TUESDAY, 17 SEPTEMBER, 1929.

1. OPENING OF THE SESSION: -The House met at Twelve o'clock at Noon, pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the twenty-first day of August, 1929.

Mr. Speaker took the Chair.

The Clerk, by direction of Mr. Speaker, read a copy of the said Proclamation, as follows:

7. COURT OF DISPUTED RETURNS IN LIEU OF ELECTIONS AND QUALIFICATIONS COM-MITTEE:-Mr. Speaker drew the attention of Honorable Members to the fact that it was no longer necessary for this House to appoint an Elections and Qualifications Committee, and pointed out that section 32 of the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections (Amendment) Act of 1928 provided for the omission of Part VI of the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Act, 1912, which contained provisions concerning Election Petitions, and the substitution therefor of a new Part VI, which provided that the Supreme Court should be a Court of Disputed Returns to decide disputed elections of Members to the Legislative

Mr. Speaker also intimated that the Proclamation declaring the commencing date of the establishment of the Court appeared in the Government Gazette No. 27 of the 22nd February, 1929.

8. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: -Mr. Bavin informed the House of a certain re-arrangement of portfolios which had taken place during the recess.

- 10. Case of Major M. L. F. Jarvie, M.C., M.L.A.—Report of Royal Commission:— (1.) URGENCY:-Mr. Bavin moved, without Notice, That it is a matter of urgent necessity that this House should forthwith consider the following motion:—"That this House do now consider so much of the Report of the Royal Commission in connection with the application made by Michael Alphonsus Dominic Fitzgibbons on the twenty-third day of October, 1928, and amended on the twenty-sixth day of October, 1928, to ply motor omnibuses between Campsie and the Central Railway Station, as relates to Major Milton Livingstone Fredericks Jarvie, now sitting as a Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Electoral District of Ashfield."

Point of Order:-Mr. Lang drew attention to Standing Order 39, which provided that "no business beyond what is of a formal character shall be entered upon before the Address in Reply to the Governor's Opening Speech has been adopted,"-and submited that the motion was therefore out of order.

Mr. Speaker pointed out that Standing Order No. 395 enabled the House at any time, if emergency arose, to suspend such standing orders as would preclude business being done which otherwise could not be done. He ruled that, as this motion was the first in the process of suspending the standing orders, it was in order.

Question put and passed.

To Our Trusty and Well-beloved

The Honourable COLIN GEORGE WATT DAVIDSON, Puisne Judge of Our Supreme Court of Our State of New South Wales.

GREETING:

Whereas it is desirable that the matters hereinafter referred to should be investigated: Now know You, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your integrity, learning and ability, Do, with the advice of the Executive Council of Our said State, hereby authorise and appoint you Sole Commissioner to inquire into all matters, transactions, and negotiations in connection with the application made by Michael Alphonsus Dominic Fitzgibbons on the twentythird day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, and amended on the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, for permission to ply motor omnibuses between Campsic and the Central Railway Station, via Earlwood, and the conduct and actions of any and every person in respect of any such matters, transactions and negotiations and in particular and without in any way limiting or confining the general nature of the said inquiry to inquire into the following matters, namely:-

1. Whether any person or persons had corruptly offered or attempted to offer to any Minister of the Crown or to any Member of the Legislative Assembly or to any employee of the Crown any money or consideration to further the granting of the permission applied for as aforesaid;

2. Whether any Member of the Legislative Assembly had knowingly been a party to corruptly offering or attempting to offer to any Minister or employee of the Crown any money or consideration to further the granting of the said permission;

3. Whether any Member of the Legislative Assembly or employee of the Crown corruptly received, demanded, exacted, or attempted to exact from any person any money or consideration to further the granting of the

said permission.

And We Do, by these presents, give and grant to you full power and authority to call before you all such persons as you may judge necessary, by whom you may be better informed of the truth in the premises, and to require the production of all such books, papers, writings and other documents as you may deem expedient, and to visit and inspect the same at the offices or places where the same or any of them may be deposited, and to inquire of the premises by all lawful ways and means: And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, within the space of one month from the date of this Our Commission, certify to Us, in the Office of Our Premier, at Sydney in Our said State, what you shall find touching the premises: And We Do hereby command all Government Officers and other persons whomsover within Our said State, that they be assistant to you in the execution of these presents: And We Do hereby declare that the Royal Commissions Act, 1923, excepting Section Seventeen thereof, shall apply to and with respect to this inquiry.

In testimony whereof, we have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Scal of Our said State to be hereunto affixed.

As summarising the whole of my foregoing remarks, I make the following findings of fact on the issues which I have already stated arise:—

- 1. Whoever placed the envelope containing the money with the parcel, was the other aware or ignorant of it?—The other was aware of it.
 - 2. Did Mr. Fitzgibbons pay or cause to be paid to Major Jarvie the whole sum of £500?—Yes.
 - 3. If so, for what purpose?—To be used to influence the Minister to approve of Mr. Fitzgibbons' application, and not by way of donation to the party funds.
 - 4. Did Mr. Fitzgibbons attempt to bribe the Minister?—By reason of his acquittal in the criminal trial I refrain from answering this question at all.
- 5. Did Major Jarvie attempt to bribe the Minister?—Yes.
- Did both Mr. Fitzgibbons and Major Jarvie conspire together for this purpose?—Yes.

On these findings I answer the questions asked in my Commission as follows:—

1. (a) I find that Major Jarvie corruptly attempted to offer to a Minister of the Crown, viz., the Chief Secretary, the late Mr. Bruntnell, a sum of money, £200, and a consideration in the form of a case of pipes, to further the granting of the permission applied for as aforesaid.

(b) I also find that Mr. Fitzgibbons and Major Jarvie conspired together to effect the purpose lastly mentioned.

(c) I find that no money or consideration as aforesaid was offered to any other Minister or to any member of the Legislative Assembly or to any employee of the Crown.

2. (a) I find that Major Jarvie, member of the Legislative Assembly, was knowingly a party to corruptly offering or attempting to offer to a Minister, viz., the late Mr. Bruntnell, money and other consideration to further the granting of the said permission.

(b) I find that no other member of the Legislative Assembly was a party to offering any such money or consideration to any minor employee of

the Crown.

3. I find in the negative.

Mr. Speaker inquired whether Major Jarvie desired to have any further passages read from the report.

Major Jarvie, having replied in the negative, was then heard in his place.

5. The Governor's Opening Speech: -Mr. Speaker reported that the House yesterday attended the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to deliver an Opening Speech to both Houses of Parliament. For greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, which he laid upon the Table of the House, and ordered that it be recorded in the Votes and Proceedings, as follows:-

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

1. It is with pleasure that I call you together for the discharge of your

important duties in the fourth session of the present Parliament.

2. My Ministers join with me in expressing a deep sense of thankfulness for the restoration to health of His Majesty the King, whose recent serious illness caused grave anxiety to the people of New South Wales, and in earnestly hoping that His Majesty's recovery may be permanent.

3. Since August of last year it has been my privilege to visit Great Britain, and I was extremely gratified to find that increasing interest is being manifested by the British people in the development and future prospects of

New South Wales.

- 4. It is regretted that economic conditions in the State are still unsettled. My Ministers have done their best to minimise the reaction which the world-wide depression of the last few years has had on the State. Local developments have rendered the position much more difficult. One consequence of these conditions is the continued existence of a large amount of unemployment. This is due, partly, to world-wide causes, but, unfortunately, also to local industrial disturbances, the continuance of which my Advisers deeply regret. The disputes in the Coal and Timber Industries, apart from the direct unemployment of those engaged in them, have led to the curtailment of general industrial activities and consequent reduction of staffs in other industries.
- 5. My Ministers especially regret that the difficulty in the Coal Trade has not yet been settled. This matter has been the subject of most earnest and continuous consideration, and every effort has been made to bring about a resumption of work. Definite proposals have been submitted, and conferences arranged between the parties, unfortunately without any adjustment being reached. In conjunction with the Government of the Commonwealth, the Government of this State has appointed a Royal Commission to investigate and report on all phases of the industry, in the hope that its investigations will disclose methods by which this essential and important industry can be placed upon a sounder and more economical basis. The Commission has not yet presented its report, but Ministers will continue their efforts to secure a resumption of work in the industry pending its receipt.

6. These adverse circumstances seriously affected the finances of the State. In addition to extensive losses of revenue due to the falling-off of railway traffic, the Government has been faced with heavy expenditure on relief works

and food relief.

7. The disastrous effects of the duplication of Federal and State jurisdiction in relation to industrial arbitration have been the subject of discussion during the recess between my Advisers and the Governments of the Commonwealth and of the other States. After that discussion, an announcement was made by the Prime Minister of the intention of the Commonwealth Government to withdraw entirely from the field of industrial arbitration, except in regard to Maritime industries. If this proposal be carried into effect, the field will be left clear to the States for an effective revision of the system. Moreover, the removal of control of the Federal Arbitration Court over State Instrumentalities will restore to the States that power of controlling their own functions without which it is quite impossible to secure efficiency and economy in State services. If, and as soon as, this field is vacated by the Commonwealth Government, steps will be taken to place before you certain amendments of our present State industrial arbitration system which will remove many of the disabilities under which our industries have been suffering. Unfortunately, it is not known at present whether the purpose of the Federal Government to vacate the field of industrial regulation will be carried out, and, until this is known, it is impossible for my Advisers to make any final statement of their proposals in regard to many important matters relating to industrial and economic conditions.

8. My Ministers have continued to devote close attention to the development of the country by opening up additional areas of land for productive purposes. Satisfactory progress has been made with the Wyangala Water Conservation Scheme, which is to be carried out under the Migration Agreement between the British, Commonwealth, and State Governments. Other comprehensive developmental schemes, which will be financed under that Agreement,

are now being investigated.

9. Consideration has been given to the problem of the marketing overseas of the State's surplus primary products, and every effort is being made to ensure that the benefits which the British tariff preference affords to some of the

State's products shall be maintained, and, if possible, extended.

10. It is regretted that indications point to a substantial reduction in the returns to the State from our great staple industries of wool and wheat. The weight of wool will be materially less than in the previous season, and prices have not recovered from the serious reduction of last year. Drought conditions still persist in some parts of the State, although up to the present the losses of stock have not been serious.

11. It is anticipated that there will be a very substantial reduction in the amount of wheat available for export. Fortunately, however, there has been a recovery in the price of wheat, and in view of the predicted world's shortage for the coming season it seems probable that a higher price will partly com-

pensate the industry for the lower yield.

12. The position of the Dairying Industry is brighter, and good results are anticipated from the efforts that have been made to stabilise prices, and

from the increased production of the past season.

Dairy stock generally are in good condition, and pastures are improving. It is anticipated that the returns during the coming year will be satisfactory. During this Session it is hoped to place this industry on a sounder footing by the passage of a Bill dealing with the supply and distribution of milk in the Metropolitan Area.

13. Economic and seasonal conditions have caused very serious hardships to rural producers in certain parts of the State. Steps have already been taken by my Advisers to afford relief in necessitous cases, and definite provision is being made to deal with all such cases on a comprehensive basis to consolidate settlers' liabilities.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,-

14. Among the earliest measures to be submitted for your consideration will be one to effect reforms in the constitution of the Legislative Council, in accordance with the promise made by my Advisers.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,-

15. You will be asked to provide for the financial necessities of the Public Service of the State. The Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure, which have been prepared with the utmost regard for economy, will be submitted for your consideration, and proposals will be brought forward for a reduction of taxation of companies and individuals.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

- 16. You will be asked to extend the term of office of the present Civic Commission for a period which is sufficient to enable provision to be made for the restoration of an Elective Council for the government of the City of Sydney.
- 17. During the recess a Commissioner has been sent abroad to investigate the transport systems in force in the more important cities of Europe and of the United States of America. His report is now available and the Transport Bill which was placed before Parliament last session will be reviewed in the light of the additional information which he has obtained.
- 18. Consideration is being given to the reports presented by the officer of the Criminal Investigation Department who was sent abroad for the purpose of

investigating methods for the detection and prevention of crime, and measures which will strengthen the hands of the Police Department in dealing with outbreaks of lawlessness which have occurred lately will be placed before you. These will include Bills for the amendment of the Vagrancy Act, and for the prevention of the intimidation of workmen by mass picketing.

19. Among the proposals to be submitted will be one designed to give effect to the promises made by my Advisers in regard to an amendment of the Liquor

Licensing Law.

20. In response to the representations made by representative deputations of women it is proposed to introduce Bills amending the law relating to the age of marriage and dealing with the question of guardianship of infants.

21. It is intended to restore to the business-paper the Bill to amend the Workers' Compensation Act, which has already been before Honorable Members.

22. Proposals will be placed before you to reconstitute the Sydney Harbour Trust Commission and to provide for the reclamation of swamps on the Parramatta River and in other portions of Sydney Harbour.

23. Proposals will also be submitted to deal with the problems associated

with the production and marketing of rural products.

24. Among other measures of importance to the rural industries of this State there will be introduced Bills to amend the Pastures Protection Act and the Dairying Industry Act.

25. In the hope of reducing unemployment in rural districts, steps will be taken to remove the restrictions imposed by the present industrial system upon the employment of rural workers.

26. A Bill will be introduced to provide for an improvement in the care

of mental defectives.

27. Among the more important land measures designed to promote settlement will be included Bills amending the Land Acts, and dealing with the Prickly-pear Pest and the Pilliga Scrub Area, and facilitating the acquisition of homestead selections.

28. It is proposed to introduce legislation enabling steps to be taken for

the more effective prevention of bush fires.

29. You will also be invited to consider a number of other measures, including Bills relating to the following subjects:—

The Regulation of Charitable Collections; The Protection of Native Birds and Animals;

Deserted Wives and Children;

Auctioneers Licensing;

The Compulsory Education of Deaf, Dumb, and Blind Children;

Wills, Probate and Administration; The Landlord and Tenant (Shops);

Small Debts Recovery;

Pure Food;

Poisons;

Ambulance Transport Service;

Opticians;

Fisheries Administration;

Commission Agents;

Racing Taxation;

Early Closing;

The Application of the Betterment Principle to the Construction of Public Works;

The Creation of a Separate Administrative Board for Public School Teachers;

and such other matters upon which it may be found necessary to legislate.

30. I now leave you, Gentlemen, to the discharge of your important duties, with the earnest prayer that, under Divine Guidance, your labours may conduce to the welfare and happiness of all.

"(ii) in the case of a claim by or on behalf of a person of unsound mind. to his committee, or the manager of his estate, or to the Master in Lunacy."

Page 3, clause 5, line 6. Omit the words "or person of unsound mind."

Page 3, clause 5, after line 21. Insert the following new subclause:—

"(4) Any sum so paid to such committee, manager, or Master in Lunacy shall, subject to any general or special direction of the Court as to payment of costs, be held and applied by him as part of the estate of the person of unsound mind."

When a "Member has conducted himself in such a way as to make it necessary for the "Speaker to call him to order more than three times in any one sitting, for "any gross breach of the rules of the House, the Speaker may order the removal "of such Member from the Chamber until the termination of that sitting. "There are other circumstances under which a Member may be named by the "Speaker as guilty of wilfully or vexatiously obstructing or interrupting the "orderly conduct of the business of the House or of a wilful or vexatious breach "of any of the Standing Orders, in which case, after the Speaker has so named "the Honorable Member concerned, the matter is one for the House to deal with, "and it is open to the Minister in charge of the House to suggest an appro-"priate punishment of the recalcitrant Member. This may take the form of "suspension from the service of the House for the remainder of that sitting, "or for a definite period, or until the end of the current Session. In extreme "cases the House has even gone to the length of expelling a Member for gross disorder committed on the floor of the House. For instance, in 1890, a Member

No vote shall be taken at the joint sitting.

After the joint sitting the Legislative Assembly in the same session or in the next session, whether of the same Parliament or not, may direct that the Bill with or without any amendment which has been suggested by the Legislative Council, be presented to the Governor for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure thereon.

The Legislative Council shall be taken to have failed to pass any such Bill if the Bill is not returned to the Legislative Assembly within one month after its transmission to the Legislative Council, and the

session continues during such period.

(3) If the Legislative Assembly passes any Bill other than a Bills Bill to which subsection one or subsection two of this section applies, generally. and the Legislative Council rejects or fails to pass it, or passes it with any amendment to which the Legislative Assembly does not agree, and if after an interval of three months the Legislative Assembly in the same session or in the next session, whether of the same Parliament or not, again passes the Bill with or without any amendment which has been made or agreed to by the Legislative Council, and the Legislative Council rejects or fails to pass it, or passes it with any amendment to which the Legislative Assembly, after a free conference between managers, does not agree, the Governor may convene a joint sitting of the Members of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly.

The Members present at the joint sitting may deliberate and shall vote together upon the Bill as last proposed by the Legislative Assembly and upon amendments, if any, which have been made therein by one House and not agreed to by the other; and any such amendments which are affirmed by a majority of the Members voting thereon shall be taken to have been carried, and if the Bill, with amendments, if any, is affirmed by a majority of the Members voting thereon, it shall be presented to the Governor for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure

thereon.

If at the joint sitting the Bill is not so affirmed, and the Legislative Assembly in the next Parliament again passes the Bill with or without any amendment which has been made or agreed to by the Legislative Council, the Bill shall, if the Legislative Council rejects or fails to pass it or passes it with any amendment to which the Legislative Assembly does not agree, be presented to the Governor for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure thereon.

5c. section shall not be deemed to be an amendment of the Bill.

(4) If a Bill which appropriates revenue or moneys for the ordinary annual services of the Government becomes an Act under the provisions of this section, any provision in such Act dealing with any matter other than such appropriation shall be of no effect.

(5) If a Bill imposing taxation becomes an Act under the provisions of this section any provisions in such Act dealing with any matter other than the imposition of taxation shall be of no effect.

5D. Any reference in section 5A, 5B, or 5C of this Act to the imposition of taxation shall be read as including a reference to the repeal, remission, alteration, or regulation of taxation.

"(2) The Council may in any public way erect island refuges, public conveniences, fountains, monuments, statues and the like in such manner as in the opinion of the council will not unduly interfere with public convenience or access to private premises.

"(3) The Council may concur with any other authority in setting apart any part of a public way as a safety zone at a tramway stoppingplace or at any other place on the way where a safety zone is required for the protection of the public.

"(4) The powers conferred by this section shall be exercised only

with the approval of the Minister."

Resolved,—That towards raising the Supply to be granted to His Majesty, in lieu of the tax levied under the Family Endowment Act, 1927-28, at the percentage declared by the Finance (Family Endowment Tax) Act, 1929, there shall be charged, levied, paid and collected quarterly under the Family Endowment Act, 1927-1929, after the first day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirty, and in each succeeding year at the times and in the manner prescribed by regulations made under that Act, and subject to the exemptions in that Act contained, from all employers for the use of His Majesty and for credit of the Family Endowment Fund contributions upon the total amount of wages paid by such employers to their employees during the periods, after such date, prescribed by regulations made under the said Act, at the percentage following, that is to say—one per centum.

Where an employer is either the Crown in right of the State of New South Wales in connection with any industrial undertaking, or a statutory authority representing the Crown in such right, prescribed by the regulations made under the Family Endowment Act, 1927-1929, there shall be paid to the Family Endowment Fund out of the funds of the industrial undertaking in Special Deposits Account or out of the funds of the said statutory authority as directed by the Governor such sum as is equivalent to the amount which the employer would have paid if liable to taxation. And any sum so payable may be paid upon the warrant of the Governor and without any further appropriation than this Act.

- (6.) Resolved,—That towards raising the Supply to be granted to His Majesty, there shall be charged, levied, collected, and paid annually income-tax in respect of the taxable income derived by any company during the year ended on the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, or such other period as may be accepted by the Commissioner of Taxation in lieu thereof and during each subsequent income year, as follows:—
 - (i) On the taxable income of every New South Wales company if the taxable income of the company does not exceed four thousand five hundred pounds, the rate of tax per pound of the taxable income of the company shall, except as is hereinafter specifically provided, be according to the following scale, that is to say:

If the taxable income of the Company—	The rate of tax per pound sterling of the taxable income shall be—
Does not exceed five hundred pounds	Twenty-four pence.
Exceeds five hundred pounds and does not exceed one thousand pounds.	
Exceeds one thousand pounds and does not exceed one thousand five hundred pounds.	Twenty-six pence.
Exceeds one thousand five hundred pounds and does not exceed two thousand pounds.	Twenty-seven pence.
Exceeds two thousand pounds and does not exceed two thousand five hundred pounds.	Twenty-eight pence.
Exceeds two thousand five hundred pounds and does not exceed three thousand pounds.	Twenty-nine pence.
Exceeds three thousand pounds and does not exceed three thousand five hundred pounds.	Thirty pence.
Exceeds three thousand five hundred pounds and does not exceed four thousand pounds.	Thirty-one pence.
Exceeds four thousand pounds and does not exceed four thousand five hundred pounds.	Thirty-two pence.

(ii) On the taxable income of every mutual life assurance company the rate of tax per pound of the taxable income of the company shall be twenty-four pence.

(iii) On the taxable income of a company (other than a mutual life assurance company) carrying on the business of life assurance in the State, the rates of income tax shall be as follow:—

(a) on so much of that part of the taxable income of the company which has been derived from its life assurance business as bears the same proportion to such part of the taxable income as the amount of the profits divided for the same income year amongst the life assurance policy-holders of the company bears to the total profits of the company's life assurance business for the same income year, the rate of income tax shall be twentyfour pence per pound, and

(b) On the remainder of the taxable income of the company the rate of income tax shall be thirty-three pence per pound.

(iv) On every pound of the interest paid or credited by a company to any non-resident person or foreign company on money raised by debentures of the company and used in the State of New South Wales or on money lodged at interest in the said State with the company, the rate of tax shall be eighteen pence.

(v) Except as hereinbefore in this resolution specifically provided, on the taxable income of every New South Wales company and on the taxable income of every foreign company the rate of tax shall be thirty-three pence for every pound of the taxable income.

And that, for the purposes of this resolution, the following expressions in inverted commas shall bear the meanings respectively set opposite thereto:—

"Company" includes all bodies or associations, corporate or unincorporate, but does not include partnerships.

"Foreign Company" means a company not being a New South Wales company.

"Income year" means the year beginning on the first day of July and ending on the thirtieth day of June (or such other period as may be accepted by the Commissioner of Taxation), during which the income in question was derived.

"Mutual life assurance company" means a life assurance company none of the divisible profits of which are payable to persons other than

policy-holders.

"New South Wales Company" means a company of which the head office or the principal place of business is in New South Wales; or a company incorporated under the Companies Act, 1899, or any other Act of the Parliament of New South Wales, wherever its head office or principal place of business may be.

"Taxable income" means the amount of gross income (less income exempt from income-tax) remaining after all the deductions allowed by law

have been made.

The House met pursuant to adjournment. Mr. Speaker took the Chair.

1. The Question of Unemployment:—Mr. Lang presented a Petition from the Labour Council of New South Wales and its constituent trade union organisations, representing that the present abnormal growth of unemployment which was resulting in widespread poverty, disease, and premature death amongst the community could not be rightly ascribed to lack of energy or of skill on the part of the workers, and quoting statistics to show that the unemployment which at present existed in New South Wales, was worse than ever before experienced in the State, and urging that the available labour be utilised to develop our natural resources; also that curtailment of expenditure, retrenchment, and employment of prison labour only intensified the existing evil, and enumerating certain proposals as an alternative scheme for the payment by the Government of basic-wage rates to all unemployed workers, and praying for the passage of legislation to enable Petitioners' proposals to be carried into effect.

Petition received.

At the request of Mr. Lang, the Petition, by direction of Mr. Speaker, was read by the Clerk.

2. Admission of Strangers—Conduct of the Police Towards a Certain Deputation Appointed to Wait Upon the Leader of the Opposition:—Mr. Speaker stated that, with regard to the complaint of the Honorable Member, Mr. Lang, that a deputation which had been arranged to meet him on the 26th February, had not been allowed to do so, and that one member of the deputation had been insulted and assaulted by a police officer, he (Mr. Speaker) had asked the Commissioner of Police for a report on the matter, and he had been furnished with the follow-reply (omitting formal parts):—

"In reply to your letter of the 26th instant, relative to an occurrence in "the vicinity of Parliament House yesterday afternoon, I beg to inform you "that the police had information in regard to a proposed procession, permission "for which had been refused, to Parliament House, and steps were accordingly "taken to see that the House was adequately protected. They also had information that some 200 tickets of admission to Parliament House were missing.

"About 3.30 p.m. some 200 persons went along Macquarie-street, not in "the most orderly manner, from the direction of King-street. They were pre"ceded by what was said to be their deputation. All arrived simultaneously at
"the entrance gates to Parliament House, obviously with the intention of
"entering. The northern and southern gates had been closed by the police, and
"the centre gate was left open for the purpose of permitting the deputation to
"enter without interruption, but, in consequence of some of the men inter"mingling with the deputation, it was quite impossible at that moment to
differentiate between them. The men surged around the entrance gate, and
one, Harry David Metheringham, who made use of indecent language, was
"arrested. He was incited to resist by another man, who was also arrested.

"The officer in charge of the police at Parliament House informed me "that the deputation referred to was not wilfully interfered with by the police, "and neither is it true that he (Inspector Weir) in any way interfered with "Mr. H. Denford or with Mr. W. Bright. The Inspector has also personally "assured me that he did not insult or assault Mr. Denford. Apparently they became mixed up in the melce that ensued while the two offenders were being "arrested. The police did not use any more force than was necessary to suppress "the disorderly scenes created in front of the entrance gate. The Inspector further states that at no time did he challenge the right of the deputation to "see Mr. Lang, other than to ask that the persons who formed the deputation be "indicated and that the number be reduced from twenty to not more than six.

"As a matter of fact, I understand that it has been the usual practice to admit not more than three when such a deputation visits Parliament "House."

In view of this report, Mr. Speaker said he felt that there was no further action that he could take in the matter.

He pointed out that the circumstances on Wednesday last were somewhat abnormal, inasmuch as—from information he had himself received—there was reasonable ground for apprehending some demonstration of violence at the entrance to the House. He had accordingly instructed the police to take reasonable precautions to prevent such occurrence, although he was quite unaware of any such thing as a deputation waiting upon the Leader of the Opposition.

Mr. Speaker further stated that the whole question of admission of strangers to Parliament House was one which was fraught with very grave difficulties. Members of Parliament, including Ministers, constantly infringed the Standing Orders relating to the admission of strangers to the precincts of the House. While he recognised the necessity for some elasticity in the application of those Standing Orders, which, if rigidly applied, would lead to considerable hardship and inconvenience to Members generally and to their constituents, he would ask Honorable Members—in their own interests—to abstain as far as possible from introducing strangers into parts of the House other than those set apart for strangers, or rooms specially allocated to Ministers, the Leader of the Opposition, or party officials.

So far as deputations were concerned, while he recognised that, in principle, there was no distinction between a Minister or a Member interviewing two or three constituents desirous of seeing him in the precincts of the House on legitimate public business, and meeting a deputation consisting of a considerable number of persons, he would carnestly ask that the comparatively recent innovation of receiving deputations, in the ordinary sense, be discontinued or resorted to only in cases of extreme urgency.

He said that he had already expressed the opinion that the accommodation for strangers desirous of bona fide interviewing Members of this House was totally inadequate. Plans had been prepared for additional accommodation, but he understood the matter had been held up owing to financial stringency.

He pointed out that under no circumstances should strangers be admitted to party rooms, and he asked Honorable Members, in their own interests, to co-operate with him in preserving the rights and privileges of Members of Parliament so far as concerns the use and enjoyment of the Parliamentary premises.

 - "'He said: I do not propose to occupy the attention of the House for very long in moving the second reading of this Bill. The reasons for the introduction of the measure are sufficiently clear, if not to this House, at any rate to the public. The reasons are clear to everybody who recognises the present economic position of the State.
 - "'Honorable Members:
 - "'Mr. Speaker: Order!
 - "'Mr. Bavin: I may tell Honorable Members that if they do not wish to listen to me I do not wish to address them.
 - "'An Honorable Member: We do not care!
 - "'Mr. Speaker: Order!
 - "'Mr. Bavin: I have no doubt Honorable Members will be very glad-
 - "' Honorable Members:

I have seen descriptions of the occurrence which would produce the impression that the scene lasted for an hour instead of less than two minutes. and that the disorder was a hundred times greater than actually was the case."

BIRDS AND ANIMALS PROTECTION (AMENDMENT) BILL.

Schedule of the amendments referred to in Message of 8th April, 1930.

Page 5, clause 8, line 30. After "Minister" insert "The prescribed fee shall be payable for any such permission."

Page 7, clause 10. At end of line 12 insert:

- "22B. Every penalty imposed by or under this Act or the regulations made thereunder in the case of any person committing an offence shall extend and apply also to any person—
 - (a) who causes the commission of the offence;
 - (b) by whose order or direction the offence is committed; or
 - (c) who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the commission of the offence."
- Page 7. Omit clause 11, insert new clause as follows:-
 - "Section twenty-four of the Principal Act is omitted, and the following section is inserted in lieu thereof:—
 - "24. (1) Any person who uses or has in his possession with intent to use potassium cyanide, or sodium cyanide, or a mixture of potassium and sodium cyanide for the destruction or attempted destruction of any bird or animal, whether a protected bird or animal or a scheduled bird or animal shall, unless he is exempted by the regulations and complies with duly prescribed conditions attached to such exemption, be guilty of an offence.
 - (2) Any person who uses or has in his possession with intent to use any poison other than potassium cyanide or sodium cyanide or a mixture of potassium and sodium cyanide for the destruction or attempted destruction of any protected bird or animal shall be guilty of an offence.
 - (3) Any person who is guilty of an offence against this section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, and shall, in addition to such penalty, be liable at the discretion of the court before which he is convicted to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months.
 - (4) Any potassium cyanide or sodium cyanide, or a mixture of potassium and sodium cyanide, or other poison found in the possession of a person offending against this section shall on his conviction be liable to be forfeited by the court and to be disposed of as the court may direct.
 - (5) In any prosecution for an offence against this section proof that potassium cyanide, or sodium cyanide, or a mixture of potassium and sodium cyanide, or other poison was in the possession of the person charged, shall be prima facie evidence that he had it in his possession in contravention of this section."
- Page 9. Add the following new clause to follow clause 14:-
 - "15. Section six of the Principal Act is amended by inserting in subsection two next after the word 'animal' where secondly occurring the following words: 'or who, during such open season, fails to comply with any prescribed condition or restriction relating to the taking or killing of any protected bird or animal, or to the use of any gun, explosive, dog, net, or instrument or means whatsoever for the purpose of taking or killing any protected bird or animal."

The Legislative Council having this day agreed to the Bill, intituled "An Act to reduce the allowances to Members of the Legislative Assembly and the salaries of Ministers of the Crown and of certain other persons; to amend the Constitution Act, 1902, and certain other Acts; to repeal the Parliamentary Allowances and Salaries Act, 1925; and for purposes connected therewith,"—returns the same to the Legislative Assembly without amendment.

The Temporary Chairman also reported that the Committee had come to a resolution, which was read, as follows:—

Resolved,—That towards raising the Supply to be granted to His Majesty in lieu of the contributions required to be charged, levied, paid, and collected in pursuance of the Family Endowment Act, 1927-28, and the Finance (Family Endowment Tax) Act, 1929, upon wages paid after the thirtieth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, there shall be charged, levied, paid, and collected contributions as follows, that is to say:—
- (a) There shall be charged, levied, paid, and collected under the Family Endowment Act, 1927-28, at the times and in the manner prescribed by regulations made under that Act, and subject to the exemptions in that Act conlained, from all employers for the use of His Majesty and for credit of the Family Endowment Fund, contributions upon the total amount of wages paid by such employers to their employees during the period commencing on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, and ending on the nineteenth day of December in that year, both days inclusive, at the percentage following, that is to say, two per centum. And where an employer is either the Crown in right of the State of New South Wales or a statutory authority representing the Crown in such right there shall be paid to the Family Endowment Fund out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund or out of the funds of the said statutory authority as may be directed by the Governor such sum as is equivalent to the amount which the employer would have paid under this paragraph if liable to taxation. And any sum so payable may be paid upon the warrant of the Governor and without any further appropriation than the Act to give effect to this resolution.
- (b) There shall be charged, levied, paid, and collected under the Family Endowment Act, 1927-1930, at the times and in the manner prescribed by regulations made under that Act, and subject to the exemptions in that Act contained, from all employers for the use of His Majesty and for credit of the Family Endowment Fund, contributions upon the total amount of wages paid by such employers to their employees during the period commencing on the twentieth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, and ending on the thirty-first day of December in that year, both days inclusive, at the percentage following, that is to say, two per centum. And there shall be charged, levied, paid, and collected quarterly under the Family Endowment Act, 1927-1930, after the first day of January in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirty and in each succeeding year at the times and in the manner prescribed by regulations made under that Act, and subject to the exemptions in that Act contained, from all employers for the use of His Majesty and for credit of the Family Endowment Fund contributions upon the total amount of wages paid by such employers to their employees during the periods after such date prescribed by regulations made under the said Act. at the percentage following, that is to say, one per centum. And where the employer is the Crown in right of the State of New South Wales in connection with a prescribed industrial undertaking or with a prescribed statutory body, there shall be paid to the Family Endowment Fund, out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, or out of the funds of the industrial undertaking in Special Deposits Account or otherwise, or out of the funds of the statutory body, as directed by the Governor, such sum as is equivalent to the amount which the employer would have paid if liable to pay contributions under this paragraph. And any sum so payable may be paid upon the warrant of the Governor, and without further appropriation than the Act to give effect to this resolution.

Further, that expressions used in paragraph (a) of the preceding resolution shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in the Family Endowment Act, 1927-28, in all respects as if the Family Endowment (Further Amendment) Act, 1929, and the Family Endowment (Amendment) Act, 1930, had not been passed. And expressions used in paragraph (b) of that resolution shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in the Family Endowment Act, 1927-1930.

Further, that the Finance (Family Endowment Tax Reduction) Act, 1929, be repealed.

On motion of Mr. Stevens, the resolution was agreed to.

7. FINANCE (FAMILY ENDOWMENT TAX) BILL:-

The Legislative Council having had under consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message, dated 13th March, 1930, requesting its concurrence in certain amendments made by the Assembly in the Guardianship of Infants Bill—

Disagrees from the amendment on page 2, clause 3, line 10, which after "jurisdiction" inserts "or the judge presiding at any District Court, or a stipendiary or police magistrate presiding in a court under the Justices Act," and from the further amendments in the same clause which after "court," wherever occurring, insert "or the judge or stipendiary or police magistrate aforesaid," because—There is no machinery provided in this Bill or in any Act for the proper enforcement of any order made, nor is there any procedure prescribed. Elaborate amendment of the District Courts Act and the Justices Act would be necessary. Further, the power proposed to be given by the amendments is unlimited—which is undesirable.

Agrees to the amendment on page 2, clause 3, line 30, which after "reasonable" inserts "No such order shall be made under this subsection in respect of the maintenance of an infant over the age of sixteen years, and any order made in respect of the maintenance of an infant under that age shall be limited to maintenance until he completes that age," but proposes to amend the amendment by inserting before "No," at the commencement, the words "Except where the infant is physically or mentally incapable of self-support."

Agrees to the amendment on page 3, clause 3, which, after line 15,

inserts—

"(8) The fact that a parent contemplates leaving the jurisdiction shall not of itself be regarded by the court or the judge or stipendiary or police magistrate aforesaid as a reason for denying such parent the custody of the child or depriving such parent thereof, if the court or the judge or stipendiary or police magistrate aforesaid is satisfied that the welfare of the child will best be served by allowing such parent to have or retain such custody," but proposes to amend the amendment by omitting the words "or the judge or stipendiary or police magistrate aforesaid," wherever occurring.

 - (c) Threepence in the pound of the income from employment derived by every person other than a company during the income year commencing on the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and thirty.

The expressions in this resolution shall have the meanings ascribed thereto in the Prevention and Relief of Unemployment Act, 1930.

I always think that the Mother of Parliaments maintains the dignity and courtesy of our institutions at their very highest standard when it is called upon, or desires of its own volition, to lay aside for a moment its legislative duties and deal with the individual. I think it is another bond of Empire that Dominion and State Parliaments all over the world in no way fall short of their great prototype.

While I shall always strive to maintain the high traditions of the office of Governor, I want to do more than that. I want to get to know New South Wales and its people, its problems, its public men and its legislators, and to gain their friendship. - 5. Public Service (Salaries Reduction) Bill:—The Order of the Day having been read,-

Mr. Speaker said he regretted that at this late hour of the Session he found it necessary to call attention to the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Honorable Members would remember that on the 6th December, 1928, he made some lengthy observations on the Legislative Council's amendments in the Income Tax (Management) Bill, and that he subsequently submitted to Professor Berridale Keith, the eminent authority on constitutional law and Parliamentary practice, a copy of those observations, together with a full copy of the debate on the Bill and all the relevant documents and Acts of Parliament.

Professor Keith had replied on the 3rd May, 1929-omitting formal

parts-as follows:-

"I have to express to you my sincere appreciation of your kindness in "sending me your letter of the 20th of March regarding your observations on "the 6th December, respecting the amendments made by the Legislative Council "in the Income Tax (Management) Bill. Your remarks appear to me to set out "the true position in a specially effective form, and I shall be glad to be able to "make use of your views when next commenting on the relations between the "two Houses in New South Wales. There is far too prevalent a spirit here, as "overseas, to disregard the importance of due regard for constitutional rules as "an essential safeguard for the maintenance of democracy."

He did not think it necessary for him to again review the whole constitutional position, as he had done so on the occasion to which he referred.

There were three amendments made by the Legislative Council in the Bill now before the House. As to the amendment on page 4, he might say at once that this was one of the amendments which had, from time to time, been accepted by this House in money Bills, as being an amendment which made clear, or more precise, the intention of the Assembly as expressed in the Bill as passed by this House.

As to the other amendments, he was of opinion that the Legislative Council had again infringed the privileges of this House. He wished to say that he totally dissented from the view which had been recently expressed in another place, that the Legislative Council had the right to amend any Bill, except an Appropriation Bill.

He strongly urged that in order to prevent the recurrence of these unpleasant differences, the relations between the two Houses in regard to money Bills should be definitely regulated by Statute, as was done in England in the

year 1911.

He did not wish to say anything further, except that it was his duty, ascustodian of the privileges of this House, to call attention to these amendments. Having done so, he now left the matter in the hands of Honorable Members.

Mr. Bavin said the Government did not regard this Bill in the nature of a taxation Bill. For this reason, and having regard to the late hour of the Session, as well as to the fact that this Bill represented a vital measure in the policy of the Government, he saw no reason why the amendments should not be accepted, and he would ask the House to agree to them.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair, and the Chairman reported that the Committee had agreed to the Council's amendments.
