An Act to validate certain proclamations, orders, regulations, and by-laws; to amend the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Act, 1912, and the Parliamentary Elections (Amendment) Act, 1918; and for other purposes. [Assented to, 23rd December, 1919.]

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—
