inadvertently entering the same.

(IX) Whenever any safety-lamp is required to be used, it shall be first examined and securely locked by some person duly authorised by the manager for that purpose who shall keep the key thereof, and no person shall, in that part of the mine where such lamp is used, open such lamp or shall have in his possession any contrivance for opening the lock of any safety-lamp, nor any tobacco, pipe, match, or apparatus of any kind for striking a light.

(X) Wherever safety-lamps are used they shall be so constructed that they may be safely carried against the air-current ordinarily prevailing in that part of the mine in which the lamps are for the time being in use, even though such current should be inflammable.

(XI) Where safety-lamps are required to be used the position of the lamp stations (underground) for lighting or relighting the lamps shall not be in the return airway.

(XII) In any place in which the use of a locked safety-lamp is for the time being required by, or in pursuance of, this Act, or which is dry and dusty, no shot shall be fired except by or under the direction of a competent person of not less than five years mining experience appointed in writing by the owner or manager of the mine, and such person shall not fire the shot, or allow it to be fired, until he has examined both the place itself where the shot is to be fired, and all contiguous accessible places in the same mine or district within a radius of twenty yards, and has found such place safe for firing, unless the explosive employed in firing the shot is so used with water or other contrivance as to prevent it from inflaming gas, or is of such a nature that it cannot inflame gas.

(XIII) After dangerous gas has been found in any mine, a barometer and thermometer shall be placed above ground in a conspicuous position near the entrance to the mine, and a true account taken at nine o'clock ante meridian and three o'clock post meridian each day the pit is at work, by some competent person appointed by the owner or manager, of the temperature and of the pressure of the atmosphere and temperature, which shall be recorded in a book to be kept at the mine for the purpose and shall be signed by the person who took the account.

(XIV) Gunpowder or other explosive or inflammable substance shall not be stored in the mine. (xv)

- (xv) Gunpowder or other explosive or inflammable substance shall not be taken into the mine except in a covered or closed case or canister containing not more than five pounds. Explosives in cases.
- (xvi) A workman shall not have in use at any one time in any one place more than one case or canister containing gunpowder or other explosive or inflammable substance. Quantity of explosives.
- (xvii) No steel or iron tools shall be used in charging holes for blasting; no explosive shall be forced into a hole of insufficient size; and when a hole has been charged the explosive which has missed fire shall not be bored out; and no hole shall be bored for a charge within six inches of any hole where a charge has missed fire. Charging holes and withdrawing.
- (xviii) If the place where a shot is to be fired in any mine or district in which gas is found is dry and dusty, then the shot shall not be fired, unless the place of firing and all contiguous accessible places within a radius of twenty yards therefrom are at the time of firing in a wet state from thorough watering or other treatment equivalent to watering in all parts where the dust is lodged, whether roof, floor, or sides. Watering dusty places.
- (xix) In the case of places in which watering would injure the roof or floor, the explosive shall be used with water or such other contrivance as shall prevent it from inflaming gas or dust, or the explosive shall be of such a nature that it cannot inflame gas or dust. Precautions when watering objectionable.
- (xx) Before any shot charged with any explosive calculated to ignite gas or coal-dust is fired in any gassy or dry and dusty place or in any place contiguous to any main haulage or travelling road in which dust is adhering to the roof or sides, all workmen (except the persons engaged in firing the shot) shall be removed from that part of the mine and from every other place where they would be in danger. Men to be withdrawn before firing.
- (xxi) Every shaft in course of sinking shall be provided with a trolley to run over the pit's mouth and receive the load when brought to the surface. Such trolley to be large enough to cover the opening at the pit top. Trolley over pit mouth.
- (xxii) Every shaft in course of sinking shall be kept clear of all noxious gases by a fan or some other appliance. Sinking pit to be cleared of gas.
- (xxiii) Every working shaft used for the purpose of drawing minerals or for the lowering or raising of persons shall have sliding gates erected on the pit-head landing stage to act as a fence while the pit is idle or when the cages are going up or down the shaft, also at every intermediate landing stage in the shaft. Sliding gates.
- (xxiv) Where there is a downcast and furnace shaft, and both such shafts are provided with apparatus in use for raising and lowering persons, every person employed in the mine shall, upon giving reasonable notice, have the option of using the downcast shaft, except while coal-drawing is going on. Option of using downcast shaft.
- (xxv) Every shaft or pit which is out of use or used only as an air pit shall be securely fenced to the satisfaction of the Chief Inspector or Inspector. Idle pit to be fenced.
- (xxvi) Every pit or shaft in course of being sunk, and every working and pumping pit or shaft, where the natural strata are not safe, shall be securely cased or lined or otherwise made secure. Pit to be lined.
- (xxvii) Every working pit or shaft and entrance thereto shall be provided with means of communicating from the bottom of the shaft to the surface, and from the surface to the bottom of the shaft, by such distinct and definite signals as shall be prescribed in the special rules, and a copy of the code of signals shall be posted up at the top and bottom of each shaft. Signals.
- (xxviii) A sufficient cover over head shall be used when lowering or raising persons in every working pit or shaft. Cover to cage.
- (xxix) No single-linked chain other than the coupling chain shall be used for lowering or raising persons in any pit or shaft, and no material shall be lowered or raised in the same cage with or in the opposite cage against any person. An efficient safety hook shall be used for attaching the cage or bucket to the rope or chain. In a sinking pit the chain connecting the rope and the bucket shall be considered the coupling chain. Raising and lowering men.
- (xxx) To the drum of every machine used for lowering or raising persons such flanges or horns, or such other appliances as shall be sufficient to prevent the rope from slipping, shall be attached. Flanges to drum.
- (xxxi) There shall be attached to every machine (worked by steam, water, or mechanical power) used for lowering or raising persons an adequate brake. When the drum is not on the crank shaft, a brake shall be attached to the drum as well as to the fly-wheel. A proper indicator shall be attached to the machine (in addition to any mark on the rope) to show the person who works the machine the position of the cage or load in the shaft. ~~In a sinking shaft the indicator may be dispensed with, but the mark on the rope must be retained.~~ Brake and indicator.
- (xxxii) Every fly-wheel, and all exposed and dangerous parts of the machinery used in or about the mine, shall be and be kept securely fenced to the satisfaction of the Chief Inspector or Inspector. Fly-wheels, &c. fenced.
- (xxxiii) Every steam-boiler shall be provided with a proper steam-gauge, water-gauge, and safety-valve. Steam-gauges, &c.
- (xxxiv) At any mine where a boiler is used for generating steam, the owner or manager shall at least once in every six months cause every such "boiler" to be blown down at least twenty-four hours before inspection and to be thoroughly examined and tested by a "competent person," who shall, immediately after the completion of such examination and test, enter in a book to be kept at the mine for that purpose a full and true report of the result of such examination and test, and of the state of every boiler so examined and tested, and every such report shall be signed by the person making it, and shall bear date of the day of entry, and a copy of such report shall be forthwith sent to the Chief Inspector. Examination of boilers.
- (xxxv)

Underground signals.

(XXXV) All underground self-acting and engine planes on which persons travel shall be provided with some proper means of signalling between the stopping places and the ends of the planes, and with sufficient places of refuge at the sides of such planes at intervals of not more than twenty yards.

Places of refuge

(XXXVI) Every road on which persons travel underground, where the load is drawn by a horse or other animal, shall be provided at intervals of not more than fifty yards with sufficient man-holes, which man-holes shall be of sufficient length, and of at least three feet in width between the waggons running on the tramroad and the side of such road.

Places of refuge to be kept clear.

(XXXVII) Every man-hole and space for a place of refuge shall be constantly kept clear and whitewashed at least once every six months, and no person shall place anything in a man-hole or such space so as to prevent access thereto.

Barriers of coal.

(XXXVIII) Every underground main road in a mine, which road is used for the purpose of haulage or for persons travelling therein, shall not exceed sixteen feet in width. And on each side of such road, other than a cross-drift or headway driven across bords in direction of the cleat or on the end, a barrier of coal or stone shall be left of not less than fourteen yards wide. No heading or bord through the barrier of coal shall exceed three yards wide, and such heading or bord shall not, without the express sanction as aforesaid, be less than ten yards apart. Provided that if any cross-drift or headway as aforesaid, or any heading on each side of which no barrier of coal shall have been left be at any time converted into or used as a main road sufficient support shall forthwith be constructed on each side thereof.

Stoppings to be of stone or brick or other suitable material.

(XXXIX) All stoppings on the sides of main engine, horse, or travelling roads shall be built up with brick or stone or other suitable material to the satisfaction of the Inspector.

Examination of mine and appliances every twenty-four hours.

(XL) A competent person, or competent persons, who shall be appointed by the owner or manager for the purpose, shall once, at least in every twenty-four hours, examine the state of the external parts of the machinery, and the state of the head-gear, working places, intake and return air-courses, levels, planes, ropes, chains, and other works of the mine which are in actual use, and once at least in every week shall examine the state of the shafts by which persons ascend or descend, and the guides or conductors therein, and shall make a true report of the result of such examination, and such report shall be recorded in a book to be kept at the mine for that purpose, and shall be signed by the person who made the same.

Reported.

Roof, &c., of travelling road to be made secure.

(XLI) The roof and sides of every travelling road and working place shall be made secure, and no person, unless appointed for the purpose of exploring or repairing, shall travel or work in any such road or place until it is made secure.

Competent person in charge of machinery.

(XLII) In any mine, which is usually entered by means of machinery, competent persons of such age as prescribed by this Act shall be appointed for the purpose of working the machinery, which is employed in lowering and raising persons therein, and such a person shall attend for the said purpose during the whole time that any person is below ground in the mine.

No boiler underground unless near upcast and bricked around.

(XLIII) If a fire be used underground for generating the motive power it must, unless otherwise authorised by the Minister, be placed within thirty yards of the bottom of an upcast shaft, in which case the walls surrounding it and the flue to the upcast shaft shall be built with substantial brickwork, and there shall be a vacant space of four feet between the outside of the brickwork and the coal seam, and the same vacant space between the top of the brickwork and the roof of the mine.

Boreholes.

(XLIV) Sufficient boreholes shall be kept not less than twelve feet in advance, and on both sides, to prevent inundations in every working approaching a place likely to contain a dangerous accumulation of water.

Width of winning headings under tidal waters, &c.

(XLV) In the case of working coal under tidal waters or rivers, from one road of every pair of "winning off" or leading headings or levels (which shall not except for sidings exceed eight feet in width), and from the face of every bord a borehole shall be kept going not less than twelve feet in advance, for the purpose of foretelling the presence of any fissure, open joint, fault, or otherwise, and in the case of working under the ocean or tidal waters every "winning off" or leading headings or levels shall be driven at least one hundred yards in advance of the working bords, and shall not exceed eight feet in width except for sidings.

Sufficient cover over workings under ocean.

(XLVI) Before any works shall be commenced for winning coal from under river or tidal waters or from under the ocean, the owner or manager shall take such steps as shall be necessary to satisfy himself that there is a sufficient covering to render the work of winning coal quite safe to the miners employed therein.

Width of pillars and position under ocean.

(XLVII) In the case of working coal by the pillar and stall system under river or tidal or ocean waters the workings shall be laid off systematically and carefully, and the size of the pillars shall be such as will afford ample support after exposure to the crumbling effect of the air over many years, and shall not be less than twice the width of the bords or coal wrought out between such pillars. The bords on one side of the headings, levels or cross-cuts, shall, unless prevented by rolls or faults, be driven opposite the bord pillars on the other side of the heading, level, or cross-cut. The minimum width of the pillars of coal shall be eight yards, and the maximum width of the bords or stalls six yards. And in no case shall the pillars under ocean or tidal waters be removed.

(XLVIII)

(XLVIII) Boreholes for the purpose of proving the thickness of the alluvial deposit shall be put down by the owner or manager on all lands fronting the ocean, tidal waters or rivers where the thickness of the strata and deposits which overlie the coal worked or about to be worked is less than two hundred feet. Such boreholes, at distances not exceeding one hundred yards apart, shall be put down from the surface through the alluvial deposit to the rock, and to the rise of the coal seam worked. An account of the strata and deposits so bored through shall be furnished by the owner or manager to the Chief Inspector or Inspector when the boring has reached the rock. Thickness of strata near ocean, &c., to be ascertained by boring.

(XLIX) In mines not under river or ocean or tidal waters worked on the pillar and stall system, where it is intended to remove the pillars, the stalls or bords shall not exceed in width eight yards, and the pillars shall not be less than eight yards wide. Where it is not proposed to remove the pillars they shall be of such dimensions as shall be necessary to support the roof. In mines worked on the longwall system substantial supports shall be erected sufficient to protect the workmen. In mines worked on the Welsh bords or double stall systems good, substantial, and sufficient pack walls shall be built, and a sufficient number of props sets on each side of the pack walls. Size of pillars in mines not under ocean, &c.

(L) In mines not under the ocean or river or tidal waters all district pillars of coal shall, regard being had to the efficient and economic working of the mine, be taken out as soon as possible after they are formed so that the roof may subside uniformly and close up the small coal and rubbish, thus leaving no open spaces where falls can occur or quantities of poisonous gases can accumulate. Pillars to be taken out soon after formed.

(LI) Where persons are employed underground ambulances or stretchers, with splints and bandages, shall be kept at the mine ready for immediate use in case of accidents. Stretchers to be kept at mine.

(LII) The coal shall not be wrought under any proclaimed or made road without the sanction, in writing, of the Minister, but headings may be driven under any such road for the purpose of connecting the workings or of working the coal on either side thereof, but all such headings shall be in such positions, of such dimensions, and so supported as the Chief Inspector or an Inspector shall, by writing under his hand, direct. Coal not to be wrought under roads.

Every person who contravenes or does not comply with the general rules, three to fifty-two inclusive in this section, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act. Provided that nothing contained in the General Rules in regard to barriers of coal, or the size of bords, stalls, or pillars, shall be construed to affect or apply to any underground works constructed or completed before this Act comes into operation, nor prevent the removal of pillars of coal (in mines not under the ocean or river or tidal waters) which shall, prior to this Act coming into operation, have been left of a less size or thickness than herein prescribed, provided that in the removal of such pillars all necessary precautions be taken to prevent injury to the miners. (*Read.*) Offences against Act.

(II) All disqualifications specified by section twelve of the Principal Act shall be disqualifications under this Act, except the disqualification thereby annexed to persons in the Naval or Military Service on full pay and to officers and members of the Police Force, paid Police Magistrates, and Clerks of Petty Sessions and except that no such disqualification shall extend to persons who although in receipt of aid from any charitable institution are not inmates of any such institution; and all words in the said section commencing from "and no Inspector-General" down to "any candidate" are hereby repealed.

(III) Every person so qualified and being of the full age of twenty-one years and absolutely free and not disqualified by this or any other Act who, ~~at the time of applying for an Electors' Right,~~ shall reside in any Division of a District shall, subject as aforesaid, be entitled to have an Electors' Right issued to him for such District, and to have his name inserted and retained on a List and Roll for such Division. (Read.)

ELECTORAL REFORM BILL:—

Application
Part V.

Clause 35. The enactments contained in Part III of the Principal Act, from section fifteen to section fifty-four, both numbers included, shall, as amended hereby, be applicable to all Elections held after the date of the completion of the Rolls for the year 1892-1893 pursuant to Part II of this Act; but the provisions in this Part contained shall not be applicable to any Election held before such date. Provided that the amendments and provisions herein-after in this section, and in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh sections contained shall take effect on the passing of this Act and shall be applicable in the case of all Elections held after the passing of this Act, viz. :—

(i) Writs for General Elections shall be issued within four clear days after the publication of the Proclamation dissolving Parliament, and not within two such days, as required by section fifteen of the Principal Act; and in every Writ, whether issued for a General Election or a Bye-Election, a day shall be named before which all nominations of Candidates must be made.

(ii) The polling days ~~day~~ for every General Election shall be so appointed that the Elections shall take place ~~within a period not exceeding twenty-one days~~ **on the twenty-first day** from the date of issue of the Writs; and such Elections shall be held in three batches, each comprising not less than twenty or more than twenty-five Districts, and not less than five or more than seven clear days' interval shall take place between the holding of each such batch of Elections; and such days ~~day~~ shall be proclaimed a public holidays **holiday** by notification in the *Gazette*, and in one or more newspapers published or circulating in the district for which such polling days ~~day~~ shall have been appointed.

(iii) The Returning Officer, instead of giving notice of the day and place of nomination, as required by the twenty-fourth section of the said Act, shall give notice of the day of nomination and of the place within the district to be appointed by him at which he will receive the nomination-papers hereinafter mentioned.

(iv) No place shall be appointed as a Polling-place at any time after the issue, and before the day appointed for the return, of the Writ for the Election of a member for any District.

(v) If in any case the Governor shall be satisfied that the convenience of a large number of Electors of any District would be furthered by appointing a Polling-place or Polling-places beyond the boundaries of such District, he may by notice in the *Gazette* appoint such Polling-place or Polling-places.

(VI.)

(vi) In every District every polling shall commence on the day appointed for the same at eight o'clock in the forenoon, and shall, unless lawfully adjourned, finally close at ~~five~~ six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

(vii) Sections twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven, and twenty-eight of the Principal Act are hereby repealed. (*Read.*)

JOINT STOCK COMPANIES ARRANGEMENT BILL (*Council Bill*).

Where compromise proposed the Supreme Court in its equity jurisdiction may order a meeting of creditors, &c., to decide as to such compromise.

Where any compromise or arrangement shall be proposed between a company which is, at the time of the passing of this Act or afterwards, in the course of being wound up either, voluntarily or by or under the supervision of the Court, under the "Companies Act," and the creditors of such company, or any class of such creditors, it shall be lawful for the Court, in addition to any other of its powers, on the application in a summary way of any creditor or the liquidator, to order that a meeting of such creditors or class of creditors shall be summoned in such manner as the Court shall direct; and if "a" majority in number representing three-fourths in value of such creditors or class of creditors present, either in person or by proxy or attorney, at such meeting, shall agree to any arrangement or compromise, such arrangement or compromise shall, if sanctioned by an order of the Court, be binding on all such creditors or class of creditors, as the case may be, and also on the liquidator and contributories of the said Company. DIVORCE AMENDMENT AND EXTENSION BILL.

Clause 1. Any married person who, at the time of the institution of the suit, shall have been domiciled in this Colony for "three" years and upwards " (provided that he or she shall not have resorted to the Colony for the purpose of such institution)" may present a petition to the Supreme Court in the form prescribed by the ' Matrimonial Causes Act ' (thirty-sixth Victoria number nine), or by the rules made under the same, "praying that his or her marriage with the respondent may be dissolved, or " praying that a judicial separation may be granted in either case on one or more of the grounds in this section mentioned, that is to say—

- (a) On the ground that the respondent has, "without just cause or excuse," "wilfully" deserted the petitioner, and without any such cause or excuse left him or her continuously so deserted during "three" years and upwards. And no wife who was domiciled in New South Wales when the desertion commenced shall be deemed to have lost her domicile by reason only of her husband having thereafter acquired a foreign domicile. Desertion.
- (b) On the ground that the respondent has, during three years and upwards, been an habitual drunkard, and either habitually left his wife without the means of support, or habitually been guilty of cruelty towards her, or, being the petitioner's wife, has, for a like period, been an habitual drunkard, and habitually neglected her domestic duties or rendered herself unfit to discharge them. Habitual drunkenness, with cruelty or neglect, &c.
- (c) On the ground that, at the time of the presentation of the petition, the respondent has been imprisoned for a period of not less than "three" years, and is still in prison, under a commuted sentence for a capital crime; or under sentence to penal servitude or imprisonment for seven years or upwards, or, being a husband, has within five years undergone frequent convictions for crime, and been sentenced in the aggregate to imprisonment for three years or upwards, and left his wife habitually without the means of support. Sentence for crime.
- (d) On the ground that, within one year previously, the respondent has been convicted of having attempted to murder the petitioner, or of having assaulted him or her with intent to inflict grievous bodily harm, or on the ground that the respondent has repeatedly during that period assaulted and cruelly beaten the petitioner. Violent assaults, &c.
- (Read.)

DISEASED ANIMALS AND MEAT BILL (No. 3).

Regulations.

Clause 10. It shall be lawful for the Governor, on the recommendation of the Board of Health, to make regulations to come into force either throughout the Colony or in any specified part of the Colony, for the inspection of animals in sale-yards, in transit, or upon slaughtering premises, and for the seizure, condemnation, and destruction of diseased "animals," and of the meat of diseased animals, and to enforce penalties for the breach of any such regulation, not exceeding in any one case *fifty* pounds, and with or without a minimum limit, and in the case of continuing penalties not exceeding *twenty* pounds for every day during which any breach or default is continued. And such regulations shall be published in the *Gazette*, and shall come into force upon the publication thereof, or at such time after such publication as shall be therein named. (*Read.*)

And the said railway shall be constructed in a proper and workmanlike manner, to the satisfaction of the Engineer-in-Chief for Railway Construction. (*Read.*)

But after the expenditure of the sum of twenty-five thousand pounds on completion of the said works, to the approval of an officer to be appointed as aforesaid, the said sum of ten thousand pounds shall be returned to the said Company with interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum.
