1. This Act may be cited as the "Stores Supply Department Building Act, 1920."

The carrying out of the work (more particularly described in the Schedule to this Act) is hereby sanctioned, and the Colonial Treasurer, or the member of the Executive Council for the time being performing the duties of the said Minister, is hereby authorised to undertake and carry out the said work, subject to the provisions of this Act, and for that purpose shall be and have the powers of a Constructing Authority within the meaning of the Public Works Act, 1912.

3. The plan of the said work is the plan marked "Government Stores Supply Department," signed by the Colonial Treasurer, and countersigned by the architect for the Housing Board, and deposited in the public office of the said Minister.

4. The cost of carrying out the said work, estimated at fifty thousand four hundred and twenty pounds (exclusive of land resumptions and fittings), may be defrayed from such loan votes as are now, or may hereafter be, applicable to the purpose, or from appropriations of the Public Works Fund, or partly from such votes and partly from appropriations, and shall not under any circumstances exceed the estimated cost by more than ten per centum.

SCHEDULE

THE proposed new stores and offices for the Stores Supply Department will occupy the site immediately to the north of Essex-street, with frontages to Milson-lane and Harrington-street.

It will consist of four storeys, and will have reinforced concrete floors, supported where necessary on steel stanchions and girders encased in concrete. The elevation to the three streets named will be finished off in cement.

The roof will be flat.
