A BILL

To amend the Act of the twenty-first year of the reign of King George the Third, and to give effect to the provisions of the Act of the twenty-first year of the reign of King George the Fourth, in relation to the law concerning the transmission of property.

Enacted by the Queen in Council, in the first year of the reign of King Edward the Seventh.

1. It is hereby enacted that the law concerning the transmission of property shall be as follows:—

2. In the case of a person dying intestate, the property of such person shall devolve upon the person or persons entitled thereto by the law of the country in which he or she was domiciled at the time of his or her death.

3. In the case of a person dying testate, the property of such person shall devolve upon the person or persons named in his or her will, in accordance with the law of the country in which he or she was domiciled at the time of his or her death.

4. Nothing in this Act shall be construed as affecting the law relating to the succession to the Crown or to the Peerage.

5. The Queen's Printer shall print and publish this Act.

6. This Act may be cited as the Act of 1900.
