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Assent to (*Session 1965-66*) reported, 4.

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Motion (*Mr Brewer*) That in the opinion of this House, every endeavour should be made to advance the cause of agricultural education on a State and Federal level through research and extension services and other existing channels and the establishment of further institutions to give effect to this aim, including some appropriate form of co-ordinating authority in this field, and debate adjourned, 275.

COALMINES SAFETY:—

Motion (*Mr Coates*) (*urgency—suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders*), (1) That in the opinion of this House a public inquiry conducted by a "judge" should be held to inquire into fatalities in coalmines in New South Wales; (2) That the inquiry be directed towards making recommendations as to how safety conditions in coalmines may be improved; amendment (*Mr Simpson*) to insert after "judge" the words "with the powers of a Royal Commissioner", and debate adjourned, 165.

CONTAINER BERTHS AND CARGO FACILITIES:—

Motion (*Mr Renshaw*) (*Urgency*), That a Select Committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon planning, construction and operation of container berths and consolidation areas and general cargo facilities in the Sydney area, *negatived*, 274.

DISALLOWANCE OF REGULATION UNDER HIRE-PURCHASE ACT, 1960:—

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DROUGHT RELIEF:—

Motion (*Mr Punch*) (*Urgency*), That the Minutes of Proceedings of and the Evidence taken by the Select Committee upon Drought Relief since its Second Progress Report be tabled in this House and thereupon such Committee be dissolved, *agreed to*, 63.

ELECTORAL LAW:—

Motion (*Mr Hough*), That the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Act should be amended to (a) prohibit canvassing and distribution of electoral material on polling day, (b) provide for display of "How to Vote" material, (c) provide for shorter polling hours, and debate adjourned, 92; resumed and adjourned, 132.

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Motion (*Mr Cutler*), That M. B. Cohen, Esq., B.Ec., be elected;
 Motion (*Mr Booth*), That F. G. Downing, Esq., be elected;
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MARGARINE:

Motion (*Mr Renshaw*) (*urgency*), That Government should immediately institute legislation to remove all restrictions on margarine manufactured, *negatived*, 157.

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Motion (*Mr Willis on behalf of Mr Askin*), for General Business to take precedence on Tuesday until 6 p.m., *agreed to*, 75.

Motion (*Mr Willis*), That during remainder of present Session, unless otherwise ordered, House shall sit on Tuesday and Wednesday from 2.30 p.m. until 10.30 p.m. and on Thursday from 11 a.m. until 4.30 p.m., General Business to take precedence on Tuesday until 6 p.m., *agreed to*, 239.

Motion (*Mr Willis*), That during remainder of present Session, unless otherwise ordered, Government Business to take precedence of General Business; the provisions of paragraphs (2.) and (3.) of Sessional Order shall not apply to the Sittings of the House, and upon the expiration of ten minutes after the motion for the adjournment of the House has been made Mr Speaker shall adjourn the House, without Question put, *agreed to*, 173, 280.

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On the motion, "The decision of the Exhibition Review Committee of the Education Department that Lithgow public school children be not permitted to attend a school matinee showing of the film 'The Greatest Story Ever Told' it was submitted that the decision of the Exhibition Review Committee referred to had been made in March last and therefore was not a matter of recent occurrence."

Mr Speaker stated that although it was contended that the decision made several months before was a continuing decision he saw no reason why he should not follow the ruling of Mr Speaker Lamb recorded on page 33 of the *Manual of Procedure* in regard to a matter concerning the New England University and ruled the motion out of order, 137.

Judiciary :—

Mr Willis submitted that the Deputy-Leader of the Opposition in his references to the Chairman of the Electoral Districts Commission was attempting to flout the ruling given last session in respect to reflections upon judges by making allegations directly or by innuendo which would bring the particular judge into disrepute.

Mr Speaker ruled that this matter was covered by his ruling on 31 March, 1966, and added that the Deputy-Leader of the Opposition had not offended his ruling, 45.

Notices of Motions and Questions :—

Mr Speaker made a statement regarding the duties and responsibilities of the Chair in ensuring that Notices of Motions and Questions conformed to the rules and practice of the House and of the necessity of frequently altering Questions and Notices, usually in consultation with the Member concerned, 269.

Privilege :—

It was submitted by the Member for Bondi, Mr Einfeld, that certain newspaper reports made by the Secretary of the Home and Property Owners Association were intimidatory and an infringement of the rights and privileges of Members.

Mr Speaker ruled that the Member for Bondi having accepted responsibility for the accuracy of the press reports, had made out a *prima facie* case of privilege and it was not for the House to decide whether or not privilege was in fact involved.

After Mr Einfeld had moved his motion Mr Speaker ruled that the motion was out of order for non-compliance with S.O. 106, 53-4.

It was submitted by the Leader of the Opposition as a matter of Privilege that amendments made by Mr Speaker to a Notice of Motion submitted by him had not been agreed to by him.

Mr Speaker stated that, as a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege had not been made, only a question of Order was involved, 247.

Select Committee :—

The Member for Gloucester, Mr Punch, moved That the Minutes of the Proceedings of and the Evidence taken by the Select Committee upon Drought Relief since its Second Progress Report be tabled in this House and thereupon such Committee be dissolved.

Point of Order: Mr Earl submitted that the Chairman of the Select Committee upon Drought Relief had moved this Motion in the House without a resolution of that Committee being passed and questioned his right as the Chairman of a Parliamentary Select Committee to move a Motion of this nature to wind up the Committee.

SSPEAKER (*continued*):*Select Committee (continued)*:

Mr Speaker stated that the Honourable Member for Gloucester was taking this action as a Private Member of the House and not as Chairman of the Committee and he did not need anybody's authority to move this Motion. Therefore, he could not uphold the point of order.

Further Point of Order: Mr Jackson submitted that the Committee had not come to a resolution and the Motion had been brought to the House without the knowledge of members of the Committee.

Mr Speaker said that it was quite clear that it was competent for any Honourable Member at any time after a Select Committee was set up to come into the House and by the appropriate forms move that the Select Committee be dissolved and he could not uphold the point of order, 63-4.

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Mr Speaker stated that, as Standing Order No. 158 provided that to move a motion of privilege a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege must first be established to the satisfaction of the Speaker, he had exercised the discretionary power conferred upon him by that Standing Order. He therefore ruled that it was not competent to move dissent from a decision of the Speaker under Standing Order No. 158 and accordingly ruled the motion out of order. 53-4.
