CONSTITUTION FURTHER AMENDMENT (REFERENDUM) AMENDMENT BILL 1994

NEW SOUTH WALES



EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Explanatory Note relates to this Bill as introduced into Parliament)

The object of this Bill is to amend the Constitution Further Amendment (Referendum) Act 1930 to make the method of voting at State referendums consistent with Commonwealth law, which requires voters to place the word "yes" or "no" in a box on referendum ballot-papers. The Bill also makes some minor amendments to the Act by way of statute law revision.

Clause 1 specifies the short title of the proposed Act.

Clause 2 provides that the proposed Act commences on the date of assent.

Clause 3 is a formal provision giving effect to the Schedule of amendments.

Schedule 1 (1) is an amendment by way of statute law revision. It alters the short title of the Principal Act to "Referendum (Machinery Provisions) Act 1930". Section 70 of the Interpretation Act 1987 provides that if the short title of an Act is changed, a reference to the short title in any other Act or document is to be read as a reference to the short title as changed.

Schedule 1 (2) is also an amendment by way of statute law revision. It omits section 2, which sets out the division of the Principal Act into Parts and Divisions. Under arrangements that have been in operation for some time, Acts are now accompanied by more detailed Tables of Provisions. The Table removes the need for the section.

Schedule 1 (3) amends section 14 to require the voter to insert the word "yes" or "no" in a box on the referendum ballot-paper opposite the name of the Bill that is the subject of the referendum. This replaces the requirement that a tick be placed beside the appropriate word. The new requirement is consistent with the arrangements for Commonwealth referendums.

Schedule 1 (4) is a consequential amendment. It omits section 21 (2), which provides that a ballot-paper is not invalid merely because the voter has inserted a cross or the number "1" instead of a tick. Section 21 (1) already provides that a ballot-paper is not invalid if the voter has clearly indicated his or her intention on the ballot-paper.

Schedule 1 (5) is also a consequential amendment. It replaces the various forms used in referendums as a consequence of the new arrangements.

A BILL FOR

An Act to amend the Constitution Further Amendment (Referendum) Act 1930 in relation to the manner of voting at referendums; and for other purposes.

The Legislature of New South Wales enacts:

Short title

1. This Act may be cited as the Constitution Further Amendment (Referendum) Amendment Act 1994.

5 Commencement

2. This Act commences on the date of assent.

Amendment of Constitution Further Amendment (Referendum) Act 1930 No. 2

3. The Constitution Further Amendment (Referendum) Act 1930 is amended as set out in Schedule 1.

(1) Omit section 1, insert instead:

Short title

1. This Act may be cited as the Referendum (Machinery Provisions) Act 1930.

(2) Section 2 (Division into Parts):

Omit the section.

(3) Section 14 (Voting to be by ballot):

Omit section 14 (2), insert instead:

- (2) Each elector is to indicate his or her vote on the ballot-paper:
 - (a) if the elector approves of the Bill—by writing the word "Yes" in the space provided on the ballot-paper; or
 - (b) if the elector does not approve of the Bill—by writing the word "No" in the space provided on the ballot-paper.

- (4) Section 21 (Saving of informality): Omit section 21 (2).
- (5) Second Schedule (Forms): Omit Forms B, D and E, insert instead:
