## A BILL

To provide for a Joint Select Committee of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly to be called the House Committee.

[MR. LEE; -29 May, 1934.]

B<sup>E</sup> it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of 5 the same, as follows —

1. This Act may be cited as the "Parliament (House Short title. Committee) Act, 1934."

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Interpretation. 2. In this Act unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires—

- "Assembly " means Legislative Assembly of New South Wales.
- "Committee " means Joint Select Committee to be **5** called the "House Committee " constituted under this Act.

" Council " means Legislative Council of New South Wales.

"Joint Staff of the Legislative Council and Assem- 10 bly," means the manager, stewards, tradesmen, waiters, cleaners, cooks, gardeners, boiler attendants, outdoor servants, housekeeper, laundresses and other servants usually employed on the staff known as the Joint Staff of the 15 Legislative Council and Assembly.

- "Parliament" means the Parliament of New South Wales.
- "Prescribed " means prescribed by this Act or by regulations made thereunder. 20

" President " means President of the Council. " Speaker " means Speaker of the Assembly.

Application of Act.

House

Committee.

3. Nothing in this Act shall be construed as in any way derogating from the powers and authorities of either House of Parliament or of the President or Speaker 25 under or by virtue of any Standing Order for the time being in force.

4. (1) There shall be a Joint Select Committee of the Council and of the Assembly to be called the House Committee. 30

(2) The Committee shall consist of the President and the Speaker for the time being in office, and ten other members.

(3) As soon as practicable after the commencement of this Act, and thereafter as soon as practicable 35 after the commencement of the first session of each succeeding Parliament, the members of the Committee shall be appointed according to the practice of Parliament with reference to the appointment of members to serve on Joint Select Committees of the Council and 40 Assembly.

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(4) Five of such members shall be members of and be appointed by the Council and five shall be members of and be appointed by the Assembly.

(5) Five members of the Committee shall form a 5 quorum; but no quorum shall consist exclusively of members of the Council or of members of the Assembly.

(6) The seat of any appointed member of the Committee shall be deemed to become vacant for any cause for which his seat as a member of the Council or

10 of the Assembly (as the case may be) would become vacant.

(7) When a vacancy occurs in the appointed members of the Committee it shall be filled upon motion in the usual manner, provided that the equal representa-

15 tion on the Committee of members of the Council and of the Assembly shall be observed in the filling of such vacancy.

(8) The Committee may elect one of the members thereof to be chairman, and the chairman shall have a 20 deliberative but not a casting vote.

(9) Upon the appointment of the first Committee the House Committees of the Council and Assembly shall cease to exist.

5. The Committee shall be vested with the manage- Powers and 25 ment of the Parliamentary Refreshment Room, and the duties of the Committee. grounds, and with authority to control the Parliamentary buildings, and power to make recommendations to the Government respecting the maintenance, renewal

and extension thereof, but the allotment and furnishing 30 of rooms shall be under the control of the President or Speaker in their respective spheres.

The Committee shall control the Refreshment Room and outdoor staff known as the Joint Staff of the Legis-

lative Council and Assembly, and shall recommend all 35 appointments thereto and dismissals therefrom to the Speaker, in whom is hereby vested the power of appoint-

ment and dismissal of all such employees.

6. The Committee shall hold office as such and may Tenure of Committee. exercise all the powers conferred upon it by any Act or 40 otherwise for the Parliament in which it is appointed,

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and upon the dissolution or expiry of a Parliament the duties and powers of the Committee may be exercised and performed by the President, the Speaker, the chairman of the Committee or any two of them until the Committee is appointed in the next Parliament.

Secretary.

7. The Committee appointed in each Parliament may, on its appointment, subject to the approval of the Speaker and/or the President, appoint one of the officers of Parliament to be the secretary of the Committee, and such secretary shall be the executive officer of the 10 Committee and perform the directions of the Committee and hold such office until the Committee in the next Parliament appoint a secretary.

Manager.

8. The Committee may appoint a manager of the Refreshment Room and such manager shall be an 15 executive officer of the Committee.

Subcommittees. 9. The Committee may appoint so many subcommittees as it may deem necessary and may delegate to such subcommittees any of its powers and duties, and may at any time reconstitute or alter any such committee 20 and delegation.

Power to sue and be sued. 10. (1) The Committee may, in the name of the secretary for the time being thereof, sue and be sued in any court.

(2) The production of a Gazette in which is **25** notified the appointment of a secretary shall be sufficient evidence of his appointment and of his authority to institute proceedings.

Regulations.

**11.** (1) The Committee may make regulations prescribing any matter or thing necessary or convenient to **30** be prescribed for carrying this Act into effect.

(2) The regulations may impose a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for any breach thereof, and may authorise the arrest and forcible removal of any person from any portion of the Parliamentary buildings **35** or grounds subject to the control of the Committee upon the authority and by the direction of the President, the Speaker, or the secretary of the Committee.

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(3) The regulations shall—

of the next session.

- (a) be published in the Gazette;
- (b) take effect from the date of publication or from a later date to be specified in the regulations; and
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  (c) be laid before both Houses of Parliament within fourteen sitting days after publication if Parliament is in session, and if not then within fourteen sitting days after the commencement

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If either House of Parliament passes a resolution of which notice has been given at any time within fifteen sitting days after the regulations have been laid before such House disallowing any regulation or part thereof

**15** such regulation or part shall thereupon cease to have effect.
