On the ninth day of December in every year the Mayor then holding office shall Retirement and retire and on the same day a new election shall take place in the manner hereinafter mentioned but the retiring Mayor shall be eligible for re-election. DUPLICATION OF THE PORT DARWIN TELEGRAPH CABLE. (Resolution.)

Mr. Burns moved,—That the Committee agree to the following Resolution:—

That this House approves of the following Agreement for the construction of a second cable from Singapore direct to Banjoewangie, and thence direct to Port Darwin, as agreed upon by the Representatives Governments of the Colonics of New South Wales, Victoria, New Zealand, and South Australia, and empowers the Government to enter into a contract, in conjunction with the other Governments named, on the terms therein stated, for the purpose of carrying out this undertaking:—

Memorandum of Agreement between the Governments of New South Wales and Victoria, on behalf of the Australasian Colonies and New Zealand (hereinafter called the Governments), on the one part, and the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Company (Limited) hereinafter called the Company—on the other.

1. That the Company shall, subject to the approval of the shareholders, contract with the Governments for the construction of a second cable from Singapore direct to Banjoewangie, and thence direct to Port Darwin, for an annual subsidy of £32,400, and shall sign the contract and necessary conditions on or before the 1st July, 1879.

2. That such subsidy shall be payable for a period of twenty years, subject to the provisions

hereinafter contained.

3. That the Company shall throughout the whole of the period during which such subsidy shall be payable maintain in full working order, force-majeure the act of God or the Queen's enemies excepted, such second cable, and also its present lines of cable between Singapore and Batavia, and Banjoewangie and Port Darwin.

4. That the Company shall before such subsidy shall become payable lay a second cable between Singapore and Penang, and thereafter shall, in like manner, maintain the same force majeure the act of

God or the Queen's enemies excepted, and its present lines of cable between Singapore and Penang, Penang and Madras, Penang and Rangoon, in full working order.

5. That the Company shall, in consideration of the subsidy herein agreed to be paid, and whilst that subsidy is payable, allow a rebate on Government messages, hereinafter defined, exchanged between England and Port Darwin, reducing their own proportion of the charge to the extent of 50 per cent, upon the present rate; and on press messages exchanged between England and Port Darwin, as hereinafter defined, will reduce their own proportion of the charge to the extent of 75 per cent. upon the present rate: Provided that such reduction shall not be extended to any Colony other than such as may contribute towards the subsidy.

6. That the Government shall have the right-during the currency of the cubsidy aforesaid to purchase the Company's cable lines and other property between Singapore and Port-Darwin-on equitable terms, to be fixed, in case of difference, by arbitration; twolve months previous notice to be given to the Company of the intention to exercise this right: Provided always that the right shall not be exercisable till the Company shall for five years

have-paid-a-dividend-equal-to-10-per-cent-

- 7. That the Company shall complete and open for communication the second cables above-mentioned between Singapore and Port Darwin and Singapore and Penang within eight months from the date of the signing of the contract: Provided always that the Company shall not be held liable for any loss or damage which the Colonies may sustain in consequence of delay in completing the said cables, in the event of such delay being caused by war, inevitable accident, or other contingency over which the Company can have no control.
- 8. That in the event of the Company completing and having the duplicate cable above-mentioned open for communication within the period herein contracted for, the subsidy payable by the Government shall commence and accrue four months after the signing of the contract; but the Company shall not be entitled to any payment under this clause until the said cables shall have been actually completed and are open for communication as above stated.
- 9. That the said subsidy shall be payable quarterly in London to the Company in sterling money, free of all deductions.
- 10. That in the event of any total interruption in the communication between Port Darwin and Singapore the subsidy shall cease pro rata for the period of such interruption: Provided that if the interruption be caused by reason of war or any such like cause the subsidy shall continue, but the Company shall be bound to restore such communication at the request and cost of the Governments so seen as the war or other contingencies shall have terminated.
- 11. Memorandum of Agreement between the Governments of New South Wales and Victoria, on behalf of the Australasian Colonies and New Zealand (hereinafter called the Governments), on the one part, and the Eastern Extension Australasia and China Telegraph Company (Limited), hereinafter called the Company—on the other.

- 1. That the Company shall, subject to the approval of the shareholders, contract with the Governments for the construction of a second cable from Singapore direct to Banjoewangie, and thence direct to Port Darwin, for an annual subsidy of £32,400, and shall sign the contract and necessary conditions on or before the 1st July, 1879.
- 2. That such subsidy shall be payable for a period of twenty years, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained.
- 3. That the Company shall throughout the whole of the period during which such subsidy shall be payable maintain in full working order, the act of God or the Queen's enemies excepted, such second cable, and also its present lines of cable between Singapore and Batavia, and Banjoewangie and Port Darwin.
- 4. That the Company shall before such subsidy shall become payable lay a second cable between Singapore and Penang, and thereafter shall, in like manner, maintain the same, the act of God or the Queen's enemies excepted, and its present lines of cable between Singapore and Penang, Penang and Madras, Penang and Rangoon, in full working order.
- 5. That the Company shall, in consideration of the subsidy herein agreed to be paid, and whilst that subsidy is payable, allow a rebate on Government messages, hereinafter defined, exchanged between England and Port Darwin, reducing their own proportion of the charge to the extent of 50 per cent. upon the present rate; and on press messages exchanged between England and Port Darwin, as hereinafter defined, will reduce their own proportion of the charge to the extent of 75 per cent. upon the present rate: Provided that such reduction shall not be extended to any Colony other than such as may contribute towards the subsidy.
- 6. That the Company shall complete and open for communication the second cables above-mentioned between Singapore and Port Darwin and Singapore and Penang within eight months from the date of the signing of the contract: Provided always that the Company shall not be held liable for any loss or damage which the Colonies may sustain in consequence of delay in completing the said cables, in the event of such delay being caused by war, inevitable accident, or other contingency over which the Company can have no control.

 7.

7. That in the event of the Company completing and having the duplicate cable above-mentioned open for communication within the period herein contracted for, the subsidy payable by the Government shall commence and accrue four months after the signing of the contract; but the Company shall not be entitled to any payment under this clause until the said cables shall have been actually completed and are open for communication as above stated.

8. That the said subsidy shall be payable quarterly in London to the Company in sterling money,

free of all deductions.

9. That in the event of any total interruption in the communication between Port Darwin and Singapore the subsidy shall cease pro rata for the period of such interruption: Provided that if the interruption be caused by reason of war or any such like cause the subsidy shall continue, but the Company shall be bound to restore such communication at the request and cost of the Governments.

10. The Company shall at all times hereafter give priority in transmission through the said cable to all Government messages; being such as are exchanged between Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies or the various Agents-General on the one hand, and the Governors or Chief Secretaries of the various Colonial Governments on the other, on matters relating to the administration of the Governments.

But no such rate made in any one year shall exceed the amount of sixpence in the pound of the annual value of such property. Provided always that no such special resolution shall be passed unless a petition signed by not less than two-thirds of the ratepayers in such locality shall have been presented to the Council praying that a separate rate may be made and levied and stating for what period it is desired that such separate rate shall be made and levied. And every particular rate made under this section may be made for and in respect of such period as shall be named in the special resolution but not exceeding the period mentioned in such petition. PARLIAMENTARY POWERS AND PRIVILEGES BILL.

Consideration of Legislative Council's Message of 26th March, viz.—

Mr. Speaker,

The Legislative Council having taken into consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message, dated 5th March, 1879, in reference to the Parliamentary Powers and Privileges Bill,
Agrees to the Assembly's amendment upon the Council's amendments in clause 2.

Does not insist upon its amendments in clause 3, line 4, which propose the insertion of the word "and" after "that," and the omission of the words "and exercise."

But insists upon its other amendment in that clause, which proposes the insertion after the word "that," in line 9, of the words "no act done or word spoken written or published "shall be dealt with as a contempt or breach of privilege by either House unless done "spoken or published in the Chamber itself or within the precincts thereof and that"

(1.) Because the Council does not deem it expedient to vest in the Legislature any powers to deal with offences alleged to be in contempt or breach of the privileges of Parliament other than those committed in the Chambers of either House or within

the precincts thereof.

(2.) Because no necessity has been shown for the existence of any powers in excess of those which the Council has already sanctioned for securing the orderly and efficient conduct of public business.

(3.) Because the ordinary judicial tribunals of the country are open to any Member of either House of Parliament who may feel himself aggrieved by any act done or word spoken written or published to his injury by any person outside the precincts of Parliament.

Insists upon its amendments which omit clauses 6 and 7,-

(1.) Because the Council does not deem it fair to a person accused of any offence against the privileges of Parliament, and who is afterwards to stand his trial for such offence, to have his case publicly discussed in one of the Chambers of the Legislature, his guilt affirmed, and the Attorney General directed by Resolution to prosecute

such person.

(2.) Because the course prescribed would, in the judgment of the Council, seriously interfere with the discretion of the Attorney General, would be an invasion on the part of one Chamber of the Legislature of his constitutional functions, and would

tend to impair the usefulness and weaken the independence of that officer.

(3.) Because any such affirmation on the part of Parliament of the guilt of any person charged with any such offence would be calculated to bring the Parliament into collision with the Courts of Law, before which the guilt of such person would have to be established.

SMALL DEBTS ACT FURTHER EXTENSION BILL.

Consideration of Legislative Council's Message of 27th March, viz.:-

The Legislative Council having taken into consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message, dated 11th March, 1879, in reference to the Small Debts Act further Extension Bill,

(1.) Because the same necessity does not exist in the metropolis for the extension of the jurisdiction of unpaid Justices, inasmuch as stipendiary Magistrates are provided for the performance of the duties to be discharged under the Act.

In the event of any dispute between such person and any Crown lessee as to the position course or width of or any other matter connected with such road the matter in dispute shall be determined by "arbitration" Provided that any roads so marked shall not be alienated under the tenth section of the "Crown Lands Alienation Act of 1861" Provided that the Minister shall have power to close roads provided for in this clause upon giving three months notice to that effect in the Gazette. After the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful for any pastoral tenant or other person to cause any improvements to be made upon any Crown lands which have been temporarily reserved from sale by the Governor under the provisions of the fourth clause of the "Crown Lands Alienation Act of 1861" And if any such improvements shall hereafter be so made by any person upon any such Reserves the same shall be deemed to be the property of Her Majesty and liable to removal or sale by auction or other disposition at the discretion of the Minister and where such removal or sale or other disposition shall not appear to the Minister to be expedient the lands on which they are situated chall not be held to be lands containing improvements within the meaning of the thirteenth-section of the said Act or the second section of the "Lands Acts Amendment Act 1875." And whenever the temporary reservation of any such lands shall be revoked by the Governor and the Minister shall not within three months after such revocation deem it expedient to remove or sell or otherwise dispose of any such improvements the land upon which the improvements are situated may notwithstanding their existence be conditionally purchased or otherwise sold as if the same had not been in any manner "improved" And no increased price or value shall be put upon the same by the Minister for Lands by reason of any such alleged improvements excepting when offered for sale by auction And should an application be made to conditionally purchase such land so improved the applicant must state in his application that he is willing to purchase and pay for the improvements the amount fixed by appraisement and shall at the time of making the application pay a deposit of ten per cent. upon the supposed value of such improvements and shall pay the balance within three months of the notification in the Gazette of the amount fixed in such appraisement or forfeit his conditional purchase Provided also that no temporary reservation of any such lands shall be revoked until after survey by way of subdivision thereof. (Read.)

(5.) All family selections shall be subject to the same conditions of payment residence improvement measurement and forfeiture for breach of conditions as other conditional purchases And all areas purchased as family selections shall be incorporated and form one holding with any area originally purchased.

(6.) No trust by way of advancement or otherwise in favour of a child shall be

implied by or attach to a family selection.

(7.) No family selection shall be liable to forfeiture or shall be declared void by any Court or other authority by reason only of an error in stating the age of any child.

10. Any person who by virtue of any conditional or additional conditional purchased Crown land should be entitled to a pre-lease of Crown land may upon payment to the Land Agent of the district the rent as provided by the fifth sub-section of the twelfth section of the Crown Lands Occupation Act may take possession of such land as he shall be entitled to pre-lease And the surveyor who may be appointed to survey the conditionally purchased land by right of which the pre-lease is granted shall at the same time if requested by any person concerned and upon receipt of a fee equal to the amount paid by the Government for the survey of the conditionally purchased land survey and mark (in manner and form as is otherwise provided) such pre-leased land and within one week after such survey the pre-lessee shall at each corner thereof erect and maintain (until fenced) a post six inches square projecting at least three feet above the surface And unless the Minister for some sufficient reason objects to such pre-lease he may so hold and occupy such land for the term of five years Provided that if at the expiration of the said period of five years the pre-emptive lease land shall be enclosed with a fence sufficient to control cattle and sheep the holder thereof shall have the pre-emptive right to purchase such land upon the same conditions as to holding and payments as though it was an original conditional purchase.
