1. OPENING OF THE SESSION:—The House met at Twelve o'clock at Noon, pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing the date the Twenty-third day of August, 1950.

Mr. Speaker took the Chair.

Mr. Speaker offered the Prayer.

The Clerk, by direction of Mr. Speaker, read a copy of the said Proclamation, as follows:—

6. ELECTION PETITION—ELECTORAL DISTRICT OF DARLINGHURST:—Mr. Speaker informed the House that the Clerk had received from the Prothonotary a copy of the Election Petition from Charles Patrick O'Kelly against the return of the Honourable Francis Joseph Finnan as Member of the Legislative Assembly for Darlinghurst.

By direction of Mr. Speaker, the Clerk laid the document on the Table. Referred by Sessional Order to the Printing Committee.

7. 8. Pro Formâ BILL—LAW OF EVIDENCE BILL:—Mr. James McGirr presented a Bill, intituled "A Bill to amend the Law of Evidence," and moved pro formâ, That this Bill be now read a first time.

Question put and passed.

Bill read a first time.

9. The Governor's Opening Speech:—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had this day attended the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber when His Excellency the Governor was pleased to deliver an Opening Speech to both Houses of Parliament. For greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, which he laid upon the Table of the House, and ordered that it be recorded in the Votes and Proceedings, as follows:—

HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

To-day we open the Second Session of the Thirty-sixth Parliament of the State of New South Wales, and it is the first meeting of Members called for the consideration of legislation and other important public business since the General Elections held earlier this year.

I wish to welcome the new Members to Parliament and trust that their experience and active interest in the welfare of the people of this State will prove of great value to the deliberations and public business in which they will take their part.

As members of the British Commonwealth of Nations, we note with pleasure the great improvement in the health of His Majesty the King, and the announcement of the possibility of Their Majesties honouring Australia with a visit in 1952. We sincerely trust that this visit will eventuate, and that the people of this State will have the opportunity of personally displaying the loyalty and affection in which the Royal Family are held.

In the period since I last addressed you, the State has lost a most distinguished Australian by the death of the Honourable Sir Frederick Jordan, who had occupied the office of Lieutenant-Governor since 1938.

In the same period members of this Parliament whose passing we have also mourned were the Honourable Joseph Authony Bodkin, a Member of the Legislative Council, and Messrs. William Joseph Carlton, Brice Mutton, and George Walter Harry Noble, Members of the Legislative Assembly.

Early this year His Majesty the King was pleased to appoint as Lieutenant-Governor the Honourable Kenneth Whistler Street, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New South Wales. We welcome that appointment as a recognition of his outstanding ability and of the services he has rendered to this State.

Next year Australia will commemorate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the establishment of the Commonwealth, and the Government is collaborating with the Commonwealth Government in the organisation of appropriate celebrations in this State.

Honourable Members of the Legislative Council, and Members of the Legislative Assembly,—

It is with deep sympathy and regret that I have witnessed the severe hardships and losses sustained by primary producers, along with the inhabitants of many towns, as a result of this second year of excessive rainfall and disastrous floods. The organisation and financing of measures for the relief and rehabilitation of those affected has received, and is continuing to receive, the urgent attention of my Ministers. Measures designed to minimise and prevent such disasters in the future are being given special attention.

My Ministers believe that the high level of prosperity now being enjoyed by the people of this State will be maintained during the ensuing period. The level of employment has remained very high, and those engaged in the primary industries have enjoyed another year of general prosperity, due to a continuance of high prices paid for their products in the markets of the world, combined with excellent growing seasons.

It is with deep regret that we have seen a deterioration of the international situation; and my Ministers are engaged in taking necessary steps, of a precautionary character, to ensure that this State shall be prepared to meet contingencies if the situation should, unhappily, worsen.

In the sphere of economic policy, priority is still being accorded to the task of providing homes for the people. Considerable progress has already been made, and the number of new homes completed last year surpassed the previous record achieved in 1937-38. Two abnormally wet winters have interfered with noth the production of building materials and the work of home-building; but, in spite of adverse conditions, the rate of building is still being increased. I am advised, moreover, that further relief will be afforded through the importation of large numbers of prefabricated homes from overseas.

The welfare of this State is very largely dependent upon industry and transport receiving adequate supplies of coal and electricity. The output of the coal-mining industry, though still short of requirements, has been more satisfactory during the current year. My Ministers assure me that new coal-winning machinery is being introduced as rapidly as practicable, while at the same time many improvements are being effected in the conditions under which coal miners live and work. As regards the generation of electricity, though supplies are still short, I am informed that there has been a better organisation of our available resources, and also a more equitable system of distribution, resulting partly from the new form of control recently established. Very large additions to our total generating capacity will be made during the next twelve months.

In the field of education, my Ministers are doing everything possible both to expand the accommodation of the schools and also to introduce improved educational methods. They are aware, however, that many important further

changes are necessary if public education in this State is to be kept abreast of world progress; and they are greatly concerned at the limitations placed upon educational development by reason of the State's dependence on the Commonwealth for necessary funds.

I have previously referred to the fact that, in the country areas, our primary producers are still enjoying a period of unprecedented prosperity due to the high prices obtained for their products in overseas markets. It is encouraging to learn that most of them are taking advantage of their present high incomes to modernise the equipment of their farms and stations, and to purchase more farm machinery. These measures should place our farmers and pastoralists in a much stronger position and enable them to meet any fall in export prices without again experiencing such difficulties as they have known at times in the past.

My Ministers are concentrating their efforts upon overcoming the greatest single obstacle to further development of the inland regions—namely, the unreliability of their rainfall. The programme of constructing a whole system of water-storage dams throughout the State is being pressed forward with all the labour and machinery and materials available. It is an enormous undertaking which to complete will occupy our energies for a decade or longer; but each new dam constructed, each new reservoir filled, means that constant water is assured for one additional region. Further, those new dams will have the effect not only of conserving water for release in years of drought; but they are intended also to hold back the water in times of excessive rainfall and thus to remove the danger of future damaging floods. Only by such measures as these, in the opinion of my Ministers, can this State achieve greater production of the foods and materials which will be required to sustain our future population.

In the field of social welfare and community improvements, my advisers are now taking the necessary administrative steps to give effect to a number of undertakings included in the Government's policy. The proposals affect many different sections of the people and some of the more important matters are as follows:—

Increasing from 50 per cent. to 75 per cent. the subsidy towards the capital cost of building and equipping Baby Health Centres.

Further assisting free Day Nurseries and free Kindergartens for children of pre-school age.

Subsidising local authorities to the extent of one half of the capital cost of buildings, equipment and furnishings for women's rest centres at selected shopping centres in the metropolitan area and in cities and towns in the country.

. Subsidising local authorities to the extent of one half the rates owing by age and invalid pensioners which are written off by Councils.

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

The budget for the financial year now current will shortly be placed before you and you will be asked to provide for the public services of the State. A carefully planned programme of public works and other services has been submitted to and endorsed by the Australian Loan Council and the estimates of expenditure and amounts proposed to be voted from the General Loan Account for those works and services will also be submitted for your consideration.

Honourable Members of the Legislative Council, and Members of the Legislative Assembly.—

During the Session you will be invited to give consideration to a number of important measures. In the forefront of this programme will be a Bill to amend the Constitution Act to ensure that the duration of the Legislative Assembly cannot be extended beyond three years without a Referendum. This legislation is considered by my advisers to be desirable as providing an additional constitutional safeguard to ensure the preservation of our democratic system of Government.

A further important measure will be one to provide for the establishment of the Hunter Valley Conservation Trust for the purpose of mitigating the disastrous effects of floods in the Hunter River Valley.

You will be asked to consider Bills to provide for the establishment of a Parole Board to advise on matters relating to the release of prisoners and to bring the Prisons Act up to date.

A Bill to provide for an improvement in the present methods of dealing with sexual offenders will also be submitted to you.

Because of the increase since the passing of the Medical Practitioners Act in 1938 in the number of persons arriving in this country holding medical qualifications obtained elsewhere than in some part of the British Empire, it is proposed to submit for your consideration a measure to remove the existing restrictions on the number of such medical men who may be registered in any one year, but it will still be necessary, before registration is granted, for the fourth, fifth and sixth year courses at the University to be completed.

The Government proposes to establish a Suitors' Fund from which any person who loses a case on appeal will be entitled to be re-imbursed his costs of resisting the appeal and a Bill to give effect to this proposal will be placed before you.

The loss of life and the injuries sustained as a result of road accidents is causing the Government concern, and it is proposed to introduce an amendment of the Crimes Act to provide a greater deterrent for reckless and intoxicated drivers of motor vehicles.

A number of other measures will also be placed before you.

I now declare this Second Session of the Thirty-sixth Parliament open, and trust that the blessing of Divine Providence may attend your deliberations.

Mr. McMahon moved, and Mr. Connor seconded the motion, That the following Address-in-Reply to the Speech which His Excellency the Governor has addressed to both Houses of Parliament on opening this Session of the Parliament of New South Wales be now adopted by this House:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

"We, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Members of the "Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled, desire "to express our thanks for Your Excellency's Speech, and to assure you of our "unfeigned attachment to His Most Gracious Majesty's Throne and Person.

"2. We beg to assure Your Excellency that our earnest consideration will "be given to the measures to be submitted to us, and that the necessary provision "for the Public Services will be made in due course.

"3. We join Your Excellency in the hope that, under the guidance of "Divine Providence, our labours may be so directed as to advance the best "interests of all sections of the community."

Mr. Treatt moved, That this Debate be adjourned until Tuesday next.

 - (c) abolish the Transport Commission and place each of the Transport Undertakings under independent authorities freed from political interference in administration.
 - "(3.) That the Government should make a dynamic approach to the problem of industrial production, in particular the production of coal and steel so vital to the efficiency of transport operations."

The Temporary Chairman also reported that the Committee had come to a Resolution which was read as follows:—

(2.) Resolved,-

That towards raising the Supply to be granted to His Majesty there shall be charged, levied, collected and paid for the use of His Majesty, under the provisions of the Motor Vehicles Taxation Management Act, 1949, and the regulations made thereunder, and subject to the exemptions and reductions contained or provided for in that Act, motor vehicles tax upon motor vehicles at the rates set out in or the sums ascertained in accordance with the Schedule to this resolution.

- (Λ) (1) Such tax shall be paid in respect of every motor vehicle the registration or renewal of registration of which takes effect after the commencement of the Act to give effect to this resolution.
 - (2) The motor vehicles tax imposed by the Act to give effect to this resolution shall be in lieu of the tax upon motor vehicles imposed by the Motor Vehicles (Taxation) Act, 1949.

- (B) For the purposes of this resolution-
 - (a) the weight of a trailer shall be ascertained as the gross weight of the trailer (including any article affixed thereto) unladen ready for attachment to a motor vehicle;
 - (b) the weight of a motor vehicle shall be ascertained as the gross weight of the vehicle laden with the tools and accessories usually carried, with such fuel, water, and oil as may be in or upon the motor vehicle, but otherwise unladen;
 - (c) the number of one half-hundredweights nearest to the weight so ascertained or, where the weight so ascertained consists of a number of hundredweights and either one-quarter or threequarters of a hundredweight, the number of one half-hundredweights next below the weight so ascertained, shall be the weight upon which the tax imposed by the Act to give effect to this resolution is to be paid;
 - (d) a motor vehicle shall be deemed to be of British manufacture if proof is furnished to the satisfaction of the Commissioner that—
 - (i) of the total cost of the vehicle at the port of shipment to the Commonwealth of Australia a percentage of not less than ninety-seven and one half per centum is represented by expenditure upon material produced within the British Empire and upon labour within such Empire; or
 - (ii) where the vehicle is constructed in the Commonwealth of Australia, of the total cost of the vehicle (excluding the cost of any second-hand material used in its construction) a percentage of not less than ninety-seven and one half per centum is represented by expenditure upon material produced within the British Empire and upon labour within such Empire.
- (C) The terms used in this resolution shall have the meanings ascribed thereto respectively in the Motor Vehicles Taxation Management Act, 1949.
- (D) The Act to give effect to this resolution shall commence upon a day to be appointed by the Governor and notified by proclamation published in the Gazette.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Where registration or renewal of registration is effected for a period of one

- 1. (a) Any motor vehicle (not being a motor omnibus or motor cycle) which has pneumatic tyres on all wheels—at the rate of 3s. 2d. per half-hundredweight of its weight.
- (b) Any motor omnibus which has pneumatic tyres on all wheels—at the rate of 4s. 10d. per half-hundredweight of its weight.
- 2. (a) Any motor vehicle (not being a motor omnibus or motor cycle) which has non-pneumatic tyres on all or any of the wheels—at the rate of 4s. 0d. per half-hundredweight of its weight.
- (b) Any motor omnibus which has non-pneumatic tyres on all or any of the wheels—at the rate of 6s. 3d. per half-hundredweight of its weight.
 - 3. (a) Any motor cycle without a side-car—£1 5s. 6d.
 - (b) Any motor cycle with a side-car—£2 5s. 0d.
- 4. Any other motor vehicle—at the rate of 4s, 0d. per half-hundredweight of its weight.
- 5. Any motor vehicle which is of British manufacture—at the rate applicable in accordance with the scale set out in paragraphs 1 to 4, both inclusive, of this Part of this Schedule, less a deduction of—
 - (a) sixpence per half-hundredweight of its weight in the case of any motor vehicle other than a motor cycle;
 - (b) one shilling and sixpence in the case of a motor cycle without a side-car;
 - (c) two shillings and sixpence in the case of a motor cycle with a side-car.

- 6. Any primary producer's vehicle (being a motor lorry or tractor)—at a rate equivalent to half the rate that would have been applicable to the vehicle under paragraphs 1 to 5, both inclusive, of this Part of this Schedule had this paragraph not been enacted.
- 7. Notwithstanding anything contained in paragraphs 1 to 6, both inclusive, of this Part of this Schedule, the amount of tax on—
 - (a) a tractor (not being a primary producer's vehicle) shall not in any case exceed £16 17s. 6d.;
 - (b) a tractor (being a primary producer's vehicle) shall not in any case exceed £8 8s. 6d.;
 - (c) a motor vehicle (including a trailer drawn thereby) used solely for mining purposes in the Western Division of the State and weighing more than five tons shall be the amount which would be payable as tax if the weight of the vehicle (including the trailer) were five tons.
- 8. Any motor vehicle with a compression ignition engine—double the sum which would have been payable in respect of the vehicle under paragraphs 1 to 7, both inclusive, of this Part of this Schedule had this paragraph not been enacted.

PART II.

Where registration or renewal of registration is effected for a period of three months.

A sum equivalent to twenty-seven and one-half per centum of the amount which, ascertained in accordance with Part I of this Schedule, would have been payable as motor vehicles tax upon the motor vehicle if registration or renewal of registration had been effected for a period of one year.

PART III

Where registration or renewal of registration is effected for any period other than a period referred to in Part I or Part II of this Schedule.

A sum to be determined by dividing the amount which, ascertained in accordance with Part I of this Schedule, would have been payable as motor vehicles tax upon the motor vehicle if registration or renewal of registration had been effected for a period of one year by 365 and then multiplying the quotient by the number of days in the period for which the motor vehicle is registered.

PART IV.

Where any sum ascertained in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this Schedule leaves an amount of pence remaining when expressed in shillings or in pounds and shillings, the sum shall be adjusted to the nearest sixpence: Provided that—

- (a) if such amount is threepence it shall be omitted;
- (b) if such amount is ninepence it shall be regarded as if it were sixpence. On Motion of Mr. Sheahan the Resolution was agreed to.



Disagrees to the amendment, because fundamentally the proposed amendment contravenes the provisions of section 17s of the Constitution Act, 1902, especially as, in this particular case, the proposed exemption from the operation of that section is in respect of a Member of Parliament who would become the holder of an office of profit under the Crown, the duties of which office would comprise the whole or substantially the whole of his employment.

Furthermore, the debate upon the amendment indicated that the Assembly was not in agreement with the principle of granting exemptions generally from the provisions of section 17B of the Constitution Act, 1902.

And the Assembly requests the concurrence of the Legislative Council in its disagreement from the Council's amendment in the Bill.

Adjournment under Standing Order No. 49:-Mr. Speaker stated that he had received from the Honourable Member for North Sydney, Mr. Geraghty, a notice, under the 49th Standing Order, that he desired to move the adjournment of the House, to discuss a specific matter of recent occurrence, viz.:-"His Honour Judge Berne's recent pronouncement that breweries were contravening section 41 of the Liquor Act, 1912."

And the motion for the adjournment of the House not being supported by five other Honourable Members, it could not be proceeded with.

- 6. Supply (Estimates, 1950-1951):-The Order of the Day having been read, Mr. Speaker left the Chair and the House resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.
 - Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair and the Chairman reported progress.
- 7. Incorrect Press Reports of Proceedings in House:-Mr. Speaker said that he wished to inform the House that he had deliberately sought the interruption of the debate in Committee of Supply in order to bring under the notice of the House some flagrant misstatements which had appeared in the afternoon's editions of both the Sun and Daily Mirror newspapers relating to the proceedings which had taken place in the Chamber to-day.

The Sun stated—in its late final extra—in large black headlines "Government Sidetracks Tied Hotel Move—Debate Blocked" while the Daily Mirror—also in its late final extra-headed its news item with similarly large headlines which read "Government Sidesteps Hotel Vote-Geraghty's Move Fails." The Sun proceeded to aggravate its headline statements by declaring that Mr. Geraghty had given notice of an urgency motion that the Government should introduce legislation to provide for releases of tied houses to private owners, hotels to come within the jurisdiction of the Fair Rents Court, and brewers to be restricted to brewing beer. Mr. Speaker said that he wished to point out that no such urgency motion had been brought before the Legislative Assembly to-day or at any time, and that that statement by the Sun newspaper was a fabrication.

In giving the call to the Minister for Labour and Industry Mr. Speaker said $\tilde{\mathcal{E}}_{i}$ he had followed the practice of the House in giving priority to a Minister to which on that occasion he had been entitled. It was not the Speaker's province to arrange the business of the House, but it was the prerogative of

the Government to order its business as it thought fit.

The fact that the urgency motion relating to the Industrial Arbitration (Basic Wage) Amendment Bill had been agreed to by the House without a division had indicated that the urgency of the proposal had been recognised. The Sun's statement proceeded to declare that Mr. Geraghty had then taken steps "to have his motion discussed by resorting to rule 49 of the Standing Orders." That also was a misstatement of fact. As far as Mr. Speaker was aware, there was no relationship whatever between the action of the Government in proceeding to bring before the House an item of urgent business, viz., the Industrial Arbitration (Basic Wage) Amendment Bill, and a perfectly ordinary procedure which had been adopted by the Honourable Member for North Sydney in taking the necessary steps to bring before the House a motion of adjournment under the 49th Standing Order. This notice, in accordance with the Standing Order, had been handed to him by Mr. Geraghty in Mr. Speaker's room before 10.30 o'clock this morning, and in the ordinary course would not, under the provisions of that Standing Order, have been entertained by the House until Formal Business had been disposed of.

The Daily Mirror had been equally at fault in the presentation of its so-called facts. It stated that when the question of urgency was put, the Opposition called for a division which had resulted in a Government win by 46 to 41. The fact was that no division had been called for on the urgency motion. division which had taken place had been on the question that the Standing Orders be suspended. Similarly, the newspaper's statement that Mr. Geraghty "has already lodged with the Speaker a request for his motion to be brought on as a motion of urgency as soon as the present Bill is finished," was just a piece of imagination on the part of the newspaper reporter and indicated colossal ignorance of Parliamentary procedure. Furthermore, it had also been improper and impertinent for the newspaper to state that "Opposition Members expect the Speaker will rule out Mr. Geraghty's request for the matter to be taken as one of urgency" and it had also been incorrect for that paper to declare that Mr. Geraghty's motion had suggested legislation to provide for "private ownership of hotels, one man one licence" and several other propositions, not one of which had been actually included in his motion, which had been simply "That this House do now adjourn." It was equally incorrect for the Daily Mirror to state that during the debate on the first reading of the "Basic Wage Bill" Mr. Treatt had asked Mr. Finnan to grant an adjournment to enable Mr. Geraghty to move his motion. The absurdity of that statement was indicated by the subsequent fact that when Mr. Geraghty had moved his motion in the ordinary course, not one Member of the Opposition had risen to support his

As Speaker, he had taken the strongest exception to the reports of both newspapers, the misstatements of facts contained in which were calculated to bring both the House and the Chair into disrepute. Not only had he taken the strongest exception to the actions of the two newspapers mentioned in permitting such incorrect and misleading statements to be published, but he felt that in the interests of the House he was bound to issue a warning, that unless this statement was published in full in the next "late final extra" issue of each paper and in a position of prominence corresponding with the position devoted by each paper to to-day's untruthful reports, he would immediately take the necessary steps to exclude the representatives of the offending journal or journals from the Press Gallery, and the Press Rooms, and treat them as Strangers with no greater or lesser privileges than were enjoyed by Strangers. He also would certainly expect the respective editors to take note of his remarks and ensure that any future report by their reporters of the proceedings of this Parliament were in accordance with fact. The actions of both newspapers were to be deplored, as they were entirely contrary to the traditions of Parliament. All Press representatives in attendance at this House had always been treated with the utmost courtesy, and had been accorded privileges which fell little short of those granted Honourable Members. Mr. Speaker therefore asked the newspapers concerned whether they considered their representatives' reports were not calculated, if left uncorrected by him, to undermine our system of democracy and to bring the institution of Parliament into public contempt and ridicule.







Resolved,—That towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty there shall be charged, levied, collected and paid under and subject to the provisions of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920, as amended by subsequent Acts, upon each statement written out pursuant to the Cattle Compensation Act, 1951, in respect of the sale of cattle, stamp duties of the amount hereunder specified for credit of the Cattle Compensation Fund established under the Cattle Compensation Act, 1951:—

For every £1 and also for any fractional part of £1-

- (a) of the amount of the purchase money in respect of one head of cattle sold singly; or
- (b) of the total amount of the purchase money in respect of any number of cattle sold in one lot—

a stamp duty of one penny: Provided that the stamp duty in respect of the amount of the purchase money of any one head of cattle whether sold singly or as part of a lot shall not exceed three shillings; and the owner of the cattle immediately before the sale shall be the person primarily liable for the payment of the duty.

On motion of Mr. Graham, the Resolution was agreed to.

 - (A) (1) Such tax shall be paid in respect of every motor vehicle the registration or renewal of registration of which takes effect after the commencement of the Act to give effect to this resolution.
 - (2) The motor vehicles tax imposed by the Act to give effect to this resolution shall be in lieu of the tax upon motor vehicles imposed by the Motor Vehicles (Taxation) Act, 1950.
 - (B) For the purposes of this resolution-

٠.,

- (a) the weight of a trailer shall be ascertained as the gross weight of the trailer (including any article affixed thereto) unladen ready for attachment to a motor vehicle;
- (b) the weight of a motor vehicle shall be ascertained as the gross weight of the vehicle laden with the tools and accessories usually carried, with such fuel, water, and oil as may be in or upon the motor vehicle, but otherwise unladen;

- (c) the number of one half-hundredweights nearest to the weight so ascertained or, where the weight so ascertained consists of a number of hundredweights and either one-quarter or three-quarters of a hundredweight, the number of one half-hundredweights next below the weight so ascertained, shall be the weight upon which the tax imposed by the Act to give effect to this resolution is to be ascertained.
- (C) The terms used in this resolution shall have the meanings ascribed thereto respectively in the Motor Vehicles Taxation Management Act, 1949, as amended by subsequent Acts.
- (D) The Act to give effect to this resolution shall commence upon a day to be appointed by the Governor and notified by proclamation published in the Gazette.

 - (c) a motor vehicle (including a trailer drawn thereby) used solely for mining purposes in the Western Division of the State and weighing more than five tons shall be the amount which would be payable as tax if the weight of the vehicle (including the trailer) were five tons.
- 7. Any motor vehicle with a compression ignition engine—double the sum which would have been payable in respect of the vehicle under paragraphs 1 to 6, both inclusive, of this Part of this Schedule had this paragraph not been enacted.

PART II.

Where registration or renewal of registration is effected for a period of three months.

A sum equivalent to twenty-seven and one-half per centum of the amount which, ascertained in accordance with Part I of this Schedule, would have been payable as motor vehicles tax upon the motor vehicle if registration or renewal of registration had been effected for a period of one year.

PART III.

Where registration or renewal of registration is effected for any period other than a period referred to in Part I or Part II of this Schedule.

A sum to be determined by dividing the amount which, ascertained in accordance with Part I of this Schedule, would have been payable as motor vehicles tax upon the motor vehicle if registration or renewal of registration had been effected for a period of one year by 365 and then multiplying the quotient by the number of days in the period for which the motor vehicle is registered.

PART IV.

Where any sum ascertained in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this Schedule leaves an amount of pence remaining when expressed in shillings or in pounds and shillings, the sum shall be adjusted to the nearest sixpence: Provided that—

- (a) if such amount is threepence it shall be omitted;
- (b) if such amount is ninepence it shall be regarded as if it were sixpence.

The Governor further informs the Legislative Assembly that on Friday the 8th February, 1952, Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second was duly and lawfully proclaimed by the Grace of God, Queen of This Realm and of all Her other Realms and Territories, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith—whereof public proclamation and due notification were fully and lawfully made within the State of New South Wales on the 8th February, 1952.

Mr. Speaker said that on the Motion of Urgency that had been moved yesterday
by the Honourable Member for North Sydney, the Honourable the AttorneyGeneral, on a Point of Order, had submitted that the motion was out of order.
The Honourable the Leader of the Opposition had spoken against the Point of
Order.

Mr. Speaker said that he hoped Honourable Members would appreciate the position in which he had been placed. On the one hand he had had the submission of a most learned legal and constitutional authority in the legal adviser to the Government, the Honourable the Attorney-General, who, he was sure, had been at that moment honestly and sincerely supporting his Point of Order. On the other hand, Mr. Speaker continued, he had had the equally learned submissions against the Point of Order by the Honourable the Leader of the Opposition.

It would be recalled that immediately prior to the Attorney-General rising to order, he had been compelled to have two Honourable Members of the Opposition ejected from the Chamber, an incident that had greatly disturbed and upset him. He had realised that if the motion had gone to a vote of the House, it would have been defeated because of his action in having had two Honourable Members removed from the Opposition side, and he had further realised that he would then have been guilty of an act of gross partisanship, and one which, as Speaker, he could not have countenanced for a moment.

In his dilemma, and believing that there had been merit in the point taken by the Honourable the Attorney-General, he had upheld his Point of Order.

Mr. Speaker said further that when the incident had passed, and in the calmer atmosphere of his room, he had been poignantly aware that, whilst he had saved himself the odium of partisanship, he had transgressed Standing Order No. 395, and that his position had become quite untenable.

He had thereupon resolved that when the House met to-day, he would admit his error, tell the House that he had been wrong, and say that the motion moved by the Honourable Member for North Sydney had been in order. He had further resolved that he would inform the House that, should the same matter come before him again, he would give a different decision from that which he had given yesterday.

Mr. Speaker added that he had made his mistake under most extenuating circumstances, but he would say that the man who had never made a mistake had never made anything. If, upon making a mistake, he were not man enough to admit it, he would be no man. He had made a mistake. He admitted it.

Whereupon the Honourable Member for North Sydney, Mr. Geraghty, made a Personal Explanation to the House.

BUSINESS UNDISPOSED OF AT THE CLOSE OF THE SESSION.

(PROROGUED, 30rm APRIL, 1952.)

QUESTIONS:-

- Replacement of Hotel Kosciusko:—Mr. Seiffert asked the Colonial Secretary, Minister for Co-operative Societies and Assistant Treasurer:—
 - (1.) Is it a fact that there are more than a thousand men employed by the Snowy Mountains Hydro-electric Authority in the vicinity of the recently destroyed Hotel Kosciusko?
 - (2.) Is it also a fact that, as the Snowy scheme develops, the number of men. employed will increase to possibly five thousand?
 - (3.) Is it also a fact that the Hotel Kosciusko provided amenities for the employees working on a project of great national importance in an isolated and extremely cold area?
 - (4.) Is it further a fact that until a new hotel building is erected many thousands of people will be deprived of a vacation in the snow country and participation in snow sports?
 - (5.) If the answers to (1.), (2.), (3.) and (4.) above are in the affirmative, will he inform the House what steps are being taken to replace the burnt-out hotel and what temporary measures are contemplated to provide the maximum possible-service immediately?
- Quarantine Station at North Head:—Mr. Darby asked the Premier and Colonial.
 Treasurer:—
 - (1.) Is it a fact that the Quarantine Station at North Head in the Manly State Electorate is owned by the State Government?
 - (2.) Is it further a fact that this land is occupied by the Commonwealth-Government at an annual rental of £3,889?
 - (3.) What is the area of the Quarantine Station?
 - (4.) If the answers to (1.) and (2.) above are in the affirmative, will be inform the House (a) when did the Commonwealth take over management of the area and upon what terms; (b) what was the capital value of improvements at the time of taking over by the Commonwealth Government; (c) has any movebeen made by the State Government to request the Commonwealth Government: to move the Quarantine Station elsewhere?
 - (5.) If the answer to (4.) (c) above is in the affirmative, what are the particulars of such requests?
 - (6.) Has any move been made by the State Government to have part of the quarantine area made available for public recreation, used for public hospitals, for suburban development or for other purposes?
 - (7.) If the answer to (6.) above is in the affirmative, what are the particulars of any such proposals?
 - (8.) Is it the policy of the Government to have the Quarantine Station at North Head removed?

- 3. Long-service Leave for Railway Workers:—Mr. Darby asked the Premier and Colonial Treasurer:—
 - (1.) Is it a fact that railway workers in New South Wales obtain three months long-service leave after twenty years?
 - (2.) Is it also a fact that the employees of the Sydney County and City Councils obtain three months leave after each ten years?
 - (3.) Is it further a fact that the employees of the Water Board obtain three months leave at fifteen years and again at twenty years with six weeks every five years thereafter?
 - (4.) Is it a fact that the employees of the Maritime Services Board obtain three months after fifteen years, six months after twenty years and six weeks every five years thereafter?
 - (5.) Is it also a fact that the railway workers in New South Wales are asking for three months for each ten years of service?
 - (6.) If the answers to (1.) to (5.) above are in the affirmative, will be give consideration to introducing legislation to provide for three months for each ten years of service for railway workers?
- 4. Public Works:-Mr. Black asked the Premier and Colonial Treasurer:-
 - (1.) Is it a fact that last August the Australian Loan Council authorised the borrowing of £64,000,000 for New South Wales Government loan works during
 - (2.) Is it a fact that this sum represents an increase of more than 50 per cent. on the previous year's authorised borrowing?
 - (3.) Is it a fact that the New South Wales Government will have spent more than £150,000,000 on public works during the six years' period ending or 30th June, 1952?
 - (4.) Is it a fact that by 30th June, 1952, no major public work will have been completed in New South Wales during the previous six years?
 - (5.) Is it a fact that, almost without exception, public works authorised by the New South Wales Government during the last six years are running substantially behind schedule and are costing considerably more than the original estimate?
 - (6.) Will he take steps to have the whole of the Government public works programme reviewed with the object of completing with all speed a limited number of them, particularly those the rapid completion of which will make an early contribution to (a) increasing food production and (b) increasing the rate at which houses may be completed?
