1. This Act may be cited as the "Navigation Short title. (Amendment) Act, 1927," and shall be read and construed with the Navigation Act, 1901, as amended by subsequent Acts.

Power of Governor to regulate smoking and display of lights on vehicular ferries.

2. (1) The power of the Governor to make regulations under section two of the Navigation Amendment (Regulations) Act, 1904, shall extend to—

(a) the regulation or prohibition of smoking on any vehicular ferry, whether such ferry is plying within the port of Sydney or elsewhere;

and

(b) the regulation of the display of lights on vehicles using a vehicular ferry whether such ferry is plying within the port of Sydney or elsewhere and the prohibition of the display on any such vehicle of any light which might tend to endanger navigation.

(2) Any such regulations may impose penalties not exceeding one hundred pounds for any breach of

the same.
