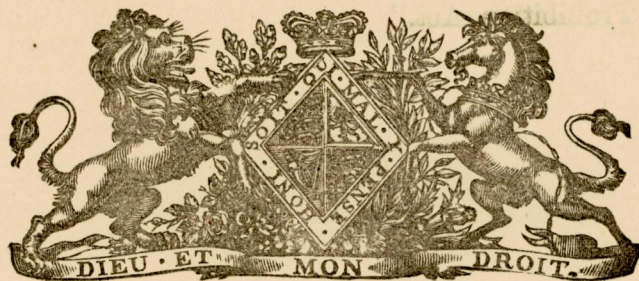
Grape-vines and Grapes Importation Prohibition.

4. All informations for offences against this Act may be heard and determined and all penalties under this Act may be imposed by any two Justices of the Peace in a summary way and may be recovered by distress and sale of the offender's goods. Provided however that every such information shall be laid within two months after the commission of the said offence.

5. One moiety of any penalty imposed under the provisions of this Act shall go to the informer and the other moiety to the Colonial Treasurer to be by him carried over to the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Summary jurisdiction.

4. Appropriation of penalties.

5. One moiety of any penalty imposed under the provisions of this Act shall go to the informer and the other moiety to the Colonial Treasurer to be by him carried over to the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Short title and duration of Act.

6. This Act shall come into operation on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and shall continue in force until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and seventy and may be cited as the "Grape-vines and Grapes Importation Prohibition Act."
