(3) A friendly society shall not exercise the powers and authorities conferred by subsection one of this section unless the exercise of those powers and authorities is approved by the Governor.

(4) The approval of the Governor under subsection three of this section shall not be given to any such exercise unless it is made to appear to him that the society has—

(a) become liable to pay the taxation upon the income to be derived from the carrying on of such business or levied in respect of the goods sold or used therein or levied under the Stamp Duties Act upon all cheques receipts and other instruments used in connection with the said business, in all respects as an association which is carried on for profit or gain; and

(b) that such society is not entitled to any concession or privilege from any department of the Commonwealth or this State which is not enjoyed by any registered pharmacist who chooses to avail himself of such concession or privilege.

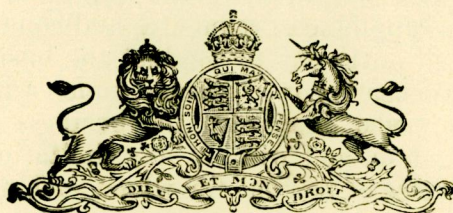

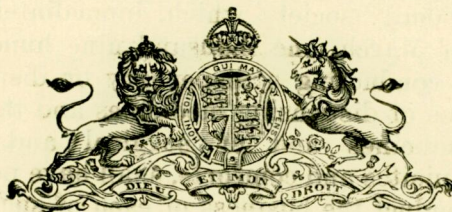

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

THE object of this Bill is to authorise certain friendly society dispensaries established for the purpose of dispensing medicines and selling and supplying medicines, surgical and medical appliances, etc., to members and permitted dependants in accordance with the provisions of the Friendly Societies Act, 1912-1942, to carry on the business of a pharmacist in open shop.

This right will be restricted to such dispensaries as were operating before 1st March, 1945.

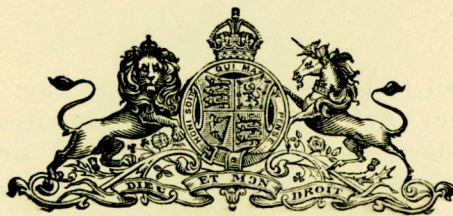
