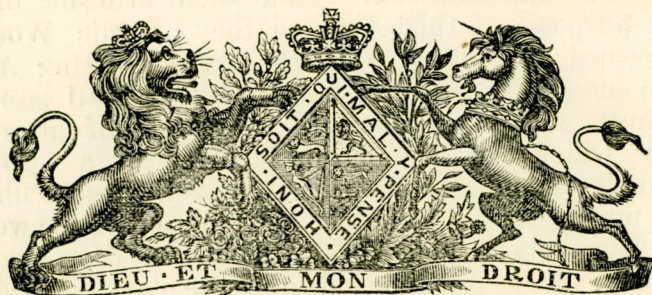

**W**HEREAS, pursuant to the "Public Works Act of 1888," a Preamble. certain proposed Public Work, namely, a "new Central Police Court," was, on the twenty-fourth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, duly submitted and explained by the Secretary for Public Works in the Legislative Assembly, and such work was thereupon referred, on the motion of the said Minister, to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works, which Committee reported thereon to the said Assembly in the following terms, namely:—"That the Committee consider it expedient that the new Central Police Court be erected as proposed on the plans and explained in the evidence before the Committee;" And whereas on the seventh day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the said Assembly by resolution declared "that in accordance with the Report from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works it is expedient that a new Central Police Court referred to the Committee for inquiry be erected on the site named in the Committee's report, and at a total estimated cost of forty-eight thousand pounds." Short title.

1. This Act may be cited as the "Sydney Central Police Court Act of 1889," and shall be read with the "Public Works Act of 1888."

Work to be carried out.

2. The Public Work more particularly described in the Schedule to this Act shall be carried out by the Secretary for Public Works, or the Member of the Executive Council for the time being charged with the duties of the said Minister. And such Minister or Member shall for the purposes of this Act and the "Public Works Act of 1888" be deemed and taken to be the "Constructing Authority" authorized to enter into contracts, and to exercise all powers, do all acts and things, and be responsible in respect of all obligations and liabilities which can be done or incurred by a "Constructing Authority" under or pursuant to this Act or the said Public Works Act, so far as may be necessary for the carrying out of the work hereby sanctioned. The plans of such Work with the alteration recommended by the Committee in this Act referred to are the plans marked "Sydney Central Police Court," signed by the Secretary for Public Works and countersigned by the Colonial Architect and deposited in the office of the said Secretary for Public Works.

Cost, how to be defrayed.

3. The cost of carrying out the work hereby sanctioned shall be defrayed from such Loan Votes as are now, or may hereafter be applicable thereto.
