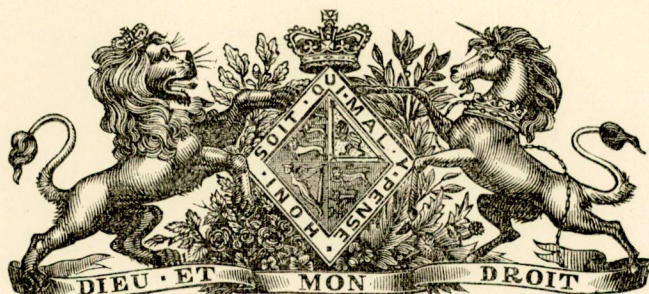

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The Governor may make and issue regulations, to be in force in all the mining districts of the Colony or in any district or division thereof, or within any gold-field, for the prevention of lead-poisoning, or poisoning by lead or any other fumes, in conducting mining operations for any metal or mineral; and may in those regulations impose a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for any infringement of the same, and in the case of a continuing infringement not exceeding five pounds for each day of the continuance thereof.
