"WHEREAS the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly of the State "of New South Wales now stand prorogued to Thursday, the fourth day of "August, 1960: Now I, Lieutenant-General Sir ERIC WINSLOW WOODWARD, "in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested as Governor of the said "State, do hereby further prorogue the said Legislative Council and Legislative "Assembly to Wednesday, the twenty-fourth day of August, 1960; and I do "further announce and proclaim that the said Legislative Council and Legis-"lative Assembly shall assemble for the despatch of business on the aforesaid "twenty-fourth day of August, 1960, at twelve o'clock at noon, in the buildings "known as the Legislative Council Chambers situate in Macquarie Street, in the "City of Sydney; and the Members of the Legislative Council and the Legislative "Assembly respectively are hereby required to give their attendance at the said "time and place accordingly.

"Given under my Hand and Seal at Sydney, this twentieth day of July, "in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty, and in the "ninth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

7. THE GOVERNOR'S OPENING SPEECH:—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had yesterday attended the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber when His Excellency was pleased to deliver an Opening Speech to both Houses of Parliament. For greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, which he laid upon the Table of the House, and ordered that it be recorded in the Votes and Proceedings, as follows:—

HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

We meet today for the commencement of the Third Session of the Thirty-ninth Parliament.

You have been called together to consider the Government's legislative and financial proposals and to deal with other matters of public importance.

Since I last addressed you, the State has suffered a grievous loss in the sudden passing of the Honourable John Joseph Cahill. In all, the late Mr. Cahill had been a Member of the Legislative Assembly for 31 years; a Minister of the Crown for a continuous period of 18 years, and Premier of the State for a record continuous term of over 7 years. He had won wide admiration for his lifetime of service to the State and I share with Honourable Members, deep regret in the loss of such a capable leader and administrator.

The deaths of the Honourable Robert Arthur King and the Honourable Gerald Blake Rygate, Members of the Legislative Council, and Mr. George Booth and Mr. Samuel Douglas Dickson, Members of the Legislative Assembly, deprived the Legislature of four other Members who had given long and devoted service in the public affairs of the State.

Seasonal conditions during the past year have resulted in record or mear-record production in our major primary industries. Wheat production during the 1959-1960 season was about 50 per cent. above the long-term average crop of 50 million bushels.

Deliveries of wool into stores—one million seven hundred thousand bales—were an all-time record.

Production in the dairying industry has also been most successful, and the season's output of milk has been the highest for a number of years.

The manufacturing industries have also continued to expand. Production of industry's basic needs has been increased substantially—pig iron by 20 per cent. and ingot steel by 11 per cent. during the last twelve months.

During the past six months plans for the establishment of 27 major industrial projects in this State have been announced, involving a capital outlay of 85 million pounds.

Extensive developments are taking place in the petro-chemical industries, including the manufacture of polythene, nylon and other plastics. Additions to oil refining plant will more than double the present capacity of this industry in the State.

Activity has been especially strong in the building industry and the volume of new buildings being approved by local authorities is rising at an unprecedented rate.

In the last 10 years the output of coal in New South Wales has increased by nearly 30 per cent. Although many industries have turned from coal to other fuels, the expansion of the steel industry and the establishment of new thermal power stations on the coal fields have increased the overall consumption of New South Wales coal.

Exports of coal have increased now to over one million tons a year and as a result of his survey of the position during a recent visit to Japan, the Minister for Mines is confident of a further increase in export sales.

This great increase in productivity in coal mining has been brought about by the use of new machines and new techniques. The Government has been concerned to ensure that this advance in mining technology will be accompanied by a corresponding advance in mine safety. To this end arrangements were made for the Chief Inspector of Collieries to visit the United Kingdom, Europe and the United States of America to examine latest developments in this field.

The decline in unemployment which commenced at the middle of 1959 has continued unabated, and the level of unemployment in New South Wales is now lower than it has been at any time since 1956. In the last year alone the total increase in the number of persons employed was higher than the increase over the three preceding years. In this period factory employment increased by over 20,000—almost 5 per cent. Of the 82 Australian factories employing more than 1,000 persons, 43 are in this State.

The technological changes now taking place in industry must inevitably have some effects upon working conditions and employment security. To enable the Government to consider the steps necessary to prevent any serious dislocation or displacement of labour, the Industrial Commission was asked to undertake an inquiry into the problems involved. The Judge of the Commission who is conducting this inquiry is at present visiting the United Kingdom, Europe and the United States of America, to obtain up-to-date information as to the experience of those countries.

The increase in the next few years in the number of young people who will be seeking employment for the first time will add to the complexity of the problems of industrial training. My Ministers have taken steps to form an Apprenticeship Training Council with a view to promoting industrial training so that the skilled workers necessary for the welfare of our community will be available.

Continued development in the use of motor vehicle and air transport, whilst undoubtedly an indication of the wealth and prosperity of the people, has created very serious problems in the operation of public transport services.

The difficulty of providing at reasonable cost, adequate services for members of the community who are dependent upon public transport, is a dilemma which faces the authorities in major cities all over the world.

However, there has been an encouraging improvement in the situation so far as the railways system is concerned.

Extension of electrification of the northern and western lines has enabled the introduction of faster and more comfortable services. Together with the extensive use of diesel electric locomotives this has enabled the railways to win back passenger and goods traffic and substantially increase earnings.

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The replacement of tram services by omnibuses in the Sydney metropolitan area is expected to improve the standard of service and the operating results.

In the year ended last June, 742 miles of new bitumen surface were laid on main roads throughout the State. This is an increase of some 50 per cent. on the mileage laid in earlier years.

About 100 miles of existing State highways and 100 new bridges and large culverts are being constructed each year on classified roads throughout the State. Major construction works are at present being carried out over some 300 miles of state highways and trunk roads. Construction of the new route of the Gwydir Highway between Grafton and Glen Innes is nearing completion and the new road will be open to traffic in December next.

Three large bridges in the country are under construction—at Port Macquarie, at Lismore and at Albury—and another three are being built in the metropolitan area.

Four bridges to replace subsidised ferries have been completed crossing the upper and lower Clarence River, one crossing the south arm of the Manning River at Bohnock, and at crossing of the Bega River at Tathra.

A bridge crossing the Hastings River at Rawdon Island is under construction and is well advanced.

Tenders will be invited in the near future for bridges to cross the Richmond River at Tatham and Scotts Creek in Manning Shire.

It is now ten years since the establishment of the Electricity Commission of New South Wales and my Ministers feel that its achievements in this period have fully justified the setting up of this authority to control electricity generation and bulk distribution in the State. After the gap had been closed between supply and demand and blackouts had become a thing of the past, the Commission was able to plan for the future to ensure that ample electricity would be available to meet every demand that might come from both the domestic and the industrial consumer.

The State's first 100,000 kilowatt generating unit will soon come into operation at Tallawarra. A start has been made on the erection of the huge new generating station at Vales Point. In association therewith two new modern collieries will be established by the Electricity Commission and the State Mines Control Authority. The Commission is now building between Dapto and Sydney an important new section of its future 330,000-volt transmission system and is in course of developing this system around the major load centre of Sydney.

During 1960 a major interstate supply interconnection was achieved between the New South Wales and Victorian systems.

Under the Government's rural electrification scheme about 85 per cent. of the farms in New South Wales are now being supplied with electricity.

A detailed investigation is being made into the application of electrical technology to farm processes and it is expected that the result will promote higher productivity and lower costs in primary production.

My Ministers are continuing their efforts to overcome the housing shortage in New South Wales. During 1959 more than 31,000 new homes and flats were built in New South Wales and present indications point to a still higher figure for 1960. During the twelve months ended 30th June, 1960, the Housing Commission completed 3,502 dwellings.

The large-scale home unit project being constructed by the Housing Commission at Surry Hills has progressed to the stage where the first of these 430 units will be available for occupation in the near future.

Finance being available, two further slum clearance projects-multistorey units in Redfern and Waterloo-are also planned.

Initial roadwork will soon be under way in the proposed £20 million "garden" suburb of 6,000 homes at Hoxton Park—the biggest of its type ever undertaken in Australia.

In addition to the activities of the Commission, a total of  $\pounds4,350,000$  will be available this year for building societies to play their vital part in the State's housing drive.

Special housing for aged people is an important feature of the housing programme and it is the intention of my Ministers to accelerate the provision of this type of accommodation.

The needs of the educational services resulting from the growth in population as well as the expanding needs in the secondary and tertiary fields continue to make the heaviest call on the resources of the State.

Enrolments in the public schools in 1960 totalled 596,500, an increase of some 16,500 over the enrolments in the previous year.

In the last financial year the total expenditure on educational services exceeded  $\pounds 61$  million. Included in this was an expenditure of over  $\pounds 11$  million on the school construction programme. Under this programme fourteen new high schools were completed and, in all, approximately 1,500 new classrooms were provided at schools throughout the State.

The Education Department this year has a teaching staff of 22,000 and almost 5,000 students are in training at the various teachers' colleges.

Increased provision has been made for facilities for the education of handicapped children and for adult education in evening classes.

Glenbawn Dam on the Hunter River, which was completed recently, is now filled almost to capacity and provides adequate security against the possibility of prolonged dry conditions.

On the Namoi River, the Keepit Dam has been completed. This Dam will regulate the flow of the river to provide a reliable supply of water for irrigation and stock and domestic purposes. The Dam has enabled a regular flow of water to be maintained in the river during some months of dry conditions.

Work is proceeding on the construction of Burrendong Dam where 490 men are employed. Examination and preparation of the foundation area is well advanced and construction of the diversion tunnel has been commenced.

Good progress has been made on the Menindee Lakes Storage Scheme, which is now almost completed. This scheme is designed to provide an assured water supply in the Lower Darling and to meet portion of this State's commitments to South Australia under the River Murray Agreement.

With the completion last year of the Gogeldrie Weir on the Murrumbidgee River, water is now being supplied to the first group of farms in the Coleambally Irrigation Area now being developed and arrangements are proceeding for the allocation of further farms.

At Port Kembla the first stage of the new inner harbour is nearing completion. The whole project will cost over £5 million and is essential to meet the needs of the district attributable to the rapid expansion of the steel industry.

A port development plan also to cost in excess of £5 million is being carried out by the Department of Public Works at Newcastle.

Good progress is being made on the scheme for the reclamation, using dredgings from the bed of Newcastle Harbour, of low-lying islands near the mouth of the Hunter River. More than 8,000,000 tons of dredgings have already been deposited on the islands which will ultimately provide over 6,000 acres of land for industrial development.

Four million pounds is being expended on the improvement works being undertaken at the Clarence River entrance.

The programme for the construction of water supply and sewerage works in country towns continues. Expenditure in the last financial year on these works was approximately  $\pounds 1,670,000$ . Two hundred and seventy-three works of water supply and 72 sewerage works have now been completed under this scheme.

The last financial year saw further improvements and expansion in the State's health and hospital services.

Expenditure on all services reached a record total of over £35 million which includes capital moneys expended on the construction of public hospital facilities.

This is indicative of the importance placed by my advisers on measures associated with the health needs of the community.

Work has continued on the construction of the North Ryde Psychiatric Centre, with an expenditure to date of approximately  $\pounds 1\frac{1}{2}$  million, and a number of wards were brought into use during the year. A commencement has also been made on the new mental hospital at Cessnock.

During the year the Government's contribution towards the maintenance of public hospitals throughout the State was increased by  $\pounds 3\frac{1}{2}$  million to a total of almost  $\pounds 23$  million.

The campaign against poliomyelitis has been continued. Plans for the fight against cancer are being actively developed by the State Cancer Council, the Government's grant to the Council having been more than doubled in the last financial year.

The activities of the Division of Occupational Health and the School Medical Services are being expanded and arrangements are in hand under which the scope of the School Dental Services will be extended.

In co-operation with the Flying Doctor Service based at Broken Hill a dental service for school children was introduced during the May holidays and consideration is being given to extending the service to old age pensioners and adults in this area.

The problem of landlord and tenant relationship has been causing concern to the Government following representations that anomalies and injustices exist under the present legislation. My advisers feel that only a public inquiry can establish the facts and provide the basic information on which any remedial action may be taken.

It has been decided, therefore, to set up a Committee of Inquiry to be presided over by a Judge, to inquire into the whole question of the operation of the Landlord and Tenant (Amendment) Act and to submit recommendations as to any modifications or amendments which may be considered desirable in the public interest.

#### MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

The budget for the financial year now current will shortly be placed before you and you will be asked to provide for the public services of the State. A carefully planned programme of public works and services has been drawn up and the estimates of expenditure and amounts proposed to be voted from the General Loan Account for those works and services will also be submitted for your consideration.

#### HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND

#### MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

During the session you will be asked to consider a comprehensive programme of legislation.

In pursuance of the undertaking given by the Government prior to the last elections, my Ministers have prepared plans for the introduction of a general Closer Settlement Scheme and amendments to the Closer Settlement Act designed to implement the scheme will be submitted for your consideration.

Other measures affecting primary producers which will be placed before you include Bills to amend the Fisheries and Oyster Farms Act, the Agricultural Seeds Act, the Marketing of Primary Products Act, the Crown Lands Act, the Swine Branding Act and the Irrigation Act.

My advisers are proceeding actively with public works for the development of the State's resources and Bills to ratify an agreement with Australian Oil Refining Pty. Ltd. concerning the deepening of Botany Bay and to provide for the construction and improvement of Brunswick Heads and Evans Head Harbours will be submitted to you. You will also be asked to authorise certain works to the south of Lake Cawndilla to improve the flow of water to the Great Ana Branch of the Darling River and to Lake Tandou. A Bill to constitute the Maritime Services Board as the single port authority for the Ports of Newcastle and Botany Bay has been prepared and general amendments to the Public Works Act are contemplated.

The stage has now been reached in the construction of the Sydney Opera House where the appointment of a trust to manage its affairs is desirable and my Ministers propose to submit to you a Bill for this purpose.

Law reform has continued to receive the close attention of my Ministers. Measures which will be submitted for your consideration include Bills to provide for the protection of purchasers of subdivided land, to restrict the subdivision of land under old system title and to facilitate applications for the release of restrictive covenants. Bills to amend the Legal Practitioners Act, the Crimes Act, the Auctioneers, Stock and Station, Real Estate and Business Agents Act and to provide for the registration of debt collectors and legal process servers will also be placed before you.

My advisers expect that before the end of the year final agreement will be reached with the other States on a uniform code of company law and appropriate legislation in this regard will be submitted to you.

The Conveyancing (Strata Titles) Bill will also be resubmitted for your consideration.

Although an Inquiry into the operation of the Landlord and Tenant Act is to be held certain provisions of the Act will expire on 1st January, 1961, and a Bill, to extend these provisions pending consideration of the report of the Inquiry will be submitted to you.

The Government has had under constant review legislation relating to industrial matters and an important measure to be placed before you will provide for long service leave for casual employees. Other Bills will amend the Factories and Shops Act, the Workers' Compensation Acts, the Coal and Oil Shale Mineworkers (Superannuation) Act, the Coal Mining Industry Long Service Leave Act, the Mines Rescue Act, the Mines Inspection Act, the Superannuation Act and the Police Regulation (Superannuation) Act.

Consideration has been given to the vexed question of damage to homes and property by subsidence caused by current, past and future coal mining operations. It is proposed to repeal the existing Mines Subsidence Act and introduce a measure designed to cover such damage throughout New South Wales without expense to the property owners.

You will also be asked to consider a Bill to provide for the recognition as service for extended leave purposes of service in the Commonwealth or another State of officers transferred to the service of this State.

The Clean Air Bill which had not been completed during the last Session will again be introduced. Other matters relating to public health will be submitted for your consideration including a Bill to provide for the licensing of dental technicians and to authorise them to deal directly with the public under certain conditions. Bills to amend the Pharmacy Act and the Sydney Hospital Act are also proposed. A Bill to provide for the separate labelling of table and cooking margarine will also be placed before you.

The streamlining of town planning procedure is regarded by my Ministers as desirable and legislation to give effect to their proposals in this regard is being prepared. Further legislation dealing with the control of the demolition of dwelling houses is also contemplated, together with some general amendments of the Local Government Act.

Bills to amend the Housing Act and the Co-operation Act will also be placed before you.

My advisers are gravely concerned at the mounting toll of the road and will submit to you further legislation which they regard as necessary to supplement the active work being undertaken in the interests of road safety.

Amendments are also proposed to the Motor Vehicles (Third Party Insurance) Act, the Main Roads Act, the Transport Act and the Government Railways Act.

It is anticipated that following consideration of the report of the expert Committee appointed last year to investigate the methods of land valuation, amendments to the Land and Valuation Act will be submitted for your consideration.

The recommendations of the Committee established to survey secondary education in New South Wales have been receiving the consideration of my Ministers and legislation required to enable certain of the recommendations to be implemented will be placed before you.

You will also be asked to consider complementary legislation to give effect to principles to be applied by the Commonwealth Marriage Bill.

Other measures of importance the provisions of which are being reviewed by the Government, will be placed before you. These include the Taronga Zoological Park (Amendment) Bill, the Ku-ring-gai Chase Validation Bill, the Australian Jockey Club (Amendment) Bill, the Banks and Bank Holidays (Amendment) Bill, the Gladesville Mental Hospital Cemetery Bill, the Royal New South Wales Institution for Deaf and Blind Children (Sale of Darlington Lands) Bill, the Archives Bill, the Mining (Amendment) Bill, the Lutheran Church Property Bill and the Returned Soldiers League (Balmain) Bill.

I now leave you to the discharge of your important duties with the earnest prayer that under Divine Guidance your labours may conduce to the welfare and happiness of all sections of the community.

Mr. Compton moved, and Mr. Cahill seconded the Motion, That the following Address in Reply to the Speech which His Excellency the Governor has addressed to both Houses of Parliament on opening this Session of the Parliament of New South Wales be now adopted by this House:—

"To His Excellency Sir ERIC WINSLOW WOODWARD, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Knight of the Venerable Order of St. John of Jerusalem, Lieutenant-General on the Retired List of the Australian Military Forces, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia.

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

We, Her Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our thanks for Your Excellency's Speech, and to assure you of our unfeigned attachment to Her Most Gracious Majesty's Throne and Person.

2. We beg to assure Your Excellency that our earnest consideration will be given to the measures to be submitted to us, and that the necessary provision for the Public Services will be made in due course.

3. We join Your Excellency in the hope that, under the guidance of Divine Providence, our labours may be so directed as to advance the best interests of all sections of the community."

Mr. Askin (speaking) moved (by consent), That this Debate be now adjourned. Question put and passed.

#### Message No. 1.

In pursuance of section seven of the Constitution (Legislative Council Elections) Act, 1932-1937, the Governor desires to inform the Legislative Assembly that he has this day, with the advice of the Executive Council, issued under that Act a Writ for the election of a Member of the Legislative Council to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Honourable Gerald Blake Rygate.

The Writ is directed to Major-General John Rowlstone Stevenson, C.B.E., D.S.O., E.D., Clerk of the Parliaments of the State of New South Wales, Returning Officer for the Election of Members of the Legislative Council of New South Wales.

This Message is accompanied by a copy of the Writ.

In order that both Houses of Parliament may be duly informed of the issue of the Writ, a like Message is this day being addressed by the Governor to the President of the Legislative Council.

Government House,

Sydney, 30th August, 1960.

Mr. Speaker announced that the Message was accompanied by a copy of the Writ.

Mr. Speaker then directed the Clerk to read the Writ, which was as follows:-

WRIT FOR THE ELECTION OF A MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF New South Wales

"Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom, Australia "and Her other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, "Defender of the Faith.

"To MAJOR-GENERAL JOHN ROWLSTONE STEVENSON, C.B.E., D.S.O., E.D., "Clerk of the Parliaments of the State of New South Wales, Returning "Officer for the Election of Members of the Legislative Council of Our "State of New South Wales-

"Greeting:

"Whereas the Honourable GERALD BLAKE RYGATE was duly elected a Member "of the Legislative Council with a term of service expiring at the end of twelve "years from the twenty-third day of April, one thousand nine hundred and

"fifty-five, And whereas the seat of the said Honourable GERALD BLAKE RYGATE "has become vacant by reason of his death on the eighth day of June, one "thousand nine hundred and sixty, Now therefore, We with the advice of the "Executive Council and by virtue of the powers vested in Us, do in and by "this Our Writ direct you, JOHN ROWLSTONE STEVENSON, to conduct in the "manner by law provided an election of a Member to Our Legislative Council "to fill the seat which has thus become vacant.

"And We do hereby appoint the seventh day of September, one thousand "nine hundred and sixty, as the day on or before which all nominations of "candidates at the election shall be made and the fifteenth day of September, "one thousand nine hundred and sixty, as the day upon which sittings of the "Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly shall be held for the "purpose of taking the votes: and that the taking of votes at such sittings shall "commence at two-thirty o'clock in the afternoon and shall terminate at four-"thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

"And We do further direct and appoint that this Our Writ shall be "returnable to Our Governor upon the twentieth day of September, one thousand "nine hundred and sixty.

"In Testimony Whereof, We have caused this Our Writ to be sealed with "the Public Seal of Our said State.

"Witness Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir ERIC WINSLOW WOODWARD, "Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael "and Saint George, Companion of Our Most Honourable Order of the "Bath, Commander of Our Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, "Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Knight of the "Venerable Order of St. John of Jerusalem, Lieutenant-General on the "Retired List of Our Australian Military Forces, Our Governor of Our "State of New South Wales and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth "of Australia, at Sydney, in Our said State, this thirtieth day of August, "in the year one thousand nine hundred and sixty and in the ninth year "of Our Reign.



# QUESTIONS :---

(Notice given, 1 March, 1961.)

1. Power Station at Lake Munmorah:-Mr. Punch to ask the Minister for Local Government and Minister for Highways,-

In view of the decision to erect the new Power Station at Lake Munmorah, will he inform the House,—

(1.) What is the estimated cost per ton of coal to be used at the new Power House?

(2.) What would be the estimated cost per ton of coal if the Station had been erected on the Gardiner's Creek site?

(3.) What is the estimated cost of installation of all facilities concerned with the cooling system at Lake Munmorah?

(4.) What would the cost have been for these same facilities, together with the cost of supplying water, on the Gardiner's Creek site?

(5.) Upon completion of the Station on either site, what would be the respective cost of running:—

- (a) At Munmorah.
- (b) At Gardiner's Creek?

2. Licensed Moneylenders:-Mr. Rex Jackson to ask the Premier,-

(1.) Is it a fact that under Section 17 (1) of the Moneylenders and Infants Loans Act, 1941-1948, a record of moneylenders' licences issued and of transfers, cancellations, substitutions and endorsements shall be kept by the Commissioner of Police?

(2.) Under subsection two of Section 17 of the Act is the Commissioner required, as early as practicable in each month, to cause to be published in the *Gazette* prescribed particulars of all moneylenders' licences issued, renewed, transferred, cancelled and suspended and of all substitutions of new authorised addresses, persons and new names pursuant to paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of subsection one of Section 8 of the Act, and of all endorsements on licences of moneylenders who have died or become insane persons or patients or incapable persons and of all other prescribed matters and things aforesaid done during the preceding month?

(3.) Has the Commissioner of Police complied with this section of the Moneylenders and Infants Loans Act and if not will he obtain from the Commissioner of Police and lay upon the Table of the House full particulars of all moneylenders licensed in New South Wales including corporate, personal and partnership licences and the full name and address of each licensee?

3. Dairy Farmers' Co-operative Milk Company Limited:—Mr. Fitzgerald to ask the Minister for Housing and Minister for Co-operative Societies,—

(1.) Is it a fact that a private company is attempting to take over the assets and business of the Dairy Farmers' Co-operative Milk Company Limited?

(2.) Have the whole of the assets of this company been financed and paid for by the dairy farmers in the milk zone?

(3.) Have "dry" shareholders received attractive offers for their shares in this company?

(4.) Was it to the disadvantage of dairy farmers when the handling and distribution of city milk was in the hands of proprietary companies?

(5.) If these are facts will he see that dairy farmers are protected against any proposal to take over the Dairy Farmers' Co-operative Milk Company Limited?

# GENERAL BUSINESS-ORDERS OF THE DAY:-

1. Aborigine Welfare; resumption of the adjourned debate on the motion of Mr. Brown,—

That, in the opinion of this House, the Government should provide additional finance for Aborigine Welfare in New South Wales from both General Revenue and Loan Funds with a view to achieving as a final objective the complete assimilation of Aborigines into the community, by:—

- (a) implementing a vigorous housing policy for Aborigines.
- (b) providing health services, full educational opportunity and employment for Aborigine families in this State.
- 2. Commonwealth-State Housing Agreement; resumption of the adjourned debate on the motion of Mr. Crabtree,—

(1.) That this House views with alarm the proposals of the Commonwealth Government, as submitted to the States, for a new Commonwealth-State Housing Agreement to replace the Agreement which expires on 30th June next, which increases the interest rate above the present rate of 4 per cent and also increases the allocation to Building Societies from the Commonwealth and State Housing Agreement Funds.

- (2.) That this House deprecates-
  - (i) the failure of the Commonwealth Government to accept a share of financial responsibility through a rental rebate system so that new dwellings can be made available to families unable to pay an economic rental;
  - (ii) the failure of the Commonwealth Government to provide any financial assistance towards slum clearance operations to States faced with this major problem; and
  - (iii) the failure of the Commonwealth Government to pay the States any subsidy in respect of the provision of housing for the aged by State housing authorities.
- 3. Kurnell Peninsula Development; resumption of the adjourned debate on the motion of Mr. Griffith,---

That, in the opinion of this House, in the event of the sale and/or lease of land on Kurnell Peninsula at present proclaimed for recreational purposes the proceeds therefrom, or an equal amount, be allocated for the immediate development of the remainder of land so proclaimed.

# NOTICES OF MOTIONS:-

1. Mr. CROSS to move,-

That, in the opinion of this House,-

(1.) The Government has seriously neglected the transport needs of the Southern Metropolitan Area.

- (2.) The Government should-
  - (a) Construct immediately adequate road crossings over Georges River together with modern roadways linking the city and St. George District with the Shire of Sutherland and the South Coast.
  - (b) Construct a double track high level Railway Bridge across the Georges River at Como; and
  - (c) Complete the construction of additional railway tracks between Central and Tempe railway stations without delay.
- 2. Mr. CRAWFORD to move,-

That, in the opinion of this House,-

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(1.) Parents in country districts should not be required to pay bus fares of up to  $\pounds 2$  per week for their children to attend school.

(2.) This payment falls especially heavily on parents who are wage earners.(3.) This payment is having a detrimental effect on the development and progress of country areas.

(4.) The Government, therefore, should immediately institute free school bus transport for country schoolchildren.

# 3. Mr. WILLIS to move,-

That this House-

(1.) Affirms as a fundamental principle of democracy the right of every Member of Parliament to speak and vote freely in Parliament according to his conscience;

(2.) Believes that no outside organisation should be allowed to extract a pledge from a candidate for Parliament which will bind him to speak and vote as directed by that organisation; and

(3.) Expresses its strongest condemnation of the practice whereby Labor candidates for Parliament are obliged by the Australian Labor Party to pledge themselves in advance of their election to Parliament to speak and vote only in accordance with the Socialist objective and platform of that Party.

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
