"Whereas the Parliament of New South Wales now stands prorogued until "Tuesday, the sixteenth day of August, 1932; and whereas by an Act passed "in the second year of the Reign of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, "being 'An Act to consolidate the Acts relating to the Constitution,' it is "amongst other things enacted that the Governor may fix the time and place of "holding of every session of the Legislative Council and Assembly: Now, "therefore, I, Sir Philip Woolcott Game, Governor, do hereby announce and "proclaim that the said Legislative Council and Assembly shall assemble for "the despatch of business on the sixth day of September next, at 12 o'clock, at "noon, in the buildings known as the Legislative Council Chambers, situate in "Macquaric-street, in the City of Sydney: And, the Members of the Legislative "Council and Legislative Assembly, respectively, are hereby required to give "their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

"Given under my Hand and Seal at Sydney, this twelfth day of August, "in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, "and in the twenty-third year of His Majesty's Reign.

Honorable Members of the Legislative Council, and Members of the Legislative Assembly,—

- 1. It is with pleasure that I call you together for the discharge of your important duties in the Second Session of the present Parliament.
- 2. Though the economic conditions throughout the State are still unsettled, the last few months have witnessed an upward trend and indications to be observed of improved economic and financial conditions in the near future are encouraging. This is due in large measure to the restoration of confidence in the community. The spread of unemployment has been stemmed, and it is confidently hoped, as the result of relief measures introduced and contemplated by my Ministers, that the number of workless will be substantially decreased. Already many public works of a reproductive character have been commenced. In addition, a sum of £600,000 has been allocated on easy terms and at a low rate of interest to assist primary producers to effect permanent improvements on their properties. Gratifying results have followed the appeal made by my Ministers to private employers and the community in general to provide more employment. Already many hundreds of men and women have been absorbed in useful work, and progressively improving results are expected as a consequence of Government financial assistance in certain cases and the general return of public confidence.
- 3. My Ministers have given close and searching attention to the public finances of the State, and estimates of revenue and expenditure have been prepared which follow the decisions of the Premiers' Conference as to the basis on which the economic recovery of Australia must be sought.
- 4. My Ministers note with gratification the tendency to improvement of commodity prices overseas. They have watched with intense interest the deliberations of the Imperial Conference at Ottawa, and they look to the closer co-operation achieved to give an appreciable impetus to Australia's export trade to the Motherland and to the Dominions. They are also hopeful of the amelioration of the position as a result of the forthcoming world economic conference, and of a substantial reduction in interest rates, both local and overseas.
- 5. My advisers will amend the Rural Bank Act in the direction of protecting the Bank's assets and will seek to safeguard the interest of its debtors, and to extend its activities.
- 6. To lighten the burden of the primary producers of the State, my Ministers will endeavour to provide the most economical and efficient transport possible. As a first instalment they have already reduced railway freights in certain directions. In addition, as a further measure of relief, my Ministers will submit for your consideration a Bill for the consolidation of the liabilities of necessitous farmers, over a period pending recovery, and for the setting up of machinery for the adjustment of farmers' excess liabilities.

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HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,-

7. Among the earliest measures to be submitted for your consideration will be one to reform the constitution of the Legislative Council.

HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

- 8. The legislative programme to be submitted to you will not be an extensive one. It will be confined mainly to urgent measures designed to give the relief which the present economic conditions demand, particularly in the direction of stimulating re-employment.
- 9. In addition to the proposals already mentioned one of the most important to be submitted for your consideration will be an amendment of the Arbitration Act to empower the Industrial Commission to fix the standard working week in various industries, and to provide for conciliation between employer and employee, to provide an improved method of dealing with apprenticeship, and to improve the Act in other directions.
- 10. Legislation will be submitted to extend and in certain directions to amend the provisions of the Moratorium Act and to give relief to Crown debtors.
- 11. A Bill will be introduced to amend the Acts in regard to the relationship between landlord and tenant and the occupation of tenanted properties with a view to removing anomalies.
- 12. My Ministers have found from experience the urgent necessity for an amendment of the Transport Act, and legislation to give effect to their policy will be introduced.
- 13. A Bill will be introduced to enable Municipal and Shire Councils to acquire or provide land for small holdings and to sell or lease the holdings for agricultural purposes.
- 14. Legislation will be introduced to amend the provisions of the Crown Lands Consolidation Act, 1913, the Closer Settlement Acts, the Returned Soldiers Settlement Act and the Western Lands Act. The object of these amendments will be to afford further relief to necessitous settlers and to assist in developing primary production.
- 15. Among other measures to be submitted for your consideration will be amendments to the— $\,$

Hospitals Act, Sydney Corporation Act, Gaming and Betting Act, Public Service Acts.

I now leave you to the discharge of your important duties with the earnest prayer that under Divine guidance your labours may conduce to the welfare and happiness of all.

Mr. Harper moved and Mr. Sinclair seconded the motion, That the following Address in Reply to the Speech which His Excellency the Governor has addressed to both Houses of Parliament on opening this Session of the Parliament of New South Wales be now adopted by this House:—

To His Excellency Sir Philip Woolcott Game, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Air Vice-Marshal on the Retired List of the Royal Air Force, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

We, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our thanks for Your Excellency's Speech, and to assure you of our unfeigned attachment to His Most Gracious Majesty's Throne and Person.

- 2. We beg to assure Your Excellency that our earnest consideration will be given to the measures to be submitted to us, and that the necessary provision for the Public Service will be made in due course.
- 3. We join Your Excellency in the hope, that, under the guidance of Divine Providence, our labours may be so directed as to advance the best interests of the State.

And so it was resolved in the affirmative.

The Ladies' Gallery was then cleared by the Serjeant-at-Arms, assisted by the Police.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Lang, proceeding to refer to evidence concerning payments stated to have been made by certain Ministers for documentary evidence bearing upon the issue of licenses for Greyhound Coursing, and such matter having been referred to in evidence given before the Royal Commission appointed to enquire into the issue of licenses for Greyhound Racing,—

Mr. Speaker said that no reference or allusion must be made in debate in this House to matters pending before courts of law or, by analogy, before Royal Commissions. This rule was well established. It was a very salutary rule that had been strictly observed in the House of Commons as well as in this House. At times the question has arisen whether a matter proposed to be discussed does actually come within the rule or not, and rulings have been given at different times based upon the circumstances of each case, but the rule itself has been strictly observed, as will be seen from reference to page 323, Thirteenth Edition of May's Parliamentary Practice.

On the 1st February, 1844, Queen Victoria's opening speech contained the following paragraph:—

"I forbear from observation of events in Ireland, in respect to which proceedings are pending before the proper legal tribunal."

During the debate on the Address in Reply, Lord John Russell said:

"There is one topic treated of in the speech, but in such a manner as to preclude me from entering into it. Yet, upon that topic, at once, I feel it necessary to say a few words—I mean the question of Ireland. I quite agree that while the trials are pending before a judicial tribunal in that country it would be impossible with a proper regard to the proceedings of a court of justice to discuss certain topics one way or other without involving the conduct of persons who are now obliged to defend their conduct before the judges."

Even where a matter has been before a court and an appeal is lodged no allusion or reference must be made to the matter in Parliament. Many rulings have been given to this effect both here and in the House of Commons.

On the 10th August, 1898, in the House of Commons, Mr. Lewis, discussing the Appropriation Bill, was directing remarks to certain alleged corrupt practices which prevailed at the Grimsby election. (House of Commons' Debate, 4th Scries, Vol. 64, page 8678.) Mr. R. G. Webster rose to a point of order: "Is it in order," he asked the Speaker, "for an Honorable Member to refer to an election at a time when the period during which a petition may be lodged has not yet expired?"

"Mr. Speaker: I must say that I think it is most unusual."

"Mr. J. McClure (Member for Lancashire): I think, if I may be allowed "to say so, that it is disgraceful."

"Mr. Speaker: Order! Order! It is a most unusual course, and I think "it is out of order. The hon member is now about to go into the ellega"tion that there was bribery and corruption at the great Grimsby election.
"That, I understand, is his object?"

"Mr. Lewis: Yes."

"Mr. Speaker: Such allegations may be true or they may not, but it "appears to me to be quite irregular to discuss that question in this House. "Supposing an election petition had been lodged, very clearly it would be "out of order to ask this House to discuss or pass judgment upon a matter "which is under consideration in an election court. The same reasoning "must apply if the twenty-one days, which is the period within which a "petition may be presented, have not elapsed. I think it would be quite "out of order for the honorable gentlemen to enter into a discussion as to "whether corruption took place at an election when the twenty-one days "have not expired within which a petition may be lodged."

Mr. Speaker further stated that the Honorable Member, Mr. Lang, said that what he proposed to discuss did not form the subject of the inquiry held by the Commissioner. He, Mr. Speaker, was of the opinion that the conduct of Ministers in regard to the evidence brought before the Commission was a matter that has substantially come before the Commissioner. It was not for him to express an opinion as to what evidence should be given before the inquiry, but he took the view that the details of the payments referred to by the Honorable Member, and which he proposed to discuss, were so closely connected with matters which were before the Commissioner and on which evidence had already been given, that any such discussion would involve a violation of the sub judice rule. It would be a most improper thing to have a discussion in this House on matters which were substantially the subject of a Royal Commission then sitting. In this House Members were not on oath; statements made on the floor of the House could not be made the subject of any civil or criminal proceedings, nor could they be tested by the process of cross-examination, and there was much wisdom in the rule prohibiting such a discussion while a Commission was sitting. Had the inquiry been closed, there would be no objection to the matter being discussed, so far as the rules of debate of this House were concerned.

The sentence quoted by the Honorable Member from the letter of Mr. Justice Halse Rogers of August 5th last, did not carry the matter any further. He did not think that the learned Judge intended to express any opinion as to Parliamentary practice or usage. The Judge's general observation that there would be an opportunity for the Leader of the Opposition to take such steps as he might think desirable in the ordinary way did not, of course, affect his judgment as to whether a discussion at this stage was permissible under the rules and usages of Parliament.

He wished to make it clear that he did not rule that discussion on the matter of the conduct of Ministers in making payments for documentary evidence to be used at the inquiry was under all circumstances prohibited. He was called on to give a ruling as to whether, at present, when the Commission was still sitting, that subject was open to discussion in this House, and he ruled that it was not. Mr. Speaker further said that the Honorable Member assumed that because the Commissioner declined to open up a certain line of inquiry before the Commission, the way was open for pursuing that line by discussion and debate in this House. He thought that argument fallacious. In an ordinary case before one of our law courts, if it were proposed by one of the parties to the proceedings to open up a line of evidence which the judge considered irrelevant, would that occurrence entitle an Honorable Member of this House to pursue the matter by discussion on the floor of this House, while the case was still pending, on the assumption that the matter to be discussed was not sub judice? If the proposed subject of discussion were substantially associated with the proceedings before the court, then it would not be for the Speaker to microscopically sift the relevant from the irrelevant evidence, but to liberally apply the sub-judice rule in such a way as to prevent the mischief which that rule was intended to obviate. He was of opinion that, at present, such discussion would be a violation of the rule to which he had referred.

Mr. Lang moved, That the address be amended by the addition of the following words, to stand as paragraph 4:—"We also desire to inform Your Excellency that the Government does not possess the confidence of this House."

Question proposed, That the words proposed to be added be so added.

Debate ensued.

(1) The arrangements made by the Premier with one Redmond Barry, whom Mr. Commissioner Halse Rogers felt impelled to describe as an admitted "accomplice in a scheme or conspiracy to employ bribery" to purchase £2,000 worth of testimony to be paid for from undisclosed and secret sources and to be used to party advantage by defaming the reputation of men who were at the time Ministers of the Crown.

(2) The action of the Honorable L. O. Martin, a Member of the Government, who, while occupying the office of Minister of Justice, handed over the sum of £500, in final settlement of the arrangement referred to above, although he must have been aware that such arrangement was unenforceable in our Courts, being void as opposed to public interest, thereby placing the cloaking of his party and his leader's misdeeds before the public interest in contravention of his oath as Minister of Justice.

(3) The association with this corrupt agreement of the Honorables T. R. Bavin, Playfair, Walder, Murray, and Higgins, Members of the Parlia-

ment of New South Wales.

(4) In so arranging the terms of the recent Royal Commission as to exclude any inquiry into (a) the nature of the dealings between the Premier and his associates on the one hand and Barry and associates of similar calibre on the other; (b) the source of the money used to purchase the testimony to be supplied by the said Barry after consultation with persons acting on behalf of Mr. Stevens; (c) the immunity granted from criminal prosecution by a Mr. Delbridge, acting on behalf of the Premier, to an associate of the said Barry on the ground that this witness was to be a Crown witness before the Royal Commission; (d) the conduct of the Honorable L. O. Martin, M.L.A., in directly associating himself with an agreement against the public interest in contravention of his oath as Minister of Justice.

(2.) That the foregoing Resolution be conveyed by Address to His Excellency the Governor.

In Clause 5, it proposed, inter alia, to invest the Legislative Council with the power to suggest amendments in Appropriation Bills and to make amendments in other Money Bills—for example, Taxation Bills. To that extent it curtailed the powers and privileges of this House, which were derived partly

from the Constitution Act of 1855 (now reproduced in the Constitution Act, 1902) and partly from well-known constitutional rules and principles. These powers and privileges had been claimed by this House from the passing of the Constitution Act, 1855, up to the present day, and were freely acknowledged by all constitutional authorities.

The Privy Council in 1886, in the case referred to it by the two Houses of Parliament of Queensland, laid down the true limitations of the powers of the Legislative Council in regard to Money Bills. So far as regarded the express language of the Constitution Act, both Houses had equal powers except that Money Bills must originate in the Legislative Assembly. But the Privy Council held that in the Legislature of Queensland, such having been constituted on a basis analogous to that of the United Kingdom, the express limitation of the power to originate supply to the elective House carried with it, by implication, a limitation of the power of the Legislative Council analogous to that which was then recognised as imposed on the House of Lords. (The relevant section of the Queensland Act was exactly the same as Section 46 of our own Constitution Act.)

He referred Honorable Members to the observations made by him on the occasion of the consideration of the amendments made by the Legislative Council in the Income Tax (Management) Bill, December 6, 1928. He had then reviewed at length the whole question of the relations between the two Houses in regard to Money Bills, and had no reason to alter the opinions which he had then expressed.

He further pointed out that if it were desired to curtail the powers and privileges of this House, and to confer powers on the Legislative Council in connection with Money Bills, which at present it did not enjoy, this could be done by legislative process, but he held that it should not be done in the way now proposed, namely, by means of a Bill originating in another place.

He reminded the House that a Message was received on the previous evening from the Legislative Council in the following terms (omitting formal parts):—

"The Legislative Council having, on the 29th day of September, 1932, passed the Constitution Amendment (Legislative Council) Bill and transmitted it to the Legislative Assembly for its concurrence—such Bill having been framed with a view to its submission to the electors by way of referendum in accordance with the provisions of Section 7A of the Constitution Act, 1902—the Legislative Council invites the Legislative Assembly to proceed with the Bill in due form and order, notwithstanding any question which may be held to arise in respect of the privileges of the Legislative Assembly by reason of the Bill having originated in the Legislative Council,"—

and said that in view of this Message, the responsibility of further action in regard to this Bill rests with the House. He hoped that nothing he had said would be misunderstood or misconstrued as an expression of any opinion on the merits of the Bill itself, or any portion thereof. As Speaker, he had no concern with the policy of the Bill; that was a matter for the Government of the day. It was, however, his bounden duty, as the custodian of the rights and privileges of this House, without delay and on his own authority, to draw attention to any invasion or attempted invasion of those rights and privileges, and it was in the performance of that duty that he had made these observations.

Mr. Stevens moved, That this Bill be now read a second time. Debate ensued.

In his opinion, the Legislative Council had, by these amendments, infringed the rights and privileges of this House, and he invited the House to give consideration to this view when dealing with the amendments.

Mr. Stevens said that the Government proposed to agree to the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this bill. And while it was quite true that the amendments were of such a nature as to increase the charge on the Consolidated Revenue, under normal circumstances the Government would have invited Honorable Members to take a course other than that which it proposed to suggest it should now take. Having regard to the late hour of the Session, and the fact that it was proposed to accept these amendments, the Government would invite the Committee to agree to the Legislative Council's amendments, and to add the usual paragraph to the Message that such agreement was not to be taken as any waiver of the rights and privileges of this House.

On motion of Mr. Spooner, Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair, and the Chairman reported that the Committee had agreed to the Council's amendments, and had made a consequential amendment in the Title.
