EXPLANATORY NOTE.

The object of this Bill is to enable the Trustees of the Botany Methodist Church to remove the remains of persons interred in the Botany Methodist Church Cemetery, together with all tombstones erected therein, to the Bunnerong Cemetery or to some other cemetery agreed upon with the representatives of the persons so interred.

No interment in the Church Cemetery has taken place since 1900, and power to remove the remains is considered desirable by the Church authorities, in order that the land comprised in the Cemetery may be put in order and devoted to such purposes as the Church authorities determine.

The Municipal Council of Botany and the Trustees of the Bunnerong Cemetery have concurred in the proposed removal.
