GOULBURN WATER SUPPLY CHARGES BILL.

Clause 2. From and after the passing of this Act it shall be lawful for the said Borough in Borough may respect of the period intervening between the first day of January, one thousand eight recover rates for hundred and eighty-eight, and the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight het January, hundred and ninety, to proceed for and recover all such rates and charges as are or were 1888, and slet made payable by any by-laws passed by the Council of the said Borough in relation to the water supply of the said Borough, such proceedings to be taken and prosecuted within twelve mouths from the passing of this Act in the manuer provided in sections sixty and twelve mouths from the passing of this Act in the manner provided in sections sixty and sixty-one in the "Country Towns Water and Sewerage Act of 1880," or otherwise as directed by the said Act, and the said Borough shall have power to recover the said rates and shall have all the rights and remedies given by the said Act to their full extent, not-withstanding any alleged irregularity or defect in the making of the said by-laws or in the mode provided for determining or assessing the said water rates, and notwithstanding any alleged non-compliance with the provisions of the said Act or of the "Municipalities Act of 1867" in any respect whatever. Provided that no person shall become liable under this Act for the payment of any such rates or charges as aforesaid in respect of the said period, if it shall appear that such person was not the owner or occupier of the lands or premises upon which the same became payable during the period in respect of which such rates and charges became due. Provided that all moneys recovered by the said Council under this Act shall be received on behalf of Her Majesty, and shall be paid, as soon as collected, by the said Council to the Colonial Treasurer towards the Consolidated Revenue, to be credited to the said Council as a part payment of the advances hitherto made in respect of the Goulburn Water Works. (Read.) .

LIQUOB TRAFFIC LOCAL OPTION BILL.

Clause 15. The Colonial Secretary shall forthwith, after the each such proclamation of each Maps of districts report of the Commissioners, cause to be deposited in the office of the Clerk of the Assembly to be deposited, powers of a properly authenticated map of every Electoral District named and described in such Commissioners, number of report Proclamation : Provided that in addition to such periodical distributions as herein Members, quota, prescribed, the Commissioners may, at any time in the fourth or fifth year after the taking <sup>&c.</sup> of any census, if the Electoral Roll then in force in any Electoral District shows an increase of, or reduction in, the prescribed quota, of not less than thirty three and a third twentyfive per centum, exercise for any part of New South Wales affected by such increase or reduction, including such Electoral District, the like powers, accompanied by the like duties.

dutics, as are conferred on them by this Act on the taking of every such census as aforesaid. Every such distribution shall be made on the following basis, and be subject to the provisions hereinafter expressed, that is to say,—

- (1) The total number of Members to be elected to serve in the Assembly shall be one hundred "and" "twenty-five." The quota of electors for the purposes of this Act shall be ascertained in the following manner:—For the purposes of the first distribution, the quota shall be ascertained by dividing by one hundred and twentyfive the total number of persons enrolled on the Electoral Rolls in force for the years 1892-1893, as-revised and-arranged-pursuant to the twenty-fourth cection of this Act which for the said purposes only shall be subjected to the like processes as are in the first subsection of the twenty-fourth section of this Act required for preparing the first Lists under this Act, except that for the purposes aforesaid it shall not be necessary to make out lists of the names of deceased or disqualified electors; and the quota for every subsequent distribution shall be ascertained by dividing by one hundred and twenty-five the total number of electors on the Rolls in force for the time being.
- (11) New South Wales shall be distributed into as many Electoral Districts, each to be represented by one Member only, as there are Members assigned to the Assembly by this Act, and every such district shall have such an area that, at the time of making such distribution, the number of persons enrolled therein shall, subject to. the margin of allowance hereinafter contained, reach the prescribed quota.
- (III) In making any such "distribution," due consideration shall be given to the then existing boundaries of Electoral Districts, to community or diversity of interest, lines of communication, and physical features.
- (IV) The Commissioners, in assigning any such Electoral District, shall be entitled to adopt a margin of allowance, to be used whenever necessary, by way of addition to, or deduction from, the number of persons enrolled in such district to the extent of "sip" hundred, whenever the apparent quota falls short of or exceeds the prescribed quota. Provided that such quota shall be in all cases adhered to as far as is practicable, having regard to the considerations aforesaid, and that a statement of the reasons for any proposed margin of allowance by way of addition or deduction exceeding two hundred shall be appended to the report, to be made in pursuance of section thirteen of this Act. SAME BILL. Clause 21. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Act, every male person, being a natural-born or New naturalised subject, who shall have resided, or had his principal place of abode, in New South Wales for a continuous period of six months immediately prior to the day on which he shall make application for an Elector's Right, or any claim for the purpose of giving effect to the franchise to which he is lawfully entitled, shall, if not disqualified or incapacitated under this or any other Act, be qualified as an Elector under this Act.

(1) Every person so qualified, being of the full age of twenty-one years, absolutely free, and not disqualified by this or any other Act, who shall reside in any Division of a District shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, be entitled to have an Elector's Right issued to him for such District, and to have his name inserted and rotained on a List and Roll for such Division.

(111) Although qualified as hereinbefore in this section provided, every person who, at the time of making out any List, or of the holding of any Election, for his District, is of unsound mind, "or in the receipt of aid from any charitable institution as an inmato thereof," or who, having has been convicted of any crime or offence wherever committed, for which, if the same had been committed in New South Wales, he might have been lawfully sentenced to death or penal servitude, and has not received a free or conditional pardon therefor, or served the sentence passed on him, shall be incapable of voting. - Clause 42. (1) Any person may object to the name of any other person being retained on any Objections to names on list. List if, before or on the prescribed day, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and thereafter before or on the twentieth day of September (where the name objected to appears on a General List) and before or on the twentieth day of February (where the name objected to appears on a Supplementary List) such person shall sign and deliver, or cause to be delivered to the Registrar for the Division and also to the person objected to, notice of such objection in the form of Schedule C hereto, stating therein the grounds of his objection; and shall also pay to such Registrar, on delivery of such notice, the oum of one shilling.
- (11) "Every such notice" of objection shall be lawfully given if the same be sent prepaid by post, addressed to the place of abode of the person to whom the same shall be directed, as described in such List; and when any person shall desire to send any such notice by post, he shall deliver or cause to be delivered the same, duly directed, open, and in duplicate, to the postmaster of any post office, within such hours as shall have been previously notified at such post office, and under such regulations with respect to the registration of such letters, and the fee to be paid therefor [which fee shall in no case exceed twopence over and above the ordinary rate of postage] as shall from time to time be made by the Postmaster-General in that behalf.
- (III) Every notice of objection given or sent to such Registrar shall, whether delivered or posted, be accompanied with the fee of one shilling, which shall be payable either in money or in stamps at the option of the objector.
- (111) In all cases in which such fee shall have been duly paid, the postmaster shall compare the said notice and duplicate, and, on being satisfied that they are alike in their address and their contents, shall seal or secure and forward one of them to its address by the post, and shall return the other to the person bringing the same, stamped with the stamp of the same and the person bringing he have been duly paid. said post office; and the production by the person who posted such notice of such stamped duplicate shall be evidence of the notice having been given to the person at the place mentioned in such duplicate on the day which such notice would in the ordinary course of post have been delivered.
- (IV) After the respective dates aforesaid, the Registrar shall make out in the prescribed manner, for each Division of his District, a List of the names of all persons objected to, according to the form in Schedule D hereto; and shall forthwith sign a copy of each such List, and transmit the same to the clerk of the Revision Court for the Division, and shall also forth-with publish such List twice at least, and, if time permits, four times in some newspaper or newspapers published or circulating in the Division, and cause the same to be posted outside each post office and court-house of the District; and shall keep the said List, or a copy thereof, for inspection by any person, without fee, at all reasonable hours of the day, and between the prescribed hours, until the day of the holding of the **Revision** Court. (v)

(v) The Registrar may object to the name of any person when entered upon the List to be made as herein provided, by entering at the time of making out such List, in the proper column against such name the words "objected to," with the cause of objection clearly stated, and appending his initials thereto; and shall insert the name and the particulars relating to the person so objected to in the List of objections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, and give notice to such person as required in other cases; and no costs shall be awarded by any Revision Court against any Registrar in respect of such objection in any case whatsoever. (*Read.*)

#### No. 2.

Method of Revision, powers of Court, costs, SAME BILL.

- Clause 46. (1) The Revision Court for each Division shall, pursuant to the provisions of this Act, revise the General or Supplementary List (as the case may be) which has been last made out by the Registrar of such Division and transmitted to the Revision Clerk; and the Registrar, or some person on his behalf, shall attend the Court, and shall produce all books and butts of Electors' Rights, notices of objection, and newspapers containing lists of the names of persons objected to, and all other books, lists, papers, and documents connected with his office in the custody of the Registrar or under his control, and shall support before the Court the objections of which he has given notice; and the Revision Clerk shall produce to the Court the Lists transmitted to him.
- (11) The Revision Court shall have power to hear, receive, and examine evidence, and, by summons under the hand of the Revision Clerk, to require all such persons as it thinks fit to appear personally before it, at a time and place to be named in such summons, and to produce to the Court all such books and papers in their possession or under their control as may appear necessary for the purpose of their examination; and any person so required who, without sufficient excuse, neglects or refuses to comply with such summons, or, having appeared before the said Court, refuses without such excuse-refusee-to be examined on oath or affirmation, or to take such oath or affirmation, or having taken such oath or affirmation to answer the questions put to him, may be dealt with in all respects as a person refusing or neglecting to appear or to give evidence before a Court of Petty Sessions.
- (111) If it appear to a Revision Court that any person has made or attempted to sustain any groundless, frivolous, or vexatious claim, objection, or title to have any name inserted or retained on any List, such Court may order the payment by such person not being a **Registrar** of any sum not exceeding "five" pounds as costs to be paid to any other person in resisting such claim, objection, or title. Any sum so ordered to be paid may, if not paid within the time specified in the order, be recovered before any Court of Summary Jurisdiction by the person named in the order as being ontitled thereto: Provided-that no costs shall be awarded against-any Registrar-in-respect of an objection made by him pursuant to this Act. (Read.)

#### MINING ON PRIVATE LANDS BILL :---

- Clause 27. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in any other Act provided, after the passing of this Act no royalties shall be charged on behalf of the Crown on any metals or minerals obtained from alienated lands, or lands in process of alienation other than those hereinafter set forth. All leases granted under the provisions of this Act shall be subject
  - (a) Gold-mining.—"In the case of lands where all minerals have been reserved to the Crown or where gold has been specifically so reserved" whenever any lease for gold-mining is granted, the Crown shall reserve a royalty of two one and a half per centum on the value of all gold obtained from such mine.
    - (b) Gold-mining.-In the case of lands where no minerals have been reserved to the Crown whenever any lease for gold-mining is granted, a tribute of two one and a half per centum on the value of all gold-obtained-from-such mine shall-be reserved to the owner if such owner be not the mining lessee, but under this subsection no-royalty will in any case be reserved to the Crown.
    - (c) Mining for minerals other than gold.—Whenever any mineral lease is granted of lands on which all minerals have been reserved, or of lands where some minerals only have been specifically reserved, the Crown shall reserve a royalty of two one and a half per centum on the value of the minerals obtained therefrom, and for which such lease shall have been granted. And except in the case of lands referred to in section six hereof, and in the case of mineral conditional purchases as hereinafter provided, no lease will be granted under this Act to work minerals other than gold which have not been reserved to the Crown.
    - In the ease of mineral conditional purchased land, if mining operations shall not have been prosecuted either on, under, or in connection-with-such land for a consecutive period of seven years, such land chall be open-to-lease-under-this Act-for minerals other than gold, and in respect of such minerals a tribute only shall be reserved to the owner of two and a half-per centum on the value of such-minerale, to be estimated in the manner <u>hereinbefore provided, and no royalty-on cuch-minerals shall-in-such-case be reserved-to</u> the-Crown.
    - (e) All rents shall commence from the date of the approval of the lease and shall be All relies shall commence from the date of the approval of the reaso and small be paid half-yearly in advance. All royalties or tributes accruing for the preceding six months shall be payable in the prescribed manner, up to the end of June and the end of December respectively: Provided that whenever the amount of royalty accruing to the Crown for any half year shall exceed the sum payable by the largest in the form of rout, the amount of wort so noid in advance may be lessee in the form of rent, the amount of rent so paid in advance may be deducted from the amount otherwise payable as royalty.
    - (f) In all cases when a tribute is received to the owner in any lease under this Act, it chall res<del>t with the owner to ascertain the amount thereof, and, to collect or recover the rame</del> at his-own-risk-and-exponse. Nevertheless-the provisions-with-respect to the accounts as--provided--in--sections twenty-four and twenty five shall, so far as-the same-are applicable, be held to apply equally in the case of tribute as in the case of royalty.
    - (g) It shall not be necessary for the owner or occupier, or for the applicant for a lease or the lessee or his employee to be the holder of a miner's right or mineral license to establish or maintain a title to a lease under this Act. (Read.)

Where a taxpayer, either alone, or with other persons, carries on, or is interested as a partner in, more than one trade, and makes a profit in one or more of such trades, and a loss in another or others, such taxpayer shall be entitled to deduct the sum of the losses from that of the profits. Where practicable such leases shall be granted in conformity with the existing divisions of such land, but in all other cases such leases shall be measured in the prescribed form. - (111) Where income arises or accrues to any person from land, whether improved or not, the taxable amount shall be the gross amount of such income.
- (iv) Income received by a tax payer, in respect of a share or interest in a company liable to income tax, shall be deducted from the taxable amount, but such income shall by specified by the taxpayer in returns made by him in the prescribed manner.
- (v) No tax shall be payable under subsection (1) of section seven in respect of income earned outside the Colony of New South Wales.
- (v1) The taxable amount of any income under subsection (11) of section seven shall be the net amount paid to or on behalf of the taxpayer less all payments by way of deduction or otherwise to the Civil Service Superannuation Account, or any other public account.
- (VII) In all other cases the taxable amount shall be the total amount of income arising or accruing to any person from all sources and liable to taxation under this Act.
- (VIII) Shillings and pence, and fractions thercof, shall not be included in the taxable amount. (Read.)

PARLIAMENTARY ELECTORATES AND ELECTIONS BILL.

Consideration of Legislative Council's amendments.

Clause 2. From and after the passing of this Act the sections of the "Electoral Act of 1880" numbered respectively six, seven, eight, and nine shall be repealed, and no proclamation under the last of such repealed sections shall hereafter be issued; but the unrepealed sections of the said Electoral Act and the "Wontworth Electorate Subdivision Act." shall, subject to the enactments hereinafter contained, remain in force and be applicable to all Electoral mentioned in the next following section, but no longer. After the said last-mentioned date all unrepealed sections of the "Electoral Act of 1880" and the "Went-worth Electorate Subdivision Act." shall be repealed, but without prejudicing or affecting the operation of, or any offence committed under, either of such Acts before such date: Provided that after the passing of this Act no person shall be entitled to vote at an Election for any Electoral District by virtue of any qualification described or indicated on the Electoral Act first mentioned; but this enactment shall not disqualify any person whose name is entered on any such Electoral Roll as aforesaid under or in respect of a qualification not purporting to be residential, if such person shall, on tendering his vote, tender to the Presiding Officer his statutory declaration (to be made and dealt with in the prescribed form and manner), to the effect that such person has during the six months last past had his usual place of residence in the District in respect of who having voted at such Electoran by virtue of the qualification made pursuant to the last preceding subsection of residence shall, at the same Election, vote or offer to vote a second time; for who in any declaration made pursuant to the last preceding subsection shall make any false statement, shall be guilty of a misdeamour and be liable to a fine not exceeding one in the outform, shall be repeated at such error at the prescribed form and manner), to the effect that such person has during the six months, and all votes given contrary to the re

AUSTRALASIAN RIGHTS PURCHASE BILL.

Clause 3. It shall be lawful for the projectors, and they are hereby authorised and empowered to take, divert, and appropriate water, as approved by the Minister from time to time, for any of the purposes set forth and mentioned in this Act, from the Colo River and the Grose River, by means of channels, returning to the stream again, the point of intake of the channel in respect of the Colo River, being about four and three quarter miles in a direct line above what is known as the First Rapid, and the end outlet of the channel being a point about a quarter of a mile below the said First Rapid and the point of intake of the channel in respect of the Grose River, being about one mile and a half in a direct line above the junction of the Grose River and Burralow Creek and the end outlet of the channel, being about half a mile below the junction of the Grose River and Burralow Creek, and from time to time to enter upon either of the rivers aforesaid, and upon the banks and beds thereof, and to construct and erect and maintain on and in any portion of the banks or beds of or near to or alongside of the said rivers or either of them between the points of intake and return as aforesaid, and at a distance of not more than one chain from the centre of the channel on either side, any waterworks and plant for the purposes of such taking, diversion, appropriation, and utilisation of the waters of the rivers aforesaid. Provided that the water so taken, diverted, appropriated, and utilised as aforesaid shall be in due course returned to the stream again unpolluted. (Read.)

### VINE DISEASES ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

Clause 3. In the construction and for the purposes of this Act, or any regulation or proclamation thereunder, the following words in inverted commas shall have the meaning hereinafter assigned to them respectively, that is to say :-

- "Central Board' and" "Board" shall respectively mean the Central Vine Diseases Board, or the Board of any vine district proclaimed under the provisions of this Act.
- "Disease" shall mean the disease in grape-vines caused by the insect called Phylloxera vastatrix, or any disease-which the Gevernor shall, from time to time, by proclamation in the Gazette, declare to be-a-disease within the meaning of this Act.
- "Diseased" shall mean affected, or liable, by reason of having been in contact, to be affected, with any the disease within the meaning of this Act.
- "District" shall mean any vine district proclaimed under the provisions of this Act.

"District Inspector" shall mean an inspector of vineyards appointed by any Board of a vine district.

"Minister" shall mean the Secretary for Mines and Agriculture. "Prescribed" shall mean prescribed by this Act, or by any regulation made thereunder. "Ratable Value"-The value of any vineyard as entered in the assessment roll of any district.
- "Vine" shall mean a grape-vine, alive or dead, or any vine cutting.
- "Vineyard " shall mean and include any parcel of land whereon one or more grape-vines may be planted, or growing, or be found.
- "Root" or "Rooted up" shall mean the removal of the whole of the original cutting, layer, or stock, with at least six inches of the roots attached. (Read.)

- (11) All dams, weirs, flood-gates, culverts, aqueducts, sluices, flumes, pipes, engines, pumping-machinery, reservoirs, and other works constructed or erected in pursuance of this Act. The lands so vested shall be held and administered by the Trust, subject to the provisions of this Act, and the approval of the Governor, but no part of the same shall be sold, except with the consent of the Trust and of the Governor. land described in the Schedule hereto annexed shall be sold.
- (111) The water which is at any time in any swamp or creek near or within the irrigation area, and in any pipe, reservoir, or other work constructed by the Trust in pursuance of this Act.

Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit or in any way interfere with the rights of the Crown to the general control of natural supplies of water, and the provisions of this Act shall be subject to the provisions of any general legislation to deal with water conservation throughout the Colony. (*Read.*)

- Provided further that the bank shall pay all such notes of its own issue in gold on presentation at its Head Office within the Colony after the expiration of the period limited by any original proclamation under this section, or by successive proclamations thereunder if more than one, and the Governor-in-Council may require adequate security for the performance of this condition.
- Provided also that no proclamation made under the authority of this section shall have force or effect beyond the time during which Part II of this Act continues and remains in force. (Read.)

The projectors are hereby empowered to construct, erect, maintain, and work any rower to con-water-works, and other works and plant that may be required for making and generating struct works. clectricity and transmitting it "to" the city of Sydney, and to any other towns or places along the main cable line. "And also to erect poles to carry wires across or along streets," and across Crown lands or private lands of any tenure above the surface, or to conduct wires beneath the surface of any such streets, or any such Crown lands or private lands, " and also across, along, under, or over any river, stream, or creek, or any bay, harbour, or inlet of the sea." And also to construct, erect, maintain, and work any water-works and other works and plant for the purpose of executing, exercising, or carrying out any of the powers, functions, duties, or authorities by this Act vested in or imposed on the said projectors. And also to make, generate, and transmit electricity for all or any of the purposes before mentioned. And also to enter upon any Crown lands or private lands of any tenure in the locality of any water-works or other works, or along the main cable line, or any branch thereof or therefrom for any purpose connected with the objects of this Act or any of them. Provided that the power to "distribute electricity" within any city, town, or place shall be subject to the written consent of the local authority. Provided further that the said projectors shall within three months after the passing of this Act commence and within three years after the passing hereof bring the said works into practical operation to the satisfaction of the Minister.

And the said Company shall within two months from the passing of this Act deposit with the Colonial Treasurer the sum of "five" thousand pounds, which sum shall be held by him as a Trust Fund, and in default of the payment of such deposit within the said period the rights and concessions provided for under this Act shall be forfeited. And in the event of the said works not being so commenced or completed as herein provided it shall be lawful for the Governor to order such sum to be forfeited to Her Majesty and to become part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund. But after the completion of the said works to the satisfaction of the Minister as aforesaid the said sum of five thousand pounds shall be returned to the said projectors. (*Read.*)

The Chairman having, under the Standing Order No. 20, intimated to the Honorable Member for Redfern, Mr. Schey, his opinion that the speech being delivered was of such unwarrantable length as to obstruct the transaction of public business, directed him to discontinue his speech.

And thereupon the Stipendiary or Police Magistrate "or any two Justices of the Peace" presiding on such occasion shall have power and authority to hear and to give and make such order upon such difference or dispute as in his or their discretion, equity, and right shall require, including the power of imposing any fine not exceeding the sum of *ten* pounds upon such master, or upon such apprentice as the case may be, as a penalty for any proved misconduct or breach of contract on his part towards the other. Such Magistrate or Justices may also discharge such apprentice, if he or they shall think proper, by certificate under his or their hand or hands, from the service of such master and may cancel the indenture of apprenticeship or any assignment thereof, which certificate shall be a complete bar to any action that may be brought on such indenture or assignment. And the Magistrate or Justices may award such costs of the proceeding in favour of or against either party thereto, as he or they may consider reasonable, as well as award the payment of any wages that may then be owing by the master to the apprentice. (Read.)

#### No. 3.

PARLIAMENTARY ELECTORATES AND ELECTIONS BILL :- Message from the Legislative Council,-MR. SPEAKER,-

The Legislative Council having had under consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message dated the 28th March, 1893, in reference to the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Bill,-Insists upon its amendment in clause 2,-

(1.) Because the existing state of the law should prevail with regard to elections until the Bill comes into force.

(2.) Because if an election takes place before the coming into force of this Act many electors would necessarily under this clause be disfranchised.

(3.) Because it would involve in all cases of a non-residential qualification the extreme inconvenience of producing a statutory declaration.

(4.) Because it might subject many innocent voters to the penalties of a misdemeanour; and, lastly,-because it is not desirable to place one measure of reform proposed in the Bill, and force it forward apart from all other reforms.

Insists upon its amendments in clause 20, line 41,-because a residence of one year at the least in the Colony of New South Wales and three months in the district is necessary to enable a voter to record an intelligent vote.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 20, line 42,-for a similar reason, and also for the convenience of preparing lists, and for the purposes of identification of the persons claiming an elector's right.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 20, line 43,-for similar reasons. Insists upon its amendment in clause 20, line 44,-for verbal accuracy.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 20, which inserts new subsection 3,-because, in view of the conditions of their service, and the duties they may be called upon to undertake during a time of political excitement, it is not desirable to extend the franchise to Naval or Military Forces, or the Police.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 20, line 4, of page 7,—because inmates of private charitable institutions are not a burden upon the State, inasmuch as they need not necessarily be paupers. Insists

Insists upon its amendment in clause 20, lines 4 and 5,—for the reason last given. Insists upon its amendments in clause 33, page 12, lines 2 to 10 inclusive, except new question 8,—as consequential upon the Council's amendments in clause 28.

Insists upon its amendment, which proposes the omission of clause 34,-because persons not qualified by residence cannot, from the nature of their occupation, he so identified with the true interests of this country as to be entitled to the exercise of the franchise.

Insists upon its amendment which proposes new question at the end of subsection 1, clause 36,—as consequential upon amendment in clause 20.

Insists upon its amendments in clause 55, and also in clause 56, lines 14 and 15,-for the

reasons hereinafter given for the rejection of provisions for voting outside district. Insists upon its amendment in clause 56, line 16,—because the necessity for a public holiday on "Polling Day," has not hitherto been shown to be necessary, and would entail general loss and inconvenience.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 67,-for the same reasons as are assigned for insisting upon the amendments in clauses 55 and 56.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 78 with regard to polling-place outside district,—for reasons hereinafter stated with regard to clause 94, and insists upon the retention of the words, or at any polling-place outside such district duly proclaimed under this Act," so as to make it conform with the provisions of clause 67.

Insists upon the omission of clause 93,-because subsection 2, of new clause, in lieu of clause 93, provides in a better way for carrying out the apparent intention of that clause.

Agrees to the omission of subsection 1, new clause, in lieu of clause 93, but insists upon the retention of subsection 2, with the following words inserted after the word "district," in line 2, viz.:—"at any polling-place duly proclaimed under section 70 of this Act,"—for the reasons already assigned for the omission of clause 93. Insists upon the omission of clause 94,—because of the inconvenience, expense, delay,

difficulties of identification, and complications that would necessarily follow the carrying out of the provision for voting outside districts pursuant to this clause. Insists upon its amendments in clause 144, lines 46 and 47,—as consequential upon the

rejection of the Police vote.

Insists upon the omission of clause 145,-because it has not been shown that electors have ever been prevented from recording their votes, and because there is no necessity for any such statutory interference between employer and employee.

Insists upon its amendment in clause 149,—because, while ample power is given to the Governor to correct errors, it is not desirable to confer the large validating powers contained in the concluding part of the clause.

Insists upon the omission of Schedule A and the insertion of new Schedule A in place

thereof,—as containing necessary questions to be put to an elector. Does not insist upon the Council's other amendments disagreed to by the Assembly, and agrees to the Assembly's amendments upon the Council's amendments in the said Bill.

The notification shall specify every name, whether real, fictitious, or assumed, and every address in respect of which the order is made; and the order shall upon notifica-tion thereof continuc in force until the Postmaster-General shall cancel it, which he is hereby empowered to do by notice in the *Gazette*; and if while such order is in force any letter addressed to any such person by any name, or to any address, so specified as aforesaid, be received at any post office, it shall not be delivered to the person to whom or at the address to which it is addressed but shall be accessed by the to the person of the address. to which it is addressed, but shall at once be sent to the person to whom of ab the address to which it is addressed, but shall at once be sent to the dead letter office in Sydney, and shall, if it were originally posted in New South Wales, be opened, and immediately returned to the sender, or if not originally posted in New South Wales, be returned unopened to the colony or country whence it originally came. While such order is in force no money order shall be issued in favour of any person with respect to whom the order has been made, and no money order shall be paid to any such person. But nothing in this section shall have any appplication to any association legalised by the Act thirteenth fourteenth Victoria, number fourteen thirteen. (Read).

### SUPREME COURT .- SATURDAY, JUNE 4.

In Banco.—(Before Mr. Justice WINDEYER and Mr. Justice INNES.)

TOOHEY V. MELVILLE

The Court delivered its reserved judgment on the above demurrer.

Mr. Justice WINDEVER said : This is an action brought by a Member of the Legislative Assembly against the Chairman of Committees of the Whole House, for assaulting and forcibly expelling and causing the plaintiff to be assaulted and expelled from the Legislative Chamber, and for preventing the plaintiff from re-entering it. To this declaration the defendant has pleaded the general issue and a plea of justification. This plea alleges that the defendant was the Chairman of Committees of the Whole House, and was presiding as such Chairman whilst the said Assembly was so sitting in Committee, and thereupon the plaintiff was guilty of disorderly conduct in the said Committee by wilfully and persistently interrupting and obstructing the proceedings and business of the said Committee, and by disregarding and disobeying the lawful directions and rulings of the defendant given to the plaintiff by the defendant, as and being such Chairman as aforesaid, and by persisting in standing when the defendant, as such Chairman, directed him to be seated, and by persisting in addressing the defendant and speaking in the said Committee when the defendant, as such Chairman, had ruled that he was out of order in so doing, and had requested him to desist therefrom; and the defendant says that by reason of the premises it then became and was necessary, in order to enable the said proceedings and business of the said Committee to continue and be conducted in a proper and orderly manner, and to preserve order and decency of debate in the said Committee, to cause the plaintiff to be removed from the said Chamber, and prevented from re-entering the said Chamber during the said sitting, wherefore the defendant, for the purposes aforesaid, and not otherwise, directed the Sergeant-at-Arms of the said Assembly to remove the plaintiff from the said Chamber, and prevent him from re-entering the same during the said sitting of the said Committee. This plea has been demurred to, on the ground that there was no right or power in the defendant as Chairman of Committees to cause the plaintiff to be removed from the Chamber without a previous resolution of the House to that effect. The question raised by this demurrer altogether differs from the questions raised in Keiley v. Carson, Fenton v. Hampton, Doyle v. Falconer, and Taylor v. Barton, inasmuch as in this case the removal of the plaintiff by the defendant, as Chairman of Committees, was a course taken, not in any way to punish the plaintiff for misconduct, but simply to maintain order, and to enable the deliberations of the Committee of the Whole House to be carried on. No such question, therefore, arises here as to the limited punitive powers of colonial Assemblies as arose in the cases referred to, and the question of the power of the defendant as Chairman of Committees to cause the removal of the plaintiff from the Chamber must be decided on the same principles as would determine the legality of similar action by the Chairman of Committees of the House of Commons, should there be no Standing Order of the House of Commons providing for the mode of dealing with such a case. It is admitted that there is no Standing Order of the Legislative Assembly prescribing any particular course to be taken by the Chairman of Committees on disorder arising, and that no Standing Order of the House of Commons applicable to the case has been adopted by the Legislative

Whole House by the Chairman of such Committee ; but disorder in a Committee can only be censured by the House on receiving a report thereof." It is somewhat remarkable that in the history of a nation whose people from time immemorial have enjoyed the right of free speech, and whose right of discussing matters in public meetings has been almost in daily exercise for conturies, that so few cases have been decided in our courts as to the powers of a chairman of any public body, the practical common sense of our race, apparently, having settled any such disputes as may have arisen without recourse to courts of law. It is admitted that the law is clear as laid down in Keiley v. Carson, Doyle v. Falconer, and Taylor v. Barton, admitted that the law is clear as laid down in Keney v. Carcon, Doyle v. Falconer, and Taylor v. Barton, that "there is an inherent power in every Legislative Assembly to protect itself against obstruction, inter-raption, or disturbance of its proceedings by the misconduct of its Members in the course of those proceedings"; and that all powers of that kind are incidental to and inherent in a Legislative Assembly, "which are necessary to the existence of such a body, and the proper exercise of the functions which it is intended to execute." "Whatever," say their Lordships, in the case of Taylor v. Barton, "is necessary for these purposes is impliedly granted whenever any such legislative body is established by competent authority." Protective and self-defensive powers being evidently necessary to enable a legislative body to authority." Protective and self-defensive powers being evidently necessary to enable a legislative body to transact its business, their Lordships, in Doyle r. Falconer, say, "If a Member of a colonial House of Assembly is guilty of disorderly conduct in the House while sitting he may be removed or excluded for a time, or even expelled. The right to remove for self-security is one thing, the right to inflict If the good sense and conduct of the Members of colonial Legislatures punishment is another. prove insufficient to secure order and decency of debate, the law would sanction the use of that degree of force which might be necessary to remove the person excluded from the place of meeting, and to keep him excluded." The inherent right, therefore, of the Assembly to remove a disorderly Member interrupting its excluded." proceedings being conceded, the only questions that remain are whether this right can be exercised by the Assembly when in Committee, and, if so, whether the Committee can exercise it through its Chairman. As to the right of the Committee to turn out a disorderly Member interrupting its proceedings, though the objection formally taken on the demurrer was that there must be a resolution of the House authorising the Chairman of Committees to act, it seemed to be virtually conceded by the plaintiff's counsel that the Committee could by resolution order the removal of the offending Member, and the argument before us was practically narrowed down to the question whether the Chairman should not have been armed by such a resolution before he acted. Certainly no reason was adduced why the Legislative Assembly, when in Committee, should not have the same power of self-preservation against the obstruction caused by intruders or disorderly members of its own body as it has when the Speaker is in the Chair. It is the same legislative body simply acting under a special mode of procedure and with a different President, and every reason in favour of the right of removing all persons obstructing its proceedings founded on the right of self-protection applies as forcibly to the House when in Committee as when the Speaker is in the Claur. In the absence of any Standing Order expressly empowering the Chairman to remove a disorderly Member obstructing the proceedings, and in the absence of any legal decision upon the point, we have to decide whether the power of ordering the removal of a disorderly Member is given by the Standing Order 176 before referred to, which authorises the Chairman of Committees to maintain order when the House is in Committee, or is a power inherent in him by virtue of his office as Chairman irrespective of any Standing Order. The contention on behalf of the defendant is that inasmuch as the removal of a disorderly Member on the order of the Chairman may at times be the only mode of maintaining order, the power to remove must be included amongst the powers given to the Chairman when he is authorised to maintain order. This contention is, we think, well-founded. It requires little consideration to show that, unless the Chairman is armed with this authority, the deliberations of the Committee may be completely obstructed, and that the Committee may be rendered unable to discharge its functions altogether. If, as contended, a resolution must be passed empowering the Chairman to order the removal of the offending Member, the same disorder which in the first instance prevented the business being carried on, and which necessitated the resolution, might still be continued, and the deliberations of the Committee when debating the resolution proposed might be completely obstructed. On the discussion of such a resolution, moreover, further disorder might arise, necessitating the moving of another resolution for the removal of another offending Member, and so on ad infinitum, thus making the discussion of the original resolution impossible. Every argument founded upon the inconvenience and impossibility of passing a resolution by the Committee authorising the removal of a disorderly Member applies with equal force to obtaining the authority of the House, which would have to be preceded by a resolution in Committee that the Chairman leave the Chair and report the matter to the House, the passing of which resolution might be obstructed with further disorder. It is absurd to suppose if a Member assaulted another and a violent contest took place that the fight should be allowed to continue till a resolution was passed ordering the removal of the offending Meinber. It would be equally absurd to require a resolution ordering the removal of a Member who insisted on beating a drum which drowned the voices of Members taking part in the proceedings, and which would alike prevent the moving of a resolution ordering his removal. These may be said to be extreme cases not likely to arise; but it is by extreme cases that we must test the validity of the argument that the Chairman has not the power peremptorily to order the removal of a Member interrupting the proceedings of the Committee. The necessity of the case order the removal of a Member interrupting the proceedings of the Committee. The necessity of this at once the basis of the power and the test of the legality of its exercise in any given instance. How the interruption is caused is of no consequence provided the necessity arises. The Chairman of Committees, in Committees of the Whole House, or the Speaker, if the House is sitting, is clothed with every power which is necessary to maintain order. The common right to remove an intruder or a Member obstructing the proceedings which is in the Whole Committee is both by virtue of the appointment of the Chairman and by the Standing Order delegated to the Chairman. Chosen by the House to guide its deliberations in Committee, and to maintain the order which is necessary for such deliberations, in all matters of order, he voices its opinion and gives practical expression to its will. All that the Committee would do if asked its opinion he does, on the assumption that he is expressing its will, and knowing that if he acts in opposition to the tacit will of the Committee, as a whole, its dissent will be quickly expressed. In this respect it appears to me that the Common Law powers of the Chairman of Committees are clearly as great as, and are certainly no less than, those possessed by the Chairman of any other lawful meeting of citizens. As Lord Denman (in the case of the Queen v. Doyle, 12 and E. 2, 157) observes with reference to the powers of a Chairman of a vestry meeting, "It is on him that it devolves both to preserve order in the meeting and to regulate the proceedings

. 3

proceedings, so as to give all persons a reasonable opportunity of voting. He is to do the acts necessary for these purposes on his own responsibility, and subject to the being called upon to answer for his conduct if he does anything improperly." The Chairman of Committees of the Legislative Assembly no less requires to be invested with this power than does a justice of the peace or the chairman of an ordinary public meeting. In the case of *ex parte* Cary, 3 Wil. and O. 304, speaking of the power of a justice of the peace to order the removal from the police court of a practitioner obstructing its proceedings by improper conduct, Sir Alfred Stephen says, in delivering the judgment of the Court, "We entertain no doubt that any person offending in the manner and to the extent supposed, and so that a repetition of such behaviour is reasonably apprehended, may also be forthwith removed from the room ; and, if so, he may be kept out of or prevented from entering it during the remainder of the proceedings. For such a power exists in the case of any ordinary meeting, where a person otherwise entitled to be present so obstructs the proceedings that they cannot, without immediate 'abatement' of the nuisance, be peaceably continued ; and it would be absurd to suppose that at least an equal power is not possessed by public functionaries in the discharge of their important duties. But to remove a turbulent or misbehaving person for the moment merely without the correlative necessary power of continuing his enforced absence for the required period of peaceful progress would be nugatory and idle." If it is said, as has been argued before us, that the possession of such a power by the Chairman of Committees is dangerous as enabling him to remove Members of opinion opposed to his own on a false pretext of their being disorderly, the answer is that the possibility of a power being dangerous if abused is no reason why such power should not be given if it is necessary for the proper transaction of any The love of justice and fair play, and the sense of moral obligation attaching to the public business. discharge of the duties of exalted station actuating those called upon to perform them, have hitherto prevented the degradation of high office by any such displays of arbitrary power. It is not too much to expect that they will suffice in the future as they have in the past. The same independent spirit of criticism and of resistance to any form of oppression which has always animated a free people will restrain any abuse of such power through mere indiscretion. In every case where such powers are exercised by a Speaker, by a Chairman of Committees, or by the chairman of a public meeting, presiding for the nonce, there is always an appeal to the opinion of the meeting, and it may be safely assumed that if the action of the chairman is not approved it will not be supported. For the purposes of the argument in this case, it must be assumed as stated in the plea that the removal of the plaintiff was necessary to enable the proceedings of the Committee to be carried on, and upon that assumption I am of opinion that the Chairman of Committees had power to order the removal of the plaintiff from the Chamber, and, as decided by the Privy Council in Taylor v. Barton, to keep him out for the remainder of the sitting; for, as Sir Alfred Stephen remarks in ex parte Corey, "to remove a turbulent or misbehaving person for the moment merely, without the correlative power of continuing his enforced absence for the required period of peaceful progress, would be nugatory and idle." For these reasons our judgment must be for the defendant. Mr. Justice Stephen authorises me to state that he concurs in this judgment.

Mr. Justice INNES said: I have not had an opportunity of seeing the judgment just read; but I understood that we were all of opinion that the demurrer must be over-ruled. At the conclusion of the argument I wrote down the following short statement of the view which I entertained, and, as I remain of the same way of thinking, it may be taken as the expression of my individual opinion. Concurring as I do with the rest of the Court, it is unnecessary to give a more elaborate judgment. I am of opinion that the plea is good. I see no reason for supposing that, when the House of Assembly is in Committee of the Whole, the Chairman of that Committee is not invested with the same power for the preservation and maintenance of order as a chairman of any public meeting is invested with for that purpose. Mr. Rogers I see no reason for supposing that, when the House of Assembly is in Committee of the has argued that the Chairman, before directing the removal of any person who is disorderly and absolutely preventing the business from proceeding, must in some way or other get what he terms "the sense of the whole meeting" as an authority for taking such action. I grant that, but I say that when a meeting places a chairman in the chair they clothe him with the requisite authority for maintaining that, the maintenance of which is absolutely necessary for the purposes—nay to the very existence—of the meeting. Standing Order 176 of the House of Commons of 1857, adopted by our Legislative Assembly, states: "Order is maintained in the House by Mr. Speaker, and in a Committee of the Whole by the Chairman of such Committee ; but disorder in a Committee can only be censured by the House on receiving a report thereof." Now, this to my mind, indicates in the clearest manner the difference between the "maintenance" or preservation of order, which is absolutely necessary to an immediate necessity for the conduct of business, and the "censure" or punishment of disorder, which is to be a subsequent proceeding, having as its main object the prevention of the recurrence of such disorder in the future. This is not a question of the expulsion of a Member from Parliament; it is not a question of the suspension of a Member; it is in no sense a question of punishment of a Member for any offence against Parliament ; it is a simple question of at once, there and then, turning a disorderly man out of an assemblage for the purpose of rendering it possible for that assemblage to proceed with the business immediately in hand. That there must be a power instantly to stop such disorder is manifest; and that that power is vested in the Chairman of a Committee of the Whole House, is, to my mind, equally manifest, from the necessity of the thing.

Judgment for defendant accordingly.

## INSTRUCTIONS TO THE GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE COLONY OF NEW SOUTH WALES. (DESPATCH FORWARDING.)

### Presented to Parliament by Command.

The Secretary of State for the Colonies to Governor, the Right Hon. the Earl of Jersey, G.C.M.G., &c., &c., &c.

(New South Wales, No. 53.)

My Lord,

My Lord, At the Colonial Conference of 1887 considerable discussion took place upon the question whether the Governor of a self-governing Colony should exercise the prerogative of pardon upon his own discretion and judgment, or whether he should be guided, as in other matters of local concern, by the opinion of his responsible advisers, but no conclusion was arrived at, as the delegates of the different Colonies were not unanimous in their views. No change has, therefore, been made up to the present time, and the existing Royal instructions to the Governor of New South Wales contain the following clause respecting the exercise of the prerogative of mercy in capital cases :---"The Governor shall not pardon or reprieve any such offender unless it shall appear to him expedient so to do upon receiving the advice of the said Executive Council thereon, but in all such cases he is to decide either to extend or to withhold a pardon or reprieve, according to his own deliberate judgment, whether the members of the Executive Council concur therein or otherwise, entering, nevertheless, on the minutes of the said Executive Council a minute of his reasons at length in case he should decide any such question in opposition to the judgment of the majority of the members thereof."

2. Since 1887 the question has received further consideration, and I have recently learnt that all the Australasian Colonies desire that, if Her Majesty so pleased, the instructions to their Governors should in this respect be modified, so that the Ministry of the day may become responsible for the carry-ing out or commutation of a capital sentence as they already are for all other matters connected with the administration of justice. I accordingly lost no time in taking the Queen's pleasure upon the subject, and Her Majesty has graciously signified her willingness to accede to the dosire of her Colonial subjects, and to command that fresh instructions should be prepared for the purpose. 3. I have now the honor to transmit to you fresh instructions under the Royal Sign Manual and

3. I have now the honor to transmit to you fresh instructions under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet containing a clause respecting the exercise of the prerogative of mercy, and adopting the language of the similar clause in the instructions issued to the Governor-General of Canada—language which will, I trust, be satisfactory to your Ministers, as it always has been to the Government of the Dominion.

4. As the clause makes no mention of a report from the Judge in a capital case, it will rest with your Ministers to consider what should be the practice in this respect; and, as they may be glad to be made acquainted with the course which is followed in the Dominion of Canada, I transmit to you a copy of the section in the Canadian Act which relates to this subject. (Sec. 8 of Chapter 181 of the Acts of 1886.)

5. I availed myself of this opportunity to advise Her Majesty that the instructions might, with advantage, be amended in certain other particulars, a course of which Her Majesty has approved; and the result is embodied in the instructions now transmitted. These instructions have, as you will observe, been throughout simplified in language, and shortened by the omission not only of clauses which are been throughout simplified in language, and shortened by the omission not only of clauses which 'are scarcely suited to the conditions of a colony under Responsible Government, but also by the omission of clauses relating to matters of detail in legislation, and to the keeping of records, which, although necessary to the proper conduct of Government, are not of sufficient importance to be retained in instructions passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet. Your Ministers, to whom you will be good enough to communicate this despatch, will doubtless do what is necessary to enable you to comply with the wishes of Her Majesty's Government in these respects. 6. The clause declaring the necessary quorum of the Executive Council is retained, so as to preclude any question being raised as to whether the Council is duly constituted at any meeting. The Council is created by the Letters Patent, and in the absence of any law on the subject, the Crown is the only authority which can determine the conditions essential for due exercise of its functions : and the most

only authority which can determine the conditions essential for due exercise of its functions ; and the most

convenient as well as the most formal method of determining such conditions is by a declaration contained in instructions issued by Her Majesty under an order of the Privy Council. You will recognise that it is essential to fix the number of the quorum; inasmuch as in the absence of an authoritative declaration that a smaller number is sufficient, it might be urged that no meeting of the Council would be duly constituted unless every member of it were present; and looking to the importance of its functions, it is most desirable that no room for doubt should exist.

7. For similar reasons the clause relating to the Presidency of the Council is also retained, as it will preclude all question as to the power of the Executive Council to proceed with the transaction of

business in the event of the Governor not being present. S. As I have before pointed out, certain clauses relating to matters of detail have been omitted, but it is expedient, as a matter of convenience to the Secretary of State in dealing with the laws sent home for consideration, as well as one of practical importance to the Colony affected by such laws, that each different matter should be dealt with in a count to law at the third relation to the secretary of the secretary o different matter should be dealt with in a separate law, so that things which have no proper relation to each other should not be intermixed in one and the same law, and that no clause be inserted in any law which is foreign to what the title of such law imports, and that no perpetual clause be part of any temporary law.

9. It is also desirable that all laws transmitted by you should be fairly abstracted in the margin, and be accompanied with a report by the Attorney-General, and in such cases as appear to you to require it with a total and in the margin. it with statements explanatory of the reasons for passing such laws.

10. You will continue to transmit for my information, and that of other Departments of the Public Service and for record in this office, a sufficient number of copies of the Journals and Minutes of the Proceedings of both Houses of the Legislature, and of such annual returns as have been ordinarily transmitted relative to the Revenue and Expenditure, Defence, Public Works, Legislation, Civil Establishment, Population, Schools, Imports and Exports, Agriculture, Manufactures, and other statistics of the state and condition of the Column I have, &c., KNUTSFORD. of the state and condition of the Colony.

### Section 8 of Canadian Act, Chapter 181, of 1886.

8. INSTRUCTIONS passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies :--

VICTORIA R.I

INSTRUCTIONS to our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over our Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, or to our Lieutenant-Governor or other Officer for the time being administering the Government of our said Colony and its Dependencies.—Given at our Court at Windsor, this ninth day of July, 1892, in the fifty-sixth year of our Reign.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent bearing date the twenty-ninth day of April, 1879, we did constitute, order, and declare that there should be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief (therein and hereinafter called the Governor) in and over our Colony of New South Wales and its dependencies (which said Colony and its Dependencies are therein and hereinafter called the Colony) : And whereas we did thereby authorise and command the Governor to do and execute all things that belong to his said office, according to the tenor of our said Letters Patent, and of such Commission as might be issued to him under our Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such instructions as might from time to time be given to him under our Sign Manual and Signet or by our Order in our Privy Council or by us through one of our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such laws as were then or should thereafter be in force in the Colony: And whereas we did issue certain instructions under our Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date the twenty pinth day of April 1870. And whereas we did issue certain instructions are our sign Manual and Signet, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of April, 1879: And whereas we are minded to give these further instructions to our said Governor: Now know you that we do hereby revoke the aforesaid instructions, and we do by these our Instructions under our Sign Manual and Signet direct and enjoin and declare our will and pleasure as follows :-

I. In these our instructions, unless inconsistent with the context, the term "the Governor" shall include every person for the time being administering the Government of the Colony.

II. The Governor may, whenever he thinks fit, require any person in the public service to take the Oath of Allegiance, together with such other oath or oaths as may from time to time be prescribed by any law in force in the Colony. The Governor is to administer such oaths or cause them to be administered by some Public Officer of the Colony. III. The Governor shall forthwith communicate these our instructions to the Executive Council, and likewise all such others from time to time as he shall find convenient for our sorvice to import to

and likewise all such others, from time to time, as he shall find convenient for our service to impart to them.

IV. The Governor shall attend and preside at the meetings of the Executive Council, unless prevented by some necessary or reasonable cause, and in his absence such member as may be appointed by him in that behalf, or in the absence of such member the senior member of the Executive Council actually present shall preside; the seniority of the members of the said Council, being regulated according to the order of their respective appointments as members thereof. ¥.

The Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, is hereby authorised, from time to Constitution of time, in our name by an instrument or instruments under the Great Seal of the Colony, to summon to Council the Logislative Council of the Colony and Executive Council.

The Governor, with the advice of the Instruments under the Great Seal of the Colony, to summon to Council. time, in our name by an instrument or instruments under the Great Seal of the Colony, to summon to Council. the Legislative Council of the Colony such person or persons as the Governor and Executive Council Imperial Act 18 shall think fit, in accordance with the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in <sup>& 19</sup> Vie., c. 54, the eighteenth and nineteenth years of our Reign, intituled an Act to enable Her Majesty to assent to a Local Act, No. 41 Bill, as amended, of the Legislature of New South Wales, "to confer a Constitution on New South ot 1853; Schedule Wales, and to grant a Civil List to Her Majesty." VIII. The Governor shall not, except in the cases hercunder mentioned, assent in our name to Bills not to be assented to.

1. Any Bill for the divorce of persons joined together in holy matrimony.

2. Any Bill whereby any grant of land or money, or other donation or gratuity, may be made to himself.

- Any Bill affecting the currency of the Colony.
   Any Bill imposing differential duties (other than as allowed by the Australian Colonies' Duties Act, 1873).
- 5. Any Bill, the provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon us by treaty
- 6. Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of our forces in the Colony by land or sea.
- 7. Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance, whereby our prerogative, or the rights and property of our subjects not residing in the Colony, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its Dependencies, may be projudiced. 8. Any Bill containing provisions to which our assent has been once refused, or which have been

disallowed by us;

Unless he shall have previously obtained our instructions upon such Bill through one of our Principal Secretaries of State, or unless such Bill shall contain a clause suspending the operation of such Bill until the signification in the Colony of our pleasure thereupon, or unless the Governor shall have satisfied himself that an urgent necessity exists requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation, in which Powers in urgent cases. case he is authorised to assent in our name to such Bill, unless the same shall be repugnant to the law of England, or inconsistent with any obligations imposed upon us by treaty. But he is to transmit to us by the earliest opportunity the Bill so assented to, together with his reasons for assenting thereto.

IX. The Governor shall not pardon or reprieve any offender without first receiving in capital cases Regulation of the advice of the Executive Council, and in other cases the advice of one, at least, of his Ministers; and in any case in which such pardon or reprieve might directly affect the interests of our Empire, or of any country or place beyond the jurisdiction of the Government of the Colony, the Governor shall, before deciding as to either pardon or reprieve, take those interests specially into his own personal consideration in conjunction with such advice as aforesaid.

X. All Commissions granted by the Governor to any persons to be Judges, Justices of the Peace, Judges, &c., to be appointed during pleasure only.

or other officers, shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted during pleasure only. XI. The Governor shall not quit the Colony without having first obtained leave from us for so Governors doing under our Sign Manual and Signet, or through one of our Principal Secretaries of State, except for absence. the purpose of visiting the Governor of any neighbouring Colony for periods not exceeding one month at Temporary leave any one time, nor exceeding in the aggregate one month for every year's service in the Colony

XII.
