1. **OPENING OF THE SESSION.**—The House met at Fifteen minutes after Two o'clock, p.m., pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing the date the twenty-seventh day of October, 1981, of which a copy was read by Mr D. L. Wheeler, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, as follows:

By His Excellency Air Marshal Sir JAMES ANTHONY ROWLAND, Knight Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, upon whom has been conferred the decorations of the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Force Cross, Knight of Grace of the Most Venerable Order of St. John of Jerusalem, Governor of the State of New South Wales in the Commonwealth of Australia.

"IN pursuance of the power and authority vested in me as Governor of the State of New South Wales by virtue of an Act passed in the second year of the reign of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, being 'an Act to consolidate the Acts relating to the Constitution,' I do hereby proclaim that a Session of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly for the State of New South Wales for the despatch of business shall commence and be holden on Wednesday, the twenty-eighth day of October, 1981, at 2.15 o'clock in the afternoon in the buildings known as the Legislative Council Chambers, in Macquarie Street, in the city of Sydney; and Members of the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, respectively, are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

"GIVEN under my Hand and Seal, at Sydney, this twenty-seventh day of October in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighty-one and in the thirtieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

6. ELECTION OF SPEAKER.—Mr Petersen, addressing himself to the Clerk (who, standing up, pointed to him and then sat down), moved, That Lawrence Borthwick Kelly, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker—which motion was seconded by Mr Quinn.

10. LEADER OF THE OPPOSITION.—Mr Dowd informed the House of his election as Leader of the Opposition, Kevin Richard Rozzoli as Deputy-Leader of the Opposition and Timothy John Moore as Opposition Whip as from 27 October, 1981.

14. MESSAGE FROM THE COMMISSIONERS.—Mr Speaker reported that the House had this day attended the Commissioners in the Legislative Council Chamber where the Honourable John Richard Johnson, on behalf of the Commissioners delivered the following Message:

HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—

We have it in command from His Excellency the Governor to acquaint you that His Excellency desires that you take into your earnest consideration such matters as may be submitted to you.

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—

It being necessary that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be first chosen, it is His Excellency's pleasure that you, Members of the Legislative Assembly, repair to your Chamber, and there, after Members shall have been sworn, proceed to the election of one of your number to be your Speaker.

We are further commanded to acquaint you that His Excellency desires that such measures be taken by you as may be deemed expedient to provide for the public services of the State.

15. LEAVE OF ABSENCE:

(1) Ordered, on motion of Mr Flaherty, That leave of absence for the present Session be granted to Phillip Joseph O'Neill, Member for Burwood, on account of illness.

(2) Ordered, on motion of Mr Flaherty, That leave of absence for the present Session be granted to Samuel Barry Jones, Member for Waratah, on account of illness.

(3) Ordered, on motion of Mr Flaherty, That leave of absence for the present Session be granted to Keith O'Connell, Member for Peats, on account of unavoidable absence.

16. ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEES.—Mr Durick moved, That Thomas James Cahill be Chairman of Committees of the Whole House,—which motion was seconded by Mr Maher.

Debate ensued.

Question put and passed.

Whereupon Mr Cahill made his acknowledgments to the House.

17. Question put and carried unanimously—Members and Officers of the House standing.

The House adjourned accordingly at Twenty-three minutes before Seven o'clock p.m., until Tomorrow at Half-past Ten o'clock, a.m.

The House met pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker took the Chair.

Mr Speaker offered the Prayer.

1. **PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER.**—Mr Speaker reported that the Assembly had yesterday been to Government House where he informed His Excellency the Governor that, immediately after the opening of Parliament, the Legislative Assembly, in the exercise of their undoubted right, had proceeded to the election of their Speaker, that the choice had fallen upon him, and that he had to present himself to His Excellency as their Speaker—whereupon His Excellency was pleased to offer him his congratulations.

That he had then, in the name and on behalf of the House, laid claim to all their undoubted rights and privileges, particularly to freedom of speech in debate, to free access to His Excellency when occasion should require, and asked that the most favourable construction should, on all occasions, be put upon their language and proceedings; to all of which His Excellency readily assented.
