HEREAS by letters patent, dated the ninth day of March, Preamble. one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six, His late Majesty King George the Fourth was pleased to create a corporation by the name of "The Trustees of the Clergy and School Lands in the Colony 5 of New South Wales": And whereas the said trustees did in or about the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty suggest and recommend to His Excellency Lieutenant-General Ralph Darling, then Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony, that a school should be founded in the town of Parramatta, in the said Colony, in connection 10 with the United Church of England and Ireland as by law established, for the reception of boarders and day scholars, and that such school should be called the King's School: And whereas by a minute dated the eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, under the hand of His Excellency Colonel Patrick 15 Lindesay, then Acting Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony, it was c 28-A reported

WHEREAS by letters patent, dated the ninth day of March, <sup>Preamble.</sup> one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six, His late Majesty King George the Fourth was pleased to create a corporation by the name of "The Trustees of the Clergy and School Lands in the Colony 5 of New South Wales": And whereas the said trustees did in or about the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty suggest and recommend to His Excellency Lieutenant-General Ralph Darling, then Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony, that a school should be founded in the town of Parramatta, in the said Colony, in connection 10 with the United Church of England and Ireland as by law established, for the reception of boarders and day scholars, and that such school should be called the King's School: And whereas by a minute dated the eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, under the hand of His Excellency Colonel Patrick 15 Lindesay, then Acting Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony, it was reported to the Legislative Council of the said Colony that the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies had signified the approval of His late Majesty King William the Fourth of the establishment of a school at Parramatta aforesaid, in accordance with the 20 suggestion and recommendation aforesaid: And whereas for the site 154-A and

and purposes of such school a parcel of land containing by admeasurement six acres two roods and twenty perches, and more particularly described in Schedule A hereto, was, in or about the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, duly vested in the said corporation by Major-General Sir Richard Bourke, then Governor-in- 5 Chief of the said Colony: And whereas in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two a school called the "King's School" was erected and opened upon the said land, and has since been carried on in pursuance of the premises : And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and 10 thirty-three, the said corporation of the trustees of the clergy and school lands was dissolved, and thereupon the said parcel of land, by virtue of the charter of incorporation of the said corporation, reverted to and became vested in the Crown, to be disposed of by His Majesty, then the King, His heirs and successors, in such manner as should 15 appear most conducive to the maintenance and promotion of religion and the education of youth in the said Colony: And whereas by letters patent or grant under the hand of His Excellency, Sir Charles Augustus Fitzroy, then Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony, dated the twenty-eighth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, 20 the said parcel of land, being the land described in Schedule A hereto, was granted unto the Right Reverend William Grant Broughton, then Lord Bishop of Sydney, and his successors Bishops of Sydney, subject to the trusts, reservations, conditions, and provisions therein contained, upon trust for a school-house, to be called and known by the name of 25 the King's School, in connection with the United Church of England and Ireland, as by law established, and for no other purpose whatso-And whereas the several parcels of land described in Schedule ever: B hereto are now vested in the present Bishop of Sydney and Metropolitan for the purposes of the said King's School: And whereas 30 by virtue of three several indentures; that is to say, an indenture made the fifth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixtysix, between Stella Kemp and others of the one part and the Right Reverend Frederic Barker, then Bishop of Sydney, of the other part; an indenture made twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand 35 eight hundred and eighty-six, between Robert Campbell Close and others of the one part and the Most Reverend Alfred Barry, then Bishop of Sydney, of the other part; and an indenture made fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, between Sir William Westbrook Burton and another of the first and second 40 parts respectively and the Most Reverend Alfred Barry, then Bishop of Sydney, of the third part; the three several sums of money in and by the said indentures respectively mentioned and assigned are vested in and held by the Bishop of Sydney and his successors upon trust respectively for the endowment and maintenance of three scholarships 45 in connection with the said school, known respectively as the "Broughton Scholarship," the "Broughton and Forrest Scholarship," and the "Burton Scholarship:" And whereas by an indenture made the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, between James Arthur Dowling and another of the 50 one part and the Church of England Property Trust, Diocese of Sydney, of the other part, the sum of money therein mentioned was assigned unto and is now held by the said Church of England Property Trust, Diocese of Sydney, upon trust for the endowment and maintenance of a scholarship in connection with the said school, 55 to be known as the "Macarthur Scholarship," which said sums of money in this and the preceding recital mentioned are hereinafter referred to as "the scholarship endowment funds :" And whereas the Reverend Robert Forrest, a clerk in holy orders, was in the year

year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two appointed by His late Majesty's then Secretary of State for the Colonies to be the first headmaster of the said school: And whereas the said Robert Forrest died in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the 5 several persons who have since successively held the appointment of head master of the said school have all been appointed thereto by the Bishop of Sydney for the time being: And whereas by deed-poll under the episcopal seal, dated the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, the Right Reverend Frederic 10 Barker, then Bishop of Sydney and Metropolitan, did, for himself and his successors, among other things, declare, direct, and appoint that the general government and management of the said King's School and all the matters relating thereto, and the nomination and appointment of the head master thereof should thenceforth be 15 vested in a body of persons to be called the Council of the King's School, and that the said Council should consist of eleven members called Governors, of whom the Bishop of Sydney for the time being should be one, and should by virtue of his office be President of the said Council, and also visitor of the said school, and the other 20 Governors should be elected for life by the synod of the diocese of Sydney in manner therein set forth : And whereas the said Council is at the present time composed of the following members, that is to say: The Most Reverend William Saumarez Smith, D.D., The Lord Bishop of Sydney, President; The Very Reverend William Macquarie 25 Cowper, M.A., Dean of Sydney; The Venerable Archdeacon Gunther, M.A.; The Reverend H. Wallace-Mort, M.A.; The Reverend James Christian Corlette, D.D.; The Reverend Francis Rowling Elder, B.A.; The Honorable George Henry Cox; His Honor Judge Docker, M.A.; The Honorable Sir Joseph Palmer Abbott; James Sheen Dowling, 30 LL.B.; and The Honorable Phillip Gidley King: And whereas it is expedient that the said Council should be incorporated and invested with the powers and authorities hereinafter contained : Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of 35 New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of

the same, as follows :-

1. From and after the passing of this Act the said members of Council of the the Council of the King's School shall be and they are hereby king's School constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Council

- 40 of the King's School, and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and may enter into contracts, and sue and be sued or otherwise appear and answer and be answered, and may take and hold to them and their successors by grant, will, or otherwise, in perpetuity or for any life or term of years, as well lands, heredita-
- 45 ments, and chattels real as chattels personal, and may, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, grant, demise, mortgage, charge, alien, or otherwise dispose of all or any lands, hereditaments, or chattels, real or personal, which may at any time be vested in the said body corporate, and may issue debentures, and also shall or may do all 50 other things incident or appertaining to a body corporate.

2. From and after the passing and by virtue of this Act there Property vested in shall be vested in the said corporation and its successors all and the corporation. singular the lands and hereditaments described in Schedule A and Schedule B hereto, and also all other property, whether real or personal, 55 which immediately before the passing of this Act was vested in any person or persons or corporation upon trust for or for the purposes of the said King's School: Provided that this section shall not operate to vest any of the said scholarship endowment funds in the said Council; but it shall be lawful for the Bishop of Sydney for the 60 time being, by deed under the episcopal seal, to assign and transfer the said "Broughton," "Broughton and Forrest," and "Burton" scholarship

scholarship endowment funds unto the said Council; and thereupon the said scholarship endowment funds so assigned and transferred shall become vested in the said Council and its successors as to each of such funds upon the trusts and for the purposes declared by the instrument whereby the same was assigned to the said Bishop as 5 hereinbefore recited : And it shall also be lawful for the said Church of England Property Trust, Diocese of Sydney, by deed under its corporate seal, to assign and transfer the said "Macarthur" scholarship endowment fund unto the said Council, and upon such assignment the said "Macarthur" scholarship endowment fund shall become 10 vested in the said Council, upon the trusts and for the purposes declared by the said indenture of the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

3. Notwithstanding the powers vested in the said corporation by this Act, it shall not be lawful for the said corporation to alienate, 15 mortgage, charge, or demise the lands described in Schedule A hereto, or any part thereof, or any lands or hereditaments hereafter to be granted unto the said corporation and its successors by Her Majesty or Her successors as a free grant or grants for the purposes of the said King's School, without the consent in writing of the Governor, with 20 the advice of the Executive Council, of the said Colony for the time being, save by way of lease, for any term not exceeding forty years, during the whole currency whereof there shall be reserved and made payable the best rent that can be reasonably gotten for the same without any fine or premium.

4. In case the said Council shall at any time sell and dispose of any lands or hereditaments which are or shall be vested in them, or shall raise any moneys by mortgage of or charge upon any such lands, or by the issue of debentures, the proceeds of such sale or sales and all such moneys so raised by mortgage, charge, or debentures shall be 30 applied or invested exclusively in one or all or any of the ways following, that is to say :—

- (a) In the purchase for an estate in fee simple of other lands and hereditaments in the said Colony and within the Police District of Paramatta for the purposes of the said school.
- (b) In the erection of houses, buildings, and other improvements of a permanent nature upon lands vested in the said Council.
- (c) In Government debentures or securities of any kind of the said Colony, or upon freehold securities in the said Colony.

5. The said Council shall consist of eleven members called 40 governors, of whom the Bishop of the diocese of Sydney for the time being shall always be one, and of the remaining ten governors five shall be licensed clergymen of the Church of England, in the said Colony in priest's orders, and the remaining five shall be lay members of the Church of England in the said Colony. 45

6. All vacancies occurring in the said Council by reason of death, resignation, removal, incapacity, or other cause shall be filled up as soon as conveniently may be by election by a majority of the Synod of the diocese of Sydney, present at any duly convened meeting thereof, and pending such meeting the said Council may fill 50 up any such vacancy temporarily.

7. As soon as conveniently may be after the passing of this Act the said Council shall formulate and adopt a code of regulations touching the conduct of the said school, and the course of education and religious instruction to be followed therein, and declaring what 55 causes other than death or resignation shall render vacant the office of Governor of the said Council, and shall have full power from time to time to vary, modify, and revoke such regulations and substitute others in their place in such manner as shall seem best calculated to promote the purposes for which the said school has been established. 60

8. The said Council shall hold all the property at any time Council to hold vested in them by virtue of this Act upon trust, to carry or cause to property subject to be carried into effect the regulations hereinbefore referred to; and in the synod. the meantime shall hold the same, subject to the rules and regulations 5 at the present time in force or use for the government and conduct of

the said school.

9. Subject to the code of regulations so to be formulated and Council to have adopted by the said Council, the said Council shall have the general general management, management and superintendence of the affairs, concerns, and property

10 of the said school, and shall have full power to appoint and dismiss the head master of the said school, and also to make such rules and and may make by-laws as to the said Council shall seem expedient for carrying into by-laws effect the provisions and objects of this Act, and such rules and by-laws or any of them to alter or revoke from time to time, and to 15 substitute others in their place.

10. At every meeting of the said Council the Bishop of Sydney Proceedings at shall preside if present, and in his absence a chairman of the meeting meetings of the shall be chosen by a majority of the governors present; and all questions which shall come before the said Council shall be decided

- 20 by a majority of the governors present, and the president or chairman shall not have a vote, except in the case of an equality of votes when he shall have a casting vote only; and no question shall be decided quorum. at any meeting unless five governors at the least shall be present at the time of such decision.
- 25 11. The said Council shall, at least once in every year, and also Annual reports to be whenever a resolution shall be passed and communicated to them by sent to the Synod. the Synod of the diocese of Sydney, in that behalf, report their proceedings, and the progress and condition of the said school to the said Synod; and at the same time present a balance sheet showing the
- 30 financial position of the said Council.

12. The Bishop of Sydney for the time being shall be the visitor Visitor. of the said school, with all such powers as by law appertain to the office of visitor of a school.

13. 14. This Act may be cited the "King's School Council Act."
