Every postmaster or other officer of the Post Office shall transmit to the General Post Office without delay every letter packet or newspaper without any postage stamp thereon or with postage stamps which have been previously obliterated or defaced (unless the postage thereon shall have been prepaid in coin) and every town or country letter with postage stamps thereon of less value than the proper postage as a town letter not exceeding one half-ounce in weight and every town or country packet with postage stamps thereon of less value than its proper postage as a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight and also every letter packet or newspaper posted or containing any enclosure or reasonably suspected to be posted or to contain any enclosure in fraud or violation of this Act or of any Act relating to the Customs or of any regulation or order made under the authority of this Act or with intent to evade payment of the postage properly chargeable on such letter packet or newspaper or which the person to whom it is addressed shall refuse to receive or which bears "a profane" obscene or libellous address or signature or which (in case any postage upon the same respectively shall be payable) the person to whom it is addressed shall refuse to pay for. 2. Insists on so much of its Amendment in the Preamble as omits the words "the Presbyterian College," for the reasons offered above.

3. Disagrees to the Assembly's Amendment in its Amendment in the Preamble, which omits from the words inserted the words "Saint Andrew's College," for the reasons offered above.

4. Insists on its Amendment in page 2, clause 1, line 6, for the reasons offered above.

5. Insists on its Amendment in page 2, clause 4, line 29, for the reasons offered above.

6. Insists on its Amendments in page 2, clause 5, lines 37, 38, and 39,—Because these Amendments carry out the franchise proposed in the Draft Bill agreed to by the said General Assembly, and because the higher franchise will encourage more liberal contributions, and place the election of the first Councillors in the hands of those likely to exercise it with advantage to the proposed institution.

The election of candidates to the office of Alderman under this Act shall be conducted in manner following Any four two electors entitled to vote in any Municipality or in any ward of any Municipality may nominate a candidate for election or any number of candidates not greater than the number of Aldermen to be elected by delivering to the Returning Officer for the time being seven days at least before the day appointed by the Governor or fixed by this Act as aforesaid for the first election and all subsequent elections and hereinafter designated the "day of nomination" a document signed by such electors containing the name or names in full of the candidate or candidates they may wish to propose setting forth also the occupation and residence of such candidate or candidates and also similar particulars respecting the four two electors so "nominating" such document to be accompanied by a written statement by each candidate signifying his willingness to serve if elected "and" the Returning Officer for the time being shall give not less than fourteen days notice of the day of nomination by advertisement in some newspaper circulating in or near such Municipality and on the day appointed for the nomination and at the place appointed the Returning Officer shall at twelve o'clock at noon publicly read the names of the candidates so proposed together with the names of their nominators and in the event of there being no greater number of candidates than the number of Aldermen to be elected the Returning Officer shall then and there declare the said persons to be duly elected but in the event of there being more candidates than the number of Aldermen to be elected the Returning Officer shall advertise in some newspaper circulating as aforesaid the names of the candidates the day of poll and the polling places Provided that it shall be in the power of any individual so nominated as a candidate by a notice in writing signed by him and addressed to the Returning Officer and delivered to such Returning Officer at any time before the day of nomination to withdraw from such candidature. (Read.)

On or before the thirty-first of January and the thirty-first of July in every year the Council of every Municipality shall cause to be prepared and transmitted to the Colonial Treasurer a detailed account of all sums of money actually raised therein by rates and all subscriptions paid up for corporate purposes during the last past half of the late year or of the current year or the fraction of a year as herein provided for such account to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Treasurer-of the Municipality And upon receipt of such account it shall be lawful for the Governor by warrant under his hand addressed to the Colonial Treasurer to direct him to pay from the Consolidated Revenue to the Treasurer of the Municipality by way of endowment for corporate purposes according to the provisions of this Act any sums of money equal to but not exceeding the following proportions that is to say—in each of the first five years after the incorporation of such Municipality a sum equal to but not exceeding the whole amount actually raised by rates or assessments and subscriptions so paid up as aforesaid for the general purposes in the 169th clause mentioned in the year last past—in each "of the next" succeeding five years a sum equal to but not exceeding one-fourth part of the amount so paid up in the year last past—and in each of the next succeeding five years a sum equal to but not exceeding one-fourth part of the amount so paid up in the year last past—"and thenceforth all contribution from public funds by way of endowment shall absolutely cease" And all such sums from the Consolidated Revenue shall be payable half-yearly and the Colonial Treasurer shall from time to time be allowed credit for any sum or sums of money paid by him in pursuance of any such warrant or order in writing as aforesaid and the receipt of the Treasurer of the Municipality or other proper officer acting as such Treasurer under his hand countersigned by the Mayor shall be a sufficient discharge for the Colonial Treasurer. Every person of the full age of twenty-one years who on the seventh day of January in any year shall be the occupier or owner-of any rateable property within any Municipality and liable to be rated for the come ac such owner or occupier chall be entitled to be enrolled in that year according to the provisions heroinafter contained upon the municipal rell of the Municipal pality and being so enrolled chall be an elector-thereof and shall be entitled to vete in all elections of Aldermen Auditors and Assessors for the Municipality eccurring while such municipal rell-chall be in-force lessee or owner of any rateable property within any Municipality and liable to be rated for the same as such occupier lessee or owner shall be entitled to be enrolled according to the provisions hereinafter contained upon the municipal roll of the Municipality for the ensuing municipal year and being so enrolled shall be an elector thereof and shall be entitled to vote in all elections of Aldermen and Auditors for the Municipality occurring whilst such municipal roll shall be in force "in the manner following":—

(1.) If the owner or occupier of any property assessed at an annual value vote in all elections of Aldermen-Auditors and Assessors for the Municipality

(1.) If the owner or occupier of any property assessed at an annual value under fifty pounds he shall be entitled to record one vote.

(2.) If the owner or occupier of any property assessed at an annual value over fifty and under one hundred and fifty pounds he shall be entitled to record two votes.

(3.) If the owner or occupier of any property assessed at an annual value over one hundred and fifty and under three hundred pounds he shall be

entitled to record three votes

(4.) If the owner or occupier of any property assessed at an annual value over three hundred pounds he shall be entitled to record four votes. Provided that no person shall be enrolled in any year in respect of any rateable property unless he shall before or on the seventh day of January aforesaid have paid all such rates as shall under the provisions hereof have become payable by him in respect of such property and no person who shall at the time of claiming to vote be in arrears in respect of any payment of assessed rates due and payable to the Council of any Municipality shall be entitled to vote at any election in such Municipality And provided also that where any rateable property is jointly occupied or jointly owned by more persons than one only one of such joint occupiers or joint owners shall be an elector as aforesaid unless the assessed annual value of such rateable property so jointly occupied as aforesaid shall exceed fifty pounds in which case a second joint occupier or joint owner shall be admissible as an elector and if the assessed annual value of such rateable property shall exceed one hundred and fifty pounds then a third joint occupier or joint owner if there be one shall be admissible as an elector and if the assessed annual value exceed three hundred pounds then a fourth joint occupier or owner if there be one shall be admissible as an elector. And the person or persons so admissible as aforesaid in cases of joint occupancy or joint ownership shall be the person or persons first-named in the rate-book. (Read.)

#### (Same Bill.)

Clause 52. Every person of the full age of twenty-one years who on the seventh day of January in any year shall be the occupier lessee or owner of any rateable property within any Municipality and liable to be rated for the same as such occupier lessee or owner shall be entitled to be enrolled according to the provisions hereinafter contained upon the municipal roll of the Municipality for the ensuing municipal year and being so enrolled shall be an elector thereof and shall be entitled subject as hereinafter mentioned to vote in all elections of Aldermen and Auditors for the Municipality occurring whilst such municipal roll shall be in force in the manner following:

> (1.) If the occupier lessee or owner of any one property assessed at an annual value not exceeding twenty-five pounds he shall be entitled to one vote

> (2.) If the occupier lessee or owner of any one property assessed at an annual value over twenty-five and not exceeding seventy-five

> pounds he shall be entitled to two votes
>
> (3.) If the occupier lessee or owner of any one property assessed at an annual value over seventy-five and not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds he shall be entitled to three votes

> (4.) If the occupier lessee or owner of any one property assessed at an annual value over one hundred and fifty pounds he shall be entitled to four votes

Provided that only the person who pays the rates for such rateable property shall be entitled to vote in respect thereof and no person who shall at the time of claiming to vote be in arrear on account of any such rates shall be entitled to vote in respect of the property rated at any election in such Municipality And provided also that no person shall be allowed to vote without first making and subscribing a Declaration in the form contained in Schedule C hereto And provided further that where any rateable property is jointly occupied jointly leased or jointly owned by more persons than one only one of such joint acquiries jointly are of such joint acquiries in the same and the property is jointly occupied jointly leased or jointly owned by more persons than one only one of such joint acquiries jointly acquires in the same and the property is jointly occupied jointly leased or jointly owned by more persons than one only one of such joint acquiries in the same and the property is jointly occupied. than one only one of such joint occupiers joint lessees or joint owners shall be an elector as aforesaid unless the assessed annual value of such rateable property so jointly occupied leased or owned as aforesaid shall exceed twenty-five pounds in which case a second joint occupier joint lessee or joint owner shall be admissible as an elector and if the assessed annual value of such rateable property shall exceed seventy-five pounds then a third joint occupier joint lessee or joint owner if there be one shall be admissible as an elector and if the assessed annual value exceed one hundred and fifty pounds then a fourth joint occupier joint lessee or owner if there be one shall be admissible as an elector And the person or persons so admissible as aforesaid in cases of joint occupancy joint lesseeship or joint ownership shall be the person or persons first named in the rate book and shall not in any case be entitled to a cumulative vote and the giving of any joint vote by such person or persons shall render any other person claiming to vote in respect to the same rateable property incapable of giving a cumulative vote in that election.

162. 166. The Council of each Municipality shall annually within three months after the election of the Mayor thereof make or cause to be made an estimate of the probable amount which will be required for the then current year in addition to any tolls rates or dues levied or authorized to be levied within the Municipality and to any probable income from fines voluntary contributions endowments or any other source of revenue to carry on the fencing making and repairing of any roads bridges punts wharves piers or other public works in the said Municipality and any other expenses necessary in carrying into effect the provisions of this Act and shall raise the amount so estimated by an assessment and rate upon all rateable property within such Municipality assessing the same at ninc-tenths of the fair average annual rental of all buildings and cultivated lands or lands which are or have been let for pastoral mining or other purposes whether such buildings or lands shall be then occupied or not and at the rate of five pounds per centum upon the capital value of the fce simple of all unimproved lands such average rental and capital value of all such rateable property to be estimated by valuers as is hereinafter provided

And notice of such assessment and rate shall be served if the property be occupied upon the occupier by a notice addressed to such occupier and left at or sent through the post to the premises and if unoccupied by a notice addressed to the lessee or owner of such property and left at or sent through the post to his last known residence or place of business in the Colony And as to any rateable property which is unoccupied and the owner of which is not known to the Council notice of such assessment and rate upon such last-mentioned property shall be advertised twice at least in two successive weeks in some newspaper circulating in the Municipality Provided that no such rate shall exceed one shilling in the pound on the assessed value of all such rateable property calculated and determined as hereinbefore directed. And the rate so imposed as aforesaid shall be payable by the occupier of the property for which such rate is payable if occupied and if unoccupied then by the lessee or owner Provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent any private arrangement between landlords and tenants as between themselves with respect to their patrices liability to rathe respectively. Provided further that in any paties ultimate liability to rates respectively Provided further that in any notice by advertisement as herein required of the assessment and rate upon property of which the owner is unknown to the Council it shall not be necessary to describe such property by metes and bounds but only to state in general terms so that the same may be intelligible its situation and estimated area and the name or names of the original grantee or grantees And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the Council from collecting their rates by half-yearly instalments if they shall think fit And also further provided that in Municipalities consisting of two or more wards it shall not be lawful to expend in any ward in improvements the funds raised in another ward without the consent of the Councillors for the ward in which such funds may have been raised.

#### MESSENGERS AND SERVANTS OF PARLIAMENT-MACE.

CONFERENCE BETWEEN THE STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEES.

### REPORT.

The Standing Orders Committee of the Legislative Assembly have the honor to report to your Honorable House that your Committee having, on Thursday, 8th August, 1867, in a Conference sought by the Standing Orders Committee of the Legislative Council, considered, conjointly with the latter, certain proposals with reference to the appointment and control of the Parliamentary Messengers and Servants, and other matters of mutual concernment,—the said Committees have agreed, conjointly, to the following Resolutions, viz.:—

- (1.) That the Messengers and other Servants of each House of Parliament be appointed and dismissed by the President and Speaker respectively. That the Housekeeper, and other Servants of the Joint Establishment of both Houses, be appointed and dismissed by the President and Speaker, or, in case of a Dissolution, by the President alone; but that, while Parliament is in Session, the Servants connected with the Refreshment Rooms be subject to control and dismissal by the joint Refreshment Committee.
- (2.) That the Messengers and other Servants of both Houses of Parliament be required to wear a uniform dress, and that the President, the Speaker, Mr. E. Deas Thomson, Mr. Josephson, Mr. Allen, and Mr. Isaacs, be appointed a Sub-committee to consider and report what that dress should be.
  - (3.) That a Mace be provided for each House of Parliament.

#### MINUTE OF THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

WITH reference to the appointment of a gentleman to the office of Parliamentary Librarian, and the recommendation of Mr. R. C. Walker for this office, by the Honorable the President of the Legislative Council and the Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative

President of the Legislative Council and the Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, it appears to the Government that certain special qualifications, which are rarely acquired apart from the peculiar taste that leads to their acquisition, are almost indispensable in the person to be appointed.

No objection to Mr. Walker on any personal ground is raised; but it is submitted that the convenience to Hon. Members and the general advantage to the Library would be great, if a gentleman of some literary ability, and especially with a bibliographical knowledge of authors and the various editions of their works, could be secured for this office. The Colonial Secretary is of opinion (speaking rather as a Member of Parliament than as a Minister) that complaints may be justly made of the manner in which which

which the Library is managed. There is a want of methodical arrangement of the books, and the attendance has certainly been irregular and unsatisfactory. Nor have the new books added from time to time been of a character, even in politics and history, to keep the Library up to the level of contemporaneous literature.

The Colonial Secretary is anxious to recommend for this appointment a gentleman who has received the entire approval of the President and Speaker, but he hopes the suggestions which he now offers will receive their consideration.

#### MINUTE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

WITH reference to the minute of the Honorable the Colonial Secretary, dated the 8th instant, respecting the appointment of Parliamentary Librarian and the management of the Parliamentary Library, the President of the Legislative Council concurs generally with Mr. Parkes in the opinions he has expressed.

It is very desirable that the Librarian should possess high literary attainments, and be conversant with books. These are qualifications, however, which it takes years to acquire; the tastes which lead to them are not very common, and they are not unfrequently associated with personal peculiarities in character, manner, or temper, specially

calculated to mar their usefulness in the Librarian of a legislative body, who should be equally easy of access to Members of all shades of political opinion.

The President and the Speaker considered carefully and impartially the several applications which had been made to them. They felt that it was their duty to regard not only the mental fitness of the candidates for the office, but also to weigh well how far they were likely to make themselves acceptable to the Members of both Houses and of all parties. They were fully cognizant of the high claims of several of the gentlemen who applied, and long hesitated between five in particular, out of whom they ultimately selected Mr. Robert Cooper Walker, mainly because they believe that in him this latter condition would be amply fulfilled.

No one can be more desirous than the President of the Legislative Council is of having the Parliamentary Library placed under the management of a gentleman of extensive literary acquirements and knowledge; and he will be glad if these qualities can be found united with those others which are indispensable in an officer who must be, to some

extent, more or less, in daily communication with the Members.

Among the applications which Mr. Parkes has enclosed, are some which the President and the Speaker had not previously before them; and it may be better for the Public Service that this question should be reopened. The President agrees to this course the more readily, inasmuch as the Government is willing to provide otherwise for Mr. Walker, who having had his expectations in this matter raised to the fullest extent, is entitled to great consideration in its ultimate decision.

The President agrees with the Honorable the Colonial Secretary, that complaints may be justly made of the present state of the Parliamentary Library in several respects; and he thinks it advisable that alterations should be made in the mode of its management.

#### MINUTE OF THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

The Colonial Secretary has read with much attention the minute of the Honorable the President of the Legislative Council, dated the 29th instant, and he has carefully considered all the facts of the case now before him.

The Colonial Secretary has also seen Mr. Walker, and made various inquiries of that gentleman as to his special fitness for the office of Parliamentary Librarian, the answers to which do not lead to the conclusion that Mr. Walker's previous studies and habits of thought fit him for the proper discharge of the duties belonging to the office. The Colonial Secretary is, however, quite satisfied of Mr. Walker's personal respectability and general intelligence, and it may be that, by energy and perseverance, he might make himself familiar with a Librarian's duties.

On the whole, if the Honorable the President and the Honorable the Speaker still desire to press their recommendation of Mr. Walker, the Colonial Secretary will advise his appointment to the vacant office.

#### MINUTE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

THE President of the Legislative Council having carefully considered the general bearing of the Honorable the Colonial Secretary's minutes of the 8th and 29th ultimo, upon the proposed appointment of Mr. R. The President has no personal knowledge of Mr. Walker, beyond that which a very short interview afforded him. The impression made by that interview was favourable; but Mr. Walker acknowledged that his literary attainments were small, and that he had no knowledge of books.

The President, however, based his recommendation mainly on strong representations which had been made to him in Mr. Walker's favour.

THE SPEAKER OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY to THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

Wednesday, 4 December, 1867.

SIR,

I yesterday received from the President of the Legislative Council your minutes of 29th November, and a copy of his minute dated 2nd instant in reply, which was sent without any consultation with me, and before I was even made aware that your minute had been received. On the 29th November, I received from the President a copy of a minute undated, prepared by him (in reply to yours of 8th of November last), in which I was unable to concur, in consequence of the President's proposal to reopen the question of our joint recommendation for the vacant office of Librarian; so it was agreed that separate replies should be sent, and mine would have been prepared in time for transmission along with the President's, but I was unable, until yesterday, to obtain

the necessary papers.

In regard to the joint recommendation by the President and myself, of Mr. R. C. Walker, communicated to the Colonial Secretary, in our letter of the 25th October, I concur generally in the statement of the President, of the careful and impartial manner in which the several applications were considered, and of the grounds on which Mr. Walker was ultimately selected. We took into consideration these circumstances in favour of his candidature, which were known to both of us:-He is a gentleman of unblemished character, of quiet and unobtrusive demeanour, of good address, and of a conciliatory disposition. He is the son of a gentleman of no mean literary attainments, by whom his education was conducted, and it is difficult to believe that such association could be altogether unproductive of the tastes congenial to the office of Librarian. The selection of Mr. Walker was made not only on account of his possession of certain qualities essential to the satisfactory performance of the duties of such an office, but also because of his freedom from those grounds of objection which even in the case of a candidate of greater literary merit might amount to disqualification.

In short, he was selected because it was believed his appointment would be obnoxious to no single Member with whom his duties would bring him in contact.

In reference to the proposal of the President "to review the whole list of candidates and their respective qualifications," I can see nothing to justify or even recommend such a course; which certainly seems inconsistent with the first part of the President's first minute. In fact, the matter has been reconsidered between the President and myself, without any conclusion being arrived at which should weaken the effect of the recommendation contained in our joint letter of 25th October last.

With reference to the minutes I had the honor of addressing to you, on the 29th of November and 2nd of December last, in reply to yours of the 8th and 29th of the former month, relative to the appointment of Parliamentary Librarian, I have now to recommend Mr. George Bernard Barton as a gentleman well, and in some respects specially well, qualified for that office. The only objection I know to Mr. Barton is that he is rather deaf.

I regret to differ in this matter from the Honorable the Speaker, with whom I have recently been in communication on the subject. He still adheres to his opinion in favour of Mr. Robert Cooper Walker.

In the event of the Government's declining to decide between these two candidates, I would recommend Mr. Milbourne Marsh, at present, and for some years past, Police Magistrate at Wellington. Several Members of both Houses have warmly interested themselves in Mr. Marsh's favour. He is personally well known to me, and would, I have no doubt, discharge the duties of the office with efficiency. Possibly, in the event contemplated, the Honorable the Speaker might concur in this recommendation.
