
EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM.

OwiNG to the continued threat of a water famine at Broken Hill as a result of drought conditions, and the imminence of a suspension of mining operations, and all that would be involved therein, it was necessary to extend and augment the water supply service.

In view of the urgency of the matter the works were put in hand before Parliamentary sanction could be obtained.

The sum of Eighty-four thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven pounds has been expended on additional pumping machinery and on extensions and improvements to the Water Supply generally. The sum of Sixty-eight thousand and eight pounds has been or is proposed to be expended on duplication of the Hathorn Davey pumping plant and an additional service reservoir.
