

**POLICE REGULATION (RETIREMENT) AMENDMENT
BILL, 1981**

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Explanatory Note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament)

This Bill is cognate with the Police Regulation (Superannuation) Amendment Bill, 1981.

The objects of this Bill are—

- (a) to enable members of the police force of or below the rank of chief superintendent to retire voluntarily upon or after attaining the age of 55 years and before attaining the age of 60 years—special superannuation allowances are to be payable to those members under the proposed Police Regulation (Superannuation) Amendment Act, 1981 (Schedule 1 (3)); and
 - (b) to make it clear that members of the police force above the rank of chief superintendent may be compulsorily retired only after they have attained the age of 60 years (Schedule 1 (1) and (2)).

A BILL FOR

An Act to amend the Police Regulation Act, 1899, with respect to the retirement of members of the police force.

Police Regulation (Retirement) Amendment.

SCHEDULE 1.

(Sec. 3.)

AMENDMENTS TO THE POLICE REGULATION ACT, 1899.

(1) Section 4A (3)—

5 Omit the subsection, insert instead:—

(3) The Deputy Commissioner—

- (a) may retire from office upon or after attaining the age of 60 years;
- 10 (b) shall retire from office upon attaining the age of 65 years; and
- (c) may be retired from office by the Governor, on the recommendation of the Minister, upon or after attaining the age of 60 years and before attaining the age of 65 years.

(2) Section 4B (3)—

15 Omit the subsection, insert instead:—

(3) The Senior Assistant Commissioner and an Assistant Commissioner—

- (a) may retire from office upon or after attaining the age of 60 years;
- 20 (b) shall retire from office upon attaining the age of 62 years; and
- (c) may be retired from office by the Governor, on the recommendation of the Minister, upon or after attaining the age of 60 years and before attaining the age of 62 years.

Police Regulation (Retirement) Amendment.

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

5 Short title.

1. This Act may be cited as the "Police Regulation (Retirement) Amendment Act, 1981".

Commencement.

2. (1) This section and section 1 shall commence on the date of assent

(2) Except as provided in subsection (1), this Act shall commence on the day appointed and notified under section 2 (2) of the Police Regulation (Superannuation) Amendment Act, 1981.

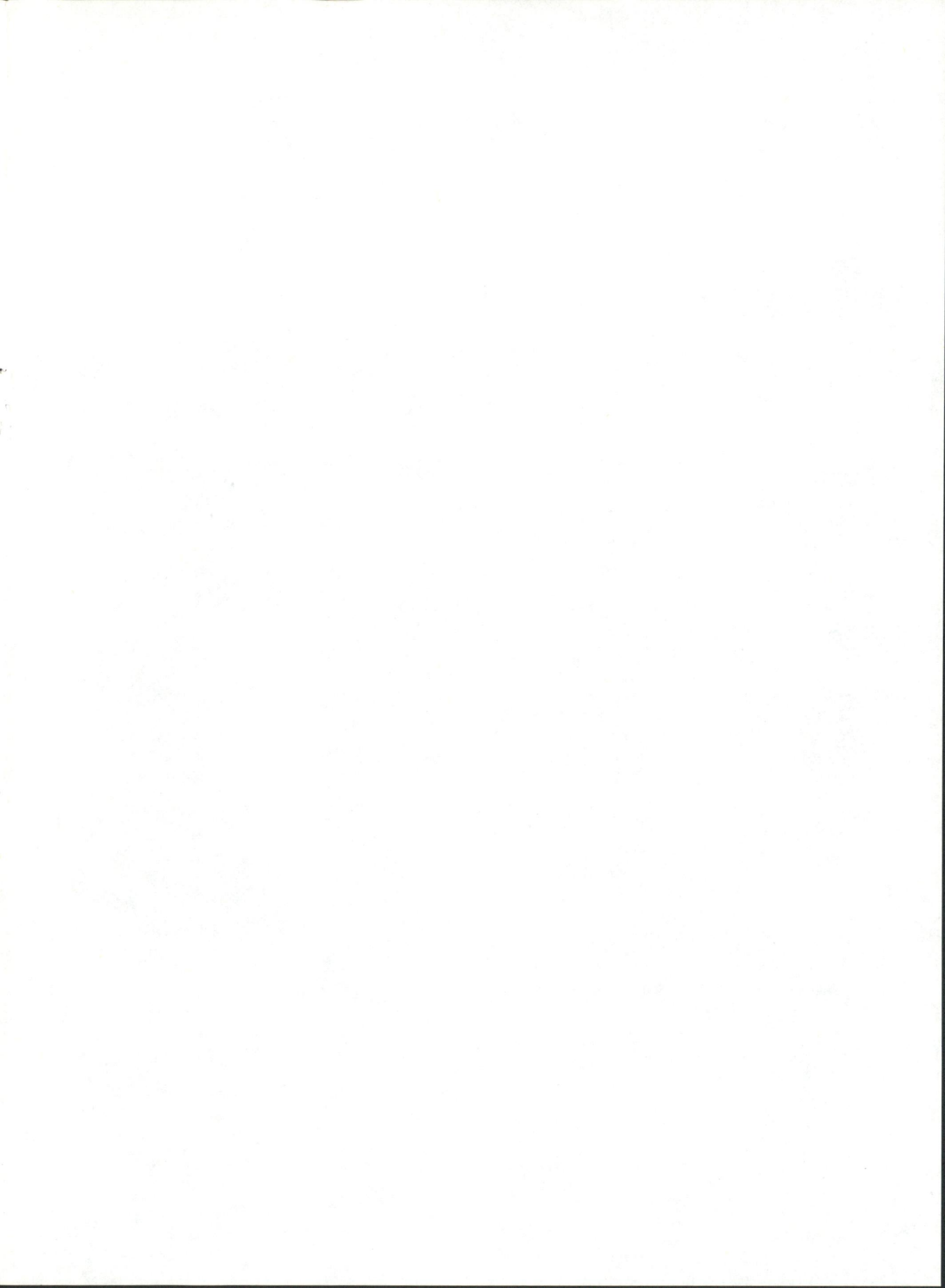

Act No. 35, 1981.

An Act to amend the Police Regulation Act, 1899, with respect to the retirement of members of the police force. [Assented to, 15th May, 1981.]

Police Regulation (Retirement) Amendment.

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Act may be cited as the "Police Regulation (Retirement) Amendment Act, 1981".

Commencement.

2. (1) This section and section 1 shall commence on the date of assent to this Act.

(2) Except as provided in subsection (1), this Act shall commence on the day appointed and notified under section 2 (2) of the Police Regulation (Superannuation) Amendment Act, 1981.

Amendment of Act No. 20, 1899.

3. The Police Regulation Act, 1899, is amended in the manner set forth in Schedule 1.

- (c) may be retired from office by the Governor, on the recommendation of the Minister, upon or after attaining the age of 60 years and before attaining the age of 65 years.

(2) Section 4B (3)—

Omit the subsection, insert instead:—

(3) The Senior Assistant Commissioner and an Assistant Commissioner—

- (a) may retire from office upon or after attaining the age of 60 years;
- (b) shall retire from office upon attaining the age of 62 years; and
- (c) may be retired from office by the Governor, on the recommendation of the Minister, upon or after attaining the age of 60 years and before attaining the age of 62 years.

(3) Section 11A—

After section 11, insert:—

Retirement of certain police.

11A. A member of the police force (other than the Commissioner, the Deputy Commissioner, the Senior Assistant Commissioner or an Assistant Commissioner)—

- (a) may retire from office upon or after attaining the age of 55 years; and
- (b) shall retire from office upon attaining the age of 60 years.
