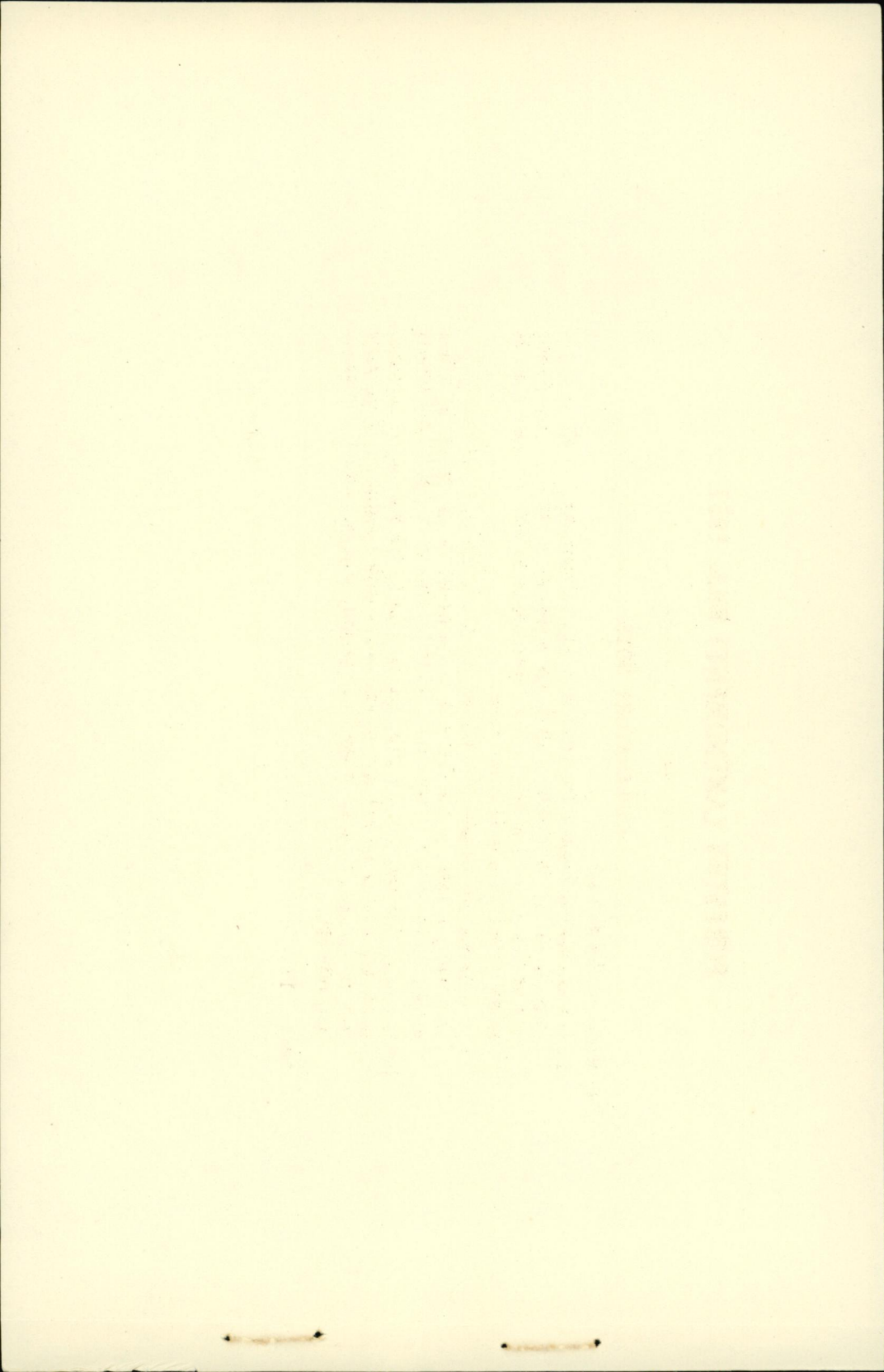
## FORESTRY (AMENDMENT) BILL, 1951.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE.

THE objects of this Bill are—

- (a) to authorise the Forestry Commission to take an assignment of an invention made by any of its officers or employees in the course of their employment and to obtain letters patent for the invention, or to take an assignment of letters patent for any such invention;
- (b) to authorise the Forestry Commission to do all things, in relation to an invention for which it has obtained letters patent or the benefit of letters patent, which in like circumstances could be done by a private individual;
- (c) to provide that royalties and other fees received by the Forestry Commission under any licence granted for the use of any such invention shall be dealt with in the same manner as royalties presently payable under the Forestry Act, 1916-1949.

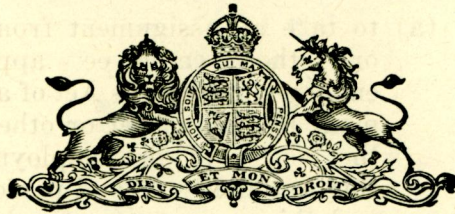
