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**Act No. 72, 1979.**

An Act to amend the Crimes Act, 1900, consequentially upon the enactment of the Summary offences (Repeal) Act, 1979. [Assented to, 11th May, 1979.]

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*Crimes (Summary Offences) Amendment.*

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**BE** it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

Short title.      **1.** This Act may be cited as the "Crimes (Summary Offences) Amendment Act, 1979".

ment.            **2.** (1) This section and section 1 shall commence on the date of assent to this Act.

(2) Except as provided in subsection (1), this Act shall commence on such day as may be appointed by the Governor in respect thereof and as may be notified by proclamation published in the Gazette.

- (a) that an indictable offence has been or is about to be committed;

357E. A member of the police force may stop, search and detain—

Police may stop and search persons and vehicles.

- (a) any person whom he reasonably suspects of having or conveying any thing stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained or any thing used or intended to be used in the commission of an indictable offence; or
- (b) any vehicle in which he reasonably suspects there is any thing stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained or any thing used or intended to be used in the commission of an indictable offence.

(2) If any property referred to in subsection (1) has not been delivered to the person lawfully entitled thereto, whether pursuant to an order under subsection (1) or otherwise, within one month after the determination of proceedings against a person for an offence with respect to the property, the property, if money, shall be paid to the Treasurer for payment into the Consolidated Revenue Fund or, if not money, may be sold by public auction and the proceeds of the sale shall be paid to the Treasurer for payment into that Fund.

(3) A person who is lawfully entitled to any property which has been dealt with in accordance with subsection (2) may recover the money or the proceeds of the sale, as the case may be, from the Treasurer.

(4) In subsection (1), "court" means—

- (a) where the value of the property, if not money, does not exceed \$2,000 or the property, if money, does not amount to more than \$2,000—the court of petty sessions for the district in which the property or money is held;
  - (b) where the value of the property, if not money, exceeds \$2,000 but does not exceed \$20,000 or the property, if money, amounts to more than \$2,000 but does not amount to more than \$20,000—the District Court of New South Wales; or
  - (c) where the value of the property, if not money, exceeds \$20,000 or the property, if money, amounts to more than \$20,000—the Supreme Court of New South Wales.

- (a) has any thing in his custody;
- (b) has any thing in the custody of another person;
- (c) has any thing in or on premises, whether belonging to or occupied by himself or not, or whether that thing is there for his own use or the use of another; or
- (d) gives custody of any thing to a person who is not lawfully entitled to possession of the thing,

which thing may be reasonably suspected of being stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained, shall be liable on conviction before a stipendiary magistrate to imprisonment for 6 months, or to a fine of \$400.

(2) It is a sufficient defence to a prosecution for an offence under subsection (1) if the defendant satisfies the court that he had no reasonable grounds for suspecting that the thing referred to in the charge was stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained.

(3) In this section, “premises” includes any structure, building, vehicle, vessel, whether decked or undecked, or place, whether built upon or not, and any part thereof.

## **CRIMES (SUMMARY OFFENCES) AMENDMENT BILL, 1979**

### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

**(This Explanatory Note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament)**

This Bill is cognate with the Summary Offences (Repeal) Bill, 1979.

The objects of this Bill are to amend the Crimes Act, 1900 ("the Act") consequentially upon the repeal of the Summary Offences Act, 1970—

- (a) to confine the offence of procuring for prostitution in section 91A of the Act to that of procuring a person who is not already a prostitute (Schedule 2 (1));
- (b) to omit the offence created by section 91D of the Act of being employed in a brothel (Schedule 2 (2));
- (c) to expand section 114 (1) of the Act so as to provide that a person who is armed with any weapon or instrument with intent to commit an indictable offence, commits an offence (Schedule 3 (1));
- (d) to extend the grounds for obtaining a search warrant to the case where there is reasonable ground to believe that there is in or on any premises "anything stolen or otherwise unlawfully obtained" (Schedule 4 (1));
- (e) to transfer from the Summary Offences Act, 1970, the provisions relating to—
  - (i) the powers of police to board, stop and detain vessels, and to stop and search persons and vehicles (Schedule 4 (2)); and
  - (ii) the procedure for disposal of property in the custody of the police (Schedule 4 (3));
- (f) to enact provisions with respect to the summary offences of—
  - (i) obtaining any money or valuable thing by a wilfully false representation (Schedule 5 (2));
  - (ii) framing a false invoice (Schedule 5 (2));
  - (iii) being unlawfully in possession of property (Schedule 5 (2));

- (iv) consorting with persons who have been convicted of indictable offences (Schedule 5 (3));
  - (v) being a convicted person found with intent to commit an offence (Schedule 5 (3));
  - (vi) resisting, etc., police (Schedule 5 (3));
  - (vii) peeping or prying (Schedule 5 (4)); and
- (g) to make other provisions of a minor or ancillary nature.

15 546B. (1) Any person who, having been convicted of an indictable offence, is found in or near any premises or public place with intent to commit an indictable offence shall be liable on conviction before a stipendiary magistrate to imprisonment for 6 months, or to a fine of \$400.

20 (2) In this section, “premises” includes any structure, building, vehicle, vessel, whether decked or undecked, or place, whether built upon or not, and any part thereof.

(E3) RESISTING, &C., POLICE.

25 546C. Any person who resists or hinders or incites any person to assault, resist or hinder a member of the police force in the execution of his duty shall be liable on conviction before a stipendiary magistrate to imprisonment for 3 months, or to a fine of \$200.
