1. OPENING OF PARLIAMENT :- The House met at half-past Ten o'clock, g.m., pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, hearing date the twentyeighth day of October, 1927, of which a copy was read by Sydney Grant Boydell, Esquire, the Clork of the Legislative Assembly, as follows :-

" (l.s.) "D. R. S. de Chair, Governor.

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"New South WALFS, By His Excellency Sif Dubley RAWSON STRATFORD DE "TO WIT. } CHAIR, Admiral in the Royal Navy, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Member of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia.

"In pursuance of the power and authority vested in me as such Governor afore-"said by virtue of an Act passed in the second year of the Reign of His late " Majesty King Edward the Seventh, being 'An Act to consolidate the Acts " relating to the Constitution,' I do hereby proclaim that a session of the "Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly for the State of New South "Wales for the dispatch of business shall commence and be holden on Thursday, "the third day of November, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon, in the buildings "known as the Legislative Council Chambers, in Macquarie-street, in the City "of Sydney; and Members of the said Legislative Council and Legislative "Assembly, respectively, are hereby required to give their attendance at the said "time and place accordingly.

"Given under my hand and seal, at Sydney, this twenty-eighth day of "October, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and "twenty-seven, and in the eighteenth year of His Majesty's Reign.

8. MESSAGE FROM THE COMMISSIONERS:—The Usher of the Black Rod being admitted delivered a Message, that "The Commissioners request the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council Chamber, to hear the Commission for opening of Parliament read."

The House went, and the President said :--

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the "Legislative Assembly,—His Excellency the Governor, not decming it fit to be "personally present here this day, has been pleased to cause a Commission to "be issued, under the Public Seal of the State, constituting us Commissioners "to do all things necessary to be performed by the Governor in the name and "on the part of His Majesty the King, or in the name and on the part of His "Excellency the Governor of the State, in order to the opening and holding of "this Parliament, to deliver a Message to the Legislative Assembly, and to do "all such other things as may be specially necessary to enable Parliament to "perform acts which admit of no delay, as will more fully appear by the Com-"mission itself, which must now be read."

Whereupon the Clerk of the Parliaments, by direction of the President, read the said Commission, as follows:--

"George V, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British "Dominions beyond the Scas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

"To all to whom these presents shall come,-

" Greeting:

"WHEREAS by Proclamation made on the twenty-eighth day of October, 1927, "His Excellency Sir Dudley Rawson STRATFORD DE CHAIR, Admiral in the "Royal Navy, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, "Member of the Royal Victorian Order, Our Governor of Our State of New "South Wales and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, did, " in pursuance of the power and authority vested in him as Governor of Our "said State, by virtue of an Act passed in the second year of the reign of His "late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, being 'An Act to Consolidate the "Acts relating to the Constitution,' proclaim that a Session of the Legislative "Council and Legislative Assembly constituted under the said Act, and com-"posing the Parliament of Our said State of New South Wales, should "commence and be holden on Thursday, the Third day of November: And "whereas, for certain causes, Our said Governor cannot conveniently be present "in person at the opening of the said Session : Now know ye, that we, trusting "in the discretion, fidelity, and care of our trusty and well-beloved the Honor-"able Frederick Flowers, President of the said Legislative Council, the Honor-"able Francis Stewart Boyce, Attorney-General and Vice-President of Our "Executive Council of Our said State, and the Honorable Broughton Barnabas "O'Conor, Members of the said Legislative Council, do with the advice of Our "Executive Council of Our said State, give and grant by the tenor of these "presents unto the said Frederick Flowers, Francis Stewart Boyce, and "Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, so being such President and Members of the "said Legislative Council, or any two of them, full power in Our name to open "and hold the said Session of the said Legislative Council and Legislative "Assembly on the said third day of November or subsequent day, on Our behalf, "to do all things necessary to be done in Our name, or in the name of Our "Governor of our said State, in and about the opening and holding of the said "Parliament, to deliver a Message to the Legislative Assembly, and to do all "such other things as may be specially necessary to enable Parliament to per-"form acts which admit of no delay: Commanding also by the tenor of these "presents all whom it concerns to meet in the said Parliament, that to the said

"Frederick Flowers, Francis Stewart Boyce, and Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, "or any two of them, they diligently attend in the premises in the form afore-"said.

"In testimony whereof, we have caused these, Our Letters to be made Patent, "and the Public Seal of Our said State, to be hereunto affixed.

"Witness Our trusty and well-beloved Sir DUDLEY RAWSON STRATFORD DE "CHAIR, Admiral in Our Royal Navy, Knight Commander of the Most Hon-"ourable Order of the Bath, Member of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor "of Our State of New South Wales and its Dependencies in the Common-"wealth of Australia, at Sydney, in New South Wales, aforesaid, this "second day of November, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine "hundred and twenty-seven, and in the eighteenth year of Our Reign.

The Members of both Houses being scated at the request of the President,— The President said,—

"Itonorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the Legisla-"tive Assembly,—We have it in command from the Governor to let you know,--"That after Members of the Legislative Assembly shall have been sworn, the "causes of His Excellency calling this Parliament will be declared to you; and it "being necessary that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be first chosen, it "is His Excellency's pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly, "repair to your own Chamber, and there proceed to the election of one of your "number to be your Speaker."

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4. COMMISSION TO ADMINISTER THE OATH OF ALLECIANCE:—The Clerk informed the Assembly that he had received, through the office of the Premier, a Commission, under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, and bearing the Seal of the State, authorising the Honorable Thomas Rainsford Bavin, Premier and Colonial Treasurer, the Honorable Ernest Albert Buttenshaw, Secretary for Public Works and Minister for Railways, and the Honorable Richard Thomas Ball, Minister for Lands, or any one or more of them, to administer the Oath or Affirmation of Allegiance to the King, required by law to be taken or made and subscribed by every Member before he shall be permitted to sit or vote in the Legislative Assembly,—which Commission the Clerk read, as follows:—

And so it was resolved in the affirmative. Whereupon Mr. Wearne and Mr. Missingham conducted Mr. Levy to the Chair, where, standing on the upper step, he returned his acknowledgments to the House for the great honor they had been pleased to confer upon him, and then

took his seat in the Chair. Mr. Bavin and Mr. Lang having congratulated Mr. Speaker,-Mr. Bavin acquainted the House that he had ascertained from the Governor that His Excellency would receive their Speaker at Government House at once.

7. PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER :- The House then proceeded to Government House to present their Speaker to His Excellency the Governor,-

And having returned,-Mr. Speaker reported that the Assembly had been to Government House, where he informed the Governor that, immediately after the opening of Parliament to-day, the Legislative Assembly, in the exercise of their undoubted right, had proceeded to the election of their Speaker, that the choice had fallen upon him, and that he had now to present himself to His Excellency as their Speaker :- Whereupon His Excellency was pleased to offer him his congratulations.-That he had then, on bohalf of the House, laid claim to all their rights and privileges, particularly to freedom of speech in debate, to free access to His Excellency when occasion should require, and that the most favourable construction should, on all occasions, be put upon their language and proceedings;-to all which His Excellency had readily assented.

Mr. Speaker then repeated his grateful thanks for the honour the House had been pleased to confer upon him.

8. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-New ADMINISTRATION :- Mr. Bavin informed the House that changes had recently taken place in the Administration, and announced that, as the result of the General Election, the late Premier, Mr. Lang, tendered

4. Your early attention will be asked to a proposal for the restoration of the proceeds of motor taxation to the Main Roads Board and for the ratification of the Federal Main Roads Agreement.

GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

5. You will be asked to provide for the financial necessities of the Public Services of the State; and a measure to indemnify the Colonial Treasurer, the Officers of the Treasury, and other persons, in respect of certain unauthorized payments during the year 1927-28, will be presented for your consideration.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND

GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

6. Measures will be introduced for the purpose of dealing with certain appointments recently made to the Public Service.

7. Certain amendments in the method of financing the Family Endowment Scheme will be submitted.

8. A proposal will be submitted for the amendment of the Industrial Arbitration Act and the remodelling of the present Industrial Commission.

I now invite your earnest consideration of the matters proposed as the subjects of your deliberations, and pray that, under the guidance of Divine Providence, your labours will conduce to the well-being and prosperity of the State.



of Members to serve in the Legislative Assembly of the State of New South Wales was held on the Eighth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twentyseven, in pursuance of the writ for the Election of such Members issued by His Excellency; that on the Tenth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, a writ was duly issued by His Excellency for the election of a Member to serve in the said Legislative Assembly directed to Ernest William Bray, of Narrandera, in the said State, the Returning Officer for the Electoral District of Murrumbidgee; that in the said writ, the Fourteenth day of Scptember, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, was named as the day of nomination, and the Eighth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty seven, was named as polling day in the event of the election being contested, and the Twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, as the day when the said writ should be returned; that Petitioner, being a person qualified to vote at the said Election, and Martin Matthew Flannery were duly nominated as candidates to be elected as members to serve in the said Legislative Assembly for the said Electoral District of Murrumbidgee; that a Poll was duly held on the date named for the purpose in the said writ, and the Returning Officer made Return to the said writ that the said Martin Matthew Flannery had been elected to serve in the said Legislative Assembly as the Member for the said Electoral District; that Petitioner is aggrieved at the conduct of the Returning Officer and the conduct generally of the said Election and complains that the said Election was not duly conducted according to law, and that the said Martin Matthew Flannery has been unduly elected and returned as a Member to serve in the said Legislative Assembly as the Member for the said Electoral District of Murrumbidgee; that the grounds of complaint of Petitioner are as follow:—(a) That the said Martin Matthew Flannery, who was returned as elected by the Returning Officer, was not duly elected as the Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Electoral District of Murrumbidgee; (b) that Petitioner was duly elected and was not returned as elected by the Returning Officer; and without limiting the generality of the grounds of complaint set out in paragraphs (a) and (b) above; that persons who were not entitled to vote at the said Election were allowed to and did vote; that votes were recorded in the names or on behalf of persons whose names had been removed from the Roll of Electors and transferred to the Rolls of other Electoral Districts; that the voting of persons voting at certain polling places outside the polling place areas for which they were respectively enrolled was informally conducted, and certain ballot papers which were allowed and counted should have been rejected as informal; that in a number of cases two ballot papers were issued and two votes were recorded and allowed in respect of one person enrolled as an Elector; that persons whose names had been wrongly placed on the Supplemental Roll were issued ballot papers and voted; that a number of ballot papers of absent voters which should have been disallowed and rejected as informal were allowed and counted; that insufficient provision was made for taking the Poll at Narrandera Polling Place, and Electors who would have voted if proper conveniences for taking the poll had been provided were prevented from voting; that the Scrutineer appointed by and acting for the said Martin Matthew Flannery at the Polling-booth at Narrandera interfered with and attempted to influence Electors within the Polling-booth, and communicated with persons in the Polling-booth further than was necessary in the discharge of his functions, and otherwise misconducted himself as such Scrutineer; that a large parcel of ballot papers which should have been in the custody of the Deputy Returning Officer at Darlington Point Polling Place for use on Election Day only in the Polling Booth and for issue by the Deputy Returning Officer only to Electors qualified to vote came into the possession of persons not so entitled, and were capable of being used in an unauthorised way as ballot papers, at the election; that the total votes returned by the Returning Officer as having been recorded was in excess of the number of votes appearing by the scrutiny to have been recorded; that there were committed other acts and other omissions were made contrary to law in and about the said Election; that Petitioner has paid the sum of Fifty pounds to the credit of the Speaker in the matter of this his Petition with the Head Office of the Bank of New South Wales. George Street, Sydney, which is a Bank regulated by law within the State of New South Wales, and the Bank deposit receipt for the sum of Fifty pounds (£50) so deposited is hereto annexed; and humbly petitioning that the Returning Officer's Return to the said writ be set aside as invalid; that the whole of the said ballot papers be ordered to be recounted under the supervision of the Elections and Qualifications Committee and in the presence of such scrutineers of the said Candidates as choose to be present, and such orders made and directions given in respect thereof as may be proper or requisite; and that such other orders, directions, and declarations be made or given in the premises as the case may require,

Ordered to be referred to the Committee of Elections and Qualifications.

ELECTION PETITION (HURSTVILLE) :- Mr. Bruntnell, by Command, laid upon the Table an Election Petition which had been addressed to His Excellency the Governor from John Roscoe Nield, a person alleging himself to have been a candidate at the Election of a Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Electoral District of Hurstville, against the return of Walter James Butler, at the General Election held on the Eighth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven,-representing that a General Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Assembly of the State of New South Wales, was held on the eighth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, in pursuance of the writ for the Election of such Members issued by His Excellency; that on the tenth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, a writ was duly issued by His Excellency for the election of a Member to serve in the said Legislative Assembly directed to Roy Lamont McLeish of Hurstville in the said State, the Returning Officer for the Electoral District of Hurstville; that in the said Writ the fourteenth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, was named as the day of nomination, and the eighth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven was named as polling day in the event of the election being contested, and the twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, as the day when the said writ should be returned; that petitioner, being a person qualified to vote at the said General Election, and Walter James Butler, Walter Edmund Anderson and William Bass Hodge were duly nominated as candidates to be elected as members to serve in the said Legislative Assembly for the said Electoral District of Hurstville; that a Poll was duly held on the date named for the purpose in the said writ, and the Returning Officer made Return to the said writ that the said Walter James Butler had been elected to serve in the said Legislative Assembly as the Member for the said Electoral District; that petitioner is aggricved at the conduct of the Returning Officer and the conduct generally of the said Election, and complains that the said Election was not duly conducted according to law, and that the said Walter James Butler has been unduly elected and returned as a Member to serve in the said Legislative Assembly as the Member for the said Electoral District of Hurstville; that the grounds of complaint of your petitioner are as follow:-(a) that the said Walter James Butler who was returned as elected by the said Returning Officer was not duly elected as the Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Electoral District of Hurstville; (b) that petitioner was duly elected and was not returned as elected by the said Returning Officer, and without limiting the generality of the above grounds of complaint set out in paragraphs (a) and (b) as above; (c) that the said Returning Officer for the said Electoral District received advice that 1,188 envelopes containing absent votes had been forwarded to him, and that the said number of absent votes were in fact forwarded to him, but that only 1,079 of the said envelopes and 1,079 of the said absent votes have been accounted for by the said Returning Officer; (d) that the said Returning Officer in contravention of the Parliamentary Electorates and 49129

Elections Acts, and in particular section 126 thereof, did not as soon as practicable after the close of the poll proceed to count the absent voters' ballot-papers used in connection with the poll in his district; (e) that the envelopes containing the said absent votes and the said absent votes were tampered with or alternatively were so left that they could be tampered with, between the date of their receipt by the said Returning Officer and the date on which the said absent votes were counted; (f) that over one hundred absent voters' ballot-papers were rejected without opening the envelopes because the declaration in each case signed by the elector had not been completed and attested by the Returning Officer or Deputy in whose presence the same was signed as required by section 115 of the said Acts; (g) that the Returning Officer in contravention of the provisions of the said Acts and in particular of section 127 thereof, and without notice to your petitioner broke the seals of the parcels containing the certified copies of the Rolls transmitted to him by his Deputy Returning Officers in accordance with section 123 of the said Acts or sealed by him in accordance with section 125 of the said Acts; (h) that the Deputy Returning Officer at the Kimberley Polling Booth did not make up in separate parcels as required by section 123 of the said Acts, the ballot-papers and certified copies of Rolls supplied to the said Deputy Returning Officer and used by him, and all books, rolls and papers kept or used by him during the polling; (j) that the name of Eric Armitage appears on the Supplemental Roll for the said Electoral District at the address 25 Byrne-street, West Kogarah, whereas there is no such person at the said address, and petitioner believes that the electoral rolls for the said district contain the names of other persons who are either fictitious or not entitled to vote in the said Electoral District, and your petitioner fears that there may have been plural voting and personation in the said Electoral District; (k) that the said Returning Officer acted in such a way as to deprive your petitioner of his right to request a recount under section 126, subsection (5) of the said Acts; (1) that there were committed other acts and other omissions were made contrary to law in and about the said Election; that petitioner has paid the sum of Fifty pounds (£50) to the credit of the Speaker in the matter of this his petition with the Head Office of the Bank of New South Wales which is a Bank regulated by law within the State of New South Wales, and the Bank deposit receipt for the sum of fifty pounds (£50 0s. 0d.) so deposited is hereto annexed; and humbly petitioning that the Returning Officer's return to the said writ be set aside as invalid; that the whole of the ballot-papers for the said Electoral District be ordered to be recounted under the supervision of the Elections and Qualifications Committee, and in the presence of such scrutineers of the said candidates as choose to be present, and such orders made and directions given in respect thereof as may be proper or requisite; and that such other orders, directions and declarations be made or given in the premises as the case may require.

NEW SOUTH WALES, | By His Excellency Sir DUDLEY RAWSON STRATFORD DE CHAIR, Admiral in the Royal Navy, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Member of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its Dependencies, in the Commonwcalth of Australia.

Will he state the number of new appointments made to Salaried Staff in the Electrical Staff of Railways and Tramways during 1925, 1926, and 1927?

5. Mr. DAVIDSON to ask THE PREMIER AND COLONIAL TREASURER,-

In view of the large number of unemployed in the State of New South Wales, which is causing so much suffering and distress, particularly among women and children of the State, will he, with a view of compelling those who own and control a surplus of wealth to employ a number of workmen in proportion to such surplus, have a statement compiled showing,--

(1.) The wealth of the State-how it is owned?

(2.) The amounts held by individuals and companies?

Otherwise will he bring down a graduated wealth tax for the purpose of procuring sufficient money to find work for the unemployed?

6. Mr. Horsington to ask The Minister for Lands,-

(1.) In view of the fact that there were over 1,300 applications for the five blocks known as Wilga Downs, in the Land District of Nyngan, will he state when improvement leases known as Honeybugle Station, containing 170,000 acres, in the same district, expires?

(2.) Will he state what steps are being taken to have this large area subdivided and offered for settlement in home maintenance areas?

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7. Mr. SHANNON to ask THE MINISTER FOR LABOUR AND INDUSTRY,-

(1.) Is it a fact that men employed on painting at Fig Tree Bridge and other bridges are being paid only £4 17s. 6d. per week, whilst the awards provide for £5 17s. 4d.? If this is so, will be see that the award wages are paid?

(2.) Is it also a fact that these men only get boat fares, and that the first boat from the Quay does not arrive at Fig Tree till 7.55 a.m., and these men have to start at 7.80 a.m., and the men are compelled to get train and motor bus to arrive at their work in time, and are compelled to pay higher fares than the sum allowed, and if so, will he allow extra travelling allowance?

8. Mr. POLLACK to ask THE PREMIER,-

(1.) Has the Government definitely decided to adopt and take advantage of the Imperial Federal Migration Agreement?

(2.) If so, will be have inquiries made re the necessity of same, copectally in view of the fact that the holidays are approaching and the traffic on this line is very heavy?

10. Mr. STANLEY to ask THE SECRETARY FOR PUBLIC WORKS AND MINISTER FOR RAIL-WAYS .---

Will be have sufficient money placed on the estimates for the early start towards construction of the East Hills Railway, especially in view of the fact that overcrowding of the Illawarra and Bankstown lines is extremely dangerous during the busy waffic, and also especially in view of the fact that the Public Works Department and the Railway Commissioners have recommended same?

11. Mr. KNIGHT to ask THE SECRETARY FOR PUBLIC WORKS AND MINISTER FOR RAIL-WAYS,-

(1.) Is it a fact that the railways have entered into an agreement with G. and C. Hoskins Limited to exchange with G. and C. Hoskins a large amount of coal from the Departmental mine for a similar amount of their coal?

(2.) Is it a fact that this arrangement has no advantage to the Commissioners, but gives Messrs. G. and C. Hoskins an advantage of several shillings per ton?

(3.) Will he make inquiries, and make available all papers in connection with this matter?



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
