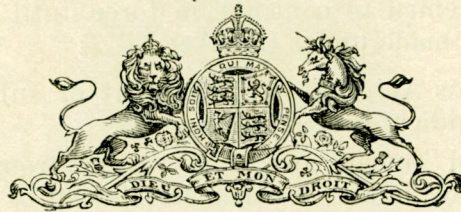

Act No. 10, 1927.

An Act to regulate and license the use, carriage, possession, and sale of pistols ; to repeal the Gun License Act, 1920 ; and for purposes connected therewith. [Assented to, 11th February, 1927.]

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

1. (1) This Act may be cited as the "Pistol License Act, 1927." (2) Short title and commencement.

Pistol License.

(2) This Act shall commence on a day to be appointed by the Governor and notified by proclamation published in the Gazette.

Savings.

2. (1) The Gun License Act, 1920, is hereby repealed.

(2) All regulations made under the said Act and in force at the commencement of this Act in so far as they relate to pistols and are not inconsistent with this Act, shall be deemed to continue in force until repealed by regulations made under this Act.

Interpre-
tation.

3. In this Act, unless the context or subject-matter otherwise indicates or requires,—

“Pistol” means any lethal weapon from which any shot, bullet, or other missile can be discharged, and of which the length of barrel, not including any revolving detachable or magazine breech, does not exceed nine inches, but does not include a toy pistol or an antique pistol which is kept or sold as a curiosity or ornament.

“Pistol dealer” means a person who by way of trade or business manufactures, sells, or repairs pistols or exposes or has in his possession pistols for sale or repair.

“Prescribed” means prescribed by this Act or by any regulation made thereunder.

4. (1) A person shall not purchase, carry, or have in his possession any pistol unless he holds a license (hereinafter called a “pistol license”) issued under this Act and in force at the time.

(2) A separate pistol license shall be taken out in respect of each such pistol, and such license shall not be transferable.

(3) (a) Any person who has in his possession any pistol without a pistol license for such pistol shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

(b) Any person who uses or carries any pistol without a pistol license for such pistol shall if such offence be committed after the hour of seven o'clock in the morning and before the hour of seven o'clock in the evening

evening be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, and shall if the offence be committed after the hour of seven in the evening and before the hour of seven in the morning be liable in addition to the said penalty to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months.

(c) This section shall not apply to—

- (i) any person in the naval, military, or air service of His Majesty, or in the police force, or to a member of a rifleclub in respect of his possession of any pistol prescribed for the use of such service, force, or club, or used or carried in the performance of his duty or when engaged in or proceeding to or from drill or target practice; or
- (ii) any pistol dealer or his servant who has in his possession or carries a pistol in the ordinary course of the trade or business of a pistol dealer or who uses a pistol by way of testing or regulating its strength or quality in a place specially set apart for such purpose; or
- (iii) any common carrier or warehouseman or his servant who has in his possession or carries a pistol in the ordinary course of the trade or business of a common carrier or warehouseman; or
- (iv) any person who uses a pistol in respect of which a license is held by the owner for the purpose of shooting at a shooting gallery which is under the personal supervision of a responsible person in charge thereof; or
- (v) any person who has in his possession a pistol acquired and held as a trophy.

(d) Upon the hearing of any information for any breach of any of the provisions contained in this section the person complained against shall be required to prove that he is the holder of a pistol license duly issued under this Act or that he is a person to whom this section does not apply upon any of the grounds set out in paragraph (c) of this subsection.

Application

5. (1) Applications for licenses under this Act, or the renewal of such licenses, shall be made to the officer of police in charge of the police station in or nearest to the place where the applicant usually resides.

(2) Such officer of police may, if he is satisfied that the applicant is a person who has a good reason for requiring the license applied for and can be permitted to have in his possession, use, and carry a pistol without any danger to the public safety or to the peace, issue such license in the form prescribed therefor.

No pistol license shall be issued to a person under the age of eighteen years.

(3) Where the pistol in respect of which a license is required is to be purchased, used, carried, or kept by the proprietor, manager, or other employee of any bank, financial institution, or business for the sole purpose of protecting property of or in the possession of such bank, institution, or business, either on the premises of such bank, institution, or business, or during the conveyance of property to or from such premises, the license may be issued in the name of the proprietor, manager, or other employee of such bank, institution, or business, and the pistol in respect of which such license is issued may be purchased, used, carried, or kept by any other employee of such bank, institution, or business for such purpose, notwithstanding that the name of such other employee does not appear on the license.

(4) The fee payable upon the issue of any pistol license and upon each renewal thereof shall be the sum of ten shillings.

(5) Where the license is issued to a special constable in respect of a pistol used or carried in the performance of his duty no license fee shall be payable.

6. Any applicant aggrieved by a refusal of an officer in charge of a police station to issue any such license may appeal from such refusal to the court of petty sessions in or nearest to the place where the applicant resides, and the decision of such court shall be final and binding upon the applicant and upon such officer of police.

Pistol License.

7. A pistol license shall, unless previously revoked, continue in force until the thirty-first day of December following the date of the issue thereof, but may be renewed for a further period expiring on the thirty-first day of December next following the date upon which the license is renewed, and so from time to time, and the provisions of this Act with respect to the issue of a pistol license shall apply to the renewal of a pistol license.

Duration of licenses.

8. Any license issued under this Act may be revoked by notice in writing signed by the officer in charge of the police station in or nearest to the place where the holder of the license usually resides if he is satisfied that the holder thereof is prohibited by this Act from holding a license or is a person of unsound mind or of intemperate habits or is otherwise unfitted to be entrusted with a pistol, subject nevertheless to the like right of appeal as in the case of a refusal to issue a license.

Revocation of licenses.

9. A record of all licenses issued under this Act at any police station shall be kept there and shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times upon payment of the fee (if any) prescribed.

Inspection of list of licenses.

10. (1) It shall be unlawful to sell by retail or by auction or by private sale or to let on hire a pistol, or for a pawnbroker to part with the possession of a pistol pledged with him upon redemption of the pledge, to any person unless at the time of the sale, hire, or redemption such person either produces a pistol license or gives reasonable proof that he is about to proceed abroad for a period of not less than six months and produces a statement to that effect signed by himself and by a police officer of the district within which he resides of a rank not lower than that of inspector or by himself and by a justice of the peace.

Sale or hire of pistols.

(2) Every person who in the course of business sells by retail or by auction or lets on hire a pistol, or being a pawnbroker parts with the possession of a pistol pledged with him upon redemption of the pledge, shall before delivery make or cause to be made an entry in a book to be kept for that purpose specifying the description of the pistol sold, let on hire, or redeemed, the date

date of such sale, hire, or redemption, the name and address of the purchaser, hirer, or person redeeming the pistol and of the officer of police by whom the pistol license produced by the purchaser, hirer, or such person was issued, the date of such license or the circumstances exempting such purchaser, hirer, or person from having such license.

Such book shall be produced for inspection on the request of any officer of police.

Penalty.

(3) Any person who—

- (a) contravenes any of the foregoing provisions of this Act; or
- (b) on the sale, hire, or redemption of a pistol knowingly makes or causes to be made any false entry or statement as to any matter concerning which he is required by this section to make an entry or statement,

shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

11. (1) Any person who carries on the trade or business of a pistol dealer, unless he shall first have obtained a certificate of registration, shall be liable on summary conviction for a first offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, and for a second or subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

(2) Applications for such a certificate shall be made in the prescribed form to, and such certificate may be issued in a prescribed form by the officer of police in charge of the police station in or nearest to the place where the applicant carries on the trade or business of a pistol dealer, on payment of the sum of one pound for every such certificate. Such certificate shall be in force until the thirty-first day of December after the date of the issue thereof, and may on application in the prescribed manner be renewed from time to time upon payment of a like fee.

12. Any member of the police force may demand from any person who at the time of such demand may be using or carrying any pistol the production of the license for so doing, and may also demand from such person his name and address.

If such person refuses to produce such license or does not give his name and address or gives a false name or address, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

13. Any member of the police force may seize any pistol found in the possession of or being used or carried by any person who is required by this Act to be but who is not the holder of a license therefor under this Act, and such pistol may be forfeited to His Majesty.

Seizure and forfeiture of pistols.

14. If a justice is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for suspecting that any pistol is concealed or lodged in any premises or place in breach of this Act, he may grant a search warrant authorising any member of the police force named therein to enter at any time, if necessary by force, and to search any premises or place named in such warrant and every person found therein, and to seize and detain any pistol which he may find on the premises or place or on such person and in respect of which he has reasonable grounds for suspecting that there has been or is a breach of this Act.

Power to search premises for pistols.

15. Any person who has a pistol in his possession and who does not take all reasonable precautions to ensure the safe keeping of such pistol shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Precautions to be taken by pistol owners.

16. Any parent or guardian of a person under the age of eighteen years who uses, carries, or has in his possession any pistol shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds unless such parent or guardian proves that such use, carriage, or possession was without his consent or knowledge, and that he took all reasonable precautions to prevent the same, or proves that the person under the age of eighteen years using the pistol was so using it under the supervision of a person holding a pistol license.

Liability of parent or guardian of a child under eighteen.

17. Any person who within the boundary of any municipality uses in connection with a pistol any contrivance commonly known as or in the nature of a Maxim silencer shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Regulations.

18. (1) The Governor may make regulations prescribing all forms under this Act and generally for carrying out the provisions of this Act, and may in such regulations impose any penalty not exceeding ten pounds for any breach of the same.

The regulations shall—

- (i) be submitted for the approval of the Governor;
- (ii) be published in the Gazette;
- (iii) take effect from the date of such publication or from a later date to be specified in the regulations;
- (iv) be laid before both Houses of Parliament within fourteen sitting days after publication if Parliament is in session, and if not, then within fourteen sitting days after the commencement of the next session.

If either House of Parliament passes a resolution of which notice has been given at any time within fifteen sitting days after the regulations have been laid before such House disallowing any regulation or part thereof, such regulation or part shall thereupon cease to have effect.

Recovery of penalties.

19. Any penalty incurred by this Act or the regulations made thereunder may be recovered in a summary manner before two or more justices or a stipendiary or police magistrate.

Pistol License Bill.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

The Gun License Act, passed in 1920, while having fulfilled a useful purpose, has been found to place certain hardships upon the man on the land, and it is now considered that all the essential requirements will be met by restricting the main features of the existing law to concealable weapons only, *i.e.*, pistols.

The Bill, therefore, will repeal the Gun License Act and will re-enact its main provisions to apply only to pistols, which, for the purposes of the measure are described as "lethal weapons from which any shot, bullet, or other missile can be discharged, and of which the length of barrel, not including any revolving detachable or magazine breech, does not exceed nine inches."

Every person who requires to purchase, carry or possess a pistol will be required to take out a license each year for such weapon and a separate license will be required in respect of each pistol.

Under the present Act gun licenses are not issued to persons under the age of sixteen years. The Pistol License Bill restricts the age to eighteen years and over.

Licenses will be issued by the officer-in-charge of the police station in or nearest the place where the applicant usually resides, instead of by the Clerk of Petty Sessions as under the Gun License Act. The fee for a gun license is 5s. per annum; under the provisions of the Bill the fee for a pistol license will be 10s. per annum.

The police will have power to revoke any pistol license if considered necessary.

It will be unlawful to sell or hire a pistol, or for a pawnbroker to part with the possession of a pistol pledged with him, to any person unless such person produces a pistol license at the time of the sale, hire or redemption.

The penalties provided under the Bill are increased.

The remaining provisions in the Bill are practically those now in the Gun License Act.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Bill is intended to amend the law relating to the issue of licenses for the possession of pistols. It provides that a license shall be issued to any person who is qualified in accordance with the provisions of the Bill, and who is of good character and of sound mind.

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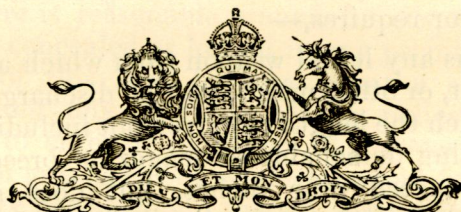

20 such House disallowing any regulation or part thereof, such regulation or part shall thereupon cease to have effect.

19. Any penalty incurred by this Act or the regu-^{Recovery of}lations made thereunder may be recovered in a summary ^{penalties.}manner before two or more justices or a stipendiary or
25 police magistrate.
